# Canadians paying too much, Scheer stresses

Average Canadians are paying too much, according to the leader of the federal Conservative Party.

Andrew Scheer stopped in King during a tour of the region Saturday. Scheer paid a visit to the Nobleton Feed Mill to chat about issues facing residents under the Trudeau Lib-

Federal policies, he said, are having a huge impact on investment dollars, which are leaving Canada. The carbon tax has resulted in a noticeable hike in gas prices at the pumps, something that hits every Canadian in the wallet.

Scheer said he's very concerned about the size of the federal deficit and the Liberals don't seem to have a plan to tackle the debt. This will place a "huge burden" on our children's future, he stressed.

Scheer also pointed out that after 25 years of deficits un-

der the Liberals, "we're not having anything to show for it."

This coming provincial election in Ontario is "huge," Scheer said. He noted that the Wynne Liberals have run up the debt. From the energy scandal to the high costs of hydro, the provincial Liberals are added to the burdens placed on taxpayers.

"Ontario can't keep writing cheques," he said.

Scheer is impressed with the local Conservative candidates running to serve King residents. Both Stephen Lecce and Caroline Mulronev would be exceptional representa-

# **Streetlight** program

More than 2,000 streetlights in King Township will be converted from standard high-pressure sodium (HPS) types to light emitting diode (LED) ones starting this week in King City.

Upgrading from HPS to LED streetlights will improve visibility, safety

and reduce light pollution. LED lights also use significantly less power than HPS ones and align with King's Sustainability Plan.

At current hydro rates, it's estimated the cost will be paid back from reduced maintenance and power consumption in around nine years.

The first area of work will be King City. On site activity will consist of 2 crews of as many as 2 vehicles each. These vehicles will be stopping at each fixture location. Operating from a small bucket truck, the old fixture will be removed, new fixture installed and a new control node added to replace the old photocell.

The crews will then move to the communities of Nobleton and Schomberg.

Following the initial sweep of the areas, the information regarding the condition of the existing poles will be evaluated and a second sweep of the areas will be conducted to address the approved correction of existing deficiencies (pole straightening or replacement.)

# **Greg Locke is Green Party candidate**

The Green Party will be represented in the June provincial election.

Greg Locke, King resident, local businessman and environmental advocate, has been named the candidate in King-Vaughan.

He's a Schomberg-based glass artist, long-standing volunteer, and father together with his wife, two cats and their border collie. Commitment to community, an enthusiasm towards the environment, and active advocacy are his driving forces.

Locke said the party approached him and asked if he would stand as their preferred candidate.

"It may sound cheesy, but I realized I needed to run when my 11-year-old daughter Brianna asked me what party I'm going to vote for. I couldn't look her in the eye and rationalize any other preference! The challenges facing our environment, our children, our seniors, and the legacy that decades of accumulated private and public debt have taken on our society, they all weigh on me. I'm concerned for her, even for her children. We've dug a very big hole for ourselves."

Locke said Ontarians have become polarized and mainstream parties are moving way left and way right to attract or keep voters. Personality and populism, he said, are the orders of the day.

"There is another choice, and that is for voters to consider the merits of voting Green."

Locke said he wants his name on the ballot in King-Vaughan to give voters a choice and get the word out why the Green Party is ready to address the many challenges facing Ontario. He shares the Green Party's vision and values, and he's proud to have Mike Schreiner as leader.

"The Green Party is fiscally conservative and socially progressive. Many voters don't realize this. If you're concerned about the devastation that deficit spending, and promises of much more, will have on our future, you have another choice. If you're in favour of continuing social investments and sup-

port mechanisms that have made Ontario such a great place to live, you have another choice."

Locke was particularly struck by a recent encounter with David Suzuki at a local Green Party Earth Week event in Stouffville.

"His message, like the party's, is simple and honest: we don't have time to waste to save our environment from ourselves. We have to act now. It's clear to me that other parties don't want this as central to their mandate – it needs to be. As an environmental advocate, I embrace this."

Greg became an environmental advocate soon after moving to York Region 12 years ago. Having searched for a more rural, small-town setting for he and Tracy to relocate their home and studio, he became disillusioned with the seemingly insensitive pace, scale and form of development across King's villages and hamlets. Having served as president on his previous condominium board, Greg jumped in with a local citizen's group trying to work with a local developer to improve the site's respect for surrounding neighbours and pre-existing environmental features. Greg became passionate when he saw the indifference to being heard by the developer and numerous local officials. He realized that the lifestyle and values he so wanted to see flourish in his new community, could only be sustained by getting more involved.

Locke ran for King Township council, first in 2010 and again in 2014, on a banner of "positive leadership." He joined CCKT as a board member to support and advance CCKT's mandate, becoming chair in 2011. He's also served and supported the volunteer boards of Arts Society King and York Region Arts Council.

His community and business experience is complemented by his Master of Business Administration (MBA) and Bachelor of Arts (Economics) degrees, both earned at York University.

