
TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King intends to consider an amending by-law under Section 36 of the Planning Act to remove the Holding (H) symbol for the lands described below. The earliest Council will consider passage of the by-law is the Council Meeting on July 9, 2018 at 6:00PM at the Township of King Council Chambers at 2075 King Road, King City.

The proposed amendment to the Zoning By-law submitted by Maidenstone Limited Partnership under Planning File Z-2017-10 concerns a vacant 0.75 hectare (1.86 acre) commercial parcel of land located at the south west corner of Highway 27 and Oliver Emmerson Avenue, in the Village of Nobleton.

The subject property is currently zoned "Commercial – General (C1-2(H)), Exception #2, Holding as shown on Schedule "A3" to Zoning By-law 2016-71, as amended. The removal of the Holding (H) symbol will permit the construction of three (3) one-storey buildings with a total gross floor area of 1436 square metres (15,460 sq.ft.). The proposal also includes two outdoor patio areas measuring a total of 81 square metres, a drive-thru, a loading space, parking areas and landscaped areas. The lifting of the Holding symbol can only be considered once a Site Plan has been approved and an evaluation of Ministry of Environment Guidelines for compatibility (noise) has been accepted for the proposed uses.

ANY PERSON may attend the Council Meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the removal of the Holding (H) symbol. If you wish to be notified of the decision of the approval authority, the Township of King, in respect of the amending by-law, you must make a written request to the Clerk of the Township of King.

# Koffler Reserve enters new phase of development

One of King's precious natural reserves is evolving.

The Koffler Scientific Reserve, owned by the University of Toronto, is growing to meet demands. King council recently approved a zoning amendment, giving the facility the green light to move ahead with its expansion plans.

The zoning change will allow education, research and overnight accommodation on the property, which is a popular spot for conservation research. The change also allows for a maximum number of five dwellings on the property.

Operators of the 487-acre parcel at Jokers Hill plan to build a new main building of 13,990 square feet. It would accommodate various preservation and conservation projects, as well as teaching and meeting space. It will also provide accommodation for employees, visiting faculty and students. There are plans for 20 small, three-season cabins equipped with electricity only.

The property is located within the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan Area and it's a valuable resource in the GTA. The ORMCP allows development and site alteration for conservation projects.

While the proposed construction team at Koffler.

would be considered major development, the applicants have conformed to all setbacks and guidelines.

King's Committee of Adjustment, in 2017, approved a variance to allow for the use, conversion and refurbishment of a former race barn on the property.

Township staff supported the plans and will continue to work with the applicant through the site plan application process to pinpoint the locations of the proposed development.

The facility will be serviced with treated well water from the existing onsite water treatment system. A new septic and waste management system will also be installed.

John Stinchcombe, director at Koffler, told councillors they've been working closely with Township staff and are mindful of all the setbacks and requirements.

"We've hit on a plan that upholds conservation plans and allows us to meet our education goals," he said.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer called the project "great," noting the it will grow and still safeguard our key natural features.

Councillor Avia Eek is "thrilled" the project is moving forward. "It's so beneficial from a scientific perspective," she said, praising Township staff and the

### Two men killed in collision

Investigators with the York Regional Police Major Collision Investigation Unit are seeking witnesses following a single vehicle, double fatal collision in the Township of King.

# All humans are cut from the same cloth

What if you found out you were related to everyone else on Earth?

What if you discovered that we are all

connected, by blood? We are!

Each and every one of us is related through our common ancestors - our primitive predecessors (Adam and Eve if you like), who lived in Ethiopia roughly 200,000 years ago.

Believe it or not, there are people who are trying to create the biggest family tree ever by examining this lineage!

We're at the top of the food chain, due to our larger brain with a particularly well-developed neocortex, prefrontal cortex and temporal lobes, all of which enable high levels of abstract reasoning, language, problem solving, social interaction, and culture through social learning. Humans use tools to a much higher degree than any other animal, and are the only extant species known to build fires and cook their food, to clothe themselves and create and use numerous technology and the arts.

I saw a piano-playing chicken on America's Got Talent, but I don't think we'll see a singing dolphin this season! But what exactly makes us human?

The human genome is the complete set of nucleic acid sequences for humans, encoded as DNA within the 23 chromosome pairs in cell nuclei and in a small DNA molecule found within will lead to advances in the diagnosis individual mitochondria. While there are significant differences among the genomes of human individuals (on the order of 0.1%), these are considerably smaller than the differences between that we're all quite unique, but share humans and their closest living relatives – the chimpanzees (approximately 4%) and bonobos.

