TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King passed By-law Number 2019-039 on the 1st day of April, 2019 under Section 34 and By-law 2019-038 (OPA Amendment No. 92) under Section 17, of the Planning Act, R.S.O, 1990,c. P.13, as amended.

Should this date fall on a holiday or weekend, you will have until 4:30 p.m. of the next business day to file your appeal. Please note the Tribunal will only accept filing fee payments by certified cheque or money order.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (LPAT). A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (LPAT), there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Comments received and considered during the public meeting of May 28th, 2018 were summarized and included in the Planning Department Recommendation Report (P-2019-11). The report is available on the Township's website www.king.ca. Additional comments at the meeting of the Committee of the Whole on April 1st, 2019 were received by Council, which identified concerns relating to the devaluation of properties, congestion and safety concerns due to increases in volume of vehicles and traffic entering and exiting the surrounding area containing residential and an institutional use (i.e. Holy Name Catholic School). These comments have been taken into consideration during the review of the application and have been responded to both generally and specifically throughout the recommendation report. Based on these comments, Council adopted a revised version of the Amendment, which is available on the Township's website at www.king.ca.

The lands to which the Official Plan Amendment apply to are also subject to an amendment to the Zoning By-law (File No. Z-2018-01) and Site Plan Development Approval (File No. SPD-18-08). The site specific Zoning By-law (2019-039) rezones the above noted subject lands to a site specific Commercial General (C1-3) zone with site specific provisions to allow for the development of a coffee shop with drive through and patio.

Any person or public body will be entitled to receive notice of the decision of the approval authority if a written request to be notified of the decision (including the person's or public body's address) is made to the approval authority. The approval authority is the Township of King, 2585 King Road, King City, ON, L7B 1A1

Drive-through supported with adjustments; public opposed

Despite vocal public opposition, and even some dissent from councillors, King council voted 4-3 to allow changes to a King City parcel that will permit a Starbucks with a drive-through compo-

After hearing from a crowd of opponents, Mayor Steve Pellegrini asked for some changes to staff recommendations regarding the physical layout of the plan, before supporting it.

The applicant, Springreen Holdings Ltd., asked to amend the property's zoning to commercial and mixed use. The lot was left over from the King Dufferin subdivision and at one point was considered for townhouses, but this was deemed inappropriate on these lands. The vacant lot is located on the southwest corner of King Road and Spring Hill Drive, with roughly 40 metres of frontage on King, and 80 metres along Spring Hill.

The plan is for a coffee shop and restaurant with a drive-through, patio, garbage enclosure, loading space and 37 parking spots. There's a proposed rightin and right-out on King Road.

Planners believe the property will act as an extension of the eastern anchor of the core area and fits in with the commercial mall across the road. Staff pointed out the property is surrounded by a wide diversity of land uses.

King and York staff are satisfied with the landscape plan submitted for the project and a portion of the existing sidewalk along King Road and Spring Hill Drive will be replaced.

A consultant compared data for drive-throughs and noted Starbucks drive-through are used less frequently than Tim Hortons, largely because Starbucks customers tend to go into the shop and sit. Consultants did admit that there is the potential for drive-through vehicles in line to spill over onto Spring Hill, which may impede traffic entering or existing the site.

Local residents spoke out against the plan, citing traffic and safety issues in this area.

Judith Tenenbaum said this plan puts the community at risk, stressing it's not prudent to approve such amendments before the Township's new Official Plan is complete. She suggested all zoning changes be put on hold until we have our new OP.

Designating this property as commercial is an example of "spot zoning," which, she said, benefits only the property owner, at the expense of the community.

This plan would lead to traffic and safety issues for residents and children in the area, many of whom walk or bike to school. Idling cars in the drivethrough present obvious environmental hazards. Tenenbaum called drivethroughs "throwbacks," noting several municipalities have banned them altogether.

The congestion, she argued, will impact all nearby roads, including Lavender Valley Road, Warren Road, Patricia and Burton Grove.

The subdivision is also home to Holy Name School, and buses travel the roads at morning and afternoon peak periods.

