**NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF A NEW OFFICIAL PLAN
BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF KING**

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the Township of King passed By-law No. 2019-082 on the 23rd day of September, 2019 under Sections 17 and 26 of the *Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P. 13*, as amended, for the purpose of adopting the new *Our King* Official Plan for the Township of King.

The purpose and effect of the *Our King* Official Plan is to:

- replace the *Official Plan of the Township of King Planning Area (1970)* and all amendments thereto;
- provide direction and a policy framework for managing growth, land use and infrastructure decisions generally within the planning horizon of 2031;
- establish the basic urban structure and land use framework for all land within the jurisdiction of the Township;
- provide a policy framework which conforms to/is consistent with upper-tier and Provincial plans and policy, notably the York Region Official Plan (2010), Provincial Policy Statement (2014), A Place to Grow (2019), the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan (2017), the Greenbelt Plan (2017), and the Lake Simcoe Protection Plan;
- carry forward recent Township initiatives including the Integrated Community Sustainability Plan, Parks Recreation and Culture Master Plan, Economic Development Strategy, Transportation Master Plan, and Water/Wastewater/ Stormwater Master Plan;
- provide a detailed policy framework to ensure environmental protection, including establishing a Natural Heritage System and policies to address hydrologic features and source protection;
- establish new policies to promote the effective use of employment land and support additional economic growth;
- provide policies to improve sustainability and promote the efficient use of infrastructure within the Township to effectively manage growth and minimize climate change impacts; and,
- enable the use of a wide variety of tools under Provincial legislation to implement the policies of the Plan.

All oral and written submissions were considered as part of the process for drafting of the new *Our King* Official Plan. Public and agency submissions were considered and where applicable, are reflected in the *Our King* Official Plan. Recent public consultation on the *Our King* Official Plan took place in the form of public open houses held on May 1, 2019, May 2, 2019, May 8, 2019, and June 27, 2019. A statutory public meeting under the *Planning Act* was held on June 27, 2019. All written comments received are included in comment and response matrices, which are available to the public online at <https://speaking.king.ca/>.

The *Our King* Official Plan will be submitted to the Regional Municipality of York for approval. The Regional Municipality of York is the approval authority for the new Official Plan and may approve, modify and approve, or refuse to approve the Official Plan.

Any person or public body is entitled to receive notice of the decision of the approval authority if a written request to be notified of the decision is made to the Regional Municipality of York at the following address:

King's new Official Plan is a legacy document

"This is a legacy that this council will leave," is how King Mayor Steve Pellegrini referred to the new, and long overdue, Official Plan.

Councillors passed the comprehensive planning document Sept. 23, after a productive discussion and input from several residents. Councillors made some last-minute amendments to the plan, which included zoning changes to the core area in King City, limiting severances and placing a two-acre lot minimum in Kingscross.

King now has a "very good go-forward document," according to Mayor Pellegrini.

In the works since 2014, the Our King Official Plan replaces a 40-year-old strategic plan and marks an important milestone in King's history, according to consultant Bob Gauthier, project manager of WSP who worked on the plan.

He pointed out some key changes were made since the draft plan was introduced in July and the final version replaces all three community plans. It provides a central function for land use planning goals, ambitions and visions set by the Township.

The OP also implements upper tier (York Region, Province) policies which have a direct impact on local planning.

The new plan provides a growth management framework, sets greenfield densities, while maintaining King's small town character. "The OP does this very well," Gauthier said.

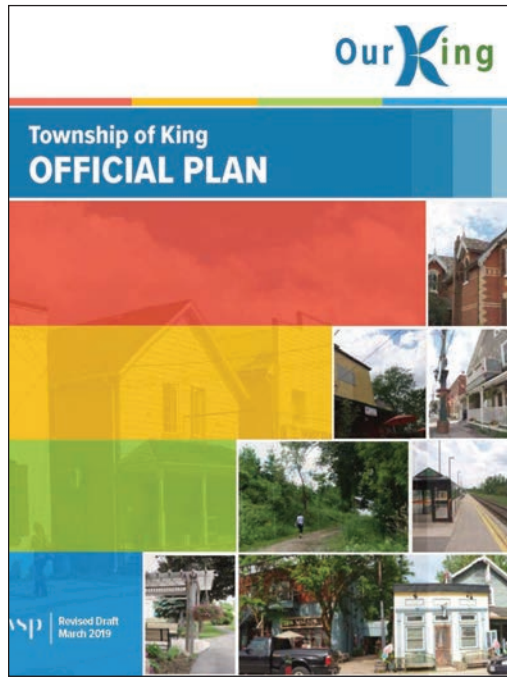
There was a need to establish intensification policies as mandated by the Province and the three villages are the focal points for this concentrated growth. The OP protects employment lands and offers source protection policies, and took into account literally hundreds of comments from agencies and the public.

