King benefits from government funds

By Mark Pavilons

The second phase of the Nobleton sewer project has received a shot in the arm from the federal and provincial governments.

Politicians gathered Monday at the Nobleton arena for the announcement. The federal government is kicking in \$248,470 and the province is pitching in \$124,235 through the Clean Water and Wastewater Fund (CWWF).

The \$373,000 will help offset the cost of the large-scale project, set to begin in 2018. King Township's share of this phase is roughly \$1.2 million.

King Mayor Steve Pellegrini called it "another spectacular day in King," stressing this added funding for this very important work will bring down the cost of hookups to local homeowners. The boost to phase 2, contract1 is a "huge deal."

The mayor said the Township is progressing through phase 2 and is "shovel ready." The process will begin this

fall and work will continue through 2018. The announcement was "perfect timing."

King-Vaughan MP Deb Schulte said this is part of the federal government's commitment to deliver needed infrastructure projects across the country. They're working with provincial and municipal partners to "plan and deliver" these projects, thereby creating growth, jobs and inclusive communities.

The feds have pledged \$180 billion over the next 13

"It's working," Schulte said. "All levels of government are making a difference."

"I know how important this is to the community," she noted, adding this was one of the first requests she received when becoming MP. "It's nice to be able to deliver on the funding."

- Clean up stagnant water found in bird baths. flower pots, swimming pool covers, clogged gutters and eaves troughs
- Ensure the window screens on your home are tight-fitting and in good repair
- Wear protective clothing, including socks, long-sleeved shirts and jackets



Advanced Metering Infrastructure program

Contractors are making the rounds of King City and Nobleton, finishing installation of a new feature on water meters.

This Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) is being implemented to enable the township to better manage and monitor metered water consumption. It will also help King proactively troubleshoot metering problems instead of waiting for the quarterly billing submissions.

For example, before AMI installation, an underground leak in a pipe might not be discovered until a scheduled meter reading shows a huge spike in consumption. Under the AMI system, a dramatic increase in water consumption would be flagged almost immediately.

Installations are on the outside of buildings. The contractor or township staff may have to arrange for entry to some

Dog Tales helps dogs find new home

Several abused dogs, used in alleged dog fighting activities, have been given a new lease on life, thanks to the efforts of King's Dog Tales and the Ontario SPCA.

Dog Tales and the SPCA worked together to create an option for the dogs seized in a criminal investigation of an alleged dog fighting operation in Cha-

In January 2016, an application was placed before the provincial court seeking permission to euthanize 21 dogs who had been seized from an alleged dog fighting operation in Tilbury. Providing the specialized care required to help severely abused dogs overcome their past requires significant resources, resources that can be hard to come by when operating within a public shelter system.

Dog Tales Rescue and Sanctuary, a privately-owned animal rescue operating out of King, recognized this, and immediately took action, filing an intervenor application before the court in hopes of saving the dogs and transporting them to Florida to take part in an enrichment and socialization program lead by world-renowned canine behaviour modification specialist, Aimee Sadler, founder of Dogs Playing For Life.

"When we heard the story of these dogs and all that they had endured, it was important to us to ensure that they be given a chance to experience love, kindness, and life as it should be," said Robert Scheinberg, co-founder of Dog Tales.

When the intervenor application was denied by the court, Dog Tales then mounted a large-scale public awareness campaign.

"The #SaveThe21 campaign was born out of necessity. We were desperate to help the dogs, but were running out of options. The purpose of our campaign was to demonstrate just how many people around the world cared, in hopes that it would inspire a different outcome," said Danielle Eden, co-founder of Dog Tales. "We were completely overwhelmed by just how viral the campaign became."

Tens of thousands of animal lovers around the world joined in the effort by

sharing photos of themselves and their dogs across social media with the campaign hashtag #SaveThe21. At the same time, more than 30,000 letters were written to the Ontario SPCA and to the Ontario Provincial Government, requesting that the euthanasia application be withdrawn. A number of animal-loving celebrities added their voices to the campaign, including Paris Hilton, Sir Richard Branson, Enrique Inglesias, Adrian Grenier, Natalie Imbruglia and Maggie Q.

