## Dew Street development in King City moves ahead

A development proposal on Dew Street in King City has undergone significant changes since it was first introduced last year, but some residents are still concerned about how it will affect the established surrounding community.

Council approved the draft plan of subdivision for the development at the council meeting Monday. The new homes will be located at the northwest corner of Dew Street and King Boulevard in an existing low density residential area in King City.

The applications were originally submitted in February 2013 and proposed 39 residential units of which 27 units were townhomes and 12 units were semi-detached. A statutory public meeting was held in June 2013 where the public expressed significant opposition to the plan, especially with respect to the proposed density. As a result, the owner undertook discussions with various stakeholders resulting in a significant change to the applications. The owner revised the plan and submitted new applications in February proposing 28 residential units composed of a mix of semi-detached and single detached units. The initial proposal also included a thru street connection from Dew Street to King Boulevard but the applicant changed the thru-road to a cul-de-sac with access to King Boulevard only.

Murray Evans, a planning consultant and agent for the landowner, explained the plan has been revised to address the concerns of the existing community.

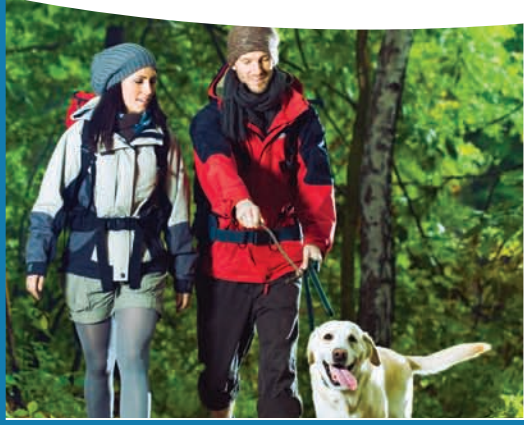

#### UPDATE TO BRIDGE / STREET CLOSURE IN ANSNORVELDT

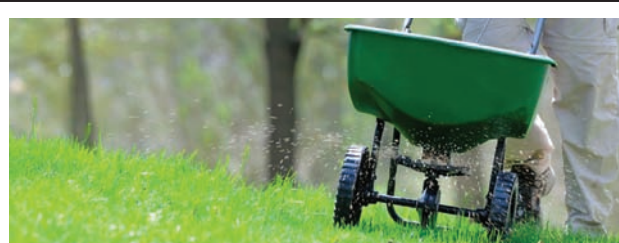

#### NOTICE TO ALL RESIDENTS - DESTROY WEEDS

**NOTICE** is hereby given to all persons in possession of land, in accordance with the Weed Control Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter W.5, Sections 3, 16 and 23 THAT unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the Municipality of the Township of King are destroyed throughout the season, the Municipality may enter upon said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging costs against the land, as set out in the Weed Control Act.

(All properties ten (10) acres or less may have noxious weeds destroyed without notice to the owner).

**NOTE:** Dog-strangling Vine and Black Dog-strangling Vine have been added to the noxious weed list this year. These species are non-native, invasive, aggressive and difficult to control once established on agricultural land. Additionally, all species of Milkweed have been removed from the noxious weed list. Recent evidence has shown a marked decline in Monarch Butterfly populations, which rely on Milkweed as a food source.

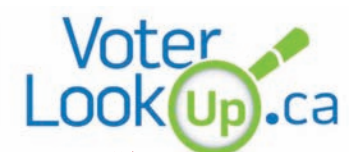

# Leaders, candidates, pledge support for Greenbelt

Municipal leaders and candidates in the coming election, have put pen to paper, pledging their support for the environment.

Politicians and others across the greenbelt gathered in Toronto recently and launched the 2014 Municipal Election Greenbelt Pledge. The goal is to add one million acres to Ontario's greenbelt and create a protected "Food Belt."

The MLGB co-chairs - Oakville Mayor Rob Burton, Guelph Mayor Karen Farbridge, Ajax Mayor Steve Parish and Toronto Councillor Glenn DeBaeremaeker - were at Queen's Park to urge Ontario to take the following steps:

- Expand the Greenbelt by an additional 1 million acres.
- Create Ontario's (and Canada's) first Food Belt consisting of 200,000 acres for farming.
- Reduce red tape for municipalities who want to grow the Greenbelt in their communities.