"The Official Plan is a very strong, modern framework for planning in King Township," Gauthier said. "It does a good job balancing everything. It's the start of a new era of planning."

Gauthier stressed there will be many opportunities to continue to refine the document, particularly when York Region updates its own OP.

Several delegations, which included consultants, agents and landowners, asked for site-specific considerations under the plan. Many asked that future plans and uses for their properties be taken into consideration. All vowed to continue to work with Township planning staff on their proposals.

Leslie Whicher, on behalf of the Kingscross Ratepayers' Association (KRA), made a passionate plea to ban severances in established communities, and she also asked that new lots in Kingscross be a minimum of two acres.



She charged council was "weakening" its protection of communities and was "dismayed" at the lack of attention to this in the OP. She wants the Township to move forward, not backwards and stressed the same rules should be applied to everyone.

Other Kingscross residents echoed those sentiments, arguing stronger wording was needed to stress the matter.

Mayor Pellegrini pointed out King's interim control bylaw did, in fact, prohibit severances in existing subdivisions. He also pointed out Township councillors and staff did support Kingscross residents throughout the process and OMB hearing over a particular lot creation application that caused some tension.

"We have fought the good fight," he said,

Our King OP addresses King's long-term planning requirements through 2031 and equips the Township with a wide range of policies to guide growth, development, land use, environmental preservation and also to facilitate economic development initiatives.

Consultants had to respond quickly to changes in provincial legislation, as the OP was being created. The Province introduced Bills 139, 108 and created the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal (LPAT).

Window of home affordability is closing fast

"God did not say that you should be able to borrow one hundred per cent of the price of a house."

- Richard Thaler

It's no surprise that house prices in the GTA, and in fact across Ontario and most of Canada, are almost out of reach for average Canadians.

Putting more money back in the pockets of hard-working citizens has been the main theme of current political candidates as we head into a federal election.

While our esteemed politicians may not be living pay cheque to pay cheque, millions of Canadians are. Millions more may have the door slammed in their face as they try to save for and buy their first home.

Sad that it's come to this.

Even though it was a bit of a struggle for my parents, a house was still affordable. And 30-year, 4% mortgages were common back then. The cost of living was reasonable, as were groceries and even the new cars.

An average new car today costs more than my parents paid for their two-storey home in Etobicoke in the 1960s.

That's our reality today. And this current dilemma is something we all contributed to, or least went along with for the past couple of decades.

Sometimes I find it surprising that Canadians didn't revolt, with or without pitchforks in hand.

A new online piece posted by Penelope Graham on Zoocasa.com is entitled "Where could a median-income household afford real estate in Canada?" It's not a pleasant read by any means.

Hitting in the reader in the face is this example:

In Greater Vancouver: where the benchmark home costs \$993,300, a median-income household earning \$72,662 would qualify for a mortgage of only \$241,994, leaving a shortfall of \$751,306 - a total of 76% of the total purchase price. That would take a household setting aside 20% of their income annually a total of 52 years to save the required funds."

That's not to pay off the mortgage,

but simply to afford one! Can you imagine?

Buyers' ability to purchase a home varies widely from coast to coast. The gap is growing between east and west and the Prairies are seen as more affordable.

In 15 major urban centres studied across Canada, only eight are considered "affordable." The GTA isn't one of them.

And, in the remaining seven, a median-income earner wouldn't qualify for a mortgage large enough to fund their home purchase, and would need to supplement it with a hefty down payment. This, in some urban centres, would require a savings timeline that spans decades, assuming they set aside 20% of their total income each year.

