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# King Library assists lab making PPE

King Township Public Library (KTPL) has lent two Library. KTPL jumped at the opportunity to support of their 3D printers to Newmarket's NewMakeIt Lab.

They are working in partnership with an organization called Ontario PPE (ontarioppe.com), a collective of makers in the GTA creating and donating PPE to Ontario's front-line health care workers.

For example, they create face shields for frontline COVID-19 workers. The shields cover the entire face. making them ideal protection from the respiratory droplets that are said to spread COVID-19.

This initiative was recently brought to the attention of Library CEO Rona O'Banion, by her colleague, Todd Kyle, CEO of the Newmarket Public

Recipients of equipment produced through this initiative include Cardiovascular Care Inc., Trillium Health Partners, Right at Home Canada, Mackenzie Health Hospital, Southlake Hospital, Lakeridge Hospital, Chartwell LTC Aurora, and York Region Paramedics.

So far they have delivered more than 550 face shields and have orders for over 5,000.

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# Muzzo cannot visit King City as part of day parole

A convicted impaired driver must abide by many conditions, as part of his day parole.

Marco Muzzo, convicted in the 2015 deaths of four members of the Neville-Lake family, received day parole from the Parole Board of Canada last week. The parole is for six months, and the board denied full parole at this time.

Among his conditions are that he cannot visit King City, Brampton or Aurora, without permission from his parole supervisor. The victims' family lives in Brampton and that's where the deceased are buried. Aurora and King City have memorials to the victims.

Further, he can't have direct contact with the victims or victims' families. He has to meet with as mental health professional to address his substance abuse issue and he cannot consume. purchase or possess alcohol.

Muzzo was previously denied parole and the board was concerned that he had "severely underestimated" his issues with alcohol and he "lacked respect for the rules of the road and safety of others."

"It is apparent that you have developed greater insight into these issues and, as a result, have been able to make a reasonable start at addressing these," reads the new board decision.

"All of those who have assessed your risk of recidivism have come to the same

lack of criminal history, your generally pro-social lifestyle, your positive associations, your solid work history, and your positive institutional behavior.

"At today's hearing, the board considers that you have demonstrated more honesty and transparency than at your previous hearing.'

The board did point out that Muzzo struggles to articulate his remorse but they believe his empathy for the victims appears sincere.

They did stress Muzzo's action "has forever severely damaged the lives of the surviving family members who continue to struggle with the monumental consequence of your selfish actions." It's "impossible to summarize their pain and suffering."

According to Muzzo's parole plan, he hopes to reside with his fiancee, but the board pointed out this would put him close to one of the memorials to the deceased children, which victims frequently visit.

The board said Muzzo presents a low risk to society if released, but remains "mindful that your selfish ways of thinking directly led to the senselesss death of four innocent people, and this risk-based decision does not detract from that awareness."

Muzzo, while at the minimum-security facility, did receive periods of escorted temporary absences for community service, "with very favourable reports conclusion; that you are at low risk to from your supervisors who note your

re-offend. This is, in part, due to your work ethic, and your commitment to giving back to the community."

Part of his day parole is to live in a community residential facility and resume work with the family company as a general laborer. He plans to continue working with the addictions counsellor and participating in any recommended programs.

The board said his conditional released was also based on his strong network of friends, family and co-workers, and the strong support of his fiancee.

Muzzo's legal counsel provided an apology to the families of those he killed.

"I want to apologize to the Neville-Lake, Neville and Frias families for the terrible pain I have caused them and their loved ones," he said in the statement. "I ruined their lives, and I take full responsibility for what I have done. I always will.

"I was careless and irresponsible when I made the choice to drink and drive. There is no way I can undo the damage that I have caused. I will live with this for the rest of my life."

The children's mother, Jennifer Neville-Lake, shared the following in an Instagram post last week:

"No matter what happened today, Daniel, Harry and Milly don't get to come back home. My dad isn't coming home to my mom. Nothing changes for me."

Muzzo pleaded guilty in 2016 to four counts of impaired driving causing death and two counts of impaired driving causing bodily harm. He was sentenced to 10 years in prison. and given a 12-year driving prohibition.

The collision claimed the lives of nine-year-old Daniel Neville-Lake, his five-year-old brother, Harrison, their two-year-old sister, Milly, and the children's 65-year-old grandfather, Gary Neville. The children's grandmother and great-grandmother were also seriously injured.

