Annual Terry Fox Run this Sunday in King City

King residents are helping to keep the hope alive by participating in the annual Terry Fox Run for cancer re-

The King Township Terry Fox Run is on Sunday, Sept. 15 at Wellesley Park, King City (northwest corner of Keele Street and King Road). Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. with an open start, any time between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. There is a 2-km, 5-km and 10-km route that is bicycle, stroller and wheelchair accessible, dogs are also welcome but on leash only.

The longevity of the Run and the cancer research legacy inspired by Terry Fox is a reflection of Canada's respect and dedication to the efforts of Terry and the Terry Fox Foundation. In all, there are more than 10,000 runs taking place across Canada.

Since the Marathon in 1980, Canadians alone have raised more than \$750 million for cancer research.

The Foundation notes that roughly 82 cents of every dollar raises goes toward cancer research. The TFF has funded more than 1,300 research projects to date.

The Terry Fox Run has become the largest fundraising

event to support cancer research in the world, with more than 32 countries participating.

The Marathon of Hope took place in 1980 and Terry ran an average of 42 kilometres per day for 143 days until he was forced to end his run Sept. 1, 1980. By Feb. 1, 1981, his dream of raising \$1 for every Canadian was realized. He died in June 1981 at the age of 22.

TOWNSHIP OF KING **CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT** COMPREHENSIVE STORMWATER MANAGEMENT MASTER PLAN NOTICE OF STUDY COMMENCEMENT

The Township of King has retained Civica Infrastructure Inc. to prepare a Comprehensive Stormwater Management Master Plan. The Master Plan will describe existing conditions within, and downstream of, proposed development areas as per the Township's Official Plan; evaluate current stormwater practices, and set targets for surface runoff quantity and quality for future developments to adhere to. The study will also investigate potential retrofit opportunities within existing stormwater management facilities to assist in meeting these targets.

The Township of King is situated within watersheds managed by the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority (LSRCA) and the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA). In particular, the Township is within the Holland River (LSRCA), and the Humber River (TRCA). Stormwater management targets from both conservation authorities will be taken into account as part of the study.

The Master Plan will adhere to the process as per the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (EA) in Ontario which requires public consultation at various times during the process. The EA process will include two Public Information Centre (PIC) meetings to allow for public input from residents, landowners, regulatory agencies and other stakeholders. This input will be considered and will assist in the planning process. The PICs are anticipated to be held during January and March of 2020. A specific date, time, and location for each PIC meeting will be advertised as the study progresses. In addition, information regarding this study will be posted on the Township of King's website within the 'Stormwater Master Plan' link at www.king.ca.

King anticipates funding for rec. centre

King Township is welcoming news from Queen's Park that more funding will be directed towards renovations, upgrades and new construction in communities.

Laurie Scott, Minister of Infrastructure announced the province is now accepting funding applications for projects under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program's (ICIP) Community, Culture and Recreation (CCR) stream. The funding will go towards investing in community, culture and recreational projects that will help deliver vital services for communities, foster greater social inclusion and improve the quality of life for residents across the province.

King will be applying to secure funds for the new community recreation centre on lands owned by Seneca College.

"This is the kind of government support we need," said Councillor Debbie Schaefer. "We have established the need for a recreational facility in King City given our growth; we have secured the place for it; we need to identify a sustainable financing plan for it."

Minister Scott said these investments matter to communities.

"Community centres, cultural facilities and recreational infrastructure are exactly the types of investments that make a difference in the daily lives of people across Ontario," said Scott.

This program is funded by the federal and provincial governments along with eligible partners such as municipalities, Indigenous communities and not-for-profit groups, and could unlock up to \$320 million in provincial fund-

"These infrastructure investments are in addition to funding commitments that the Ontario government has already made for rural and northern infrastructure and transit infrastructure projects," added Scott. "We are committed to making the right investments in the right places at the right time."

Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program: Community, Culture and Recreation guidelines and application materials are available for eligible partners on the Transfer Payment Ontario website.

The Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) is a \$30-billion, 10-year infrastructure program costshared between federal, provincial and municipal governments. Ontario's share per project will be up to 33.33 per cent or about \$10.2 billion spread across four streams: 1. Rural and Northern, 2. Public Transit, 3. Community, Culture and Recreation, 4. Green.

