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King hopes to create stormwater management plan

King Township will begin the process of creating a comprehensive stormwater management plan for the municipality.

As well, councillors agreed to add a flood study component, and will look into the feasibility of a stormwater

The Township is responsible for an extensive network of stormwater infrastructure in King City, Nobleton, Schomberg, Laskay, Snowball, Lloydtown, Ansnorveldt and Pottageville. The Township also manages an extensive network of culverts in the rural areas.

While King initially included stormwater within its Water and Wastewater Servicing Mater Plan, staff determined a more comprehensive study was needed. Recent storms and flooding in Schomberg and Nobleton, as well as impacts of commercial development in King City, all point to the need for an up to date stormwater management plan.

"... stormwater infrastructure is being challenged by events of significant rainwater duration and/or intensity. As a result, municipalities are identifying deficiencies within the support infrastructure and determining there are potentially significant budget impacts to respond to these identified deficiencies," staff noted.

Maintaining such infrastructure is costly and some municipalities - nearby Aurora, Vaughan and Newmarket - have turned to a stormwater utility fee.

This is meant to ensure a stable base of funding to support development, maintenance and replacement of the pipes. Staff will be examining the feasibility of this in King.

Staff concluded a comprehensive stormwater management plan is "imperative to the long-term evaluation, operation and maintenance of the

King actor part of powerful mini-series

Good stories make for great TV drama.

Canada's organized crime is the subject of the City original series Bad Blood. The first screening of the mini-series takes place Sept. 1 at Fan Expo Canada in Toronto.

Starring Anthony LaPaglia (Without a Trace), Kim Coates (Sons of Anarchy), Paul Sorvino (Goodfellas), and King's own Enrico Colantoni (Flashpoint), Bad Blood is inspired by the Canadian true-crime story of reputed mobster Vito Rizzuto. Colantoni portrays Bruno Bonsignori.

"Bad Blood is a story of family, loyalty, deceit, power, greed and ultimately revenge," the official press release states. "Montreal Mafia boss Vito Rizzuto is a criminal anomaly – the only man to bring peace among the disparate wings of the Montreal crime world who would serve as a de facto CEO while ensuring a lucrative payday for all. When Rizzuto is suddenly arrested and extradited to Colorado's Supermax Prison for the 1981 murders of three Bonanno crime family members, the powerful empire he built begins to crumble.


"Rizzuto watches helplessly as his family and friends are killed one by one. Upon his release from prison in October 2012, a revenge tale unfolds, leading to the brutal murders of his closest companions, and ultimately, to the death of Rizzuto himself."

The series is based on the book Business or Blood: Mafia Boss Vito Rizzuto's Last War, by authors Antonio Nicaso and Peter Edwards.

It's a six-part series, produced in partnership with New Metric Media and Sphère Média Plus in association with DHX Media and Skyvision.

The premier of Bad Blood is on Thursday, Sept. 21 at 8 p.m. ET/PT; and Ghosted on Sunday, Oct. 1 at 8:30 p.m. ET/PT, on City.

Much of the series was filmed in Chelmsford, Ontario, northwest of Sudbury.

The applications for Zoning By-law Amendment and Draft Plan of Subdivision propose to allow the creation of 22 new residential lots fronting onto a new public street. The new lots are comprised of a range of lot sizes for single detached dwellings. The subject lands consist of block 208 within plan of subdivision 65M-4448. At the time of the review and design of plan of subdivision 65M-4448, the subject lands were identified as a potential future school site if determined to be necessary by the school board.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King in respect of the proposed plan of subdivision and/or zoning by-law before the approval authority gives or refuses to give approval to the draft plan of subdivision and/ or the zoning by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board unless, in the opinion of the Board, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

- Only 1 single fire at a time
- This fire cannot be any larger than 2 metres in height and 2 metres in diameter (6 feet in diameter and 6 feet in height)
- An approved means of extinguishment must be available at all times

Township of King RECREATIONAL FIRE GUIDLINES By-law 2015-109 requires the following:

- A means to extinguish the fire must be in close proximity

King urges motorists to mind school zones

Slow down, keep your head up and obey the rules of the road.

These three simple actions are something King Township is asking motorists to keep in mind since students will soon be heading back to school.

"Motorists need to adjust to an increase in traffic as people return to work from vacation and students return to school after the summer break," said King Township Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "Be mindful of school busses and children walking or biking to school. Trying to shave a couple of minutes off your trip by speeding or passing busses with lights flashing is not worth the risk."

Speeding, distracted and impaired driving are three entirely preventable behaviours, said Pellegrini.

"Slow down, put your phone down and concentrate on driving," Pellegrini said.

