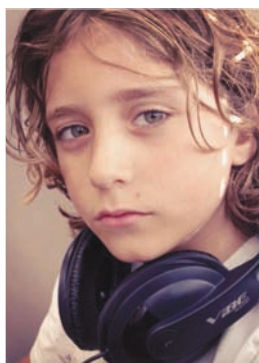

Council looks at options for the old Schomberg arena

Ideas for re-purposing the Schomberg Agricultural Arena and Community Centre were brought forward at the committee of the whole meeting Monday.

The staff report was presented to council at the meeting, serving as an update on the results of the Expressions of Interest (EOI) issued by the township. The report also made recommendations for the next steps in the process for redevelopment of the arena building and property.

Last year council decided to try and re-purpose the building and property instead of selling it. A number of factors were considered in the decision including the potential loss of an important community asset, the loss of future opportunity for re-use for community purpose, impact to the Schomberg Agricultural Fair and loss of green space. As part of the agreement, any future use should generate \$1.3 million in funding (the appraised value of the old arena) in order to recover costs which were supposed to go towards the Trisan Centre debt. The intent is to re-purpose the site through a public/private partnership by way of a sale or lease that will result in a multi-purpose, community use and/or mixed community/commercial use facility, explained Chris Fasciano, director of parks, recreation and culture for the Township of King. Staff were to

report back to council with the results of that exercise and they did so Monday.

"Initially the Schomberg Arena was to be put up for sale but we wanted to look at ways to keep the building and the land and keep allowing the Schomberg Agricultural Society to use it for the fair while also recovering the debt of \$1.3 million to go towards the new Trisan Centre," said Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "Any proposal that can achieve that goal as well as keeping the facility, adding value and enhancing the community is great."

After an extensive public consultation process, council recommended the issuance of an EOI to interested individuals, businesses or organizations. Staff developed the EOI document taking into consideration input received from the community consultation. The document was issued at the end of February with the purpose of gathering options for the future use of the site. By the time the EOI closed at the end of April, three submissions were received and those options were presented to council at the meeting.

The first option proposed (Proposal A) is for a mixed commercial/light industrial including a micro-brewery, retail store, restaurant and community space. Potential commercial uses for the property include a micro-brewery, winery, bakery, boutiques, agricultural and rural businesses, community kitchens and in-

door farmers market.

"Described as a destination craft-brewery, craft cidery, craft distillery, restaurant and retail site, the project is intended to build a state of the art world class facility that will act as a destination spot bringing tourism, employment and a significant positive financial impact to the area," reads the staff report.

The second proposal (Proposal B) is for a long-term care facility including onsite associated services such as medical offices and a pharmacy and community space.

"This proposal involves the redevelopment of the site with a new commercial/community centre building described as an institute for home and community care and the construction of approximately 30 individual living care units focused on the needs of seniors requiring a continuum of care," stated the staff report.

The third option (Proposal C) proposes a fair and agriplex facility. The year-round facility would host the annual agricultural fair, agricultural/community/equine events, an indoor equestrian centre and potential rental opportunities in the arena, hall or fairgrounds through a business partnership with the municipality.

This option was not selected as a preferred option by staff as it would present a financial risk to the township in that it would require continued financial investment by the township.

Furthermore, the public consultation process revealed that there was minimal support for residential development in that area as many people felt there were enough residential units available in Schomberg.

The next step is to move forward with a Request For Proposal (RFP) process taking into consideration the community's input while making sure the proposal will finance the current Trisan debt requirement. According to staff, Proposal A is the best option for the township, but some members of council were not so sure.

Pellegrini wanted to know why the proposal for the microbrewery, commercial and retail space was selected over the proposal for the long-term care facility.

"Recommendations in this report were discussed by your management team," explained Township CAO Susan Plamondon. "Based on what we understand to be the preferred approach that met the financial requirement, this proposal was the one that was most consistent with the preferred alternative that came out of the

public consultation."

She added the Township could issue an RFP that solicits proposals consistent with both Proposal A and B, if council prefers.

