Arrests made in illegal marijuana grow operation in King Township

Police have made a major bust after discovering an illegal marijuana grow op in King.

Investigators with the York Regional Police Organized Crime Bureau - Guns, Gangs and Drug Enforcement Unit executed a search warrant at a cannabis grow operation in King and seized 635 pounds of harvested cannabis and more than 4,000 plants, totalling a street value of \$6.5 million.

On July 26, York Regional Police officers were assisting Township of King Bylaw, Region of York Public Health and Township of King Fire and Emergency Services with a safety inspection of a property located at 570 Strawberry Lane, following complaints from the community. During the inspection, a large-scale cannabis grow operation was discovered. Further investigation revealed that there were three Health Canada licences in place that allowed for each licence holder or their designate to grow a total of 875 plants on their behalf for medical purposes.

On July 27, a search warrant was executed on the property, which included a house and 22 greenhouses. It was discovered the number of plants far exceeded the limit permitted by the licences and the cannabis was being grown in an unregulated, illegal and unsafe manner, with no quality control, environmental considerations or security measures. Two men who were maintaining the plants were charged.

"This criminal enterprise was operating well in excess of Health Canada authorizations to grow cannabis for medical purposes," said Chief Eric Jolliffe. "Over and above the community safety risks associated to unsafe wiring and the use of chemicals, all too often, police are identifying personal and designated production licence holders that are growing

Health Canada authorizations. The Trafficking and Produce Marihuana. product is then diverted to the illicit market by organized crime groups to supply illegal dispensaries, export outside of Canada and be trafficked in our local communities."

Police charged Samkeo Vanvilay, 43, of Laval, Quebec and Chi Chung Phan, 36, of Montreal, with Possession of Marihuana for the Purpose of

The investigation is ongoing.



King makes top 20 in best places to live in Canada

The secret is out!

King is one of the best places to live in all of Canada.

A survey released by MoneySense magazine revealed that half of the 50 best places to live in the country are in Ontario.

The overall winner is Oakville, thanks to its rich and growing diversity. King ranked 18th overall, moving up

Data in the article said King's median household income was \$110,818 and the average household net worth was roughly \$2,655,435. The low crime rate and abundance of family doctors make it attractive.

King placed 4th as one of the best places to live for new Canadians. This ranking is based on the low unemployment rate, apartment rental and diversity. They survey indicates that 25% of King's population speaks a first language other than English or French.

"Top in York Region and in my heart!" exclaimed Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "Nice to see that King is getting its recognition it deserves as we have flown below the radar."



Reader wants chair elected

The following letter, to Premier Doug Ford and King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce, was submitted to the King Weekly Sentinel.

I'm writing to express my strong opposition to the announced canceling of the direct vote for regional chairs in York Region, Peel, Niagara and Muskoka while allowing the continued direct voting of regional chairs in all other Ontario regional jurisdictions.

I am a long-time resident of King Township who takes an active interest and role in municipal elections. I believe strongly in the opportunity for citizens to freely vote for significant government representatives that impact municipalities.

I very much support and welcome the opportunity to be able to consider the various candidates and cast a vote for the position of regional chair in York Region for the very first time. Over 700,000 voters in York Region are about to lose this democratic privilege should you carry through with the legislation to cancel the direct vote of regional chairs in the four identified regions.

The role of regional chair in York Region has a salary of over \$200K paid for from public tax dollars. The York Region Council is responsible for a budget well over \$2 billion. The position of chair provides significant leadership and influence over the regional council. There needs to be accountability to taxpayers and citizens.

This is a regressive move on the part of the Ontario government, and further disengages citizens from the political process and elections. This is also an untimely and disruptive move right in the midst of an electoral process which has been underway with set and understood parameters and rules for three months, since May 1, 2018.

I urge you to retain the direct vote of regional chairs in all regional governments across Ontario, otherwise we will have unequal voting rights in Ontario and a double standard from region-to-region.

Cleve Mortelliti seeks re-election in Ward 1

A 12-year veteran on King council wants to keep his seat.

Cleve Mortelliti knows full well it's hard to please everyone. But his three terms on council have taught him a lot.

"The most you can do is listen, empathize, and do your best to solve problems for people as individuals and for the municipality as a whole," he said. "And you need to do it with respect, understanding and empathy for your council colleagues and staff, because vou can only get things done when you work together as a team."

That cohesiveness is what's kept things rolling along in King.

After 12 years in the trenches, Mortelliti said he's helped get things done and improve the quality of life in Ward 1.

Mortelliti shares some local pride, following the ranking of King by MoneySense magazine as one of the best places to live in Canada.

The life-long King City resident has seen history unfold in King. His family has been entrenched in the community and local sports for many years.

