A lot of talent and some Hollywood magic transformed a Nobleton area business for a scene in a hit TV drama. The Pioneer Brand Honey property, owned by Andre Flys, hosted the cast and crew of the made-in-Canada political thriller *Designated Survivor*, starring Kiefer Sutherland. The building became Duckwall Bait & Tackle for a scene in the show. Flys said a location scout dropped in after he saw the "BUZZ" sign on Highway 27. He noted the crews also spent time filming at nearby F1 Stables. Regarding the show, Flys quipped "who isn't a fan of Kiefer?" Luis Mendoza, location manager for the show, said the scene involves Secret Service agents looking for the bad guy. King properties like Pioneer Brand Honey are great for the crew, given the proximity to Toronto. It's a good look for the outdoor shots, he said, adding residents in the township are both excited and welcoming when crews come to town.

While outdoor location filming presents certain challenges, Mendoza said a very talented crew, many of whom have been with the show since its inception, pull it all together. Their visits, with upwards of 100 personnel, do help boost the local economy. The Toronto film industry boasts world class talent, in a world class city, filming in world class locations. King seems to be a nice fit for the crew. The iconic Main Street in Schomberg and the interior of The Scruffy Duck were featured in an episode of the show in 2017. Storefronts were altered, and gas pumps added to All Service Auto Centre, and Schomberg substituted for North Dakota. The show airs Wednesday nights on CTV. Mendoza noted the series is also available on Netflix, and many viewers tend to like watching the whole series, from beginning to end. Season 2 wraps up in a couple of weeks.

NOTICE OF COMPLETE APPLICATIONS CONCERNING A PROPOSED OFFICIAL PLAN AMENDMENT, ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT AND SITE PLAN APPLICATION

The Township of King has received applications for a proposed amendment to the Official Plan (File No. OP-2018-01), Zoning By-law (File No. Z-2018-01), and Site Plan Application (File No. SPD-18-08) on the property outlined below, submitted to the Township of King in accordance with sections 17, 34(15), and 41(4) of the Planning Act. The subject applications propose to permit the development of a commercial coffee house/restaurant (2,800 square feet/ 260 square metres) with drive-thru, patio, loading space, landscaping and 36 parking spaces.

The Township has determined that the applications are considered complete and the Planning Department has commenced processing. We welcome your comments regarding this application.

PROPOSAL

The subject applications propose:

- The application concerns the proposed development of a commercial coffee house/restaurant (2,800 square feet/ 260 square metres) with drive-thru, patio, loading space, landscaping and 36 parking spaces. The development site fronts on the south side of King Road and on the west of Spring Hill Drive. The property is currently utilized as a temporary construction office for the subdivision in the area and measures approximately 0.33 hectares (0.78 acres) with approximately 40 metres of frontage on King Road and 80 metres of frontage on Spring Hill Drive. Vehicular access to the site is also proposed off of King Road and Spring Hill Drive.
- The subject property is designated 'Low Density Residential 1 Area' by the King City Community Plan (OPA#54) and is zoned Transitional (T) by Zoning By-law #74-53, as amended by By-law #2008-46 and also zoned Future Use (F) by Zoning by-law #2017-66. The purpose of the Official Plan Amendment application is to redesignate the lands to 'Mixed Use Area' to permit the uses noted above. A Zoning By-law Amendment application and Site Plan Approval application have also been concurrently submitted to facilitate the development of the site.

At such time as a public meeting is scheduled in accordance with the Planning Act, the Township of King will provide further notice specifying the date and time of the meeting.

Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed official plan amendment, zoning by-law amendment or draft plan of subdivision.

**NOTICE – Parking Supply and Demand Surveys
Core Areas Parking Study - King City, Nobleton and Schomberg**

Why are we conducting these surveys?

