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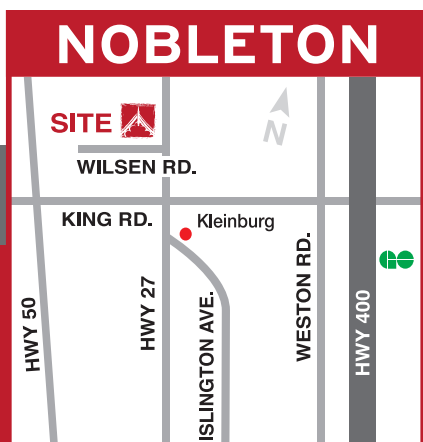
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# Local opposition to Metrolinx funding options

The Big Move may be necessary, but forcing residents to pay ever-increasing taxes, is not the preferred way to go.

Metrolinx, the government agency created to improve transportation in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Areas, presented its investment strategy to support over 400 kilometres of new and enhanced transit, along with improvements to roads and highways.

"Congestion is getting worse every day. It's having an increasingly negative impact on both our quality of life and our region's economy," said Robert Prichard, Metrolinx board chair. "The \$16 billion of new transit being built today will deliver real results for commuters, but we cannot stand still. We need to continue

to invest in The Big Move and get the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area (GTHA) moving again."

The Big Move's next wave of projects will transform the region by building new light rapid transit in Mississauga, Brampton and Hamilton; new bus rapid transit in Halton, Peel, Toronto and Durham; subway expansion with the Relief Line and the Yonge Subway Extension into York Region; major enhancements to GO Transit as well as improvements to municipal transit projects, roads and highways, and active transportation options.

The investment strategy is designed to support a set of transit and transportation projects that comprise the next wave of The Big Move. The investment strategy includes funding recommendations, such as

a 1% increase to the HST; a regional 5-cent-per-litre gas tax; business parking levy; toll lanes and amendments to development charges.

"Metrolinx is recommending that we have dedicated funds," said Bruce McCuaig, Metrolinx president and CEO. "We are also recommending that these funds be placed into a transportation trust fund to create certainty that The Big Move projects are delivered and to provide the accountability and transparency GTHA residents demand and deserve."

## Councillors agree on the need

King Mayor Steve Pellegrini said there's no question we need good transit, which will help free up our roads. However, the gas tax is unfair and it's something he opposes.

Pellegrini pointed out King is at the border of the GTA and people to the north of us will benefit the most. Even King City's GO line is filled with commuters from the north.

He understands that Metrolinx has to find the funds, which ultimately come from you and I, the taxpayers.

"I'm for equity," he said. "Everyone needs to pay."

He supports levying a charge on HOV lanes, noting this is a choice. If drivers are willing to pay for it, great.

Taxpayers can't totally subsidize transportation.

Pellegrini also believes development charges should be part of the transportation funding formula.

Ward 5 Councillor Debbie Schaefer said finding new revenue streams and timing are of the essence.

We're playing catch-up regarding transportation infrastructure and we have to get moving, she said.

She doesn't think there is enough money to be found in trimming the fat and looking for inefficiencies within the government. She likes the diversity of ideas presented by Metrolinx and she favours "spreading the hurt."

If the gas tax is deemed appropriate, she prefers to see it across the board, and not just in the GTHA. There are other jurisdictions in Canada, she pointed out, that use gas taxes to fund various projects. To a degree, people do have a choice in the amount of gas they use.

She doesn't think a 1% hike in the HST will hurt too much and at least it's fair because it's extended across the province. She would also like to see someone examine business sources of revenue.

Schaefer added the civic action campaign - your32.com - refers to the 32 minutes which will be saved when the Big Move is funded and is in place. There will be many people who will look at their lives today, how they live it, and they will say that the Big Move does not affect them. But, this thought process ignores the possibility that one may live in a different place or that one may want to work in a different place; that your family, particularly the next generation, may want to make different choices.

She admitted it will be a tough sell at Queen's Park.

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti said the transit system needs to be expanded, sooner rather than later.

"So something has to give."