In some of the figures provided, Zoocasa calculated the maximum mortgage they'd qualify for in each region, assuming a 3% interest rate, 25-year amortization, and that the equivalent of 1% of the total home purchase price would be put toward annual property taxes. An additional \$100 per month for heating costs was also factored into the calculation.

Zoocasa's calculations reveal housing affordability is most prevalent in

the Prairies, accounting for five of the most affordable markets.

Alas, a median income wouldn't get far in the British Columbia or Ontario real estate markets. Fraser Valley and the Greater Toronto real estate markets round out the steepest three, requiring median-income households to come up with 70% and 63% of total purchase prices of \$823,300 and \$802,400, respectively - requiring prospective buyers to save for 42 and 32 years!

But a young couple with decent jobs could afford a home in Regina, where the average price hovers around \$267,900. Median income earners could get a \$264,000 mortgage and could likely find the \$13,000 down payment.

Other "affordable" areas include Saskatoon, Winnipeg and Halifax-Dartmouth and Edmonton.

When my wife and I got into the market in 1980s, we purchased an end-unit townhouse for roughly \$120,000 with a \$20,000 downpayment.

About 10 years later we got the itch for something bigger. Our "profit," along with a hefty donation from the sale of my mom's house, allowed us to purchase a \$495,000 home in Bolton in 2006.

Never in my life would I have thought I'd buy a house for half a million! I recall being shocked and almost scared to death at the prospect of taking on such a burden. But our monthly payments

were manageable, so we took the plunge.

Things were rolling along nicely, until I lost my job and my wife's day care went bankrupt. Talk about troubled waters!

A few refinances, mortgages and lines of credit later, and here we are. No further ahead, but we're juggling, managing and getting by. However, if either of us lost our jobs today, we'd be looking into the abyss.

Along the way, we worked through many realities. I never owned a new car. We never went on any Caribbean vacations. We didn't eat out a lot.

But when I look at these current numbers I shake my head in disbelief, and a certain amount of sadness. What can our young generation expect in the future? Will any of our children ever own a home?

This generation has lost more than mere purchasing power. It has lost an unincumbered, stress-free youth. It has lost a certain amount of freedom and assuredness.

It may have lost faith and, in some cases, hope.

And that's incredibly unfortunate.

I don't know what the future holds. But my wife and I may hold off on "downsizing" until our kids are secure. And that's why we've started, slowly, to finish the basement. Our youngins may be staying at mi casa a lot longer!

The Township of King has retained Civica Infrastructure Inc. to prepare a Comprehensive Stormwater Management Master Plan. The Master Plan will describe existing conditions within, and downstream of, proposed development areas as per the Township's Official Plan; evaluate current stormwater practices, and set targets for surface runoff quantity and quality for future developments to adhere to. The study will also investigate potential retrofit opportunities within existing stormwater management facilities to assist in meeting these targets.

The Township of King is situated within watersheds managed by the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority (LSRCA) and the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA). In particular, the Township is within the Holland River (LSRCA), and the Humber River (TRCA). Stormwater management targets from both conservation authorities will be taken into account as part of the study.

The Master Plan will adhere to the process as per the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (EA) in Ontario which requires public consultation at various times during the process. The EA process will include two Public Information Centre (PIC) meetings to allow for public input from residents, landowners, regulatory agencies and other stakeholders. This input will be considered and will assist in the planning process. The PICs are anticipated to be held during January and March of 2020. A specific date, time, and location for each PIC meeting will be advertised as the study progresses. In addition, information regarding this study will be posted on the Township of King's website within the 'Stormwater Master Plan' link at www.king.ca.

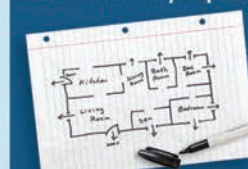

York council to optimize existing investment to accommodate a future population of 1.8 million

York Regional council has endorsed the principle that new infrastructure investment be tied to the achievement of population thresholds, as outlined in the recent infrastructure and alignment report.

“Over the last decade York Regional Council made significant investment in transit, water and wastewater infrastructure, taking on growth-related debt to serve our growing population,” said York Region chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. “However, population growth has slowed in recent years. Optimizing existing investments in infrastructure before triggering new investment is key to meeting provincial growth targets in a fiscally responsible manner.”

