## Development issues emerge at 2nd CCKT debate in Pottageville

Concerns about development and a need for affordable housing dominated the discussion at the second of two CCKT-sponsored political debates.

Concerned Citizens of King Township brought together eight candidates in Wards 2, 3, 4 and 6 at the Pottageville Lions hall for a lively discussion last Thursday. Growth, the relationship between developers and the Township, and the need for more affordable homes were discussed.

CCKT prepared two written questions, sent to candidates prior to the meeting.

The first asked who should take the lead in planning new subdivisions, and whether candidates can find solutions to housing needs.

Ward 6 candidate Roman Dyriw said council and staff have done a good job preserving greenspace and allowing development. Council should look at the long-term continuity of all the development and collaborate with developers who have a knowledge of the marketplace. While the trend is for luxury homes, the model seems to be working since they are all selling out.

Incumbent Avia Eek said King is taking the lead, implementing various policies and using our own Sustainability Plan as a guide. She admitted there's a need for a variety of housing stock. Just as the ICSP relied on public input, so too does the Official Plan review, which will contain valuable tools for future direction. She noted York Region has created a committee that is reviewing affordable housing across the region.

Incumbent Ward 4 Councillor Bill Cober said the planning process is complex and the municipality has to follow the rules laid out in the King's OP, York's OP and the provincial Places to Growth legislation. Council does set a clear vision and diversified housing options have started to appear in King. It's a matter of meeting both community needs and market demands.

Candidate Mary Asselstine said intensification is spelled out in urban areas and citizens are telling her they want more affordable homes. The trick is finding a balance and there needs to more dialogue.

Ward 2 candidate Sherry Draisey

said she wants to remain in King in the coming years. Along with offering condos, we have to solve our transportation problems and provide better transit options for seniors as well.

Incumbent David Boyd admitted a broader housing stock is integral to King and we're in a very exciting time. He urged the public to get involved in the OP review as this is the essential framework that will guide staff for the next decade.

King is like Forest Hill, noted Ward 3 candidate Jakob Schneider. "We pay the price to live here," he said, noting houses are becoming more energy efficient. He does support the creation of more seniors' housing.

Candidate Geoff Simpson said there's a need for more housing options. Attracting investment to King is vital to providing housing and he will work with staff to encourage future development to head in that direction.

The candidates were asked about their availability for the role as councillor, and their volunteer desires.

Asselstine said she's been on countless committees and organizations that have helped shape her community. Volunteering, she stressed, makes the community better and she's built many strong partnerships over the years. She sees the role of councillor as an advocate and she'll devote all of her time to the job. She's interested in the Sustainability Committee and Heritage Advisory Committee at the Township.

Cober noted he's been able to efficiently carry out his constituency work while working as a principal. He's proven his dedication and over the years on council, and he's served on numerous boards and committees.

Boyd said his schedule is flexible as a firefighter and he firmly believes that "life is about community." He's fully involved and knows what's required as councillor. He also boasts a 100% attendance record at council. He's involved in community events in Nobleton and also coaches hockey.

Draisey runs her own home-based business and has a very flexible schedule to serve.

Simpson, an IT professional, also has a lot of flexibility with his time.



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#### Mayor notes the qualities that make a good councillor

We are quickly approaching the municipal election on Oct. 22 when you will elect your Township council for the next four years. And, while many of us are tired of politics, this is still a very important election as the results affect you and our community directly.

I have had the great fortune to lead a stable, cohesive council for the past eight years. We have not always agreed on the issues but we have been respectful of each other and the decisions that have been made by the majority. With Councillor Pabst retiring after 24 years of service, there is going to be at least one new member of a team that has been the envy of the GTA in the way it

At a recent all-candidates debate a local resident came up to me and asked, "What qualities are you looking for on your council"? I thought I would share my answer with the entire Township for your consideration as you go to the polls to cast your vote for your next

An effective council member will be a collaborator and team player. We need relationship builders who can help to create partnerships to achieve our common goals and to work effectively with those partners. A good councillor does their homework and is a mature, critical thinker who understands the entire impact of their decision (not just for their neighbours or in their ward). They

do what is best for the entire Township. A good councillor is approachable for all residents and is respectful of their needs and concerns.

The final, and one of the most important characteristics that a councillor must have, is financial acumen. Municipal finance is not the same as your private finances nor is it the same as business finance. We deal with development charges, grants, user fees, general taxation, reserve funds, cash in lieu, etc. not topics that most people encounter in their daily lives.

