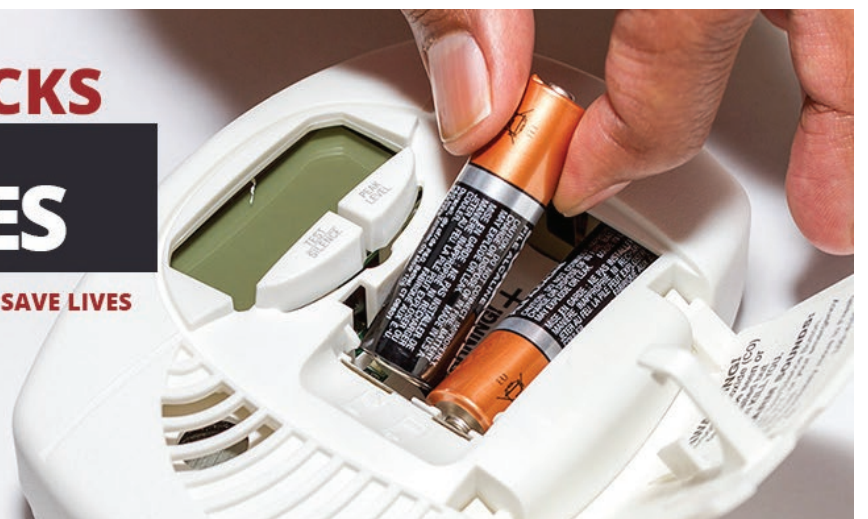

Improving daily commutes is part of the government's plan to build Ontario up. The four-part plan includes investing in people's talents and skills, making the largest investment in public infrastructure in Ontario's history, creating a dynamic, innovative environment where business thrives, and building a secure retirement savings plan.

"By adding 72 new parking spots and another 60 in 2016, we are making it easier for GO customers in King City to access the GO network and get to where they need to go. This is further proof of our government's commitment to making the daily commute and quality of life better for Ontario families," Del Duca added.

"The additional parking spots at the

King City GO station are a welcome addition to constituents in my riding who use GO Transit every day," said Dr. Helena Jaczek, MPP for Oak Ridge-Markham and Minister of Community and Social Services.

"We're expanding parking here in King City to make it easier for people to choose transit first. Helping our customers get to and from our GO stations as quickly and conveniently as possible is critical in ensuring our GO Train network can keep them moving in their everyday lives," said Mary Proc, vice-president of customer services, GO Transit.

Since 2003, the Ontario government has extended GO's rail network by nearly 90 kilometres, opened 14 new GO stations, rebuilt four existing stations, and added more than 31,000 new parking spots across the system.

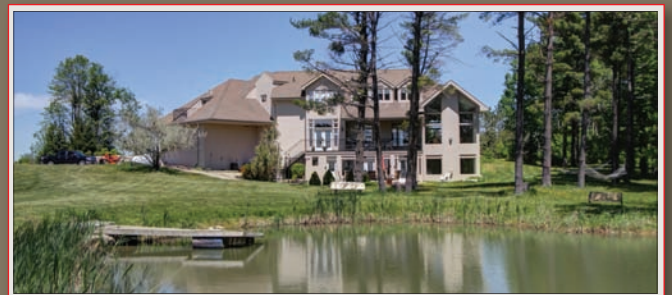

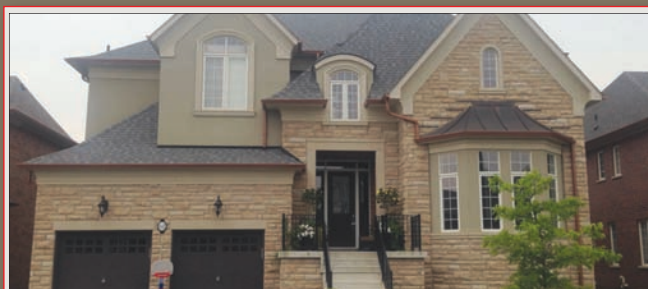

Vote to make a difference in environmental action

Every time I hear that phrase, "Let me be absolutely clear," I know a platitude of PMO proportions is coming. I watch the eyes of the prime minister slide centre-screen back to the teleprompter that guides his every word, and then intone a warning to hard-working, tax-paying, old-stock Canadians to stay the course for the need of our perilous security and our fragile economy.

The first casualty of war is truth, they say. So, too, with election campaigns. But the first casualty of this historically lengthy federal election campaign was the environment. As I wrote previously, the environment made it into the Prime Minister's speech in French on the day he announced the dissolution of Parliament as a key plank of the Conservative platform. It lasted for a few seconds, and then "the Environment" disappeared from the English version never to be seen again.

So, for those interested in voting for a party that was going to deal decisively with the environmental issues associated with accelerating climate change,

it certainly wasn't going to be the Conservative Party of Canada. Even as the other main parties tried to introduce their platforms and policies, we found ourselves distracted by the trial of the PMO and its senators, economic debates on technical recessions, the Syrian refugee crisis, and the niqab identity risk to national security.

And so, with more than enough time to engage in a national discourse on the truly greatest threat of the 21st century, we failed to bring the environment to the front burner. But the threat isn't going away, and as the chief of the International Monetary Fund recently put it: "We're cooked if we fail on climate change."

Sadly, any chance for legitimate lasting dialogue on the environment, and there was plenty of time to inform the public, was lost in distractions and repetitive party talking points. With only a few days to go before the election, we are left to glean what we can from the published platforms of those seeking our trust. For your voting pleasure, we have attempted to summarize the key points of each party's environmental

promises, keeping in mind that most promises made during an election campaign are as durable as pick-up lines in a bar.

The Conservative platform is weak; in fact our current government is the weakest of all G7 countries in dealing with climate change. They have agreed to join G7 countries in phasing out fossil fuels by 2100, by which point most members of the current government will be composting. Their reduction targets are equally weak, with a 30% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2030 based on 2005 levels, but on a sector by sector basis, not including the oil sands (emissions from the oil sands have risen 79% since 2005). They have proposed funding for green projects like a Public Transit Fund, but not until 2017.