# Ontario provides urgent relief for small businesses and landlords

The Ontario government is partnering with the federal government to provide urgent relief for small businesses and landlords in King-Vaughan affected by the COVID-19 outbreak. The province is committing \$241 million through the new Ontario-Canada Emergency Commercial Rent Assistance Program (OCECRA). The total amount of provincial-federal relief that would be provided is more than \$900 million, helping to ensure small businesses are ready to reopen their doors when the emergency measures are lifted.

Details of the new program were announced on April 24 by Premier Doug Ford, Rod Phillips, Minister of Finance, Christine Elliott, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health, and Dr. Merrilee Fullerton, Minister of Long-Term Care.

"Small businesses in King Township and Vaughan are experiencing real financial pressures during the COVID-19 outbreak and are struggling to pay rent as a result," said Stephen Lecce, MPP for King-Vaughan. "That's why we are partnering with the federal government to ease these financial pressures and support our small businesses through this challenging economic time. We moved quickly to province immediate support so our small businesses are able to succeed once it's safe to reopen Ontario."

Hiring local workers for farm jobs isn't easy

COVID-19 has turned lives upside down right around the world. People are grappling with illness and death, with separation from family and friends, business closures, job loss, and general uncertainty about what lies ahead.

Things are no different for farmers, but many of us who grow fruits and vegetables have the added challenge this year of trying to get our international workers here and making sure we do everything possible to keep them safe and healthy.

That's not without added cost, and while we recognize that COVID-19 is causing losses and increased expenses for everyone the longer this crisis continues, we appreciate the federal government's recent announcement of financial support for employers of seasonal agricultural workers.

We also appreciate government willingness to exempt international farm workers from its COVID-19 travel bans. Simply put, without the approximately 20,000 seasonal workers who come to Ontario every year to work on fruit and vegetable farms, many crops wouldn't get planted at all or in the case of trees, vines and perennial crops like asparagus, wouldn't be maintained or harvested.

Probably the biggest misconception people have is that farm work is unskilled labour. There's no denying that for all of us in farming, the hours are long and the work is hard. But our farms have become highly specialized, with sophisticated technologies and stringent food safety certifications.

And it takes skilled workers to be able to properly prune a grape vine, thin an apple tree, grade asparagus or gently harvest and handle a peach so that it arrives on the grocery story shelf free of bruises and blemishes.

The vast majority of seasonal farm workers in Ontario come to the same farms every year. These aren't skills that can just be taught on the fly.

The other hard truth about farm work is that it needs to be done when Mother Nature is ready. Asparagus or strawberry harvest can't just be put on hold because it's raining, it's too hot, or it's the weekend.

When work doesn't get done, there is less produce on the shelves and likely at lower quality. Timing is everything in of the Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association.

fruit and vegetable growing, making a reliable work force absolutely essential.

As spring ramps up, there's a lot of work to be done on our farms right now. But we will also need workers right through the summer and fall to see us through the busy harvest season. When our economy starts to open up again and Canadians go back to their real jobs, we will still need people to pick apples, harvest grapes and get fields and orchards ready for winter.

Most farms are in rural areas, which is both an advantage and a disadvantage in this situation. Once our international workers arrive, they live and work on our farms so keeping physical distance from local towns is not difficult. Food and groceries are delivered and online banking is set up so workers don't need to leave the farm, minimizing risk of disease

It's much harder with local workers who have to travel back and forth from their homes daily and have more interaction with their communities. There are also no public transit options outside of cities, so unless people have their own transportation, they wouldn't be able to get to work.

It's also important to note that for farmers, foreign worker programs are Canadian-first programs. That means we only hire international workers if we can't find Canadians to fill those jobs.

And we can't ignore what these jobs mean to the workers themselves. They come to Canada from Mexico, Jamaica and the Caribbean to support their families and communities, earning more in their few short months here than they could in a year back home.

Even with the travel exemption now in place, the reality is that many farmers will still be short workers this year. There are jobs on Ontario farms and we are hiring, but without our international workforce, our grocery store shelves and dinner tables could look a lot different this year.




# Cleaning Out Your Clutter

# King Fire mourns loss of former chief Lorne Burbidge

King Township has lost a long-serving member of its firefighter alumni.

Veteran firefighter and former chief Lorne Burbidge passed away April 20 with his family at his side.

Lorne Burbidge and his childhood sweetheart, Isobel (nee Bishop) moved from Vaughan to King City in 1962. Lorne was at that time a firefighter in North York (now Toronto). His career there spanned from 1957 to 1993.

Lorne was promoted to Captain, District Chief and finally to Platoon Chief in North York.

During those years Lorne also showed that he was committed to the safety of his fellow residents of King City. Not long after moving to King City Lorne joined the fire department and was promoted to captain in King City and from 1980 until 1986 served his community as fire chief.

