# Cost of rec. centre grows to \$86 million

The cost of the new Township Wide Recreation Centre has grown by \$10 million.

King councillors approved the project's budget increase to \$86 million. The additional \$10.1 million will be funded buy developer charges and a temporary funding strategy from the Township reserves.

The contract, for \$73.2 million, was awarded to JR Certus Construction.

Council further asked York Region to approve traffic lights at the entrance to the facility, at 1600 15th Sideroad.

The project has been in the works since 2018 with several design changes. With some \$38.8 million in government funding, King decided to expand the facility's amenities to include a second surface and larger swimming pool.

The facility will have two NHL-size rinks, a six-lane lap and leisure pool and separate therapy pool, and multi-purpose community rooms and spaces.

The Township is anticipating higher construction costs, which seem to be common across other municipal-

Council voted to increase the budget from \$75.8 to \$86 million.

The Township also hopes to raise revenue through fundraising, naming rights and the sale of surplus lands.

The commercial uses have been reviewed against the range of commercial uses permitted under the Official Plan, the range of commercial uses permitted under the C1 zone of the Urban Areas By-law, and the prohibited uses identified under the Wellhead Protection provisions of the Zoning by-law. The range of uses were also reviewed for parking demand and with respect to being functionally appropriate and compatible for the site, given that the property has already been developed.

#### Be a good neighbour

Clean Yards By-law 2016-68 sets out minimum standards for properties in the Township including some rules on litter, waste and property maintenance to help ensure that properties are safe, clean and attractive in relation to adjacent properties.

#### Reminder to Owners and Tenants:

- All properties must be kept free and clear of long grass and weeds.
- All properties are to be free of garbage, litter, yard waste, standing water, storage bins and demolition project material, and construction equipment.
  - All properties need to be clear of derelict vehicles, including vehicles that are not currently licensed for operation.

The Clean Yards By-law is the Township's tool for addressing and responding to concerns about property maintenance. Bylaw Enforcement Officers work with property owners and tenants through education to achieve voluntary compliance, but alternatively orders may be issued to obtain compliance with the by-law standards.

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

On the 27day of June, 2022 the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King approved an application for Draft Plan of Subdivision under Section 51 of the Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990, and passed a Zoning By-law Amendment (By-law Number 2022-055), under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O., 1990, c.P 13, as amended, regarding the following applications:

The Zoning By-law Amendment application under File Number Z-2019-11 and Draft Plan of Subdivision application under File Number 19T-19K04, submitted by Nobleton 2715 Developments Limited, concerns lands legally described as Parts of Lot 10, Concession 8, Nobleton, Township of King, as shown on the attached map. The subject applications propose 170 single detached homes, together with open space, natural heritage and buffer areas, and park/stormwater management facilities, as well as a connection to the existing neighbourhood to the south, including a road connection at Paradise Valley Trail.



#### Brief explanation of effect, if any, of written and oral submissions on the decision

All submissions were considered as part of the decision making process. Public, Staff and Agency submissions were considered and where applicable, are reflected in the Conditions of Approval and/or Draft Plan and Zoning By-law. Public consultation on the Draft Plan of Subdivision took place in the form of virtual public meeting held by Council on November 2, 2020, which was a formal statutory meeting under the Planning Act. All comments received were considered in Municipal Planning staff reports and were made available to the public. The comments were identified, discussed, and where appropriate, addressed in the Conditions of Draft Plan Approval, Draft Plan, and Zoning By-law, which were presented at the Council meeting on June 27, 2022 and within Planning Division Report No. GMS-PL-2022-22. Comments received and considered from the public were summarized and included in the Planning Division Report (GMS-PL-2022-22). The report is available on the Township's website www.king.ca. More specifically, comments received in relation to traffic, noise, pedestrian safety, walking and biking trails, the protection of wetlands and aquifers, sewage infrastructure and climate action plan were summarized and responded to within Appendix 3 of Report GMS-PL-2022-22.