# Contradictions over planned drive-through

Sometimes, your newspaper gives me a case of "cognitive dissonance" where government policies and public statements are concerned. I've been reading about the latest imbroglio over a Starbucks' drive-through in King City, including Cleve Mortelliti's excellent letter "Councillor points out planning rules for drive-through" (June 21). Great letter, Councillor Cleve. Very succinct.

I followed the comments about traffic engineers, traffic design standards laid out in the Ontario Traffic Manual, traffic safety standards, traffic movement, volume of daily vehicles, etc. So much detailed planning goes into getting residents into cars, on to roads, then into a vehicle line-up at a proposed drivethrough!

Still, I have to ask this question: "Why do politicians make so many public statements about compact walkable liveable communities while showing a distinct preference for the exact opposite?'

What is so walkable and liveable about adding drive-throughs? Drivethrough fast food outlets, drive-through banking, drive-through prescription pick-up at some drug stores, even drivethrough beer stores. I wonder what the bylaws will be for drive-through marijuana outlets located at LCBO stores?

Years ago, I would never have guessed

that people would want to waste so much time, idling in a line-up of cars and trucks, just to collect a drink and/or a boxed meal, or make a bank deposit, or pick up a prescription by driving from one huge asphalt-coated parking area to another. The more drive-through "conveniences," the larger and larger the paved parking areas grow (along with vehicle emissions), as assigned service lanes have to be built and dedicated to the line-up of cars. Add in the dedicated turning lanes off the main roads, and even off highways. In the end, the overall effect of this vehicle-focused design discourages physical exercise, such as walking.

Ever since Tim Hortons and McDonald's arrived in Schomberg, we are kept busy collecting cups, straws, containers, and clamshells from nearby ditches, recycling the small fraction that can be recycled. It seems some residents manage to drive to those outlets, collect their meals, then eat and finish them just in time to chuck all the containers out the window before they get home.

Civic consciousness? Not when environmental amnesia is in fashion. Why must municipal economic planning result in such social and environmental "baggage"?"

You can wade through the trail of "economic success" that litters far too many roadsides and ditches through- NOW because there is so little about it out the GTA. You can even see plastic that is "liveable." It is completely unbags, emptied of their contents, festooning tree branches. Where does all that waste come from?

It is so predictable and ubiquitous that it really needs to be addressed sustainable.

#### Collier takes the lead on rec. complex

King's new recreation complex project is moving ahead, with the hiring of the project manager.

King council confirmed that Collier Project Leaders Inc. will provide project management services for the new facility.

Hiring the firm "would be greatly beneficial to ensure the project stays on track through the initial design, and ultimately construction," staff noted.

The firm will help with budget control and procurement services and work with the prime consultant. It will coordinate other consultants and carry out regular reviews of the project scope and estimates.


The 2017-2018 had set aside \$525,000 for project management, but Collier came in with a total cost of \$344,966.40.

The large, multi-use recreation facility will be located on the southeast corner of Seneca College's King campus. The agreement between Seneca and King would see Seneca lease 25 acres to King for 60 years at a nominal rate.

More than 80 per cent of the \$32 million estimated cost to build the centre will be covered by developer contributions.

# Campaign creatively 'unmasks' brain injury

In honour of Brain Injury Awareness Month, throughout June, associations and community experts in the treatment of Traumatic Brain Injury display masks, created by survivors of TBI. Ontario Brain Injury Association (OBIA) has generously taken a lead in this initiative.

Ruth Wilcock, executive director of the Ontario Brain Injury Association, shed some light as to the scope of the challenge when she offered that "there are close to half a million Ontarians currently living with acquired brain injury (ABI)."

Survivors of car accidents, sports mishaps, and other injuries that can happen in an instant, all use art to express emotion and as a recovery tool.

I talked with one TBI survivor who created her mask with her daughter while discussing with her the new challenges they must face together on their journey to recovery.

Maria's mask presents a flurry of contrasts. Lips pointing downward, the extreme sadness she feels for the many losses that her brain injury presented her with. With new artistic endeavours, back to nature and back to spiritual roots activities, the lips become curled upwards. Sadness transforms into a new calm that searches for a different normal life. On her mask, the flowers of her gardening and painting passions transform the frown to a smile.

