King continues taking action to keep people safe

King Township is working to ensure residents remain health benefits for your mind and body. healthy and served during this current crisis.

King supports the Ontario government's declaration of an emergency and the subsequent closure of all non-essential businesses and services. This new measure was took effect Tuesday.

"Our top priority is the health and safety of our citizens, staff and businesses. Our council and staff are working closely with all levels of government to monitor the situation and take actions to protect our citizens, staff and businesses," said Mayor Steve Pellegrini.

The results include the closure of all municipal facilities, including libraries, arenas, cultural centres and the municipal office.

The Township is recommending citizens refrain from using playground equipment. This equipment cannot be properly sanitized and does not allow for adequate social distancing in line with federal and provincial recommendations.

King supports recommendations that include social distancing, working from home, avoiding non-essential trips in the community and cancelling gatherings.

And remember, connecting with nature has great "We encourage residents and their families to get out

and walk, bike or visit one of our trails." The Emergency Operations Centre has been set up at the municipal centre. Mayor Pellegrini said there's no real need to declare an emergency at this point, since the

EOC is ready as a moment's notice to spring into action. Certain staff, such as the roads crews, are out. The Township is supporting its employees by allowing them to work remotely.

King's core services will continue. These include Fire and Emergency Services, water and wastewater, waste collection and roads.

"I know this is a stressful time. I want King Township's citizens to know that we are doing everything we can to stop the spread of the virus while maintaining our core services. King Township is a community of communities and I know we will help each other get through this global pandemic."



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

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York Region to review its council composition

The composition of York Regional Council may change in the future.

York will undergo a review of its governance make-up later this year.

The Province, through the Municipal Act, requires Regional Council to review the number of representatives from each of its nine local municipalities by December 2020.

Based on representation by population, each current member of council represents approximately 59,000 residents. However, representation varies across the Region with population per elected member as high as 82.258 in the City of Vaughan. In reviewing representation by population, council

In order to pass a bylaw to change the composition of Regional Council, the motion must pass a triple majority approval.

A triple majority is attained when the following three factors are met:

- A majority of Regional Council votes in favour of the bylaw.
- · A majority of the nine local municipal councils pass a resolution consenting to the bylaw.
- The total number of voters in the local municipalities that have passed resolutions for a majority of all electors in York Region.

Council has considered the issue of regional representation on a number of occasions over the past 49 years, mostly with respect to council composition and representation by population. Demonstrating a commitment to responsible government, council currently consists of 21 members, increasing by just four members since 1971 while population has grown from 170,000 to 1.2 million.

Aurora Mayor Tom Mrakas has been a vocal supporter of reforming the structure of regional govern-

Aurora passed a motion in January regarding the move to review regional composition.

As part of that review, Aurora is asking that York council be reduced from the current 21 members (11 regional councillors, 9 mayors, and 1 regional chair) to a reduced council

gional chair). They are also asking that the report be presented as part of the composition review report for Council's consideration in time to implement any changes for the 2022 election.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini is King's only representative at the regional

Mayor Mrakas, Aurora's sole voice at the Region, said the new structure should give each of the mayors a weighted vote tied to the population of their respective communities.

Previously, Aurora mayors, including Mayor Mrakas, have advocated for an additional seat at the Regional table. Aurora is one of just three York Region municipalities, along with King, Whitchurch-Stouffville and East Gwillimbury, to have just one voice at the Regional level, while smaller communities like Georgina, have multiple representatives.

"Aurora is currently below Georgina in representation, below New- the Region."

has elected to support an additional of 10 members (9 mayors and 1 remarket in representation, equal to Stouffville, East Gwillimbury and King, so if you were to go with a nine-mayor system with a weighted voting system, we would leapfrog Stouffville, King, Georgina, East Gwillimbury and we would be just slightly behind Newmarket - which would have seven votes and we would have five. It puts us in a better position to be represented properly as per our population," Mrakas said.

> "It is (cost-effective) because as we grow, and we all know each of the municipalities are growing, if you need to make changes (according to population), you don't need to add another position; all you need to do is readjust the voting numbers."