#### When and how to file an appeal

Any appeal of the Zoning By-law or appeal of the decision of Council to the Ontario Land Tribunal ("OLT"), is made by filing with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of King, no later than 20 days from the date of this notice, a notice of appeal including the reasons for the appeal, together with a filing fee per application being appealed, in the amount specified on the OLT website (www.olt.gov.on.ca), along with a cheque for \$236.00 per appeal, representing the Clerk's Department 2022 Administrative processing fee, payable to the Township of King, and a cheque for \$300.00 per appeal, representing the Planning Division's 2022 Administrative processing fee, payable to the Township of King. The last day for filing an appeal is July 27th, 2022. Should this date fall on a holiday or weekend, you will have until 4:30 p.m. of the next business day to file your appeal. If you wish to appeal to the OLT, a copy of an appeal form is available from the OLT website at www. olt.gov.on.ca. Please note the Tribunal will only accept filing fee payments by certified cheque or money order.

#### Who can file an appeal

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a Draft Plan of Subdivision or Zoning By-law Amendment to the OLT. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

#### Right of applicant or public body to appeal conditions of draft plan of subdivision

The applicant, the Minister of Municipal Affairs, or any public body that has made oral submissions at the public meeting or made written submissions to the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King before the proposed Draft Plans of Subdivision was approved may, at any time before the approval of the Final Plan of Subdivision, appeal any of the conditions imposed by the Council of the Corporation of the Township of King to the OLT by filing a notice of appeal with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of King.

Only individuals, corporations or public bodies may appeal decisions in respect of a proposed plan of subdivision to the OLT. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or group on its behalf.

on or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal of the decision of the approval authority, including the lapsing provisions or the conditions, unless the person or public body, before the decision of the approval authority, made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council, or made a written request to be notified of changes to the conditions or, in the OLT's opinion, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

#### How to receive notice of changed conditions

# Why Canada should be celebrated, not trashed

To understand why it's popular among the chattering classes to trash Canada at this time of year, it helps to understand the power of utopian thinking.

In past centuries, utopian movements sprang from religious impulses and secular imitations of the same na-

Religious examples include communes which, in extreme forms, separated themselves from what they viewed as an impure world. The goal was utopian: to create a mini-heaven on earth.

Secular utopian movements included 20th-century Marxists – be it Russian revolutionaries in 1917 or Pol Pot's Cambodia and his Khmer Rouge killing fields in the 1970s – with plenty of other deadly examples in between. The common impulse was a utopian vision of radical economic equality.

Previous religious and secular utopian movements were anti-reality. Those utopians ignored human imperfection

or diverse human abilities, desires and choices, but such dreamers at least focused on creating a future paradise.

In contrast, today's reflexive Canada critics apply utopian thinking to the past. They look back and see that Canada's first prime minister, John A. Macdonald, or some other historical figure was imperfect. Or didn't have 2022 views in 1867.

But why would we expect them to be flawless when we're not? Or expect a 19th-century politician to follow 21st-century policy prescriptions?

The result of such utopian thinking as applied to the past is the inevitable attempts to try to 'cancel' such figures, to send their history and praiseworthy accomplishments - the creation of a nation – down some 1984-like memory

Utopianism is one mistake when looking in the rear-view mirror. Another is to see the flaws in history as definitive for a nation like Canada and not ask: How did we move away from past wrongs that were once routine in almost every civilization?

Slavery was ubiquitous in the ancient world until recent centuries. Slaves of every colour, creed and ethnicity were taken captive on every continent: Africa, Asia, the Americas, and even Europe and the North Atlantic regions. Historian Robert Davis has catalogued how one million Europeans were taken into slavery between 1530 and 1780 by slave traders who originated in North Africa.

Slavery was, tragically, once a reality worldwide. But why and how did it come to be abolished?

It was the result of people like British parliamentarian and lifelong abolitionist William Wilberforce and the British Empire post-1833, including pre-Confederation governors in Canada.

So why should Canada be celebrated this Canada Day?

Not because it was ever perfect or is now, but because pre- and post-Confederation Canada was ahead of the curve on that and other issues.

While Canada effectively abolished slavery in 1820, it took the Americans until President Abraham Lincoln's 1863 Emancipation Proclamation to declare slaves free and the Union's 1865 Civil War victory over the slaveholding south to make that declaration a reality.

Many other nations didn't abolish slavery until the first half of the 20th century. These included China, Malaysia, Morocco, Turkey and Kuwait. About a century and a half after Canada abolished slavery, Oman and Mauritania finally outlawed slavery – in 1970 and 1981, respectively.

Or ponder the emancipation of women. Canada granted the vote in federal elections to women in 1917. It took until 1944 in France, 1949 in China, 1950 in India, 2005 in Kuwait, and 2015 in Saudi Arabia – and only for municipal elections.