The cross in the centre of her forehead is a symbol of her steadfast faith. The darkness of the constant headaches and constant exhaustion due to lack of sleep is surrounded by a light of love

and caring. The light is symbolic of the professionals that ensure a steady recovery towards a productive life.

Maria's injury was the result of being rear-ended in an automobile accident

We hide what we can't do because we want to save face. Everyone wants to be intelligent; it is what our society judges us on, but when a brain injury challenges our intelligence, we struggle but don't want anybody to see. You can see a broken leg, you can see a broken wrist but you can't see an injured brain. You can't see how that changes a person.

People would say to Maria that she "looks ok."


"But, I was and I am not ok. I am not able to continue my courses. I am not able to do what I was able to do in the past. It is difficult but I am seeing some progress."

Maria praises the help she received from Nobleton Physiotherapy, OT Maria Paulsson, speech therapist Kindrey Roland and her PSW.

She enjoyed embracing the unmasking campaign because "I wanted to plant the seed of knowledge in our community's minds, that if they have a brain injury, they should take it seriously and visit not only their family doctor but a great team that helps their whole body return back to a new normal life. We are not alone and there are many experts that are willing to help."

Masks will be on display at Nobleton Physiotherapy during the month of June and available to take home free of charge (while supplies last) so you may paint with your kids. This is a family friendly healthy minds initiative.

#### Charges laid in multiple break-ins

Investigators with the York Regional Police #1 District Criminal Investigations Bureau have charged a 40- year-old man in connection with multiple break and enters in York Region.

#### Blended residential tax rate drops

King's residential tax rate has dropped this year by roughly 6.33%

King passed a 0% net levy when it passed its 2018 budget in February. It achieved this through a combination of identifying incremental sources of revenue; deferring personnel requirements, and a "temporary reliance" on the tax rate stabilization reserve, to offset the impacts of Bill 148.


Based on assessment role data provided by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation (MPAC), as well as impacts of maintaining revenue neutral tax ratios, the blended resident tax rate fell 6.33%. That doesn't mean taxes dropped, however. The median assessment increase was 6.85%. The blended commercial rate went up 1.64% and the blended industrial rate rose .95%. Both experienced double-digit assessment increases.

Staff pointed out that roughly 54% of property owners will see a real reduction in their total property tax burden, compared to 2017.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini observed that over the past six years, the average increase in the King portion of taxes was 1.13%, exclusive of assessment increases.

Staff noted that in accordance with the Regional decision to maintain the revenue neutral tax ratio policy, established in 2017, residential property owners in King can expect a little over 1% reduction in total taxation, as a direct result of maintaining this revenue neutrality.



One would find it easy to get caught up in the glitz and glamour of Polo for Heart, held at the Toronto Polo Club in Richmond Hill.

After all, the equestrian enthusiasts from across southern Ontario who converge on the grounds annually for a weekend of high-fashion, fine food, and the sport of kings are among the area's elite: though at its core, the main focus of attendees and volunteers alike is charity.

In fact, an incredible \$6-million plus has been raised over the event's 39 years to help fund heart disease and stroke treatment and research.

"It's helped us do all kinds of innovative work," said Susan Mullin, president and CEO of Southlake Regional Health Centre, the recipient of the funds. "We've had a couple of 'world-firsts' at Southlake, thanks to Polo for Heart in part."

The "firsts" Mullin refers to includes the first surgery of a ventricle inserted through the arm, as well as the first electronic monitor for a heart implanted in North America.

"This is an organization that has supported us for years, and we're just thrilled to partner with them ... it's such a natural partnership."

Historically dampened by bad weather conditions in recent years, this year's event went off without a hitch on Thursday evening, opening with the highly-anticipated Polo Under the Stars.

Saturday's agenda followed up with everything from a pair of intense polo matches, to a performance by the Canadian Cowgirls show team, to the traditional champagne divot stomp, where guests enter the field at halftime to smooth the field while enjoying a glass of bubbly.

# King's Christodoulou has bright future in Formula 1

Still years away from earning his licence to drive on a public road, Nico Christodoulou is already an expert behind the wheel on a track.

The 13-year-old King City native is already experiencing a thrill that many of-age drivers have yet to have.

"Just feeling the power when you step on the pedal, and firing down the straight-away," said Christodoulou to CBS Austin in January.

Christodoulou had the opportunity to work with a former Formula 1 driver turned development coach in Austin, site of the U.S. Grand Prix. Though just finishing Grade 7 at Villanova College in King, Christodoulou entered the track as no stranger to driving.