It greatly concerns me when I hear promises to "cut taxes." The decision to raise or lower taxes cannot be taken lightly. We are a small municipality with a small budget; for every 1% increase, or decrease, in taxes we lose or gain, \$250,000. A tax cut likely means cutting a service that residents want and need, or not completing a road repair, or not putting in traffic calming measures somewhere, etc. etc. I, and every member of council, pay taxes and we don't like increases any more than you do, I guarantee that! We do our very best to ensure that every tax dollar is used in a responsible and respectful

On a more personal note, I thank everyone in King for the confidence in my leadership and I promise to continue to work hard to improve the quality of life for our great residents and businesses.

#### Salaries disclosed for 1899 council

In light of the upcoming elections Oct. 22, we thought it might be fun to revisit our historical Public Disclosure Data archives.

We perused the Township's previous financial statements going back 120 years to reveal the salary ranges of our former reeves and councillors.

In comparison, a loaf of bread retailed for approximately 3 ½ cents a pound in 1900 in the Toronto area according to the Board of Inquiry into the Cost of Living Report published in 1915.

The Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act only came into being in 1996 and requires any corporation which receives public funding to disclose the names of their employees earning \$100,000+. The council of King Township had no qualms disclosing their salaries in 1899.

The salaries and allowances for Town Council, Dec. 15, 1899 to Dec. 15, 1900, were:

R. Gallagher, Councillor, \$87; J. Burns, Councillor, \$61; T. H. Legge, Councillor, \$60; S. Lemon, Reeve, \$80, and J. Rogers, Councillor, \$50.

## Ontario is ready for legal cannabis, Mulroney says

The province stands ready to ease the transition to legalized marijuana.

The recreational use of pot became legal Wednesday.

Addressing the Empire Club of Canada Oct. 9, York-Simcoe MPP and Attornev General Caroline Mulroney said social effects associated with consuming recreational cannabis will not magically disappear and they are all very much top of mind.

"The risks to our children, our roads and our communities are real - and we are committed to addressing them," she

"Time was of the essence because the federal government had dictated the legalization date and we knew we needed to develop a new a plan to protect children and youth, keep our roads safe and combat the criminal market in Ontario.

"To provide certainty on each of the Alcohol and Gaming Commission

these priorities, we spoke directly with of Ontario as the provincial regulator clude regulation-making authority to Ontarians about their concerns regarding the federal government's decision and how to enforce and oversee this federal government decision in a responsible and reasonable manner."

Mulroney noted that in mid-August, she and Minister Fedeli announced Ontario would move to a robust private retail system, and away from the previous government's public retail model with stores run by government employees in locations chosen by the government.

"We concluded that such a system was incapable of seriously competing with the illegal market and in turn would leave our communities more vulnerable and susceptible to the underground market ... we developed a retail and regulatory framework designed to fulfill our three objectives: protecting children, keeping roads safe and combatting the illegal market."

The Province proposed to establish

to oversee the licensing and compliance process.

"In our consultations, it was clear that municipalities and police stakeholders were supportive of the AGCO as the province-wide regulator for private cannabis retail sales in Ontario."

Mulroney admitted that while new resources will be needed to help get the AGCO up and running in the shortterm, ultimately they expect the licensing regime to run on a sustainable cost-recovery basis. Establishing the AGCO as a province-wide regulator also benefits smaller municipalities who could not implement their own municipal licensing regime, primarily due to lack of administrative infrastructure.

"This approach also means the AGCO can provide communities and operators more certainty through a one-stop licensing approach rather than allowing a patch work of municipal licensing regimes to spread across Ontario. In order to best compete with the illegal market, our government made the decision that the number of licenses for cannabis retail stores would not be capped, but instead would be issued based on market demand.

"I want to underscore the fact that the proposed legislation would also in-

set concentration limits for how many retail store licenses a single operator can hold to ensure diversity in the market. So our approach to this issue will certainly evolve as we gather more information from stakeholders and as we see the market take shape.

"We want to ensure that only responsible and accountable individuals are participating in the licensed retail framework.

"It is my view that the system we have proposed provides an opportunity for small and medium size businesses to compete in this legal retail space, which we believe is the best way to drive out the illegal market."

Mulroney noted that the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and in regional consultations held MPPs. revealed that a "one-size fits all approach" - the approach of the previous government - was not the right way forward. Municipalities wanted a provincial framework with an opportunity for local input.

"We heard this message on two key elements of our policy.

"One, where stores can be located, and two, where people can consume cannabis.'

