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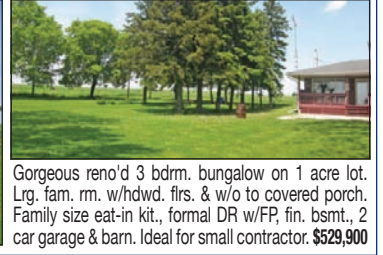

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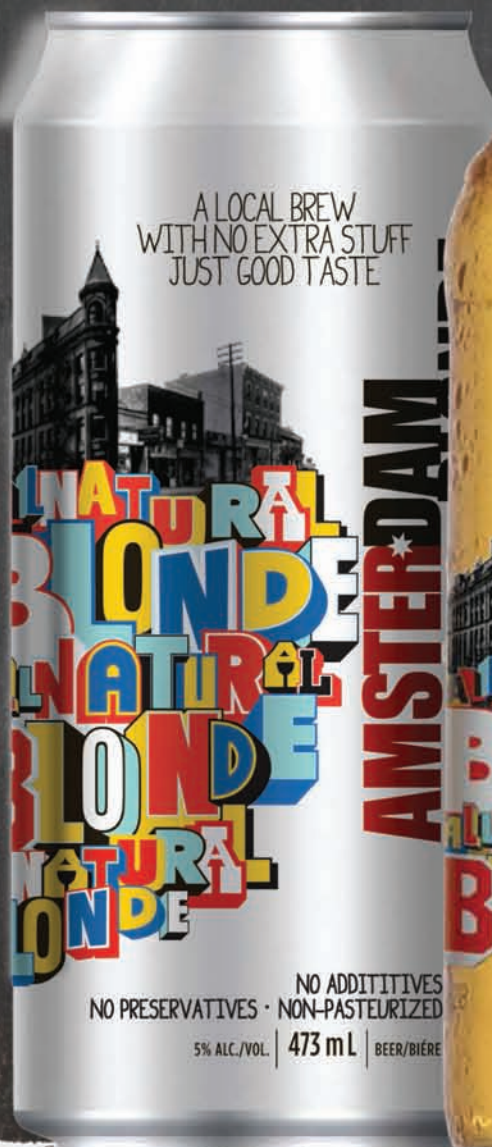

Nobleton residents request removal of sidewalk

Residents living on the east side of Westbrooke Boulevard in the new Fandor subdivision in Nobleton say they don't want or need a sidewalk on their side of the street.

A report was brought to the committee of the whole meeting on July 8. The residents submitted a petition to the Township's engineering and public works department to eliminate the sidewalk on Westbrooke Boulevard. While some residents on the street have moved into their new homes, the sidewalk has not been constructed yet. There are 31 properties on Westbrooke Boulevard of which 10 residents are requesting the elimination of the sidewalk. The Westbrooke Boulevard sidewalk connects the collector sidewalk from Park Heights

Trail to Northcott Way.

In the report, staff recommended the request be denied, and that the developer be directed to install the sidewalk as per the approved design.

"The locations of sidewalks are designed to accommodate anticipated pedestrian movements," reads the staff report. "Continuous streets providing neighbourhood connectivity will normally be designed with sidewalks on one side."

Imma Mondaro was at the meeting as the spokesperson for the residents living on Westbrooke Boulevard.

"It's really not necessary," said Mondaro. "We are located at the back of the subdivision and the road is only frequented by the people who live there. It doesn't connect to any other street in the subdivision."

Sidewalks would cut right through the homeowners driveways and create less privacy, she said. She added that nearby

Kaake Road doesn't have sidewalks and she asks that the same consideration be given to Westbrooke.

Councillor Bill Cober said he could not support the elimination of the sidewalk. He recalled an incident where a pedestrian was struck on a road that didn't have a sidewalk and the municipality was on the hook for millions of dollars because they were the ones who approved the removal of the sidewalk.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer pointed out that residents living in the older neighbourhoods in King are constantly coming to council asking for sidewalks to be installed on their streets.

