Would-be crooners, old school rockers, and even local politicians showed off their pipes – and even some, their dancing skills - at last week's lip-sync battle in support of York Region Victim Services.

The third annual event, held in King, had guests bring out their formal wear for an evening of food and drink before settling down for the night's main attraction.

RRJ Insurance President and COO Paul Martin, the primary sponsor of the event, said he was taken aback when he first heard of the Victim Services organization.

"At first I thought, 'we don't have much crime here!' But then you come to understand that there are a lot of underlying factors, and people whose story never comes to light ... as well as those that lose their houses in fires, and other tragedies."

Purpose of Public Meeting

To consider a Township initiated general zoning by-law amendment under Section 34 of the Planning Act regarding cannabis production facilities and sites. The purpose of the meeting is to provide information to, and receive comments from the public.

Purpose and Effect of Zoning By-law Review

The purpose of the general zoning by-law amendment is to update the Township's Zoning By-law(s), as amended, to (i) provide definitions related to cannabis production facilities and sites (ii) amend the "Rural General (RU1)", "General Industrial (M2)", and the "Employment General (E2)" zones to identify where cannabis production facilities and sites could be permitted, and (iii) address location requirements and lot and building standards for such facilities.

Appeal Procedure

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Township of King Council to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (LPAT). If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting, or make written submissions to the Township of King before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (LPAT) unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment.

How To Stay Informed

If you wish to be notified of the passing of the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment, you must make a written request to the Clerk of the Township of King, 2075 King Road, King City, ON L7B 1A1.

Additional Information

Cannabis Production Facilities are federally regulated by the "Access to Cannabis for Medical Purposes Regulations", which came into effect on August 24, 2016. An information report on this matter entitled "Planning Report P-2015-46: A review of Official Plan Policies and Zoning By-law Provisions Regarding the Location of Medical Marihuana Operation in King Township" was before Council as part of the Committee of the Whole agenda on December 14, 2015. A public meeting was held on October 16, 2016 to consider a draft by-law on medical marihuana production facilities; refer to Public Meeting Report P-2016-41. A working session of Council was recently held in relation to zoning for cannabis on April 23, 2018.

King campus receives sustainable emissions funding

Seneca College is set to be a leader in reducing greenhouse gas emissions in Ontario.

The King campus, along with Newmarket-Aurora MPP Chris Ballard, announced a \$4.7-million government investment into geothermal retrofit funding for the campus's Garriock Hall, the hub of the rural campus.

"These innovations will make lasting changes to our footprint on the climate, and replace decades-old systems in the campus," said Seneca College president David Agnew. "It will make a significant reduction in our greenhouse gas emissions."

The introduction of a natural gas heating plant will reduce the Hall's greenhouse gas emissions by more than 50 per cent, according to Agnew.

"Using all natural gas will be a welcome change to our Mother Earth."

Called the Greenhouse Gas Campus Retrofit Program, the change will be



implemented in the coming months, and is part of a long-term plan for the campus in terms of reducing their climate footprint.

The project pulled especially on Ballard's heartstrings, a native of King City. Ballard, who also reigns as the

Group plans to appeal decision to OMB

The North Gwillimbury Forest Alliance is appealing a decision that allows development on environmentally sensitive wetlands. According to the group, the Town of Georgina's new Official Plan illegally permits the DG Group to build a giant residential development on the North Gwillimbury Forest's wetlands. If this project proceeds, it will destroy the Paradise Beach-Island Grove Provincially Significant Wetland and drive a stake through the North Gwillimbury Forest.

"We must not allow this to happen," said Jack Gibbons, chair of NGFA. "We are asking the OMB to amend the Town's Official Plan to prohibit development on the North Gwillimbury Forest's wetlands."

Gibbons said they can win the appeal "because the law is on our side, but victory will not come cheap. We need your help to raise \$45,000 to pay our legal and expert witness fees before our OMB hearing commences on May 22."