Two weeks into the campaign, Dog Tales received the news that so many had been waiting for – both sides had agreed to transfer the dogs to Florida pending third-party behavioural assessments.

Dog Tales then arranged for canine behaviour specialist Jim Crosby to travel to Canada in the month of May for the purpose of re-assessing the dogs. Of the 21 dogs subject to the original euthanasia application, two have tragically passed away. Of the remaining 19 dogs, 18 were recommended for transfer to Florida for enrichment. Sadly, for a dog named Tommy, a second euthanasia recommendation was made, citing serious human-focused reactivity. This comes as a direct result of the terrible abuse that Tommy suffered prior to his rescue, and it is devastating that he will lose his life as a result. The remaining 18 dogs will begin the next part of their journey in memory of the three who were lost.

On July 20, 21 months after the dogs were originally rescued -- the outcome was made official in the form of a court order from Justice of the Peace S. Hoffman. Dog Tales will cover all costs associated with the future care of the dogs, the enrichment program, and trans-

"The dogs are getting an extraordinary opportunity due to the resources that Dog Tales is providing. We have been pleased to work in partnership with them on this outcome and hope to work with them on other initiatives. Our role in this case has always been to provide the balance between the welfare of these dogs, the safety of other animals and public safety. We need to remember that dog fighting is a criminal act," said Deputy Chief Jennifer Bluhm, Ontario SPCA.

"The Ontario SPCA rescued the dogs from the nightmare that they had been living each day. Now, Dog Tales will provide the dogs with all that they need to move forward and start a new chapter of their lives," said Robert Scheinberg. "We are so grateful for each and every individual who never lost hope, and who gave these dogs a voice after they had been voiceless for so long. If only these dogs, once forced to fight, knew just how many people have been fighting for them. We are overjoyed."

The Criminal Case is still proceeding. Additionally, the charges laid under the Dog Owners' Liability Act are still before the court with a pending court date of Aug. 24.

Robert Scheinberg and Danielle Eden have launched Dog Tales, following a gala, star-studded celebration Oct. 19 in 2014 at their beautiful property north of Snowball.

Dog Tales is home to Horse Haven, which offers horses a happy place to spend their final years, along with attention and medical care. For more, visit www.dogtales.ca.

Lecce says residents deserve better

The following letter, to the board members of the Ontario Energy Board, was submitted to the King Weekly Sentinel.

The cost of living is rising, and families and seniors are struggling to pay their hydro rates that have tripled since the Ontario Liberal Party took office in 2003. For context, this 300% increase under the Wynne Liberals has resulted in an average family paying over \$1,000 more per year.





3. In a clean skillet over medium heat, add a flour tortilla. Top with Monterey Jack, cheddar, cooked chicken mixture, avocado and green onions. Place another tortilla on top and cook, flipping once, until golden on both sides, about 3 minutes per side. Repeat with remaining ingredients. 4. Slice into wedges and serve warm with sour cream.

Members of Ontario Greenbelt Alliance (OGA) met at Pine Farm (King City) in late June to celebrate successes and to prepare for the next phase of work to ensure that farmland and water sources in and beyond the Greenbelt are protected.

In addition, it was an opportunity to acknowledge the substantial contributions of Former Councillor Jane Underhill by giving her an "OGA Green Local Champion Award." In addition to her efforts over 20 plus years to protect the aquifers in the Oak Ridges Moraine several attendees acknowledged how Jane had inspired them to enter politics and/or to become an environmental activist.

The OGA and its individual members were very active participants in the lengthy review of the Greenbelt Plans that include the Oak Ridges Moraine, Niagara Escarpment and Protected Countryside as well as the Growth Plan. That effort was well rewarded as minimum hectares were removed from the Greenbelt's protected area and there were some additions to the Greenbelt; the latter included the inclusion of 21 urban river valleys and 4 coastal wetland areas across the Greater Golden Horseshoe. Very importantly, changes were made across all four Plans to enhance the ability of farmers to be successful.