"The Spring Hill area is a hidden gem, with numerous residences backing onto the wetlands or ravine. There is a clear line in the sand between the residential and commercial area. That line should not be transgressed," she

Another resident said the peak periods for drive-throughs (7-9 a.m.) coincides with busy hours for school buses.

Another man pointed out a coffee shop will lead to increased litter in the area, compounding the existing problem.

A seven-year resident said she's also concerned about children's safety, noting she's enjoyed the small, green space in this area. She stressed that even the smallest of green parcels are import-

Kelly Colasanti noted he served as a crossing guard and he knows local traffic woes first-hand. "This will make things worse," he said. "Congestion is already evident."

A new resident to King City said he travels through town every day and said the traffic is already challenging.

Bruce Craig, representing Concerned Citizens of King Township, said they support building healthy communities While CCKT is in favour of commercial growth, it needs to be balanced and in keeping with King's Sustainability Plan.

He questions whether drive-throughs have any benefits at all and he doesn't think this project is in keeping with King's vision.

The lot is bounded by wetlands on both sides and Craig said the new OP limits drive-throughs.

"It's time to turn the page in our society on drive-throughs," he said, adding villages should be designed to be more walkable.

Harvey Tenenbaum reminded councillors about the vigorous opposition campaign launched by residents. Councillors, he said, should be guided by input from residents and not solely by planning staff.

"Residents have, and continue to make it abundantly clear, that they are unalterably opposed to this proposal," he said. Tenenbaum noted the best interests of the community take priority. Even LPAT appeals take into account municipal planning rules.

Other issues with this proposal include noise, annoying lights and more than 100 environmental issues alone.

Another resident said they purchased their home to enjoy the green spaces in King City. There's already a speeding problem on Lavender Valley and Warren and she has difficulty getting out of her own driveway. She wondered what would happen to children's safety if the drive-through becomes a reality. Further, a Starbucks would be "an evesore."

A Spring Hill Drive resident commented that she, too, has trouble getting out of her driveway due to the traffic. She said they moved from Maple to get away from the congestion.

Susan Beharriell said this won't improve the neighbourhood, adding idling cars not only impact climate change through emissions, but waste tremendous amounts of fuel.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer sided with the residents, noting this project seems inconsistent in the big picture. She doesn't see it as a commercial extension of the core at all and it's also incompatible with the draft Official Plan.

Mayor Pellegrini pointed out to the crowd that councillors don't direct staff, but rather these professionals offer their educated advice. He cited two recent LPAT hearings where council sided with residents but went against staff recommendations. The tribunal decided against the Township in both instances. These hearings cost the Township a lot of money, staff time and resources fighting what's often a losing battle.

This application, he said, has been improved since it was first presented. He made the recommendations of shifting the drive-through window to help improve traffic flow on the site.

It is with disbelief, and huge disappointment, that council voted to allow the demolition of 446 Kettleby Road at the township meeting of Feb. 25.

Having greatly appreciated living in King for the past 33 years, and having visited the unique and historic village of Kettleby on a great many occasions, we were delighted to be able to move to the village in 2015.

People residing in Kettleby have taken immense pride, for generations, in the upkeep of their heritage properties, and for their community in general. Even now, on special occasions, visitors to Kettleby are informed, via plaques posted outside many of the old homes, listing which family lived in each home, their occupations, and when the homes were built. Appreciation of heritage and history is so important to many residents.

A book is currently being written about its founding, and how the village evolved to become the hamlet it is today. Many residents have contributed their family histories to this book, which will be published later this year.

This is a community who share in celebrations and festivities on a regular basis. Many of us share a common spirit and appreciation for our history. It is therefore highly disrespectful, to our forefathers who have built one of the truly unique villages in Canada, to have one of these historic homes given approval for demolition.

Spring cleaning your yard? Check local By-law before starting an Open Air Fire/Burn

Township of King – April 2019

King Fire & Emergency Services is advising local residents to contact them regarding the restrictions that govern open air burning before having any open air fires or burning brush.