The Green Party, predictably, has a strong platform with specific commits to putting a price on carbon at \$50 a tonne across all sectors including the oil sands. Their GHG targets are equally ambitious with reductions of 80% below 1990 levels by 2050. They promise a \$180 million a year for clean energy Research and Development as well as \$1 billion a year for Green Technology Commercialization Grants. Their tax credits are for Energy Efficiency Home Renovations and propose a National Plan for green transportation infrastructure. They also commit wisely to a \$500 million a year Green Climate Fund to support developing nations.

The NDP platform also commits to an 80% reduction in GHGs by 2050, as well as a \$4.5 billion invested over 4 years in Green Bonds to support "clean energy, climate resilient infrastructure, commercial and industrial energy retrofits, and other sustainable development projects." They also promise \$1.5 billion

over 4 years additionally for green programs for retrofitting homes in northern communities.

The Liberal platform is promising: "we will provide national leadership and join with the provinces and territories to take action on climate change, put a price on carbon, and reduce carbon emissions." As yet there is no price per tonne stated for carbon, nor any specific GHG reduction targets, but they have committed to end subsidies to oil and gas sector. There is a \$200 million annual for Clean Technology Innovation as well as \$100 million for clean tech companies. Public transportation gets \$6 billion over 4 years and an additional \$10 Billion for public transportation infrastructure over 10 years. The Liberals have also committed \$40 million for ocean sciences research.

So, in summary, the Conservative Party has the weakest platform, but a chance of winning a minority. The Green Party has the strongest platform, but the least chance of forming the next government. The New Democratic Party has a strong platform, but are currently running third, with perhaps a supportive role for the next minority government. The Liberal Party also has a strong platform and is positioned to win a minority government; their policies on climate change would need the support of the Green and NDP parties to succeed.

So, dear friends, let me be absolutely clear. There is one big thing we can do to help address the ecological and economic issues associated with accelerating climate change. The biggest single thing we can do is to vote for the party that has the best chance of making the biggest difference in Canada's environmental policies and actions.

Opposed to use of arena

I would like to express my disappointment with King council over their decision to convert the Schomberg arena into a works depot. Not only do I disagree with repurposing the property, I also take issue with the fact that the land is being kept under Township ownership at all.

Several years ago before the Trisan Centre was built, the citizens of King were told that the Schomberg Arena property would be sold to help offset the cost of the new facility. Millions could likely be recovered in such a sale. Years later under what was basically our current council, that plan was unilaterally changed to hold the land in Township hands but lease it out on a 25-year basis.

Where is the accountability of council here? Unsurprisingly there were only two bids for that scenario, neither of which was very good. What business would sink any amount of money into redeveloping a property they couldn't own?

That winning bid, a seniors' medical hospice, has quietly walked away from the deal. Citizens were actually informed of that fact by Mayor Pellegrini at a town meeting back in the spring, but he conveniently failed to mention the fact that a works depot might replace it, which to me is a far worse option.

A works depot will add virtually no community value to Schomberg. The trucks and machinery going in and out will be an added nuisance to an already treacherous Western Avenue which has no sidewalks but is the route many of our children take to walk to school. The property is smack in the middle of a residential neighborhood directly across from a park and tennis courts, where families and children walk and play. It is also clearly visible from Main Street, our primary business area.

There are hectares and hectares of land throughout King Township, including many acres zoned industrial as highlighted in the recent King Official Plan review, that would be more than suitable. Why not put a works depot on that type of property? Or perhaps at the site of the old Holy Name school, which will be our future Town Hall and includes acres of extra property? Any of these seem more logical than using space in the heart of Schomberg, which is far more rare and valuable village-designated land.

It would have been preferable to put the land on the market to see what great ideas private enterprise could come up with. During the last tender process there was talk of a microbrewery and attached restaurant. What a great boost for Schomberg/Main Street businesses that would have been! Or perhaps a year-round farmers' market? That would be a winning deal for local farmers and area residents.

But instead, we have been handed down a decision that will provide an eyesore to our community that will not only provide no economic value, tourism, tax creation or community value but will ultimately be using our tax dollars to boot. What a great deal.

Seems to me like Schomberg is being treated as the proverbial red headed step-child of King Township.

Concerns with use of old Schomberg arena

I have just become aware of the council decision to convert the old Schomberg Arena and surrounding area into a storage facility and works yard for parks and recreation equipment.

This came with little or no consultation with residents of the area, and obviously with no concern for the added traffic, noise and dust that such a use

will bring to Main Street, Doctor Kay Drive and Western Avenue. These have limited access and are already crowded with traffic, and all of this will have an impact on the surrounding residents and business people of the village.

I cannot believe that such a move would even be contemplated, let alone decided upon, by a council that supposedly has the best interests of the villag-

es and hamlets of this township as there primary responsibility and duty.

Schomberg is a village, not an industrial area and should remain as such. Introducing an essentially industrial operation into a village is outrageous and simply unacceptable even on a "temporary" basis as has been suggested. In that the Township apparently plans to spend close to \$100,000 to prepare the facility for "temporary use," we all know that "temporary" will soon become "forever."

This property is better left vacant than to use it for this purpose, and surely this council has more vision than is displayed by this "creative and innovative" decision. This is presumably all about money, and I suggest that a slight reduction in the estimated \$10,000,000 or more to be spent on converting the old school house into a Township office building would more than accommodate the cost of a parks works building

in a more appropriate location.

The school property adjacent to the planned Township building is just such a property, easily accessible from King Road and not in the middle of residential properties. The planned costs of the renovation of the arena would easily pay for a quonset building perfectly suitable for equipment storage.

It is simply incredible to me, that a decision such as this, with the impact that a public works yard will have on the quiet village of Schomberg should be made without any public consultation and in fact without even the knowledge of the surrounding residents. The residents of this village and in fact of this Township have a right to expect better governance than this.

I can only say to the mayor and entire council of this Township: "shame on you!"

Pattern of spending taxpayers' money

It seems there is a pattern in the way King Township is spending taxpayer money.

