Accolades abound for Lecce as King office opens

The accolades flowed like pure spring water at the official opening of the King City office for King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce.

Constituents and municipal politicians from across York showed their support for their representative at Queen's Park.

King Mayor Steve Pellegrini told the crowd Lecce chose well when he picked the King City locale, noting it's roughly the geographic centre of the riding.

Vaughan Mayor Maurizio Bevilacqua said he's known Lecce for many years, working with him in Ottawa when Bevilacqua was MP (1988 through 2010). He said he has nothing but admiration for Lecce, noting in just a short time, he's risen in the ranks very quickly, earning several portfolios.

Lecce, he said, is "talented, dedicated and brings something to the table." Voter confidence in Lecce was well placed and "one of our own" has great potential,

the mayor said.

Peter Van Loan, retiring MP for York-Simcoe, noted this is one of the nicest constituency offices he's ever seen. He, too, worked with Lecce in Ottawa when Van Loan was House Leader under Stephen Harper.

Calling Lecce "level headed" and "sensible," Van Loan said constituents in King-Vaughan are "extremely fortunate" to have him as their MPP.

Lecce welcomed the crowd, noting the full house is a sign that people from all sides can come together for a common goal. In just a short time, Lecce has already helped constituents with their problems, and set precedents at Queen's Park.

"It's very rewarding when you can move the yard stick forward," he said. "My goal is to have the best customer service office in the GTA."

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

Voter Identification

Council opposes marijuana retail outlets, opts out of plan

While the rest of the country is saying "yes" to marijuana, King council is saying "no" to future retail outlets in the municipality.

Council approved a resolution Monday night, telling the Province that King "strongly opposes" private retail sale of cannabis in King, and that the municipality is opting out of permitting retail sale in the township.

"I don't want this in King," said Mayor Steve Pellegrini at the previous council meeting Sept. 10. "I want the province to know, not in King!"

When recreational cannabis use becomes legal Oct. 17, it will be made available through the Ontario Cannabis Store (OCS).

The provincial government is looking at a public retail model for the sale of recreational cannabis, which will be overseen by the Liquor Control Board. Queen's Park recently announced it will introduce new legislation that will allow a regulated private retail model, arriving in April 2019. The OCS will no longer be opening any stores, and will only be conducting online sales and distributing product to provincially licensed private retailers.

The province said municipalities will have a one-time window when they can choose to opt-out of permitting



physical cannabis retail stores in their boundaries. But municipalities can always opt back in at a later date.

Staff reported there are still many uncertainties in all of this. They did offer councillors three options on how to deal with zoning issues.

The mayor said the whole issue brings with it huge costs in enforcement. He pointed out that retail stores will become prime locations for illegal drug trafficking, where dealers can simply approach customers and offer a better price.

Resident Judith Tenenbaum supported the mayor's call, noting it's "totally inappropriate" to have retail outlets in King. "We don't need it." she said.

Traffic needs to be addressed!

Recently we had a fatal collision on Mill Road, where two men were killed! Mill Road was closed for many hours.

Last Tuesday, I came up from Etobicoke via Hwy. 27, which I survived until 4 kilometers out of Nobleton it also came to a standstill! I crept up and finally drove up the gravel on to the King Vaughan Road and came east over to Mill Road. King Vaughan Road is a winding section of road with a one lane Bailey bridge and there were numerous cars coming west.

At King Vaughan Road and Kipling there was a "Road Closed" sign. I drove through to Mill Road and home, although I was almost forced off the road by a tow truck in King Creek, speeding at least 80 km/h and throwing up gravel! Fortunately, I got into my driveway alive at 4.15 p.m.

At 4:30 p.m. sirens, two fire trucks and an ambulance from Nobleton. Already, there was a build up of traffic on Mill Road and minutes later YRP blocked King Road eastbound, so all traffic going northbound had to go towards Nobleton and all traffic going east bound had to go down Mill Road, and that included many, many transport trucks which continually travel King Road.

Many semi trucks had extreme difficulty turning off King Road on to Mill Road, in fact, at 8 p.m. one created a traffic problem for about 20 minutes trying to manoeuver the corner!

During the rush hour there were probably well in excess of 400 cars going northbound and southbound many cars but also a lot of commercial vehicles. Mill Road is a gravel road not warranted to this type of traffic!

These are serious traffic situations that have to be addressed by York Region and King Township. King Road, from Dufferin Street west to the Caledon Townline is a busy arterial road. Mill Road is being used as an access route for commuter traffic, which generally exceeds the established speed limit.

When are we going to address these issues?





Building on many accomplishments over the past term, David Boyd wants to continue as Ward 2 councillor.