"It was always a great place to hang out, and spend a day," said Ballard. "The property has always been a monument to the community, and environmentally, a strong part of my DNA, and I'm proud to say this is part of my ancestral home." The King campus is among the first school to receive funding from the Ontario government for retrofit programs, set up in 2014.

"Since then, campuses have decided to come on board, reducing greenhouse gas emissions from the buildings, while using the savings to improve the student experience," said Ballard.

"We want to create a long-term clean future for Ontario."

What are we doing to preserve our 'faith?'

Living vicariously through my eldest daughter's exploits, I pondered faith and culture recently.

Lexie just returned from a week-long volunteer mission trip to Guatemala. She likes to be fully immersed in the culture of every country she visits.

In Antigua, Guatemala, the cobblestone streets are a reminder of the past, of a culture with very deep roots. Antigua is a small city surrounded by volcanoes and known for its Spanish colonial buildings, many of them restored following a 1773 earthquake that ended Antigua's 200-year reign as Guatemala's colonial capital.

Notable architectural examples include baroque La Merced church, an integral part of the city's famous Semana Santa, a holy week with parades and rituals. Antigua was founded in 1542.

Can you imagine the tales those walls and streets could tell over the past 476 years?

strong Mayan and Spanish influences and continues to be defined as a contrast between poor Mayan villagers in the rural highlands, and the urbanized and relatively wealthy mestizos population that occupies the cities and surrounding agricultural plains.

Can you imagine sharing ancestry with the wonderful and mysterious Mayan civilization? The society developed by the Maya people is filled with historic milestones, including the only known fully developed writing system of the pre-Columbian Americas. The Mayans were also known for their art, architecture, mathematics, calendar, and astronomical system.

My newest passion is collecting ancient religious artifacts, including pendants, rings and crosses, dating back to the Roman, Byzantine and medieval periods. My fascination is that these bronze trinkets represented some fundamental human qualities. Life, 1,000plus years ago, was hard, often intolerable. All that average people had were their families and their faith. 

If you cancel the pipeline, you're damned, if you approve the pipeline you're damned. Trudeau is taking all of the heat right now for keeping his eye on the long game, trying to hold together The Pan-Canadian Framework on Clean Growth and Climate Change for the good of all Canadians well into the future.

With Saskatchewan and Manitoba resistant, and B.C. and Alberta locked in mortal combat, our Prime Minister is in a very difficult spot. Perhaps we should all just back off a little and give him room to negotiate. A new and improved National Energy Board is a good place to start. More than 2,000 streetlights in King Township will be converted from standard high-pressure sodium (HPS) types to light emitting diode (LED) ones starting this week in King City

Upgrading from HPS to LED streetlights will improve visibility, safety and reduce light pollution. LED lights also use significantly less power than HPS ones and align with King's Sustainability Plan.

At current hydro rates, it's estimated the cost will be paid back from reduced maintenance and power consumption in around nine years.

The first area of work will be King City. On site activity will consist of 2 crews of as many as 2 vehicles each. These vehicles will be stopping at each fixture location. Operating from a small bucket truck, the old fixture will be removed, new fixture installed and a new control node added to replace the old photocell.

The crews will then move to the communities of Nobleton and Schomberg

Following the initial sweep of the areas, the information regarding the condition of the existing poles will be evaluated and a second sweep of the areas will be conducted to address the approved correction of existing deficiencies (pole straightening or replacement.)

All field activity is to be completed by the end of September 2018.







Plans fitting like a puzzle in King City development

With the submission of the first draft plans of subdivision, the large-scale development near King City is progressing well.

King councillors received details of several subdivision plans as part of the King City North East Functional Servicing/Development Area Study (FS-DAS), a comprehensive plan (template) to bring cohesiveness to a massive tract of land involving six property owners.

Township staff brought councillors up to speed on the progress, and how the individual subdivisions are shaping up and interconnecting. The FS-DAS provides the foundation for the integration of development for this new "community area."