The new Growth Plan clearly places priority on stopping sprawl; there is minimal opportunity for towns and villages in the Greenbelt to expand their

settlement boundaries; intensification targets have increased from 40-60% over time to 2041. There are new targets for urban centres within proximity to high order transit, and for the first time the urban development in the growth plan area must ensure that intensification happens first with greenfield development only going ahead afterwards. The interdependence of the 3 plans was made very clear: to protect farmland and water sources development must occur only where there are services including transit. Sprawl must stop. This I know is music to Jane Underhill's ears.

Over the next several months OGA will continue working to represent the views of Ontarians that the Greenbelt must expand to better protect at risk water sources and at risk prime farmland across the GGH region. The Alliance and will continue to advocate that nature and agriculture be protected and enhanced for our shared continued prosperity.

King households

King's population has increased by 23.2% over the past five years, according to the latest figures from the 2016 Census.

King's population hit 24,512 in 2016, up from the 19,899 in 2011. The population was split evenly between males (12,280) and females (12,230).

The majority (66.5%) of the residents are between 15 and 64 and the average age is 40.4. Seniors make up one of the largest age groups, with 3,760 King residents 65 and over. King had an impressive 425 residents 85 and over with women in the majority - 245, compared to 185 men. Surprisingly, King had 20 people between 95 and 99 years old and five were over 100.

The municipality is still rather sparse, with only 73.6 people per square kilometre. There were 8,736 private dwellings in King, the majority being single detached houses (7,080). King averages 3 people per household.



York Regional Police clamp down on impaired driving

Impaired drivers continue to plague York Regional Police. They've stepped up efforts to get impaired drivers off the roads, and while charges continue to be laid, the numbers reveal the prevalence of this senseless crime.

On Friday, June 30, York Regional Police launched a summer impaired-driving prevention campaign Not One More, with the goal of preventing another impaired driving related tragedy like the devastating collision that claimed the lives of the Neville-Lake children and their grandfather.

As a part of this campaign York Regional Police have been posting and handing out drawings that were done by the close friends of Daniel, Milly and Harrison Neville-Lake that depict the pain and loss suffered by the children as a result of impaired driving.

York Regional Police removed 31 impaired drivers from our roadways and charged 87 distracted drivers in a seven-day period, from July 17-24.

Twenty-six male drivers and five female drivers were charged with impaired-related driving offences between Monday, July 17, and Monday, July 24. Twenty-three drivers were charged for being impaired by alcohol, four drivers were charged with being impaired by drugs and four drivers were charged with failing to provide a breath sample. Fifteen of those drivers were stopped by officers conducting general patrol or at RIDE spot checks, five drivers were arrested after being involved in collisions and 11 impaired drivers were stopped as a result of calls from concerned citizens.

On Thursday July 20, at approximately 6:50 p.m., officers responded to a suspicious vehicle call in a parking lot in the area of Wellington Street West and Dufferin Avenue in King. When officers arrived they located a truck that was parked taking up two spaces. The vehicle was running and a man was sitting in the drivers seat who was passed out. The driver, a 54-year-old man from Mississauga, blew more-than three times the legal limit and was charged with impaired care and control.

Police want to thank the members of the community for helping us stop and arrest impaired drivers by calling 9-1-1 through the Safe Roads ... Your Call program. Police consider these incidents a life-threatening crime in progress and will continue to respond to these calls.

If you see dangerous driving or behaviors on the road that could jeopardize the safety of motorists and pedestrians, you are encouraged to contact police immediately.





"Investing in water and wastewater treatment infrastructure is essential to maintaining a healthy environment and providing access to clean, reliable drinking water. The Government of Canada is working with provinces, territories and municipalities across the country to support important projects like those in King Township, which ensure that Canadian communities are healthy and sustainable now and for years to come," Schulte added.

"The continuation of constructing municipal sanitary sewer systems in the established village core of Nobleton is vital to protecting the health of water sources today and for decades ahead. Federal and provincial funding made available through the Clean Water Wastewater Fund reinforces the importance of protecting the local environment, while assisting residents of smaller municipalities access municipal sanitary sewer services that would otherwise be cost prohibitive to build," added Pellegrini.