"The threat of urban sprawl is on the Greenbelt's doorstep. It's time for a bold plan to expand the Greenbelt and permanently protect one million more acres of sensitive environmental lands and farmland. Let's build on the success of Ontario's world renowned Greenbelt and help it grow to 3 million acres across the Greater Golden Horseshoe region," said De Baeremaeker.

"Since the Greenbelt was established in 2005, growth pressures have impacted our communities. With even more growth expected, farmland that gives Ontarians access to healthy, high quality, local food is at risk of being paved over. Establishing a food belt would protect some of Canada's best and remaining farmlands threatened by development in the Whitebelt under the Places to Grow Act," said Mayor Farbridge.

"As the first municipality in Ontario to grow the Greenbelt, we know firsthand how challenging and slow the process can be. We need a more streamlined approach so municipal governments can respond more easily to what constituents are asking us to do - protect and expand the Greenbelt in our communities," added Oakville's Mayor Burton.

Ontario's Greenbelt protects green space, farmland, forests, wetlands, and watersheds, and provides habitat for more than one-third of Ontario's spe-

cies at risk. Each year, the Greenbelt contributes \$2.7 billion in ecosystem services to Ontario's economy.

"It is an extremely important provincial policy that protects our environmentally significant land and our much needed farm fields," said King Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "King benefits immensely from this protection."

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said it's important for citizens to be aware of such issues affecting the bigger picture.

"It is important that 2014 voters know the position of candidates regarding the three conservation plans up for review in 2015.

"I have signed the 2014 pledge to renew my support for the continued permanent protection of Ontario's Greenbelt. Ontario's Greenbelt is 1.8 million acres; it includes areas protected by the GB Plan, the ORMCP and the Niagara Escarpment.

"These plans are not perfect, hence I welcome the opportunity to review them with the objective of strengthening them to achieve the objectives of stopping sprawl, protecting farm land so that food is grown locally, connecting natural heritage systems to achieve clean water through river systems, protecting the source of fresh water for hundreds of thousands people and providing green space for recreation and renewing the spirit. I want to see amendments which will enhance the ability for farmers and other stewards of the land to operate their businesses successfully across the Greenbelt. The greatest protection for the Greenbelt is every land owner operating as a steward of the land and seeing the brightest future as one including their lands as productive agricultural acreage or as landscape for the rivers to flow through or as a host for wetlands."

Greg Locke, candidate for the Ward 4 council seat, also lent his support to the cause.

"I was delighted and more than supportive to have been invited as a candidate to this event," he said. "As chair of Concerned Citizens of King Township, I've been leading our board to promote the protection and enhancement of our Greenbelt, Oak Ridges Moraine and Niagara Escarpment Plans. The mandated reviews commencing in 2015 are critical to us in King, as 70% of our land mass is on the Moraine and 30% is on the Green-

belt.

"As a King candidate, signing the MLGB pledge is a 'no-brainer' for me and I support it wholeheartedly. I encourage all candidates to do so.

"One thing we all have to not only enjoy, but rely on for our safe water and local food supply, is our local environment. I'm determined to protect it for

these reasons and more, for my daughter and for all King residents now and for generations to come."

The MLGB is a network of 70 elected mayors and councillors from across the province who support the Greenbelt as a permanent feature of Ontario's landscape.

**Township of King Transportation Master Plan Study**  
**NOTICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION CENTRE #2**

The Township of King has retained WSP Canada Inc. to undertake the development of a Transportation Master Plan (TMP) Study. The TMP Study will guide the development of the Township's long-term transportation vision for the next twenty years and will be undertaken in accordance with the applicable planning policy framework at the provincial, regional, and local levels, including the Provincial Policy Statement. It reflects the Township's desire to develop a sustainable transportation system with a strong focus on efficient use of existing infrastructure, transit, active transportation and Transportation Demand Management.

Public Information Centre (PIC) #1 took place between January 28 and 30, 2014 in King City, Nobleton, and Schomberg. In PIC #1, existing and forecasted transportation needs, and current road network issues were reviewed. Also, existing and proposed active transportation and transit services were reviewed. It provided information and opportunities for discussion on the transportation challenges, priorities, and choices facing the Township of King.