"The Big Move has been a comprehensive study over five years. And it appears the study groups have looked at every angle possible of how to dramatically improve the system and lessen the gridlock. But it's going to cost \$50 billion."

"They should call it the 'Big Root Canal! It's going to hurt.'"

## Munro says Liberals lack credibility

York-Simcoe MPP Julia Munro agrees the need is there, but doesn't place a lot of trust in the financial responsibility demonstrated by the Liberals at Queen's Park.

She pointed to a Liberal promise about no new taxes and then points to the provincial health

tax. She's not confident that any new taxes will be dedicated to Metrolinx and may simply be gobbled up in provincial coffers.

As well, the term "revenue tools" means "new taxes," she said, adding the government has literally blown billions.

"So it's hard to see a credibility" in financial management, Munro noted. The suggestion about an HST increase would be a joint federal-provincial mechanism and it's doubtful Ottawa would go along with it.

As well, the government tossed up a rebate mechanism which would be complicated.

Munro said her riding constituents say they feel the pinch and would not support a new gas tax.

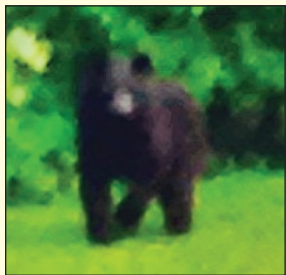

Our spouses, who openly or silently support us unconditionally, deserve a front-row ticket to the show. Contrary to popular

belief, or at least modern day management, no one is replaceable.

I've said goodbye to four family members over the past decade - my dad, sister, uncle and mom. That's four too many.

There's still so much yet to be done, and we'll have to toil on without them by our side, in the bleachers, or at the dinner table. Four fewer to cheer us on. A foursome of voices, all silent for some time now. It's like taking away a primary colour from a famous painting - you just can't look at it the same way ever again. It's like removing the centrepiece from an award-winning garden.

But there are forms of natural energy, cheap and never-ending enthusiasm. They come in the form of children. When I look into the eyes of my kids, I feel like a superhero - strong, yet vulnerable and weak. It's humbling. I'm a role model, yet they're holding the "kryptonite."

Our eldest once told us

that since we created her, she owes us a great deal. If you're a typical mom, undoubtedly you have a box or drawer somewhere filled with the home-made greeting cards from the kids. Pull them out and read them over, it's like chicken soup when you're sick in bed!

While I have plenty of in-my-face evidence that I've helped create three human beings, I never really thought of the whole giving life thing. Creation, even after three successful attempts, still amazes me.

I am profoundly confident there is much more at work than mere genetic material coming together in a biological soup. No matter how it's described in medical terms, creation is magical, mysterious and heavenly. It's a gift that should humble each and every one of us mortals.

As I mentioned, average people could spend their entire lives without making a dent in the social fabric. But it all ends pretty much the same way.

There's often a small box, a shoe box perhaps, at the bottom of the closet or in some corner of the

attic or garage. This box is what remains of us when we're gone.

Its contents vary, but often include old letters, photos, postcards, a few favourite objects like a keychain, coin, watch or trinket. Sometimes it contains old toys, keepsakes and a few Valentine's Day cards made by the kids when they were preschoolers.

They're memories, in one small, convenient container - our lives in a nutshell. Not grand, glamorous or cosmopolitan. Just a few pieces of what was.

Of all the dreaded tasks I've had to perform over the years, wrapping up the lives of loved ones were the worst. It was very sad really, in an almost regrettable or guilty way. I remember each experience with a hollow feeling.

In my family members' cases, four ripples in the pond were reduced to a handful of knick-knacks, souvenirs, old clothes and personal bits of paper. There were some strange and gaudy picture frames or odd-shaped bottle openers picked up on some Caribbean holiday decades ago.

With each piece or item that I carefully wrapped or disposed of, I felt it. It was a very strange feeling, like someone standing behind you at the bus stop. I found myself smiling, instead of weeping. These crazy little items spoke volumes, reaching out from beyond. I'm sure there was a story behind every item, something that made them smile, laugh or even cry.