> He concedes it will be a "difficult process" to get through, but says he honestly believes it is "the one system we can all look at and agree we are all being presented properly, fairly, and in the most cost-effective manner for the Region and for the residents of



The proposed Official Plan Amendment, Zoning By-law Amendment and Site Plan Control applications submitted by MHBC Planning Limited, on behalf of the owner, 1986 King Road Developments Inc., under Planning Files OP-2019-05, Z-2019-13 and SPD-19-64 concerns a property located on the north side of King Road approximately 45 metres east of King Boulevard in the Village area of King City. The subject property measures 0.29 hectares with 67 metres of frontage on King Road and supports a dwelling and accessory garage. The owner intends to remove the existing buildings from the lands.

Proposed Changes

The subject property is designated 'Core Area' by the King City Community Plan (OPA #540) and is zoned Core Area - King City (CAK) by Zoning By-law #2017-66, as amended.

The Official Plan Amendment application seeks to increase the height and density requirements of the Community Plan to provide for a residential infill consisting of 20 stacked, 4-storey townhome units, serviced by a common road to a maximum density of 70 units per hectare. The purpose of the Zoning By-law Amendment is to provide for stacked townhouses in the CAK zone and to amend the zone requirements for Maximum Height, Floor Space Index, Front Yard setback, Rear Yard setback, Interior Side Yard setback and other site-specific provisions to implement the development.

Appeal Procedure

If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Council of the Township of King to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal ("LPAT") but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed official plan amendment is adopted or zoning by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of King before the proposed official plan amendment is adopted or before the zoning by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal ("LPAT") unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Any person may attend the public meeting and/or make written or verbal representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Official Plan Amendment or Zoning By-law Amendment. **Written comments will become part of the public record.**





"If the school closures have you or someone you know concerned about a child not being able to eat breakfast or lunch let me know. I will do what I can to help. A cooked meal, a box of cereal, gallon of milk, bread, fruit, whatever it may be, I will try to help. Do not be ashamed, we all need help at times. Kids depend on these meals more than we think. This is also extended to parents/guardians since kids need their parents/guardians. We will help. It takes a village," she wrote, refusing to even have her name printed in the newspaper. "I really don't want any recognition as I truly just want to help while we still are able to. It's just a small gesture in all the craziness that's

While some thought of children goout to mothers who may be running out of formula or baby wipes and are unable to find them in stores. The administrators of the Facebook group, Stephanie D'Orazio and Deb L-M, posted an open invitation for anyone who needed help to connect with them. "We have such a great community network in this group. As for those who offered help, Laura DeGasperis was one who offered free formula to moms in need. There were a couple of other women that offered other baby items and babysitting.

"Some ladies just reached out to us personally and a few responded on our post and offered their assistance to anyone who was looking for help," said Stephanie D'Orazio.

York reports first death from COVID-19

The Regional Municipality of York has been notified of a death related to COVID-19. The individual, a female in her 70s, is the Region's first COVID-19-re-

The City of Markham resident returned from international travel on March 21 and died shortly thereafter.

"York Region extends their deepest condolences to the family and loved ones of the individual," said Dr. Karim Kurji, York Region's Medical Officer of Health. "This case speaks to the seriousness of the current situation and how as a community we need to continue working together to protect one another."

York Region also reported seven newly-confirmed cases of COVID-19 earlier today, bringing the total number of confirmed cases to 44. This total count includes yesterday's announcement of the confirmed case of a resident living in Markhaven Home for Seniors.

As part of the ongoing investigation and based on the expert advice from Public Health Ontario, a COVID-19 outbreak at the Markhaven Home for Seniors in the City of Markham has now been declared, which means anyone with symptoms at the facility is assumed to be a positive case of COVID-19. York Region Public Health continues to work closely with the staff and residents at Markhaven, and all long-term care centres in the Region.

"We now cannot rule out local transmission in York Region," added Dr. Kurji. "These unfortunate signals are indications of progression of the virus in our community. Local transmission is defined as individuals who did not have close contact with a travel-related case or any known case of COVID-19."

To prevent the spread of COVID-19 and to protect our community, York Region Public Health encourages residents to avoid crowds, stay at home when possible and practice social distancing and maintain good hand hygiene. Even with newly confirmed cases, these measures will help slow the spread of COVID-19.



Local efforts boost Jamaican school programs

Canadians love rallying around a good cause. And King residents top the list in charitable giving.

When a Schomberg woman put a call out to help with a school project in Jamaica, the overwhelming local response warmed her heart.

