

"Volunteerism is essential to King. Not only do your efforts create a foundation that defines the character of King, but they immeasurably enhance the quality of our community," Pellegrini said.










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

Check local By-law before starting an Open Air Fire/Burn Township of King - April 2019

King Fire & Emergency Services is advising local residents to contact them regarding the restrictions that govern open air burning before having any open air fires or burning brush.

"With spring outdoor cleanup starting, we know some residents choose to burn brush and yard debris on their property," explained Fire Chief Jim Wall. Cleaning up debris and limiting the level of flammable vegetation surrounding your home is understandable. However, please make sure that the way you do it is safe – for you, your home, your neighbours, and the surrounding area.

A permit is required with specific conditions for burning in the Township of King.

Open air burning can include the use of outdoor fireplaces and cooking fires not involving the use of a barbeque (for recreational purposes). Some outdoor appliances may not be recommended because there is potential for personal injury, property damage and increased risk of a grass fire. Please do your homework and go on-line and research these appliances before you make any

"Whether in the backyard of your home, the cottage or at a campground please make fire safety a priority," said Fire Chief Wall. "Open air burning, especially if left unattended can become difficult to control and can result in a serious injury or widespread fire." Always keep fire safety in mind.

Artists encouraged to design new Schomberg crosswalks

Calling all Schomberg artists!

Street art is about to be incorporated into making Main Street in Schomberg even more pedestrian friendly!

Everyone is familiar with painted crosswalks. A growing trend is to use the space between the white striped lines for some form of creative expression, combining colourful, eye-catching options with enhanced pedestrian safety. In Ontario, there have been colourful crosswalks installed in Toronto, Kitchener, Windsor and Hamilton.

The Schomberg Village Association saw this as a great opportunity for Main Street and has launched a contest for area artists to submit original designs for three crosswalks to be installed by King Township, two at the corner of Church Street and Main Street, and one at Main Street and Dr. Kay Drive.

"You can think of the space between the white lines as a blank canvas," explained Charles Cooper, president of a collaborative effort between the

the Schomberg Village Association. "Not only will the designs keep pedestrians safer, properly designed crosswalks will also enhance Schomberg's walkability and sense of community."

While the theme of the crosswalk artwork is at their discretion, artists are encouraged to be creative and design artwork that best reflects and represents Main Street's heritage and agricultural roots, with the utmost respect for its history and the community itself.

The competition is open to residents of the Schomberg area. A single artist will be chosen to ensure continuity in the themes of the three crosswalks. The artist or artist teams will receive a \$1,500 honorarium for the selected designs used in this project. The deadline for applications is Tuesday, May 28. As such, for safe railway operations, the annual vegetation control program will be carried out on CN rail lines in the province of Ontario. Proposed townhouses a sign of provincial conformity

Yes, too dense while encroachment into the existing 30-metre buffer zone is unnecessary. As far as I'm concerned, the greater the number of people and units crammed into one area, the wider the surrounding buffer ought to be – it should not be fixed.

In a presentation to council on behalf of the applicant, Adam Grossi noted the current buffer "is not working" while, the smaller proposed buffer "will function much better." Nothing to do with needing more space to cram in extra units, huh?

Kudos to Councillor Jordan Cescolini for observing these units were "already advertised for sale online" though unapproved. Noting this is a contravention of the Planning Act, he asked if Grossi's client had posted the advertisement. What's the penalty for breaching the Planning Act? Or, did some unknown entity illicitly commandeer the online sales function for this company due to the pervasive and global 'Wild West' attitude that prevails with development across southern Ontario?

It's time for Ontario to show vigilance, just in case some entrepreneurs might be getting ahead of the game, while various pieces of planning legislation continue to be de-constructed at the provincial level.

Like it or not, provincial legislation dictates how communities are built, no matter who gets elected at the municipal level. As you venture around this precise form of development in Vaughan, Richmond Hill, Markham, Newmarket, Bolton - heck, they all look the same! Aside from road signs about place and population, these locales are indistinguishable from one another as they meld together. Provincially-imposed regimental conformity stalks the landscape.

There are approximately 70 pieces of provincial legislation directing development at the municipal level. While municipalities appear to have local independence, they are like freight trains, loaded with provincial legislation. The province lays the tracks, so that's the only direction followed by municipal trains. This explains why Ontario developments looks so similar everywhere.

And, that is why every resident should be concerned to read "Province asking municipalities to 'pause' on OPs" (King Weekly Sentinel, March 28). Good to hear Mayor Pellegrini does not want to pause the process.