First, there is a curtailment of many road repairs due, we are told, to a lack of funds. Then we are informed that the Township will be spending likely in excess of \$10 million dollars to move to new offices.

And the latest news is that they propose to spend close to \$100,000 to renovate the old Schomberg arena so that they can store lawnmowers and other parks department equipment. We are assured that it will only be a temporary measure and residents should not be concerned. Well, I for one, am concerned.

Firstly, I resent that the Township would spend such an amount of money on a "temporary" solution. Secondly, I resent that they would think it is acceptable to build an extension to their works department in the centre of Schomberg, a small residential village.

Are they not aware that this location borders on homes where there are children who could be in harms way of Township vehicular traffic?

Councillor Bill Cober has indicated that as the Schomberg Arena is a municipally owned property, and no re-zoning is necessary to allow the Township to utilize the arena as a storage facility. I question if this is indeed correct, and if so, why would a municipality be exempt from following its own zoning bylaws?

But the bigger question is the manner in how the Township is spending money. It now has a staff of close to 100 people with a payroll of well in excess of \$1 million a year, a belief that \$10 million for a new municipal office is acceptable and that spending \$100,000 for a "temporary" renovation should not be open for public debate.

Time for a reality check!

Candidates show their passion at CCKT debate

From youth jobs and infrastructure to climate change, candidates seeking to become King-Vaughan's first MP showed their passion during last week's all-candidates' meeting.

The event, hosted by Villanova College and organized by Concerned Citizens of King Township (CCKT), brought together three contenders, who spoke out about issues and defended their party leaders and policies.

Moderated by Councillor Cleve Morrelli, the panel included Ann Raney, Green Party; Natalie Rizzo, NDP and Deb Schulte, Liberal. Conservative candidate Konstantin Toubis declined the offer to attend.

During her opening remarks, Schulte noted Toubis's absence "doesn't serve the country or community well."

She's worried about the future and economic opportunities for youth. The Conservative government believes tax cuts stimulate the economy, but Schulte countered nothing could be further from the truth.

"Investment grows our economy" as well as taking a more balanced approach on the environment, she charged.

She's running to make government work together and work for the people. She's running to end the divisive attitudes.

"I'm offering hope ... and will fight hard for you in Ottawa," she said.

Rizzo, too, began by saying it's unacceptable that a representative of the prime minister's party didn't attend the debate to share in open, accountable discourse.

As someone who grew up in the riding, Rizzo said she's concerned about her future and about stable, quality employment for young people. Settling down and owning a home in York is a challenge.

The Harper government, she noted, has the worst economic record since the Depression.

Too many young people are out of work; too many seniors are retiring in poverty, and too many parents struggle to afford day care.

The NDP have a plan and will invest

in innovation, and invest in youth. They have progressive policies that will "repair the Harper damage."

Raney said events like the debate are similar to job interviews. "You don't get the job if you don't show up for the job interview," she stressed, referring to Toubis's absence.

The Green Party is focused on helping to improve the quality of life, protecting farmland, supporting biodiversity and creating long-term sustainability. She's tired of partisan politics that's getting in the way of progress. "I have seen a danger in the way we do politics in Canada," she said.

She's an advocate for eliminating poverty - "we should not have a poverty issue."

Greg Locke, chair of CCKT, noted the candidates were given prepared questions before the meeting. The bulk were submitted by CCKT members and one was created by Grade 10 students at Villanova.

When asked about Canada's reputation on the world stage on environmental issues, all of the candidates said we need to do much more.

Rizzo noted in the last 10 years, Canada's environmental policies and governing acts have been devastated and fossil fuel subsidies are proving costly. The NDP, under Thomas Mulcair, will establish a national environmental policy and treat our environment as a public resource. They also want to strengthen environmental protection and put a price on carbon.

Raney said the Green Party has known what to do for a very long time and they have an evidence-based policy to address the issues. They would unleash an "army of contractors" to retrofit all buildings by 2040, to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by an estimated 30%. They, too, would implement a carbon tax and offer funding for developing nations to work on climate issues, since they lack the funding and resources to adequately address the issues and talk about them on the world stage.

The Liberals, Schulte said, believe a strong economy includes a healthy environment. The Liberals vow to create a Pan American panel within 90 days of being elected, to establish global targets. Canada also needs a national framework on the environment and must work with all provinces and territories. She would

like to see the teeth put back into the environmental assessment process and restore funding for environmental protection. The Liberals pledge millions for green technology and green infrastructure.

No one is better qualified to represent Canada at the upcoming United Nations Climate Change Conference in Paris, than Elizabeth May, Raney stressed. The event is slated for Nov. 30 to Dec. 11.

The King-Vaughan riding includes both rural King and urban Maple. The candidates were asked how they would approach this "juxtaposition" of communities.

Raney said both communities benefit from their proximity to large urban centres and also enjoy access to open spaces. In King, transit seems to be the issue.

Schulte said rural/urban differences need to be respected and she can draw on her experience as a Vaughan regional councillor. She also worked on early greenbelt legislation, as well as the ORMCP, so she has an understanding of rural issues.

Rizzo said she lived in both Maple and King City and she looks to the future generation. Their outlook, sadly, seems bleak because middle class families are falling further behind. The NDP plan to strengthen both the middle class and small business sector, by creating well paid jobs.

When asked about inter-provincial trade barriers and their impacts, Rizzo said Mulcair has a plan to bring the provinces together and open trade talks.

Raney pointed out that 70% of our economy is internal trade. Canada is a federation and Ottawa can't dictate to the provinces. She believes a strong federal government is needed that can work with the provinces and encourage one another to lessen these barriers.

"We have to work more co-operatively in our approach," she said.

Villanova students wanted to know how the candidates will create more job opportunities for future students and graduates.

