Villanova turf project breaks ground

Work is under way for the new artificial turf field at King's Villanova College and community partners are pitching in. King Mayor Steve Pellegrini presented a motion at Monday night's council meeting, to take \$200,000 from the proceeds of the mayor's annual golf tournament, and direct it to this project. King United Soccer has pledged \$300,000.

The original field has served the athletic programs and the community for the past 15 years. Romeo DeGasperis and ConDrain have once again come to generously support the build of the artificial turf and re-dedication of the field.

The field will be completed in two parts: all site preparation and sub-drainage work is currently under way. Completion of the grade beam and foundation wall for a future seasonal "bubble – air support structure" will be completed in spring 2017. The artificial turf field will be a regulation size for football, soccer and field hockey and will be fully lit.

This project allows for the extension of both the fall and spring athletic seasons for both the school and the local soccer

Once a site plan review has been completed and approved, the hope is to have a seasonal bubble in place in the near future. Re-dedication ceremony to take place in the spring.

Villanova College would like to thank the DeGasperis family, ConDrain, King United Soccer Club (KUSC) and the Township of King for its support of the project.

It's a unique partnership with a unique history.

In 2000, Romeo DeGasperis of ConDrain donated all of the site work for the establishment of the first phase of the physical plant of Villanova College. It was at this time that Romeo and ConDrain asked that the athletic field be named in memory of Frankie DeGasperis, Romeo's late brother. The field was dedicated in September of 2000 at a ceremony where members of the DeGasperis family were present. This included Frankie DeGasperis – the then 10-year-old son of Frankie DeGasperis, in whose name the field was being dedicated. Frankie DeGasperis (junior) is now project manager of the artificial field turf



"The pen is mightier than the sword."

So wrote author Edward Bulwer-Lytton in 1839 in the play, "Richelieu, or The Conspiracy." His intent was to show that the power of words to change opinions, to create opinions, to incite social revolution and evolution was far greater than the power of military force.

Winston Churchill knew this when he gave his powerful speeches to the war-weary citizens of England. Rachel Carson knew this when she wrote Silent Spring and an entire planet's environmental consciousness was reawakened. Politicians like Donald Trump know this in the most perverted sense where boldly repeated lies and incendiary tweets can elevate a narcissistic megalomaniac to the status of presidential candidate.

And reporters for newspapers great and small know this. The ability of "the word" to educate or confuse, to bring light or to cloud an issue, to elevate or crush a reputation is a power not to be underestimated.

We are fortunate in King to have an editor of our local paper who respects the ethics of good reporting and knows the difference between editorial commentary and the W5 of a news report. In an editorial, the writer can be colourful, outrageous, opinionated, and totally partisan. In a news report, the who, what, when, where, why and how must be reported with totally unbiased precision.

An editor who lets a news reporter slip into editorial commentary is like the bystander watching a bully. A good newspaper simply does not let this happen, which is why major chains immediately publish apologies when they have printed a news report that crosses the line.

Here's an example from the most insidious of wordsmithing occupations, the legal profession. Pretend we are defending a driver whose vehicle struck another car and we have a witness in front of us. Depending on who we are representing, we ask the witness: "And how fast was the car travelling when it dented the other vehicle?" or "how fast was the car travelling when it smashed the other vehicle?"

Our witness can change their calculation of the speed of the vehicle by as much as $50~\rm km/$ -h depending upon the words used – "dented" might get a $40~\rm km$ -h and "smashed" might get an $90~\rm km$ -h estimation from our "eyewitness." And the charges and the settlement will go accordingly. Lawyers know this and so do reporters.

A reporter in a nearby municipality recently wrote that one party to an issue "flooded" and "inundated" the regional council with their reports, while the other party was "succinct" and "brief." The one creates the impression of a destructive deluge of biblical proportions, and the other implies business-like demeanor. This kind of bias in reporting can influence a reader's opinion.