Given the magnitude – just over 1,000 units which will be home to more than 3,000 residents - it is like planning a village.

The King City East Landowners Group (KCELG) consists of various property owners in the study area, who have all come together in a coordinated effort.

Planner Gaspare Ritacca pointed out this gives all parties the ability to design their subdivisions as if there were no clear property lines or borders. It's a more fluid, effective and efficient way to plan.

Together, seven applications combine to create this huge development. Acorn Development plans 55 detached design with multiple access points, and

detached homes and 47 townhouses, along with a school site, parks, etc. Supco has the smallest project of seven residential lots. Kingsfield Estates proposes 43 lots, while King Green Developments plans 90 lots as well as a park. King Rocks Developments is looking at building 74 detached homes and 77 townhouses, with a park, buffer area and water management pond. Scouli Developments is aiming for 99 detaches homes, a park, natural heritage features, open space, etc.

While the applications are secparate, Township staff are looking at the whole big picture.

To date, there have been some comments and concerns raised regarding this development.

Residents are asking that Acorn be limited to a maximum of 40 lots. Others want pedestrian trails. There are concerns regarding the fate of a small portion of land earmarked as "future development."

Current restrictions limit building heights to three storeys and a gross density of 7 units per hectare.

Staff are asking that the number of cul-de-sacs be minimized. They would like to see an increase in the number of townhouses or semi-detached units. Staff also pointed out that both the Acorn and King Rocks properties have significant access limitations, which "may present a challenge to achieve a

Expansion approved by council

The large-scale expansion of Schomberg business was given the green light by King council recently.

Canadian Krown Dealers are planning to add a one-storey, 5,888-square-foot addition to the rear of their existing building on Proctor Road. It will include office and warehouse space, as well as a loading door, additional parking, a garbage enclosure, landscaping and stormwater management features.

Canadian Krown Dealers operates from 35 Magnum Drive, where an office, warehouse and manufacturing facility was established in 2008. The Proctor Road property was purchased to increase their warehousing space.

The property is already zoned industrial and the proposal is consistent with development in the area.

Staff supported the project, which also drew support from councillors. Councillor Bill Cober noted it's great see a local company thriving and expanding in the area.

homes, while Remcor is looking at 529 therefore, more difficult to rationalize here." a higher number of units within those areas."

The Parks, Recreation and Culture Department staff are working with the developers to identify the best size, location and distribution of parks.

Overall, staff noted this development does provide a significant connectivity throughout the different sections. A network of sidewalks, trails and multiuse paths are included.

Traffic impacts are also being reviewed. Staff are concerned about single access points in some areas, including the proposed extension of East Humber Drive. Staff have asked the applicants to explore revisions and make improvements.

Staff are also looking at the phasing of the development, to ensure it occurs in a comprehensive and orderly manner.

Overall, staff is pleased with the way this development is coming together, like puzzle pieces fitting together.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said it's "remarkable what we're trying to do

An East Humber Drive resident asked council to maintain the area's tree cover and plant as much foliage as possible.

Another resident is worried about traffic congestion this development will cause, noting it's difficult to get out of his area during peak morning rush hour.

Resident Judith Tenenbaum said this is an innovative, smart-growth approach and she praised staff. She's concerned about the potential use of the 2.4-acre future portion. She urged council to prohibit any form of commercial use on this site.

While the Acorn development wants 55 units, bot the Township and residents would prefer 40. Ritacca said while the overall densities are set, each property has its own unique "practical realities" that will limit the number of lots.

The review of the applications is ongoing and staff will report back to council as the process continues.

Contract for phase 2 of Nobleton sewers

The second stage of the Nobleton sewer project is moving forward.

King council awarded the \$6.45 million contract to North Rock Group Ltd. to carry out the work.

Township staff noted phase one of the construction project took more than five years to complete. The cost to build the infrastructure services has escalated substantially and staff believe if phase two was delayed any longer, prices would continue to rise.