To ensure that the Township continues to improve upon the vitality of each of King's core villages, while meeting the community's growing parking needs, the Township has initiated the Core Areas Parking Study. A major study component is the collection of parking supply and demand data at local commercial establishments to facilitate a review of existing parking operations within the three core areas in King City, Schomberg, and Nobleton.

How will the surveys be conducted?

Surveyors will count the number of vehicles parked at the targeted core area. *No personal or business information will be collected and no interaction between property owners or members of the public is necessary.*

The surveys are simply to observe parking patterns; the surveyors will walk into the targeted parking lots, count the number of vehicles, and leave. The surveyors will carry copies of this notice, business cards, and identification.

When will these surveys take place?

The parking supply and demand surveys will be conducted during the following days and times:

- **Tuesday, March 20th:** 8:00 AM & 12:00 AM (midnight) in Nobleton & Schomberg;
- **Wednesday, March 21st:** 8:00 AM & 12:00 AM (midnight) in King City;
- **Friday, March 23rd:** 6:00 PM & 9:00 PM in King City, Nobleton, & Schomberg; and
- **Saturday, March 24th:** 1:00 PM & 6:00 PM in King City, Nobleton, & Schomberg.

Community involvement is important!

In addition to the parking surveys, the Core Areas Parking Study will be consulting members of the public in an effort to obtain feedback regarding existing parking challenges, knowledge of existing issues, and desired study outcomes. Consultation activities will involve an online survey and an online crowdsourcing map; further details will be provided in the future.

Work on Laskay Hall progressing

The relocated Laskay Hall will join the King Museum in becoming focal points for the community.

Laskay Hall arrived at its new home at the King Heritage and Cultural Centre last August.

Staff have worked hard to prepare the site, but there have been complications along the way.

The weather, building condition and utility hookups all provided their own unique challenges.

The most significant issue, staff said, was the condition of the structural beams under the hall. As the building was raised off the ground for transport, it was discovered that many of the wooden beams had been decimated by carpenter ants. The ants had also affected some of the walls and doors. This led to a redesign of the supports under the hall, and required additional architectural and engineering support.

This was actually a blessing in disguise, as the issue was dealt with and will actually increase the building's lifespan.

Hydro proved tough, and electricity was connected Feb. 8, even though requests were made last October. The site is still awaiting final approval from Enbridge.

The extreme cold during some parts of the winter delayed some work.

At this point, the structural work is done and most of the basement is finished. Utilities and fixtures are being installed.

The next steps are the reconstruction of the front door and side door. Staff said both deal with structural issues, as well as accessibility. Painting of the interior, washroom and kitchen renovations will follow.

Ramps and railings will be installed in April or May and the final grading and seeding will take place after that.

Staff is working on selling the property of the hall's former home on Weston Road. Some problems with the property arose, including septic system limitations.

Staff suggested increasing the size of the lot by "stop up and closing" the southern portion of Second Street, and having part lots merge onto it. This will resolve the septic issues and will also resolve the outstanding unopened road allowance, which was never intended for practical use.

The property was surveyed and the septic system can be placed with no impact on neighbouring wells.

The Township hopes to sell the land to offset the costs of the hall's relocation, which went over budget by roughly \$125,000.

The total for the move was \$425,000 and the Township set aside \$300,000 in the 2017/18 budget, which included the sale of the property.

Staff is recommending the property be sold to any potential buyer. Hopes are the selling price can offset the \$125,000 shortfall.

If that doesn't happen, staff will report back to council on alternative financing.



Authority warns of ice conditions

Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority (LSRCA) is reminding residents of the dangers that exist near bodies of water, particularly around this time of year, and urges people to keep family and pets away from the edges of all waterways.

Spring is almost here, and with warmer temperatures, people look forward to getting outdoors. Warmer temperatures, however, also usually bring rain, melting snow and shifting ice which can contribute to higher, faster flowing water in watercourses.