Or consider another evil in human history: the rampant mistreatment (or worse) of those different from the majority – which can be defined by colour, ethnicity, religion or language. Institutional discriminatory treatment was once routine (and still is in Quebec). What's remarkable is the move away from seeing people as defined by such characteristics and in-

stead being treated as individuals in law and policy.

Canada was again ahead of the curve. Ontario passed laws against discrimination in employment and accommodation based on colour, ethnicity, religion or gender in the early 1950s. Yet some in 2022 claim that Canada is institutionally racist, conflating personal prejudice with systemic racism, when in fact, institutional reforms were enacted 70 years ago.

There are many reasons to celebrate Canada on Canada Day. Don't let the utopian perfectionists who think the past should have been perfect dissuade you from celebrating a tremendous accomplishment: Canada.

Over time, Canada has become a free and flourishing nation for ever-more peoples.

### **Amendments approved for Nobleton property**

A commercial property in Nobleton will enjoy some expanded uses, thanks to a recent ruling by King council.

The owners of the property at 12840 Highway 27 wanted the list of permitted uses expanded to include a child care centre, convenience retial, day spa and dry cleaning business. Some other uses, such as automotive retail and service were

# Education workers deliver letters to MPPs Lecce, Mulroney

ered tens of thousands of letters to the premier and local MPPs recently.

Members of CUPE Locals 1196, 1734. 4340 – the frontline education workers of York Region District School Board and Conseil scolaire catholique MonAvenir – also delivered copies of their letters to King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce at his King City constituency office. They were also dropped off at Caroline Mulroney's constituency office.

Writing directly to the re-elected premier, frontline workers from public, Catholic, English, and French school boards across the province are calling for increased staffing in schools to guarantee that service improvements for students will be in place come September, as well as real wage increases above the rate of inflation to address low pay and problems with retention.

The letter to the premier of Ontario, written and signed by education workers, reads in part:

"Even before the pandemic, understaffing among education workers was a problem in Ontario schools. Many school boards can't recruit and retain qualified education workers, in large part because wages are so low and jobs so precarious.

"During the COVID-19 pandemic, we

Front-line education workers deliv- have worked both in schools and offsite, at times risking our own and our families' health and safety. We took these risks so that students could keep learning, schools would be kept secure, and families and communities had the support they needed.

"A 2021 survey of CUPE education workers found 51% of us worked at least one additional job to make ends meet. This number increases to 64.5% for sole-income earners. Roughly 75% of our members are women for whom the gender pay gap is widening further each year.

"Frontline education workers are the backbone of every community's schools with most of us working second or even third jobs to make ends meet," said Laura Walton, president of CUPE's Ontario School Boards Council of Unions (OSBCU). "Yet we're paid only \$39,000 a year on average while we personally subsidize Ontario's education system by doing unpaid work outside of regular hours because staffing levels are so low we can't get all the work done on paid time."

"Whether schools are provided enough money to stop damaging cuts and to ensure that all students, especially students with special needs, have the right supports and services is a po-

litical choice made by our elected representatives," said Walton. "Ontario is the richest province in Canada and the money controlled by only 59 billionaires has increased by more than \$100 billion during the pandemic. There's no excuse for this government to cut corners on our children's future or for keeping education workers on the brink of poverty."

The report Education Workers' Wages in Ontario: The Impact of Ten Years of Cuts released this spring found that Ontario education workers are the lowest-paid in the sector, earning on average only \$39,000 per year. It relied on new original data - survey responses workers.

The Ontario School Boards Council of Unions (OSBCU) unites 55,000 members of the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) who work in the public, Catholic, English, and French school systems throughout Canada's largest province. OSBCU members are educational assistants, school library workers, administrative assistants, custodians and tradespeople, early childhood educators, child and youth workers, instructors, nutrition service workers, audio-visual technologists, school safety monitors, and social



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# Renewed subdivision proposal north of Nobleton

A bid for 170 homes north of Nobleton is moving forward.

King council approved conditions of draft approval for the project.

Initial plans for the property were submitted back in 2019 and public meetings were held on the matter.

Since then, the property changed hands and is now owned by Nobleton 2715 Developments Ltd. The new owner is proceeding with the existing applications.

The previous owner appealed the application to the Ontario Land Tribunal but those were withdrawn by the current owner, who is working cooperatively with the Township.