In 2014, council adopted a fiscal strategy which provides tools to manage debt and better align capital spending with growth. This strategy has allowed the Region to maintain a state of sustainable financial ‘equilibrium’ by limiting capital expenditures and reducing debt.

While the Region remains committed to delivering the infrastructure required to support growth to 2041, the existing infrastructure investments in approved urban communities can accommodate a significant amount of population growth without taking on additional debt.

“Directing growth to areas that have servicing capacity has a direct impact on the fiscal health of the Region,” said Markham Regional Councillor Jim Jones, chair of Planning and Economic Development. “By staging growth with existing and planned infrastructure, we can better plan for current and future residents.”

As part of the provincial growth plan, York Region is undergoing a Municipal Comprehensive Review (MCR) to help us plan well-designed communities that attract residents, jobs and investments and support the population to 2041 and beyond. “Planning staff, together with the consulting team at WSP, are continuously monitoring the ongoing provincial changes and has adapted the Our King Official Plan to address the in-force legislation,” staff said.

As well, York Region is undertaking its Municipal Comprehensive Review (MCR) with projections through 2041. King’s OP will have to conform to this when it’s completed.

King is also in the process of updating its 2015 Transportation Master Plan. When this is completed, it, too, will be incorporated in the new OP.

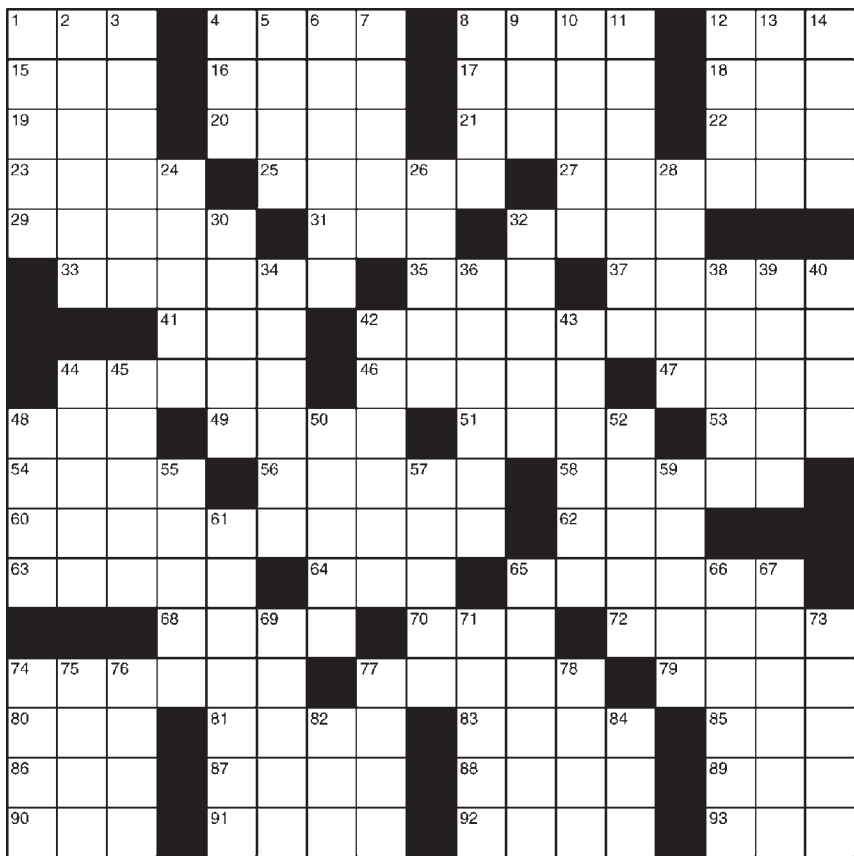
Several open houses were held to garner public input into the plan and many residents took advantage of these sessions. All of the documents related to the OP, along with the OP itself, are available on the Township’s website, at www.king.ca

The OP not only addresses planning issues, but defines goals and sets objectives; establishes a natural heritage system, and provides a framework for sustainable economic development.

Overall, the plan promotes “complete communities that foster and support healthy, active lifestyles, while continuing to protect and enhance the natural environment, agricultural and rural areas that give King its distinctive character.”