"With spring outdoor cleanup starting, we know some residents choose to burn brush and yard debris on their property," explained Fire Chief Jim Wall. Cleaning up debris and limiting the level of flammable vegetation surrounding your home is understandable. However, please make sure that the way you do it is safe - for you, your home, your neighbours, and the surrounding area.

A permit is required with specific conditions for burning in the Township of King.

Open air burning can include the use of outdoor fireplaces and cooking fires not involving the use of a barbeque (for recreational purposes). Some outdoor appliances may not be recommended because there is potential for personal injury, property damage and increased risk of a grass fire. Please do your homework and go on-line and research these appliances before you make any purchases.

"Whether in the backyard of your home, the cottage or at a campground please make fire safety a priority," said Fire Chief Wall. "Open air burning, especially if left unattended can become difficult to control and can result in a serious injury or widespread fire." Always keep fire safety in mind.





Student protest addresses new changes to education

When I saw Education Minister Lisa Thompson's announcement about the Ford government's education budget cuts on the news, I knew that my voice would be heard.

I saw the "Students Say No" Instagram account a few days after Minister Thompson's announcement. It was reassuring that I was not the only one who felt the same way. They had been planning a province wide walkout on April 4 at 1:15 p.m.

The main concern was the importance of our students and educators over other things, such as horse racing. Classroom sizes would increase from a 22 to 28 student average, decreasing the jobs of thousands of our educators. The quality of our education and increase stress for everyone. Unfortunately, that is not the only policy put in place. Major cuts are being made to the Ontario Autism Program, arts programs, ESL programs, and even omitting indigenous studies from the Ontario history curriculum! Also, they are tweaking the sexual education curriculum, allowing the parents to make the decision whether their children have the opportunity to learn about topics, such as birth control and LGBTQ+.

These cuts impact everyone from elementary to post-secondary. The Ford government is stripping students from low income families of their free tuition and limiting grants. Instead, they're are giving low-income students a 10% discount off their tuition. This is not enough of a discount. Because of these changes, students may not even have the chance to go to college or university based on how much money they have in their pocket.

I think it is an understatement to say that Ontario is in debt. We, as students, understand cuts in the provincial government's budget need to be made. However, why make such dramatic cuts to something that is building the foundation to our future? The provincial government needs to realize that LGBTQ+ people are still people. Indigenous history is still our history. Art classes have

the same importance as math classes. Our teachers and students matter and I was not about to let this go unheard in our community.

I started the Instagram account @ kcss_saysno and registered my school, King City Secondary School, for the Students Say No walkout. I followed as many people as I knew until the word spread around school. When organizing the walkout, I knew that I could not do this by myself. I called on the help of my friends and the gears started turning.

I want to give a big thanks to Kashifa Ahmad, Sivan Isacov, Sarah Ashworth, Emily Stephens, Malaika Javaid, Jacqueline Hillier, Cindy Li and Amira Kabir for helping me with organizing. I couldn't have done this without them.

When I had posted a poll on the Instagram page asking how many people were coming to the protest, only 40 people had said yes. But as soon as it turned 1:15 on April 4, a little more than 200 students united together as one voice to express their opinions on the devastating budget cuts. Over 700 schools and 100,000 students province participated in their local walkout.

All the walkouts were organized by students, for students, and we were not forced by the union.

We can get this to Queen's Park through the media and the multiple stakeholders involved in fighting for a







Mississauga wants independence from Peel Region

Mississauga wants independence from Peel Region and they held a town hall style meeting Tuesday night to get public input.

The city council passed in principle Mayor Bonnie Crombie's motion requesting the Province pass legislation that the municipality become independent from the Region of Peel.

"The City of Mississauga has long held the position that regional government does not work for our city, our residents or our businesses," said Mayor

Crombie argues that the city sends \$85 million to the region to fund the growth of Brampton and Caledon. She said that is not fair for residents and businesses. She said their money city and that they must be able to govern their own affairs and set their own vision without interference.