Thanks to this investment, residents of King Township will benefit from the construction of a sanitary sewer collection system and concurrent works (roads and watermain) serving 63 single family dwellings in the west end of the village core area.

Phase 2 sanitary sewer and concurrent works in Nobleton will be broken into segments with the initial contract areas being north of King Road in the south-west corner of the village (Nobleview/Cedarwood area), affecting more than 60 homes. The cost for each residence to hook up in this first contract area is currently being calculated with a report expected to come to council at the Aug. 28 meeting.

Nobleton councillor David Boyd said the work is important in order to pro-

tect and preserve source drinking water and the environment as a whole.

"I've spoken to several residents and they're pleased to connect to a modern, safe sewage disposal and treatment system," he said. "The funding that was announced today is great news for those residents who will be hooking up to the new system."

Phase 1 of constructing sanitary sewers in the Nobleton was completed in late 2014.

Dr. Helena Jaczek, Oak Ridges-Markham MPP and Minister of Community and Social Services, said her involvement in sewer projects in King goes back 27 years. As former medical officer of health for York, Jaczek is very familiar with the proper disposal of sewage and the importance of safe infrastructure. She said she was glad to see this project move forward, and was happy to be part of this collaborative process.

The Province is tacking priority water projects over the next two years. The \$124,000 given to King is part of a "phenomenal number" of projects across York Region.

She, too, said she was impressed by the due diligence and level of work put in by the municipalities in preparing their priority lists. The minister pointed out this will be the largest injection of funds the Province has ever made, over the next 12-13 years.

"Building and maintaining high-quality water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure is an essential part of building livable communities. This announcement demonstrates the Province's commitment to partnering with municipalities in order to deliver the public infrastructure Ontarians need. The Nobleton Phase 2 Sewer project will contribute to enhanced quality of life for the community for years to come," Jaczek said.

Affordable housing lacking across York

The skyrocketing house prices are making home ownership out of reach for average people in York, and across the GTA. Affordable housing has become a necessity, one that's sadly lacking.

The strong real estate market has put added pressure on affordable housing, and rental units, to the point where waiting lists for housing are at record highs. King councillors heard the facts from York Region staff recently.

Rick Farrell, general manager of Housing Services, pointed out resale prices rose a whopping 138% between 2006 and 2016, to a record \$1.16 million average for a single detached home in York.

The waiting list for "affordable" housing has exploded to 14,000. The picture is bleak, especially when you look at rental statistics. Only 101 private sector rental units have been built in the past five years. Rental vacancy stands at only 1.5%.

The local picture is even worse. In King, there are only 124 affordable units, and all are for seniors. There is no non-senior affordable housing in King.

"You can't just build your way ot it," Farrell stressed.

York planner Sarah Cameron said roughly 60% of York households had an income of \$115,000 or more in 2016. But their maximum affordability was a house in the \$460,000 range. She noted that only 14% of new homes are affordable to 40% of

She added that options are very limited in the northern municipalities in York. The most affordable units are those in high-density buildings. But affordability studies didn't take things like condo fees into consideration. Overall, "affordable" refers to units with two bedrooms or less.

A working group in York has been assembled to advocate all levels of government and find solutions to the housing shortage through partnerships. The group is making progress, and hopes to have a framework for an action plan in early 2018



King U14 Royals advance in CSL Cup tournament

The U14 King City Royals boys' soccer team had a very busy July as they reached the half-way mark of their outdoor campaign in the Central Soccer League (CSL), as well as winning their opening round match of the CSL Cup Tournament.

Cup Action

The CSL Cup opened on July 29 un-

der clear blue skies and sunny conditions as the Royals played at Country Day School against Whitby. The opening half was evenly played as both clubs had few opportunities as the majority of the half was played in the midfield. The game was scoreless at the break.

Five minutes into the second half, striker Marco LaVerde took a shot from at least 25 yards out and picked the top right hand corner with a bullet

shot to give the Royals a 1-0 lead. Unfortunately that lead was short-lived as Whitby scored five minutes later off a turnover when a Whitby player took a though ball pass and split the King City defence to score the tying goal.