The Province has nominated more than 350 projects to the federal government for funding under the Rural and Northern and Public Transit stream of the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, and some projects have already received federal approval to begin construction.

The Province is also currently accepting applications for transit projects from 11 municipalities inside the GTHA.

The agreement between Ontario and Canada commits \$407 million in federal funding to the Community, Culture and Recreation stream.

Lecce meets with German committee

Stephen Lecce, Minister of Education and King-Vaughan MPP, hosted Peer Knöfler and his colleagues from the German Education Committee of the State Parliament of Schleswig-Holstein earlier this week.

"My number one priority is to ensure students have the tools and skills they need to access good-paying jobs of the future. It is critical that we look at new ways to empower the next generation and challenge them to reach higher, amid a stubbornly high youth unemployment rate and skilled trade shortages.

"That is why I was pleased to have met with Peer Knöfler and his colleagues to take a closer review of Germany's successful apprenticeship model that facilitates a strong level of youth employment. It is critical that we learn from the experiences of other jurisdictions in order to continue building a skills-focused education system that opens the door to high-quality opportunities and good-paying jobs for Ontario youth.

"I am committed to deepening our relationship with our German counterparts - and all education partners - to ensure our students are able to succeed and prosper in a competitive global marketplace."


Province appeals decision on carbon ta

Ontario filed its appeal of the Ontario Court of Appeal's decision on the constitutionality of the federal Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act to the Supreme Court of Canada.

"In June, we were disappointed to learn that in a split decision, the Ontario Court of Appeal did not accept our position that the federal carbon tax is unconstitutional. Despite this decision, we remain committed to using every tool at our disposal to fight against the job-killing carbon tax, which is making life more expensive for Ontario's hard-working individuals, families and businesses. That is why we filed our appeal of the decision on the carbon tax to the Supreme Court of Canada," said Jeff Yurek, Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks.

"Since the carbon tax came into effect on April 1, we have seen the very real costs on the people of Ontario. Increased gasoline and natural gas prices mean that it is now more expensive to fuel our cars and heat our homes, with the carbon tax costing a typical Ontario household an extra \$648 a year by 2022. Now, the federal government is suggesting it could cost Ontarians even more. It's time for the federal government to be up front with the people of Ontario and disclose the real cost of its carbon tax plan.

"Our challenge against the federal carbon tax does not mean that we won't continue to address climate change and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Ontario's Made-in-Ontario Environment Plan considers our province's specific priorities, challenges and opportunities, and commits to lowering emissions to 30 per cent below 2005 levels by 2030, a target that aligns with the federal government's Paris commitments, all without a burdensome carbon tax."

More balanced King tree bylaw is needed

I've read the debate regarding the proposed tree bylaw and recently attended the proposal of the same to King council. A number of concerns stand out, some of which were touched on by other recent letters to the editor.

other recent letters to the editor. The current proposed iteration of a tree bylaw seems to have gained some support as a reaction to radical "lot clearing" in regards to commercial development in some of the Township villages, in addition to residential clearing. A fairly punitive bylaw was suggested some time agao as a reaction, one that involved the municipality determining what trees could or could not be removed from a property owner's lot, and an obligation to retain an arborist, pay fees, etc. to make changes in trees to their own property. It was eventually decided that the first iteration was a bit "aggressive" and that reconsideration of a tree bylaw was necessary and that in the meantime an educational component needed to find its way into the tree retenLetter to the Editor

tion/canopy enhancement discussion.

What is currently being proposed and discussed is only a slightly lighter form of the previous proposed bylaw. The new proposal suggests no permit fee, but an aggressive three-to-one replacement of an existing tree. The land owner removes a tree from their own lot and is obligated to replace that tree with a Township-approved tree or pay for three \$500 trees to be planted elsewhere in the township. So, to be clear. no permit fee but an obligation to do a specific thing on your own lot or to pay a substantial "tax" or penalty for the right to "not replace." What is wrong with choosing to have trees where vou do or don't want them? At the end of the day, just how many trees are enough

The proposed bylaw is only directed at the villages. Is this because the "clear cutting" was objectionable in

the village, or because the villages are being singled out ot pay for town-ship-wide tree replanting? Why are the agricultural properties not subject ot this bylaw, or the residential non-farm properties in the township? Are all residents not responsible for maintaining the tree canopy? If there is to be consideration of a tree bylaw it seems more reasonable and equitable that it apply to all residents, not just the residents of the villages.