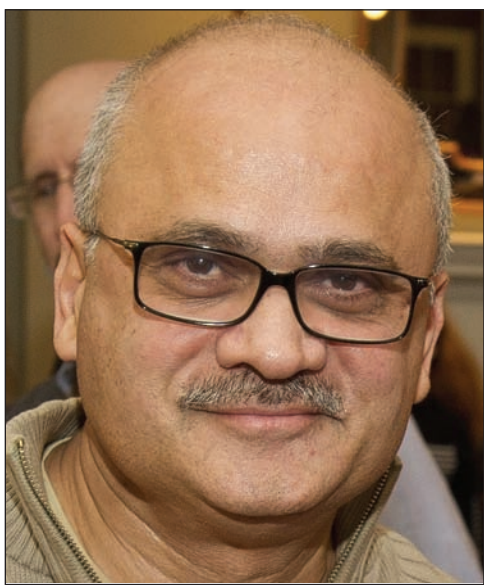

Schulte stressed the government doesn't create jobs directly, but the Liberals plan large investments in infrastructure, which creates a climate for job growth and economic confidence. The Liberals will improve access for youth to education and training, and grow our technology sectors. This will all lead to offshooting jobs.

The more money in the hands of the middle class (the engine of the economy) will see a domino effect. A federal youth employment strategy, coupled with changes to student grants, will put more "in the hopper" for students.

Rizzo said the NDP takes youth seriously. She said there aren't enough jobs to accommodate our highly skilled young people and her party plans to invest in small business, paid internships and implement a \$15 per hour federal minimum wage.

Green technology is part of our sustainable future, Raney remarked, noting they plan to slash student debt; eliminate tuition and boost youth employment.

One Maple resident wanted to know about green technology, noting Canada is way behind our European counterparts.

Raney said the plan is to develop our own technology here and focus on Canadian solutions.

There are currently more seniors than there are children in Canada and one King City woman wanted to know how the parties plan to look after the needs of our elderly.

Schulte admitted she's concerned about the financial well being of seniors. The Liberals plan to increase the Guaranteed Income Supplement, for starters.

Rizzo said the NDP have plans to increase CPP benefits, lower the retirement age to 65, boost the GIA and OAS and improve access to home care services.

We need a national seniors' strategy, and the Green Party has one, Raney pointed out. They hope to address financial inequality with their "Guaranteed Livable Income" strategy.

Regarding transit, the Greens have a detailed plan for solutions within the GTA.

Rizzo, as a transit rider, said co-operation with municipalities is key, since roughly 60% of public transit is owned by municipalities.

Schulte said the Liberals plan to spend \$20 billion over the next decade on public transportation. She's a strong supporter for all-way, two-way GO here in King and Vaughan.

One resident reminded the candidates that the newly elected government will have to deal with the sensitive issue of physician assisted suicide. While none of the candidates would offer their view on the matter, they agreed that consultation with the medical field and the public is key in making these difficult decisions.

Dr. Hans Martin, retired scientist with Environment Canada, noted dealing with climate change involves adaptation and we need to move forward on action plans, especially given the upcoming summit in Paris.

Setting targets involves working with the provinces, Schulte said.

The Green Party adopted green policies more than 15 years ago, so they're leaders in this area, Raney pointed out. May worked on the acid rain pact in the 1980s and was instrumental on working to ban CFCs.

Scotiabank teams up with historical society for opening

Modernity met history for the grand opening of the new Scotiabank at King's Ridge Marketplace in King City.

Kelly Matthews, the author of the new book "Eaton Hall: Pride of King Township," was on hand to provide 100 copies of her work, detailing the history of the palatial mansion once owned by the Eaton family.

She also did her research on the land that the new Scotiabank stands on at 1700 King Road, finding a little historical background of its own.

"We are currently standing on the

east half of Lot 6 in the 3rd Concession of King Township," said Matthews. "When I went through the records for this property, I found some exciting information about the early inhabitants of this land."

She found that in 1797, there were six original patentees in King Township, six people given the parcels of land found on the 86,000 acres of King. Edward Wright was given 200 acres, including the area that the new plaza stands on.

Four transactions later in 1822, the land was owned by a companion of Jesse Lloyd, now the namesake of Lloy-

dtown. He joined Lloyd in leading the Upper Canada Rebellion of 1837.

"This land that we now stand on today, where Scotiabank now calls its home, housed one of the first pioneers of the township, and a rebellion leader that helped lead the development of the country. And now we welcome Scotiabank, who has already demonstrated their interest and support of local history."

With that, Scotiabank presented a \$1,000 donation to the King Township

Historical Society.

"You'd be pretty hard-pressed to turn over a stone in King City and not find some sort of historical tidbit, or fact," said Matthews.

Matthews was pleased to announce that after three months on the market, book sales have already tipped just over a thousand.

"It's pretty remarkable for a small, niche, book, so I want to thank the community."

Hike in Happy Valley Oct. 17

Happy Valley Forest has a rich cultural and natural history. It's waiting to be explored.

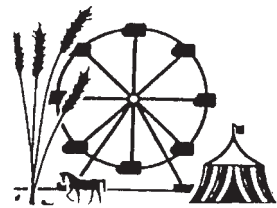
Guided and narrated walks, courtesy of Thom Unrau, conservation technician with the Nature Conservancy of Canada, are opening the forest to visitors and giving them a new perspective.

And what better place to connect with nature and our past, than an unspoiled tract, left behind on the Oak Ridges Moraine, after the last glaciers retreated some 12,000 years ago.

Happy Valley Forest is one of the largest remaining intact upland deciduous forests on the Moraine. This 1,560-acre area, much of which is donated by land-owners, supports more than 110 breeding bird species and is an outstanding example of mature sugar maple and beech upland forests. The wetlands and forest are critical to the survival of nationally significant species such as the Acadian flycatcher and cerulean warbler. The area also holds a cultural significance as it's connected to the Toronto Carrying Place trail, a historic portage and travel route.

The Oak Ridges Moraine Trail runs through the forest and several of NCC's properties also feature hiking trails.

Unrau will lead visitors of all ages in three more upcoming hikes. The next one is slated for Oct. 17. The walk takes place from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. You can sign up or register contact Thom-as.Unrau@natureconservancy.ca.

Monument helps mark St. Patrick's 100th anniversary

A lasting reminder of our roots now sits proudly on Church Street, in Schomberg.

