
King Township is joining others in marking Earth Week 2018 with a host of fun and family friendly activities.

#### **Appeal Procedure**

If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Council of the Township of King to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, if one is held, or make written submissions to the Township of King in respect of the proposed plan of subdivision before the approval authority gives or refuses to give approval to the draft plan of subdivision, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Township of King to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, if one is held, or make written submissions to the Township of King in respect of the proposed plan of subdivision before the approval authority gives or refuses to give approval to the draft plan of subdivision, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

# Amendment bid raises questions about land's future

The possibility of some excess Magna lands being used for warehouses has created quite a stir among King residents.

Magna International has applied for a zoning bylaw amendment to permit warehousing on a large swath of land it owns at the corner of King Road and Jane Street. Recently, Magna deemed the majority of these lands as surplus, save a portion in the northwest corner, reserved for its future headquarters. Magna has plans to sell off these surplus lands.

Up for sale are 82.36 acres of employment lands and Magna will retain 20.76 acres for their future head office.

The application deals with an L-shaped swath currently zoned as E1-9 and Magna is hoping it can be designated to permit "warehousing." The 104-acre property contains four different zones, but all relate to employment lands.

The Official Plan designates the lands as prestige employment and this includes accessory and ancillary commercial and retail uses. Light industrial uses are permitted and planning staff believe warehousing is considered a light industrial use, as outlined in the King City Community Plan. There's no cause of the fact that King is an "idyllic

plan and the KCCP does not allow commercial, self-storage warehousing.

Staff are reviewing this aspect of the land use to get a handle on the implications of including warehousing as a permitted use.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said she doesn't want to see a large distribution centre on the land.

Steve Albanese, of IBI Group, planning agent on behalf of Magna, said the company has no concrete plans or timelines for its future headquarters. He sees the application as bringing the lands into conformity with the KCCP, and that's it. They're continuing to work with Township staff.

Residents are worried that this rezoning will set a precedent that will result in some large-scale warehousing, and all the impacts that brings.

Planner Gaspare Ritacca stressed at this point the entire parcel is one piece, and no applications to divide it have been received. He said Magna needs permission for any severing of the lands and that will require approval by the Township.

At this point, it's a bid to change the use on one part of the property.

# Witnesses sought in illegal dumping

York Regional Police is appealing for witnesses after several chemical containers with potentially hazardous material were illegally dumped in King Township and Richmond Hill.

Police report that on Sunday, April 8, officers responded to a report of illegal dumping at Humber Trail and Mill Road in the Township of King. Officers trained in handling hazardous materials found in clandestine labs, along with other emergency services, found 16 garbage bags, 100, 20-litre orange pails and approximately 15, 50-gallon blue chemical drums had been illegally dumped in the area.

On Thursday, April 12, officers attended an area near a construction site at Leslie Street and Elgin Mills Road for a report of illegal dumping of chemical containers. Approximately 20, 50-gallon chemical drums were located.

The Ministry of the Environment attended that scene to assess the area and facilitate the cleanup.

Police said the two sites do not appear to be related at this time. The material in both incidents is believed to have been found within 24 hours of being dumped. All potentially hazardous material was safely removed and it was determined there was no concern for public safety. The materials found are commonly associated to the manufacturing of illegal drugs.

Police are encouraging anyone who may have seen anything suspicious in those locations to come forward.



There are no subsidies for volunteer work and so local donations helped make this possible.





# DON'T LIGHT THAT FIRE!

Township of King Recreational Fire Guidelines By-law 2015-109 requires the following:

- **Only clean, unpainted, untreated wood may be burned**
- □ Fire must not exceed .75 metres in height and .75 metres in diameter (approximately 2 feet in diameter and 2 feet in height)
- A means to extinguish the fire must be in close proximity i.e. garden hose, pail(s) of water, etc.
- Recreational fires must be supervised by a competent person at all times. Leaving the fire unattended is not permitted
- □ A minimum distance of 3 metres (10 feet) to combustible materials must be maintained at all times
- Outdoor fireplaces must be equipped with a screen on the flue and fuel loading area
- □ The use of an outdoor fireplace must comply with manufacturers' guidelines/ instructions
- Outdoor fireplace must be installed on a non-combustible surface

Failure to comply with Municipal By-law 2015-109 could result in charges being laid under the Ontario Fire Code including charges under the Municipality's Fees and Charges By-law.