Crombie states Mississauga will have the ability to speak as one city, fully in control of its future identity. She said it will lead to an efficient and effective government, that Mississauga's tax dollars will no longer be forced to subsidize Brampton and Caledon, that city council and staff will have the ability to make decision in their best interest and that they will have greater access to their own funding.

Further, she said Mississauga will be treated with the respect it deserves as the third largest city in Ontario and sixth largest in Canada, independent of another level of government.

Caledon Mayor Allan Thompson did not want to speculate on a potential divorce. He did, however, say that if there was a move to a single tier, the most should go towards priorities in their likely outcome would be a single "City of Peel."

"The irony is that our regional government works quite well right now, from an operational and fiscal perspective," said Thompson. "In fact, the Region of Peel is the only government organization at any level to have receive an Excellence Canada's Platinum Award for Excellence, Innovation and Wellness. So, I'm not too sure what benefit there would be for the province to break up a government that is working well."

Peel Region chair Nando Iannicca said the current regional model is working exceptional well.

"This is not the first time Mississauga has expressed a desire to leave the Region of Peel, but from the interests of our residents across Peel, it is important to consider the benefits that Region-wide services offer economy of scale and seamless delivery," said Iannicca. "Services are provided effectively to meet the needs of those living and working in Peel and we have been able to provide value to the taxpayer through this competitive advantage that we have over smaller municipalities. Our scale of service delivery ensures costs are spread cost-effectively over time and population, that simply can't be matched by the local municipalities on their own.

"The Region spans across the three local municipalities and the details that will need to be negotiated are wide-ranging and very complex," said Iannicca. "Whatever the decision taken by the Province will be, we are committed to ensuring that the exemplary outcomes that we have been able to provide our residents and business for over 40 years will be maintained."

Mississauga staff provided three options to council at a recent meeting. They said the city can be its own single-tier municipality; that the Region of Peel is reformed, and that Mississauga, Brampton and Caledon amalgamate.

Caledon is not an option," said Crom-

of all three municipalities do not want an amalgamation. They each have a distinct identity and an independent history, and that they are inefficient.

Thompson, on the other hand, continues to voice his support for regional governance.

"I've been involved in regional government for the past 16 years," said Thompson. "I've been chair of the Region's Public Works Committee. I have a good understanding of how regional government works. What appears at first glance to be simple would, in my view, be complicated, divisive and potentially very expensive."

Crombie said it no longer makes sense for Mississauga to be part of the Region of Peel. She said they have the financial strength, experience and maturity to operate as their own city, set their own priorities and control their own destiny."

York Region chair and CAO Wayne Emmerson didn't want to enter the fray.

"It is not for me to comment on discussions or decisions of other political jurisdictions beyond the boundaries of York Region," he said. "As I stated in January when the Ontario government first announced a review of Regional governments, Simcoe County and the lower-tier municipalities, York Region is supportive of the review. York Region and our partnership with our nine cities and towns is strong, supportive and collaborative. We are always identifying efficiencies and better ways to conduct business to benefit our residents and businesses. It is just one of the reasons why people choose York Region to live, work and visit."

King Mayor Steve Pellegrini said it's "narrowminded to think it's all about

Regarding the relationship among regional colleagues, Pellegrini likened it to sending your kids off to university, one by one.

Councillor Bill Cober also came out in favour of the plan, noting some 32,000 cars travel along King Road each day. The market demand drives commercial investment like this, he pointed out. Today, time is precious and people demand the convenience of drive-throughs. Cars are becoming cleaner, and more electric vehicles will lower emissions and pollution in the future.

King has to shore up its residential to commercial ratio, to improve the overall tax burden. A commercial investment like this makes people stop in the village, and creates jobs.

Councillor Avia Eek sided with the residents, noting this project is not suitable on this parcel. She said residents' concerns really need to be taken into consideration. "These people live there; it's their community," she said.

Councillor Jordan Cescolini noted he supports business, but has listened to residents and stands up for them. He, too, opposed the recommendations.