Although Lake Simcoe's watershed received a typical amount of snow this past winter, the warmer temperatures experienced through February have resulted in an early snowmelt. The ground still remains saturated in many places and in periods of intense rain, there could be a higher amount of runoff in a much shorter interval than usual. As well, slippery and unstable stream banks and extremely cold water temperatures can also lead to very hazardous conditions close to any body of water.

Please keep family members and pets safely away from any water's edge.

Am I covered?

Your vehicle insurance policy likely has some flexibility built in to ensure you are covered in different situations. You should check your policy or ask your broker to be sure.

Renting a car

If you drive a rented car or any vehicle that is not owned by you, your existing vehicle insurance covers physical damage to the vehicle, accident benefits and third-party liability to the same limits that apply in your policy. Note, this is only true if your insurance is issued to you as an individual. If your vehicle insurance is issued to your business, you are not protected when

driving non-owned cars. Also, if you rent a luxury car but have a sub-compact insured, you might not be covered for the cost of repairs to the luxury vehicle. In these cases, you should purchase the insurance offered by the renter. If you are a frequent renter, add an endorsement to your car insurance policy. These can be simple to arrange, and far more economical than the costly damage waivers that rental car companies charge.

Traveling outside the province or country

Your insurance will apply if you take your car on short trips to other provinces or into the continental U.S., as long as you engage in normal use of the vehicle.

Moving to another province

If you are relocating long-term or permanently, you must inform your insurer and arrange for new coverage that reflects the risks in your new location.

When the car is "in the shop"

Under most insurance policies, you are not entitled to a replacement vehicle while your car is in the shop for normal maintenance or repair. If you lose the use of your car

because of an accident then you might be entitled to a loaned vehicle depending on the situation.

When driving someone else's car

If you borrow someone else's car you are covered by the insurance on that car. However, if you are involved in an accident, the owner's record, not yours will be affected. If you are a regular borrower, ask your broker to arrange a special clause in your policy to cover your use.

When someone else drives your car

Remember that when someone else is driving your car, you are still responsible for it. Any at-fault accidents or claims will go onto your driving record and affect your future premiums.

Don't guess.

If you are not sure about your coverage, it's better to give your broker a quick call than to guess. Remember, if you're not covered and an accident occurs, the insurer is not obliged to pay.

Ask your broker for more information about liability and how to obtain the right level of coverage.

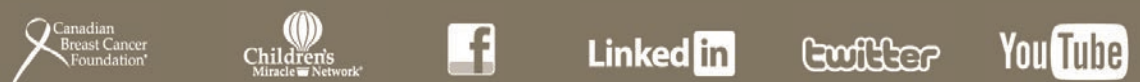

We are all examples of living miracles

"To be alive, to be able to see, to walk, to have houses, music, paintings - it's all a miracle."

Arthur Rubinstein

I am confident that miracles not only exist, they are responsible for our very existence.

We still refer to conception and giving birth, as the miracle of life. And it is. Sure, we have figured out all the chemical interactions and details of human conception.

But in the end, creating another human being, in all of its perfection, is still mind-boggling. It is a miracle that two people can come together to produce such an amazing creation.

Modern science is tinkering around with DNA and gene-splicing, but they're working on an existing model, one that has been in place since the dawn of humankind.

All of us are here because of minor miracles - we're living proof that they exist!

Aside from the miracle of birth that gave us life, let's rewind a bit, and look at how we got here.

I will outline my personal miracle.

My parents were from two totally different worlds and backgrounds, as were many Europeans who met and bonded in post-war Europe.

My dad was Latvian, with some Lithuanian ancestry. Few people I talk to even know of these tiny Baltic states, located on the Baltic Sea, directly across from Finland. They are bordered by Poland, Belarus and Russia.

These areas were likely sought after by ancient Scandinavians and Russians due to their strategic location on the sea.

They were rather insignificant countries until the Second World War, when they became a battleground between German and Russian forces, leaving the inhabitants caught in the crossfire.