Since then, technical studies along with policy directions have also been prepared in support of the Transportation Master Plan, for example, future proposed road improvements, roadway hierarchy, active transportation, traffic calming, streetscaping, and complete streets.

PIC #2 will be held in a "drop-in format". This PIC will present the list of policies and transportation infrastructure projects being recommended as part of the Transportation Master Plan to achieve a sustainable transportation system for the Township of King.

Representatives from the Township of King Engineering Services Department and the Consultant will be present to receive input and comments from interested people. The PIC will be held as follows:

King is not likely to create any more community parks for a long time. To the young men who came to the meeting, how much support is there for a skateboard park? Have your friends expressed their opinions?

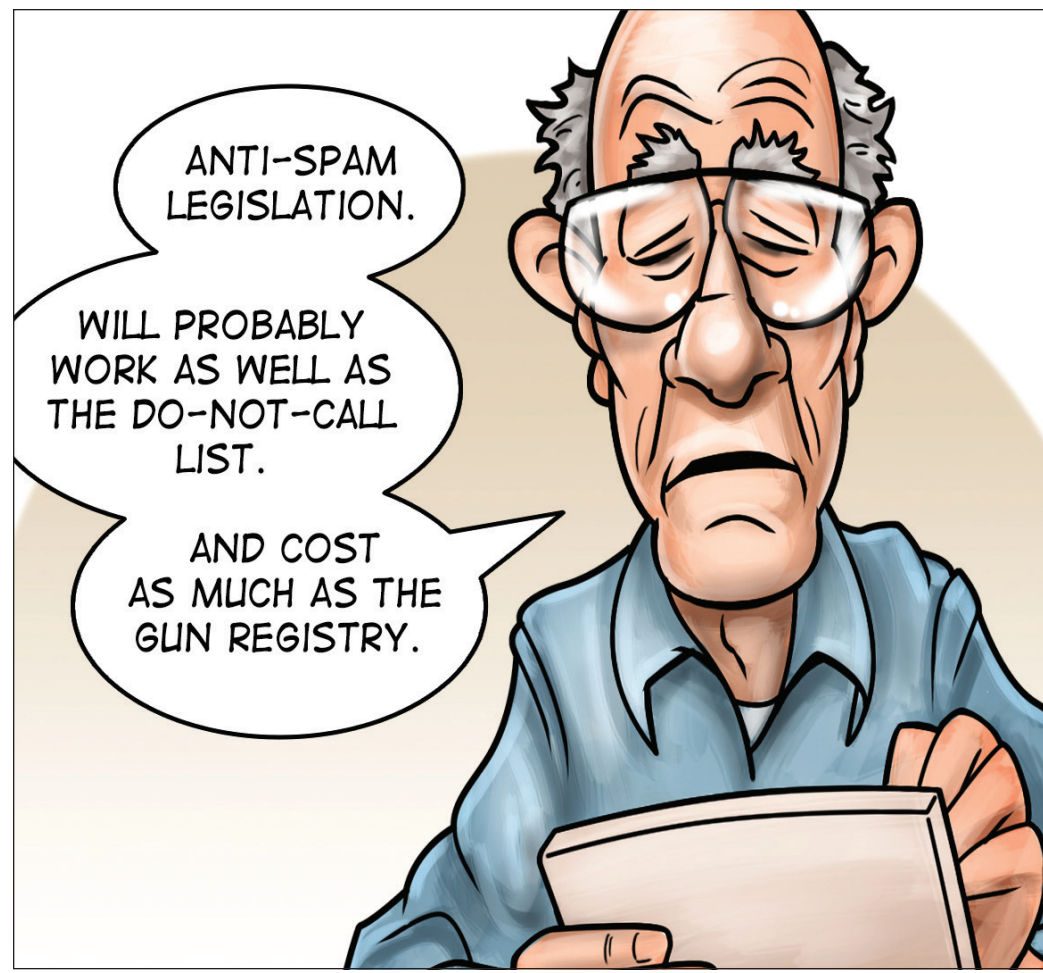

## Practise water safety

Drowning is the second leading cause of death from unintentional injuries for people ages 5 to 24, according to the National Safety Council's Accident Facts Report.

Drownings may occur during swimming, boating, hunting, fishing, and even taking a bath. Small children can even drown in a bucket of water.