When Lorne was promoted to District Chief in North York he knew that the demands of that position would require him to resign from King City.

As Fire Chief in King City, Lorne started a serious modernization of the department, including the purchase of the first diesel truck with the largest fire pump in the township at that time. The large fire pump needed a diesel engine to run it.

The fire station in King City was expanded and upgraded and training became an important part of Lorne's time

On top of all this Lorne and Isobel raised a family of three sons, Alex, David and Bryan and a daughter, Heather.

All three sons followed their father into the King City Fire Department. They shared Lorne's dedication to their community.

King City was truly blessed to have had Lorne and many others inspired by Lorne to serve as firefighters.

One cannot serve as did Lorne without support at home and Lorne had this support unequivocally from Isobel and the rest of the family.

King Fire Chief Jim Wall called Burbidge a "true gentleman," who often stopped by the station to chat long after his retirement. He was a "gem of a person and will be sadly missed."

A private service will be conducted with a celebration of Lorne's life to be held sometime in the future when such gatherings are safe.

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

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# King's Economic Development staff are here to help businesses

A shift towards establishing a for- tance-shopking. mal King Business Concierge program is unfolding during this unprecedented crisis.

King's economic development staff have connected virtually with more than 500 business stakeholders since the COVID-19 pandemic was declared on March 12. Staff have been proactively reaching out to businesses and responding to questions about what kinds of supports and resources are available to help them weather the economic uncertainty caused by this crisis.

Within a week of the pandemic being declared King's Economic Development Office developed a business resource portal to help business owners navigate the various assistance programs available to them, accessible at www.economicking.ca/ covid-19. As a result of this new portal, traffic to the website increased to more than 4.200 visitors in both March and April, almost doubling the number of visits in February.

King Township is a proud partner in the Northern York Region (N6) COVID-19 Business Recovery Information Centre. The Northern Six (N6) municipalities of York Region (Aurora, East Gwillimbury, Georgina, King, Newmarket and Stouffville) and the York Region Economic Strategy Office are working together to assist local businesses through this crisis. As a result, an intake form has been developed and businesses are encouraged to submit their information at bit.ly/businessrecovery. The N6 municipalities will be using the responses and aggregated data to develop appropriate measures and actions to support and assist businesses to adjust and adapt.

A ShopKING portal was also quickly launched on March 19, to promote essential businesses that were connecting safely with customers through physical distancing purchasing options, accessible at www.economicking.ca/physical-dis-

"We're seeing some encouraging news out of this quick action," said Mayor Steve Pellegrini. "On their own, and with our help to get the word out, 60 per cent of King's restaurants managed to quickly pivot to provide take-out and delivery options, while adhering to physical distancing orders put in place by the Province.

"As the province takes a measured and staged approach to fully re-open for business, the Township will be there to provide guidance and support for our businesses and local economy to be more resilient and stronger than ever," he added.

To help the Township identify concerns and challenges, and to assist with developing a plan moving forward, Mayor Pellegrini will be hosting a "Virtual Business Roundtable." The roundtable will include a cross-section of local business leaders. King Chamber of Commerce members, and elected officials from other levels of government. Hon. Deb Schulte (MP, King-Vaughan), Hon. Stephen Lecce (MPP, King-Vaughan) and Hon. Prabmeet Singh Sarkaria (MPP, Brampton South) will be participating in the roundtable.

In the months to come, council, staff and local businesses will continue to work together, including as participants on the York Region Business Recovery Support Partnership initiative. This collaboration, led by York Region's Economic Strategy Division, with local business and economy stakeholders are joining forces to coordinate a regional response to COVID-19. The goals of the partnership include economic impact assessment, streamlined business advisory support and communications.

"While all levels of government have taken swift and unprecedented actions and measures to support local businesses adapt and recover, we collectively are always looking and listening for ways to do more," said Mayor Pellegrini.

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

# Support for students, new grads affected by COVID-19

Post-secondary students are feeling the economic impacts of COVID-19. Many students were preparing to start a summer job in May, and are now worried about how to pay rent and cover basic living expenses, while recent graduates are struggling to find meaningful work. This is a critical point in their lives, and we must do everything possible to support their future.

Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau announced comprehensive support of nearly \$9 billion for post-secondary students and recent graduates. This plan will help provide the financial support they need this summer, help them continue their studies in the fall, and help

This includes launching the proposed Canada Emergency Student Benefit, which would provide support to students and new graduates who are not eligible for the Canada Emergency Response Benefit. This benefit would provide \$1,250 per month for eligible students or \$1,750 per month for eligible students with dependents or disabilities. The benefit would be available from May to August 2020.