# DON'T LIGHT THAT FIRE!

Township of King OPEN AIR BURNING By-law 2015-109 requires the following:

- □ A valid burn permit must be on-site at all times
- □ The property owner or agent acting on behalf of the property owner must be on-site at all times
- The property must be at least 1 acre in size and cannot be located within the restricted boundaries as per By-law 2015-109
- Only clean, unpainted, untreated wood may be burned
- Only 1 single fire at a time
- This fire cannot be any larger than 2 metres in height and 2 metres in diameter (6 feet in diameter and 6 feet in height)
- □ An approved means of extinguishment must be available at all times



## Have your say on improved parking in villages


A Core Areas Parking Study was launched in order to better understand existing parking challenges in the village cores of King City, Nobleton and Schomberg and look for solutions.

Councillor Cleve Mortelliti said these lands have been earmarked for employment for more than 17 years and that carries an array of potential development.

Resident Judith Tenebaum pointed out the KCCP includes special guidelines for the gateway to King City and any development should be reflective of the nature of the community.

"There's no place for warehousing in this location," she said, noting directly across King Road is an estate residential development, along with the King Heritage and Cultural Centre. There's nothing "prestigious" about warehousing, she observed, adding such facilities should be near rail transit corridors.

Tenebaum pointed out that Vaughan doesn't permit warehousing on any of its employment lands.

She can't see Magna requiring such

done in order to facilitate the sale of the lands.

Greg Locke, of Concerned Citizens of King Township, echoed these sentiments.

CCKT advocated strongly for the prestige employment land designation, before Magna purchased this site. Previously, the owner made an application to develop the property which included significant amounts of allowable retail and commercial uses, including warehousing, which was "not in keeping with this vision."

While Magna was a welcomed partner in the community, this does not mean that as a community that "we have lowered our expectations. A warehousing functionality, including the ingress and egress of transport trucks and noise, is not the quality, value-added use we are seeking."

Locke added it is not in keeping with

warehousing, and believes this is being the established surrounding residential areas: those immediately south of the lands and across King Road; the soon to be constructed King Township municipal offices to the east; the King Cultural Centre; Kingsbridge Centre, etc.

> "On its face, this looks like Magna trying to add marketing potential to the property by adding a common use typified by businesses seeking to locate close to a major highway and interchange. We could see a business requiring a minimal amount of storage and shipping/receiving functionality that would be engaged in the kinds of prestige' uses we have been hoping to attract to these lands.

> "But once it's zoned, how to we control it? The proximity to the Highway 400 interchange is just too magnetic for us to trust any assurance of this by a developer.

> "Let's be careful what we give away," Locke said.

> Planning staff want more time to review the application and the matter will be referred back to council at a later date.



# Dismissal shows 'one-sidedness' of anti-SLAPP legislation, counsel says

The Ontario Superior Court of Justice dismissed a motion seeking to terminate a defamation lawsuit in a decision, that highlights the one-sidedness of anti-SLAPP (strategic lawsuit against public participation) legislation.

In McCarthy-Oppedisano v. Muter 2018 ONSC 2136, the court heard that the defendant, Mary Muter, sought an order dismissing the defamation action brought against her by the plaintiff, Tara McCarthy-Oppedisano (McCarthy)

McCarthy is a real estate agent in the community of Kingscross Estates, and her father is a developer who builds homes in the community. Muter is an environmentalist who lives within the same community and who sits on the board of the Kingscross Ratepayers' Association (KRA).

The KRA has been concerned with developers purchasing property in the community directly from homeowners, who may not be aware of their land's worth, at less than market value. The builders then profit by building large homes on the lots.