"One thing we heard loud and clear is the retention of the building if possible and allowing the Schomberg Agricultural Society to continue the Schomberg Fair," said Plamondon, explaining the long-term care facility option proposes removal of the existing building and redevelopment of the site. "The first proposal is more inline with the preferred alternatives we heard discussed during the community consultation."

Pellegrini said he wants to see the land retained, not necessarily the building.

"It's our land. You can't buy land like that anymore," said Pellegrini. "Let's try to keep it so that 50 years from now it will still be part of Schomberg. I think the building has passed its useful life. It may be cheaper to tear it down and put a new building. I really think both (options) have incredible merit."

He added that the proposal for a long-term care facility is innovative and he would like to further explore it to see whether it is feasible or not. He asked

that a senior care centre be added to the list of possible uses in the RFP.

Councillor Peter Grandilli did not agree.

"In 2009, council approved the sale of this arena and the proceeds to go to the Trisan Centre. I do not know why we are dragging our feet," said Grandilli. "After four years I think it's time we came to a decision. We should reapprove the sale of the building. I don't think King Township should retain any of this land or the arena. We are not here to partner with

private businesses."

Grandilli said that keeping the arena is costing the taxpayer money and he requested a report to find out exactly how much.

"Overall I am completely disappointed with this report and I expect something better than this," said Grandilli.

Pellegrini responded, stating exploring options for the property has not cost the taxpayers a penny.

Fleetwood is disturbed that it happened, and would like those responsible to be held accountable. She's considering offering a reward for information on the matter.

Stolen vehicles located in King, charges laid

Two Bradford men are facing several charges after stolen vehicles were found on a King Township property.

York Regional Police report they began their investigation after recent spikes in thefts of Honda and Toyota vehicles throughout the region. Through the course of the investigation, two suspects were identified.

On May 22, members of the York Regional Police Auto Cargo Theft Unit, with the assistance of #4 District Criminal Investigation Bureau, #2 District Criminal Investigation Bureau and South Simcoe Police, executed a search warrant on a business located at 20100 Bathurst Street, in the Township of King. The shop was being run out of a rented unit on a barn on the property.

As a result of the search, six stolen vehicles were recovered, two trailers, as well as parts from four other stolen vehicles, for a total value of approximately \$150,000.

Two individuals were located on the property and were arrested and charged with theft over \$5,000, possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000 and altering a VIN.

The investigation is ongoing and officers are asking anyone with information to come forward.

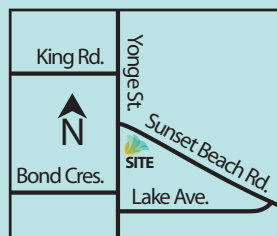

Oak Ridges Moraine Foundation and conservation authorities create partnership

The Oak Ridges Moraine Foundation (ORMF) and the Conservation Authorities Moraine Coalition (CAMC) are pleased to announce the formation of a strategic partnership that will further examine the effectiveness of the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan (ORMCP).

Unanimously passed by the Province of Ontario in 2002, the ORMCP was hailed as one of Ontario's most successful and innovative "environment-first" pieces of legislation, and has provided a pathway to better planning on the Oak Ridges Moraine. With growing concerns over the piecemeal and expanding development on the Oak Ridges Moraine, the ORMCP was created to provide land-use and resource management direction for the 190,000 hectares of land and water within the Moraine. It has been a major catalyst for protecting the drinking water of more than 250,000 people on the Oak Ridges Moraine and millions more in the Greater Toronto Area.

In 2011, the ORMF released a series of eight reports called Measuring Success on the Oak Ridges Moraine. These reports assessed how effective the provincial government, the ORMF and all other Moraine partners have been in meeting the purpose and objectives of the ORMCP. Although there were many accomplishments to be cited in the reports, there were still considerable gaps and deficiencies identified in the ORMCP that threaten the future of the Moraine's ecological and hydrological integrity.

Only one-third of all streams on the ORM are functioning as healthy, natural ecosystems. Grassland birds are in decline and rare prairie and savannah habitats are threatened, as is habitat for interior bird species and endangered wildlife.