From what my dad told me, Latvia

had little more than a bare-bones militia and they were pawns in the war. All that I do know is he was wounded when a train he was on was attacked by a fighter plane and suffered cuts on his arm from flying glass.

Many Latvians ended up in refugee or naturalization camps set up by the allies after the war. He told me he quickly befriended some British soldiers, learned English and managed to get a job cooking for them in the mess halls. He then drove a jeep for British officers and managed to advance himself by always offering to do more.

From there, he and some friends made their way to London where they worked before they decided to come to Canada in 1952.

What if my dad was killed in the war? What if he decided to stay in England?

That's one half of my miracle.

Meet my mom. She was German, with Polish ancestry. Her mom died of appendicitis during the war because doctors

were in short supply. Her dad moved them around a lot during the war, for work and to keep them safe from allied bombing.

They ended up in east Berlin at the end of the war. Her dad (my grandfather) was in charge of public works for the city. Unfortunately for him, that role led to his interrogation by the occupying Russians. They believed German soldiers were being protected in the underground sewers. After several days of interrogation, my grandfather was released, but died of a heart attack at home.

My mom and her brother had some stories to tell of inherent dangers in post-war Germany, under Russian control. I won't go into detail here, but both teenagers endured hardships and many close calls.

They eventually made their way "over the wall" at great risk, to west Berlin. From there, they set their sights on Canada as their new homeland. My mom's older sister stayed, and remained in Germany until the day she died.

Many German women put ads in Canadian newspapers, asking for sponsors to help pay their passage to Canada. Her ad caught my dad's eye and the rest, as they say, was history.

In her case, too, she could have been killed several times over. She could have stayed. Her ad in the paper could have been missed that day my father picked up the paper.

Like many immigrants, they worked hard to build a new life together in Toronto.

If I just stop here, the story is already filled to the brim with minor miracles. And that's just for two people in this

huge world.

Let's not forget about what brought their ancestors together, and what set of circumstances, coincidences and yes, "miracles" led to the connection of my grandparents, great-grandparents, great-great ... you get the idea.

Out of my parents' unusual intersection came something very special - me!

While my wife's side is a little less war-torn, it is also filled with minor miracles. Her dad's family was all set to sail from Ireland to Australia, but at the last minute, changed their plans and came to Canada instead. Her mom's family, from South America, made the trek, one sibling at a time, to Toronto. Kim's parents, again from two different worlds, met at a dance and hit it off. The rest was history.

These events only set the stage for Kim and I being on earth. How and why did we meet, come together, marry and have children?

More miracles.

It begs the question. Are we all here because of a series of strange coincidences and minor miracles? Or is there some sort of plan; eddies and currents in the universe that guide people together?

It's all pretty weird, and cool at the same time.

I think there are some very valuable lessons here. Since we are all here due to a series of perhaps random events, doesn't that make our existence even more precious? Shouldn't we be elated each and every day that we get up in the morning?

It's something to think about, and maybe share with our children, to make them feel even more special.