Enter King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce, stating "we have heard loud and clear from municipalities and job creators - there is too much red tape." What did government hear from the average unwashed voter, us peons of democracy? As a peon, here's what I figure: the greater the growing population on this finite landscape, the more there will be competing demands, so government must balance and referee disputes between competing sectors, while

King, you might wonder if you've seen weighing in favour of the public inter- where, but lacks solid laws when it est. Corporations have their lobbyists, while ordinary citizens are supposed to be represented by government.

Lecce seems to focus most on housing, but Ontario has been doing that Toronto tend to be the primary focus since the mid-1980s at an ever accelerating pace. Let's switch channels for a moment. Where is the provincial policy on preservation of farmland? We know people need food, and if you are bringing in more people, ergo, you need more food. If Ontario is actually open for business, it should have a solid agricultural policy. Consider a few comments from Keith Currie, president of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, in his letter (dated Jan. 18 0 to the Premier and Ministers of Ontario:

"In 2017, Ontario's family farm and food processing businesses contributed \$39.5 billion in GDP and supported 822,483 jobs. Agriculture and agri-food are the number one economic contributor to Ontario's overall economy. Jeopardizing these stable, recession-resistant businesses and jobs runs counter to an 'open-for-business' mind set. Agriculture is a business. This proposal presumes that agricultural land should no longer be preserved and protected for agriculture to make way for commercial and industrial businesses."

If housing is the main concern, let's digest the recent (March 2019) report from Transparency International Canada, entitled, "Why Criminals Love Canadian Real Estate (and how to fix it)."

Canada welcomes money from any-

comes to corporate transparency, anonymous ownership, and outright money-laundering in the real estate market. The areas around Vancouver and of such activity, but it occurs in other areas, too, as noted at http://www. transparencycanada.ca/wp-content/ uploads/2019/03/BOT-GTA-Report-WEB-copy.pdf This particular report relates exclusively to activities in Ontario.

"The Financial Action Task Force (FATF) estimates that real estate accounts for nearly a third of criminal assets confiscated worldwide, reflecting its appeal for money laundering ... it is clear that real estate is attractive to criminals with money to launder, and basic economics suggests that prices increase in response to added demand. Money launderers also have perverse incentives to overpay or overstate the value of property in some cases, artificially inflating benchmark prices. By allowing criminals to invest in Canadian real estate, we are exacerbating crises in cities where housing is unaffordable and in short supply."

Transparency International Canada's report outlines its methodology before identifying specific risks, and names of individuals or organizations uncovered thus far. It reviews anonymous ownerships in the GTA only, going back to 2008.

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

That was the message delivered by King's business brass at the annual Mayor's Lunch, held at Nobleton Lakes. The King Chamber of Commerce, and its new president Angelo Santorelli, welcomed Mayor Steve Pellegrini and a sold-out crowd of local business own-

King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce was slated to attend, but an emergency called him away. Former King councillor Linda Pabst spoke on his behalf, noting the MPP is strengthening ties with King Township and Mayor Pellegrini. He's stepped up and helped bring investment to King, from the GO station in King City to Schomberg's revitaliza-

The government is helping to grow small business and expand the employment base, across Ontario and also here in King. Helping to reduce red tape and improve business in his riding if one of Lecce's priorities.

Santorelli, in his first official event as president, stressed that small business has always been a foundation of our country's economic driving force.

He extended praise to Chamber board members and especially administrator Helen Neville, for setting up the lunch and making things run smoothly.

Santorelli praised former president Tom Allen for the years he's given to the Chamber as president and board member. Allen's contributions are "too numerous to mention" and Santorelli looks forward to relying on Allen for his expertise and guidance.

Mayor Pellegrini said the relationship between the Township and the Chamber continues to grow strong and Allen has been a big part of that cooperation. The Chamber wouldn't be where it is today without the strong leadership from its president and board members.

Pellegrini also welcomed Santorelli. who's a long-time resident and strong community force. Under his term, the Chamber will continue to encourage small and large businesses to flourish.

The mayor reviewed the Township's budgets and business plans through 2022, which maintain operational service level standards, boosting roads and respects the taxpayers. King's network of some 300 kilometres of roads

King's Economic Development department has been busy and its 2018-2022 strategy will set the stage for the future. The key areas of focus include investment readiness; a commitment to sustainability; fostering a culture of entrepreneurship, and developing a strong, innovative rural brand.

Recent achievements include the creation of the strategy; Schomberg Main Street revitalization; core parking study and the hiring of a new economic co-ordinator.

King's Community Improvement Plan (CIP) is working well, and has delivered more than \$167,000 in grants to last four years. For every dollar the

Township investments in this program, property owners and businesses have invested \$8.50 to improve and revitalize their properties.