Jo-Anne Cober joined forces with Devon Dunn, who identified a need for school equipment in his homeland of Jamaica.

The school lacked books, audio equipment and they had limited internet access.

"I am a firm believer in reading. Not only as the basis for education but also as an escape to far off places. Some of these kids have no access or limited access to the internet. Books provide knowledge they may not ever know."

When she put the word out for donations, it spread like wildfire.

"We called around and had friends donate cash. I went on the Schomberg Facebook page and put out a request for books. Since then more than 10,000 books came in," Cober said

She added they learned about a decommissioned school so they collected many desks, tables and chairs as well, internet routers and networking cables, flat screen TVs, DVDs, projectors, etc.

They "adopted" three other schools and Dunn formed the Uzazi Foundation.

said the welfare of children was always important to her. She remains "a socially conscious person who prioritizes the needs of children in our community and in the world at large."


The Jamaican situation struck a cord with her and she remains inspired by Dunn, who has worked with some 25,000 children and their families in Canada. Now, at this time in his life, he is committed to doing something for Jamaica's children.

"I needed to be a part of that," she

Cober observed that the need elsewhere is great, and the waste in our country is ridiculous. Our landfills are brimming with items that are still usable. Our discarded items go a long way to filling a need in certain countries.

Cober pointed out that while Jamaica seems to be doing well overall its education ministry cannot afford to reasonably support all of its schools. The bulk of the resources tend to go to the first-tier schools that are in the cities and the major towns. Many remote schools have rebar instead of proper windows. When it rains the children get soaked. There are often six grades under one roof and no partitions.

"We repurpose commercial cubicles in order to provide sound proofing between classes. We focus on assisting remote schools that usually don't get much mainstream support. We support schools where more than 40% of the student body come from homes that are



Currently, Uzazi has adopted four schools and in all, 1,200 students are benefitting from their support and donations.

"Indirectly we are helping as many as 80,000 people per year as the schools are focal points in their communities and extending supports to adults as well after school," Cober said. "We have committed to helping each of our schools creating effective libraries filled with books, improve their cafeteria with appliances, create a working computer labs, science labs, chairs and tables for their cafeteria, picnic tables, desks and chairs for teachers, sports equipment and so much more.

"We have committed to a major building maintenance and reconstruction effort providing structural support appliances for the school kitchen, library with books, science models, other teaching aids, kitchen appliances.

"We will be building a building that will be 100 feet by 50 feet at the Woodlands Primary and Infant School in Cross Keys Manchester."

The building, she said, will be constructed from recycled Canadian con-

tainers.


"We have so much to give but sometimes people don't understand about helping kids so far away. Also they don't realize how a simple item such as a book can make such a big difference."

Questions were asked about the Regional project at King and Weston Road. Residents were pleased to hear that the works will resume this spring with a projected substantial completion late fall.



Venus is in clear view as our 'evening beacon'

Throughout history, keen sky-watchers would follow the weekly and monthly movement of bright objects against the background sky. The early Greeks referred to the planets of our solar system as the "wanderers" and there are five which can be seen and followed with the unaided eye.

The planet Venus is now seen high in the western sky shortly after sunset. Other than the moon, Venus is the brightest night-time object and for good reason. It is completely surrounded by thick clouds comprised of carbon dioxide and reflects about 75% of sunlight that falls on them.

On a moonless night out in the dark countryside and away from any light source, this beacon will cast a shadow on a sheet of white paper. It can also be a great subject for astrophotography. However, what goes on under the clouds is something out of a science fiction novel. Thanks to its 50 to 75-kilometre cloud deck, pressures at the surface are 90 times that of earth. That is comparable to being a kilometre under the ocean or in a car crusher. It rains sulphuric acid (battery acid) that never reaches the ground.

The clouds also produce the greenhouse effect, trapping the solar energy and locking it in. This keeps the day and night side a toasty 400 degrees Celsius and is so hot you could cook a large pizza in 9 seconds. It is safe to say human astronauts will never visit the Venusian surface. However, in 1970 the Russians launched Venera 7 and

became the first of its kind to land on another planet. The craft only lasted about 50 minutes but opened the door to the planet's hidden secrets. Today, X-ray images pierce these clouds to reveal its landscape and volcanoes that still seem to be erupting.