"First, municipalities will decide whether there will be any stores in their communities at all. Each municipal council will have the opportunity to opt-out of having bricks and mortar retail stores in their communities. Those decisions will need to be made by Jan. 22 of next year. That gives each council three months from the municipal election date to make this decision, and the decision date is five months after we announced our intention to move to a private retail model."

At a recent council meeting, King has decided to opt out of the retail plan.

Nobody in Ontario has the right to a cannabis retail license, she pointed out. The AGCO's due-diligence process will be strictly applied and thoroughly enforced, and the role of public commentary in this process is real. Before you pick your store locations, be mindful of the importance of local responses that can be provided within the 15-day comment window.

The government has largely aligned the rules for cannabis consumption with the tobacco restrictions under the Smoke Free Ontario Act.

This approach prohibits smoking and vaping of cannabis in areas where the smoking of tobacco is also prohibited, such at playgrounds, child care facilities, schools and hospitals.

"Our approach also allows local municipalities to enact bylaws that further provincial minimum standards in plac- all understand what is at stake." es like parks.

"Once again, these proposed amendments have been crafted after consultations across the province and are designed to allow each of Ontario's 444 municipalities to shape consumption rules that work for them."

The government has already launched an awareness campaign, to educate and communicate with people regarding applicable rules, regulations and health and safety measures.

"We will plainly tell Ontarians how our children, communities and roads will be protected, and how we will work to combat criminals. Our messages will be apparent and accessible where people live and commute, on social media and where they view content online, on television, and across university and college campuses."

Mulroney knows that many people will be looking for as much information as possible now that cannabis is legal. Go to Ontario.ca/cannabis homepage for more detailed information and resources.

"We are confident that when taken together, our proposed licensing model ,overseen by the AGCO, the flexibility and certainty we are providing to local communities, and the public awareness campaign I shared with you today are the best way forward to achieve our objectives.



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## King City concerns dominate first CCKT debate

There's no question King City is taking the brunt of King's development. Issues related to growth dominated the first of two all-candidates' meetings, hosted by Concerned Citizens of King Township (CCKT) last week.

Ward 1 candidates were peppered with questions during a lively debate at Villanova last Wednesday.

CCKT prepared two written questions, sent to candidates prior to the meeting.

CCKT wanted to know how much time the candidates are prepared to give to their role as councillor, as well as their interests in serving on committees and volunteer groups.

Rob Payne noted he's a financial advisor and as a small business owner he has a lot of flexibility in his hours. The former councillor said he's in a good position to serve. He's interested in getting involved in the library board and Sustainability Committee.

Incumbent Debbie Schaefer said her council post is her priority. She's retired and noted the job can be hectic and unstructured at times. She's served on the Heritage Advisory Committee, Sustainability Committee and was one of the founding members of King for Refugees.

Sasha Mozaffari recently graduated university with a degree in political science and she's planning on attending law school. She's an efficient multi-tasker and she would split her time between her constituents and her studies. It's a post she takes seriously. She would be interested in the Sustainability Committee and perhaps the Committee of Adjustment.

Jordan Cescolini sees the value in serving his community. He's self-employed in a family business and is committed to providing upwards of 25 hours per week for council work.

Incumbent Cleve Mortelliti said it's considered a part-time job, with peaks and valleys during the course of a year. Council relies on staff for the majority of the studies and recommendations, so council is more like a board of directors. He's part of the senior management team of R.J. Burnside and Associates, and he has a flexible schedule to meet his duties. He's managed his time well over the past term and "I know the job."

Kelly Colasanti said as a retired executive, he "has all the time in the world" to dedicate to the job. He said he's used to working 24/7 and has no time constraints. He's interested in heritage and the public library.

CCKT asked the candidates who should take the lead on planning new subdivisions and communities - the Township or the developers. CCKT also wanted to know their vision on housing in King City, Nobleton and Schomberg.

Colasanti said the Township is the local planning authority and should take the lead, but they have to work with developers. Housing has to meet the community's needs and has to fit with existing houses. He'd like to see more townhouses and eco-friendly options.

Mortelliti said the Township follows the guidelines laid out in the Community Plans, but the Province does mandate development through various pieces of legislation, particularly the Places to Grow Act. There is always room for negotiation with developers, something they do with every application.

Cescolini said there has to be a fruitful relationship between the Township and the developers. He'd like to make sure developers contribute more towards local road infrastructure, to deal with the traffic that comes with new development. He'd like to see smaller bungalows for seniors.

Mozaffari said they have to work together and council should also ask residents what they'd like to see. She would like to allow landowners of smaller parcels to develop housing types.