On March 27, York Regional Police received a report from a concerned citizen that a woman had been leaving bread and dog food or treats on the

ground at King City Memorial Park. He believed the food had been poisoned as he reported that he was aware of at least two dogs that had eaten something at the park and became ill.

On April 1, YRP received an additional report from King bylaw officers who have been investigating the incidents as well. They provided information on two possible suspects.

The suspects were identified and empty bags and containers in their possession were seized. Officers also located pieces of bread that appeared to be freshly left in the park. The bread has been sent to the Center of Forensic Sciences for expert examination. No charges have been laid.

Township staff placed warning signs at Memorial Park advising people of

"Our most important priority is keeping animals safe," said Chris Fasciano, director of Parks, Recreation and Culture. "We're advising people to keep their dogs on a leash and don't let them walk alone outside of their view. It only takes a second for a dog to eat something on the ground." King's animal control bylaw, dogs must be leashed and not allowed to run at large at all times.

The speed at which toxic substances take effect varies depending on the type and quantity ingested by the animal, but the symptoms of poisoning are relatively easy to recognize:

· Neurological concerns (change in behaviour, lethargy/weakness, tremors, loss of coordination, difficulty walking, seizures, coma).

· Gastrointestinal concerns (loss of appetite, excessive thirst, drooling, excessive urination, diarrhea, vomiting).

· Cardio-respiratory concerns (rapid breathing/panting, rapid heart rate, vo-

If you suspect your dog has eaten something harmful, take them to your veterinarian or emergency clinic im-

Several generations in each of these homes have dedicated their time and effort to preserving their properties, thus ensuring significant historic architecture at

With a rich architectural history, the core of Kettleby village is truly unique in having many houses which were built by our early pioneers and settlers in the mid- to late-1800s. This is not a collection of pioneer homes on show to the public. It is a real pioneer village, where many people care about their homes and their local environment.

To allow the destruction of any one of these homes is more than embarrassing, it represents an insult to our forefathers, and to anyone with any sense of value for our community history.

From 150 years ago to 150 years from now, Canadians will look back and wonder what was in the minds of those who allowed the original houses to be replaced with pretentious houses. No matter what new home tries to replicate an older one, it can never hold any true historic value, no matter how old. It is simply not

In terms of setting a precedent, as soon as one of these homes is demolished, others will likely follow, if the same councilors are of the same mind in future. This would mean that ultimately, there would be no more heritage village, which is a true rarity in Canada.

When will the value of heritage architecture be realized by those making such decisions? When will community be valued, and those who live in this community, who have a deep admiration for the special place in which they live, instead of the irresponsible wishes of selfish individuals?

I would propose that individuals should not have the right to do "anything they want," when it includes ruining the unique heritage which this village provides. One just has to look at many new residential developments – cookie-cutter replicas almost everywhere, with few exceptions - most are pretentious homes of little

Bringing in heritage experts who deflected and eradicated the issue of heritage to this structure is only relevant to those people. They don't live in our village and clearly have no vision for the future of the village. There are so many options to rejuvenate the interior of the house in question. Many modifications to better suit the needs of the current occupants are feasible options without destroying the historic structure.

I would sincerely request that the current mayor and councilors, and indeed future mayors and councilors, do not allow homes of more than 100 years old, in our cherished village, (and indeed in King) be allowed to be demolished, unless their condition is so far gone that rejuvenation is impossible, which is not the situation in this case.

When it comes to original historic structures compared to rebuilt facsimiles of those houses, true historic value lasts forever. Values of fake, pretentious homes become insignificant, very quickly.

Keeping King green makes us happy, healthy

Finland is the happiest country in the world for the second year in a row, according to the UN happiness report. Finland has long, dark, and cold winters; it's not the richest country in the world, and there are high rates of suicide. What makes the Finnish people so happy?

"Our secret is in our nature, very literally. When others go to therapy, Finns put on a pair of rubber boots and head

than that, there is truth in this.

My mom is Finnish and I was recently in Kuopio. Finland for research (I am studying a health policy approach known as Health in All Policies). While I was there interviewing government employees and speaking with locals, I repeatedly heard people speak of their love for nature.