That is why the Canadian Press has the following Code of Principles and Practices:

- "1. Investigate fully before transmitting any story or identifying any individual in a story where there is the slightest reason for doubt. When in doubt cut it out.
- "2. Cite competent authorities and sources as the origin of any information open to question. Have proof available for publication in the event of a denial.
- "3. Be impartial when handling any news affecting parties or matters in controversy. Give fair representation to all sides at issue.
- "4. Stick to the facts without editorial opinion or comment. Reporters' opinions are not wanted; their observations are. So are accurate backgrounding and authoritative interpretation essential to the reader's understanding of complicated issues.
- "5. Admit errors promptly, frankly. Public distrust of the media is fed by inaccuracy, carelessness, indifference to public sentiment, automatic cynicism about those in public life, perceived bias or unfairness, and other sins suggesting arrogance.
- "6. Our integrity can help overcome negative public attitudes towards the media through scrupulous care for the facts, and unwavering dedication to fairness. We must not be quick to dismiss criticism and complaints, a trait journalists refuse to accept in others.



"7. The power of news stories to injure can reach both the ordinary citizen and the corporate giant Our integrity and sensitivity demand that we respond empathetically and quickly when an error has been made. It doesn't matter if the complaint has come from a timid citizen acting alone or a powerful figures' battery of lawyers.

"8. Every story shown to be erroneous and involving a corrective must be drawn to the attention of supervisory staff.

"9. In our reports, parties in controversy, whether in politics or law or otherwise, receive fair consideration. Statements issued by conflicting interests merit equal prominence, whether combined in a single story or used at separate times.

"10. Part of our responsibility as a news agency is to ensure we don't do anything that demeans the craft or weakens our credibility. We must observe stringent ethical practices, and be seen to be doing so. We should not accept anything that might compromise our integrity or credibility."

If we, as intelligent readers, use these principles as a guideline, we will instantly be able to separate the good from the bad and the ugly. This column permits editorial commentary, but my editor insists that commentary be based on legitimate research and investigation, still honouring the Canadian Press Code of Principles and Practices.

As a member of the Canadian Association of Journalists, I am bound by that code. Never let me forget it.

The Ontario Provincial Police stopped the 11-year-old boy after leading officers on a chase on Highway 400 near King Road on the weekend. According to OPP Sgt. Kerry Schmidt, police got a call late Saturday night about a vehicle that was "all over the road" on Highway 400. Officers located the vehicle, but it took off, accelerating to more than 120 km/h before more officers managed to stop it. They were shocked to find the 11-year-old behind the wheel. The boy said he was playing the video game "Grand Theft Auto" and wanted to drive a real car. "Here we have an influence of a video game making kids try things without their parents' knowledge or consent," Schmidt said, adding it was "an absolute tragedy waiting to happen."

Schomberg's Foodland was one of several businesses honoured by King Township in their annual "spotlight on local businesses."





Other winners in last week's matchups were Welch, Pringle, and Broadhurst.


Ladies win gold in Newmarket







Christians did not start building specific buildings where they could gather and worship until the early 3rd century and then mainly in the eastern more tolerant part of the Roman Empire which we know today as the strongly Muslim Middle East.

Once Constantine, the first Christian Roman emperor, granted Christianity equal footing with the old Olympic Roman religion, Christians in the western

part of the empire (Europe) felt secure enough to have places of worship outside their homes, catacombs or derelict buildings where they had previously met in secret. With this new freedom they often used pre-Christian holy sites such as abandoned or ruined temples adapting them to Christian services.

The oldest known of these places is the mausoleum (a building containing a tomb) of the Emperor Diocletian on the grounds of his now ruined palace in Spalatum Dalmatia (modern Split, Croatia). This large mausoleum was constructed of tuff a soft volcanic rock and favourite building material in ancient times, local limestone, white marble, and brick also of local manufacture.

Of course additions now surround this ancient building and together they form the Cathedral of St. Dujam (Domnius) but the mausoleum remains the major part of the church.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that ironically both St. Dujam and St. Alban were martyred during the Emperor Diocletian's bloody persecution of Christians in the early 3rd century AD – the last and longest of these mass murders in the Roman history.