The new proposed tree bylaw has, in large part, been influenced by the good folks at Friends of Trees/Concerned Citizens of King Township. CCKT has certainly put some effort into the tree concern and note, as we all do, that most residents love the trees in the King. The entire tree debate is, at its heart, an effort at education. At the same time, CCKT does not speak for all the residents of King Township and are doing so in the inequitable and punitive approach taken in this bylaw proposal.

A more reasonable approach to the

bylaw as we move along this process is to ask the public at large what might be a more reasonable approach, one that didn't involve dictating to residents what they can or can't do on thier own properties. And one that didn't involve a "tree tax."

When it came to council for discussion, I heard councillors suggest alternatives which were employed elsewhere: residents can remove one or two trees a year to avoid the clear cutting; a greater education component; a revised cost structure, etc. The answer is likely to be found in a more balanced approach with a limited tree removal limit per year, combined with a permit fee – the approach to be applied to ALL residents in King.

We all love the trees in King Township, but it has to be recognized that they have a natural and useful life. The canopy is already increasing, not decreasing.



Proposed tree bylaw 'targets' wrong people

and King Township council do not get the objections that township residents, including myself, have voiced regarding the proposed tree

Case in point: Newmarket launches a program where residents who plant a leaf tree receive a rebate of \$100 toward planting such a tree. Meanwhile, King Township announces a "made in King" tree bylaw draft that targets the wrong people, creates unnecessary red tape requiring permits and more bureaucracy of which Ms. Schaefer seems proud, and tries to create an additional revenue stream on top of property taxes under the guise of tree protection and environmental stewardship. What a difference forward-thinking minds can make!

There is no danger to the tree canopy in private backyards in King. Pride of ownership will prevent most property owners from cutting down healthy trees for no valid reason.

As I have stated in my open letter to council, new residential developments present the real danger. Councillor Schaefer seems to agree by stating "there is nothing to stop a developer from cutting trees down prior to having their consultants conduct an inventory during which rare species or very large important trees may be identified." So why does this bylaw draft not target this very issue instead of private backyards? Stupid and ineffective bylaws targeting the wrong cause of a problem will be ignored, leading to disrespect for the law in general, hardly a desirable outcome.

The essence of this new bylaw draft is the same as the one from 2014, whether Councillor Schaefer agrees or not. The new draft is just a lot more verbose with legalese.

I sense that Councillor Schaefer It again targets the wrong people and most recommendations made by several participants at the then public meeting were ignored, i.e. exempt dead trees, set a threshold of perhaps one or two trees per year per property that could be felled with notification, not a permit and additional cost, and address the real problem of new residential developments that require wholesale removal of healthy trees.

Township council has the means of identifying new property developments. Make this tree protection bylaw specific to them. Create a "tree bank" where developers must deposit a "monetary tree" (or more than one) for each healthy tree they take down in the process of clearing a building site. Allow residents to draw from this bank with grants toward planting new trees in their own backyards and watch the tree canopy grow.

Pierre Elliott Trudeau once eloquently said: "There's no place for the State in the bedrooms of the nation." A corollary to this quote is: There's no place for the Township in the private backyards of the residents.

A King musician has hit the road for the first time, showcasing her talent and unique style of music.

Singer-songwriter Cynthia Tauro said plans for the tour came together quickly. She's wanted to tour with her band for a long time, but it was a call from the Aylmer Performing Arts Council that set things in motion. have songs that "I really loved playing finally recorded and put out into the world! Before its recording, I was at a crossroads as to what to do next career-wise. Recording an album seemed like the right route to take.


"I was fortunate to work with George Koller, who produced and played bass on the album, and several other legendary Toronto jazz musicians. During the album's pre-production, George and I worked together to decided what originals and standards to include. We decided on four of my favourites for each. Every song on that album is meaningful to me, and they reflect where I was in my life both musically and personally when it was recorded."

Tauro said she loved the studio process, which she described as the highlight of her year so far.