"One thing the residents often bemoan is the lack of sidewalks," said Schaefer.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini was in favour of eliminating the sidewalk from the street.

"We're hearing that we're urbanizing and I don't like that, I like the

rural character of King," said Pellegrini. "No sidewalks is part of the character. I think we should work with the developers and pull the sidewalk and use those funds to improve the community in another way."

Schaefer was worried about the number of pedestrians who would use the sidewalk. Local councillor Peter Grandilli urged members of council to respect the staff report

and recommendations and to move forward and construct the sidewalk.

Developer Domenic Dell'Elce of Fandor Homes said there is a reason why the sidewalk was put in that particular area. He feared removing it could set a precedent. He also pointed out that not all the houses on the street are occupied yet.

"What about the purchasers that have closed on the opposite side that

have sidewalks in front of them," he said. "What if they come forward and want that sidewalk. It's a community, it's not just about one street."

With that, a motion was made to approve the staff recommendation to deny the residents request to remove the sidewalk and to instruct the developer to install the sidewalk as outlined in the approved subdivision design. The motion carried.

My son recently returned from his first trip to the Caribbean, and his first experience above the clouds.

He told me the view from up there was breath-taking, and it definitely gives you a different perspective.

As an aviation buff, I was thrilled he got a chance to soar.

He didn't mention whether he caught a glimpse of my dad as he scanned the horizon, God's handiwork.

This week marks the 15th anniversary of dad's departure to his final resting place among the clouds.

Time waits for no one and while it has little bearing on those who've moved on, the days, months and years appear in our hair, our faces and the corners of our eyes.

It's also evident in our offspring.

My eldest, who's also 15, is a modern miracle and a glowing reminder that, alas, I'm getting older.

Fortunately, my dad got a chance to see, cuddle and weep at his second granddaughter - his son's first born. That was Father's Day, June of 1998.

That was the last Father's Day we'd spend together. My dad left, quietly, July 19. It was a Sunday.

His restlessness came to an end, but I'm not sure whether he went willingly. There was more Pavilons history and adventure ahead. Much more. But maybe he didn't have a choice.

Carrying Lexie around in my arms during dad's farewell event was somewhat comforting. I don't recall shedding too many tears at the time - way too much to do. There were some moments of solitude and some glances upward during starry nights that followed.

One branch of the family tree removed. One branch the kids could no longer climb, sit on and view the beautiful vistas.

While mom filled in admirably as the happy grandma, there were no long walks in the woods, no tiny hands grasping large, wise fingers. There was no talk of whispering pines and weeping willows.

Lexie had three grandparents to guide her, spoil her and love her to pieces.

Then came the mid-

dle child, Liam, our clan's only male.

I know dad would have cried and beamed if he had the chance to cup this tiny creation - his only grandson. It would have been enough to fuel him well into the afterlife. It would have been beautiful.

Mom had enough joy for several people, when Liam arrived March 15, 2001. She couldn't get enough of the little guy. Perhaps she spent a few extra minutes bouncing him on her knees for my dad's benefit. If there was any way he could have witnessed such a bond, I'm sure it would have made his adventure here, and his subsequent trek all worthwhile.

My sister got a chance to embrace Liam for a while, before she too was called away Dec. 10, 2001.

Some bitter sweet moments for our family, to be sure.

Lexie doesn't remember my sister Angela and Liam never got to know her.

Then Kyleigh Q arrived on our 10th wedding anniversary, shortly after midnight on Aug. 5, 2005. A nice gift to be sure.

Another reason to count our blessings. A trio of magnificent creatures now complete.

It was another crazy week in our lives.

Kim was a week overdue and my uncle was in hospital, succumbing to cancer. He died on a Sunday and Kyleigh arrived the following Friday. I remember sitting on the floor of the hospital room, shortly after her birth, trying to catch my breath.

A death and a birth, all in one week. Way too much going on.

The actual details of that week are pretty much a blur. Our two children said goodbye to my uncle and later in the week said hello to their new baby sister.