Locke sees this as a critical juncture in Ontario, both for the "rural" communities of King and the more "urban" City of Vaughan. There are several reasons compelling him to participate.

He said there's no choice for voters, especially now, who value fiscal responsibility and social progressiveness.

"There's no reason we can't appoint leaders who support both. I want to be one of them."


Locke stressed we must ensure we focus on people - supporting our youth and seniors with programs and policies that will ensure we can grow in this new technology-driven world, without leaving anyone behind.

"We must continue targeted investments in education, health, child care and affordable housing."

We must continue to invest in key infrastructure, including education, public transit, high speed internet, and efficient road and rail networks to ensure our cities, Vaughan especially, continue to be the social and economic engines of wealth we so rely on them for.

Locke also noted debt has to be adnurture and grow our biggest assets, including small business and our youth, technological innovation, to create new streams of sustainable wealth.

"We've being governed as though we're living in a 1960s world where our economy was delivering high wage and salary jobs in largely manufacturing and resource based industries. We must focus on our relative strengths to build a sustainable economy, including key manufacturing and building industries."

The investments we've made in the reviews of our major environmental plans (Green Belt and Oak Ridges Moraine) must be sustained.

"It's critical we protect and grow the legacy of these key pieces of environmental legislation. Over 80% of King is within the Greenbelt or Moraine. There is more work to be done here."

The Places to Grow legislation mandates intensification targets across the GTA. Municipal governments are challenged to identify locations for potential infill development, especially in King-Vaughan, where infrastructure is at or near capacity, and few harmonious locations exist. This is causing

much stress between residents, developers and municipalities.

"I want the Province to work harddressed. We must support policies that er to define targets that are reasonable on a community by community basis, maintaining our goals of growing our filled with ideas in world-embracing housing stock, conserving our scarce rural and farm lands."

The out-dated Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) has just been replaced by a long overdue regimen now in effect (Local Planning Appeal Tribunal). Positive change was critical in this area of land use appeal. LPAT is problematic in several of its new objectives, requirements and processes; amendments are surely needed.

"Without active review and engagement with this new legislation, citizen and community voice for land use appeal will once again be a mostly losing game."

Locke is confident that "real solutions exist," and he's ready to jump into the foray at the provincial level.

# Witnesses sought in nearby fatal

Investigators with the York Regional Police Major Collision Investigation Unit are seeking witnesses, including the driver of a transport truck, who may have been in the area prior to a fatal collision in the City of Vaughan.

On Thursday, April 26, at approximately 1 a.m., police responded to a collision on Highway 50, south of Nashville Road. A black Honda Accord was travelling north on Highway 50 when it went off the roadway and into a ditch.

Investigators believe a full-sized transport tractor trailer was travelling north on Highway 50 and the driver may have seen the Honda Accord, may have been passed by it, or could have possibly witnessed the collision. One of the occupants of the Honda, a 38-year-old man from Brampton, was de-

ceased at the scene. One adult male occupant in the Honda was transported to hospital in life-threatening condition and two other adult male occupants were transported to hospital with serious but non-life-threatening injuries. The investigation is ongoing and any witnesses who have not yet spoken with



# Schomberg resident receives librarian of the year award

In 2008, Kendall founded the Toronto Addis Ababa Academic Collaboration - Library Science Program, an educational partnership with the Ethiopian academic community, to further enhance library services at the Addis Ababa University. To date, she has taught more than 1,200 learners in using HINARI, the electronic resources library, established by the World Health Organization for developing countries.

In 2018, the planned in-country training session will be held in October.

Kendall had educated residents, fellows, nurses, faculty physicians and librarians at Addis Ababa to perform

spond to clinical questions with medical library resources. She's been able to share her expertise with librarians in national and international conferences. Kendall presented the project's progress and success at various associations, including the Ontario Library Association, Canadian Health Libraries Association, Medical Library Association.

Kendall, in 2017, became president of the Ontario Health Libraries Association and initiated a project to transform RxTx, a major electronic drug information resource, into a provincially licenced product in all of Ontario hospitals. She's established a positive rapport with not only library professionals, but also stakeholders in government private and non-profit sectors.

Kendall is also a writer, and published an updated evidence-based medical toolkit in the Canadian Family Physician journal, encouraging clinicians to find credible sources of medical information in a practical manner. The toolkit has been used by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario, the Ministry of Public Health and a number of hospital libraries across the country.

Kendall has been a role model and mentor to library professionals around the world, and is known for her energy, creativity, sense of humour and work ethic. She continues to make an exceptional contribution to hospital librarianship in Canada and beyond.

### Speed reduced on Highway 27 By Mark Pavilons

York Regional Council has decided to reduce the speed limit on a certain section of Highway 27.

Councillors voted to reduce the speed from 80 km/h to 70 on Highway 27, from the King-Vaughan road to 230 metres south of Oliver Emerson Avenue. They also voted to drop the limit from 80 to 60 km/h on 27, from 230 metres south of Oliver Emerson, to 315 metres south of King Road.