There are things I still can't part with, like my dad's fake Rolex that I picked up from a guy on a street corner in New York City for \$10. There's my uncle's cowboy hat, adorned with feathers and pins. When he wore it, his chest widened with pride. There's a bank envelope with my dad's handwriting on it, containing a few old \$1 and \$2 bills he got before they were replaced by loonies and toonies.

I thought about my personal shoe box and what I'd like it to contain.

I'd fill this container with some souvenirs from trips Kim and I took in our younger years - key chains, lighters and cheesy dice from Las Vegas. I'd toss in the two tiny pieces of the Berlin Wall snatched up by souvenir hunters as the wall came crumbling down. I'd include one or two photos of myself smiling ear to ear, like the one on the bench at the hotel in Cartagena or eating conch fritters at The Fatman's Nephew in Nassau. Perhaps I'd include one of my rings, toy airplanes or Star Trek collectibles.

Not very fascinating, valuable or interesting to anyone, really. Not much of anything at all.

But everything IS me. From my playfulness and concern for the past, to my search for a better life, it's all in there, if you know where to look.

Obscure, maybe. Replaceable?

Definitely not!

## Letter to the Editor Future of the Schomberg arena

I was pleased to see and read the report of the Parks and Recreation Department on the creative re-use of the old Schomberg arena, and I do take note of Mayor Pellegrini's comments that the property should be saved while, for the right re-use, the building may be replaceable.

Having said that, there are some inherent problems with re-purposing the Schomberg arena building and lands for a seniors' care facility.

I would separate the question in to a three-tier process; the first is simply having unique low maintenance independent living units for those seniors who wish to stay in King and can live and survive independently, which frankly can be built anywhere. The second tier would be for those seniors who require a certain level of assistance, but for the most part can function well without assistance. The third tier is for those seniors who require full service care and attention.

In my view the first two tiers are easily achievable in just about any location within King Township, assuming cooperation of the municipality. In point of fact I have, for a group of individuals, prepared a draft conceptual plan which allows for the construction of a communal facility for tier 1 and tier 2 seniors, which includes a full-time nurse and visiting doctor 6 hours per week, which could be constructed for less than \$250,000 per tenant, and have a maintenance cost (inclusive of salaries, utilities and taxes) of less than \$1,200 per month.

Unfortunately, the land value associated with the Schomberg arena and lands would increase the estimated costs by about \$50,000 per tenant, which may or may not be acceptable.

The third tier of care - that is full service medical attention - requires a great deal of cooperation from various levels of government, and incurs tremendous expenses. If this were achievable within King Township, I suspect the timing may put it years down the road. And quite frankly, any developer who took on the task would likely price the facility considerably higher with allowance for reasonable (whatever those may be) profits.

While from a political perspective it may be desirable to consider a full service seniors' facility, I don't believe it's realistic to consider the same for the old Schomberg arena and property.

## York Region sets ambitious water conservation goals

In February 2011, York Regional Council approved a comprehensive Long Term Water Conservation Strategy to reduce residential water use to 150 litres per capita, per day, from the current 220 litres. To help support this conservation objective, York Region has implemented a number of initiatives and recently advocated for changes to the Ontario Building Code. As a result, updated standards for water-efficient toilets in new residential buildings will take effect in 2014.

"The Long Term Water Conservation Strategy offers programs through Water for Tomorrow to ensure greatest return on investment, including looking at conservation initiatives in new development," said York Region chairman and CEO Bill Fisch. "It's easier to implement environmental improvements in areas prior to homes being built. We're developing programs targeting the highest outdoor water users in both the residential and business sectors."

"Water for Tomorrow has made key partnerships with service providers in our communities to ensure its conservation message is being relayed to residents," said Richmond Hill regional councillor Vito Spatafora, chair of the Region's environmental services committee. "These professionals promote water efficient fixtures and practices to their customers, all which helps us achieve our ultimate goal of water conservation across York Region."

In addition to water savings from water-efficient toilets, other Water for Tomorrow programs continue to be highly successful, with York Region residents saving 1.6 million litres of water each day in 2012 alone, for a cumulative saving of 25.8 million litres of water saved each day since the program began in 1998.

