

A: The King City Arena at 25 Doctors Ln.


B: The old municipal offices at 2075 King Rd.

Marco Muzzo denied parole

Marco Muzzo will have to wait another year before he applies for parole once

The Parole Board denied Muzzo's application for day and full parole last week, noting he hasn't addressed his alcohol misuse.

Muzzo was sentenced to 10 years in prison in 2016 after pleading guilty to four counts of impaired driving causing death and two counts of impaired driving causing bodily harm.

Muzzo was convicted in the Sept. 27, 2015 fatal accident that killed Daniel, Harry and Milly Neville-Lake and their grandfather Gary.

The board received numerous letters and petitions both for and against Muzzo's parole request.


"We don't question your remorse. It's obvious that this is a very difficult thing for you to deal with," said the board panel.

"I don't and won't get the chance for parole from this life sentence of misery and despair," Jennifer Neville-Lake said at the hearing. Neville-Lake told reporters outside the hearing she does not believe Muzzo is remorseful.

"Although parole was denied, it doesn't change a thing for me," she said. "I will still stare at urns, still stare at photos because an impaired driver stole innocent lives."

An online petition against Muzzo's parole garnered more than 10,500 names in just over six days. The petition was started by Thornhill's Jennifer Stallman. The petition was to the parole board. It says in part:

"We are a community asking for tougher drinking under the influence laws. We are asking that Marco Muzzo should not be allowed parole and should finish the rest of his 10-year sentence in prison. Our kids deserve protection. Stronger laws and consequences are going to help this. Our community has been deeply affected since Sept. 27, 2015, by the death of the Neville-Lake children and their grandfather. Please make an example out of him to prevent more DUI cases. We are all feeling grief for this family."





Semi-annual public complaints report

The York Regional Police Chief reports to the board on an annual and semi-annual basis with respect to public complaints. During the first half of 2018, 86 complaints were filed against York Regional Police officers compared to 77 during the same period in 2017. Sixteen (16) of those complaints remain under investigation. Thirty-nine (39) complaints were deemed to be not in the public interest, frivolous, or more appropriately dealt with under another Act or law; six complaints were unsubstantiated; 15 public complaints were withdrawn by the complainant; two complaints were resolved informally and one complaint did not fall under the jurisdiction of the Office of the Independent Police Review Director. The nature of the majority of complaints relates to police procedure.

Bells ring 100 times for peace

A group of enthusiastic bell ringers and supporters gathered at the "going down of the sun" on Nov. 11, outside King City United Church, to mark the centennial of the end of the First World War. This local initiative was organized by Sandra Kirby as part of the Royal Canadian Legion's "Bells of Peace" program.

Sandra explained that "Bells are a symbolically strong way to mark important occasions and reminiscent of the ringing of bells to signify peace after war. This initiative will be undertaken in many other countries as well."

Ringers represented various King Township churches including King City United, Nobleton United and St. Andrew's Presbyterian churches. Each ringer rang their bell individually 10 times and the sound of peace rang out for almost 17 minutes.

Board approves 2019 police budget

The board approved the 2019 York Regional Police Operating Budget of \$327.9 million, which is a 3.7 percent increase over the 2018 budget and includes the addition of 53 police officers and civilian members to address population growth and intensification, continued sustainable and effective police services to the communities, increasing demands for service and cannabis enforcement.

The 2019 Police Operating Budget continues to maintain the lowest policing cost per capita in Canada among comparable police services (with populations of over 1 million residents).


The board also approved the 2019 York Regional Police Capital Budget of \$33.5 million with a Capital Spend Authority of \$62.5 million. The expenditures include \$14.5 million for facilities, \$8.6 million for vehicles, \$5.9 million for information technology, \$4.1 million for specialized equipment and \$0.3 million for communication equipment. Financing for the capital budget is a combination of contributions from reserves, debenture proceeds repaid from development charges, debt reduction reserve funding, development charge collections and external funding.

The 2019 Police Budget will be tabled at York Regional Council in January. A copy of the budget presentation can be found on the board's website yrpsb.ca.

