

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



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Aurora resident engages in illegal tree cutting

The Regional Mu-ronment and, together rate search has revealed Robert Strmota, illegal tree-cutting and illegal fill operation taking place in the Town of Aurora.

After regional and town staff were alerted to illegal tree cutting that had already occurred, York Region Forestry staff confirmed the woodland is located on the Oak Ridges Moraine and falls under the jurisdiction of the Regional Forest Conservation Bylaw. Additionally, illegal placement of fill and site alteration appears to be continuing in contravention of Town of Aurora fill and zoning bylaws.

"The property owner has knowingly disregarded Regional and municipal bylaws and processes," said York Region chairman and CEO Bill Fisch. "The removal of mature trees has impacted the forest cover for the Town of Aurora and for the Region as a whole. It is devastating to our envi-

Letter to the Editor Resident hopes 'mess' can be solved

The following letter is in response to King planning director Stephen Kitchen's explanation regarding a connection to the 8th Concession.

The previous excuse for not putting a road to the 8th was the grading and crossing of the wetlands. I think we need to confirm the possible extension does not have these challenges. I am sure the route that you have identified has some steep inclines and major grading requirements. You now mention the need to modify the storm water pond which raises the cost barrier even higher.

These challenges would not exist if the extension was protected along the path the graders used to take the topsoil across the wetlands when they bulldozed the land. This is the location that is being changed to a single residence. Council should ensure this route is protected as part of the changes to File Z-2012-07. Having the developer lose 1 property to protect a significantly lower cost extension to the 8th should be insignificant to the developer, but is very significant to the Township. I am not sure why you, as the town planner, do not see this as the best interest for King Township.

Regarding traffic, was the Township's plan to put all-way stops at every intersection on Hill Farm road? I certainly do not recall seeing this change in any traffic study. These stop sign additions clearly indicate there is a problem that the Township is trying to ad-

My concerns are far from addressed. York Regional Police cannot keep up with the traffic violations on Hill Farm and Greenside. Adding more stop signs just makes the problem worse. The Township bylaw officers are not able to keep up with the bylaw violations in this area (if they are even trying).

This is a mess that is going past the front of my house every day. I would like to understand that there might be some hope in the future that this mess will spill out onto the 8th Concession instead.

Floyd,

I had understood your principal concern to be the protection of a road connection to the 8th. That has already been accomplished through the Fandor subdivision. Notwithstanding the foregoing, I am advised that there remain opportunities to construct a road connection to the 8th from Bluff Trail irrespective of the current zoning amendment application.

Your concerns with traffic and the four-way stop signs appears to be unrelated to the zoning amendment application since the number of residential units remains the same if the rezoning application is refused. In addition, as the school site block is no longer required for a school (which is a traffic generator) one would anticipate that there could be a further reduction in traffic from the original forecast.

I am advised that the four-way stops were installed in response to community input. I am forwarding a copy of your concern to the Engineering & Public Works Dept. for their information and consideration.

ENGINEERING AND PUBLIC WORKS WATER METER REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

Over the next few years King Township will be replacing our old water meters. Notices will be going to affected residents for the work this year. The initial focus will be Nobleton. Your co-operation with our contractor will be greatly appreciated. This program will assist the Township in leak detection and water conservation. Improvements to Township infrastructure are a benefit to all King residents.

King Township has awarded the contract for this water meter upgrade program to WAMCO Municipal Products. As each phase is implemented, WAMCO licensed meter installers will canvas areas that have been identified for that phase and deliver a copy of the official King Township Notice to Property Owners. WAMCO employees will wear an identification tag and wear a hat & reflective vest with the WAMCO logo.

TOWNSHIP OF KING 11th CONCESSION PAVING

Please be advised that paving and reconstruction of the 11th Concession Road is scheduled to begin shortly. The paving and reconstruction of 11th Concession will occur between Highway 9 to 19th Sideroad; 19th Sideroad to 17th Sideroad; and 15th Sideroad to King Road. The scope of the work will include new paving, installation of guiderails, culvert replacement, and restoration of driveways and other affected areas. Any existing areas that are disturbed during construction will be reinstated.

The Contractor has advised the Township that the proposed works are expected to begin by the end of June of this year, subject to weather and final scheduling. The work is expected to be completed by the end of September of this year.

During the project, vehicle access will be maintained with a single lane through the work areas. Please expect delays if travelling through the work zone and obey flag persons at all times. Short term road closures will be required for some of the cross culvert replacements, however specific notice will be provided by the Contractor in advance of the proposed work. Project Information Signs will be posted at the limits of construction and detour signage will be set up for the local affected areas in advance of the construction.







By that time the process of creating can art had already begun, so the company decided to push through with that idea, starting out by replacing whatever ingredients they could find with local.

As it turned out, a gentleman by the name of Mike O'Hara who has been picking up the mash from the Hockley Brewery since they've been in business, is a certified organic farmer who grows spelt, an ancient grain that Kohnen is to grown 50% from last had singled out for a role in the production of Hockley 100.

The resulting cycle makes the Hockley Brewery one of two breweries in the country that has a full-cycle system on the go. The mash collected by O'Hara get taken to his farm where they feed his cows. Sticking with the cycle, the waste from the cows fertilizes fields where he grows the grains that go into brewing Hockley beer.

"People are going on and on about organic. We actually know the guy who grows our product. To me you can't qualify your product any better than that," said Smellie. "We know the farmer, we know where the field is and we watch this stuff grow. You can't get any closer to home than that."

They have a line on a farm in the Nottawa area that will be producing 13 acres of hops.

"Over the course of a year we're going to have a 100% 100-mile beer," said Smellie. "It's very light beer. Using spelt in it has really lightened it up to meet demand."

The whole process from inception to distribution took 10 months. A typical release takes six months but he says the result was worth waiting for. The delay in the release of the



"This is beyond significant, what's happening here," he added.

"Ian went before me and set the track," said MacPherson, 23. "I watched him go, and knew what I had to do pick up the pace, and keep going!"

MacPherson was nervous as three riders were still to follow. Colombia's Roberto Teran was on the pace until two rails fell near the end of the shortened track to leave him fifth in the overall

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

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
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