Here are some safety tips:

- Leave early to avoid rushing and disobeying the rules of the road.
- Stop when a bus has its arm extended and lights flashing. Do not proceed until the lights are turned off.
- Slow down in school zones and keep an eye out for
- Do not park in bus loading/unloading zones, even if you're only going to be a couple of minutes dropping off a child.
- Avoid three-point turns and U-turns in school zones.
 - Obey crossing guards and signage.

Taxes are largest household expense

Despite high housing costs across the country, the average Canadian family spent more on taxes in 2016 than housing, food and clothing combined, finds a new study released today by the Fraser Institute, an independent, non-partisan Canadian public policy think-tank.

"Many Canadians may think housing is their biggest household expense, but in fact the average Canadian family spent more on taxes last year than on life's basic necessities - including housing," said Charles Lammam, director of fiscal studies at the Fraser Institute and co-author of the Canadian Consumer Tax Index, which tracks the total tax bill of the average Canadian family from 1961 to 2016.

Last year, the average Canadian family earned \$83,105 and paid \$35,283 in total taxes compared to \$31,069 on housing (including rent and mortgage payments), food and clothing combined.

In fact, the average Canadian family paid nearly twice as much of their income in taxes (42.5 per cent) as they did for housing (22.1 per cent). The basic necessities of life, which include food, clothing and housing, amounted to just 37.4 per cent of income – still less than the percentage of income going to tax-

This represents a marked shift since 1961, when the average Canadian family spent much less on taxes (33.5 per cent) than on food, clothing and housing (56.5 per cent).


The total tax bill reflects both visible and hidden taxes that families pay to the federal, provincial and local governments including income, payroll, sales, property, carbon, health, fuel and alcohol taxes and more.

Since 1961, the average Canadian family's total tax bill has increased by a staggering 2,006 per cent, dwarfing increases in annual housing costs (1,527 per cent), clothing (677 per cent), and food (639 per cent).

Even after accounting for inflation, the tax bill has still increased 157.6 per cent over this period.

"Taxes help fund important public services that Canadians rely on, but the issue is the amount of taxes governments take compared to what Canadians get in return," Lammam said.

"With more than 42 per cent of their income going to taxes, Canadians might ask whether they're getting good value for their tax dollars."


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Icelandic fundraiser was an amazing challenge

Trekking the Icelandic lava fields is not for the faint of heart. For one King City woman, it was a challenging yet successful fundraiser for a worthy cause.

King's Alba DiPlacido was among roughly 90 people from across Canada who trekked across the Iceland's landscape, raising money and awareness for Shelter Foundation.

"It has been one of the most incredibly challenging and meaningful experiences in my life, one that truly aligned the hearts and souls of all participants to helping and supporting this worthy cause," she said.

Prior to going on the this trek, the participants trained to log many kilometres. Alba said she could easily do 20 kilometres in four hours in King. "I believe we were all quite naive in not knowing how challenging the terrain in Iceland would be," she said.

The first day was a 14-kilometre hike that introduced them to the beauty of Iceland.



"To state that the scenery was breathtaking is an understatement."

The group navigated some steep mountain paths to the crest of a crater overlooking a beautiful glacial lake. This trek allowed the guides to assess individual abilities and capabilities.

The second day was "gruelling in the terrain, geothermal hot pools, snow fields, constant inclines and declines and fiercely blowing winds." A steep, 1,300-metre ascent of took 4 and 1/2 hours to climb.

When they arrived at their campsites, the tents went up and meals were prepared by Helga, the amazing chef who elevated camp food and introduced us to some Icelandic fish and lamb din-

DiPlacido said every day was an adventure in itself.

"Each day as we set out we would not know what we would encounter in terms of trekking terrain and weather. We were incredibly fortunate to have had five straight days of great weather."

She said it was a "privilege" to be immersed in a landscape that's so powerful and expansive, with deep crevasses and gorges, powerful waterfalls in various lengths and widths, glacial rivers, mountains, craters, snow fields, relatively fresh volcanic ash, "which the winds did their best to blow on our faces."

They group went through the active volcano Katla and their rule was always to support one another along this 100-kilometre hike on the Landmannalaugher Trail.

"We are all incredibly proud of our achievements," she said. "To tackle the challenge that was presented to us, to work together as a community with a shared purpose. This we talked about every evening in our dinner tent as we discussed our reason to undertake the trek - to raise awareness and funds to help victims of domestic violence so they can find their strength to seek support and help."

"I am proud to report I was able to complete all five days of the Trek, made possible only by the genuine love and support from all the amazing members of group two. They nourished my soul, expanded my heart, and by sheer example, pushed me beyond my limits."

The group, according to DiPlacida, raised more than \$650,000, which will go directly to shelters in local commu- 1988 and has raised over \$24 million, nities across Canada. It is the largest single fundraising initiative in the history of the 20-year Royal LePage Shelter Foundation which has raised over \$22 million so far for this worthy cause.