Schaefer said it's council's job to manage growth, but there are other players in the mix, including York Region and the Province. They have control over their Official Plan and zoning bylaw and they can certainly help shape future growth. There are still gaps and she's like to see a more robust mix of housing types.

Payne said the Township has a vision, the developers have a stake and the Province sets the rules. He supports intensification in core areas, along with mixed use.

Both local and commuter traffic is a concern of residents who asked candidates about possible solutions.

Payne said the King-Vaughan Townline is the only viable option for a "bypass" and he strongly opposes reviewing the 15th Sideroad again as a route. He said council, York Region and the Province have to work together to help alleviate traffic and he's willing to take on this task as councillor.

Cescolini does support using the 15th as an alternate route, noting the King-Vaughan road doesn't work.

Mortelliti pointed out this is not an election issue and it's a moot point for at least another 10 years.

Colasanti said more studies are needed and the traffic issues have to be addressed.

A Snowball resident wanted to know whether the candidates would lobby the Province to limit intensification to the urban areas.

Mortelliti noted the current rules restrict development to the King City boundaries and nothing should change.

Colasanti said he supports current Greenbelt restrictions.

Schaefer said the provincial Growth Plan is a valuable tool and it sets the parameters for development.

Payne said we can accommodate growth in the legislated areas under the Places to Grow Act.

The candidates were all asked whether they accepted campaign donations from developers. All said they did not.

A Warren Road resident, who said he was "okay with roads and taxes," asked whether the Township should consider ward redistribution.

Mortelliti noted Ward 1 has grown significantly and said ward realignment may be worth looking at. He did admit it's "a painful process."

Payne said he would be happy to start this discussion. A ward redistribution may be warranted in the name of fairness and equity. He said he supports an extra King representative on York Regional council.

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
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
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

### King's Leon flashes brilliance in Women's World Cup

Adriana Leon made her return to the world stage early last week in a qualification game against Cuba, putting together a performance that ensured her a permanent spot on the Canadian Women's World Cup roster.

The 26-year-old King City native blasted home four goals in a 12-0 routing of against the 88th-ranked Cubans for the fifth-ranked Canadians in the CONCACAF World Cup qualification tournament.

"We're feeling pretty good," said Leon on the CONCACAF post-game broadcast. "I think it was a pretty dominant performance. I thought we kept the level high up until the 90th minute, so it was a good team performance."

Leon, who suits up for the Seattle Reign FC of the National Women's Soccer League, posted a brace by the 23-minute mark before adding two more in the second half.

She backed up her resume with yet another pair of goals Monday night in a 7-0 win over Panama in the tournament semifinals, a game that clinched a spot for Canada in the Women's World Cup next year, their seventh straight tournament.

With the top three teams earning qualification, the defending champi-

on United States are also already in, who Team Canada will meet in the finals later this week.

"It's gonna be physical, for sure," said Leon. "It's gonna be tough. It's always hard to play against the U.S."

"They're the number-one team, they're number-one for a reason. So it's gonna be a tough battle, but I'm looking forward to it. They're always our big rival, so we'll be gearing up for it."

Growing up in Maple, Ontario, Leon's parents moved the family to King City when she was 16 years old in 2008. She was still attending classes at The Country Day School the first time she was called up to represent her country internationally, playing in the U-20 World Cup a year later.

Since then, her career has taken her to all corners of the globe, from Cyprus, to Japan, to Germany, and Brazil

It was in 2012 that she joined the senior squad and got the opportunity to play alongside her childhood idol, Christine Sinclair. She scored the only goal in a 1-0 win over China PR, and has now found the back of the net 12 times since joining the senior team

Leon was a player on both the rugby and volleyball programs at The Country Day School as well.

They then return to Alliston for yet another meeting with the Hornets the following evening.

He's served on several community organizations, including CCKT and the Food Bank. He would be interested in serving on the HAC, Sustainability Committee and library board.

Schneider serves on King's Accessibility Advisory Committee and York Federation of Agriculture. He's also a volunteer firefighter in King. He vows to remain "connected" and available 24/7.

Eek, who operates a Holland Marsh farm with her husband, notes her role as councillor is her top priority. For her, the job is not part-time and she's served on many committees and attends all local events. Her personal motto is "being present and speaking up."

Given his concerns with the Holland Marsh Drainage Board, Dyriw said that's one organization he would get involved in. He's a Marsh farmer as well, and he has scaled back his operation to free up his time.

One resident asked the candidates how they would balance greenspace with sustainable development.