The new Canada Student Service Grant will help students gain valuable work experience and skills while they help their communities during the

COVID-19 pandemic. For students who choose to do national service and serve their communities, the new Canada Student Service Grant will provide up to \$5,000 for their education in the fall.

The Government of Canada will expand existing federal employment, skills development, and youth programming to create up to 116,000 jobs, placements, and other training opportunities to help students find employment and develop valuable skills this summer and over the coming months.

In addition, to help students continue their studies in the fall, the government will double the Canada Student Grants for all eligible full-time students to up to \$6,000 and up to \$3,600 for part-time students in 2020-21. The Canada Student Grants for Students with Permanent Disabilities and Students with Dependents would also be doubled.

The Canada Student Loans Program will be enhanced by raising the maximum weekly amount that can be provided to a student in 2020-21 from \$210 to \$350.

Taken together, these programs will not only help ensure more students get the financial support they need, but the opportunities and experience many students were counting on.

The government will continue to monitor and respond to the health, social, and economic impacts of COVID-19. We are ready to take additional actions as needed to stabilize the economy and mitigate the impacts of the pandemic on Canadians.

"The future of our economy and our country relies on the opportunities and support we provide to Canadian students today. To promote a sustainable economic recovery, we need a strong workforce and good job opportunities for young people. That means giving them the support they need to continue their studies and encouraging them to serve their communities. Together, we will get through this difficult time," Prime Minister Trudeau said.

"Canada's COVID-19 Economic Response Plan is providing Canadians and businesses in all sectors across the country with the help they need to get through the current challenges and position them for success as we emerge from the crisis. The significant new supports we are providing for students and recent graduates are a reflection of the central role they will play in en-

suring that Canada emerges from these challenges stronger than ever,"

added Carla Qualtrough, Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Disability Inclusion.

On March 30, the Government of Canada placed a six-month interest-free moratorium on the repayment of Canada Student Loans for all individuals currently in the process of repaying.

On April 8, the Government of Canada announced temporary changes to the Canada Summer Jobs program that will help employers hire summer staff and provide young Canadians with access to the jobs they need during this unprecedented time. This program will help create up to 70,000 jobs for youth between 15 and 30 years old.

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
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

# Nobleton's Pecchia ecstatic about hockey scholarship

Sports has a peculiar way of saying patience is a virtue. Years of hard work and little results on paper, might leave you helpless. It may be moan a player to believe, this is not for them.

When really, it could be. Once you break through the barrier that has stood in your way for so long it might leave others bemused; but not you. Some might say this player is a oneyear wonder, but those critics have seemingly viewed their opinion from one perspective. The others, who recognize the tenacity, the grit and the determination through the confines of the numbers are the ones that will give you a call.

Nobleton native Matteo Pecchia's story is quite like this. He committed in March, to Western Michigan University on a hockey scholarship starting in 2021, to major in finance and minor in sports management.

In his second year with the Ontario Junior Hockey League's (OJHL) Mississauga Chargers, the 19-year-old left-winger was named the OJHL Most Improved Player of the year, leading his team in points with a career-high 50 points in 44 games played.

"This year, I came in with more confidence and was determined to get better each day," Pecchia said.

His life has always been surrounded by hockey. Since the age of three, he has been on skates. His father; who previously played hockey growing up, never had the opportunity to begin playing the sport at a young age. He wanted to give his son that chance.

At the age of five, Pecchia participated in his first competitive game on

ice, beginning his minor hockey career with the NobleKing Knights.

He watched the sport heavily. He became an Edmonton Oilers fan but wanted to mirror his game around his favourite player; Detroit Red Wings centre, Pavel Datsyuk.

"Growing up, I always wanted hands like Datsyuk. I always wanted to be a two-way player like him. I think a role model like that helped me as well."

Pecchia has always loved playing centre but has spent most of his time on the left wing because of his speed. After three years with the Knights, he moved up to AAA with South Central (now known as Richmond Hill).

Following one season, he went to play AAA in the Greater Toronto Hockey League (GTHL) where he first joined the Toronto Young Nationals under Nobleton resident head coach Santo

At the age of 14, while in his bantam year, Pecchia began refereeing for the NobleKing Knights. He wanted to appreciate the game from a different perspective. He continues to referee games and added York Simcoe Express and St. Andrew's College Saints Varsity games to his officiating resume during his rookie junior season.

He played a total of six years with the Nationals, a total of two years with the Toronto Titans under coaches Brian McLaughlin, former NHLer Darcy Tucker and Jason Nobili before finally making his last pit stop in the GTHL with the Toronto Jr. Canadiens Midget AAA team under Nobleton resident head coach Rick Varone.