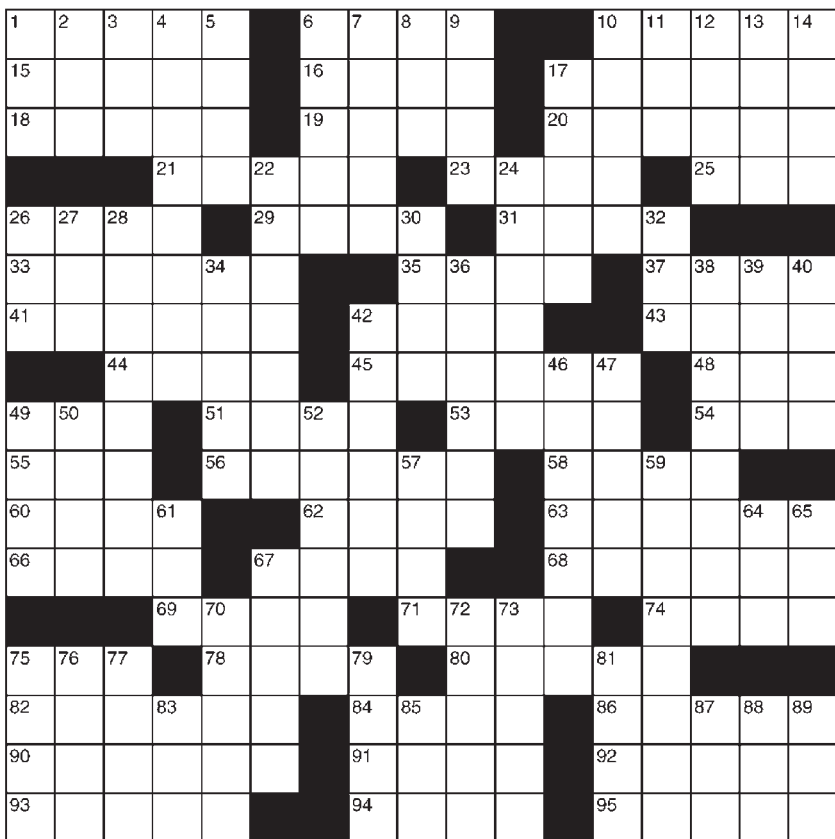

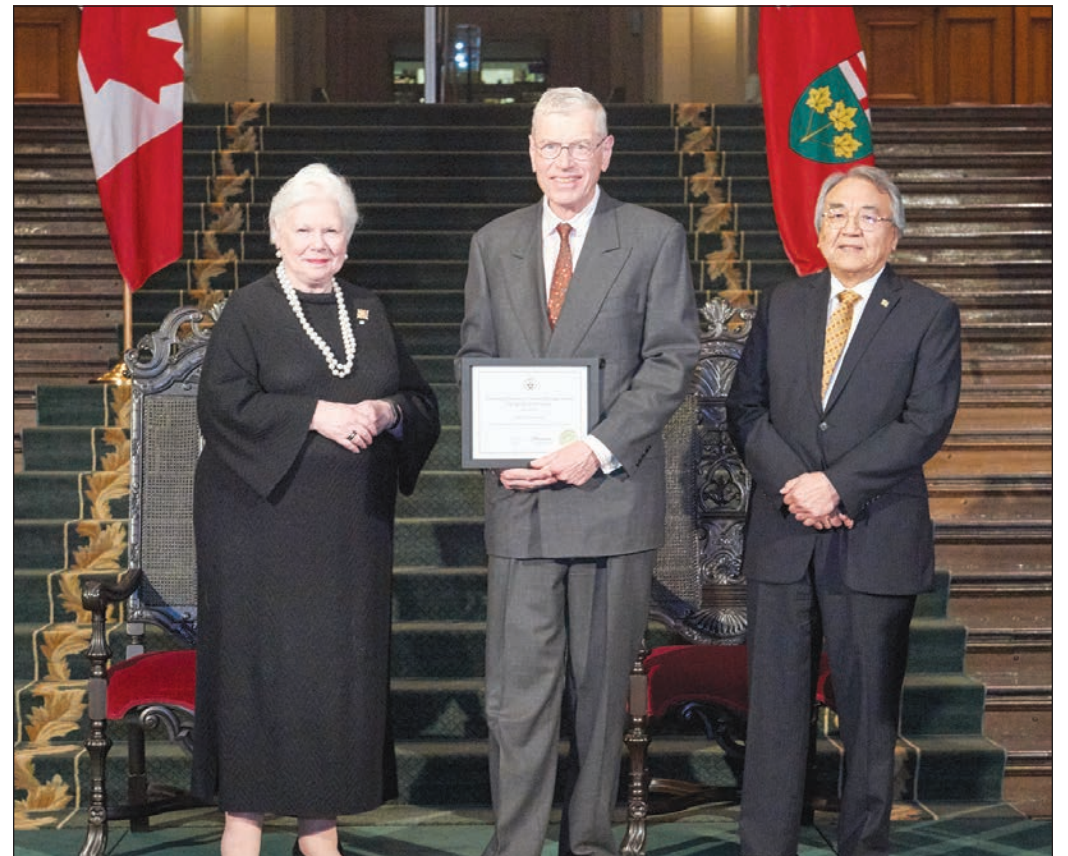

360Kids helps students understand youth homelessness

"It must be really bad, but what can I do about it?"