The mayor also touched on the new recreation facility to be built on lands owned by Seneca College; King City streetscaping projects; the \$750,000 in funding provided by the Province, as well as upcoming events in the commu-

King has been working for years to get broadband Internet service available to rural King homes. Even though it's not a municipal responsibility, King has been working with other levels of government, as well as Vianet, to get the services up and running. The mayor pointed out that King City will see the bulk of residential development in the next few years, but he stressed the local businesses in core areas over the municipality will manage it in a sustainable way

The results show \$28.4-billion worth of housing was acquired through private corporate entities since 2008; \$9.8-billion of real estate were purchased with cash by private companies, bypassing statutory anti-money laundering (AML) checks on funding source; from 2008 to 2018, \$25-billion in real estate was purchased from unregulated lenders, bypassing AML checks again.

This report also shows unregulated lending accounts for 49% of mortgages taken out by companies, compared to 3% for individuals. Since anonymous ownership is opaque, it is not possible to attribute motive to purchases, but policies that serve transparency would eliminate the type of opacity that obviously serves criminal objectives.

If Ontario is "Open for Business," let's be sure it's the kind of business we want. After reading this report, Ontarians might want governments to exercise greater scrutiny, not less. More red tape, maybe?

A really special aspect of the tour is getting inside an artists studio, seeing their work space, wet brushes, canvases with ideas.



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

He's also a past member of the King Township Environmental Advisory Committee and was instrumental in forming the Tree Focus Group, helping to preserve trees in King.


Mayor Pellegrini said Craig is know for his "gentle and loving voice.




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

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Nature Conservancy will lead delivery of new program

The Nature Conservancy of Canada is taking the lead in investing in this country's most precious natural re-

The conservancy, well known as stewards in King Township, has been named by the federal government to lead the administration and delivery of a new \$100-million, four-year national program, pending a final funding agreement, that will help protect more of Canada's nature.

The Natural Heritage Conservation Program will be delivered by NCC and its partners, including Ducks Unlimited Canada, Wildlife Habitat Canada and the Canadian Land Trusts Working Group. The program will assist local, provincial and national conservation land trusts in securing land from private landowners, as well as to secure private interests (e.g. forest tenures) on land in order to establish new protected and conserved areas.

The new program will establish at least 200,000 hectares of newly protected land and freshwater, especially in southern Canada where nature and wildlife faces the greatest pressures and where the majority of land is privately owned. The program will also contribute directly to reaching Canada's goal of doubling the amount of nature protected in our lands and oceans.

For every dollar of federal funding, the NCC and its delivery partners will provide a minimum \$2 matching funding from non-federal sources, including donations of lands.

"Nature is our most precious resource. By working together, we can double the amount of nature we're protecting in our oceans and our lands from coast to coast to coast. Today's investment will help protect nature closer to where Canadians live at the same time as focusing on the parts of Canada that are facing the greatest threats to areas rich in biodiversity," said Catherine McKenna, Minister of Environment and Climate Change.

"The Natural Heritage Conservation Program will bring Canadians together to take real action to protect our lands, freshwater and species at risk. We are grateful for the opportunity to lead this program, working alongside our partners to deliver a model of environmental leadership. There has never been a more important time to invest in the natural areas that sustain us all," added John Lounds, president & CEO, Nature Conservancy of Canada.

"Many of Canada's most important natural habitats, including wetlands, are located within its privately held or settled landscapes. In addition to providing critical habitats for waterfowl and other wetland-dependent species, these areas deliver essential benefits such as clean water, flood and drought mitigation and protection from sea level rise to citizens and communities across the country. Ducks Unlimited Canada looks forward to the ways that the Natural Heritage Conservation Program will deliver more of these benefits to wildlife and all Canadians through new protected areas. It's a significant investment that will positively impact generations to come," said Karla Guyn, CEO of Ducks Unlimited Canada.

"Wildlife Habitat Canada is excited to be a part of this significant project, which will protect and conserve important biodiversity in wildlife and their habitats across the country. We bring 35 years of grant administration experience to this initiative and look forward to helping the Land Trust community secure critical private lands that will further preserve Canada's natural heritage," commented Cameron Mack, executive director, Wildlife Habitat Canada.

In November 2018, the Government of Canada launched a call for proposals for the Natural Heritage Conservation Program. The call sought proposals from organizations to develop, coordinate, and deliver a national program aimed at assisting local, provincial, territorial, and national conservation organizations in securing at least 200,000 hectares of ecologically sensitive pri-


vate lands and interests in lands in Canada.

Private lands are mainly located in southern Canada where the greatest biodiversity is found. These private lands are where most Canadians reside and where pressures from development are higher.