Venus, along with Mercury, are termed inferior planets as they reside inside earth's orbit. It takes only 224 days for Venus to circle the sun and takes on different phases when viewed through a telescope, much like we see with the moon as more or less sunlight illuminates its surface.

Over the next few weeks, the planet will position itself between the sun and earth. Following this progression through a telescope, you will notice the planet growing in size as it moves closer to us but shrinking in illumination.

On April 3 it will be located in the Pleiades Cluster and on the night of May 21 and 22, teams up with Mercury low in the northwest sky but will be a thin 4% lit crescent.



Berger's dog guides much more than her best friends

As many dog-lovers would attest, there's no bond quite like the one between a human and their pet.


But for Nobleton's Bev Berger, the relationship goes far beyond the typical one of love, licks, and those coveted behind-the-ear scratches. For Bev, who has been blind since the age of 30, her dogs provide the freedom and independence she so begrudgingly lost in the first few years of her disability. For the past 31 years, they've not only acted as her eyes, they've ensured her safety, have allowed her to get involved in her community, and- it goes without saying- provided love and companionship in spades.

"Over the years, I've discovered that beyond the physical act of guiding and keeping me safe, I also have an animal that loves me and is not there to judge me. They're there to give me a lick if the tears start rolling down my cheeks," said Bev. "And the only expectation they have for me is to feed them, and groom them, and exercise them, and love them. And let me tell you, I have the way better end of the deal."

Bev's introduction to dog guides began in 1989, when Nobleton Lion Ken Hodgson saw her walking around Nobleton with a cane and asked if she'd be interested in receiving a dog to help. When Bev agreed, the Nobleton Lions went ahead and submitted her application to the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. Months of paperwork and interviews later, Bev was sent to Oakville to undergo one month of training at the foundation's headquarters. It was there she met her first dog guide, the proud, water-obsessed Reb.

"All of my dogs have had their quirks, and Reb's was water," laughed Bev. "He almost took me water-skiing a few times."

A dog guide has a working life of seven to eight years, meaning they typically retire at nine or ten. Ideally, an owner will retire their old dog guide at the same time they receive a new one. For those with the financial ability to care for two dogs, like Bev, this means years of off-duty relaxation for the elder. For those who are unable, the eldest is put up for adoption in a loving home by the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. However, retirement isn't always the preferred lifestyle for the most



steadfast of dogs.

"When Jasper retired, I went and got Lotus. And Lotus was the working dog," reminisced Bev. "But every time I got the harness out, Jasper would be standing there right beside him, pushing into it. I would say 'no, Jasper' and would put the harness on Lotus. I was

so glad I couldn't see him, because I knew how sad he would get. He knew he couldn't do the job physically anymore, but his heart was still in it. And he was right there beside Lotus, every day, until he died."

Despite the years that have passed since the inaugural Reb first entered

her life, Bev still recalls the minute details of each of her dog's personalities. Reb, her first, had a dignified arrogance Bev attributes to his Quebecois upbringing. Mason, her second, was highstrung and wickedly intelligent. Her third, KitKat, was the sassiest of the bunch, and Jasper, her fourth, a Type A people-pleaser who thought he could do everything. Lotus, Bev's current dog guide, is easy-going, empathetic, and reliable.


"In spite of the fact my life has changed, everything around me has changed, I'm older – one thing remains constant," said Bev. "And that's my furballs."

Of course, as with most other things, owning a dog guide can come with its own set of difficulties. In this sense, Bev's experience mirrors that of many. It's immensely difficult when her dogs pass away, and the unique bond she's shared with them throughout their guiding career only serves to amplify that. Yet, as Bev attests, it's all about making the kind of memories with her dogs that will never leave her.

"Lions International had their convention in Toronto July of 2014, and I was invited to speak on behalf of Canadian Dog Guides. There were over 15,000 people there." said Bev, recalling one such moment. "It was so special, because they had all arranged a big party for Jasper's retirement. He retired September of that year. He was a pretty special boy."

Having now received five dog guides free-of-charge from the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides, Bev has committed herself to paying the Lions' generosity forward by acting as a spokesperson for the foundation. For years, she's travelled throughout Canada and the world, speaking about her experiences as a dog guide owner and of the Lions' invaluable help. She's also helped front the Pet Valu Walk for Dog Guides in Nobleton for nearly a decade, raising awareness and much-needed funds for the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. As dog guides cost roughly \$25,000 to raise, train, and supply to their owner, these kind of events are crucial in helping the program thrive.