"I was fortunate to be able to work with some of the kindest, loving and outstanding musicians in Canada, and it was an excellent experience for me. While we were in the studio, George and I demoed a bunch of my originals and Latin jazz standards that I loved. From there, we narrowed it down to eight songs and picked the musicians that were going to play them. We then spent one day recording all eight songs! It was a lot of work, but certainly the best work we could be doing."

Tauro said she simply loves the energy of performing live.

"As a musician performing in front of an audience, there's something that comes over you which doesn't reveal itself at home, rehearsal or in jam sessions with friends. The electric feeling that you get before and after a show is unbeatable. So, I'd just like to keep feel-



ing that feeling!"

Right now, she's focussed on the tour and preparing for the dates.

In the long-term, she hopes to record and release an EP in 2020. She wants to continue collaborating as much as possible and improve her songwriting, playing and singing.

"I don't think I'll ever be genuinely satisfied with where I am musically, so that's definitely a life-long goal!" she said. "I'm just passionate and eager to keep moving forward and progressing

as an artist."

The tour wraps up in Schomberg and Tauro said it will be a "treat to perform to a local audience in a place that's so familiar – right on Main Street!"

The tour began Sept. 4 in Ottawa and continues Sept. 14 in Aylmer. She will be at the Kensington Market Jazz Fest in Toronto Sept. 15 and then perform at Toronto's Alchemy Sept. 19. The finale in Schomberg is slated for Oct. 5 at Unplugged on Main.





Students get eye-opening message at MADD presentation

Young students in Nobleton returned to school last week and were greeted with an eye-opening message to increase their awareness.

Students at St. Mary Catholic elementary school witnessed a special screening of MADD Canada's new School Assembly Program. The program, titled "Over the Edge," gives students a realistic and hard-hitting look at what can happen when someone makes a decision to get behind the wheel after consuming alcohol and/or drugs.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among 16 to 25 year olds in Canada, and alcohol and/or drugs are involved in more than 50 per cent of those crashes. MADD Canada's School Assembly Program educates young people about the dangers of mixing alcohol and/or drugs with driving.

Students also shared their reactions and questions after the screening.

MADD Canada School Outreach representatives are travelling across the province to delivery the message students in Grades 7 to 12.

Canada will deliver about 1,400 presentations at Ontario schools, reaching hundreds of thousands of students.

At a party to celebrate Sam's homecoming, she reunites with her two best friends, Kat and Adam, and meets Kat's friend, Steve. The group catches up while drinking and smoking cannabis. Things quickly get out of hand when Kat divulges a secret, and Sam and Adam leave. Knowing she shouldn't drive, Sam calls her Dad to pick them up. The next morning, Sam and her dad decide to go fishing. On the way, Sam gets a text from Kat saying that Steve is driving impaired. Sam and her dad agree to pick Kat up at a nearby gas station, and Sam calls the police to report Steve's impaired driving. Suddenly, a crash happens, changing all of their lives forever. After that fictional story concludes, viewers see interviews with real-life victims of impaired driving who talk about their loved ones who were killed or injured in crashes.

Group objects to Greenbelt development

Ontario Premier Doug Ford keeps promising he won't touch the Greenbelt. Yet his Minister of Municipal Affairs started a process to allow sub-division development on protected Greenbelt land, according to advocacy group Environmental Defence

The forested land, located on the north side of Vaughan in the "Natural Core" protected zone of the Oak Ridges Moraine, supports important wildlife, including endangered species such as bobolink, butternut and bats. It contains a provincially significant wetland and the headwaters of Patterson Creek, therefore helping to provide clean water and reduce flooding in the region. It has been protected under the Oak Ridges Moraine and Greenbelt acts since 2003.

Environmental Defence said its development would remove one of the last large intact forested areas in north Vaughan. Building a subdivision on the land will also increase the amount of car dependent housing and the pollution that causes climate change. It is also unnecessary, as York Region has more than enough land within existing urban boundaries to provide for all projected new housing needs to at least 2031.

"The Minister, by ordering the Provincial Development Facilitator to begin negotiations to allow development on protected Greenbelt land, would have opened the door for other developers to ask for the same. The result would be death by a thousand cuts and makes a mockery of the Premier's claim that he won't touch the Greenbelt," said Executive Director Tim Gray.