The reports also revealed dominant threats to the moraine including the dumping of contaminated fill into areas of high aquifer vulnerability on the moraine, draining of aquifers for



development off the moraine and the building of infrastructure that traverses the moraine.

"It is virtually impossible to meaningfully protect or even improve biodiversity on the Oak Ridges Moraine without addressing the need to review the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Act and Plan, and close the gaps and loopholes," said Kim Gavine, executive director of the ORMF.

In 2013, the ORMF

and CAMC will work together to collect further data and compile key policy recommendations for review of the ORMCP which is scheduled for 2015. They will work alongside all Moraine stakeholders, including the public from local communities, to address the policy gaps and deficiencies within the plan so it is better at achieving its original objectives.

"Comprised of nine conservation authorities whose watershed boundaries collectively cover the entire moraine, the CAMC is pleased to work with the ORMF in collecting the necessary scientific data to report on ORM-wide health and trends overtime and most importantly to help the province make informed decisions during the 2015 ORMCP legislative review," said Rob Messervey, chair of the Conservation Authorities Moraine Coalition.

The Oak Ridges Moraine is one of Ontario's most prominent ecosystems. It is a geological ridge of land up to 300 metres high that runs parallel and about 60 kilometres north of Lake Ontario. It extends 160 kilometres, from the Trent River in the east to the Niagara Escarpment in the west. More than 30 of the rivers that drain into Lake Simcoe and Lake Ontario have their headwaters in the Moraine. The Moraine supplies drinking wa-

ter to more than 250,000 people.

The Oak Ridges Moraine Foundation (ORMF) is a non-profit organization mandated to preserve, protect and restore the ecological and hydrological health of the Oak Ridges Moraine (Moraine). Since 2002, the ORMF has allocated more than \$14.1 million and leveraged more than \$35.8 million to 177 projects in sup-

port of stewardship, education, research, trail and land securement projects. While the ORMF's granting role is currently suspended, it still has a pivotal role to play in collecting the necessary data (policy and technical) in preparation for review of the ORMCP in 2015.

York Regional council to ask province for additional member for Vaughan

The City of Vaughan could get an additional regional councillor.

York regional council voted unanimously in favour of asking the Ontario Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing to enact a regulation to authorize adding an additional member of regional council for the City of Vaughan in time for the Oct. 27, 2014 municipal elections. The decision was made at the council meeting Thursday.

The addition would increase the City of Vaughan's representation on York Regional Council from four members to five, and is based on the need to ensure Vaughan residents are adequately represented based on a representation by population principle.

"The issue is self-explanatory," said Mayor Maurizio Bevilacqua. "It is about fair representation for Regional Council. I think we have been under-represented for a while and this issue will allow us to bring fairness to council and indeed to the City of Vaughan. I have spoken to a number of individuals ... and I think we're just ready for the vote now."

Each member of Re-

gional Council from the City of Vaughan currently represents approximately 78,000 residents, and based on population projections will increase to more than 87,000 residents in 2018 if its representation stays at four members.

With 28 per cent of York Region's population, Vaughan only has 20 per cent regional council representation. By contrast, if the City of Vaughan had five members, each Vaughan member of regional council would represent approximately 64,500 residents, which would be more favourable for City of Vaughan residents.

"This addition reflects how York Region's population is increasing by another 400,000 residents by 2031 with a majority of that growth happening in our southern three municipalities," said Bill Fisch, York Region Chairman and CEO. "Based on its population, The City of Vaughan is currently under-represented on our current council and this request by regional council will address that."

Markham Mayor Frank Scarpitti agreed.

"I think it is fundamental for this council to operate with representation by

population and certainly the city of Vaughan has that population and I think the number of representatives and the weighted representation on this council should reflect that population based on the formula that we use," said Scarpitti. "If down the road there are other municipalities that pass the threshold where we need to do the same thing, then I don't know maybe 15 or 20 years from now we may have to revisit some of that formula. The Formula is what it is and I think the City of Vaughan is owed that representation based on population."