"Your community and local land trusts across Canada look forward to working with the Government of Canada and our partners to expand the protection of private lands to achieve Canada's Target 1 goals. Canada's local land trusts are a key partner in conserving Canada's biodiversity, especially as our natural areas and species are further pressured by climate change. By acquiring natural heritage lands and by thoughtful stewardship, land trusts can help Canada both adapt to and mitigate climate change. Land trusts can be local solutions to the global problems of biodiversity loss and climate change," added Susan Walmer, co-chair, Canadian Land Trusts Working Group.

The \$500 million Canada Nature Fund, which funds the Natural Heritage Conservation Program, is part of the Budget 2018 Nature Legacy initiative, which invests \$1.3 billion in nature conservation.

In King, NCC oversees Happy Valley Forest, the largest intact block of deciduous forest on the Oak Ridges Moraine. It is an outstanding example of the mature sugar maple and beech upland forests of the moraine. Nearby Pottageville Swamp is a Provincially Significant Wetland made up primarily of treed wetlands.

CDS graduate Goodrow plays hero in Sharks' series win

Only seven minutes of ice time, but a memory to last a lifetime.

Country Day School graduate and ex-Cyclone varsity player Barclay Goodrow put the icing on the cake in the NHL's San Jose Sharks' first round series with the Vegas Golden Knights late last week, burying the overtime winner that marked an incredible lategame comeback for the Sharks to move on to round two.

Goodrow, a regular fourth-liner on only his second shift of the extra frame, called it the "biggest goal of his career."

"To be honest, I can't really remember what just happened," Goodrow told a massive media scrum following the game. "It was a pretty surreal mo-

With the Sharks down 3-1 late in the third period, the team went on a five-minute major power play that saw them score four goals to take the lead. The Golden Knights managed to tie it up late to force the overtime, before Goodrow put the series to bed.

"Game seven, overtime, NHL playoffs," Goodrow told TSN's Ray Ferraro. "I had tons of energy. I was sitting there most of the overtime, so when I got the call, I figured I may as well use my fresh legs, and make it create something.

The former 114-point star of the York-Simcoe Express commended star defenceman Erik Karlsson with finding him to produce the game-winning goal. "I saw him get the puck, I saw the

(defenceman) was a little flat-footed ... I was hoping he would get the puck to me as I'm getting behind the D-man ... (Karlsson) is a world-class player, so I was just happy to get it around (Vegas goaltender Marc-Andre) Fleury there."

Barclay's hockey career began with the Optimist hockey program in Aurora, a precursor to reaching the Aurora Minor Hockey program for five and six vear olds. He moved on to the Aurora Tigers AA ranks early in his career, before spending his final five years of minor hockey with the Express program, winning a total of five OMHA champi- in the regular season this year.

onships between his stints with the Tigers and the Express.

He joined the Country Day School hockey team upon the program's reintroduction in his Grade 8 year, skating for the Cyclones for three years.

The 2018-19 season marked Goodrow's rise to the top ranks, playing in all 82 games for the first time in his NHL career. After five seasons with the OHL's North Bay Battalion and going unpicked in the NHL Entry Draft, Goodrow signed with the Sharks in 2015.

He posted seven goals and 10 assists

York9 FC plays to tie in opener

A swift through pass from his midfielder, and Ryan Telfer broke into the record books just under three minutes into the Canadian Premier League's debut.

The York9 FC forward took a pass from Manny Aparacio in front of a crowd of over 17,000 attendees at Hamilton's Tim Hortons Field on Saturday, in what would eventually be a 1-1 tie between York and the home team, Forge FC.

"It's a special feeling. Just to be known as the first goal scorer in this new league is something special to me," Telfer told reporters after the match.

"It honestly hits inside. There's no better feeling than having family members

being proud of you.

"Realizing Manny had space and time to turn, there was only one thing on the mind. Manny knew exactly where I was going to be."

The York9 defenders shined in their opening match, including goalkeeper Nathan Ingham, who made a highlight reel save in the 60th minute to keep the clean sheet going.

York9 FC head coach Brennan called it "a world-class save."

"He's brave as a lion," said Brennan. "He'll throw his body in front of anything. What a great save that was, to come across the box, make himself big.

It wasn't until the 77th minute that the home team finally found the back of the net, in a match that would eventually end in a 1-1 tie.

Brennan said his team had done "their job."

"It was a true derby game today," said Brennan in the post-game. "Once that whistle blew, we knew the game was on.

"We wanted to spoil the occasion for (Forge FC) today," he said. "We wanted to come away with a point or three points, so we're happy. We've done our job today."