The net cost to the Township for the work, including the optional area north of Sunset Drive on Russell Snider Drive, O'Neil Court and Kohoe Court, is pegged at \$4 million.

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

Partnership with ASK endorsed

Reflecting the major contributions of King's arts organization, the Township agreed to a more formal, long-term partnership.

Building on the terms of this initial one-year agreement, staff have worked collaboratively with ASK to create a new, longer-term partnership agreement that strives to create a lasting and mutually beneficial arrangement through which the municipality can leverage new opportunities for increasing the number and quality of arts-based programming in King.

"... a longer term partnership is a viable option for achieving several objectives that have been identified ... These objectives include ... developing and fostering strong community based partnerships and the continued strengthening of the Township's capacity to support the arts," staff wrote.

Festival support Shelburne Rotary's many charitable projects, including: Music and Memory Program at Dufferin Oaks Home for Seniors, BMX track at Greenwood Park in Shelburne, major contribution to the digital imaging department at the Headwaters Health Care Centre, breakfast clubs at local elementary schools, Centre Dufferin Robotics Club, Shelburne Girl Guides and Boy Scouts, a variety of minor sports, including hockey, baseball, gymnastics, lacrosse, and figure skating, Dufferin County Meals on Wheels, Hospice Dufferin,

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

This partnership enhances the capabilities of both parties, through sharing resources. The Township has committed to two "streams" of funding.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer stressed that ASK is an amazing volunteer organization and the Township benefits so much from their efforts. King is "exceedingly" lucky to have ASK as a partner.



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

Ontario increases cancer coverage for firefighters

Ontario is making it easier for firefighters in York Region, and across the province, to get the help and care they need by extending the presumption for entitlement to benefits to cervical, ovarian and penile cancers.

By adding the three cancers to the list of cancers presumed to be related to their work, firefighters and fire investigators will have greater access to healthcare and compensation. With the expanded presumption, once a firefighter is diagnosed with cervical, ovarian or penile cancer, the claims process for WSIB benefits will be expedited, and firefighters will not be required to prove a causal link between these cancers and a workplace exposure.

Claims related to cervical, ovarian and penile cancers will be retroactive to Jan. 1, 1960. This will apply to full-time, part-time and volunteer firefighters, firefighters employed by band councils and fire investigators.

"Firefighters are vital to keeping our communities safe from life-threatening dangers. Every day, they risk their health and their lives to protect us and our communities. In return, we must protect them. That's why the government has made it easier for firefighters and fire investigators to qualify for workplace safety and insurance benefits," said Labour Minister Kevin Flynn.

"Firefighters put their lives on the line daily to protect our communities. I am proud that our government recognizes the importance of supporting these brave men and women. The extension of coverage to more types of cancer will make it easier for our firefighters to get the help and care they need," added Dr. Helena Jaczek, MPP Oak Ridges-Markham.

"Presumptive legislation is very important to all of who serve as firefighters. I'm glad to see the list of presumed cancers expand," said Councillor and firefighter David Boyd.

In 2007, the Workplace Safety and Insurance Act (WSIA) was amended to create a statutory presumption for firefighters and fire investigators to get compensation for heart injuries and certain cancers without having to prove they are work-related.

In 2014, the Ontario government amended the Firefighter Regulation under the Workplace Safety and Insurance Act to add six cancers to the list of diseases that are work-related: multiple myeloma, testicular, breast, prostate, lung and skin cancer.

This amended regulation makes Ontario among the leaders in this area and Ontario's firefighters among the best protected in Canada.

There are about 450 fire departments in Ontario made up of about 11,000 fulltime firefighters, 19,000 volunteer firefighters and 200 part-time firefighters.

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

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

Canadian Premier League set to kick off in York Region

There is always room for more footy in the soccer hotbed of York Region.

That was the thought process of the York Sports and Entertainment organization when they announced last week the formation of "York 9 FC," the first of eight clubs that will kick off the inaugural Canadian Premier League season.