The applications concern four residential lots measuring a total of 1.57 hectares (3.88 acres) located in the Village of King City and situated at the north west corner of Dew Street and King Boulevard. The properties are municipally known as 230, 240 and 250 Dew Street and each support a single detached dwelling with a vacant lot also included.

The owner proposes to amend the Official Plan for the Township of King by re-designating the subject lands from 'Existing Low Density Residential Area' to 'Medium Density Residential Area' to permit a residential density of 25.2 units per hectare. The owner has also submitted an amendment to the Township's Zoning By-law (74-53, as amended) to re-zone the lands from 'Residential Urban (R1)' to 'Residential Urban (R1-X) - Exception' and 'Open Space and Conservation (O)'. The development proposes the construction of a new public street and a stormwater management pond with connection to both the municipal water system and sanitary sewer system.

IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Clerk of the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment, Draft Plan of Subdivision and/or Zoning By-law Amendment Applications are adopted or refused, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of Council to the Township of King to the Ontario Municipal Board.

IF A PERSON OR PUBLIC BODY does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Clerk of the Township of King before the proposed Official Plan Amendment, Draft Plan of Subdivision and/or Zoning By-law Amendment Applications are adopted or refused, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

ANY PERSON may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Official Plan Amendment, Zoning By-law Amendment and/or Draft Plan of Subdivision. If you wish to be notified of the decision of the Township of King in respect of the proposed applications, you must make a written request to the Clerk of the Township of King.



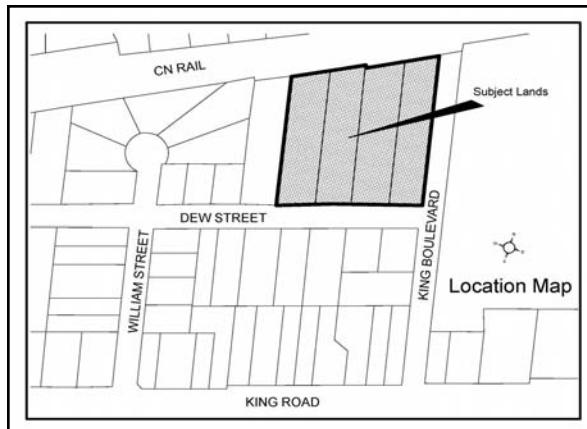

### ENGINEERING AND PUBLIC WORKS WATER METER REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

Over the next few years King Township will be replacing our old water meters. Notices will be going to affected residents for the work this year. The initial focus will be Nobleton. Your co-operation with our contractor will be greatly appreciated. This program will assist the Township in leak detection and water conservation. Improvements to Township infrastructure are a benefit to all King residents.

King Township has awarded the contract for this water meter upgrade program to WAMCO Municipal Products. As each phase is implemented, WAMCO licensed meter installers will canvas areas that have been identified for that phase and deliver a copy of the official King Township Notice to Property Owners. WAMCO employees will wear an identification tag and wear a hat & reflective vest with the WAMCO logo.

### NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS - DESTROY WEEDS

NOTICE is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16 and 23 THAT unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the Municipality of the Township of King are destroyed by date of June 15th, 2012 and throughout the season, the Municipality may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging costs against the land, as set out in the Weed Control Act.

(All properties ten (10) acres or less may have noxious weeds destroyed without notice to the owner).

**NOTE:** Giant Hogweed was added to Ontario's list of 23 Noxious Weeds in 2010. It is a toxic plant that can grow to heights of 15 to 20 feet (4.5 to 6 metres) and it can cause permanent blindness and burn the skin. Extreme care must be used when cutting or destroying this weed.

