# **Full steam** ahead for **King's office** relocation

King Township politicians are excited about the planned relocation of its municipal offices.

Councillors voted to move full steam ahead with its planned office move to the former Holy Name school site on King Road.

Councillors approved recommendations at its Aug. 24 meeting to proceed with a partial demolition and addition of the existing site. Council also agreed to proceed with talks with York Regional Police about including a sub-station in the new municipal complex.

"I'm excited that we will have a proper building for King Township," said Councillor Cleve Mor-

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telliti. "I have been a councillor and an employee in this (current) building. It's high time we got moving."

Mayor Steve Pellegrini wants to get under way "as soon as possible," adding the preferred rebuild is fiscally responsible and provides a "community hub."

Councillor Bill Cober, known for being frugal, is anxious to get firm cost projections and a funding formula for the new digs. He believes the public wants to know where the money is coming from.


The bulk of the funding will come from the sale of the current municipal office and strip mall. In order to maximize the Township's return, "we want to sell this place shovel-ready," the mayor observed. The value will be "extremely high" if the new buyers can get going immediately after purchase.





## GO STATION PARKING LOT IMPROVEMENTS WEST STREET, KING CITY





# **Planned renovation meets objectives**

The Township is looking at the necessary changes to permit some repurposing of the site with commercial and residential elements.

It will bolster village vitality and prosperity by providing a new location (the current municipal office in the strip mall) for additional commercial and housing.

CAO Susan Plamondon noted while the initial cost projects are high, the sale of the existing site, coupled with some DCs and potential "green" grants, will lessen the blow.

She told Cober that as the project matures, updates and a detailed financing plan will be presented to council.

Both senior staff and +VG consultants recommended going forward with the partial demolition and addition.

This option includes retaining the most functional part of the building - the two-storey portion. The one-storey section at the front will be demolished and an addition will be build to address the space requirements.

The study by +VG pegs the cost at between \$9 and \$10 million, exclusive of contingency, soft costs, furniture and equipment.

"Project MOVE" as it's been called, incorporates best practices in green building standards. The new offices will allow Township staff to operate more efficiently and effectively in providing services to the community.

"A new administrative/community use facility will not only enable the Township to better serve the community, but can also serve as a landmark and a meaningful symbol of the community's identity," according to CAO Susan

Plamondon.

One of council's objectives is to consider incorporating community uses within the building, making it a community hub.

Plamondon said very preliminary discussions were held with York Regional Police. A YRP presence in King has many advantages, not the least of which are a local presence and a share of the operating costs. Council directed staff to enter into more formal discussions with YRP with the ultimate goal of a sub-station within the building.

Thomas Wilson, of +VG Architects, updated councillors on their work to date. Their space needs assessment included interviews with staff in order to determine department placing and work stations throughout the building.

The site has many positive elements, not the least of which are the views and soccer field. Their preliminary designs took the Township's priorities into consideration - cost effectiveness, improved access for the public, accommodating community partners and longevity.

The structure. Wilson said, "has good bones ... much of it is well built."


The approved option meets all the objectives and "shows leadership and cost effectiveness."

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said she wanted to ensure the main fover allows for ease of access by the public, and also provides flexibility.

Plamondon noted it does boast a centralized customer service area and has been designed to accommodate the bulk (roughly 80%) of common, day-to-day customer transactions. It will really be a one-stop centre.







This concept drawing shows the options for the repurposing of the former Holy Name school, which will become the Township's new municipal offices.





## Letter to the Editor Selective no parking zones

One of the last things that my husband and I thought about during the process of purchasing our first home was parking. With more pressing issues, parking enforcement was the farthest thing from our mind.

Never, in the few years, that we have lived in this newly developed subdivision in Schomberg, has an issue with parking ever presented itself – until now. So why is it that several no parking signs attached to wooden posts have been strewn in specific areas along one of the major streets in the subdivision? Why did it escalate to this without any notice to residents? Not only have these signs posed as an inconvenience for guests coming to visit but they are an eyesore. With the exorbitant amount of property tax that residents in King Township pay annually, I would have thought that they could have sprung for a more modest alternative such as metal rather than untreated wooden fence posts. I would like to point out that by alternative parking I mean parking in the areas within the subdivision that do not possess these no parking signs (like so many residents do daily) as there is no overflow parking options for residents or their guests. When asked what prompted the implementation of these signs, I was told by a Township official that emergency and Township vehicles are having a hard time manoeuvering around the tight corners of the street due to the cars parked on the road. That in turn begs the question- Aren't all roadways created equal? Why are the corners on this specific street too tight for emergency vehicles to safely pass yet other corners within the subdivision are not? Why this now becoming an issue? And why are parking infractions not being enforced in other areas of the subdivision and the township as a whole? Namely to those cars that park on the road for a period of longer than three hours or the cars that block the sidewalks and overhang on the road. Both are direct infractions in the township yet there are never any tickets handed out to people except for those in the no parking zone. When asked why it is that only certain individuals are receiving parking infractions, I was told by a township official that it is usually due to personal complaint that was made to the parking enforcement department directly.