According to court documents, Mc-Carthy submitted an application to the Township in May 2015 to amend the official plan, so she could sever two properties (Snowberry Lane). The two properties were owned by McCarthy and her mother, and the severance would have created an additional lot. The KRA opposed the application as it would create smaller lots in the community and "offend the official plan."

"McCarthy's application seems to

have brought to a head the tensions in the community between those who share Muter's interests and concerns, and those who either support broader choice with respect to development or who, for whatever reason, do not share KRA's agenda," wrote Justice Susan Healey.

According to court documents, Muter claims she was tasked with polling residents of the community as a cochair of the KRA. She was to figure out what the views were on McCarthy's application. Muter had conversations with residents where she expressed the KRA's opposition to lot sizes being reduced. The issue was heated and led to community meetings about McCarthy's plans.

The evidence on the motion states that at some point rival real estate agents allegedly told Muter that McCarthy had real estate licence infractions and was blocking bids on home purchases in the community. This rumour was also heard by other people in the community.

The evidence goes on to explain that a resident of Kingscross, Lisa Iafrate, had Muter over to her home where a discussion about the community ensued. Iafrate recorded the conversation, without Muter's knowledge, as Muter made negative comments about McCarthy.

The court noted that the recording is incomplete and that the cell phone on which Iafrate recorded the conversation repeatedly stopped at which point the recording would have to be re-started.

Justice Healey wrote that, read in its entirety, the transcript leaves the

impression that Iafrate was interested one cannot embed defamatory comin talking about a member of the KRA board whom she dislikes and who she believed was controlling the decision to hold a meeting about lot severance.

"The transcript also leaves the impression that Muter's primary objective during the conversation was to present her opposition to the idea of reduction of lot sizes through severance, and the potential precedent that would be set if McCarthy's application was granted, by maligning and vilifying McCarthy and her father," she added.

The court noted that Muter denied disseminating negative comments to anyone else but Iafrate. However, members of the community said defamatory words were repeated after the conversation between the two women occurred.

According to court documents, another KRA board member, Michael Notaro, spoke to Muter about her conduct after he was approached by McCarthy. He advised Muter to stop making these remarks, which the court wrote were that McCarthy was "dishonest and had infractions on her licence."

McCarthy commenced a lawsuit after Muter did not cease the defamatory comments about McCarthy.

The court noted that s. 137.1 of the Courts of Justice Act has a two-part test as to whether an action should be dismissed: 1) "that the proceeding arises from an expression made by the moving party," and 2) "that the expression relates to a matter of public interest."

Justice Healey wrote that the parties agreed that "the words complained of" are an expression that was made by Muter. However, the second part of the test is not met.

"It is true that the Kingscross community appears to have had widespread interest in the topic of McCarthy's severance proposal, and that Muter was involved in the concerns raised by it both on a personal level and as a co-chair of the board. What is not germane to that public interest, however, is sheer gossip about McCarthy's integrity or ethics in her chosen profession," noted Justice ments against another within speech that at times may relate to matters of public interest. In other words, defamatory comments are defamatory regardless of whether they are 'cloaked' in subsequent speech that may touch upon public interest," he explained.

Fiske said that while there is a need for anti-SLAPP legislation to protect vulnerable defendants from aggressive litigation tactics, the current legislative scheme is too one-sided and "pre-supposes" that all defamation suits are de facto SLAPP suits.

"It puts those plaintiffs who have legitimate causes of action in libel or slander at a significant disadvantage," he noted.

Fiske said one disadvantage is that there is no obligation for a defendant to bring an anti-SLAPP motion to strike a claim in a timely manner. He explained that under the new anti-SLAPP legislation these motions can be brought at any time.

"In theory, such a motion could even be brought in the middle of a trial and the effect of bringing such a motion is to stay the action as well as any related tribunal proceedings until after it is heard," he said.