"I have spent my whole life in here. The time is right for York Region to develop its own identity," said Jim Brennan, part owner of the team and past president of the Aurora FC. "This is a booming area that is diverse, youthful and passionate about football. It is our goal to ensure that when York 9 FC steps on to the pitch, it will reflect what our community is all about."

Brennan joins local housing developer Carlo Baldassarra, owner of Grennpark Group, and businessman Preben Ganzhorn in creating the first club to bring together each municipality of the region under one emblem.

Aurora, East Gwillimbury, Georgina, King, Markham, Newmarket, Richmond Hill, Vaughan, and Whitchurch-Stouffville are all represented by the bars in York 9 FC's vibrant green emblem, which symbolizes York Region's forests. The charcoal grey and blackon-black close out the logo's colour pallet and represent the Black Creek River.

"Our club, York, is about the nine municipalities," said Brennan. "We want to create a culture where everyone in York Region looks and says, "This is our pro club.' If they still want to support Toronto FC, absolutely, of course, it's a fantastic club ... but we really want people in York Region to understand this club is all about the community and York 9 represents every single municipality."

The fledgling club is the first to debut its colours among the eight that are expected to compete in the first CPL season, joining Hamilton, Calgary, Winnipeg, and Halifax as established locations.

Edmonton and Ottawa are widely expected to be confirmed as locations in the next few weeks, while a group based in British Columbia have yet to choose a landing spot.

Expected to sit one level below the top-tier Major League Soccer on the North American system, CPL Chairman David Clanachan is hoping to fill a gap between youth sports and pro soccer without forcing athletes to go overseas.

"It's unconscionable to think a country the size of Canada, the 10th largest economy in the world, does not have a premier league," Clanachan said. "And

we're the only country in the top 10 that does not have a premier league."

According to Stats Canada, soccer is the fastest growing sport in the country, with more than 10 per cent of Canadians playing at least once a week.

York Region has close to 60,000 registered soccer players.

"The demand's here, the support's here," Brennan said. "The one thing we were missing in the region was actually having a pro club. And now we've been fortunate enough to bring one here."

York 9 will play their inaugural, and most likely second, seasons out of the York University Stadium, though Ganzhorn said the organization will be looking for a location in York Region to build a 12,000-15,000-seat stadium, similar to those in Europe or Central America.

"We've already had a bunch of meet-

S NEW book ings with different parties in the region," said Ganzhorn. "We've looked at some fantastic places where we can build stadiums, but it's a work in progress right now to figure out where we want to build, what the infrastructure

is like in the area."

Former Ironman champion releases new book

Lisa Bentley, a resident of Caledon and a former triathlete, has released her first book, which she hopes will help others carve out their own path to success.

Called "An Unlikely Champion," she described it as chronicling her path "from "no-talent" high school runner to champion triathlete, and "my transition from hiding my cystic fibrosis to seeing it as a gift that enables me to bring hope to others and meaning to my own career."

The book is not about winning races or Cystic Fibrosis (CF). "It is about finding a path to fulfillment even when every path looks impassable," and "having the courage to get out of your comfort zone, to never stop learning and to turn seemingly inevitable failure into victory."



Bentley, 49, said writing the book wasn't difficult, and felt amazing to write it. "I really had to look inside myself."

She competed on the Ironman race series since the late 1990s, winning 11 Ironman competitions from 2000 to 2007; her best was finishing third in 2006. She also won seven Ironman world championships, her highest placement being second in 2006.

"I've learned so many things through racing. As I evolved as an athlete, I had to learn tactics to be successful."

She represented Canada on multiple national teams and at the Pan American Games and was ranked top 5 in the world for a decade. She competed at the highest level despite having cystic fibrosis, a genetic lung disease resulting in chronic infections and limited lung capacity.

"I trained hard, I worked really hard and I managed my illness."

An Ironman Triathlon is a series of long-distance triathlon races, that consists of a 3.76 kilometer swim, then a 180.25 kilometer bicycle ride, followed by a 42.20 kilometer run, all without a break. It is often considered one of the most difficult one-day sporting events in the world. Most Ironman events have a limited time of 17 hours to complete the race.