The thing people can do to stay safe in and around water is learn how to swim and learn how to perform CPR in case an emergency occurs. Some more tips for the little ones include:

- Always swim with a grown up. Play it safe in the water. This means staying out of any body of water - the ocean, lakes, ponds, rivers, pools, hot tubs, spas, or whirlpools - if there is no grown up or lifeguard present.

- Wear a personal floatation device (PFD) when in the boat. When you go boating with your family and friends, practicing good safety habits is just as important as when you go swimming. When on a boat, everyone needs a seat. If there is not a seat for you, don't go. In addition, everyone on the boat needs their own PFD. Air-filled swimming aids are not acceptable substitutes. Wear your PFD the entire time you are in the boat.

- Personal floatation devices are designed to add buoyancy to your body, hold your head and body higher in the water for better visibility, and to help keep your body warm.

Learn and practice the water safety rules. Here are some helpful hints for keeping safe in the water:

- Swimming is a lot of fun, and great exercise. If you plan to go swimming, you should take swimming lessons.

- Whether you are at a pool, beach, pond, lake, or other swimming areas, always check for a lifeguard. Lifeguards watch out for your safety and your family's safety. They are trained to help in case there is any trouble in or around the water. Swim only where there is a lifeguard or a grown-up who can give you permission to swim.

- Follow the posted rules. Rules are usually posted as signs where you can easily see them. Signs to look for are ones that say: "Danger, Do not swim here, No diving" and "No running or jumping."

Also, look for warning flags. Flags of different colours can mean different things. Ask the lifeguard on duty for help.

- Swim only when you are rested.

- Never jump or dive into the water unless the lifeguard or a grown-up says it's alright

- Refrain from swimming at night

- At home, parents, older children, and babysitters should lock gates, fences and doors surrounding pools and spas to prevent younger children from entering the area.

- Stop, look, and test before entering lakes and pools. When you go swimming in a new place, always check with the lifeguard or a grownup first. Wade into the water, never jump or dive. Make sure you dive only in areas that have been approved for diving - do not dive off piers or rocks.

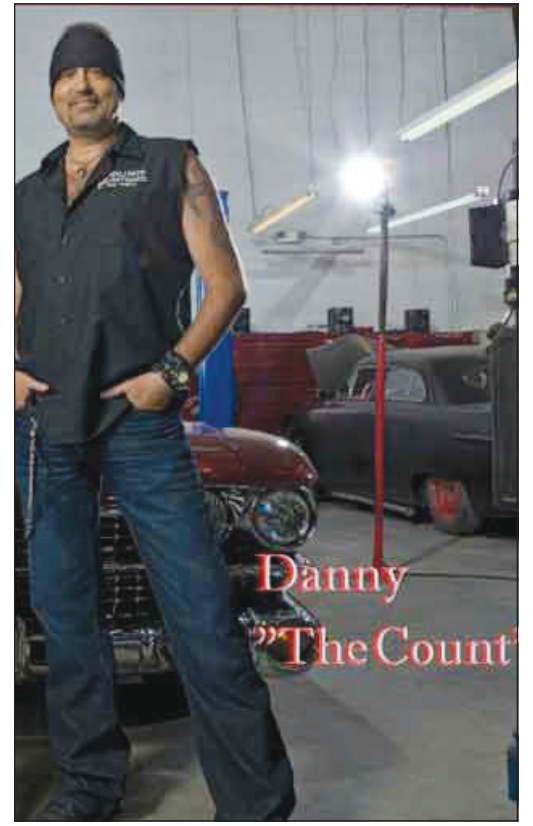

## King's Badcock dominates jumpers at Caledon events

A King equestrian is on a tear.

Neil Babcock, competing after recent heart surgery, has come back with a vengeance.

Babcock was a star at the Caledon Pan Am Equestrian Park as it wrapped up its second phase of the Caledon Premier on Sunday.

Michelle Vandal topped the list last week with two big wins on Christina Woodley's Travola, taking home both Thursday's \$5,000 1.35m Jumper Stake, presented by System Fencing, and beating out a field of 24 in \$10,000 Leon's Furniture Orangeville Grand Prix on Sunday (July 6).

Neil Badcock of King City was a stand-out at several events.