Wi-Fi hotspots available for loan at the King library

In celebration of Canadian Library month, King Township residents can now check out one of 12 Rogers Wi-Fi hotspots from their local KTPL branch, giving them unlimited Internet access for the one-week loan period.

A Wi-Fi hotspot is a piece of equipment you can use to connect a mobile-enabled device, such as a laptop, smart phone or tablet, to the Internet. The hotspot is portable, so you can connect from almost anywhere, be it at home, on the bus or in the park.

Among other things, local library facilities serve as community hubs, where patrons have the choice of using the library's in-house computers or their personal devices to access the Internet to look for jobs, check email, study, fill out government forms, stream video or play games. The need for reliable and affordable Internet connectivity across the Township of King has been identified as a priority by council and the library is pleased to support this effort.

"A key tenant of public libraries is to provide access to information. In a 21st century context, that includes the Internet, making connectivity an essential service. So in keeping with our broader mandate, the Library now circulates Wi-Fi hotspots to ensure our residents have more options when trying to get online," said Rona O'Banion KTPL's chief executive officer.

Residents are now able to borrow or place requests for the hotspots using the library's online catalogue at kinglibrary.ca. As with other material any late returns will be subject to overdue fines.

The wireless devices are available to anyone 18 years or older with a King Township Public Library card.

Over the past 26 years, CDS has raised \$514,323 for the Terry Fox Foundation.







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
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
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Geoff Simpson eyes Ward 3 council seat

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

Karate school given exclusive use of hall

A Nobleton karate school will continue to be an exclusive tenant of the Nobleton Community Hall.

King council granted the KaiShin Karate School (aka Glitz International Corporation) exclusive use of the upper level of the hall.

The school was first given exclusive use in 2015 and asked for a three-year ex-

Glitz, staff noted, has proven itself to be "a fine tenant and is providing a service to the residents of Nobleton."

The hall is primarily used by two organizations – the Nobleton Lions Club and the Nobleton and King City Garden Club. Additionally, the hall is rented for miscellaneous events, a dozen or so times per year.

Summer camps also use the facility during operating months and contribute a large portion of the revenue to the facility.

Under the pact, Glitz has exclusive access to the 2,300-square-foot upper level for their karate classes. In return, Glitz pays the Township \$9.83 per square foot, or roughly \$22,659 in 2018, plus 50% of the utility costs.

They will also be allowed to place signage on the building for their school.

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

Jim Brennan may be on the sidelines when York 9 FC makes its Canadian Premier League debut in 2019, but on Saturday, he took to the field one more time in support of a good cause.

The former Canadian national team member, and current head coach of York 9 FC was joined by past teammates and CPL executives in a friendly against the Aurora Soccer Club on Saturday, in support of Southlake Foundation and the Aurora Food Pantry.

Supporters young and old waved their banners as Brennan and his squad showed off some new white and green kits, in a match they won 4-1.

"We need some experienced players, we need some youth, we need some guys that can lead by example, that can take control in the dressing room," said Brennan.

Even positionally, the gates are wide open for any hopeful to pull on the green and black.

"You need utility players as well, guys that can play all over the park in different positions."

For Brennan, he brings experience to the position in filling in a roster from scratch. He did so in 2016 in building the AYSC's branch of the semi-pro Leaguel Ontario squad, the Aurora FC, as the executive director.

Yet on a larger scale, and representing not just Aurora but the nine municipalities of York Region, the grandiose task allows a much larger and more widespread pool of players to choose from: something he thinks will benefit the program.

"I think a lot of times, when a coach inherits a team and he wants to play a certain formation, he can't because the players can't adjust to it and he's got to take a little bit of time in order to move players on and get the players he wants," Brennan said. "We're in a good situation here where we can really build our squad to suit our style of play and our system."

The hundreds in the stands on Saturday may have caught a glimpse of the type of play Brennan hopes to bring to the team's inaugural season, opting to prefer to fill his roster down the middle of the field when they take to the pitch in 2019.

Though you can guarantee he and his staff are doing their research daily to find their best fit, regardless of position.

"The key to success is a difficult one, and everybody has to find the right ingredients that are going to make them successful. And it's not an easy task in world football."

"It's hard to win and it's hard to get your systems right, your formations right, and get the right players in place, so we've got a hard task ahead of us but we're going to make sure we're very thorough in what we do and make sure we get the right players in."

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Coyle tops at show jumping tournament

Daniel Coyle of Ireland won all three phases of Caledon Cup competition at the CSI2* Canadian Show Jumping Tournament running Sept. 19 to 23 at the Caledon Equestrian Park in Cale-

With wins in the first two events partnered with Farrel, Coyle stole the show on Sunday by riding Legacy to victory in Sunday's \$50,000 Caledon Cup – Phase Three, presented by HEP, Aviva Insurance, and Edge Mutual Insurance. A total of 11 horse and rider combinations qualified for the jump-off after successfully negotiating the firstround track set by Portuguese course designer, Bernardo Cabral.