She explained she would get up early, to ensure there no distractions, and with repetition, it was just like any other situation to prepare for. "Those are tactics of a high achiever."

A runner in high school and university, Bentley decided to do a triathlon when she met friends in university, and decided to do it as a social event. "It was the greatest thing."

She described them as fun, and helped improve her running.

"I thought it was just such a great way to stay fit, great way to meet nice people, and it still is." Athlete and now author Lisa Bentley with her newly published book An Unlikely Champion. The former Canadian triathlete won 11 Ironman competitions, despite being diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis.

Bentley said the triathlon is challenging, but "living in the moment is what it's all about. You don't want to think too far ahead. You want to anticipate things, but you really want to be completely enrolled with it."

For her, the best part was the run, but being at the end it is the hardest.

"So if you haven't been keeping on top of your nutrition or hydration, it'll always creep up on you on the run. Doesn't matter how good of a runner you are."

She said when she was diagnosed with CF in university, it was late, because usually you're typically diagnosed shortly after birth.

"It explained why I had been sick as a kid, it explained why I was always on antibiotics."

Bentley said that she looked at it as a benefit, and her "internal desire" is what pushed her to keep going, thinking of other diagnosed with CF and those who would love the chance to compete in the race.

She added that by not doing her best and not having a good time would "be against everything that I was raised to believe."

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

"Now as he (Yeshua) blessed them (his 11 closest associates), he withdrew from them and was carried up to heaven. (Luke24-51-52).

This event that is thought to have taken place on the Mount of Olives is

known to Christians as the Ascension almost hesitantly and neither of these and marks Yeshua's last moments on Earth.

The Anglican, Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic Churches observe this happening on a Thursday 40 days after Easter – this year Thursday, May 10, but most Protestant churches no longer observe it.

In the Anglican Church Ascensiontide once was a separate short season in the church year as was Whitsuntide that followed. Both are now part of the 50 day celebration of Easter.

In Yeshua's day the universe was seen as a rigid 3 layered construction – a flat Earth centred on Jerusalem with heaven above and the underworld beneath. The blue sky (or firmament) was seen as the underside of the heaven's floor which was made of flawless lapis lazuli, a semi-precious stone found principally in Afghanistan and a particular favourite of Egyptian pharaohs. Souls of the good ascended to this heavenly floor which was believed to support God's palace at the centre of His heavenly kingdom and no doubt Yeshua the "goodest of the good" went there, too.

Only the gospels accredited to St. Luke and St. Mark mention Yeshua's ascent to heaven and then very briefly

men were eye witnesses to the event. There is an account of the ascension at the beginning of the Book of Acts (of the Apostles) and many biblical historians claim this New Testament book along with St. Luke's Gospel were written many years after the events described therein by the same anonymous author who wasn't an eye witness and likely had no direct contact with anyone who was. Luke's account tells that Yeshua went with the 11 disciples to the outskirts of the village of Bethany and here the ascension took place. Is it then possible to assume his dear friends Lazarus who some claim is the "beloved disciple" with his sisters Mary and Martha all of whom lived in Bethany were witnesses as well?

And in Luke it strongly suggests Yeshua ascended at Easter the day of his resurrection not 40 days thereafter throwing into question accounts his appearances on Earth during the 40 day before the date of his traditional ascension!

Jerusalem Sunday – words to live by and an invitation. Our incumbent, Rev. Dr. Elizabeth reflected on the ascension last Sunday – a critical event in Christian belief.

The disciples returned from Bethany to Jerusalem with the inspiring story of Christ's being taken up into heaven still blessing them "... the promise of blessing was continuing as Jesus left them. Blessings continue. Jesus's blessings do not end. I wonder how many times the disciples must have retold the story of how Christ parted must have been a continual source of comfort and strength to the church," she said and reminded us that "God in Christ blesses us, when we bless one another."