In her declining years, my mom joined us in our new home and the bond between her and the children grew. While some may not relish the idea of having an elderly parent live with them, I wouldn't have had it any other way. It gave my children that sense of history, a familial connection that helped mold them in their formative years.

We also never ate so well!

My mom decided it was time to leave as well, so on March 10, 2010 she slipped away quietly and alone. It was a Wednesday afternoon.

I sat with her for about an hour after I arrived at the hospital, discussing trivialities. It was almost surreal.

I'm not an expert on fate, destiny or what

awaits us in the great beyond.

I'm not really an expert on the here and now, either.

What I do know is that 15 years have come and gone without a hand on my shoulder; without words of praise or harsh criticisms - without him.

All I have are a few photos and tales to pass on to my little ones. The stories likely lost a bit in translation, and aren't as poignant as placing a small hand on a well wrinkled cheek.

My loss is theirs, too.

How would they look at the world, had they benefitted from dad's insights and unique take on things? How would they have grown receiving his hugs and kisses. Would even a hearty laugh, echoing in their ears for all eternity?

Down here, time passes and it's not always kind.

My advice is, if you must look back, keep one foot on the gas!

York-Simcoe Liberals elect energetic executive

The York-Simcoe Provincial Liberals are back in the game, electing an energetic new executive.

In a meeting at the Bradford West Gwillimbury Public Liberal, more than 40 local members came together to chart the way forward for the Liberal movement in York-Simcoe.

The new president, Jonathan Scott of Bradford, praised the team. "We're a team from across the riding and are excited to get to work. We have a lot of hard work ahead of us - fundraising and finding a candidate - but we're excited to get started."

Scott, who was a student trustee with the Simcoe County District School Board and worked as a speechwriter for Premier Kathleen Wynne, highlighted the "grass-roots talent" included in the team, noting the various municipal councillors and school board trustees serving on the executive.

Councillor Raj Sandhu of Bradford is the association's vice-president; Councillor Avia Eek of King Township is the new secretary. East Gwillimbury school trustee Lora-lea Carruthers and former trustee and Simcoe County District School Board vice-chair Nancy Halbert are association directors.

Other executive members include former Liberal Party of Canada (Ontario) political operations officer Kevin Roche; businessman Lucinio Miguelo; Bradford realtor Tina Sibbald; federal riding association treasurer Vaughan Moulit; and former YNOT Bradford West Gwillimbury Youth Coun-

cil vice-president, Jeff Bunn.

"We are well aware of our challenges; this riding has never elected a Liberal," Scott conceded. "But, we know that the riding just south of us - Oak Ridges-Markham - is represented by a great Liberal MPP and we know Liberals have won in areas of this riding within the past decade. We're excited to build the organization needed to finally win."

Disappointed in changes to Slokker development

I am disappointed to see even more changes to the Slokker development. I do not support the planned changes without protecting future access to Concession 8 through the elbow bend of Bluff Trail.

The extensive development in the northeast quadrant has placed excessive traffic onto Hillfarm and Greenside, resulting in significant safety concerns. Both York Region Police traffic stops and Township traffic studies support the lack of control on these residential streets. The further build-out of the development will put additional pressure on these streets.

By moving tons of earth across the ravine, the developer has proven that access to Concession 8 is possible. This access must be reserved for potential future use.

This council should ensure the safety of current and future residents is protected by reserving this critical access route.

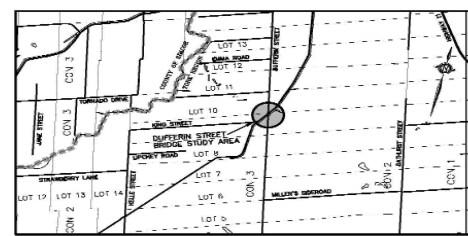

THE STUDY

As part of the overall Dufferin Street Bridge replacement, recon-

struction of a portion of King Street will be required. As a result, the Township of King has initiated the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (MEA Class EA) process. Options for the reconstruction of King Street include realignment of the roadway along a new municipal right-of-way, partial realignment and major utility relocation within the existing right-of-way, construction of a new roadway between King Street and Bernhardt Road and permanent closure of King Street adjacent to Dufferin Street. The Dufferin Street Bridge spans the south canal of the Holland Marsh drainage system just south of the community of Ansnorveldt. A Canadian Environmental Assessment has been previously completed for the canal improvement and bridge replacement. A location map is shown below:



THE PROCESS

This project is being planned under the planning and design process for **Schedule B** projects as defined in the Municipal Engineers Association "Municipal Class Environmental Assessment" (October 2000, as amended). The Class EA process includes public and review agency consultation, an evaluation of alternatives, an assessment of the impacts of the proposed alternatives, and identification of a preferred solution. Upon completion of this study, a **Project File** documenting the process will be available for public review for a period of 30 calendar days.

PUBLIC CONSULTATION

Public consultation is an important component of the EA process. This will provide the public an opportunity to review the project, related issues, and discuss timing for the proposed work. Members of the public, agencies and other interested persons are encouraged to participate in the planning of this undertaking. Participation can include attending consultation opportunities, or by contacting the person(s) identified below with information, comments or questions. Consultation opportunities are planned throughout the planning process and will be advertised in local newspapers, on the Township's website and directly to individuals or agencies on the Project Mailing List.

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Aurora eyes judicial review in King cell tower fight

Lawyers are exploring the possibility of applying for a judicial review over the King Township cell phone tower looking over a swath of southwest Aurora.

Aurora council approved a motion tasking Town Solicitor Warren Mar with retaining an external lawyer to explore the possibilities of getting a judicial review off the ground.

While he cautioned the results of a judicial review could be limited, residents in the area have one objective in mind: having the tower dismantled and carted off elsewhere.

"An apology does not remove the Town's obligation to have justice done," said resident John Cunningham, one of the leading voices against the tower, citing a previous apology from municipal staff over how the tower was handled.

The Town, he said, should clearly look at launching a judicial review, looking into pro-

cesses and protocols which lead to the construction, just over the Town's boundary with King Township on Bathurst Street.

"A win in favour of the Town and the residents would be the requirement of a do-over of the whole process of the tower by

Bell," he said. "As the mayor seeks to meet with senior leadership of Bell, capable of making the decision to move the tower, it is important for all stakeholders to know how serious the community feels about moving the tower and that the Town is en-

gaged and ready to continue the escalation."

Not so fast, said Mar. A judicial review could be "very limited" in scope due to the involvement of Industry Canada which has a "clear" policy in place. A judicial review could simply state issues

with communications between the company and residents, leaving all concerned in the same place they are right now.

Councillors approved 7-2 going ahead with getting advice about a possible judicial review. Consultation over a potential

judicial review could run up to \$5,000 with advice coming forward to council.

"I think the request is reasonable to explore every option and that is all [residents] are asking for," said Councillor Michael Thompson.



York Region approves guidelines for new communities

The Regional Municipality of York released New Communities Guidelines, a blueprint for planning urban areas in York Region. These guidelines have been created to assist local municipalities and the development industry achieve sustainable practices and meet the requirements outlined in the York Region Official Plan (ROP) 2010.

"In developing the next generation of communities in York Region, we need to ensure development continues to be planned as healthy, inclusive and sustainable," said York Region Chairman and CEO Bill Fisch. "These guidelines provide clarity on the planning of these communities while applying the policies of the Regional Official Plan."

The eight-chapter document was developed through resident, stakeholder and municipal consultation. It addresses the 41 Regional Official Plan policies directly related to sustainable buildings and new community areas.

At 201 Banner Lane in King City, this garden brings the indoors out. The owners have built many garden rooms to enjoy.