Cober noted the OP will guide the future vision and direction of King and he urged the public to get involved in 2019 during consultation sessions.

Asselstine said the Township is governed by various planning documents and provincial legislation already protects the greenbelt and Oak Ridges Moraine. Growth is limited to our urban

Boyd said under the Sustainability Plan, all plans should be reflective of sustainable goals. The task at hand is to make sure the OP aligns with the Sustainability Plan.

Simpson said King will continue to limit growth to the urban areas and not infringe on the rural areas.

Schneider said development is taking place in King, but some areas will never see it. He vows to keep any development off of prime agricultural land.

Another resident asked candidates what they would do to upgrade many of King's sub-standard roads.

Simpson said many residents expressed the same concern at the door and he discovered they're split - half want all roads paved, others don't. Some argue that once a rural road is paved, it will attract traffic and speeding will increase.

Schneider said council would have to weigh the pros and cons, and the costs of paving gravel roads.

#### Region remains vigilant in tracking and managing invasive plants and insects

The Regional Municipality of York continues to combat the effects of invasive species such as the emerald ash borer and giant hogweed across York Region with strategies to slow down their spread.

"Invasive species in York Region and Ontario continue to be a growing environmental and economic concern," said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "York Region remains proactive in our approach to assessing, preventing and mitigating the impacts of these invasive species."

Ontario has more invasive species than any other province or territory in Canada. The potential economic impacts on agriculture, fisheries, forests, health care, tourism and the recreation industry are estimated at \$3.6 billion per year.

"The Region is committed to protecting our residents, our assets and the local environment," said Vaughan Regional Councillor Mario Ferri, chair of Environmental services. "By investing in prevention and early detection of these invasive species we can minimize the need for long-term, more costly management."

Together with regulatory agencies, the Region remains vigilant in monitoring for tree pests and diseases and works with partners to reduce the impact of hazardous plants such as wild parsnip and giant hogweed along Regional roads.



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

## Ward 1 candidate Cescolini champions tax reduction

Reducing taxes is top of the list for Ward 1 candidate Jordan Alexander Cescolini.

The life-long King resident pointed out the average household in King Township pays \$12,182 a year in property taxes. In comparison, the average house in Vaughan pays \$6,850; Richmond Hill \$7,418; Aurora \$7,394; Newmarket \$6,698 and Markham \$6,762.

"Council has argued over the past few years that the reason your property tax bill is so high is due to the price of homes in King Township. Regardless, the cost of removing garbage, snow removal, and other municipal services do not change based on the value of your home and for too long the residents in King Township have been paying far too much and seeing far too little in return. If elected, I will bring fourth much needed tax reform and make every dollar go further."

Cescolini also stresses that investing in our infrastructure is vital.

"Over the last decade our community has seen a surge in development, our one lane roads have been overwhelmed and traffic congestion has led to a decrease in road safety. Commuters passing through our community have been taking short cuts through neighbourhoods to avoid congested



main roadways and intersections. This puts at risk our community! Especially our children and seniors! It is time for council to recognize this huge risk and stop ignoring the plain fact that our roadways are becoming less safe. I also promise that every time a main roadway is expanded or even resurfaced that we mandate that a side walk is installed if it is not existing and a bike lane is put to ensure maximum safety for everyone in the community. Together with property foresight and planning we can continue to grow sustainable and increase safety in our community."

Cescolini said community recreation is the cornerstone that binds a community together. It is where we gather to play, cheer, and make memories.

"With the growing number of people" calling King Township home it is our duty to ensure we create environmentally sustainable recreational infrastructure. This starts with building a community centre in the heart of King City, that features new ice rinks and both indoor and outdoor soccer fields. But it extends way past that into creating and maintaining new walking/ biking trails in our green spaces and building youth conservation programs, so the next generation can see the importance of sustainability and lead a generation that will help promote and enhance this in our dear community."

#### Cannabis will impact driving

The legalization of recreational cannabis will likely have an impact on drivers, according to a survey conducted by Desjardins.

Survey highlights reveal:

the influence of a prescription drug. According to the Traffic Injury Research Foundation (TIRF), the percentage of fatally injured drivers who tested positive for marijuana rose to 20.9%

in 2015 from 15.9% in 2000 According to TIRF, the two biggest age brackets for fatally injured drivers who tested positive for marijuana in 2015 were 16-19-year-old drivers (32.1%) and 20-34-year-old drivers (35.9%)

According to Statistics Canada's National Cannabis Survey, one out of every seven marijuana users with a valid driver's licence is getting behind the wheel within two hours of consuming marijuana.





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