St. Patrick's Roman Catholic Church in Schomberg is marking its 100th anniversary this year and the congregation gathered Sunday to unveil its new monument.

On hand were parishioners and members of the community who rolled up their sleeves and pitched in with the beautification efforts.

The surface slab stone was sourced from the French River area of Ontario. The glacier surface stone was selected for its unique colouring and design as it

blends with the artwork. The monument was installed on a concrete sleeve which will allow for ease of removal for plate fitting. This plate will be installed at a later date and will include the names of those that served on the Centennial Committee as well as those who made a contribution to the project.

The monument was unveiled by Lucy Stange and Joe Melo (co-chairs of the Centennial Committee) and blessed by Father Paul Hancko and Deacon Milan Popik.

The showpiece is a special granite sculpture, roughly six feet tall, courtesy of Joe Melo of Melo Landscaping and Allstone Quarry Products.

Melo wanted to incorporate a bit of the church's past, its Irish heritage, along with modern times, as a tribute to the 100th birthday. He also contributed the stones for the new walkway, which have a fresh, energetic look. The sculpture provides a nice focal point, and there's even a large rock placed just so

that can be used as a bench.

Barry McCague, of McCague Landscaping, handled the installation and walkway.

A veteran landscaper and stone craftsman, Melo has been involved with the Peace Garden in Toronto, Science North and the Portuguese Walk of Fame, to name a few. Melo has been involved in the church renovations and the handicapped ramp which he oversaw in 2011.

He said the community really came together and put their hearts into this project, through donations of money, materials and labour.

The parish's final celebration for 2015 will be a dinner planned for late October.

Its namesake, St. Patrick, was a bishop in Ireland and known as "the Apostle of Ireland." Saint Patrick's Day is observed on March 17, the date of his death.

Though established in 1876, the

Schomberg parish did not have a church building for almost 40 years. Instead, Mass was celebrated in the chapel/living room of the rectory. In 1915, the current church was finally built using bricks from the former Lloydtown Methodist church.

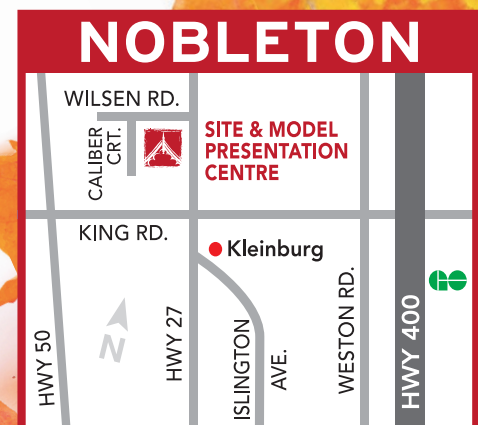

What is the purpose of this meeting?

The meeting is being held to outline the proposed urbanization, re-construction and servicing works for Church Street and the neighbouring roadways. The following provides an overview for the road reconstruction and servicing works:

- Remove the existing roadway asphalt, curbs, sidewalks, driveway aprons, culverts, storm sewers and boulevard topsoil;
- Install new storm sewers, ditches and culverts;
- Install new street lighting poles and underground wiring;
- Install new replacement watermain within Edwards Mill Lane;
- Import road base granular materials to widen the roadway platform;
- Install concrete curbs and sidewalks;
- Place new asphalt, and
- Complete driveway, boulevard and road restorations where required to match into the new road profile elevations.

What is the Construction Work Schedule?

The project is planned to commence in early spring of 2016. The servicing and road works, up to and including the base course asphalt placement, are expected to be completed in 2016.

How Will I Get To My Property?

Vehicle access property will be provided most times during the construction period from one direction; however, direct access to your driveway may be occasionally interrupted for a few minutes while equipment is maneuvering, trucks are dumping, etc. We ask for your patience in such instances. During periods when access is not available, please park in a safe alternative location. The contractor will provide prior notice for any imminent access restrictions to the residence. All affected driveways will be restored with gravel by the end of each day and completely restored when the road works are finished.

Pedestrian access to all homes will be maintained during construction. If you have any special needs, for instance if wheelchair access is required, please advise the contract administrator (contact information provided below). Access for emergency vehicles will be maintained at all times.

Will My Services Be Affected?

For properties connected to the Township water supply from Edwards Mill Lane there will be a brief period where your water service will be disrupted while the temporary and new water services are being installed and commissioned. Additionally, sections of the Church Street watermain system will be temporarily disrupted for the fire hydrant, relocation and the storm sewer servicing works. Township of King staff will give prior notice of such occurrences.

Telephone, Cable TV, Hydro and Gas services should not be affected by the construction, barring any unforeseen circumstances.

Mail delivery will not be interrupted, as pedestrian access to your home will be maintained throughout the construction period.

On the normal collection day, place all garbage / recyclable / yard waste materials at the front of your property as usual. The construction contractor will remove these items and take them to outside of the construction zone, for pickup by the garbage contractor. Your garbage cans and blue boxes will be returned to your property later that day. Please mark your address on your garbage and recyclable containers.

It is very important that you take your refuse and recyclable items to the front of your property by 7:00 a.m. otherwise these items may not be picked up.

King-Vaughan candidates respond to questions

The King Weekly Sentinel posed the same 3 questions to the candidates in King-Vaughan.

The questions are: 1) **What are the local riding issues and action plans?** 2) **What are the national issues and action plans?** 3) **Why should people vote for you?**

The following are their answers, in alphabetical order.



Ann Raney
Green Party

Canada, the world, is in a climate crisis. The climate is going to continue to change and we must be ready. To steer Canada away from the status quo and toward a future economy is imperative and will take some effort. Together, we can do it. It will take years to finish, but we have delayed starting for too long already and so it is now urgent that we begin. We must now open our eyes and minds and look to our collective futures and the future of our children.

For Canada, and for King-Vaughan, the work of adaptation to climate change is perhaps the largest business opportunity in human history. Other nations already have stronger economies for having begun the transition. Germany is a good example where Green fiscal policies were adopted over 15 years ago. Canada can catch up. We are a modern country with a highly skilled and diverse, innovative people. We have everything that we need to benefit from a fossil-fuel-free world, but we need to begin now.