This was the thought that went through Maryam M's mind whenever she saw a homeless person.

The Grade 6 student simply thought there was nothing in her power to make a difference, even a loonie wouldn't have much of an impact.

"I always thought in order for there to be big change, there has to be a big committee towards that topic," she says. "I never thought I could do anything about homeless or homeless youth, and I would walk away like most people do. Boy, was I wrong to think that."

Maryam, and her fellow Grade 6 students at TMS Schools, had an eye opening experience on the Family Day weekend, walking in the shoes of homeless youth, in association with the 360 Kids Youth Shelter.

Over the past few months, students in Grades 4 through 6 have been immersed in workshops with 360 Kids representatives learning about the needs of youth who use their services and resources, as well as exploring the issues of affordable housing, precarious employment and mental health.

The kids put this knowledge into action by participating in their first 360 Kids sleepover, which was designed to give youth the opportunity to experience the challenges and choices facing youth who aren't as fortunate.

The overnight experience was hoped to not only raise money for 360 Kids, but foster an empathy while simulating a typical night for a homeless youth.

"Our students have been inspired to become engaged citizens and, in the meantime, contribute to this supportive organization in various ways," said teacher Rachel Marks. "They are learning that giving can come in many forms."

When Milad M. saw homeless youth, he says he too felt a sense of sadness and the helplessness of not being able to lend a hand.

"This experience really opened up a new world of possibilities to help people and gave me a different perspective on homelessness," he says. "When I

was doing the experience we had to create a shelter with two things: cardboard boxes and a tarp. Some of us didn't have a tarp at all. We only had one cardboard box per person and we could team up with others and this challenge was extremely challenging. Boxes kept falling because of wind and the tarps were flying through the air. Most of us were in teams, so we all thought, imagine doing this alone almost every day fixing a little shelter, uncomfortable as it was, and calling it home.

"There was also the cold wind chilling us up even though we had jackets, snow pants, gloves, hats, and scarves trying to warm us up. We imagined having old clothes unwashed and used, and knowing what I would really need if I find myself homeless helps me know what they need."

The experience was not only an eye opener on the struggles homeless go through each and every day just to make it through the night, but it was also an eye opener that these struggles are being faced by homeless youth not that much older than themselves.

"When I saw that so many kids were homeless, I was very surprised," says Kurtis Ng. "I knew that there were homeless people in York Region but I didn't know that some of them were kids."

Adds Milad: "You don't see the people as they are usually portrayed. Homeless people look just like all of us in the way that they aren't really dirty, their clothes aren't always ripped or torn and they do have an education in public schools. All of the details I mentioned were once what I thought of homeless people and since I didn't see any of that I thought that there probably weren't any homeless people. This is called invisible homelessness and it happens everywhere even when we can't see it."

But, this didn't surprise Maryam. It is an issue many choose to ignore, she says, because people have that "unfortunate" mind set that there is nothing they can do to help.

"I think anyone can do anything to help: you could donate, you could go buy homes for them, buy furniture, take them in with your family. There are many things we can do to help as

individuals and as a group," she says. "After this experience, however, I saw how caring 360 was, and how they took the time to come teach us how it felt and how we could make a change. After seeing this, I was very happy 360

kids supported these kinds of people. From now on, when I want to help, I would donate lots of money to homeless youth organizations, and if I ever saw a homeless youth, I know where to call: 360 Kids."