The art gallery features an eclectic assortment of art, including acrylic, watercolour and oil paintings, creations crafted from wood, quilting and






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Importance of family vital to King Fire and Emergency Services



King Fire family sticks together in times of tragedy and sorrow

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times ... it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness ..."

Charles Dickens may not have been thinking about first responders when he wrote A Tale of Two Cities, but these words certainly ring true of the recent dark days experienced by members of King Fire & Emergency Services.

Personnel routinely risk their lives to save strangers in their community. And they're equally brave and committed when coming to the aid of one of their own. Families of KFES volunteers suffered tragic losses recently and these stories – this perspective – sheds some light on the unique bond shared by this fellowship of brothers and sisters.

The community said farewell to little Abby Eveson recently, daughter of Becky and firefighter Craig of Schomberg.

Abby suffered from a rare congenital heart defect. Born without her main pulmonary artery, Abby had her first surgery 14 hours after birth and has had three open heart surgeries since. The community, and family of King firefighters, rallied around the Eveson family, providing whatever support they needed. They answered the call.

During the annual KFES appreciation dinner, Mayor Steve Pellegrini shared his thanks for the support shown the Eveson family.

"I can think of no better example of the positive impact you make on King Township than the support you showed for Abby Eveson's family. You responded to the call when Abby went into distress. You were on the scene and did everything you could in an attempt to save Abby's life.

"Everything you did those dark days speak to how connected you are to the community you serve."

Mayor Pellegrini read a note provided by Becky Eveson.

"I felt that we needed to say something here this evening since the majority of the fire department is sitting in one room.

"Our family has been a part of the department for quite some time now. You always hear the term brotherhood and fire family being spoken of. You celebrate weddings together, babies together, and then there are times you come together to mourn a loss.

Members of KFES chalk up impressive training stats

Being a member of King Fire and Emergency Services comes with high expectations. Personnel train constantly to be the best. During the recent 2018 Appreciation Dinner, Deputy Chief James Arnold shared some impressive statistics.

Since November of 2017, staff have participated in 243 training classes for a total of 1,164 hours of training.

That adds up to 9961 staff hours of training alone.

This dedication to training has resulted in 99 individual certifications in NFPA Professional Qualification for staff in the last 12 months.

22 Certifications in NFPA 472 Hazmat Awareness.

18 Certifications in NFPA 472 Hazmat Operations.

26 Certifications in NFPA 1001 Firefighter Level 1; 25 Certifications in NFPA 1001 Firefighter Level 2; 3 Certifications in NFPA 1021 Fire Officer Level 1; 1 Certification in NFPA 1041 Fire Instructor Level 1; 1 Certification in NFPA 1041 Fire Instructor Level 2; 1 Certification in NFPA 1035 Public Information Officer and 2 Certifications in NFPA 1035 Fire and Life Safety Educator Level 1.

"We have been fortunate to be able to replace some aging apparatus and staff spent many hours training on the new Engine 341, Ladder 366 and Command 30," he said.

Arnold pointed out the service has benefitted from 21 recruit firefighters from the 2017-2 class who graduated in 2018, and 18 firefighters from the 2017-1 class were promoted to Fourth Class Firefighters receiving their black helmets.

"We also recognized the promotion of 4 firefighters to the rank of Captain, and last but not least, we now have 21 more recruits in training as we speak and they will finish their recruit training in February."

"I understand that sinking feeling when you hear an address that you know over your pager. I can only imagine how you all felt as you heard 99 Cooper knowing that it was our dear Abby and assuming that things were bad if you were being paged out. What I can tell you is that as your hearts sank as I saw each of you that was able to respond to the call my heart was lifted. As I saw you share the pain on your face as you saw Abby my heart lifted. I knew that no matter what, she was going to be cared for when I wasn't able to be at her side. That love like ours would be shown to her.

"As the ambulance raced to the hospital I saw Chief Wall coming down Main with lights and sirens trying to get to our house. He arrived at the hospital with Craig and stayed by our side for the day.

"The amount of support that poured in through the fire department. We have felt it before but this time there was so much love. Taking on the leads of ensuring our vision for Abby's celebration would happen. Devoting hours to details. Dropping off meals, setting up gofundme pages, coming to the house to offer hugs and a shoulder to cry on.