If the minister approves the regulation, council must give public notice of its intention to pass a bylaw changing the size of council and hold at least one public meeting to consider this. There also must be a triple majority support in order for the bylaw to pass. This includes:

1) Obtaining a majority of votes on York Regional Council.

2) Obtaining a majority of the nine local municipal councils.

3) Electors in the local municipalities must represent a majority of electors in York Region.

The bylaw would need

to be passed by Dec. 31, 2013 in order to be in effect for the 2014 municipal election. Adding one additional member will bring the total composition of York Regional Council to 22 members, which includes the York Region Chairman and CEO.

The municipalities of Aurora, King, East Gwillimbury and Whitchurch-Stouffville currently do not have a regional councillor. Those municipali-

ties have motions coming forward next month requesting a regional councillor be added for the municipalities that don't have one.

"If the good mayor from Vaughan is talking about fairness then I am sure he would be willing to add an amendment it would be conditional on elected representatives be added to the other four municipalities that only have one," said Grossi. "If we're

talking fairness, I think it would only be fair with respect to those other municipalities. I didn't want to get into this discussion, but if we're going to get into it, we know what discussions have taken place so far and fairness means that Aurora, East Gwillimbury, King and Whitchurch-Stouffville should have an additional member."

Crime in York Region is down for 9th year in a row

York Regional Police Chief Eric Jolliffe reported that the overall crime rate decreased for the ninth year in a row, dropping 5.4% in 2012.

The rate for property crimes and assault has decreased. The assault rate has decreased by 4.83% or 160 fewer incidents from 2011, and the property crime rate has decreased by 2% or 426 fewer incidents from 2011.

The number of cases that were cleared in 2012 was 62.1% which is a slight increase from 2011. 9-1-1 calls decreased by 4.2% in 2012.

The number of non-emergency calls also decreased by 2.3% with the total number of calls received decreasing by 3% from 673,186 to 652,793. Reported Hate Crime occurrences in York Region decreased by 10.1% in 2012 compared to the corresponding period in 2011.

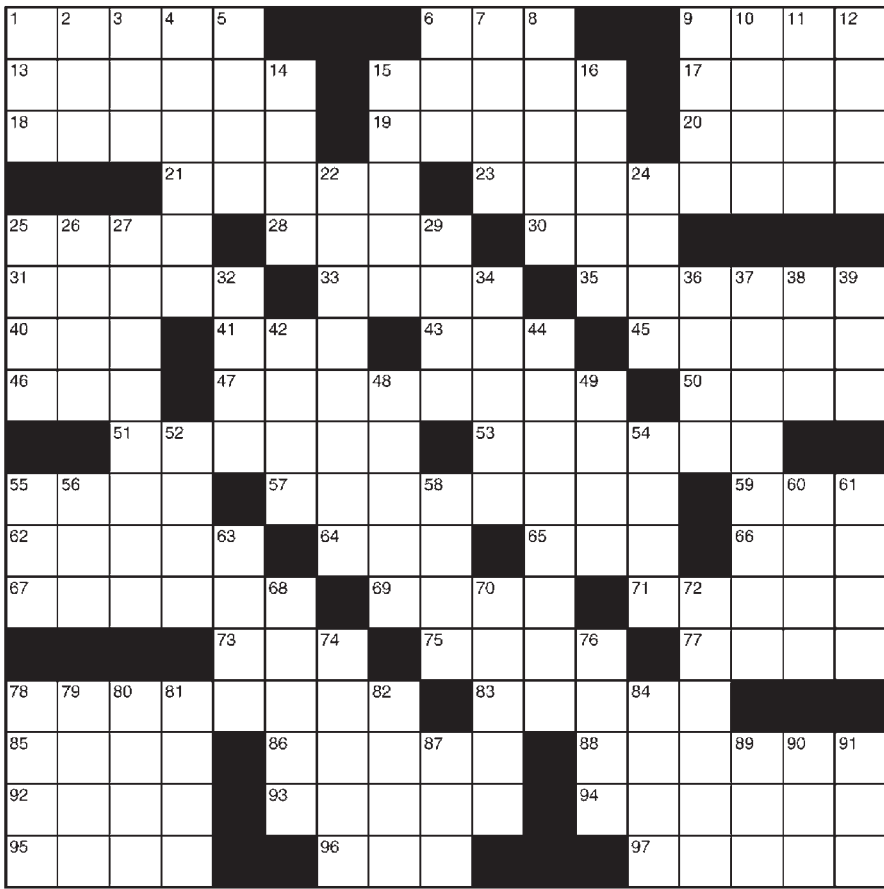
Coming up, Michael will be attending CMTC (Canadian Model and Talent Convention) and will be performing at the CNE in his year's Rising Stars competition.