Cleve himself coached kids in the King City Hockey Association from 1988-1992. From 2003-2004 he served on the King City Citizens Advisory Committee - a committee of council that was struck to help grapple with and prepare for the development wave that was coming. He also served on the King Heritage Committee and was given the distinction of honourary member.

"King City is where I grew up, and it's where my kids are growing up, and it's where I pay taxes just like everyone else. This place is in my heart and bones, and I love it."

Backed by more than 30 years of experience in civil engineering profession, he even worked for two years in the Township of King's engineering department from 2004-2006. He's currently director of communications and operations at R.J. Burnside and Associates, a well-established Canadian multi-disciplinary engineering firm in Ontario.

Mortelliti is guided by both his heart and his professional experience.

"When you grow up in a place you become rooted it in, which makes change really hard to accept - and some of that change has truly pained

"When I see an opportunity that would help my constituents, I use my professional experience and professional contacts to help make it hap-

He pointed to the temporary construction access he negotiated to keep construction vehicles off of East Hum-

"When something crops up that I know most of my constituents hate. (like severances in existing mature subdivisions), I use my professional experience and consult my contacts in the industry to strategize a defence, along with strong, proactive messaging."

He's been adamant that he does not support severances in existing subdivisions.

When residents on Dew Street opposed the new subdivision at Dew and King Blvd., he called several stakeholder meetings to strategize how to

'Knowing it would be very difficult if not impossible to stop, we rolled up our sleeves and brainstormed how to make it better. With the input of the community, he then redrew the draft plan to lower the density by 35%, and turned the street into a cul-de-sac to mitigate traffic impacts on the existing neighborhood. After this alternative was presented to the developer, it was adopted and built.

"And when an application for a change of use was made that threatened the quality of life for residents in Snowball, I have no compunction about having voted against staff recommendations.

"Some battles you win, and some you lose, but never without having tried. People can be passionate in their beliefs, but not until you walk in the shoes of a councillor for a few years will you ever truly understand what you can and cannot do."

He said it's all about representing, problem solving, and leading, within the confines of provincial legislative framework. Municipalities are creatures of the Province. The previous Liberal government demonstrated that when the forced the Peaker Plant into King Township, and the new PC

government just demonstrated that by slashing Toronto council in half, and by eliminating the direct election of regional chairs. What powers the provincial government gives municipalities, they can take away at a moment's notice, he pointed out.

Over the years, Mortelliti has learned that being a local councillor is not about pleasing everyone.

"It's about listening to everyone, empathizing, and searching for reasonable, do-able solutions that benefit the Township as a whole. And there are always limitations to what you can do – limiting factors that prevent you from doing what you want to do."

"How many of you run your own company? How many of you manage people in the work place? How many of you manage staff in a unionized environment? Think about that for a while, and then let's chat.

"Let's all continue to work together, find the common ground, and work toward solutions."








New priest installed



Ontario launches constitutional challenge to carbon tax

The Government of Ontario announced the next step in its fight to defend the people of Ontario from the federal government's plan to impose a "punishing new carbon tax on Ontario families and businesses."

Minister of Environment, Conservation and Parks Rod Phillips and Attorney General Caroline Mulroney announced that the government will take immediate steps to challenge the constitutionality of the federal government's carbon tax at the Ontario Court of Appeal.

"During the election campaign we made a clear promise to the people of

Ontario that we would use every tool at our disposal to fight the federal government's plan to impose a carbon tax on Ontario families and businesses," said Phillips. "We are keeping our promise."

Ontario's position in court will be that the federal Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act imposes an unconstitutional tax on Ontarians.

The decision to commence a reference to the Ontario Court of Appeal is in addition to the decision announced by Premier Doug Ford last month to intervene in the Government of Saskatchewan's reference also challenging the federal carbon tax.

King has healthy DC reserves







Annual bee count is now on

The 3rd annual "Great Canadian Bumble Bee Count" is on. The "Bumble Bee Count app" facilitates photographing, identifying and locating bumble bees right across the country. For those using a camera, Friends of the Earth's Census Cards

"Last year we (Friends of the Earth) received more than 2,500 beautiful photos and descriptions of bumble bees from all across the country," said Beatrice Olivastri, CEO Friends of the Earth Canada. "With the launch of our new "Bumble Bee Count app" we're hoping to receive even more in 2018."

More than two-thirds of the food crops we depend on benefit from pollination by native bees, honey bees and other pollinators. Bumble bees are especially important - they are capable of buzz pollination making them particularly effective pollinators for certain crops and flowers - including blueberries and tomatoes.

"Bees are facing the same climate challenges you and I face - from heat waves to fires and floods," said Olivastri. "Add that to exposure to neonic pesticides, habitat loss and pathogen spillover from domesticated bumble bees and Canada's wild bees are under growing pressures to just survive."