Another disadvantage Fiske pointed out is that once an anti-SLAPP motion is formally brought by the defendant, they are supposed to be heard within approximately 60 days. However, it is common for such motions to be delayed for six months to a year.

"If a plaintiff wins an anti-SLAPP motion and is able to demonstrate that they had a bona fide cause of action in libel or slander, the anti-SLAPP legislation still creates a presumption against costs. Therefore, a plaintiff who has likely had to spend between \$10,000 and \$50,000, and in some cases even more, to defend an anti-SLAPP motion is presumptively not entitled to costs. Strategically, this puts a plaintiff at a serious disadvantage because a defendant can wear them down financially with little risk of having to pay costs. Yet, a plaintiff has to expend significant resources in responding to such a motion because if they lose, the overriding action is dismissed, and they are exposed to a presumption of full indemnity costs on the motion and possibly damages," he said. Fiske noted that further issues arise with anti-SLAPP legislation as an unsuccessful defendant who has failed to show that the action is a SLAPP suit has an automatic right of appeal, without the requirement to obtain leave, even though it is an interlocutory motion. Fiske said that the anti-SLAPP provisions allow a defendant to use the legislation as a sword when it is meant to be used as a protective shield.

Healey, adding that McCarthy's reputation is not connected to the public interest in severance application.

Justice Healey went on to write that Muter's lack of concern about the "veracity of the gossip that she was so readily relaying to others" supports the view that the allegations are personal attacks passed on to others for "political advantage." She determined, in her decision released April 3, to dismiss the motion.

Cameron Fiske, a partner at Milosevic Fiske LLP and co-counsel for McCarthy with David Cassin, said the decision shows that a court will not permit a member of a voluntary community organization to "shelter behind" that position when making defamatory comments about the reputation of a private citizen.

"A key takeaway from the case is that LexisNexis Canada Inc.

Counsel for Muter declined to comment on the decision.



More people from far and wide are "experiencing King."

The Township's website, marketing and Experience King branding are paying off and boosting local tourism.

With a modest budget of \$30,000 annually, efforts by staff and Margaret Hastings of Clear Impact, are accelerating the momentum.

"The overall success of the program is measured through social media reach, website traffic and qualitative reporting from tourism stakeholders." noted Jamie Smyth, King's economic development officer. "Base on the metrics collected, tourism 2017 was an immense success and King is poised to have an more successful 2018."

The user-friendly, interactive website (www.economicking.ca/experience-king-2017-update/) makes it fun and easy to access King's best features.

The Experience King campaign. Smyth noted, is aimed at increasing visitors to King by those outside the area. There's a market population of more than five million within an hour's drive of the municipality.

"People are looking for ways to step away from the hustle and bustle of their daily lives to be refreshed, recharged and revitalized," Smyth noted. "They hear about interesting things to do in King through the social media stories created and pushed out."

The website promoted some 47 business and more than 27 local events last year. There was a marked increase in "social reach" in 2017 as well.

Experience King, Smyth observed, augments and complements existing marketing activities.

The challenge is, of course, securing more funding. Promotion relies on the "organic" spread of social media, which has proven effective. King hopes to leverage any available funding from other organizations such as Central Counties Tourism and Experience YORK.



launched in 2014 and a new plan will be prepared and presented to council later this year.

Councillor Avia Eek called this a "great news story" for King. This "demonstrates the level of dedication and passion that has been put into our Community Tourism Plan. I never thought we would have come this far, in such a relatively short period of time, with so few financial resources! Thank you Jamie Smyth and Margaret Hastings. If we hadn't had you on board, I King's three-year tourism plan was don't think we'd be where we are now."







# **Running for municipal office?**

Serving your community as a municipal councillor is rewarding and fulfilling. With the 2018 municipal election looming, there are several things candidates and voters should keep in mind.

Candidates interested in running for local offices (municipal) in the 2018 King municipal election will be able to access nomination forms online or at the Clerk's Department. Nominations must be filed in-person with the Clerk's Department by the candidate or the candidate's agent, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. starting May 1. Nominations must be made prior to July 27 by 2 p.m.