King resident participates in Michigan fundraising run

A King resident and Toronto firefighter believes there's no such thing as borders when it comes to helping our fellow men and women.

Adam Simson, a 16-year King resident, joined family and friends May 4 for Ryan's Angiosarcoma Awareness 5k Run/Walk in Troy, Michigan.

Simson's cousin and some of his friends worked with Ryan Humphrey, a young family man who had it all, until his life came crashing down with the diagnosis of a rare form of cancer.

Ryan felt blessed by his wife Andrea and their two sons, Landon and Logan.

Just as Ryan earned his wings with a dream-come-true career (a pilot with American Airlines/American Eagle), life threw Ryan a curve ball when he learned that he had angiosarcoma, a rare, aggressive and little known cancer. As a result of undergoing lung surgery and unable to pass the medical requirements for pilots, Ryan was no longer able to fly so he returned to his previous position as a customer service agent.

When the cancer returned in 2012, Ryan refused to have the disease take over his life. Instead, while undergoing 10 rounds of chemotherapy, Ryan enrolled in undergraduate classes in medical school and he also started researching and learning more about angiosarcoma so that he could make others aware

of this rare and deadly form of cancer.

According to Humphrey, angiosarcoma accounts for only 0.1% of adult malignancies, is poorly understood, and is one of the most aggressive cancers. It also has a dismal prognosis with a five-year overall survival rate of only 30%. The lining of the blood vessels (endothelial cells) become malignant. In angiosarcoma, the endothelial cells grow uncontrollably and create more blood vessels until a tumor comprised of blood vessels has formed. This cancer is particularly aggressive because it has a high rate of metastasis.

Ryan created a website, www.nobodyfightsalone.com, to share what he has learned and his experiences.

Although Ryan watched his dream career as a commercial pilot fade away, because of his battle with angiosarcoma, he refused to give up the fight and today he is blessed to be alive and a survivor.

Ryan has made it his mission to make people aware of angiosarcoma.

And Simson was happy to be part of it all.

"Although I live in Canada, I went to Michigan because I wanted to support Ryan Humphrey and his goal of making people aware of angiosarcoma," Simson said. "Working as a full-time firefighter, I have always believed that in the emergency services, there are 'no borders' and that we are an international brotherhood/sisterhood when it comes to support-



ing each other in the emergency services.

"I have the same belief when it comes to supporting people in communities that we serve, not just while on duty, but also outside of our scheduled work days. Diseases know no borders so, when it comes to supporting people and worthwhile causes I also believe that there are no borders."

Simson said he lost two fellow firefighters from the truck he worked on, to cancer.

Simson added that Humphrey was deeply touched that he made the trek to Troy, Michigan to

support him. Ryan wrote Adam: "Trust me when I say the honor was all mine! You're an amazing person. Thank you so very much for making the trek to Troy. It was a pleasure sharing this amazing event with you. Thank you!"

Simson said it was he who was deeply touched and honoured to be there for Ryan.

"Ryan, you are my hero, a true inspiration."

Simson noted he met so many wonderful people from all across the U.S. at the fundraising event.

Humphrey reported they prepared for the run without any high expectations, aiming for 200 runners raising \$10,000.

"We far exceeded these original goals. We were able to raise almost \$26,000 and 368 racers officially crossed the finish line. We had approximately 450 people in attendance at the event. The day was truly amazing, inspiring, and full of hope!"