"Then the day of Abby's celebration, so many of you came out to help set up. You honoured her with one of your most greatest traditions of the honour guard.

"So yes I completely agree that it is a family. It may not feel like it during the first few years. There may be disagreements and arguments but in the end this is a family. A family that stands strong together especially when someone in their family needs them.

"Thank you to each and everyone of you that has made us a part of your

family as we have with you. Thank you for standing by our sides when we have needed you the most."

Captain Trevor Storey knows how life can change in an instant.

October 28 is etched in his mind as both the luckiest, and saddest day of his life

While spending time at their cottage, family members awoke with severe headaches and sickness. They rushed to the emergency department of the nearest hospital and it was confirmed they all suffered carbon monoxide poisoning. The fact they all made it was a mirrollo

While at the hospital Storey received a call no parent ever wants to receive. His eldest son Byron, 19, died suddenly in a remote area of Algonquin Park.

He rushed to the area, which was virtually inaccessible, even by ATV. First responders at the scene banded together and offered Storey all the support he needed. He also received countless calls from his brethren at KFES, offering whatever they could.

He pointed out that one's perspective changes with time and personal experiences. "It's different when it's your own," he said.

The veteran paramedic and firefighter with 28 years of experience, offered some advice for his colleagues. He told them to be cognizant of what you do and say on the scene and be compassionate with the families involved. This support is invaluable during times of tragedy.

"Duty, Trust, Honour" are more than just words, he said. "They mean a lot when you're on the other end of things."

There's no question that family helps ease the pain in the worst of times.

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

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

Anglican Parish By John Arnott

On that chill, drizzly, fall, still dark, early morning just over 100 years ago deep in a forest a railway coach stood silently waiting for its moment in history. Then before dawn the principal players a small group of middle aged men in distinctive military uniforms arrived on scene and just as they exited their several autos, lights went on inside the coach revealing its rich interior of polished teak wood, bronze decoration and comfortable leather chairs. At 5 a.m. a document was signed which 6 hours later would bring blood soaked World War 1 officially to an end. But this doomed peace would last only 21 years before an even more horrific war between the same adversaries would plunge the world into Hell once again.

The signing took place in an historic woods, long a favourite with French royalty staying at Compiegne Chateau near the town of the same name, in Picardy northeastern France.

The railway coach used was built in 1914 for the Compagnie des Wagon Lits to serve as a dining car. At the beginning of the war it was made into a travelling office for French Marshall Ferdinand Foch Supreme Allied Commander and attached to his private train. After its use for the signing of the peace it returned to being a dining car but in 1919 the afore mentioned railway company gave it to the French government as an historic site. Much of the furnishings it had in the days when Foch used it were found and put back in place, Then it was put on public display in the courtyard of the Hotel [Hall] des Invalides, that Paris landmark, where Napoleon lies entombed. Here it remained from 1921 until 1927. But at the request of the mayor of Compiegne it was returned to the forest and placed in a protective covering especially built for it only a few metres/yards from where it had originally been on Nov. 11, 1918.

Son after France fell to the Nazis in 1940 Hitler demanded it be taken and placed on the same stretch of train track where it had stood on that armistice day 22 years before and then invited the officials of a defeated France to come to the coach to sign surrender documents. He, surrounded by his Nazi officials, sat at the same polished desk in the same comfortable leather chair

Marshall Foch had used in November 1918. Then, like Foch, he left abruptly leaving his underlings and the humiliated French to take care of details. Later he had the coach to be shipped to Germany to be put display in Berlin as a symbol of Germany's victory over France and ordered the entire Compiegne site obliterated leaving only the statue of Foch staring out over nothing but destruction as another calculated humiliation.

Today the Compiegne site has been has been lovingly restored and an exact replica of the lost coach containing small pieces of bronze decoration and a pair of access ramps, all that remains of the original, stands sheltered in the area now designated Clairiere de l'Armistice- Glade of the Armistice only a few steps from section of railway track marking the original site.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes that this past Sunday, Remembrance Day, French President Emmanuel Macron and German Chancellor Angela Merkel together inspected a brigade of young French and German soldiers on site, placed a memorial wreath and unveiled a plaque in memory of those who lost their lives on both sides of these past conflicts.

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