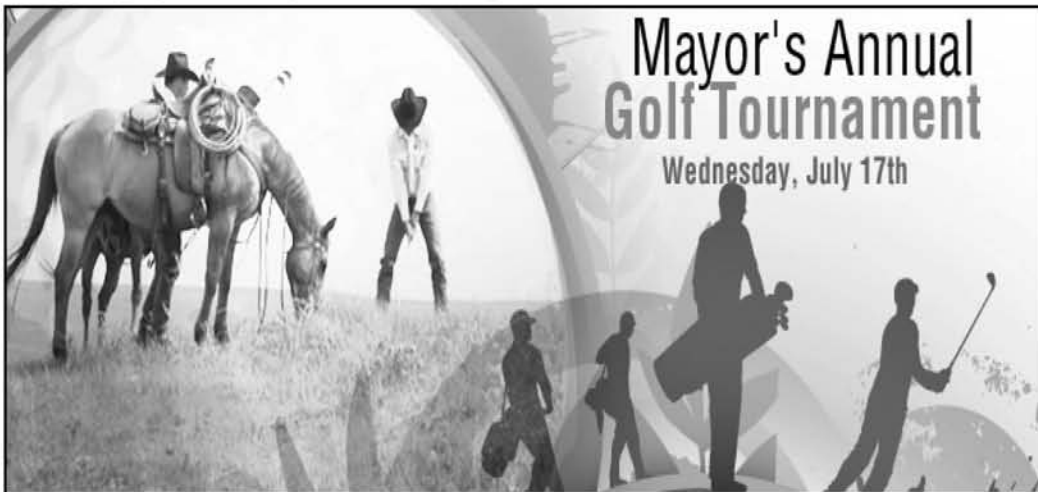

Tom Walker and the King City Secondary School (KCSS) Senior Jazz Band & Rock Band will be on hand. Walker is head of the music department of the school and his students will perform.

They will be followed by the King City Rock Band Mk III and then local blues artist Joel Krivy.

Krivy is a long-time resident of King City. He recently closed his practice, after 30 years as a family physician and now works part-time at the University of Toronto and Mackenzie Health Centre.

Joel has been playing the guitar for most of his life and has been performing since he was invited to play an acoustic Blues set at Kingfest in 2005. His

musical genre is acoustic blues/roots played on acoustic finger style and slide guitars. His performance includes a variety of original material as well as covers of many of the old blues masters.

In 2006, Joel was diagnosed with lymphoma, which resulted in his being home receiving extensive chemotherapy and radiation. During that time he was able to get together with friend/producer Scott Dibble, and produced his first CD of solo acoustic material: "The Radiation Sessions," which was well received and led to other performing opportunities, including airplay on several radio shows.

Over the past few years, Joel has been a regular at the Aurora Jazz Festival and opened for Harrison Kennedy (nominated for

Best Blues Recording of the Year) at the Newmarket Jazz Festival. At Kingfest, he opened shows for various performers including Murray McLaughlin, Quartette, and Mike Stevens and Raymond McLean.

He is still cancer free and is currently working on his second CD which will include some original material that will be presented at the King City Music Festival.

The Blackboard Blues Band is a 10-piece group dedicated to the finest rhythm and blues, funk, soul, blues, and rock music from the '70s to present day. The group has released two CDs and has made appearances across the GTA and on TV.

Anyone who grew up in King City in the 1970s and '80s knows where Elmer's Lane is. In what was once a rural village surrounded by farms, decades before skate parks existed, a wide open field at midnight was the preferred escape for

King City's men and women and the restless dreams of youth.

Elmer's Lane is resurrected by six "young" King Township lads who have been friends since high school. They're back at it playing classic rock hits and lovin' it!

The origin of the Hero's And Wedge is much disputed. Some say they were originally invented in Italy, and then Italian immigrants brought them to New York. The combination of funk, dance, rock, or pop is still popular.