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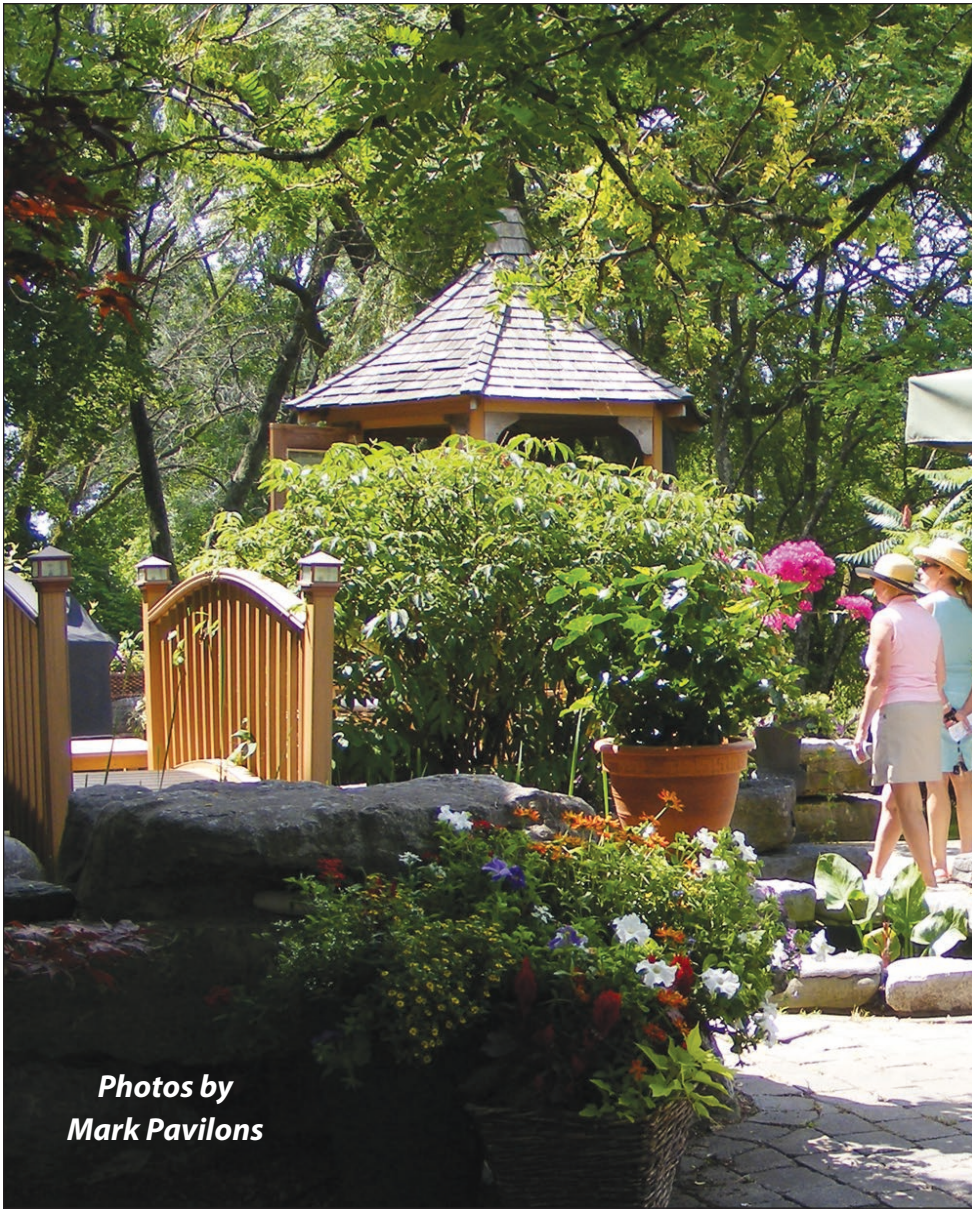
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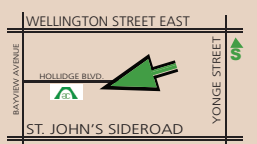
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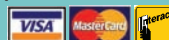

York Regional Police hosted the event for the second time and officers joined ci-

vilian volunteers to make the event possible.