"Rather than attack it, our provincial government should work with the public, municipalities and MPPs to expand the Greenbelt. It will have a chance to do so when the Legislature resumes this fall and the private members bill to extend protection to the Paris-Galt Moraine is considered at Committee."

Freemasonry is the oldest and largest world-wide fraternity dedicated to the brotherhood of man and the Lodge wants to open up membership to men in the community. A member since 1972, George Burt is proud of the orga-



nization's history and contributions to not only King's history, but that of Ontario itself.

He stressed that Freemasonry is not a religion at all, but actually encourages tolerance of all religious beliefs. A criteria to join is a belief in a "supreme being." Members don't discuss religion or politics and simply foster morality and the importance of leading a good life. Freemasonry provides and opportunity for men to meet and enjoy companionship, in the spirit of love and helpfulness.

Freemasonry contains a great deal of symbolism and all stories of a secret society are simply untrue. Freemasons proudly wear their emblems and insignia.

The fraternity has roots to the 17th century, created by the many guilds of stonemasons who built the cathedrals, abbeys and castles of the Middle Ages. The first Grand Lodge of England started in 1717.

The atmosphere in the Schomberg Masonic hall is steeped in history – you can see it all around the meeting chamber. You may even find an old spittoon or two in the corner.

Locally, the Lodge still has roughly 30 members; pretty decent considering the size of the community.

Freemasonry endeavours to "make good men better," and the local group meets once a month. Membership requires some lessons on moral values and the history of the organization.

An avid history buff himself, Burt rogers.com

has amassed more than 5,000 books on Freemasonry. He never tires of the history and insights passed on by the fraternity and its members throughout history.

Building on its tradition and long history, Freemasonry has become a modern organization dedicated to helping others. Burt has been a long-time supporter of the fraternity's MASON-ICh.I.P. program, which uses modern, police-approved techniques to create child identification kits. The kit collects photos, video, digital fingerprints, DNA swabs and is matched with the needs of law enforcement. The idea is to expedite the safe recovery of missing children. The program is free, and the next nearby event will take place Sept. 28 at the Upper Canada Mall in Newmarket at the Old Navy store.

The fraternity also provides endowments, bursaries and assists with prostate cancer research. They are also active blood donors.

With limited resources, the local fraternity often requires all hands on deck, when it comes to building maintenance and repairs. Revenue doesn't meet annual costs and they are encouraging local membership. They would also welcome corporate sponsorship and will start investigating available grants.

The Lodge will host an open house in the near future and inquiries are always welcome.



Cougars knock off rival Hawks in pre-season tourney

The Schomberg Cougars are showing glimpses of progress, before the Provincial Junior Hockey League season even begins.

The Junior C club was one of 12 teams taking part in the Alliston Hornets' annual preseason tournament at the New Tecumseth Rec Centre over the weekend, where fans and team executives alike get their first look at their rosters' final product.

Despite finishing the tournament with a 1-2 record, the Cougars can hold their heads high in besting the rival Caledon Golden Hawks in a 5-2 victory, after finishing dead last in the PJHL's Carruthers division last season.

The veteran presence was palpable for the Cougars in the Saturday matinee, where Spencer Ripley potted a pair of goals to kick off his third season with the team. Winger Brendan Cohen, now in his fourth year in a Cougars jersey and coming off a career-best 31 points in 2018-19, also had a single.

A pair of new faces made themselves known, as well. It was 18-year-old Cameron Kokelj who opened the scoring just 10 minutes into the contest, a York Simcoe Express graduate of the Midget AAA program. Will Major, an AP suiting up for the game, buried his first PJHL goal late in the first period.

Newcomer Nicolas Porreta carried the brunt of the workload between the pipes throughout the tournament, sandwiching the win between a pair of losses to the interdivisional Port Perry Mojacks and the Carruthers division's Midland Flyers.

A 5-1 loss to Port Perry to open the tournament on Friday saw Ripley as the only goal scorer for the Cougars, and should be relied upon heavily to carry a good portion of this year's offense after a six point performance in the playoffs last season.

The task will also fall to veteran forward Owen Heilemann, who led the team in scoring last year in his second season as a Cougar at a point-per-game pace. He notched the only goal for the Cougars in a Saturday afternoon 4-1 loss to the Flyers.