Badcock once again had a big week on Corrido, owned by Jessie Bonisteel, winning their third straight big-money class in Friday's \$5,000 Open Welcome Jump-

er, after having already claimed the Phase One \$5,000 Open Welcome and \$10,000 Caledon Premier I Modified Grand Prix the previous week.

Friday's win put an exclamation mark on an what has been an incredible comeback for Badcock, who just 11 weeks ago had open-heart surgery to correct a previously undiagnosed and life-threatening congenital condition.

"I was probably feeling symptoms of the actual heart issue for many years and didn't even know it, but just put it down to fatigue from working too hard or overexertion. In some regards I feel better than new; I feel tremendous," said Badcock.

"Friday was a great class," he added. "I'm really happy with the horse, he's giving me 100 per cent."

The hunters took centre stage at the Caledon Pan Am Equestrian Park recently for the first phase of the Caledon Premier Series, featuring two always-exciting Hunter Derby classes.

Badcock impressed on his mount Corrido. They took both the \$5,000 Open Jumper Welcome and the \$10,000 Caledon Premiere Phase One 2014 Grand Prix.

"Today's ride was really a gift from the horse to me. (Corrido) is a wonderful horse," said Badcock of his ride on the previous Sunday. "Whenever you have good competitors in the field it always makes you rise to the occasion, and there's always a little luck involved, too. It was a good field to jump off against."

"He's a seven-year-old Holsteiner. I've only had him for about a year, and he's stepped up a lot this year from the metre-twenty-fives to the metre-forties. He's probably one of the more special ones I've ever had," said Badcock of Corrido.

The ring also played host to two Hunter Derby classes, starting with Natasha Skupsky taking the \$3,000 three-foot OHJA Junior-Amateur Hunter Derby on Affidavit, owned by Amatoville Enterprises Inc.

Toronto's Cawthra Burns followed that up by beating out a field of 31 and winning the \$3,000 J. Gibson Design Canadian Hunter Derby, part of the Canadian Hunter Derby Series, on her longtime mount Posh. Caledon resident Erynn Ballard was both second and third in the class on her rides Cenerife, owned by Alison Dyer-Fagundo, and Christel Weller's Confession, respectively.

Also on Saturday, Caledon resident Erin Ugolini, out of Sorensen Stables located in Caledon East, won the \$2,500 Low Child/Adult Hunter Classic aboard Wellington, owned by Toni Hickox.

The week's competition closed out with Olivia Wierenga of Woodstock taking home the final class of the day in the \$1,500 Adena Springs Long Run TB Hunter Classic on her horse Atlantis.

## Township, Villanova explore field partnership arrangement

King Township and Villanova College are joining forces to investigate a mutually beneficial deal.

King council received a report from Chris Fasciano, director of Parks, Recreation and Culture, that outlines the proposal, subject to further discussion and funding approvals in 2015.

Council okayed that King and Villanova enter into a "sports field agreement" to make improvements to their turf facilities, a deal that will benefit both the school and local user groups.

For several years, King has worked with local sports organizations to get a handle on the need for fields, as further growth takes place. Last year, King created its Parks, Recreation & Culture Master Plan, which recommends that field development takes place, through strategic partnerships.

And that's where Villanova came in. Staff and college management began discussions on putting an artificial turf field in place of the current football field at the 15 Sideroad campus.

The scope of the project includes a larger footprint, removing the current running track. The Township is responsible for the funding and construction and the school may look at an enclosed dome down the road.

This development would allow the expansion of programming time for King's groups. They can play longer (April to October) and later into the evening with added lighting. This turf would also allow for a higher caliber of play.

"This additional usage in conjunction with the higher quality of play available will be a huge benefit to our soccer clubs in King and represents a creative, strategic partnership to enhance the amenities to our user groups and residents," Fasciano wrote.

He admitted that the field development does require a large upfront financial commitment, an estimated \$1.6 million. But, the ongoing maintenance is less than that of a standard field.

"This allows the municipality to explore new ways to manage the higher requirements of parks services as they grow and thus allow staff to increase the quality of life for our residents while being financially aware."

Fasciano pointed out the current deal with Villanova doesn't commit King to the project just yet. Its funding, and potential sources of funding, will be brought to council as part of the 2015 budget discussions. Money has already been put aside for the design and tender portion of the project.