Photos and observations from the Great Canadian Bumble Bee Count help signal changes in how bumble bees are dealing with these issues.

The Rusty-patched Bumble Bee, once abundant in southern Ontario, is now almost extinct and officially designated as endangered. On advice from scientists, the federal government has designated four more native bees for protection under the Species at Risk Act. Once abundant across Canada, the Yellow-banded Bumble Bee is considered at risk. It has declined in southern Canada by at least 34%. Scientists report pesticide use, habitat loss, climate change and pathogen spillover from managed bumble bees all contribute to this decline.

"Wild, native bees are our most important pollinators," said John Bennett,

senior policy advisor, Friends of the Earth. "We want Canadians to be just as familiar with Yellow-banded bumble bees as they are with Monarch butterflies."

There are over 800 confirmed species of wild native bees in Canada with little proper monitoring.


How can you work in such a sad place?

Kids and canines combine for Seneca literacy program

As part of a child's mental growth and stimulation, it comes as no surprise to see a parent read to their child.

But what about the child reading to their pet?

This is the idea behind a joint venture between Seneca College's King Observations Lab Teaching School (KOLTS) child care and Vet Assistant programs at King campus, bringing child and animal together in an investment in literacy and socialization.

"As the (kindergarten) teacher at KOLTS, I often arranged visits with the children to the Animal Health Centre," said Fran Defilippis, an educator with the program. "In 2016 I came across an article where school age children were reading to animals in shelters to socialize the animals and support literacy."

"I was inspired!"

A staple program within the Seneca College itinerary since 1974, the KOLTS program provides those within the Early Childhood Education program with a lab-style facility to find and promote beneficial methods to improve a child's development.

When it comes to meeting with the animals, Defilippis said the benefits are "numerous."

"The most evident is the building of language and literacy skills through reading to the animals, writing letters to the animals, drawing pictures for the animals and sharing their animal experiences with others," said Defilippis. "This can lead to inquiry about an animal, what breed they are, why they are different colours

More importantly, Defilippis said it gives the child "an outlet to express feelings, and take leadership roles as mentors for nervous peers," a practice that could reduce stress and increase confidence.

Visiting with the animals weekly, the children bring along a favourite book to share. However, given their young age and the often lack of social skills from the animals in the program, Defilippis said it is important for the child and animal to develop a relationship beforehand: something they work on with the help of Sarah Carnegie, the coordinator of the Vet Assistant program.

Carnegie, whose daughter Mabel attends KOLTS day care, said she "jumped on

the bandwagon" as soon as Defilippis mentioned the idea.

through the children's families.

"The benefit of this initiative is mutual," said Carnegie. "The animals, as do the kids, love the interaction and socialization which ultimately helps the animals to become more adoptable. Some of the more introverted animals become a little less so over time."

Working with animals looking for a home, the interaction with children can be beneficial to the animal adapting to an eventual family life.

"Teaching children the love and respect for animals that our Animal Health Programs fosters is a rewarding experience for all involved," said Carnegie, who added the program also intends to provide some possible homes for the animals

While cats and dogs may initially come to mind on the topic of adoption, the Vet Assistant program provides a variety of animals for the children to interact with and read to, including rodents, sheep, and horses.

Carnegie added that all animals in the program come from highly accredited

"The dogs and cats come from local shelters. The program works very hard to ensure that all animals are adopted to a loving, forever home and has an Adoption Club which regularly features our Animals available for adoption on Seneca's social media links."

Core Athletics rooftop track the first in Canada

The sky is the limit at Core Athletics.

The state-of-the-art fitness club in King City has officially unveiled its new rooftop track and workout facility, the first of its kind in Canada.

"It's something we just came up with when designing the facility," said Mary Triano, owner of Core Athletics. "Our winters are so long, that we figured it would be nice to be working outside when you can."

Inspired by her own experience with outdoor boot camps and training sessions, the fresh air would always do the body well, yet they still lacked the professional atmosphere of a proper workout facility.

"It would often be in places like parking lots, where you have to move when a car comes, or it's dirty ... we wanted to give people the opportunity to work out in a proper facility, but still with the open air."

The building was designed with the rooftop track in mind from the start, with special flooring installed to accommodate for the plush turf that would

soon serve as the track's surface.

The club opened last fall, but Triano had to wait until May for her rooftop vision to begin coming to fruition, opening last month to serve the club's members.

Similar to the bevy of classes offered inside the facility, members have the chance to take in the same workouts on the roof.

"We do the majority of our classes outside as well," said Triano. "We have the rooftop yoga, we do boot camp out there, Pilates ... the only classes that we don't are spin, and the TRX," which require equipment only available indoors.

"The more classes we do outdoors, the better."

This motto seems to have boded well with the club's members, of whom Triano said have given plenty of positive feedback.