Juvenile Rebellion heading back to OMHA finals

Spring hockey has become a yearly tradition for King's Juvenile hockey squad.

Raising a banner into the rafters of Schomberg's Trisan Centre every year since 2014, the Juvenile Rebellion will once again vie for the OMHA championship title, after eliminating the New Hamburg Huskies in five games.

After sweeping through their first round series with the Bradford Bulldogs and earning a 5-2 win in their opening match with the New Hamburg Huskies, the Rebellion were brought down to size with a tie and a loss in games two and three, essentially leaving both sides needing two wins to clinch the series.

A return to Trisan Centre for game four on Friday meant the Rebellion could take a stranglehold on the series at home. A pair of early power plays helped King open the scoring mid-way through the first, when Alessandro Paglia's shot from the point squeaked through the Huskie goaltender's pads.

More penalty trouble came New

Hamburg's way late in the frame, when King took advantage of a long five-on-three, as Cameron Zinner was in the right spot at the right time to bury the rebound from another Paglia point shot.

The game was put away for good when James Barber knocked one in off a scramble mid-way through the second period, a sizable lead they would hold onto in a 5-1 final.

Back in New Hamburg for game five the following night, King put the series to bed with a 5-3 win.

The 2017-18 championship will mark the fifth year in a row the Juvenile Rebellion/Red Wings have reached the final, having last taken the title in 2014-15.

The Rebellion will be in for a tough match up in the final series, faced with the Amherstburg Avalanche. Sweeping through Woolwich in their respective semi-final, the Avalanche have lost just one game in the post-season, all the way back in early February's quarter-final.

The championship schedule is yet to be set.

Lions capture first YRAA hockey title

The King City Lions are kings of York Region hockey, and heading to OFSAA for the first time in the program's history.

Cam Kokelj, Gabriel Pechia, and Lucas Ceccarelli all found the back of the net in the YRAA championship game against St. Theresa, a 3-1 win that saw goaltender Michael Paglia make an impressive 30 saves.

Finishing at the top of the YRAA's elite division in only the second year of the program's history, head coach Brad Matwijec called the title "a group effort."

"The team has been working towards this the past two seasons," said Matwijec, who first began to gauge interest in forming a team in January of 2016.

"What makes this special is that the team is made up of mostly Grade 9s, 10s and 11s, with only three seniors."

After finishing the season with a 4-4-0 record to hit the post-season in sixth place, the Lions swept through Stouffville before a pair of 5-2 wins over Sacred Heart, to set up the final against the first-place St. Theresa.

The title is just the latest that King City can add to its young, yet expanding trophy case: the varsity Lions were York University Cup champions in 2016, and most recently won the Gary West Tournament at St. Andrew's in Aurora in 2017.

Next on the docket: a chance at a provincial title at the OFSAA championships. "We really believe in this group of young men," said Matwijec. "They are easy to coach, and committed to team playing as a team."

Matwijec and his coaching staff will be leaning, as they have all year, on their young talents to lead them through the provincial tournament, having lost six seniors to graduation last year.

"The team has excellent young leaders, including grade 10 captain Mathew Pappas, as well as Anthony Arnone and Cam Kokelj," said Matwijec. "We were also quite fortunate this year to add to add Scott Thain to our coaching staff."

"Thain has worked hard to develop this young squad."

The OFSAA championships go March 20-24 in Collingwood.

Mulroney speaks in Caledon

It was the dying hours of the campaign, but Caroline Mulroney brought her quest for the Ontario Progressive leadership to Caledon last Thursday.

There was an enthusiastic crowd out to greet her at the Caledon Estates Banquet Hall.

Palgrave resident Derek Clark, a member of the board of the Dufferin-Caledon Progressive Conservative Riding Association, acknowledged it was a "very short campaign period."

"Only one leadership candidate has come to Caledon," he added, referring to Mulroney.

Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones as on hand for the event, although she stressed that was not an endorsement of Mulroney's candidacy.