When speed limits are changed, the region installs "NEW" signs in the area, and they remain in place for 60 to 90 days.

York staff monitors and reviews the regional roads network, making sure speed limits are updated in accordance with policy, and set at proper levels for the road.

# Region and U of T partners in transportation technology

York Regional Council approved a multi-vear partnership with the University of Toronto's iCity Centre for Automated and Transformative Transportation Systems (iCity-CATTS), as part of a coordinated action plan to prepare The Regional Municipality of York for the impacts of technology on transportation.

"Innovations in technology are revolutionizing the way we travel, and this partnership allows us access to industry experts and information not possible otherwise if we act alone," said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "This investment for our future gives the Region a unique opportunity to learn about potential impacts these changes can have on our transportation network, and will help inform policy and infrastructure decisions."

York Region has committed to funding the University of Toronto's iCity-CATTS Study at a cost of \$75,000 per year to a total of \$300,000 over four

The University of Toronto's iCity-CATTS is the first to study how "smart" transportation technologies such as automated vehicles and e-sharing will affect people's transportation choices, how businesses provide transportation as a service, and how cities should plan for those changes to achieve the best results for society.

This funding supports work the Region has already initiated to prepare for changes in transportation technology as well as initiatives approved in the 2016 Transportation Master Plan (TMP). Highlights include:

- Testing new technology in the field; an example is York Region Transit vehicles now communicating with traffic signals with the use of new advancements in Bluetooth technology.
- Integration of technology during land use and policy decisions.
- Creating partnerships to leverage shared resources in response to new

technology, such as through the Re- create more dynamic, inter-connected gion's partnership with Waze, a community-based traffic and navigation application company that provides real-time traffic information.

"The result of this study provides us with some of the answers we are searching for," said Richmond Hill Regional Councillor Vito Spatafora, chair of the Region's Transportation Services. "With autonomous vehicles getting closer to becoming a reality on our roads, we can take this information and

and efficient transportation systems with the increased potential for safety and cost savings."







Vince was known for his "special charisma," reliable nature and passion to help others. He helped seniors get to their medical appointments and was always humble.



#### Horticulture By John Arnott

And what a night it was, Monday, April 23, when the Nobleton-King City Horticultural Society/garden club (N-KCHS/gc) officially marked the 60th anniversary of its founding on a cold January night in 1958 with John Neate, a British ex-pat, as its first president.

New members, present members, past members and guests including those from nearby horticultural societies were all warmly welcomed to this gala occasion by co-presidents Lucille King and Kelly Lavis (both King City).

The festive evening began with Barbara O'Malley, director of District 15 of the Ontario Horticultural Association (OHA) bringing us greetings from this august provincial institution and commending the society for its 60 years of service to the local community and its continuing efforts to promote good horticultural practices that have a strong positive impact on the immediate environment.

Following director Susan Beharriell (Nobleton-King) using a cleverly constructed slide montage took us down memory lane to show what life was like back in 1958. Kelly Lavis then reminded us of the society's early brave beginnings under the guidance of St. Clair Tenant (Kleinburg) past president of the Ontario Horticultural Association but Director of District 15 at the time of the society's inception. Society past presidents Carol Field and Blair Day (both King City) reminisced about this vital community organization bringing attention to highlights and achievements of N-KCHS/gc over 60 years and reminded us that we're still growing strong. Past and present members were remembered and thanked for their efforts to keep the society going in good times and bad.

We were taken back to N-KCHS/gc's early days when meetings were held in the basement (before renovations) of the Nobleton United Church then moved to the Nobleton Community Hall for Saturday meetings and flower shows. With 185 members, 75 of which attended regularly both the upstairs and downstairs of the hall were often filled to overflowing with members, guests and flowers. It was also noted that the society enthusiastically participated in Nobleton's Victoria Day Parade – at first with members in 19th century dress riding in open cars and later with an artistically decorated floral float which will be reprised in this year's parade as part of our ongoing 60th anniversary celebrations. As well, mention was made that in 1989 St. Alban's Anglican Church in Nobleton

Thursday, May 3, 2018 - THE WEEKLY SENTINEL - 23 marked its 100th anniversary and as part of this celebration the society held Nobleton's first flower festival beautifully decorating the interior of the century church with floral arrangements. Not long afterwards St. Alban's "monastery garden" encouraged and supported by the society was started on the church grounds.

> We were reminded that in the late 1990s during the presidency of Carol Field N-KCHS/gc successfully hosted its first District 15 Annual General Meeting (AGM) with St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in Nobleton as the venue. District 15 of the OHA is comprised of 17 horticultural societies Schomberg south to Nobleton-King on down to Swansea, and east to Richmond Hill and Thornhill. In 2008 during the presidency of Kate Agosta (Bolton), the society once again with great success hosted District 15's AGM, this time at the King Campus of Seneca College on Dufferin St. to mark our golden year - 50 great years of growing.