Both teams had many good chances to score throughout the second half but just could not find the net. Whitby had the best chance with under five minutes to go when they hit a crossbar from just outside the 18 yard box. The score was tied 1-1 after regulation.

CSL Cup games go straight to penalty kicks if tied after regulation and King City chose to kick first. Mario Fratto scored first, followed by the Whitby player who went bar down to make it 1-1 after the first shooters. Miguel Parra was second and scored as goalkeeper Zishan Tejpar saved the second Whitby shooter to make it 2-1 after two rounds. Both teams scored in the next two rounds (Mason Dalakis and Jacob Snelgrove were the King City scorers) to make it 4-3 heading into the fifth round. Marco LaVerde was the final penalty taker for King City and he calmly scored to give King City the 1-1 (5-3 pen) victory. The Royals next CSL Cup game will be the quarter finals when they play East York at a date still to be determined.

League Play

In league play, the Royals played that same Whitby team on the road on July 26 as they defeated the opposition 7-1 in dominating fashion. After missing many opportunities early on and trailing 1-0 ten minutes in, the Royals dominated play thereafter taking a 3-1 lead at the half and finishing the game off by scoring seven unanswered goals in the win. Gianpaolo Luiciani (with his second of the year), Giovanni Scuilli (with his first), Zack Donsky, with a pair (five on the year), and Mario Fratto, who scored his first three goals of the year via a hat-trick, were the goal scorers in that game.

On July 19, the Royals snapped a two game losing streak by winning a nail biter 1-0 against Glen Shields. Zishan Tejpar picked up the clean sheet as Mason Dalakis scored the game's lone goal, his fourth of the campaign.

King City also played on July 5 against Toronto's Sporting CP and lost 4-1 as Kahyl Jadavji scored the team's only goal, his second of the year.

King City are now in 10th place out of 18 teams in the CSL with a 5-4-0 record (15 points) as they continue to fight to stay in the top 11 of the league standings to avoid relegation. Their next league game is on Aug. 9 when they travel away to face North Toronto, who are currently in fourth place.

Horticulture By John Arnott

This morning walking through my, gone wild with neglect, garden I glimpsed a patch of vivid purple and on closer examination discovered it is a show of tall or purple top verbena I'd bought and planted a couple of months ago. Sold as verbena Latin for lash (stems of a distant cousin were once used to make whips) bonariensis, Latin for Buenos Aires, in local garden centres it is native to much of South America especially southern Brazil, Uruguay, Paraguay, and northern Argentina where it thrives in damp sunny fields. Although a perennial in its native habitat, it won't winter in our area so is seen as annual here. It readily self seeds and I've had a few seedlings survive our spring frosts However in some warmer areas such as southern coastal British Columbia and the southern states it's considered invasive.

This B.A. vervain (from the Celtic words fer meaning go away and faen meaning stone refers to its use as a medicinal to treat gallstones) can grow up to 6 ft./ 2 m high but what I've grown grows under 18 in/45 cm. The main stems of each plant and their small top side stems hold flat clusters of tiny intense purple 5 petalled funnel like florets. Green stiff to the point of being prickly serrated (toothed) leaves grow up the slender but tough,rough stems getting much smaller and sparser as they grow higher making purple top ideal for growing near the front of the garden and under planting it with low growing annuals including petunias, impatiens, French marigolds and of course popular annual garden verbena

hybrida that comes in a variety of colours thus giving the garden an unusual but pleasing layered look.

Plant verbena bonariensis in well draining dampish soil in full sun, give it some TLC until it's established and it will be an attractive easy care addition to the garden – both bees and butterflies love it.

We have a beautiful native wild verbena growing in damp to wet open areas here in King, New Tecumseth and neighbouring townships and in fact throughout much of eastern North America. It grows 2 to 3 ft./60 to 1m high with pliable green serrated leaves. Each slender, sturdy square stem is topped with a candelabra like cluster of tiny rich royal purple florets.