"I've stayed neutral so far," she observed. "I'm staying neutral."

She added she thought she had an obligation to be on hand, since the candidate was visiting her riding.

"Here in Dufferin-Caledon, we truly believe we are the centre of the universe," Jones told the crowd.

Mulroney had praise for Jones, commenting that she represents her riding with great distinction. And as deputy leader, she's been a force in the party.

Mulroney said the local stop was great opportunity for her to increase her profile, although she admitted she benefits from some name recognition.

"I'm Ben Mulroney's sister," she observed.

"It's time to be bold," she declared, agreeing she's new to political life, having only secured the PC nomination in York-Simcoe. "It's time to be fresh."

She also said she was anxious to start a new chapter for the party.

"Our party is strong and we're ready to win," she declared.

She added she had been knocking on doors and hearing a consistent message.

"Voters are desperate for change at Queen's Park," she remarked, citing poll numbers that had been published that day that indicated 81 per cent wanted to see change. "More Ontarians than ever are ready to vote PC."

Mulroney stressed the need to give leadership people can trust.

She pointed to the example of Premier Kathleen Wynne who has been mortgaging the future of the coming generation. "The Liberals have spent 15 years digging us into quite a hole," she observed, adding it will take a while to get out of the hole.

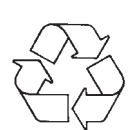

Anglican Parish

The original Parish of Lloydtown 175 years ago stretched south from Lloydtown (Schomberg) and Kettleby to Pinegrove (Woodbridge) and east from the boundaries of King Parish to Bolton-Sandhill, only connected primitive dirt roads in places not much more than trails. Thus it was impossible to have church services in every Anglican community in the parish every Sunday. While there were regular Sunday Holy Communion services in the mother church, the old St. Mary Magdalene's still in Lloydtown, services in the outlying Anglican communities were held in churches, homes or even barns once or twice a month usually on a weekday evening.

Even today if the parish had remained the same size it would be well

nigh impossible for one priest to hold services every Sunday in each community. Our hats go off to those long ago priests who faithfully ministered to their far flung flock under very harsh conditions.

Holy Communion services today in the much smaller parish are held in the 2 parish churches (St. Alban's Nobleton is now sadly closed) Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m. in the church hall adjacent to Christ Church, Kettleby on Kettleby Rd. A coffee/tea hour follows the service for any wishing to stay and at 11:15 a.m. in St. Mary Magdalene's 116 Church St. in Schomberg.

On Thursday March, 22 volunteers are needed to make palm crosses for distribution on Palm Sunday March 25. Cross makers are asked to meet at 9:30 a.m. in the lower level of St. Mary Magdalene's Please bring scissors. Coffee/tea and instruction will be provided.

level following this solemn service.

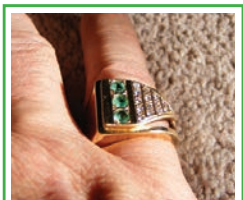
Horticultural Society

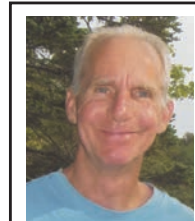

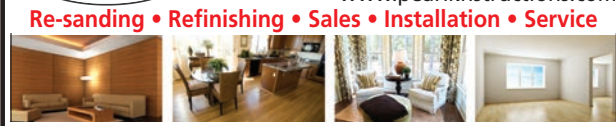

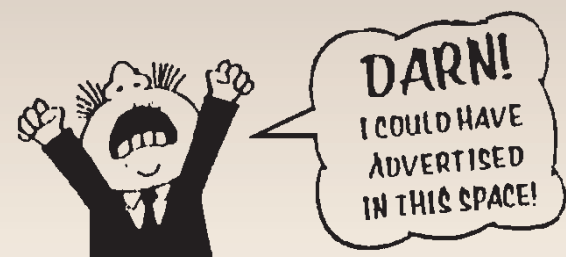