Humphrey said he wanted the event to be more than just about angiosarcoma.

"I wanted people to understand that our coming together was for the good of all of us. It was a way for everyone to share stories, accomplishments, sorrows, and triumphs. It made me ecstatic to have individuals email me their take on the day.

"It was just as much of an honor for me as it was for them. I very much look forward to next years event. The date is set as May 3, 2014."

Humphrey noted the event took place on Saturday and he endured his chemo treatment the following Monday.

He continues to keep in touch with his supporters via his Facebook posts.

"Today is chemo Monday, but I am still on an incredible emotional high from Saturday. It matters not that cancer killing poison will be going through me in an hour!

"The life-changing and profound effect you all have had on my life is unprecedented, undeserving, and unexpected! There are few times in my life that even compare to what happened this weekend!"

"I truly believe part of the battle, with anything in life, is mental; whether it be strength, determination, courage, ability to remain calm, reflection, etc, but what they all point to is stress. You need to mitigate and minimize the stress in your life.

"For me, I feed off of you; your hope; your stories; your strength; your inspiration, and your love. What this weekend did for me, what you all have done for me over my entire journey, especially this last month, is a pure miracle. The fire it instills in my heart, the passion it fuels in my soul and the determination to not let you down and fight to the end are all forever engraved in my psyche."

Parking changes at Seneca

Seneca College has recently modernized the parking system at the King Campus. At King Campus, pay stations are located in Garriock Hall and at the parking lot across from KOLTS Childcare Centre.

Dropping someone off or only staying a few minutes? No problem, parking for 20 minutes or less is free (just hold onto your entry ticket and insert it into the machine on your way out).

Parking for players and families attending King City Soccer Association league games continues to be complimentary. Tickets will be provided to King Township for distribution.

"This is our opportunity to do what's right for the municipality, to do what's right for the community and to put something we want there instead of what a developer wants there," said Pellegrini. "I don't want to just put up a 'for sale' sign."

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said she didn't have enough information to make a decision between the two different proposals and asked that both be considered as part of the RFP process.

Grandilli requested a recorded vote on the matter.

"Council members voted to sell this arena in 2009 and this arena should be sold," said Grandilli adding so many people complain about the problems with the old building. "Keeping it would only please a few local groups that want to keep the arena at the expense of the taxpayers in King Township."

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti said he has no problem justifying the decision to repurpose the arena to his constituents in King City.

"My own constituents ask me why we are doing this," said Mortelliti. "The point is not selling the building, it's recovering the \$1.3 million. Why do we have to sell the building if we can recover the money without selling the property. It will enhance the community. I think we're going down a good path here."

A motion was made for the Township of King to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) to interested individuals, businesses or organizations for the re-purposing of the site by way of a sale or lease that will result in a mixed commercial/light industrial development including a micro-brewery, retail store, restaurant, community space and/or senior care facility. The proposals will be accepted until Aug. 31, 2013.

A recorded vote was taken on the matter. With six members of council in favour and Councillor Grandilli against, the motion carried.