# Cornhuskers aiming for a spot in the playoffs

In 2007, Nick Burns started Super Elite Football with a vision of promoting and growing the game he loves throughout Ontario.

"We also have guys that have gone

"We're a fundamentals based camp, so it's all about getting these kids better, growing the sport of football and more importantly giving them an experience that they're never going to forget."

The Summer Youth Leadership Camp costs \$349 for the entire week and there is a possibility for financial assistance if needed.

Aside from their summer camps, Super Elite also offers eight week programs in the winter and overnight provincial camps.

Burns said Super Elite works with youth all the way up to 19 years old and hopes the game will continue to catch on.

"We've put a lot of emphasis on the younger players, because I think they're the future of our sport, so we're trying to mold them into players," he said. "Football is not for everyone, but what we try to do is give them a camp that allows them to become excited about the game."

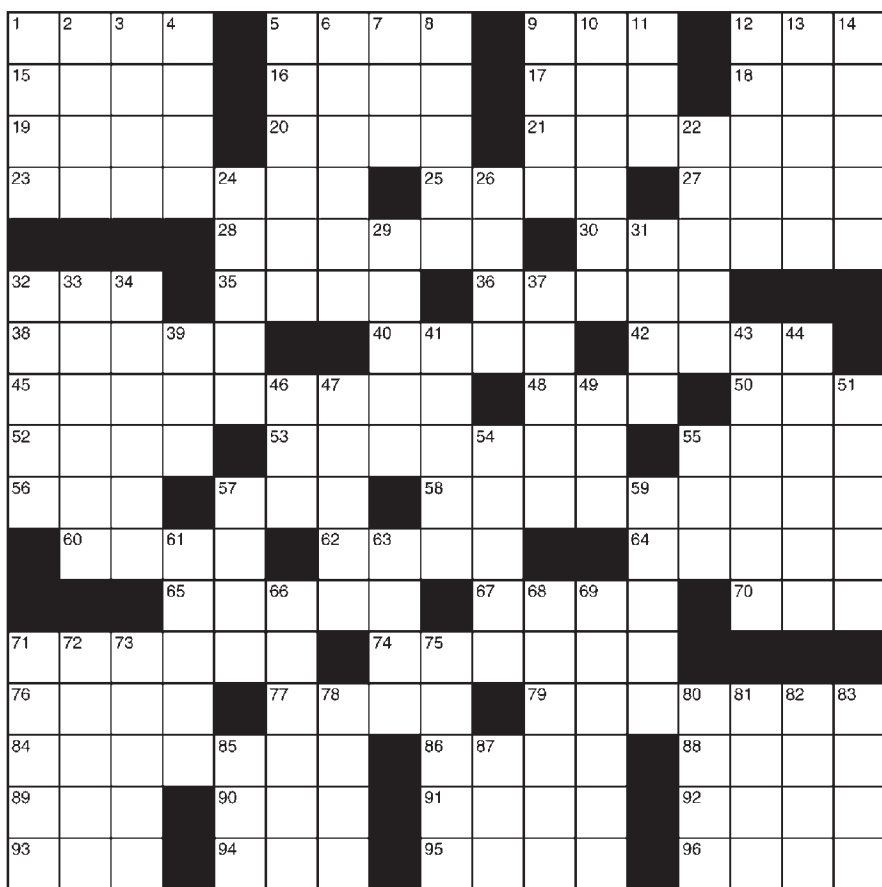

# Resident concerned about intensity, drainage

"The plan has changed quite noticeably in its character and features," said Evans, adding a number of public consultations were held and the feedback from resident has been incorporated into the revised plan. "Through the information exchange process, it became clear that there were some issues with density, compatibility with the existing community and safety."

His client is now proposing a development that is more appropriate for the location, he explained.

"With the help of staff, we've come up with a plan that will provide a very nice transition and a very nice street front along King Boulevard," Evans said. "It provides different types of housing in a very small area in what I believe is a good location for this - near schools, high schools, transit and shops."

From a density point of view, the developer has gone from 39 units to 28 units. "It's more in keeping with what is existing on the street," he added.

In addition, the developer has agreed to build a sidewalk along Dew Street and King Boulevard which will address the safety concerns for children walking to

school.