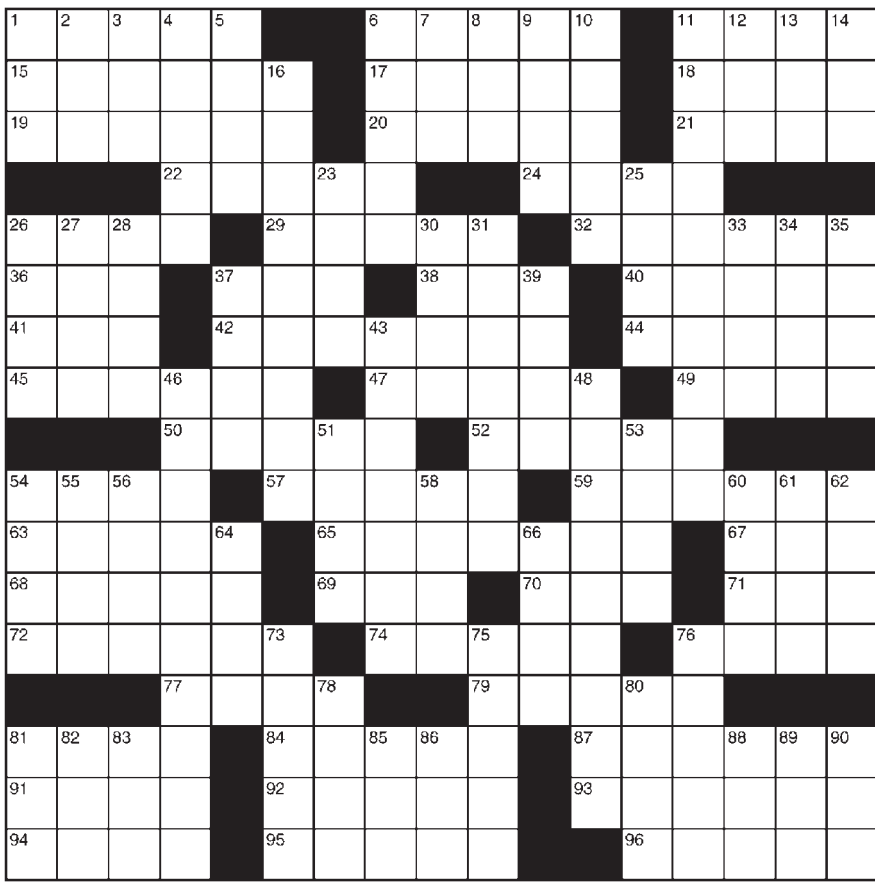

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# Mayor impressed with China's growth and trade opportunities

An incredible, eye-opening experience has changed the way King's mayor looks at the far east.

Steve Pellegrini was part of an Ontario mayoral trade delegation to China. Sponsored by the Canada-China Investment Association, the whirlwind 10-day mission had a full slate of activities for the mayors.

Pellegrini attended on behalf of York Region, as their Greater Toronto Marketing Alliance representative. The mayor pointed out taxpayers were not on the hook for any of his expenses.

All of his previous notions about this large, populous nation were shattered upon his arrival.

He noted China has spent decades building infrastructure and today, its cities are modern examples of architectural and technological prowess.

The mayors met and networked with representatives and government

officials in Beijing, Shanghai and Xian, gaining an understanding of the economy of China.

Pellegrini said he was impressed by the country's road system, calling it "phenomenal." What makes it even better, is the attention paid to well manicured boulevards, containing rose bushes and walkways. There are dedicated cycling lanes and well placed buffers. He was also taken by the large number of public art displays, statues, monuments and public parks.

While many may think China is ruled by cyclists, luxury European automobiles now dominate the landscape. Cities are lush and lavish and the landscape is dotted with tower cranes, signalling constant development.

Every city, Pellegrini noted, is growing at an accelerated pace and employment is secure. Investment is coming from inside the country as well as international companies.



The Chinese have money to invest in Canada and are looking for opportunities across the GTA. Chinese companies have already purchased Niagara vineyards and Dave Eke, Mayor of Niagara-On-The-Lake attended the mission. Canadian ice wine is a huge hit in China.

The Chinese are also particularly interested in agriculture and investing in Canadian farms, to feed their growing population.

Pellegrini said they toured a private school and the country has a reputation for having some of the finest international schools in the world.

He hopes to help facilitate an exchange program between China and King's private schools. Currently, there are no exchange programs in place. He would love to see a King-China connection established.