"The Lions Foundation changed my life, and my dogs changed my life," stated Bev. "If I can make that change in other people's lives, I will."





Plan in the works to bring home stranded CDS students

Plans are in motion to bring home some local students, currently stranded in Peru.

Premier Doug Ford noted a flight has been arranged to bring home a group of King City high school students trapped

Air Canada will operate three flights between Toronto and Lima. The first departure from Canada took place March 24. Two other special flights from Lima to Toronto are currently scheduled for March 26 and 27. The flights will be operated by a wide-body Boeing 777 aircraft with 400 seats.

The students are currently self-isolating at a hotel and are under the supervision of two teachers.

In all, 19 students, two teachers and a World Challenge trip guide are among many Canadians stuck in Peru.

Kim Sillcox of CDS said it's important to note that should a plane become available, it would not just be for CDS students, "but to the best of our knowledge, a plane for any Canadians stranded in Peru. We are in the same situation as all Canadians abroad and continue to focus

on working through Global Affairs Canada and other government contacts to find out any details regarding repatriation. Our focus remains on keeping our students safe as we continue to work toward a resolution of this issue.'

King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce said immediately after being contacted by a Country Day School parent and principal, his office in partnership with Premier Ford, swung into action to help repatriate these citizens back to Canada.

"The Premier and I have been clear in our advocacy and expectation that all students get home safe and immediately. My office will continue to work with parents, the CDS community, and our Members of Parliament Deb Schulte and Francesco Sorbara to ensure these students, and all Canadians, get home as soon as possible."

King Mayor Steve Pellegrini said he's been in contact with provincial and federal representatives to help the students in any way possible. He did point out that country is relatively safe at this point.

There are Canadians all over the world in a similar predicament and it's a matter of priorities.

Council costs taxpayers \$365K

Governing residents in King cost taxpayers a little over \$365,000 in 2019.

Staff release the remuneration and expenses report for 2019, as required by the Municipal Act.

The total includes much more than salaries.

Total salaries for council members hit \$271,358.50.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini received a salary of \$69,549.48. All councillors receive roughly the same amount; all within a few hundred dollars of \$33,000.

Councillors received payroll benefits of

roughly \$5,000, with the mayor's portion slighty over \$10,000.

For dental and extended health benefits, councillors Jordan Cescolini and Jakob Schneider received \$2,443.74, while all other councillors received \$6,499.44.

Councillors were paid for membership and conferences, from a low of \$185.20 for Schneider, to a high of \$2,407.30 for councillor Debbie Schaefer.

Councillors were reimbursed for expenses and events, with the majority coming in under \$100. The mayor's expenses totalled \$1,314.72.

Only Mayor Pellegrini claimed \$1,903.71 for mileage in 2019.

Nobleton Lakes to host Ryan Chisim Golf Tournament this fall

This disease deprives children of essential motor functions such as a loss of speech, sight, the inability to eat and finally, to breathe.

Seven-year volunteer and committee member of the tournament, Elyse Smith, confirmed this at SickKids, Eric Bouffet. information via email to the King Sentinel.

Since the inaugural tournament in 2012, the tournament has raised over \$175,000 in partnership with the Hospital of Sick Children (SickKids), wrote Smith.

Last year, through the efforts of the golf tournament, \$20,250 dollars was raised. Statements from SickKids would suggest, that discovering a cure for DIPG, is one of the fundraising priorities at the hospital and SickKids hopes to raise \$10 million, according to Manager of Community Partnerships, Kelly Dickinson.

On Jan. 30, 2020, SickKids stat-

ed for the second consecutive year they are getting closer to discovering a clinical trial to help patients.

According to the report, Sick-Kids says, cancer cells have a unique ability to bypass the immune system.

Through Immunotherapy research, the design of the trial is to trick the immune system into believing tumor cells are infected with a virus.

Once the cells appear to the immune system, the system will attack the cancer cells using a drug to defeat the cancer cells, before they multiply.

This tactic has garnered interest from other countries around the globe as far out as Australia.

This tournament has received praise from the Senior Associate

Bouffet commended the efforts from Ryan's father John Chisim and to those who have donated their hard-earned money to support the hospital in finding a cure.

