APPEAL PROCEDURE

The application concerns two parcels of land located on the south side of 17th Sideroad, east of 7th Concession. The subject lands are identified as 4235 & 4355 17th Sideroad and measure 22.7 hectares (56.1 acres) and 27.0 hectares (66.7 acres), respectively. The properties are mostly covered by dense deciduous forest forming part of the Happy Valley Forest Reserve. The property at 4235 17th Sideroad also supports two detached residential dwellings and three accessory structures.


The intent of the zoning amendment application is to facilitate a conveyance of 10.52 hectares (26.0 acres) of land from 4235 17th Sideroad to the property at 4355 17th Sideroad for natural heritage conservation purposes. The amendment seeks to sterilize the proposed severed lands for building purposes by restricting the range of permitted uses to those which are consistent with conservation purposes. In addition, 0.88 hectares (2.2 acres) are proposed to be conveyed from 4355 17th Sideroad to the property at 4235 17th Sideroad for continued residential purposes. The amendment further proposes to sterilize the remainder of the lands located at 4355 17th Sideroad by restricting the range of permitted uses to those which are consistent with conservation purposes.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed zoning by-law amendment is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of Council of the Township of King to the Ontario Municipal Board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed zoning by-law amendment is adopted, and the By-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed zoning by-law amendment. **HOW TO STAY INFORMED**

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Ontario Municipal Board. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Municipal Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Bv-law number 2016-81 amends the permissions of the Institutional (I) zone to include office uses for public and non-profit purposes as permitted uses. In addition, the by-law amends the parking provisions of the by-law regarding parking stall size and parking requirements. Furthermore, the by-law re-zones the environmentally sensitive areas and related buffers outside of the existing development area from Institutional (I) to Environmental Protection (EP) in accordance Environmental policies of the King City Community Plan.

Comments received and considered in preparation of the final Zoning By-law included the need to define the limits of the applicable zones in terms that the public can understand and that would be consistent with the policies of the King City Community Plan. A detailed zoning schedule was prepared based on survey information and the environmental buffers and the existing development area were used to detail the zone boundaries

King conducting safety blitz in school zones

Slow down, keep your head up and obey the rules of the road.

These three simple actions are something King Township is asking

motorists to keep in mind as students head back to school. And to back up that message, King



will be sending bylaw enforcement officers out on a safety blitz in school zones starting this week.

"Motorists need to adjust to an increase in traffic as people return to work

from vacation and students return to school after the summer break," said King Township Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "Be mindful of school busses and children walking or biking to school. Trying to shave a couple of minutes off your trip by speeding or passing busses with lights flashing is not worth the risk." Speeding, distracted and impaired driving are three entirely preventable

behaviours, said Pellegrini. "Slow down, put your phone down and concentrate on driving," Pellegrini

Here are some safety tips:

- Leave early to avoid rushing and disobeying the rules of the road. Stop when a bus has its arm extended and lights flashing. Do not proceed until the lights are turned off.
- Slow down in school zones and keep an eye out for children.
- Do not park in bus loading/unloading zones, even if you're only going to be a couple of minutes dropping off a child.
- Avoid three-point turns and U-turns in school zones.
- Obey crossing guards and signage.
- Don't park in prohibited areas posted by sign. Don't park in fire routes and designated disabled parking spaces.
- Don't stop in a "no stopping" area posted by sign.

"Everyone behind the wheel shares in the responsibility of making sure we all get to and from our destinations safely," said Pellegrini.





Zoning change first step in sale of current municipal office property

A change in zoning is the first step in preparing the current municipal office site for sale.

With the construction of the new municipal centre under way, King will sell its current home - the strip plaza on King Road and Banner Lane. To help facilitate the sale, and provide options in keeping with the King City Community Plan, council gave staff the go-ahead to look into rezoning the property.

The 2.5-acre property with some 125 metres of frontage on King Road, is currently a mixed use commercial building.

The application will rezone the lands from Shopping Centre Commercial (C4) to a new "Core Area (King City) CA-KC" zone, to permit a variety of uses, including multi-unit residential. It also provides site-specific provisions for parking, building requirements, waste storage, setbacks, etc.

While the fire hall is part of the parcel, it's not included in these zoning

This property was originally a commercial plaza in the 1970s and the Township bought it in 1999, converting several units to the current municipal offices. The fire hall was built in 2001.