As the second rider to return for the jump-off, Coyle laid down a clear round in a time of 38.60 seconds that would prove unbeatable. Veronica Bot of Burlington, came the closest to dethroning Coyle, but was still off the pace with a time 39.19 seconds to finish second riding Cool Down 3, an 11-year-old Hanoverian gelding (Chacco-Blue x Lysander).

Canadian Olympian Beth Under-

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hill of Schomberg, gave it her best shot clear skies, great crowds, and an exwith Sandy Lupton's 11-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding, Count Me In, with a jump-off time of 39.44 seconds placing the pair third in the final standings. Underhill was also awarded a \$1,000 bonus by HEP as the highest-placed Bot on her consistency in claiming the rider sporting a HEP-branded saddle

Mac Cone of King City, riding Zaia di san Giovanni, finished 9th.

"I was second to go in the jump-off, which isn't the best place to be when there are 11 in it," said Coyle, 23 of his performance with Legacy, an eightyear-old Zangersheide mare (Chippendale Z x Bon Ami) owned by Ariel Grange. "I hadn't really gone that fast with her all week and today I went a bit faster. She's an amazing horse. Ariel just bought her after Florida this year. We know she's incredibly talented and to see her showing it in the ring today makes it even more real."

As for winning all three phases of the Caledon Cup on two different horses, Coyle noted: "My horses are incredible and I know them well. I have two good horses and if one doesn't' win, the other one usually does."

At the conclusion of all three phases, there was a tie in the points standings for the Caledon Cup. Using a format that rewards consistency of both horse and rider, Coyle riding Farrel, Bot with Cool Down 3, and Underhill with Count Me In had all accumulated a total of 40 points. When the tie was broken using class placings, 22-year-old Bot and Cool Down 3 were crowned the overall winners of the 2018 Caledon Cup.

"The Canadian Show Jumping Tournament is our grand finale for the outdoor season, and we were blessed with

citing jump-off," said Craig Collins of Equestrian Management Group (EMG), the organizing committee for equestrian events held at Caledon Equestrian Park. "Congratulations to Veronica Caledon Cup, and also to Sam Pegg for winning our newly-introduced \$5,000 bonus awarded to the top rider in open classes at the 1.35m-1.40m level throughout the season.

"We started off the season with a wind storm that caused a lot of damage which was tough, but we had great support from our customers the entire year," continued Collins. "That people made it a point to come to all of our events with a lot of horses was really special. Thanks to the support we received, we've been able to carry on and enjoy great sport throughout the season."

Collins also spoke to the legacy of hosting the equestrian events for the 2015 Pan American Games, which allows the Caledon Equestrian Park to stage top-level show jumping and other events in a spacious indoor arena. After jumping outside in the grand prix ring for the opening phase of the Caledon Cup on Thursday, competition moved inside on Friday night for the second

"The indoor arena is a wonderful part of the Pan Am legacy," said Collins. "Friday night was a riot! We had a tonne of people here and food trucks outside, all creating a great atmosphere. It makes for a great venue to be able to host that type of special evening."

Coyle noted that being based at Lothlorien Farm in nearby Cheltenham adds to the allure of competing at the Caledon Equestrian Park, saying, "There is a lot of comfort being here; you don't have to drive ten hours to get to the show and sleep in a hotel. The staff can go home at night and everyone is a little more relaxed. It's incredible to have a show facility this good on your back door."

With the passing of Lothlorien's founder, Susan Grange, almost a year ago, her daughter, Ariel, has continued the farm's operation.

"It was terrible to lose Sue, and it's incredible to have Ariel step into her shoes," said Coyle. "She obviously has a great love for the sport. I never feel any pressure from her as an owner. If we have a bad round, we figure out how we are going to go forward; we don't think about what happened before.

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




















Schomberg Community Run helps bring clean water for all

We run for sport. We run for fun. We run for exercise. We run for a cure and we run for a cause.

This Saturday, Sept. 29, residents from Schomberg and neighbouring communities will run (or walk) for clean water in indigenous communities in Ontario - specifically Pikangikum, as part of the Schomberg Country Run.

Why Pikangikum?

Pikangikum is a First Nations community in northwestern Ontario. It came to national attention after a wave of youth suicides prompted a group Toronto-based professionals to work with the Pikangikum elders and the school system as the Pikangikum Working Group (PWG). Together, they identified 12 priorities for the community. The first priority was to get a new school, which opened in the fall of 2016. The second is clean water.