It was with the Jr. Canadiens in 2017-2018, that Pecchia was given the

green light to be an affiliate for their junior A team in the OJHL under then head coach Jeff Angelidis. It was his first time experiencing 20-minute periods and a completely different style of the game.

In his rookie year in junior hockey in 2018-2019, Pecchia went to play for the North York Rangers the next season, where he played under head coach Geoff Schomogyi.

"I really like Geoff. I really liked his philosophy and I wanted to be coached under him," Pecchia said.

into his season, he sustained an injury that sidelined him for nearly two months. Returning from his injury became difficult. Pecchia was struggling to find his footing.

At one point, the Rangers were ranked second in the country. With the Rangers, interested in pushing for a national championship, Pecchia was traded to the Mississauga Chargers midway through the year, for the league leading goal scorer, forward Brandon Yeamans.

In 20 games for the Chargers, Pecchia recorded only six points.

That summer, Pecchia aptly sought ways to better himself. Sure, confidence is everything, but he wanted to work on his defensive side of the puck, weight training five times a week and exercising on the ice three times a week.

When the season began in 2019, Pecchia continued his training with Ray LeBlanc and Spencer Wight from S.P.E.E.D HD. LeBlanc would train Pecchia through game video review, on defensive positioning and hockey I.Q that he knew, would give Pecchia the extra edge.

"He taught me how to play smarter

"Even if you're training hard, I believe your hockey I.Q and being able to think the game at a higher pace is what gets you to the next level and watching video helps you work on the weaknesses in your game."

He got his confidence back with the Chargers under head coach Joe Washkurak. Western Michigan University began following him in late September and as Pecchia continued to produce numbers and play exceptional hockey, Pecchia began settling in well but the Broncos first reached out in Janunfortunately after only eight games ary and did not hesitate to offer a scholarship in March.

> Pecchia was immediately sold to devote himself to the division one school, because of the reputable hockey program and coaching staff under former NHL head coach Andy Murray.

> He was also drawn by the wildly renowned fanbase.

> "I'm ecstatic. That's actually one of the reasons why I fell in love with Western Michigan. The fanbase is so behind the hockey team. They call themselves the Lawson Lunatics, because the Broncos play at Lawson Ice Arena."

> Broncos hockey fans have since reached out to Pecchia, expressing their excitement to watch the youngster play hockey. He believes that this is the best environment to immerse himself in, with the high hopes of one day, making his dream of joining the NHL a reality.

Regardless of what the future holds for Pecchia beyond college hockey, he wants to be a part of the game any way he can. Whether it's coaching or in management. Hockey is his life and he will fight for a way to be a part of it, on or off the ice.

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

#### Horticulture **By John Arnott**

As he climbed over a rocky rise on the lower slope of that mountain in eastern Turkey one sunny morning in early spring Pierre was astonished by what he saw, a field of tiny sky blue flowers, stretching before him up into the receding snow above. And although

Last Sunday was Good Shepherd he knew they would have already had ancient local name he called them chionodoxa, Greek for glory of the snow. Thus Pierre Edmund Boissier a 19th century Swiss botanist, soon introduced this 6-petaled star shaped bright blue spring flower with its white centre into the gardens of the western world.

There are some 6 species of chionodoxa with c. luciliae (named after Boissier's wife) and c. gigantea, the best known. Forbes' chionodoxa is a pale pink hybrid and there are white hybrids as well. Botanists see these small perennial plants as close relatives of another early spring flower found in King gardens, scilla.

Like many spring flowers in our area "glories" grow from bulbs albeit tiny ones. Each bulb usually produces slender stems around 4 in./10 cm high each holding 2 to 8 clusters of blooms accompanied by 2 narrow grass like leaves slightly wider at the top. Tiny anthers in centre of each flower carry a pale yellow pollen.

These pear shaped bulbs should be planted with in a month of purchase pointed end up 3 in./ 8 cm deep in groups of 5, 10, 25 up to 100 in sunny locations. This easy care plant isn't soil fussy as long as it isn't rock hard, bone dry or boggy. Digging a little compose/ composted cattle manure in the area where they're to be planted will be rewarded. Glories are great for naturalizing as they produce bulblets and seeds prolifically.

They grow well under most deciduous trees as they are up blooming and have died back by the time these trees leaf out. Once they die down glories leave little trace of where they've been so if planted in a garden you'll need to mark where they are to avoid slicing through them later.

May we find time at this time to again ask for his help and guidance and thank him for all he is doing for us as we journey forward to the everlasting peace of his green pastures and still waters.

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
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