On Oct. 22, positions to be filled include mayor, ward councillor for each Ward, 1 to 6; school trustees. New this year is a vote for York Regional Chair and all voters wil cast a ballot for their candidate.

The Ministry of Municipal Affairs is holding candidate information sessions to brief would-be politicians on the process. The next one will be held in the Vaughan council chambers (2141 Major Mackenie Drive), Wednesday, April 25 at 7 p.m.

The Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) is providing an online course you can work on at your own pace. There is a charge and you have to register on AMO's website, under "Municipal Education."

Candidates are not permitted to spend or raise funds for their election campaign until their nomination has been filed with the Clerk.

The refundable filing fee, paid to the Township Clerk at the time of nomination is as follows: \$200 for the head of council (mayor) and \$100 for councillor and school board trustee. The filing fee will be refunded if your campaign financial statement has been received by the filing deadline.



Always the first to push for an active lifestyle in kids through diet and exercise initiatives, the King native is teaming up with SpringFree trampolines and Earth Day Canada to bring a pop-up adventure playground to Toronto on Sunday.

"I've been working with Spring-Free for quite a while, and when they learned about Earth Day Canada they were really excited about how there's an overlap in their values, to get kids outside and active," said MacLennan. "So this year, we're creating the pop-up adventure playgrounds across Canada, including Toronto."

Dubbed as a "child-friendly space designed to stimulate imaginative, unstructured outdoor play," the event at Trinity-Bellwoods Park in Toronto will be hosted by MacLennan, who will be on-hand for a meet-and-greet and to sign autographs.

"It's a great way to engage kids with natural materials, and play structures, and just use their imagination in being outside and being active," said MacLennan.

Moving away from the traditional playground structures of monkey bars and slides, MacLennan is bringing the "safer, more natural" playground setting to cities across Canada, where she hopes they will be implemented on a permanent basis.

"I think it's great for kids to have a variety," said MacLennan. "I think it's will be on-hand at 11 a.m.

## Funding to help people in Ontario save energy and money in their homes, businesses

Canada and Ontario are working together to take action on climate change and find clean solutions to help homeowners and families save money, reduce energy waste, create jobs and support healthy communities.

The Minister of Environment and Climate Change, Catherine McKenna, and the Premier of Ontario, Kathleen Wynne, announced a federal investment of up to \$100 million to help the people of Ontario make energy efficient retrofits to their homes - including apartments, townhouses and low-income housing – and businesses.

As part of its Climate Change Action Plan (CCAP), Ontario in investing up to \$1.7 billion over the coming years into GreenON to support a wide range of programs, including rebates and programs to help families, business and farmers make environmentally friendly changes. The CCAP is a five-year action plan that is making life more affordable for people across the province and making Ontario a leader in the global fight against climate change. Revenues from Ontario's carbon market, which puts a cap on the carbon pollution businesses can emit, are funding this action plan.

The Government of Canada's Low-Carbon Economy Leadership Fund provides \$1.4 billion to provinces and territories that have adopted the Pan-Canadian Framework on Clean Growth and Climate Change (PCF), to deliver on commitments to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Today's announcement is part of the almost \$420 million Ontario is receiving through the Leadership Fund.

"The environment and the economy go together. That's why the Government of Canada is working with Ontario to put practical climate solutions into action – and creating good, middle class jobs and economic opportunities in the

process. Investing in energy efficiency pays for itself by saving money, reducing carbon pollution and making our homes and businesses more comfortable and affordable," said McKenna.

"Households across Ontario and Canada are already coping with the effects of climate change. We must act now to lower our emissions and decrease our carbon footprint. This support from the Government of Canada will boost the Green Ontario Fund and help homeowners pay for energy efficient technologies that will help us meet our global obligation to reduce emissions and combat climate change," added Premier Wynne.