And this year it's just coming into bloom now. I find this verbena hastata (Latin for arrowhead or spearhead referring to the shape its leaves and flower heads) is difficult to transplant! I've had the best luck moving it in the fall to a place on my property that duplicates as much as possible the wild location where I found it growing – the fringe of the marsh at the south end of the conservation bush near my home. And I only moved it because it was in danger of being destroyed by heavy logging machinery being used in the bush.

Anglican Parish By John Arnott

Who's this dude Jesus, Christians are always yappin' about? This much yapped about biblical dude seems to have two natures – one spiritual, one human. And we catch only glimpses of his spiritual nature in the Christian writings of the Bible called the New Testament,

His birth and its surrounding events have a spiritual aura, but then the birth of any creature has a like aura, However, the fact Christians believe his to be a virgin birth makes it something quite spiritual, But irreverents, cynics

and disbelievers are quick to point out his wasn't the only virgin birth ever recorded. Ancient Babylonian, Egyptian and Greek mythologies all tell of other similar births. Closer to Jesus's own time, Olympias, mother of Alexander the Great, claimed he was conceived by the power of the great god Zeus (Jupiter), thus all this virgin birth stuff is merely myth.

The next spiritual glimpse of Jesus is at his baptism by his cousin John the Baptist when Matthew 3: 16-17 tells the sky opened up and he saw the Holy Spirit descend like a dove to him while a heavenly voice was heard saying "This is my son, the Beloved; my favour rests on him," suggesting that only Jesus saw and heard these things.

Mark backs this theory up but Luke suggests all present heard and saw while John quotes John the Baptist as saying "I saw the Spirit coming down on him from heaven like a dove ..." In the original Greek translation of the story, only Jesus is aware of the sky, the dove and the voice. The disbelievers see the whole baptismal scene is pure fiction saying it should be treated as just literary fiction.

Now, when Jesus went into the Judean desert to get to know himself and learn about what purpose God had in mind for him, more of his spiritual nature is revealed. The Bible tells he fasted for a month or so, during which time he was tempted by Evil. Only a spiritual being could survive without food and water for such a time. But again irreverents cynics and disbelievers say after a few days with out sustenance of some kind he'd begin to experience mirages common to travellers weakened by hunger and thirst in desert conditions.

Was this whole event a series of hallucinations as they claim? And they ask how did this experience come to light as no one was there with Jesus to verify the biblical account.

As well there's no mention in the New Testament, in its present form, of Jesus telling of this experience. Did he, around the campfire one night when there wasn't much talk, off handedly say "Oh by the way fellas I want to tell you about something that happened to me before I hooked up with you guys ..." And if so was this recollection never recorded or was it edited out of the Bible by early Christian writers, or simply lost in the several translations this holy book has undergone?

All of the miracles and healings associated with Jesus are tinged with the spiritual. But again the naysayers suggest that Jesus, a well educated man, would no doubt have had some medical knowledge and certainly a good working knowledge of first aid. While we aren't privy to the details and circumstances surrounding these often briefly mentioned healings, most are credited to simply a touch. But there are 3 instances where he used his spit, and in one instance mud from dirt mixed with this spit, to effect cures.

In his day saliva was highly regard-

ed as a healing agent especially in the treatment of blindness by the Jewish rabbinical community of which Jesus was a member. A couple of biblical researchers state that cannabis oil was widely used back then for treating glaucoma and epilepsy. Jesus would have known this and most likely used it too. Of course "weed" and spit didn't figure in all the miracles attributed to Jesus, but doubters choose to ignore this and the spiritual involved.

Perhaps Jesus's spiritual nature is most clearly seen in the description of the transfiguration when with 3 followers, Peter, James and John, he went to pray on the slope of an unnamed Judean mountain (now known as the Mount of the Transfiguration), and where amazingly, his face and robes began to glow with radiant light as he was joined by Moses and the prophet Elijah, with a voice from above calling him Son.

One Christian author states there is a remote possibility that this event never happened and it's the happy faces of the group in prayer blown out of all proportion that was turned into a fantastic piece of religious propaganda by subsequent authors.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that Christians must face these irreverents, cynics and disbelievers, recognize where they're coming from and prove them wrong by getting much more involved and in touch with our Christianity and the Christ dude at its heart.