Unfortunately, leaders in government and in industry have been short-sighted and self-serving. They have denied the inevitable and delayed needed action. Canada needs strong federal leadership which has a deep understanding of how to go about shifting us off of our reliance on fossil fuels and toward becoming an efficient, clean, inclusive country. I say inclusive because we must all work together and take care of each other. Together, united, we can accomplish this for ourselves and future generations. We must leave no one behind.

It begins with federal leadership, co-operation, and policies that are guided by science, evidence, and best practices. It ends with an efficient, diverse, sustainable economy. A transition that will only serve to improve the quality of life for all Canadians. Ours was the first fully-costed platform which reflects a deep and detailed vision of over 180 pages.

King-Vaughan will initially benefit from energy retrofit programs to homes and buildings which together with other municipal improvements and electrical grid and digital upgrades will help to create good local jobs. There will be fast and efficient public transit, reduction in student debt, affordable housing, pharmacare, support for small businesses, and funding for emerging technologies and manufacturing. Also, urban sprawl will come to a crawl and halt as farmland, biodiversity, and the natural environment are too valuable. They will be protected from unsustainable development.

Decades ago, the Green Party of Canada and our leader Elizabeth May accepted the clarion call to address root causes of climate change and to prepare Canada for a changing future, but also to help other nations and work through the United Nations to achieve consensus and global action. Over the years and after many consultations with Canada's best brains, from various fields and sectors, the Green Party developed its vision for a Canada that can prosper and take advantage of the changes that will come to Canada and the world.

Strengthening our federation and creating a body called the "Council of Canadian Governments" would be a Green priority for Canada. Chaired by the federal government with provin-

cial/territorial, local/municipal, Inuit, Metis, and First Nations governments at the table, it will meet regularly to work out the best ways to remove barriers within Canada and increase efficiencies and boost economy across the whole country. They will also work to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of how we provide our common social safety net with new health care approaches and national strategies for seniors, dementia, housing, transportation, and to eliminate poverty with the most cost-effective and proven successful, "Guaranteed Livable Income," for those who need it. Above all, with the provinces, the Greens would implement a robust Canadian Climate and Energy Strategy which would price carbon, implement a Canadian Fee and Dividend Plan (a carbon fee from the source-industry that would be evenly divided annually among all Canadians 18 and over; similar to B.C.'s), rapidly phase out coal-fired electricity, and transition to a prosperous, decarbonized economy.

The Greens have the most detailed plan on how to achieve goals of a virtual fossil-fuel free economy by 2050. Our greenhouse gas emissions would be reduced 80% below 1990 levels by then as well. Elizabeth May has the ability and the know-how to lead this. Her experience is more than working on environment treaties on behalf of Canada's government in the 1980s, but includes decades of attending UN Climate talks and working with world scientists, economists, and leaders. She also is a leader of a Green Party which shares founding principles with Green Parties around the world and which are taken very seriously in Europe.

If elected, I am ready to do my part for Canada's team. Immediately after Oct. 19, we would be at work with Ms. May and others to prepare Canada's submission for the post-Kyoto global UN Climate treaty at COP21 in Paris. Rough drafts of Canada's proposals are due mid-November. More than that, if elected, I would be your representative in Ottawa as only a Green MP can. The Green Party requires all of its candidates, and therefore MPs, put our constituents first, thereby respecting our democracy, the constitution, and best parliamentary practice and traditions. I will always be free to vote and to speak

up for the people in King-Vaughan.

The Green Party is not hyper-partisan and its representatives, except during elections, are not partisan. We believe in and practice respect for democracy and a co-operative parliament. We are walking the walk not just talking the talk.

Canada's democracy has taken a beating over decades of partisan politics and influence of large corporations. Partisan politics and large corporate influences have gotten in the way of Canada's progress on eliminating poverty, dealing with long-standing issues with our Indigenous peoples, international diplomacy, humanitarian aid, and yes the now-urgent need for climate action.

The best way to fix our democracy is to elect more Green MPs to parliament. Please hire me to work and speak on your behalf and for the future of King-Vaughan. It would be my honour and privilege to do so.

such as roads and public transit, which has not kept pace with development. There is also a severe shortage of affordable housing options and a lack of local jobs.

We also have a growing population of seniors who are very concerned about their income security and the ability to stay in their homes after a lifetime of hard work.

Effective solutions for these issues will require significant investment and cooperation between all levels of government.

We need a federal government that recognizes its leadership role in the Country, one that is focused on building a strong, diverse economy – not one focused on tax cuts at the expense of jobs and focused on a single sector of the market.

Our \$60-billion infrastructure investment increase sets the Liberals apart from the NDP and the Conservatives. NDP's Rizzo addresses seniors and youth

1) *What are the local riding issues and action plans?*

One major issue in the riding is how our government will ensure our seniors are given the chance to age with digni-

ty. Over the next 25 years the number of seniors in Canada will double, and poverty amongst seniors will only continue to rise. Under the Conservatives, leadership on growing health needs like long-term care have been ignored, and \$36 billion has been cut from health care while Canada's richest corpora-

tions have continued to benefit from tax breaks that the Liberals intend to keep. Canadians deserve better, and the time to act is now.

The NDP is the only party with a national seniors strategy, built on consultations with local communities like King-Vaughan. This strategy includes restoring the age of OAS/GIS to 65, boosting the Guaranteed Income Supplement by \$400 million to target those with the greatest need, and collaborating with the provinces to expand long-term and home care services.

Another major issue in King-Vaughan is youth unemployment and the lack of opportunities there are for young people. At twice the national average, the youth unemployment rate for the 16,000 people aged 18-29 in the riding is a stark reality, and cause for concern. Throughout this entire election period, young people and even their parents have been sharing with me their fears that the only thing they will receive after graduating is the burden of student debt.