In the email sent by Smith, she stated Ryan, "was an incredible child with a zest for life."

The 30-year-old King City native scored a pair of goals the night before the suspension against the Anaheim Ducks, tallying his goal total to a career best of 16. Pietrangelo ripped a shot from the point, off of the post and into the back of the

et leaving Anthony Stolarz helpess to give the Blues a late 2-1 lead in the first. Late in the third period, up 3-2, the Blues' catalyst chipped the puck into the net from the defensive zone to seal the victory.

This game was replayed after the previous encounter between the Blues and the Ducks on Feb. 11 was postponed. The game, came to a halt after Blues defenceman Jay Bouwmeester suffered a cardiac episode on the bench. Pietrangelo is now tied for second in goals by defenceman in the NHL, along-

season after 78 games played, with 15 goals and 39 assists. After achieving his career high in goals, Pietrangelo is two points away from

breaking that 54-point record. This year he has 52 points, with 16 goals and 36 assists with twelve games remaining in the regular season. In team history, Pietrangelo is also two points away from surpassing Al Mac-

Innis in all-time points by a defenceman. MacInnis currently holds the record set at 452 points in 613 games and Pietrangelo has 450 points in 758 games played with the Blues.

The King City native is also second all-time in games played by a defenceman in Blues history behind Barret Jackman.

The Blues currently hold the best record in the Western Conference and sit atop of the Central division with 94 points; two points above the Colorado Ava-

It seems as if the number two is haunting Pietrangelo and the Blues, but not for long.

The defending Stanley Cup champions patiently hope for the season to resume. The Blues also hope that Vladimir Tarasenko returns to the lineup in time for the playoffs after missing 58 games this season due to a shoulder injury.



According to the list released by the Province, most retail operations, pharmacies, grocery stores, even convenience stores, will remain open. For many, it is still business as usual.

"But I have said from day one we will, and we must, take all steps necessary to slow the spread of COVID-19. The health and safety of every Ontarian must come first. The health of you, your children, your grandparents and friends depends on all of us doing our part."

"Based on the advice of Dr. Williams, Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health, and the experts at our Command Table, Ontario is taking further action to contain the spread of COVID-19," said Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "These enhanced measures are necessary to protect the health and well-being of Ontarians. Nothing is more important."

We are social creatures and we need to know that people care. Pick up the phone and call someone who lives alone.

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

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Create family memories with cookies

Oatmeal is a versatile ingredient found in desserts, breakfast foods, savory dishes, and so much more. While it is enjoyed in many different dishes, for cookie lovers, oatmeal shines brightest in cookie recipes.

Homemade cookies not only fill the kitchen with delicious aromas, they are a comfort food prepared and enjoyed with others. Many recipes are even passed down among generations. This recipe for "Pecan Toffee Oatmeal Cookies" from Laurie McNamara's "Simply Scratch: 120 Wholesome Homemade Recipes Made Easy" (Avery) could become a family favorite in no time.

Pecan Toffee Oatmeal Cookies

Makes 3 dozen cookies

1 1/2 cups unbleached all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

3/4 teaspoon kosher salt 1 cup unsalted butter

1 cup packed dark brown sugar

1/2 cup granulated sugar 1 teaspoon pure vanilla ex-

tract

2 large eggs

3 cups old-fashioned oats 3/4 cup chopped pecans, toasted

1 cup toffee pieces

Preheat the oven to 350 F. Line two rimmed baking sheets with parchment paper or silicone liners.

In a medium bowl, combine the flour, baking soda, cinnamon, and salt and set aside.

In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment, cream together the butter and both sugars until light and fluffy, about 2 minutes. Add the vanilla. Add the eggs one at a time,



mixing and scraping down the sides of the bowl after adding each egg. Gradually add the flour mixture until just combined.

With the mixer on low, stir in the oats, pecans and toffee bits.

Using a 2-tablespoon scoop, measure out the cookie dough onto the prepared baking sheets, spacing them 1/2 inch apart. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes, rotating the baking sheets halfway during bake time for even baking.

Let cool on the baking sheets for 5 minutes before using a spatula to transfer to a wire rack. Repeat with the remaining dough.

These cookies are extra delicious when served warm.