For the next few weeks, residents and visitors to King can enjoy a photographic exhibition in King's municipal centre by a Nobleton artist.

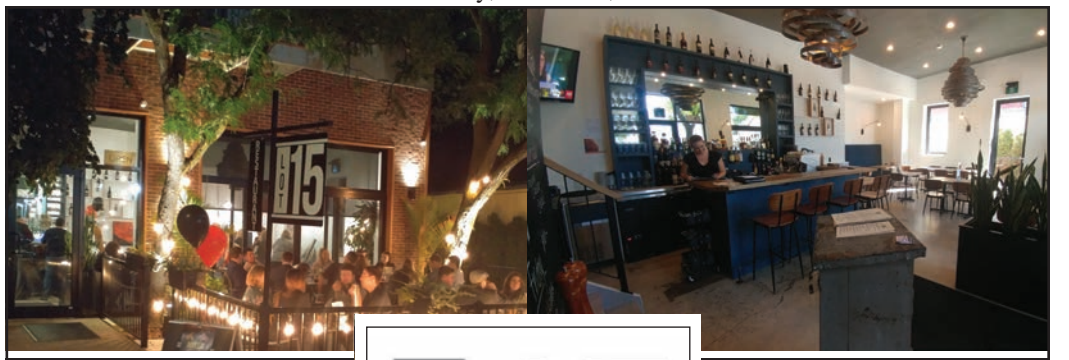

In the 80's, Canada was a respected world leader for atmospheric science and for leading world action on global warming.....

Canadian Maurice Strong started as a Canadian entrepreneur in the oil patch, and became an executive of a large oil and hydro company. He also was a humanitarian and a diplomat who served as Under-Secretary-General of the United Nations. Maurice Strong died in November 2015.

To move forward we must recognize that in the midst of a magnificent diversity of cultures and life forms we are one human family and one Earth community with a common destiny. We must join together to bring forth a sustainable global society founded on respect for nature, universal human rights, economic justice, and a culture of peace. Towards this end, it is imperative that we, the peoples of Earth, declare our responsibility to one another, to the greater community of life, and to future generations."

Green Party of Canada leader Elizabeth May was on of many who contributed to the writing of the Earth Charter.

The Green Party's 2019 Platform and Costing are available online at greenparty.ca. The more detailed costing will be made available online soon. In Ms May's message at the beginning, she states,

Now is the time to elect a parliament that is not going to back down, compromise or waffle. We are offering you the slate of candidates and the platform that will get us where we need to go.

Trees planted at municipal centre to mark Forest Week

The urban forest in Township of King grew by a whopping 350 native trees and shrubs last week during National Tree Day.

biological diversity to the municipal grounds.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini, kicked off the evening community planting event by welcoming everyone to the municipal offices where the planting occurred.

"This is the perfect site for a planting. Throughout the property we have natural, pollinator friendly landscaping, a healthy woodlot and a provincially significant wetland, home to countless species creating a very diverse ecosystem. This planting among the many others King facilitates helps to green our municipality, increase our natural capital and offset the GHG emissions we produce," he said. "This partnership planting with LEAF and the Regional Municipality of York helps to signify King's effort to be a leader in environmental preservation and climate change by creating healthier, environmentally friendly and sustainable spaces for future generations to enjoy."

James Lane, York Region manager of natural heritage and forestry, Environmental Services, spoke on behalf of the Region. "York Region has a woodland cover target of 25% and an urban forest canopy cover target of 35% by 2031. Today's planting will contribute to the expansion of our tree canopy cover,

woodland cover and biodiversity, while mitigating the impacts of emerald ash borer and enhancing the local watershed. Through the Region's Greening Strategy, York Region is able to provide programs like the LEAF Backyard Tree Planting Program."

Erin MacDonald, community programs manager at LEAF rounded out the welcome with a message for all in attendance. "Working with partners and engaging the public is extremely important to our efforts," said MacDonald. "The students, community members, and municipal partners showed their commitment to growing the urban forest and caring for its survival today. This hands-on work is how we bring the benefits of trees to all of us for years to come."