The foundation directs funds to shelters (80% raised stays in the community). The funds are used for domestic violence prevention and teen healthy relationship programs.



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Caledon firefighter speaks out for double-hatters at AMO

Caledon's "double-hatters" are continuing with their efforts to continue serving in their community, and they have lots of support.

And that includes from the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO).

Caledon District Chief Mandy Gould drew two standing ovations last week when she addressed more than 1,000 delegates at the AMO conference in Ottawa. She was one of five double-hatters in Caledon found to be in violation the rules of the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF) Local 1068 (Brampton). The ruling came down in June, and is being appealed.

Double-hatters, also known as two-hatters, are full-time professional firefighters who also volunteer their off-duty time answering calls in their

home communities.

"I was not really sure what to expect, but it was quite the experience, that's for sure," Gould said.

AMO has been supporting double-hatters in their struggle for some time, and Gould said she was glad for the opportunity to raise awareness of the situation, since many municipalities make use of these professionals as part of their fire service.

Gould's presentation drew very positive reviews.

"Mandy Gould was a star in her performance," Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson declared. "She did an excellent job," he added. "She nailed it."

"There wasn't a dry eye in the house; in the whole conference," AMO President Lynn Dollin said. "She was the only one who drew a standing ovation."

Dollin is the deputy mayor of the Town of Innisfil, and she said they've ble-hatters and their union.

AMO is continuing with its efforts to keep the fight going.

"Hopefully, at some point, common

sense will prevail," she remarked. There have been some improvements over the last couple of years.

The government passed Bill 109, the Employment and Labour Statute Law Amendment Act, which addresses the double-hatter situation, among other

AMO made a presentation to the Standing Committee on Justice Policy in November 2015.

"Full-time firefighters have valuable skills to offer local communities in Ontario," the presentation stated.

"It is important to remember that full-time firefighters love their communities and want to contribute," it added. "Volunteer firefighting is one central

had some issues there involving dou- way in which they do so. AMO appreciates the courageous position of volunteer firefighters who believe in the principle of freedom to volunteer in their communities."

Dollin said the bill provides some security. It prevents these people from losing their jobs for volunteering, but it doesn't stop the unions from fining them, or pressuring them to stop.

"So it's not enough," she observed. "It's something, but it's not enough."

She added AMO is looking to see legislation that will prevent unions from taking such action. She pointed out Ontario and Newfoundland are the only province that don't have such legisla-

"It's just not fair, and you shouldn't be picking on people just for being good citizens and volunteering in their own community," she said.

A misconception is that these are bad-quality borrowers. "Bad credit? No Credit? No Problem," are advertisements sometimes seen. This is far from the truth.

In 2016, 2.7 million Canadians were self-employed (Statistics Canada). These people are generally in the sales and services industry, such as Realtors and Contractors. There were also 1.2 million small businesses. These borrowers do not meet the bank's lending criteria, and are therefore turned down. Their tax return may show a significantly lower figure than what they actually take home as income.

Charity cycle to remember firefighter

At the age of 26, Sara Rosen donated one of her kidneys to her brother, and became an advocate of organ donation ever since.



The 38-year-old, whose passion for giving back to the community was well known, tragically passed away last May after falling off a trail while mountain biking at the Kelso Conservation Area in Milton.

"Sara was passionate about many causes," said Adam Simson, a long-time King resident and friend who completed his Captain's course along with Sara in the spring of 2016. "Sara was the kind of person that gave back to communities in any way she could."

Rosen's accident happened just shortly after completing the course, while working out of Station 413 on Islington

Avenue in Etobicoke.

Her desire to help others was not lost in her death, as her parents Ann and Allen established the Sara Rosen Tribute Fund to raise money and awareness for organ donation and mental health, two causes Sara was adamant about in her life.

"Sara was inspirational and the type of person that believed in standing up against anything that she believed was unjust," said Simson. "In fact, she was about to attend law school in the fall of 2015 and take after her father, who is a lawyer."

This year Sara's friends, family, and fellow firefighters have taken one step further in putting together the first annual "Sara's Ride," a mountain biking ride/ race designed to raise funds and awareness while bringing people together to remember Sara's life.

"This is an opportunity for families to get outside, ride, socialize and raise funds and awareness for PTSD, mental health, positive spaces and organ donation," said Simson.

To be held on Sept. 23 at the Albion Hills Conservation Area in Caledon, Sara's Ride will feature both a two and four hour event, with each lap consisting of 12 kilometres, as well as a "youth lap" for those 17 and under.

Families of riders are welcome to come out and enjoy the site with music and food.

The benefitting organizations are the kidney transplant program at Toronto General Hospital, the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health in Toronto, and the Positive Spaces program in Toronto, which works against discrimination in the workplace of which Sara was an ambassador for.