Jesus performs a miracle in a most basic way. He spits on the ground, makes clay with the saliva, and smears it on his eyes, and says, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam." This miracle is so "every day" that its very ordinariness seems part of the lesson Jesus wants to teach us. Jesus comes into our life without the thunder and lightning. Jesus comes to us as a living, loving presence in order that through him, we might see God in all things and in all people.

"The blind man went to the Pool of Siloam"—which means the one who is "sent," washed, and came back able to see. We who have been baptized, have washed in the pool of Siloam. We too have been sent by God. Each one of our lives has holy meaning and a God-given purpose.

"I went. I washed. I saw." Four times the man born blind says that. What will we say this Lent?

While we are all doing our best to guard against the spread of COVID-19, the fear, isolation, the confusion, negatively impact our faith. We might think that by way of COVID-19, we are being punished for our sins. But Jesus calls us wants us to see God no other way than as a God who loves and who heals. We should not be touching one another, but we can still approach Jesus – the spirit of the living God – and invite him to come and touch our hearts. Then we might see and understand as never before, that God is sending us to love one another.

Lent is about reforming our seeing. Sometimes we despair and say, "I can't understand what God is doing. I

don't see any way out of this!" Lent's answer to our dilemma is wash in the One sent by God – Jesus Christ our Lord. "I washed; I see; I hope; I desire."

The story about Jesus healing the blind man is a story of how Jesus has the power to give us a sign today, when we are blind to so much that is going on around us. We all have blindness in our lives and we can pray in the simplest of words:

"Jesus, heal my blindness. I lose sight of your love when I think there is no hope, when people hurt, or turn against me, when all I see in the world is suffering. I lose sight of your love when I am overwhelmed with grief and despair. I lose sight of your love when I fail to see your presence in my life; when all I see are my own selfish needs and wants. Holy God, restore my sight, not just for today, but in all those ways I live every day without seeing you. Amen."

Horticulture By John Arnott

There in the light snow that had fallen over night they were still standing tall ready to greet me giving my spirits a much needed lift this past grey Monday morning ,these fragile looking sentinels of spring we call snowdrops.

Some 20 species, all native to the eastern Mediterranean region, can be found of what are actually tough, little. mostly early spring flowering bulbs botanists named galanthus (from the Greek gala "milk," anthus "flower"). It was once thought that these perennial, herbaceous plants were native to northern Europe especially the British Isles or were brought there by

migrating Celts and later the Romans. Today's botanic historians say they weren't found here until the beginning of the 1500s.

It seems this area so suited them that they soon escaped over the garden wall and began to happily naturalize throughout the countryside where today in late winter into early spring they form great drifts of white bloom making. It seems that they've been there forever. European colonists introduced them into the Americas.

Today there are hundreds of cultivars developed from the existing species. Now the most common species in our area is galanthus nivalis – Latin for "of the snow." These early risers begin to push up through the still frozen ground under snow and yes even ice, the last days of February into early March. Once emerging into the open they will hold their white drop like buds tightly closed for days even a couple of weeks until weather conditions are right for opening. This was certainly the case for mine this year!

Each snowdrop bulb produces a pair of narrow green grass like leaves with sharp stiff brownish tips and between these twin leaves grows a single leafless stem called a scape that holds a single drooping bloom made up of a circle of 3 outer white tepals and petal surrounding a tighter circle of 3 smaller tepals that carry splashes of green and are attached to a slightly elongated pale yellow centre.

Most snowdrops grow about 4 to 5 in./8 to 12 cm tall. They prefer well draining sandy loam in full sun or light shade but aren't really that soil fussy and will do well in average garden soil to which some compost/composted cattle manure has been well dug in and will survive in clay if sharp sand has been dug into it to promote good drainage. They don't like soggy or bone dry conditions.

These heralds of spring do not transplant well. If they must be moved it must be done while their leaves are still green. Bulbs should be planted in our region by the beginning of October or earlier, say mid-September if possible. And planted as soon after purchase as can be done to avoid them drying out, which they do quickly. Plant these small bulbs 3 in./8 cm deep and the same distance apart in groups of 5, 10,15 or 25 for the first best show.

As by early summer flowers and leaves have died right down to the ground leaving little or no trace of where they once were it's important to mark where the bulbs are so you won't slice into them when later digging in the garden. Leaves must be left until they yellow and wither to nourish the bulb for next year's growing season.



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