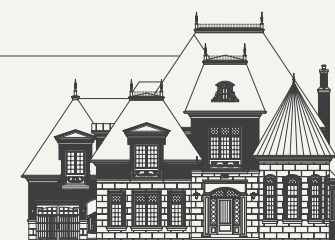

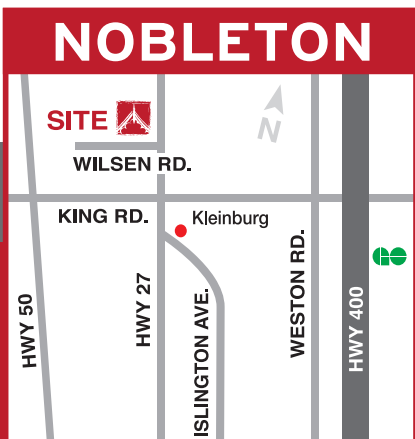

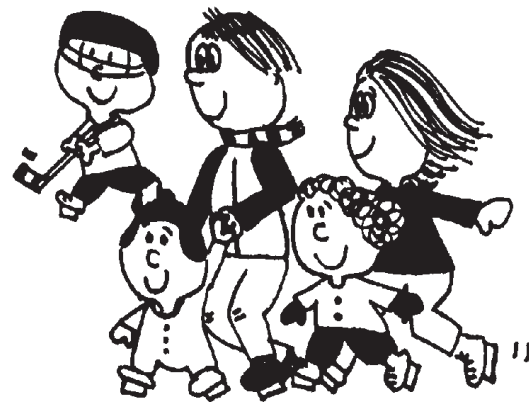
The three judges took us to the stage and asked us questions in front of an intimidating audience but I think that each of us did the best job we possibly could.

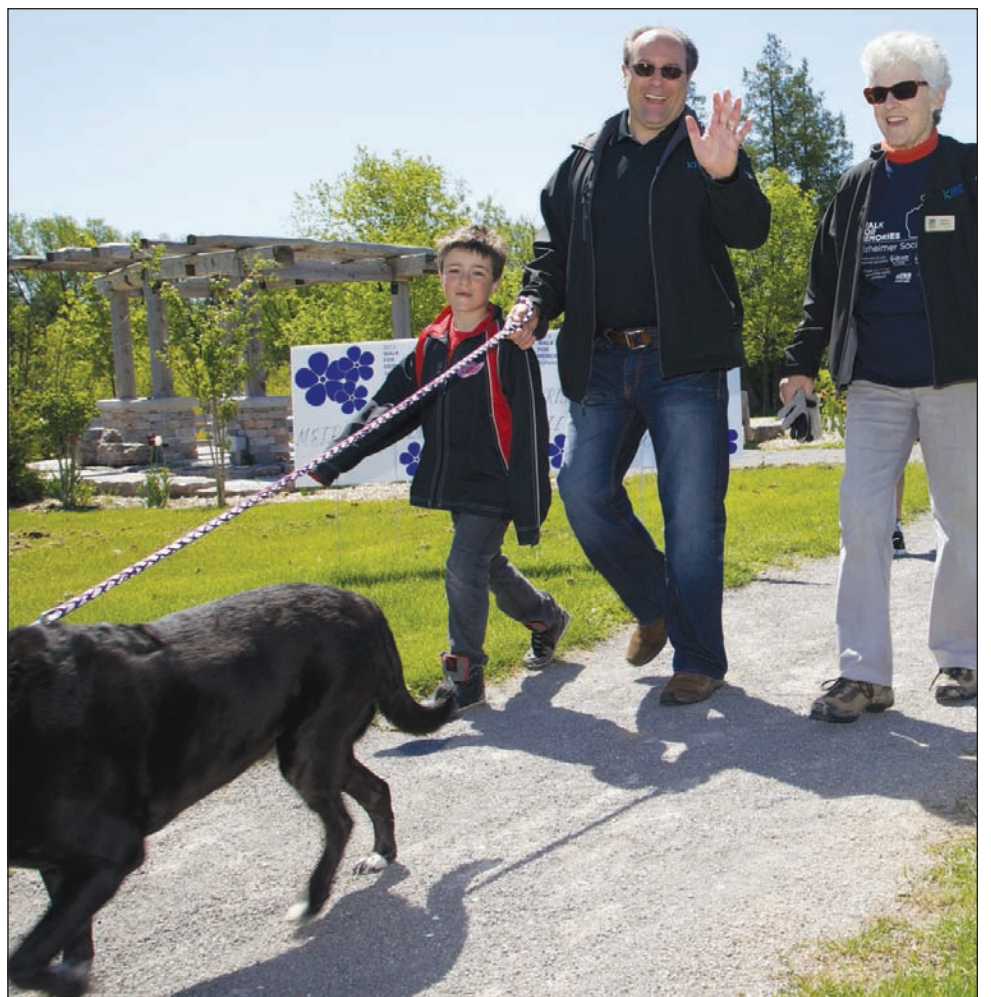
pronounced loss of memory; and finally, a profound loss of all higher brain functions with the person affected requiring intensive nursing care.