After just one match, it's tough to tell where the level of fan engagement will go once fans are made to pay their way into the stadium, after Saturday's initiative in providing free tickets. Yet the product on the field, intense and physical in nature, should spell success for the budding league.

Midfielder Aparicio managed to set a historic first for the league as well, though not as he had drawn it up: a second yellow card late in the game led to Aparicio earning the first red card in CPL history.

With Aparicio now becoming unavailable to take the field when his club faces Calgary's Cavalry FC on May 4, Brennan said his player became "emotional" after Saturday's match.

"He felt he let the team down," Brennan said. "I know what he was trying to do, he was trying to cause a professional foul there, they were about to break. Maybe should've used his head rather than his hands, but it got to him.

"In the dressing room he was very, very emotional, but it's a part of the game. It's a reaction that he did, and after that you think and go, maybe I shouldn't have done that, maybe I should've pulled his shorts, or his leg or something. I know what he was trying to do, I can't get mad at him.

Brennan noted the physicality of the match, one between many athletes who had never seen the game at the pro level. A total of 15 fouls were handed out in

"The pro game's here now and you're starting to see how big these guys are, how athletic, the contact within a sport. That's just the game all around the world." The two squads will meet again back in York Region on May 25.







Easter is an observance

St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton (still apart of the Anglican Parish of Lloydtown) notes that Easter is not just a one-day affair but rather an observance that lasts from sundown on Holy Saturday with Easter Vigil and runs through sundown on Pentecost Eve 50 days afterwards (this year Saturday, June 15). It now includes Ascension and Whitsuntide formerly separate church seasons. This time frame stems from the Jewish celebration of Shavuot or Feast of Weeks that is held within 50 days after Passover to mark the beginning of the spring harvest and the receiving from God of the Torah.

As Easter season deepens and white, symbolizing joy, remains the colour of robes and church hangings, questions that have perplexed Christians since the early days of this religion as it began to take hold in southern Europe and North Africa especially Hellenized Egypt remain unanswered.

From almost the beginning skeptics have questioned a Jesuine presence on Earth, some claiming it never was and that an emerging power group who would call themselves Christians invented the whole Christ story for their own benefit. Others say there was in the early 1st century AD a back country itinerant preacher called Yeshua but he had little to do with Christianity. Some claim the Jesuine figure of St Paul's writings was based on a person

from the distant past where others believe Yeshua was a composite of several men some existing at the time some earlier but all having Jesuine quali-

Another question often asked is why after his resurrection did Yeshua allow the women - Miriam (Mary) Magdalene and the other Mary (the mother of James the younger?) to clasp his feet. In the gospel accredited to John he tells the Mary Magdalene when not to touch him because he had not yet ascended to God. Some 8 days later, still not having ascended to God, he invited Toma (Thomas the Doubter) to touch him. Whether or not Thomas took up the offer isn't recorded!

Many biblical scholars say as Roman custom demanded Yeshua was stripped of his clothing at his crucifixion which were then gambled away. And once he was taken down from the cross a linen cloth was loosely wrapped around his naked body before he was hurriedly put into a rock cut tomb to await proper burial. This cloth and the one covering his face were found folded neatly on the flat ledge cut into the tomb wall where he'd lain. Thus the risen Yeshua alive but still naked wasn't seen to be in a suitable condition to be touched. He may have been in this same state when he told Thomas to touch the wound in his side and those in his hands. Was this his condition throughout his 40-day post-resurrection stay on Earth?

Mark's gospel, the first written, tells that a young man in a white robe greeted the women come to prepare Yeshua's body while Matthew's gospel, thought to be a rewrite of Mark's, tells that an angel descended from heaven in a robe as white as snow and rolled away the stone blocking entrance to the tomb.

Luke's gospel mentions that 2 men in brilliant clothes spoke to the frightened women and John's gospel also says there were 2 angels in white.

This brings us to Miriam, Yeshua's mother and whether or not she was present at his crucifixion. Only in John's gospel is his mother recorded to have been present. But did she travel with him and his followers on his last and fatal journey to Jerusalem or was she warned or did she suspect what was about to happen to her eldest son and on her own initiative make the dangerous 5-day walking journey from Nazareth to Jerusalem some 100 miles/160 km away accompanied by at least one of Yeshua's brothers or male cousins. She is not mentioned as a fellow guest when he stopped over en route at the home of Marv. Martha and brother Eleazar, thought by some to be the disciple Yeshua loved. Nor did she take part in the Last Supper, an important family

Was then Mary at home in Nazareth celebrating with Yeshua's siblings and their families and learned of Yeshua's fate after the fact?

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
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
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