At the age of 11 in 2016, he put his name on the map in the competitive kart racing circuit in winning the Intrepid Kart scholarship at Goodwood Kartways, before also earning the titles of Pfaff Motorsports Junior Driver of the Day, Professional Racing Ontario's Most Improved Driver of the Year, and the Team FMR 2016 Rookie of the Year Award before the end of the calendar year.

It was in his second season of competitive kart racing when Christodoulou was scouted by the F1-affiliated coach, transitioning to the big leagues of car racing. Christodoulou jumped ahead of the pack, in a sport where drivers usually get

their start around the age of 18, though he was certainly capable. At the time, he was the number-one Briggs and Stratton Junior Lite driver in North America.

Starting his training last fall in a Star Mazda on Ontario tracks, it quickly became apparent that to really hone his skill, he needed to train in the United States.

"Currently, Nico goes to the USA for several days each month to train in his Formula 4 car," said his mother, Shelley. "The Formula 4 Championship series are held in several countries around the world, but there is no F4 series yet in Canada."

"Tracks here in Ontario are not only very few and far between, but are extremely cost prohibitive."

Formula 4, a racing series intended for junior drivers, is quite comparable to the top-end Formula 1. Cars reach speeds of up to 250 kilometres per hour.

"Driving an F4 car is exhilarating, but also physically taxing and drivers need to be in top physical form as well as mentally sharp and focused," said Mrs. Christodoulou.

His rise to F1 stardom in the United States has been meteoric: he currently holds the fourth fastest lap time ever recorded at Harris Hill Raceway in Texas, not far off the record of seasoned F1 driver, Max Papis.

While preparing to make his official F4 debut next season in the U.S. or Mexico Championship Series, Christodoulou has been filling his trophy case, picking up a win and two poles at Virginia International Raceway earlier this month.

## Lamaze takes his third win in a row at Spruce Meadows

Canadian Olympic Champion Eric Lamaze stood in the winner's circle for the third day in a row after claiming the \$385,000 CSI5\* 'Continental' Grand Prix riding Fine Lady 5 on Sunday, June 17, at the Spruce Meadows Continental tournament in Calgary.

Having won Friday night's \$131,600 Scotiabank Cup in spectacular fashion aboard Chacco Kid, Lamaze again won on Saturday, taking the \$70,200 Canadian Utilities Cup with new mount, Saura de Fondcombe, owned by Katharina Peter. His third win on Sunday came aboard Fine Lady 5, his individual bronze medal partner at the 2016 Rio Olympics.

Riding Fine Lady 5, the 15-year-old Hanoverian mare (Forsyth x Drosselklang II) his Torrey Pines Stable owns in partnership with Andy and Carlene Ziegler's Artisan Farms, Lamaze was one of seven riders to jump clear and qualify for the jump-off over a testing track set by course designer Guilherme Jorge of Brazil. In the same scenario as Friday night's Scotiabank Cup, Lamaze was chasing the jumpoff time posted by young American Lucy Deslauriers and Hester when he entered the ring. And in a repeat of Friday night, Lamaze was again faster, stopping the clock in 43.22 seconds compared to the 43.66 posted by Deslauriers.

Lamaze is using the Spruce Meadows Summer Series consisting of four weeks of CSI5\* competition, the highest level of show jumping competition sanctioned by the Federation Equestre International (FEI), to prepare for September's FEI World Equestrian Games in Tryon, NC. When Fine Lady 5 was originally purchased in the spring of 2014 from Germany's Holger Wulschner, she was not intended to be used for 1.60m grand prix competition.

"Fine Lady was purchased as a speed horse, as a 1.45m/1.50m ranking horse," explained Lamaze who is based in Wellington, FL, and Brussels, Belgium. "Prior to the Rio Olympics, we stepped her up and put her in some big competitions here at Spruce Meadows in the Summer Series and she just blossomed. Then we moved her up at Aachen and she won. At the Olympics I couldn't believe it; the final round was big and although I wouldn't say she jumped it easily – none of the horses jumped it easily – she jumped it. It was a very pleasant surprise.



#### Horticulture By John Arnott

"This is the plant I want and this is the place I want it to grow!"