# Chief Ross Kennedy was a genuine trailblazer


We should all remember the efforts of those who blazed the trails, when those trails didn't even exist.

Looking around the meeting room at the Nobleton fire station, history unfolds through photographs and newspaper clippings. The history of the volunteer force and the station itself is filled with heart, dedication and commitment.

Ross Kennedy, who served as Nobleton's first fire chief from 1959 through 1996, will be remembered for many "firsts." He set the stage for a local force that is considered one of the best in the province.

Kennedy, who passed away July 19 at 88, will be remembered at a service Thursday, Sept. 3 at the Manor. The public is welcome to attend the service, which runs 6-9 p.m. at the Manor, located at 16750 Weston Road in Kettleby.

Taking the helm of the Nobleton service in 1959, Kennedy went to work quickly, securing the needed equipment for his men. He helped spearhead a fundraising drive to raise the money to purchase a 1943 International pumper truck, which came from an airforce base. There was no station at this time, and the truck simply moved



around town. Long-serving retired captain Terry Phillipps recalls that on occasion, other vehicles, including a milk truck, had to be moved out of the way to access the pumper. presented some challenges, especially in the winter.

Phillips also noted that in those early days, six phones were strategically placed around town, so when people called, they all rang and tripped the fire alarm.

In 1964, they purchased a used ambulance and the Nobleton Firefighters and Ambulance Association was born. In those days, the firemen actually sent out bills to residents who called for an ambulance.

In 1966, they acquired the first pager system, which resembled a large, portable radio. Fire was dispatched by King City Police at the time.

When York Regional Police took over in 1972, the fire departments were dispatched through Vaughan.

Acquiring equipment was no small task in the early years. It was still relatively expensive. Government funding allowed them to purchase a 1965 Thibault pumper for \$15,000.

The original fire hall was built in the early '60s and a library was added on in the early 1970s.

Things began to take off with the arrival of regional government in 1974, but King's three stations still operated separately, with their own chiefs.

Phillips recalled that a new pumper arrived in 1978 with a price tag of \$55,000. When it was replaced in 1993, the cost had more than doubled.

Kennedy made sure that his crews and station always had the most up to date equipment as possible. Volunteers and members of the Nobleton Lions Club rolled up their sleeves and pitched in when needed.

If no agreement can be reached before the 10th, the OMB member will likely have to attempt to settle what issues should be dealt with in Phase 1.



The 28-year-old male from Nobleton was arrested and charged with Sexual Interferrence, Sexual Assault and Luring.


He was held for a bail hearing Aug. 27 and was released. He is further scheduled to appear in court on Sept. 17.

## first equestrian Olympic medal

When John Rumble rode astride his gelding Cilrov (pronounced Kilrov) in the 1956 Summer Olympic Games in Stockholm, it was not in his mind set to bring a medal home to Canada.

Yet he, along with teammates Jim Elder and Brian Herbinson, rode the horse he had only worked with for a few months to Olympic bronze.

On top of their inexperience with each other, Cilroy was not a pure thoroughbred. He was also crossed with a coach horse, one who had never even jumped in a horse show before.

"No one thought he would be going to the Olympics," said Rumble.

A friend of his, Harold Crang, had offered up Cilroy after Rumble's own horse was put out of commission. Although the dressage and show-jumping legs of eventing haven't changed much over the years, the grueling 22-mile cross-country section that was a part of the Olympics until the 1940s was hard on both horse and rider, Rumble weighing 20 pounds more than the 165-pound minimum.

"In those days, a rider who fell could remount and continue on," said Rumble. "Spectators would catch your horse for you and vault you back into the saddle."

Today, a fall means automatic elimination.

The Cheltenham-born horse surprised the world, and laid the roots of equestrian in King, with his Olympic victory. Rumble and Cilroy were the strongest member of the team, accruing the least amount of negative points.

Rumble, a staple in the King equestrian community, recently gave a talk at the King Township Museum where he commented on the state of the horsey set within the area. He said although his days of competition faded with his Olympic experience, equestrian is still very much in his blood.

"Living in this area, it's not difficult to see the inspiration of equestrian everywhere,' said Rumble, who added his signature to one of the horses in the area's recent art installation Parade of Horses. "It's deeply rooted in King, and the amount of quality farms in the area is astounding."


The talk was even given the name "King: The Kentucky of Canada."

Having laid roots in King 18 years ago, Rumble now helps younger riders along the same path he followed over a half-century ago. He now works with Selena O'Hanlon of Kingston, who rides his four-year old gelding Foxwood High, aka "Woody."

O'Hanlon and Woody recently represented Canada as alternates for eventing in the 2015 Pan Am Games at Caledon Equestrian Park.

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