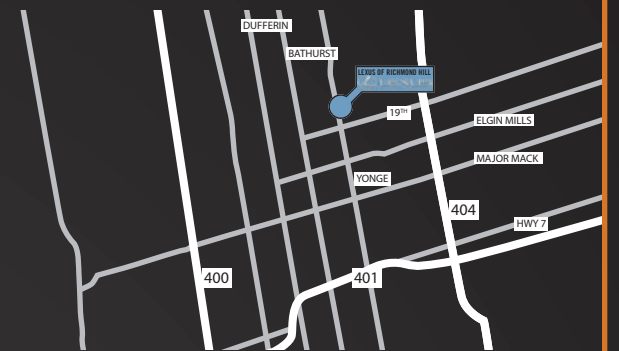

Cougars continue up-and-down season with split

The Schomberg Cougars are used to the middle of the pack in the Georgian Mid-Ontario Junior Hockey League, and this season has not proved any different.

Forced to face the Midland Flyers for the second time in as many games on Thursday night, the Cougars were in tough against the league's most successful turnaround team. But it was Schomberg who badly outplayed the Flyers in the opening frame, with Linden Sturrock scoring his first goal in a Cougars uniform having just joined the roster last week.

Midland countered by putting one past goaltender Martin Lauzon near the end of the period, just seconds after Schomberg sniper JP Crescenzi was kicked from the game for a hard hit from behind.

Lauzon stood tall to stop 22 more shots over the remaining 40 minutes, matched by his Midland counterpart who was having a similarly stellar game.

But it was Midland who took two points out of the match when Steven Pickard found the back of the net just over three minutes into overtime.

It was in Orillia on Saturday that the Cougars were able to halt their short, two-game losing skid, playing a Terriers team fresh off their first win of the season.

Crescenzi scored twice in a back-and-forth effort throughout the first two periods, the two teams deadlocked at three apiece in the third.

Kiefer McIntosh gave the Cougars their first lead of the game with just under 15 minutes remaining, a lead they would hold thanks to a strong back-stopping effort by Vince Michelizzi. He stopped 17 Orillia chances in the final frame, while team leading scorer Joseph Mete buried an empty-netter with seconds remaining to seal a 5-3 victory for Schomberg.

One month into play, the Cougars have both outmatched and been outmatched by their opponents, sitting at a comfortable 4-4-1 record through their first nine games.

What has been impressive, however, is their ability to score goals. Their offensive production in last year's Cinderella playoff run has continued into this season, notching 30 goals so far, good for second in the league.

Despite a strong team showing overall, this has come about on the backs of the team's seasoned veterans.

Mete, who had a breakout season with the Cougars last year, has stepped up to a point a game production so far in 2015-16.

His often linemate Ryley Egerton has bounced back from an underperforming 2014-15 to similar production this year, his third with the club.

They see Midland for the third time in four games this Thursday, hosting the Flyers at the Trisan Centre. The team heads to Huntsville to do battle with the Otters the following night.

Nobleton pool to get a new building

A new structure will be built at the Nobleton outdoor pool.

King council approved giving Yukon Construction the contract for the new pool building.

Staff identified the need for renovations to the building and pool for a couple of years, but costs have been an issue.

Staff moved forward with the pool structure, with funding coming from the Enabling Accessibility Fund Grant.

The work will include demolition and removal of the existing building and the construction of a 750-square-foot, accessible structure.

Council previously approved \$353,000 in funding through the 2015 capital budget and staff obtained the \$50,000 accessibility grant.

This project will be funded through development charges, reserves and tax-based capital funding.

Staff, according to Chris Fasciano, director of parks, recreation and culture, want to explore energy efficiency options. They include upgraded lighting, wall mounted toilets, high-efficiency pool heaters, etc.

Councillor Linda Pabst wondered if there's a way to incorporate solar heating on the site and Fasciano said they will look into it.

Councillor David Boyd wanted the Township to recognize the efforts of the Nobleton Lions Club in creating the site in the first place. He hopes they can erect a plaque in their honour.

Perfect pebble equals perfect performance

Curling ice or the playing field as such, can make or break a game wide open.

Fast, slow, heavy, frosty, slippery, whatever the characteristics of the day, the 3-centimeter of ice to which a curling athlete plays with can be a challenge, even on the best of days. That 3 cm. of ice converted to 1 3/16 of an inch can dictate and produce some of the biggest challenges for a Skip. The one inch of ice packs a powerful punch in learning to read and anticipate the curl down his sheet and for some; the biggest headache.

The surface must be laser level and as flat as possible. Perfect pebble is needed to ensure each game the longevity required to outlast 64 rocks thrown per game. Curling ice differs from hockey ice, figure skating ice and speed skating ice on thickness and temperature alone (without getting too technical as the list could go on). So for those who say it's "just ice," well it is NOT. Clean and quick is usually the preferred quality, but players who adjust and interpret the conditions of their ice will more than likely be the team who comes out on top.

Monday night men's league got off to a roaring start as they opened their league game opener this past week. The men's league, which has increased their calibre of curling, pays homage to some of the clubs' top men curlers. The depth

of talent and standard quality of curling appears to grow with each year the King Curling Club is in operation. The game of inches certainly lives up to its name as the results were proven once again how close this class of excellence is measuring up to be.

Team Frans versus Team Davis was featured and anticipated to be a tight, end-to-end game. Team Frans, skipped by John Frans, and his squad of Jody LaPlante, Allen Frans and Jack Vincent, took to the hack with a new found energy as they faced former league champions Karl Davis, Steve Broad, Gary Boose and Joe Burnato.

As both teams picked up on the ice reading fairly early, the precise shot making made its debut in the early ends and continued throughout the 8-end session. For a lot of games it only takes one shot to turn things around and make the difference. Skip Karl Davis, who's known for doing just that, executed a great shot late in the game to claim the lead and eventually held the one point lead to obtain victory.

Skip John Frans commented afterwards that the game was excellent and didn't feel bad for losing the back and forth well-played match. Both teams performed and triumphed with precise guard making, accurate angle take outs and soft weight draws to the button. Everything a great game can consist of.