National Tree Day happens on the Wednesday of National Forest Week. It is a day to celebrate all the great benefits that trees provide for us. A healthy urban forest can improve air quality, reduce stormwater runoff, provide wildlife habitat, reduce noise pollution and even improves our health! Planting native trees and shrubs is the way to a greener city.

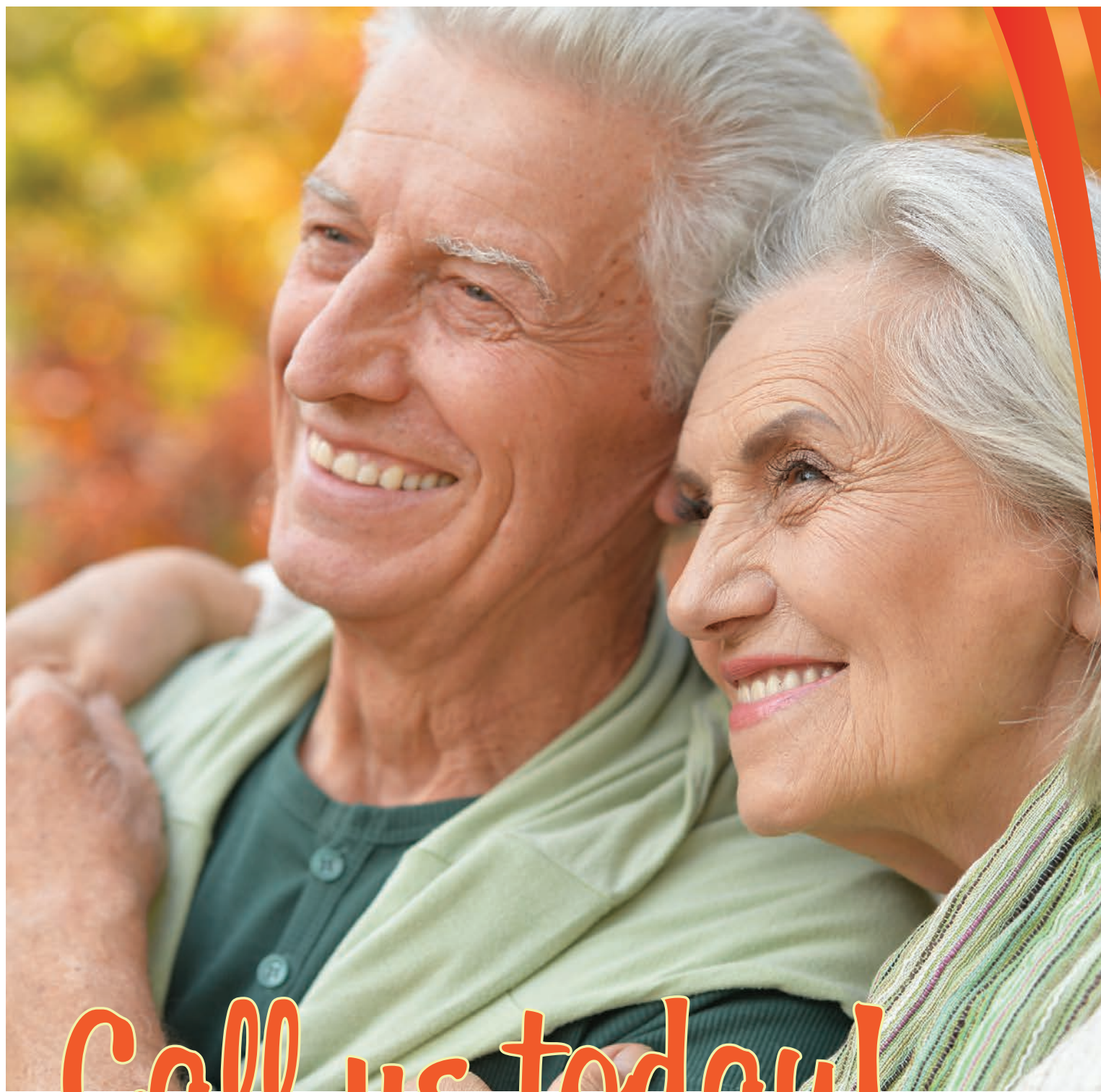

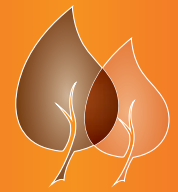

"We need to elect Greens to parliament to make sure that there will be no more short-term thinking, no more games or political strategies, no more disrespect for democracy and truth, but a government that knows what to do to avert climate catastrophe and how to pay for it."