"We are nature people," one woman told me. Even the city planners and decision makers recognized the importance of having and preserving forests and greenspaces.





staying. After work, I would go for a walk on these trails, and would see many other people there. It was November, so it was very dark (I didn't see the sun at all during my 10-day visit), and it rained every day. Nevertheless, the trails were busy. We could walk when it was dark because there were lamps on the trail. I saw people walking alone or with a buddy. People were generally quiet, seemingly in their thoughts and enjoying themselves. In the 10 days I walked the trails, I saw only one person on his phone.

Research shows that visiting forests increases physical and mental health, and evidence suggests that living near major highways may increase the risk of negative health outcomes (including asthma in children). Living near major roads increases noise and air pollution for nearby residents.

When I was in Kuopio, the locals showed me a new subdivision that had just been built. This subdivision was near two major roads, but instead of homes being built right beside the highway, there was space between the homes and the road, and even a wall to block the noise. They even painted the wall with beautiful art! I was taken aback at how thoughtfully this subdivision had been built. Clearly, the health and wellbeing of residents were considered during the planning.

This made me think of the new townhomes being built in Vaughan near Canada's Wonderland adjacent to Highway 400. The homes look as if they literally cannot be any closer to the highway. Were the health and wellbeing of citizens considered when planning and approving this development?

Kuopio and Vaughan are very different cities, particularly in their land availability and population size. Nevertheless, I don't see why greenspaces cannot be protected and homes cannot be built a safe distance from highways and major roads.

King is a nice place to live and has many forests and greenspaces. However, many other cities started off like King, and ended up with congested developments and parsimonious parks and forests (think of some areas in Brampton). And unfortunately, it's often the neighbourhoods with less expensive homes that end up with even less greenspaces, parks, and trees (and are more likely to be situated beside major roads).

Michelle Obama says in her book "Becoming" that as a child she could tell the rich from the poor neighbourhoods by the amount of trees that were on the streets: "The poorer neighbourhoods often had no trees at all."

Although King is in a good place when it comes to greenspaces, city decision-makers must continue to advocate for protected forests and greenspaces, for all residents. Health, happiness, and wellbeing should be considered in city planning and development. We should all have the luxury of putting on our boots and heading to the woods.

MPP touts savings as Drive Clean ends

King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce headed out into the community, to celebrate the government's plan to reduce the burden on vehicle owners, save time, and put more than \$40 million back in the pockets of taxpayers each year by cancelling the Drive Clean Program.

Lecce made the announcement during a tour of Maple Honda in Vaughan recently.

"Our government is committed to putting more money back in your pockets. That is why we have cancelled Ontario's costly, time consuming, and outdated Drive Clean program that has outlasted its effectiveness and no longer provides value for taxpayers. The provincial government's Made-In-Ontario Environment Plan will focus on heavy polluters, so that Ontario can continue to lead in reducing smog-causing pollutants, without raising taxes or costs on families, seniors, and small businesses," Lecce said.


When it was first introduced by the Progressive Conservative government in 1999, Drive Clean was effective in delivering results. More than 16% of passenger vehicles were flagged for repair annually. But as the years expired, so did the program's usefulness and Drive Clean no longer did the job it was intended to do.

According to the Auditor General, on-road emissions declined steeply, so much so that they are no longer the biggest contributor to smog. 75% of these reductions came through stricter manufacturing standards, requirements for cleaner fuels, and the natural retirement of older vehicles – not as a result of Drive Clean.

This program established almost 20 years ago, no longer makes sense. Premier Doug Ford and Minister of the Environment Rod Phillips announced the cancelation of this outdated program.

The Made-in-Ontario Environment Plan targets heavy emitters and promises strong enforcement to crack down on the biggest polluters.

"We recognize that Ontario must continue to do our share to combat climate change. That's why our plan commits to reduce our Greenhouse Gas emissions 30% by 2030, a target that aligns us with the federal government's commitments," according to a statement from Queen's Park.