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

Anglican Parish By John Arnott

If as Shakespeare wrote "For Apparel oft proclaims the man" and Mark Twain said "Clothes make the man." then what kind of clothes were worn some 2,000 years ago by Yeshua (Joshua), that radical back country Galilean preacher known better by his Latin name Jesus?

From the many translations the New Testament, the Christian writings in the Bible, has undergone we read that baby Yeshua was wrapped in swaddling clothes. Swaddling is bands of cloth wrapped around a newborn to replicate the mother's womb and help him/her adjust to the outside world. Swaddling restricts an infant's movements, quiets the child and helps her/him sleep better. It is thought to also reduce the risk of SIDS (sudden infant death syndrome).

Swaddling is still practised in many cultures today. Swaddling clothes are available in both Sears Canada and the Hudson Bay Co.

Mary's mother would probably have seen to it that she had sufficient swaddling with her for the journey to Bethlehem as the baby was soon due.

When, at age of 12 Jesus went with his parents to the Temple in Jerusalem for his Bar Mitzvah, he would have worn, as he did for school, a knee-length every day brown light woollen tunic. On his head he would have worn a plain brimless kippah (skullcap). But it would have been a fine linen dress tunic (possibly white) with embroidered edging and a fancy kippah he wore at the coming of age ceremony in the Temple.

As an young man Yeshua would have worn a knee-length short sleeved linen under his tunic over his loin cloth, and depending on the weather, a light or heavier woollen long sleeved over tunic falling below the knee to almost the ankle. In the ruins of Europus Dura in Syria on one of the wall of oldest yet discovered house church the earliest painting of Yeshua shows him wearing this type of outer tunic. But though a man appearing in just his under tunic was said to be naked, workers would often dress this way and Yeshua would have done so working as a carpenter/ stone mason. During his final year on Earth one of his women followers made him a tunic completely woven without seams, an uncommon and expensive piece of clothing.

The long, ground-touching robe that medieval and Renaissance paintings and mosaics often show him wearing would have been cumbersome when he was travelling through the rocky countryside where he did much of his teaching. And in town it would have picked up dirt and debris that littered the streets and thus needing constant washing. Having no wife that we know of Yeshua would have done all his own shopping in the Capernaum bazaars for clothes and the sturdy leather sandals he always wore. Knowing that cleanliness is next to godliness he would have done his own laundry in the courtvard of his digs at the same time as he washed himself using a mixture of ash, cassia/olive oil and water. On occasion he probably did his laundry in the Sea of Galilee, a fresh water lake, near his lodgings and let it dry on the rocky shore while he enjoyed a leisurely swim.

On warm nights he would most likely have slept on the flat roof of his house in a light sleeveless knee length linen sleeping tunic open at the sides but belted around the waist. If sleeping indoors during the summer it was not uncommon for men in ancient Israel to sleep in the raw and Yeshua would be no different.

He would have also had a long serviceable square woollen cloak called a himation that served as a blanket when he was travelling and had to sleep rough or in the winter at home, as snow is not unknown in Galilee. This cloak, when not in use, could be folded carried over one shoulder much like a Scottish plaid (plaid is the article of clothing -tartan is the pattern).

Thursday, August 31, 2017 - THE WEEKLY SENTINEL - 19 ses this cloak would have had tassels fastened with a blue cords to each of its 4 corners to constantly remind the wearer of God's 10 commandments. It eventually evolved into the prayer shawl worn today by Jewish men when attending synagogue.

"And they stripped him and made him wear a red cloak ... And when they had finished making fun of him they took off the cloak and dressed him in his own clothes and led him away to crucify him." Matthew 27: "Then they cast lots to share out his clothing" (Luke 23).

As he hung in terrible pain dying on the cross the Roman soldiers divided his clothes now soaked in blood, urine and sweat among themselves but they didn't want to tear apart his valuable seamless under tunic in the same condition so they gambled for it. According to tradition the Empress Helena, mother of Constantine, the first Christian Roman emperor, acquired this tunic on her pilgrimage to the Holy Land 336-328 AD and brought it home to Augusta Treverorum, the Roman city in Germany now called Trier where it is kept in the cathedral, and occasionally put on

Revamped visitors centre at Cold Creek

King Township is moving ahead on redesigning the visitors' centre at Cold Creek Conservation Area.

Council recently approved a staff request to hire Brook McIlroy as the prime consultant for the work.

This stage of the project includes design and contract administration for a 3,000-square-food expansion to the existing visitors centre.

Brook received the highest scores of bidders and their services will cost \$155,805. Funds were approved in the 2017-2018 capital budgets.

Staff said the design work could begin this month, with the aim of releasing a tender document for the work in the fall. If all goes according to plan, construction could begin in the spring of 2018.