"Climate change is a global threat that requires a united effort from all levels of government. The Low-Carbon Economy Leadership Fund is a great example of how the provincial and the federal governments can work together to help people and businesses fight climate change, save money and transition to a cleaner, low-carbon economy," commented Chris Ballard, Ontario Minister of Environment and Climate Change.

The Government of Canada's Low Carbon Economy Leadership Fund will make homes and buildings more efficient, comfortable and affordable to run, help companies across Canada innovate and access technologies and help the forest and agriculture sectors to enhance stored carbon in forests and soils.

In January, Ontario became part of the second-largest carbon market in the world, which forms the backbone of Ontario's strategy to cut greenhouse gas pollution to 15 per cent below 1990 levels by 2020, 37 per cent by 2030 and 80 per cent by 2050.

Ontario's carbon market has generated approximately \$2.4 billion in revenue to improve schools, hospitals, transit and other projects like new bike lanes that are building a greener, more energy efficient province.

Ontario has committed up to \$1.7 billion over three years to support a wide range of programs under the Green Ontario Fund (GreenON).

Through GreenON, property owners are currently eligible for rebates up to \$7,200 in savings on new insulation; \$5,000 in savings on replacement windows; \$5,800 in savings on some air source heat pumps; and \$20,000 in savings on installation of some certified ground source heat pumps.

Words cannot express the magnitude of what has happened in Humboldt, Saskatchewan. It is unimaginable to think of what the first responders confronted and its imperative that we are there for them in their time of need.

In partnership with Wounded Warriors Canada, the Tema Conter Memorial Trust has created the Humboldt First Responders Fund. 100% of the proceeds will be used to provide mental health support to the First Responders involved in the tragic events involving the Humboldt Broncos.

Tema provides support programs such as One-on-One Peer Support and Family Assistance Line 1-888-288-8036; funding for mental health services; mental health referral services and peer support training.

Former King resident Vince Savoia founded the Tema Conter Memorial Trust. He has made it his mission to get emergency personnel to open up about their experiences.

Together, Savoia and the Trust have made tremendous inroads in education and awareness of critical incident stress among emergency workers and the general public. And his message has spread far and wide - literally from coast to coast.

The Tema Conter Memorial Trust was created by Savoia, who in 1988 was the first paramedic to arrive on the scene of the murder. On Jan. 27, 1988 at the age of 25, Tema Conter was murdered by a convicted serial killer.

That one event would change his life forever.

#### Anglican Parish By John Arnott

There are many unanswered questions Christians over the centuries have asked or been asked by non-Christians about Christianity.

If crucifixion was meant to be a long, lingering, excruciatingly painful death used to warn people what was in store for them if they dared to challenge Roman authority, why then did the crucified Yeshua, an upstart backwoods country preacher, we know as Jesus die in less than a day? Luke's gospel tells us that even Pontius Pilate the Roman Prefect of Judaea who ordered the crucifixion was surprised to learn this.

The reason usually given is that the Jewish temple authorities who wanted Yeshua crucified did not want him naked and suffering in public view over their sabbath day observance, especially at Passover. They persuaded the Romans to quickly kill him (which they could have more easily done while he was held prisoner overnight in the Antonia Roman fortress in Jerusalem). The Romans seem to have been unwillingly pushed by the temple officials to carry out this brutal execution but how much further would they allow themselves to be pushed by leaders of what they considered unimportant bunch of


If the Jewish temple authorities who saw Yeshua as a threat to their power and influence were so concerned about the body of this dying preacher desecrating their sabbath, why didn't they just have him kept in prison and hold off on demands for his execution until the holy time was over?

Yeshua was crucified not because the temple authorities accused him of sacrilege/blasphemy against the Jewish religion, but rather because the Romans saw him as threat to their rule over Israel.

Regarding the "thieves," the Gospel of Nicodemus, dating from the mid-4th century AD, gives their names as Dimas later recorded as Demas or Damas the "good thief" and Gestas, the one who taunted Yeshua along with the gathered crowd. Dimas is a saint in the Roman Catholic Church and the Eastern Orthodox Church.