CDS qualifies three debaters for Worlds

For the 12th consecutive year, The Country Day School has qualified a debater for the World Championships, held this year from April 11-17 at Branksome Hall in Toronto. There will be 14 students representing Canada, and for the first time three students will be from CDS.

Maeve Tebbutt, 19 (from Midhurst), was the first to qualify last fall at the International Independent Schools' Public Speaking Competition (IISPSC). Following very closely behind Maeve, Anna finished 4th overall at the IISPSC and like Anaïs qualified to compete at Nationals.

At the Nationals, Anna finished 3rd overall, qualifying to compete in Worlds. Anais also excelled, securing a spot at Worlds for her second year. Students from independent schools in 16 countries will converge to compete within a global community in three out of four events: Impromptu Speaking, Parliamentary Debate, Interpretive Reading and either After Dinner or Persuasive Speaking.

"We are immensely proud of what all three girls were able to accomplish again this year at the IISPSC and Nationals," said longtime debating coach Kerstin Wyndham-West. "We wish them well at the World Championships representing CDS on the world stage."

Teen receives life-saving award

Calm under extreme duress, an Aurora teen saved a man's life.

Haley Hastings, 16, received the Life-Saving Certificate recently, at a ceremony hosted by St. John Ambulance and York Regional Police. Hastings was the only civilian to be honoured at the February event, where she received praise from EMS officials for her actions last fall.

It was Nov. 10, 2018 when Hastings was working the night shift at a fast food restaurant. That night, she was up front serving customers. She took a man's order and waited for him to return from the bathroom. After more than 15 minutes went by, she became concerned. He came running to the front crying, saying his friend was on the floor of the bathroom in critical condition.

Hastings went to check, pushed her way into the bathroom and found a man in an awkward position under the stall doors. She made him comfortable and noted he was in bad shape so she began CPR while the manager called 911. Hastings noted he was frothing at the mouth and was covered in a white, powdery substance, denoting a drug overdose.

She maintained her composure and continued working on the man until EMS personnel arrived. He was a larger man and Hastings had to push hard with her compressions, working up a sweat in the process. EMS lauded Hastings for her actions and noted she helped maintain the man's pulse and kept him alive in those crucial minutes.

She said she didn't hesitate to jump in and do what she could.

When Haley's mom Teri arrived on scene that night, she was shaken, but impressed at how calm and collected her daughter was.

Giving Haley a boost was her CPR training and experience at a specialized co-op placement at Southlake Regional Health Centre.

When she returned for her co-op placement Monday morning she asked about the patient, but it wasn't until the following Wednesday that she found him in ICU and was assigned to his team of caregivers.

The man spent more than a week in hospital before he sadly passed away. He had no family and had been a resident



at the Blue Door shelter in Newmarket.

Hastings's effort was bittersweet. But she took some consolation in knowing that six of the man's organs were donated to help change the lives of other people.


Hastings admitted it felt odd receiving the award, given that the man passed away and didn't even get a funeral.


Hastings is currently reviewing her post-secondary options, with a hope to get into trauma medicine. She had thought about following in the footsteps of her grandfather, Dr. former chief of orthopaedics at Wellesley Hospital and former team doctor for the Toronto Maple Leafs when they won the Stanley Cup back in 1967.

These days, our youth are more often criticized than they are praised. It's good to know people like Haley Hastings don't think twice about springing into action, and helping their fellow men and women.









Local delegate helps expand women's rights abroad

Promoting access to education for women and girls received some international attention recently, at the largest United Nations gathering on gender equality ever held.

Schomberg's Lynn Bird was a delegate, represented the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) at the United Nations Commission on Status of Women held March 11-22 in New York City.

An estimated 9,000 delegates from around the globe shared concerns, recommendations, concepts and plans to promote opportunities for women.

For Bird and the CFUW, it meant they had the opportunity to have their message heard by some of the delegates. Their particular delegation included some of the top national leadership of CFUW and "we were well prepared."