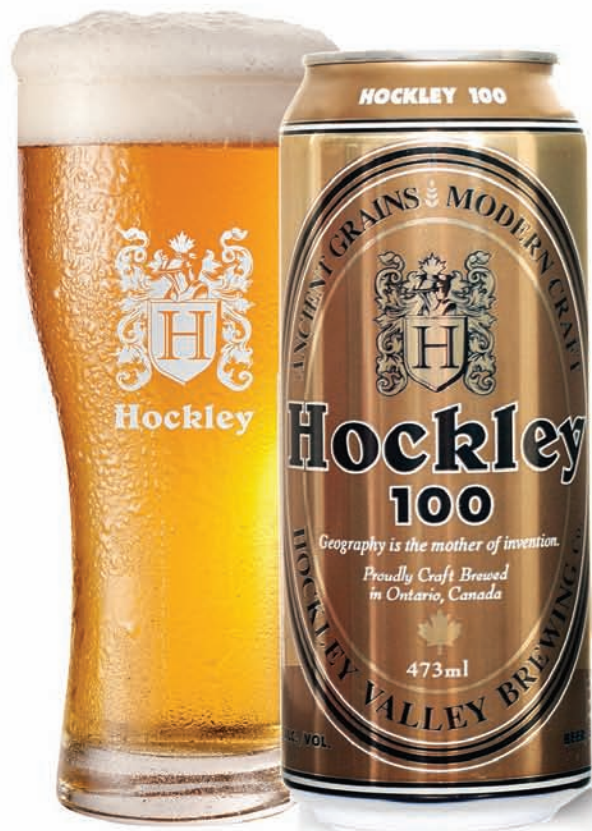

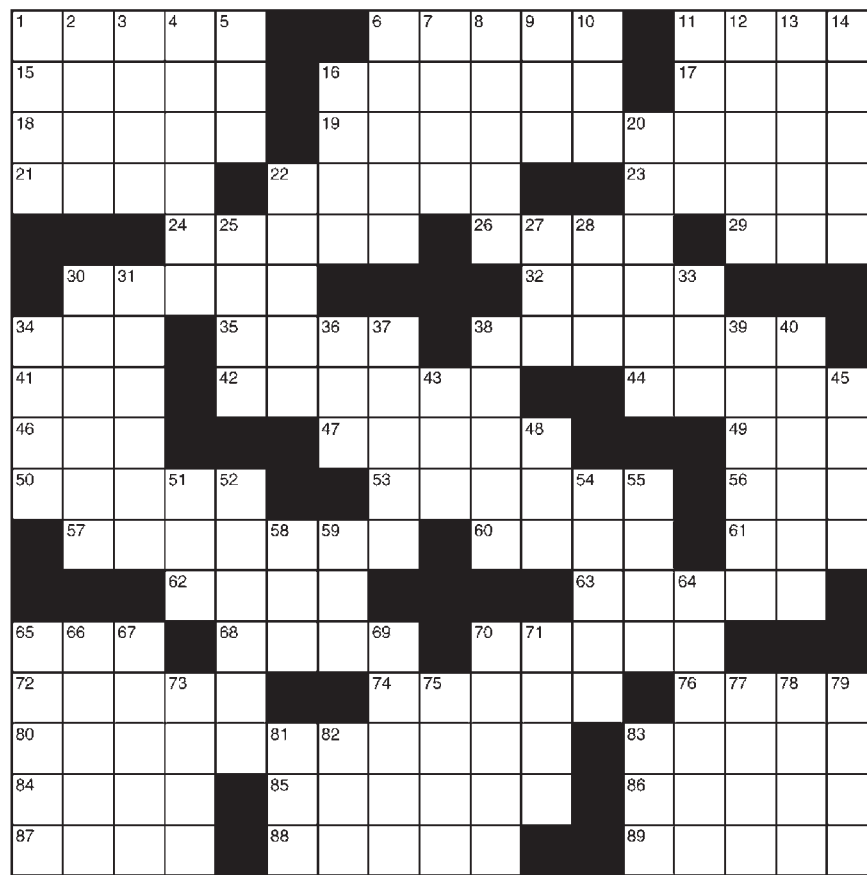