The Port Hope Panthers bested Midland 5-1 in the tournament's championship game.

With the pre-season now behind them, Thursday night marks the regular season home opener for the Cougars, when they host the Huntsville Otters at Trisan Centre. Puck drop is set for 8:30 p.m.

They then head to Midland on Friday evening in a rematch with the Flyers.

Hamilton claims 905 crown over York

Try as they might, York9 FC just cannot knock Hamilton's Forge FC off of the 905 throne.

The budding, yet already storied battle between the Canadian Premier League's only Ontario-based clubs continued Sunday with a visit to Hamilton's Tim Hortons Field, where Forge retained their title as 905 Derby champions in a 2-1 win.

Forge dominated the play from early on, notching the game's first tally in the 21st minute on a banked shot in off the far post. They doubled their lead with a header in close early in the second half, while a converted penalty in the 65th minute by York's Wataru Murofushi was not enough to mount a comeback.

"We wanted to just push our guys a little higher up the park," said head coach Jim Brennan after the match. "Try to create some more opportunities. And finally we started to break the lines, and the result was a penalty out of it. But we didn't do it enough today."

The two squads met in the first-ever CPL game in April, playing to a 1-1 tie, before Forge earned bragging rights in a 2-0 clean sheet in late May.

A pair of matches in mid-October between the rivals will give York9 just two more chances at redemption before the season ends on Oct. 19.

Brennan said he thinks his team "could have done a lot better" Sunday on the

"We worked hard at times, but we drifted out of it. Out of our shape, out of the energy we had ... we were in and out of the game at times, and then the last minute you're just trying to get the ball forward and try to get the ball in the box for anything, a header, a knock-on, anything ... but today's performance, it wasn't good enough by us, at all."

Hoping to contend for the top of the ladder in the fall half of the CPL season, Brennan and his team's goals have fallen well short as of late in dropping four of their last five games, only picking up a single point in a tie with Edmonton FC in late August. A record of 3-6-1 has York9 well back of the league-leading Forge FC, sitting ten points back.

York is now 1-6-1 in its last eight matches.

Despite the latest step in the wrong direction, Brennan had some positive thoughts looking forward for his squad, including praise for his goal scorer Murofushi.

"We brought (Murofushi) in because we wanted to get control of the middle of the park, which we thought was very good when he came on. He controlled the ball, and got us windows, got us playing."

The York squad will return home to York Lions Stadium this Sunday to host Valour FC, who find themselves just two points up on York in CPL standings. Kickoff is set for 3:30 p.m.

Canada 2nd in BMO Nations' Cup

The Canadian Show Jumping Team finished second in the \$530,000 BMO Nations' Cup held Sept. 7, at the CSIO5* Spruce Meadows 'Masters' tournament in Calgary.

Erynn Ballard of Tottenham, Kara Chad of Calgary, Mario Deslauriers of New York, and Eric Lamaze of Wellington, FL, took on nine other countries in the richest show jumping team competition held in North America. For the second year in a row, Canada finished in the runner-up position with a total of 14 faults.

Belgium, the newly crowned European Champions, won in convincing fashion with a total of four faults. With victory sewn up after its first three riders posted clear performances in the second round there was no need for anchor rider Yves Vanderhasselt to return for a second time. Ireland took third with 19 faults; Sweden was fourth with 20 faults; Mexico fifth with 25 faults; and France was sixth with 53 faults. Only the top six teams returned for the second round with defending champions Germany failing to make the cut. The United States, the reigning World Champions, also failed to advance while the Netherlands and Italy were also left on the sidelines.

As Canada's lead-off rider, Deslauriers had the opening element of the BMO triple combination down with Amsterdam 27, a nine-year-old Holsteiner gelding (Catoki x Acord II) owned by Luja LLC and Wishing Well Farm LLC. The fence would prove to be the 'bogey' element of the day, falling more often than any other element on course designer Leopoldo Palacios's tough track. The pair returned to jump clear the second time out, keeping Canada in the hunt for a potential third title in the event that has been held annually since 1977.