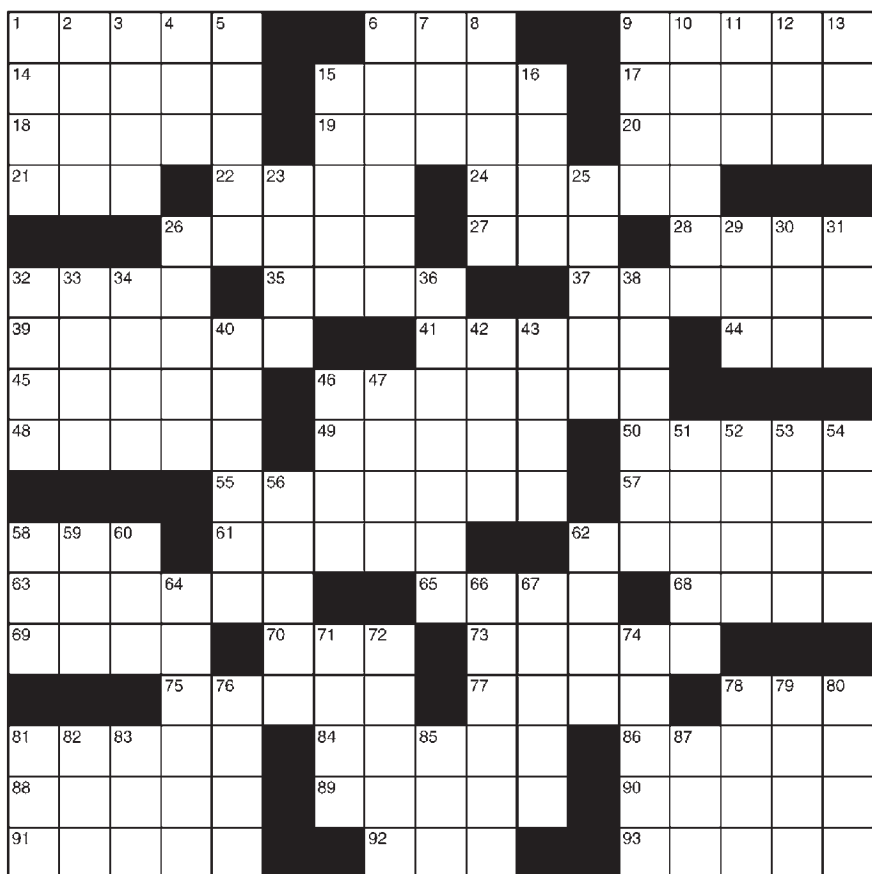

David's most recent recording, Bristles, features David alongside bassist Andrew Downing and trumpeter Jim Lewis. The CD was given 4 Stars in the internationally-acclaimed Downbeat Magazine. The project was also nominated for a 2015 Juno Award.

Sunday's worship was about Thanksgiving and the altar was beautifully decorated with samples of our bountiful harvest. Rev. Evelyn McLachlan used the Ten Commandments as her text. She asked what we think of when we hear the phrase "The Ten Commandments?" Does Charlton Heston, hair blowing in the wind, holding two stone tablets on a mountain top come to mind? Do we think of only the "Thou shalt not?"

Rev. Evelyn suggested that it should be more like the book "All I Really Needed to Know I Learned in Kindergarten" by Robert Fulghum. Every parent should give a copy to their kids, "... because at that point your child is about to cross a kind of Jordan River into a Promised Land called college or university or freedom from the parents! We know that this new land offers amazing opportunities for tremendous growth. And there's also all kinds of dangers

that may end up trapping and destroying them."

These commandments are really statements of love to guide us into a fuller and richer life: "... don't hit people; put things back where you found them; clean up your own mess; don't take things that aren't yours; wash your hands before you eat ..."

We should also look upon the Ten Commandments as statements of love for us from God. "Instead of thinking them only as the do's and don'ts or the thou shalt and the thou shalt nots, think of them as a way to freedom and fullness of life."

Anglican Parish By John Arnott

The cross was a cruel reminder to the earliest Christian of Roman executions particularly that of Jesus so was certainly not used as a symbol by them of their faith. Now XP (pre Bill Gates) are the first 2 letters in ancient Greek word chreston meaning good and was often used by Greek scribes in pre-Christian times as a mark in the margin of manuscripts to indicate an important or worthwhile passage much as we use the Latin NB (nota bona).

XP also happens to be the first 2 letters in XPISTOE the Greek word for Christ. And early Christians used these letters as a symbol of their religion.

In Roman (Latin) script XP becomes chi rho (key row) which Roman Christians called the monogram - P with an elongated stem on which the X was super imposed- they adopted as a pre-cross Christian symbol.

Constantine the Great (272-337AD) the Roman Emperor (306-337 AD) facing battle with powerful enemy forces com-

manded by his rival Maxentius is said to have had a dream in which he was told to put 'a heavenly divine symbol' on the shields of his soldiers. He chose a symbol closely resembling the chi rho. Shortly afterwards he soundly defeated his enemies at the Battle of Milvian Bridge an important crossing point on the Tiber River in the north of Rome. Encouraged by his Christian moth-

er, the future saint Helena, he lifted the ban on Christianity throughout the Roman Empire and gave it legal standing equal with that of the old Roman religion with its Olympian gods headed by Jupiter/Zeus.

Just before his death Cone became a Christian. The St. Alban Anglican community in Nobleton notes that it must be admitted all this is good!

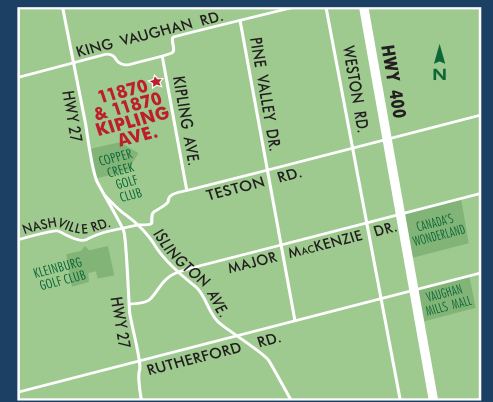