The Township became aware of a problem in 2012 of fuel oil (hydrocarbon) contamination on the lands. Measures were taken to reveal the extent of the problem. Remediation and monitoring was also carried out. The problem still persists, and the Ministry of the Environment has advised that the best way to fully remediate the site is through demolition and a total rebuild.

Planning director Stephen Kitchen did stress the contamination is confined to a portion of the property, and it has not leached beyond the site.

The Provincial Policy Statement and local plans do support intensification in this area, and it has been identified by

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the Township as a site for residential intensification.

The property is deemed Core Area in the King City Community Plan, which recognizes such places as a focal point for commercial, residential and commu-

The Core Area does provide guidelines for new development, which includes a three-storey height limit and maximum floor area. It also stresses the aesthetics should be in keeping with the character of the community.

"Maintaining and strengthening of the Core Area as a focal point in the community is a key objective of the King City Community Plan," according to the planning report. "The Plan identifies objectives to foster the economic health of existing and new businesses; provide choice in terms of secure, adequate and affording housing types; and encourages development at a pedestrian scale and orientation."

The current bylaw establishes minimum acceptable standards. Specific details of the site (design elements, parking, etc.) will come later on, during a subsequent site plan application pro-

Resident Bruce Craig praised the potential of the site, noting it's an ideal location to reflect the principles of the community plan. The changes for the site will "provide an opportunity for alternative residential forms."

Anne Raney echoed Craig's sentiments, noting she hopes to see housing options appear.

A Banner Lane resident said he's worried that parking will be expanded at the rear of the property. Mayor Steve Pellegrini pointed out this is only the very preliminary stage in the property's evolution and those details will come

Councillor Debbie Schaefer also shares the hope for more residential options, perhaps suited to seniors.

It's no secret the cost of living in this wonderful, free society continues to grow exponentially.

Reckless' cap-and-trade scheme

"The Wynne Liberals are doubling down on their cap-and-trade scheme after signing an agreement with Mexico that could see Ontario businesses buying Mexican carbon credits in the future," said Ontario PC Environment and Cap-and-Trade Critic Lisa Thompson, following the Joint Climate Change Declaration that was signed in Guadalajara.

This, she said, comes after Quebec and California fell well short in meeting their revenue expectations from their cap-and-trade schemes in last week's auction. Now it appears that the Liberals are scrambling to add new partners.

As it stands, the Wynne Liberal's cap-and-trade scheme will already see an estimated \$300 million flow from Ontario to California by 2020, and that number is expected to rise to \$3 billion by 2030.

Now the Wynne Liberals have entered into an agreement with Mexico. The Ontario PC Party believes that working with businesses to address climate change issues, through innovation and conservation, rather than by forcing them to send money to Mexico, is the best way forward.

Report reveals developers are exploiting a loophole in legislation

In Ontario, current Growth Plan legislation requires that developers "plan to achieve" density and intensification targets in order to increase the mix of housing types and direct growth away from prime farmland and sensitive natural areas. However, a new report by former Waterloo Region Director of Community Planning Kevin Eby shows that many developers prioritize low density sprawl.

While they may claim to "plan to achieve" density, many never actually build mixed use, walkable affordable neighbourhoods intended by the plan.

The report shows that the predominant approach to Land Needs Assessments – the system developers use to determine the types of houses to build – undermines Ontario's Growth Plan requirements, disregards public transit objectives, and is poised to create a housing supply crisis in the Greater Golden Horseshoe.

Released by the Friends of the Greenbelt Foundation, the report, A Review of the Residential Land Needs Assessment Process Associated with Implementation of the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe, found that

In Ontario, current Growth Plan leglation requires that developers "plan used by developers and municipalities achieve" density and intensification results in:

- Failure of new sprawl developments to create higher density of population needed for investment in public transit.
- Prime farmland paved over for low density development by cities and towns
- Cities not redeveloping and infilling lands to the degree needed to save tax dollars on building new roads, sewers and water lines.
- Cities forced to build new roads, sewers and water lines to low density developments with no money to pay for them long-term.
- Housing needed by an aging baby boomer population not being built.

"The requirements of Ontario's Growth Plan are being gamed," says Environmental Defence's Erin Shapero. "Instead of following Growth Plan targets for increased density, some developers are exploiting a loophole in language and not fulfilling requirements. Developers are gobbling up more farmland than needed when Growth Plan policies indicate that cities and towns should be planned more efficiently, with more compact mixed-use developments including diverse, affordable housing options served by better public transit, resulting in walkable, transit-friendly healthy neighbourhoods."