"The members all love it. There are a lot of runners that love it as well, especially those that can't run on cement any more."

The turf track gives support that running on a hard surface cannot, which Triano said can be hard on a

runner's hips.

"Because we use all turf, instead of rubber for the track, it gives the runner padding for a nice, cushy feeling beneath their feet. It's therapeutic."

Designed with the short summers, and long, long winters in mind, Triano is hoping the all-turf facility will be able to withstand the conditions as late into the year as possible.

"As long as we can keep it open before it actually snows," said Triano.

"We're hoping to keep it open right up until the first snowfall."

Located at the King's Ridge Marketplace at King and Dufferin, the facility also boasts state-of-the-art cardio, strengthening and functional training equipment, free weights, infrared saunas and the Core Café.







Interestingly, early Christians believed that as Yeshua moved ahead of his companions he shed his robes and it was from within his naked body that dazzling white light radiated out as he stood with his heavenly visitors. Modern American artist Edward Knippers strikingly recreates this scene in his controversial painting "Transfiguration."

St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that "clothes don't make the man" and God takes no notice of how fashionable or shabby they are, but instead sees our true souls enrobed in our nakedness just as he saw Yeshua's that day on that hillside.

This past Sunday, Aug. 5 many Christians worldwide observed with great reverence this ancient holy Transfiguration event – the actual date of being Aug. 6.

The word transfiguration like metamorphosis means to change from one state into another more beautiful one and in this case from an ordinary earthly human state to an extra ordinary

state that is both spiritual and beauti-

But why then were only 3 of his disciples present to see this transformation instead of all 12? The Bible doesn't give an answer but according to Jewish law set out in Deuteronomy in the Jewish writings of the Bible called the Old Testament, things witnessed by 3 reliable adults were deemed to be true. As well Yeshua made it clear that he wanted to keep this happening secret until after his resurrection.

Christ's wonderful. albeit brief, change into the mystic spiritual showing his 3 companions who he really is and just a glimpse into his future glory was over in minutes as mist shrouded the participants clearing away as quickly as it came with everything now as it was before.

All this is recorded in the New testament gospels accredited to St. Mark. St. Matthew and St. Luke but not actually written by them but by unnamed others almost 100 years later. But there is no mention of it the much edited St. John's gospel and he was the only gospel writer who was witness. Perhaps this is why some ask with reason did this transfiguration thing ever really take place?



Horticulture **By John Arnott**

I absolutely hate pulling out little biddy weeds and these are the worst.

They start off as tiny 2 leaved green sprouts which probably is the best time to pull them out but the time I hate!

So I decide to wait a few days until they're a little larger. Then I get busy going somewhere or doing something else and the biddies are forgotten. By the time they come back under my scrutiny again they're large and forming a ground cover lush and green especially in my front garden for all my neighbours to see!

Stellaria (star) media (mid-sized) referring to its very tiny delicate white flower, is better known as common chickweed and is thought to be the planet's most common weed found. According to authors France Royer and Richard Dickinson in their excellent book "Weeds of Canada," on all continents including Antarctica. They write that the plant which prefers shaded fertile soil is believed to have originated in Eurasia. But anywhere man has gone so has c. chickweed.

This annual, believe it or not, belongs to the pinks family and is a distant cousin of the carnation.

It is generally lies prostrate on the ground forming large mats where it grows unchecked. Its thin weak stems that don't lie flat can generally grow some 4 in./10 cm tall but taller, up to 10 in./25cm, if it must compete with other plants. Some of the c. chickweed in my garden forms only 6 in./15 cm ground mats with a few stems 4 in./10 cm tall before it again grabs my attention and

The delicate tiny barely measurable daisy like white flowers have 5 so deeply grooved round topped petals that they appear to be 10 surrounding barely visible reddish purple stamens-the pollen bearers. The tiny ovate or spoon shaped leaves grow in pairs opposite each other with the lower growing leaves held on petioles or stemlets that curiously have only a single row of whitish hairs. The upper leaves are stemless. The long thread like fibrous roots go deep in the soil and produce new growth when top foliage and flowers are cut or pulled off but just during the plants one growing

Each c. chickweed plant can produce 15,000 seed over its one-year lifespan, some of which will grow in the same season and produce their own seeds along with their parents! About 1/4 of the seeds can remain viable in the ground for 10 to 12 years. And can germinate in temperatures as low as 2 degrees C./35 degrees F.

From prehistory on humans have gathered or cultivated c. chickweed as food for themselves and forage for their livestock particularly poultry hence the plant's common name. And for that long this low growing plant has been used as an herbal medicine to treat skin ailments including mange as well as pulmonary (lung) disease and arthritis. Modern herbalists use chickweed because of its high iron content to treat anaemia.