Local minister for the Anglican Parish of Lloydtown, Rev. Sheilagh Ashworth, founded the Schomberg Country Run after learning of the youth crisis in Pikangikum.

"At that time, I remember thinking that community was about the same size in population as Schomberg, and I couldn't fathom the stark contrast. I wanted to understand the primary issue behind this sense of hopelessness," she said. "While the situation with the Canadian government and indigenous communities is very complex – from the Indian Act being administered by the federal and water being a provincial jurisdiction – as citizens, we can take a stand and make a difference for those in need. Pikangikum is an opportunity where we can make a difference."

Habitat for Humanity Manitoba has agreed to work with the Pikangikum community, as has the Anglican Church of Canada's Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF), the Mennonite Central Committee Ontario and Atlas Copco Mining Rock Excavation Technique Canada, according to a June 2018 Habitat News article.

Proceeds from the Schomberg Country Run are directed to the Pikangikum Clean Water Project through the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund and KAIROS, an ecumenical movement for ecological justice and human rights.

"We know for certain our effort with the Schomberg Country Run has been well received," added Rev. Ashworth. "So far, we have been able to accommodate the necessary plumbing and hardware for clean water and bathroom facilities for a number of homes in the Pikangikum community. While there is more to be done, it has been incredibly encouraging."

And he said to her "Hagar, Sarai's maid, whence camest thou?and whith-

er wilt thou go?"

This is the first recorded encounter we have of humans and those biblical beings known as angels.

Then what exactly are angels? Well, the St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that most Christians believe these spiritual beings that can take on human form are special servants of God who, among their many duties can on occasions interact with humans on his behalf.

These other world spirituals are not limited to the Abrahamic religion (Judaism, Christianity and Islam) but also are present in Buddhism Hinduism and Zoroastrianism (from which the idea of a guardian angel for each person originates).

Many believe angels walk among us unnoticed today!

Greek philosopher Aristotle talked about a prime mover, a force or Godlike creator who unmoving moved/ controlled everything in the universe and believed secondary movers, angel like forces, worked under this primary force.

Some ancient history scholars see the ancient Egyptian god Aten as equivalent to the Archangel Michael, while the god Aah is the Archangel Gabriel.

And Mercury the Roman messenger looking. The angel who wrestled with god could be identified with Gabriel as well.

The author of St. Matthew's Gospel, one of four accredited Gospels in the New Testament, writes that angels have much greater knowledge than humans but are certainly not omniscient. St. Augustine of Hippo says that angel is the name of the office these spirituals hold not of them personally!

The word "angel" meaning messenger comes from the Mycenaean Greek akero through the Persian angaros back to the classical Greek aggelos into the Latin angelus.

In today's world almost all angels are shown as young women with wings but women as angels is a Hollywood invention. And late medieval and Renaissance artists gave angels wings as an explanation of how they could get from heaven to Earth. Biblical angels all appear as wingless young men. Although there is no description of the angel who appeared to Hagar twice, this spiritual is referred to as two angels who came to Abraham's camp with an incognito God and later warned Abraham's nephew Lot to leave Sodom before its destruction. They are described as young men ordinarily dressed and ordinary

Jacob, along with Azrael who passed over the Hebrew homes in Egypt but brought death to Egyptian homes were male. As were the wingless angels in shining white who appeared at Yeshua's empty tomb at Easter.

Heavenly angels are said to have 7 leaders or archangels with Michael, who defeated the rebellious angels led by Lucifer/Satan banishing them from heaven, in charge of all. Gabriel is the messenger angel sent to tell Mary she was chosen to be mother of God's son and brought the Qur'an, the Muslim holy book, to Mohammad some 600 years later. These are the only 2 given a name in the Bible.

But tradition tells us others include archangel Raphael who will sound the trumpet from the rock/Temple Mount in Jerusalem on Judgement Day and Uriel, who guards the garden of Eden with his fiery sword.

This coming Saturday, Sept. 29 is St. Michael and All Angels Day. On the following Sunday morning Sept. 30 the Anglican Parish of Lloydtown will mark this occasion in words and song during Holy Communion at 9:30 a.m. in Christ Church, Kettleby Rd. mid way between Keele and Jane Streets.

King's historic tidbit

A small but vibrant Catholic community was established on Jane Street and the 16th Sideroad during the Great Depression, to provide homes and livelihoods for families on relief in Toronto.

Enough money was raised to provide each family a temporary home on a two-acre lot, and they were given seed for planting and fifty chickens. Two cows were provided for the community, the men worked together, and by the end of three months, the newcomers were self sufficient. Co-operation, barter, and community spirit were the cornerstones of happy, prosperous community and other Catholic families soon arrived.

Very few of the original families now remain, but the beautiful church built in 1960 continues to support its local Catholic community.



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
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