"Some developers are refusing to build the type of housing that an aging population will require, setting up municipalities and Ontarians for a housing crisis as boomers age and look to move out of their large suburban houses," Shapero added. "This manipulation of the system must stop. If Ontario is serious about stopping costly sprawl in southern Ontario, the revised Growth Plan must close this loophole and freeze municipal urban boundary expansions for the next 10 years, until the next review of the Growth Plan."







Black plastic boxes near tracks will test vibrations


Metrolinx will be conducting tests on the GO train line in King Township starting this week.



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




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Collins helps create competitors at Spray Lake


One of the center's partners, Stephen Collins, head waterski coach, has worked hard to realize this vision for the sport of waterskiing. In just four years, Spray Lake has managed to cultivate an unusual and exciting mix and range of water-skiers, from beginner to world class. Many come to the lake asking for "Stevie" to take them for a waterski.

Stephen's focus is on development regardless of ability or athletic goal. He provides each individual he coaches with strategies tailored to their needs and overall growth. For Stephen, this is not just a sport, but a way of life because through skiing, he believes there are valuable life lessons to learn and master, especially with his young students. Stephen always encourages a balance between being respectful and having fun, as well as, between sports and life.

Stephen's passion for the sport is personal. He was a member of the Canadian national team and at one point was ranked in the top 15 in the world in jumping and as an overall skier, participating in all three skiing events of slalom, trick and jump. He has insider knowledge of the experiences of skiers from beginner to professional as he has worn all the hats. Stephen has seen the sport from many different lenses from being a two-time Canadian Overall Men's champion, to an athlete trying to come back to compete after a devastating neck injury. It is his comprehensive and well-rounded approach, as well as his unparalleled passion about the sport that makes Collins so effective.

Never satisfied with the status quo,

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or successes his athletes are realizing, Stephen works diligently to network and confer with the pros and veterans of the sport to fine tune his craft and to constantly gain new perspective. The most important thing to Stephen is to breathe new air into water skiing and this air comes in the form of developing new competitive skiers from the grass roots of the sport.

Since Spray Lake's inception, Stephen has worked with skier Thomas Daigle. Like his coach before him, Thomas is a three-event overall skier. Thomas is from Quebec and travels to King Township each summer to ski at Spray Lake. Thomas has spent four years with Stephen learning new tricks, jumping farther, and learning new techniques to advance his slalom skiing. He has recently been named to the Canadian national junior team and for the first time skied in a pro event in Edmonton with top podium finishes in each event.

At the recently completed Canadian waterski championships held in Winnipeg, Thomas competed in his own age division and was also invited to ski in the Open Men's event; a significant accomplishment for an athlete who is

In recent years, Spray Lake has become home to another great talent and respected coach. Janice Stevens, 21. is a three-event skier from Morrisburg, Ontario who has chosen to work at Spray for the past two summers, to be able to be coached by Stephen. This year in the Canadian Waterski Nationals Janice won four gold medals in the women's division.

The newest additions to the unofficial water ski team at Spray Lake are Ty, 9, and Leo Bigourdan, 10. These two young brothers from King Township have learned to run the slalom course and have been inspired to compete at a provincial and now national level. Leo has been competing for two years and Ty for one and both have medaled in different tournaments. Recently, Leo and Ty have added trick skiing to their resume with plans to start jumping next season; making this duo the next generation of overall three-event heights they have set out to achieve.

It is worthwhile noting that the skiers described above are a few of the many celebrated skiers at Spray Lake. Ben Wheeler, aged 10 from Toronto, finished first in the Under 10 boys division and Ilan Klein, 13 and also from Toronto, finished second in the Under 14 division at the 2016 Canadian championships.

In fact, Spray Lake is home to 14 competitive skiers who tirelessly work on their sport with Collins. Each have competed in tournaments throughout the summer, most recently the Canadian Waterski Nationals where they collectively won a total of 26 medals.

These athletes are a testament to the vision Stephen Collins has nurtured in his quest to help put waterskiing on the map. As important as his success as a high performance coach, Stephen has helped dozens of children and adults get up on water skis for the first time, overcoming their fears and returning to the dock requesting another ride. He has challenged his students to push their limits, to recognize their potential, to grow, and ultimately to allow each of them to reach whatever

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