Do you know someone who gardens with this flawed philosophy? I know a couple. They see a plant they like and have a place in the garden where they want it to grow and that's where it goes like it or not! And then of course when the plant performs poorly they are disappointed and feel cheated. What they don't take into consideration is that over millions of years nature has programmed plants to grow in certain places under certain conditions and like me plants must be all under the sign of Taurus and hate change!

Thus, a sun-loving plant must be planted where it gets plenty sun in order for it to thrive otherwise it grows

tall, spindly and weak trying to get the sun it needs, eventually dying off when it can't. And vice versa a plant designed to grow in shade will do poorly in full

As for soil, plants that need a soil that drains well like oriental poppies, yucca, and iris won't do well where the soil is constantly wet and plants that like damp feet like columbine astilbe and ligularia won't live long in the sandy soil that most plants of lily family love. Many plants grow well in average garden soil especially if it has had compost added to it such as composted cattle manure.

But heavy feeders such as peonies and daylilies, roses and rhubarb need a heavier clay like soil that has a liberal amount of compost added to it.

You would think the richer the soil the better the plant will perform but that is not always the case as annuals such as portulaca nasturtiums that do well in poor soil and many perennial plants like bleeding hearts, coreopsis, lupins, Shasta daisies, delphiniums and foxgloves that grow happily average garden soil will produce an abundance of green foliage but only a few blooms and these on long stems that soon flop.

A few years back a speaker at a

Schomberg Horticultural Society meeting I attended said if you want plants to grow well find out as much as you can about their native/natural habitat and duplicate the growing conditions found there as best you can in your own gar-

Two books I highly recommend and constantly use to help me put the right plant in the right place are "What Perennial Where" by Ron Lancaster published by Cavendish Books-Vancouver, and "Perfect Plants" by Roger Phillips and Martyn Rix published by Random House-New York.

He brings us peace and calm in grief or sorrow, takes away our worries, and for us death never has the final word. "When we don't know what to do, are afraid to move, remember Jesus's prayer - "not my will but thy will be done." Trust in God and you will find peace."

#### **Anglican Parish** By John Arnott

On an early, slowly clouding mild late spring day most of the of townsfolk had already gathered in the seating area of the local outdoor stadium but far from cheerful they were quiet and solemn as they waited for the somber event they were forced to witness to unfold. Then, out of the silence, a hushed murmur began to ripple through the gathered spectators when those nearest the open stadium's wide gate heard rather than saw the approach of the military. Short minutes later mounted officers resplendent in their light armour glinting silvery in last remnants of the morning sunshine, with scarlet cloaks moving slightly by the motion of their cadenced ride, arrived on scene. Following closely a small contingent of soldiers escorted a lone figure wearing a white woollen short sleeved knee length tunic and behind this little assemblage of pageantry came a muscled, big, grim faced man carrying a heavy wicked double edged sword.

After the officers dismounted, the most senior of them addressed the crowd with harsh words that ended in a cruel warning. Then the white clad man whose arms were tied behind his back was brought forward and the upper part of his tunic ripped open while the commanding officer read out the charges, his sharped edged voice easily reaching the sullen onlookers. Now at a signal the prisoner who refused a last minute chance to recant was ordered to his knees as the grim faced executioner took up his position raising his sword upward and bringing it swiftly and expertly down. And as blood splashed out in all directions the crush of unwilling spectators gasped as one at the horror.

The year, 305 AD ,the place, Verulamium in the Roman province of Britannia (England). The executed prisoner, a Roman officer called Albanus. The crime, giving shelter in his home to a fleeing Christian refugee and helping him escape the persecution of Christians during the reign of Emperor Diocletian.

There are many more questions than answers about this early Christian who is Britain's first known martyr.

In the early 1600s a group of Jesuits, known as the Bollandists after their founder Jean Bollandus, headquartered in what is now Belgium researched, studied and recorded the lives of Christian saints. They, because of their exemplary research skills, excellent reputation and high connections, were able to gain access to private or previous unknown or forgotten documents as well as unearth some long thought lost records. The Romans were noted for their exceptionally good record keeping. And thus were able to prove the actual existence of many ancient Christian saints including St. Al-

As near as we can tell St. Alban was martyred on June 22, 305 AD. And so this past Sunday morning June 24 the Anglican Parish of Lloydtown marked his martyrdom in story, prayer and song during the regular Holy Communion services at 9:30 a.m. in Christ Church, Kettleby and again at 11:15 a.m. in St. Mary Magdalene's in Schomberg - sadly his namesake church in Nobleton closed in 2013.