Ahead of the conference, they submitted a written statement called "Promoting Gender Equality through Quality Public Education Systems and Services." The statement, Bird said, focuses on tackling the systemic barriers in accessing education for women and girls and ensuring safe and non-discriminatory learning environment.

"We had the support from the Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women, Graduate Women International. International Alliance of Women, the National Council of Women of Canada and YWCA Canada! The hope was that we would be selected to present this statement to the UN."

CFUW partnered with Graduate Women International to present a parallel event entitled "The Promise of Global Citizenship Education and the Power of Digital Literacy." The power of connectivity to the internet for educational advancement is well documented and one speaker streamed from Canada, making this an excellent example of using technology.

The CSW is the principal global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women.

The discussion at this year's session focussed on social protection systems; women's empowerment, and the vital participation of NGOs.

As an NGO with "consultative status" with the United Nations, the CFUW delegation actively participated

CFUW delegates from across Canada chosen to attend the event.

This was the first time Bird attended the UN. She was filled with wonder prior to the conference, eager to learn more about advocacy issues. She also had an expection to learn some of the best practices that would benefit women and girls in Tanzania.

"The benefits for me were the opportunity to meet many women in leadership roles throughout the world and hearing about what they are doing to addresses issues of concern to women. Issues of inheritance rights of widows in India; the elimination of child marriages in Yemen and female genital mutilation in Kenya. Closer to home was the issue of missing and murdered indigenous women. I learned a great deal from a presentation on the role of the family in giving girls the confidence to pursue a career in STEM. Girls are under represented in STEM careers compared to other developed countries.

"We were happy to have a face to face meeting with our own Minister of the Status of Women and International Development, Maryam Monsef, and presented a statement on the need for Canada to have a national child care program, one that is accessible and affordable. Canadian child care advocates have been requesting this for many years.

"One take-away from this event was the amount of interest by my fellow CFUW delegates in ABCD's program that supports a women's cooperative in Tanzania that is making personal care kits available for young women and girls to help with their menstrual health needs. Girls miss less school, stay healthier when they have easy access to water, toilets with doors and personal care kits.

Bird co-founded a Canadian NGO, ABCD: Art Building Children's Dreams, that works in Tanzania to support the educational needs of children and community development in the Kilimanjaro Region.

Bird hopes to release a report for CFUW this May. She will also be presenting some best practices on gender equality that could "apply to our work in Tanzania to our board of directors here in Canada and also to the Community Based Organization, ABCD Tanza-

Palm Sunday At All Saints – Our 10:30 a.m. service next Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week. We commemorate Jesus's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, an event chronicled in each of the four Gospels. It will be celebrated

by the distribution of palm crosses representing the palm branches the crowd scattered in front of Christ as he rode into Jerusalem and by hearing the passion story.

Our young people perform the Good Samaritan - Grace Martin's church school performed the whole story of the Good Samaritan last Sunday at the front of the church. Maundy is a short for of the Latin word for commandment. Jesus's new commandment to his disciples was to "love one another as I have loved you."

Our Diocesan Bishop visits All Saints Bishop Andrew Asbil was warmly welcomed to our church last Sunday - he officiated at the service and delivered an inspiring sermon on the Gospel story in John 12 of Mary anointed Jesus's feet with expensive perfume and wiping them with her hair. He said that we all have a ministry and called us to give generously of our gifts.

Our relationship with God is always moving, sometimes he is out of sight and seeks us out. "I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert," he quoted from Isaiah when the Jewish people were separated from God. "Sometimes you have to be far from home to know who you are. Then God reveals himself, and knows who you are. He says 'I see you,' I will do a new thing and the whole creation will change. Old words will be fresh again."

Mary knew that grief was coming to Jesus. He reminded us that Mary's immense gratitude involved anointing Jesus with perfume worth a whole year's wages. He told the story of an event when he was a curate raising money for his church and he had to ask a parishioner, Jim, for a donation. To his enormous surprise, he promised \$100,000 saying "it's a joy to give." In the Gospel Jesus says the poor will always be with us. He urged us to be open-handed with them and with our parish. In so doing we will receive new life and be transformed.