The mission involved non-stop networking, meetings and events, offer-

ing little time for sightseeing. Pellegrini managed an early morning jaunt to The Great Wall and saw the famous Terra Cotta Army. At times, it was "information overload," and the mayors were run off their feet.

Pellegrini enjoyed learning about their innovative methods, architectural concepts and building technologies.

Despite their prowess, China does lack certain things and is looking to Canada to help them with their electricity system efficiencies, solar power and green methods.

Pellegrini called the experience "incredible."

"It was very productive. As a mayor, it was a great growth experience for me and a great learning experience."

The connections he made have already resulted in an exchange of emails.

The mission also put things in perspective as to how fortunate we are to live here.

China is Canada's number two export destination and last year, exports totalled \$18.6 billion.

The season culminated with Natalie capturing the coveted national title for the second year in a row at the Canadian National Junior High Public Speaking Championships held in Calgary recently.

Fortunately, the CDS team is not losing any stu-

dents this year. They will all be back next year to host and compete in the IISPSC (International Independent Schools' Public Speaking Competition) Oct. 17-20 at the Kingbridge Centre in King City. The school is expecting to host more than 150 students from upward of 50 schools from around the world. Here are some highlights from the last few competitions:

While the majority of students were taking a well-earned rest over the March Break, Natalie Ganzhorn, 14, travelled to compete in the World Individual Public Speaking Championships in Durban, South Africa.



Natalie competed against 130 students from around the world, in four categories: Parliamentary Debate, Persuasive Speaking, Impromptu Speaking, and Interpretive Reading. With her impressive top 30 finish, Natalie was the top speaker under 15 at the

event. At the Nora McCrae Public Speaking Competition, held at Branksome Hall April 28, more than 100 students from all over Ontario took part in three events each to earn top honours.

In the senior category,

Lukas Weese (Grade 11) finished in 2nd place in After-Dinner Speaking and in 3rd place in Impromptu Speaking. Jai Singh (Grade 11) finished 1st in Dramatic Interpretation, 1st in Impromptu Speaking, and 3rd in Declamation, leading to his impressive 1st place finish overall.

In the junior division, Olivia Railton (Grade 8) took 1st place in Dramatic Interpretation, Natalie Ganzhorn (Grade 9) finished in 3rd place in the same event and was 1st in Impromptu Speaking. This meant that the girls finished in 3rd and 4th respectively overall in the competition.

Finally, Natalie Ganzhorn and Olivia Railton also qualified to represent

Ontario at the Canadian National Junior High Public Speaking Championships held at Webber Academy in Calgary from May 3-6. The top 60 students from across the country competed in four events. Olivia Railton was a finalist in Dramatic Interpretation and Impromptu Speaking and finished in 5th place overall. Natalie was the National Champion in Impromptu Speaking and Interpretive Reading, and she finished in 2nd place in Dramatic Interpretation, and was a finalist in Persuasive Speaking.

These fantastic results meant that Natalie was the overall winner of the entire competition, and she won the coveted national title for the second year in a row.

The recommendations by Metrolinx will be “carefully considered” by the government, but there are tough choices to be made, according to Oak-Ridges Markham MPP Dr. Helena Jaczek. The premier, she said, wants to take her time to “get it right,” but the need is pressing.

“If we don’t do it now, the economy in the GTHA may be in jeopardy,” she said.

No one wants to pay more taxes, but in the end they hope to “spread the pain in the fairest and most logical way.”

We all have to “grin

and bear it,” and in the end, Jaczek said the result will be a huge improvement.

The federal government needs to step up and offer some assistance, since the GTA is key to the province’s economy. She said MPPs are talking to their federal Liberal counterparts to press the issue.

Regardless of the methods used to fund the program, Jaczek pointed out there is only one taxpayer and most will be passed on to consumers in one way or another.

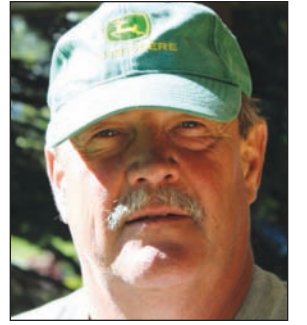