Schulte sets her sights on re-election after strong first term

Progress has been made on several issues affecting King residents, and the current MP wants to continue the work.

Deb Schulte, MP for King-Vaughan, is knee-deep in the election campaign, which will culminate Oct. 21.

She's truly enjoyed building new relationships and friendships in King Township.

The most consistent issue here is broadband and limited cell access. "Unfortunately it will take more than four years to solve the broadband/cell issue, but progress has been made and our Liberal government has committed to connect 95% of Canadians with 50/10 Mbps by 2026, and 100% by 2030. I will be dedicated to ensuring we have this issue solved in King Township in my next term."

Despite the challenges, she's found her first term to be "rewarding."

"Overall it has been a privilege to work on local priorities while also working to solve the larger issues facing Canada."

Schulte stressed the 2015 platform fo-

cused on improving the lives of middle income Canadians and those working hard to join them.

"We made it a central theme that helped to direct decision making throughout our four years. Many of our initiatives have been to try and make life more affordable for middle income Canadians and to rework the social safety net to provide better support and to reduce poverty. We also were clear that the economy and the environment must go hand in hand and that we needed to take action on climate change. That is why in our first year we brought the provinces, territories, indigenous leaders, businesses, and environmentalists together to develop the Pan-Canadian Framework on Climate Change, which laid out a blueprint for cooperation across the Country, and the steps necessary to meet our Paris agreement."

Unfortunately some provinces, including Ontario, have decided to withdraw from this agreement which has required the feds to impose a price on carbon pollution to help meet the target.

Schulte said she's personally proud



of the work she did as chair of the Standing Committee on the Environment and Sustainable Development that resulted in significant progress toward expanding our protected spaces in Canada and a \$1.3 billion investment to achieve our targets of 10% marine and coastal areas, and 17% terrestrial and freshwater, including our very own Maple Cross Nature Reserve near Potageville. She also chaired the Liberal Seniors Caucus and was instrumental in getting improvements and the appointment of a Senior's Minister.

She admitted there is still so much more to do.

"We need to continue to build and transition our economy, especially as we move to a lower carbon future; we need to better address affordability, especially housing; we need to continue

to invest in infrastructure, including the changes necessary as a result of climate change. We need to make our communities safer and more livable, especially for our seniors. We need to do so much more to help build a more stable world. I am excited by all the work that is required to be done to ensure we are the best country in the world to live and raise a family."

The riding is diverse and affluent, but Schulte pointed out that more than 10% of our children are living in poverty.

"We are a large riding with rural landscapes and farms to the north, villages scattered throughout King and a semi-urban landscape to the south. I feel many of the issues facing the country are felt in our riding, so it has kept me very busy on many caucuses to make sure our community's voice is at the table as we work through the problems and bring forward solutions."

She vows to focus on getting broadband and cell service to all residents in King Township and north Vaughan.

"I will work to get the government to implement a modernized Canadian Environmental Protection Act and legislation to improve the protection of our air and water, and better manage toxins in the environment. I will continue to advocate for more affordable housing and increased economic opportunities in our riding, and for policies that will help residents with the high cost of living. I will also advocate for more action on climate change and moving to a lower carbon future."

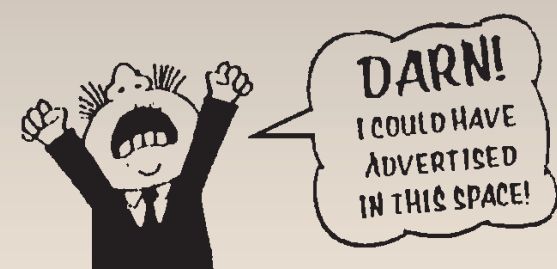
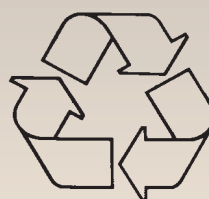