Fresh off their double clear performance in the team competition at the recent Pan American Games in Lima, Peru, Ballard and Fellini S were next in the order for Canada. After having rails at 11 'a' and at the final fence, Ballard and the nine-year-old Dutch Warmblood gelding (Vermont x Rash R), owned by Ilan Ferder, jumped clear the second time out, only getting caught by the clock for one time fault.

Lamaze, the 2008 Olympic Champion, anchored the team with a clear in the first round and four faults in the second when the Canadian plank fence fell. Having ridden Chacco Kid to victory earlier in the day in the \$133,700 Suncor Energy Winning Round, Lamaze saddled Coco Bongo, a 14-year-old Rheinlander gelding (Caretino x Calido) owned by Artisan Farms and Torrey Pines Stable, for the BMO Nations' Cup.

Dropping Ballard's score in the opening round and Chad's in the second, Canada incurred a final score of 14 faults to finish runner-up.

York teacher wins ETFO Anti-Racist and Equity Activism Award

A York teacher is doing his best to curb racism and foster equality.

The Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) has presented York Region teacher Carlos Ponce Tovar with its 2019 Anti-Racist and Equity Activism

The award recognizes a member of ETFO or group of members who have demonstrated outstanding commitment to anti-racist and equity activism in the classroom or community.

As a French teacher at Barbara Reid Public School, Carlos organized a Girls' Studies Club facilitated by a female colleague and started a Gay-Straight Alliance (GSA) with intermediate students named "Pride Pack." He conducts an annual survey among students asking if they see their identities reflected at the school in order to help support underserved students including Indigenous students and those with special education needs. Carlos also has students undertake a Compassion Project where they identify a marginalized group in their community and think of a way to make a positive change for this group.

Carlos works hard to educate and involve his colleagues in anti-racism and equity initiatives. He holds bi-weekly equity meetings with fellow teachers to plan assemblies, mark special days and hold foyer displays and workshops for students that relate to equity and inclusion. He runs an Educators' Equity Book Club meeting on a bi-weekly basis to discuss possible implications of issues derived from the readings for their school community. Carlos won ETFO's 2016 Rainbow Visions Award for his work in creating a positive space for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender students while a teacher at Castlemore Public School.

"Carlos has done an enormous amount of work to ensure that staff receive professional learning on equity issues and that students have a much deeper understanding of what inclusion looks like," said ETFO president Sam Hammond. "Carlos's work embodies ETFO's equity and social justice principles to ensure that public elementary students value inclusive and supportive classrooms and communities."







Anglican Parish By John Arnott





Words to live by – Our incumbent, Rev. Dr. Elizabeth returned from holidays last Sunday to preach on one of the Gospel's most challenging passages. "It's about detachment from that which prevents us from following God. Watch out for how we hang on to things. What we possess can possess us." Horticulture By John Arnott

The coreopses in my garden which bloom beautifully late spring into late summer now have more seed heads than flowers.

All 70 to 80 species this plant are native to the Americas-some species to North America others to South America. Those grown in gardens in our area and available local garden centres are usually perennials but there are some annual species.

The perennial is called coreopsis from the Greek koros meaning bed bug and opsis to view as/resembles since the tiny achene (capsule that holds the tinier seeds) looks like a little bug. Annuals are known as calliopsis from the Greek beautiful to view. While calliopses with their red centred flowers

edged with yellow are generally found growing wild in fields and along roadsides, coreopses are usually garden found flowers. Though all coreopses have the common name tickseed because their seed capsules look like ticks they are much better known by their botanical name.

My coreopsis is classed as c. lanceolata as most leaves have a long pointed smooth edged centre lobe and 2 similar smaller lobes opposite each other at the base of the main lobe. These lobes must have reminded the naming botanists of mediaeval sword like lances. An almost twin of this coreopsis is c. grandiflora (large flowers) with somewhat bigger flowers.

Both of species send up several stems that grow 18 in. to 3 ft. /45 to 90 cm tall from a fibrous root base eventually forms a clump which can be 12 in to 24 in./30 to 60 cm wide. Most main stems grow shorter slender branches (flower petioles/stems) and each of these hold a single daisy like flower made up of usually 8 flat ray petal like florets around a centre ring of tightly curled disc florets a few of which are dark brown.

Easy to grow easy care (once established) coreopses do well in average to poor soil.