York battles invasive insect with Emerald Ash Borer management plan

Approximately 700,000 ash trees in York Region are at risk of infestation by the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB). This season, many ash trees will succumb to the beetle and it may be the last opportunity to treat ash trees with an insecticide.

Residents are invited to learn more about the EAB and its impact by attending an information night on Wednesday, May 29 from 7 to 9 p.m. at the York Region Administration Centre, 17250 Yonge Street, Newmarket.

The Emerald Ash Borer, an invasive insect from Asia, was first

detected in the City of Vaughan in 2008. Its larvae kill ash trees by eating the live wood beneath the bark, causing a tree to die within one to three years. Ash trees not yet infested or at an early stage of infestation can be treated with insecticide injected into the trunk every two years until the EAB population declines to insignificant levels, which will take about 10 years.

"The Emerald Ash Borer is making its mark across North America, with no signs of slowing down," said York Region Chairman and CEO Bill Fisch. "York Regional council approved an Emerald

Ash Borer Management Plan, which provides a multi-pronged approach to managing the impacts of infestation. The Emerald Ash Borer can't be eradicated, but this plan will help maintain the health of our forests, despite its presence."

York Region's Emerald Ash Borer Management Plan includes:

- Monitoring the spread of the pest throughout the Region using green prism traps.
- Removing dead or dying ash trees on Regional roads and replacing them with trees of other species.
- Protecting select

ash trees by treating them with a biological insecticide.

• Restoration activities in the York Regional Forest to minimize the ecological impact of the invasive beetle.

• Public outreach and communications.

• Incentives for residential tree planting.

"All of our municipalities are affected by the Emerald Ash Borer," said Town of Richmond Hill regional councillor Vito Spatafora, chair of the Region's environmental services committee. "Our ash trees are dying. If residents own ash trees, it's a good idea to get them assessed this spring by an arborist to deter-

mine their options."

York Region has partnered with the non-profit organization LEAF-Local Enhancement and Appreciation of Forests to offer subsidized tree planting programs to all York Region residents and an EAB Ambassador program to teach residents how they can help lessen the impact of EAB in their neighbourhoods. Citizens defend their urban forest by tackling EAB

As the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) spreads through the 700,000 ash trees in urban areas across York Region, LEAF is playing an important role in the response to this invasive pest. The Backyard Tree Planting Program gives citizens an opportunity to help preserve the canopy by planting a variety of native trees around their homes.

"The best response to EAB is to plant trees in your yard. Even if you don't have an

ash tree directly on your property," said Janet McKay, executive director at LEAF.

LEAF's subsidized Backyard Tree Planting Program includes a consultation with a certified arborist to help select the appropriate species and location, planting and a care guide. The program also offers extended care packages that will help newly planted trees reach maturity.

A hardy, fast-growing species,

ash was a common choice for landscapers and homeowners, but many neighbourhoods with high concentrations of the species are now faced with devastating losses. By encouraging a wide range of appropriate species, LEAF and York Region hope to strengthen the resilience of the urban forest and avoid a similar fate in the future.

"This is not something we want to see again. Maintaining a healthy

canopy offers financial, health, and environmental benefits for us all," continued McKay. "We need to work together to defend this shared resource - on our own property and in our communities."

Healthy urban trees provide preventive health care benefits through shade, filtered air, cleaner waterways, and reduced smog. When planted strategically, they reduce energy costs, increase property value and offer

privacy. Trees also provide food and shelter for birds, butterflies and other wildlife, supporting our urban ecosystems.

In North America, EAB was initially discovered in Michigan and southwest Ontario in 2002. In 2008 infestations were found in York Region. The invasive pest tunnels underneath the bark, cutting off the flow of water and nutrients and killing the tree within a few years. There is a

treatment derived from the neem tree that may be effective in certain circumstances.

On Sunday, June 23 LEAF will host an EAB Ambassador Training Workshop at the York Region Administrative Centre (17250 Yonge Street, Newmarket).