Resident Peter Nufrio is particularly concerned with the location of the storm water management pond, which he argued is right in his backyard.

"That is not acceptable," said Nufrio. "If the pond overflows, it will go on my property. Nobody can guarantee that's not going to happen. Put it in someone else's backyard. Other residents don't care but I do ... At the end of the day, if there is an issue I'm stuck with it."

"I see this as suffocation," he stated. "This is Maple or Woodbridge or whatever you want to call it. This is not King anymore ... I feel like I'm being punished. I chose to live in King but now it feels like I'm being forced out."

He also argued that he was kept in the dark and that "it was all done behind closed doors."

King City Councillor Mortelliti pointed out that a number of public consultations were held. He suggested that while other residents may not necessarily support the development, they recognize that it is a better fit than what was initially proposed.

"I don't know that it's accurate to say all residents are pleased with this because I think what they would like is to

see no development across the street from them," said Mortelliti, adding the developer held a number of public meetings to obtain input from residents. "The plan that came out of that discussion ... I think they recognize this is a better plan for their area than the original plan that was proposed."

"The real win was our collaboration with the community and the willingness to work with the developer, knocking down the density, to make it fit with the community a little bit more," said Mortelliti, adding a refusal in the application could have resulted in the applicant taking the matter to the Ontario Municipal Board where the decision would be taken out of the Township's hands. Intensification is mandated by the province and the proposed area is within the boundary. "It's pretty difficult for me to say I can't support this when we worked so hard to get it where it is ... I think we have to recognize as a council that this is a win in comparison to what was initially proposed."

With respect to the resident's concern regarding drainage issues and overflow of the storm water management pond spilling onto his property, Mortelliti said there are no guarantees but that the sys-

tem is designed to draw water away from the properties. He added that the ponds are an industry accepted practice and that they are designed to mitigate flooding in subdivisions.

Evans explained the pond is in that location because there is an existing culvert there which allows the water to flow under the road and the rail line and empty into an open space.

"It's not going into the delegate's backyard, it's going into a pipe that is already in place," explained Evans. "There is water flowing at the present time into that pipe. The pond will collect water in a storm event and allows the water to leave ... at a controlled rate."

Council approved the staff recommendations for draft approval of the subdivision plan, adoption of the official plan amendment and enactment of the implementing zoning by-law subject to the conditions of draft approval. As a condition of draft plan approval, Mortelliti requested that the developer install a privacy fence along the western boundary of the development.

"I hope the developer is agreeable to that," said Mortelliti. "I don't think it's a huge cost and it provides a better buffer to the adjacent properties."



# Liberals following through with vision in Throne Speech

The newly elected Liberal government is staying the course with its vision. That vision, a precursor to the next provincial budget, was delivered in the speech from the Throne at Queen's Park last week.

The overall message is one of building up Ontario, according to Minister of Community and Social Services, Oak Ridges-Markham MPP Dr. Helena Jaczek.

"In my ministry, it's about building people up," she said. It's about ensuring those who are the most vulnerable in society have the services they need.

Infrastructure is also a main focus for the province. Transit infrastructure, as well as plans for a new hospital, are important in a rapidly growing York Region, the minister observed.

Another message in the speech was the fact the Liberal government values the efforts of its public sector, an issue during the recent election campaign.

In her ministry, so many services are delivered by front-line workers, it's important to validate their efforts, Jaczek added.

Once debate and discussion at Queen's Park over the speech wraps up this week, the next provincial budget will arrive.

Jaczek said it will be the same budget that was delivered, and defeated, back on May 1.

The budget calls on additional funding for social services, particularly in programs that provide transition from childhood to adulthood for those with special needs.

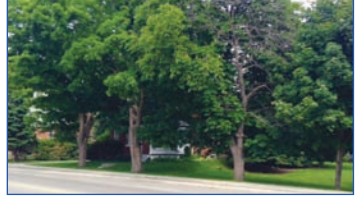

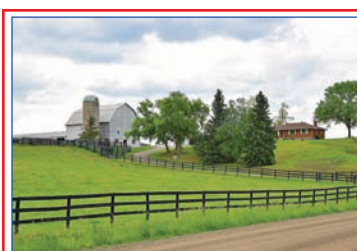