Along with the 170 homes, there are plans for a park, stormwater management facility, wetland, woodlands and open space.

The 21-hectare property is located at the southeast corner of the 15 Sideroad and Highway 27. The land is designed as "Neighbourhood" and "Village Natural System" in the Township's Official

The lands are located within the Oak

designation with both the ORMCP and Greenbelt Plan.

The Province's Places to Grow Plan promotes intensification and sets targets for municipalities to meet.

In order for the project to move ahead, the lands have to be rezoned to various residential zones, while some portions will remain as Environmental Protection.

Staff noted the southern boundary of the property is close to existing residential lots on Paradise Valley Trail. Staff believe this proposal conforms to criteria of the Official Plan.

Preliminary designs have been submitted by the applicant, and these will be reviewed during the draft plan approval stage.

Vegetation protection zones have been included.

Staff and York Region are looking to see if there's sufficient capacity to accommodate the project in Nobleton's sanitary water and sewer system.

The proposal also has an underground stormwater management facility, to be situated beneath a park.

There are road links planned at Paradise Valley Drive and a new intersection at 15th sideroad. The applicants Ridges Moraine and within a settlement have been working with Township staff



on street design standards.



ation while we embark on this work," Baldwin added.





The first thing to do is to look around your neighbourhood and nominate a front garden that you think is bright and colourful and well designed. Feel free to nominate your own front garden.



# Summer exhibitions at the McMichael Canadian Art Collection

The McMichael Canadian Art Collection is pleased to announce its summer suite of exhibitions; three exceptional solo presentations by women artists who share a passionate love of colour: Wanda Koop, Canada's most masterful living painter of light and luminescence; Gathie Falk, now 94, a trailblazer across media whose work evokes the uncanny in the everyday; and Elisapee Ishulutaq in her first museum survey, whose vibrant large-scale drawings of daily life in Nunuvut mark her as one of Canada's most innovative artists.

Taken together, these retrospective exhibitions illuminate the extraordinary bodies of work that have been created assiduously over decades by some of Canada's most perceptive artists – working in and out of the limelight – the full breath of which will be on display at the McMichael this summer.

The McMichael also welcomes artist Jen Aitken to the Thomson Shack for the RBC Emerging Artist Residency.

Wanda Koop (b. 1951) is one of Canada's leading painters, her works appearing in the galleries of Toronto, Montreal, Los Angeles, New York and Houston. Though she has had a more than 40-year career as an artist, the presentation at the McMichael catches Koop in a late-career moment of glory as she continues on her bold path of experimentation.

Based in Winnipeg, Koop has created a body of work that attests to her astute observations of contemporary life, responding to such issues as climate change, Indigenous land rights, and the digital media environment in which we are immersed, as well as the transcendent beauty of the natural world.

Since her earliest days, Koop's work has engaged with abstraction, as she stripped away inessential detail to create strikingly pared down compositions and combinations of colour. In her more recent paintings, though, Koop is increasingly exploring colour and light as subjects in themselves, masterfully engineering her canvases through the application of dozens of layers of deftly controlled pigment. The resulting surfaces seem to glow from within, suggesting euphoric states of vision.

Through the arrangement of these recent works into an ensemble of rare beauty, Koop introduces visitors to realms of light as never before, offering a rare glimpse into her deepest sources

of inspiration. In addition to her paintings on canvas, the exhibition also includes two of her new Light Sticks installations—suites of long, thin, shaped works that bear strips of intense colour and patterning, arranged sculpturally against the wall—a breakthrough by the artist into the third dimension.

"Throughout her dazzling career, audiences have come to know Koop primarily as a figurative artist," says Chief Curator Sarah Milroy. "But abstraction is a painter's language that runs throughout all of Koop's works. This show explores her recent push even deeper into the frontier of pure colour and light. Here we see Koop creating layers of colour to bottomless effect, evoking expanses of light that evoke her euphoric experience of the beauty of nature."

At age 94, Gathie Falk is one of Canada's most beloved and esteemed artists, long known and celebrated for her pioneering achievements in painting, performance art, ceramics, and installation art. A trailblazer on all fronts, she has brought a rich sensibility to bear on her observations of the everyday, perceptions often tinged with the surreal and the uncanny.

From her fruit piles to the landmark performances of her early career, to her extended pursuit of themes and variations in her painting practice – expanses of water dazzling with light, riotous flower borders set against cement sidewalks, night skies pierced by starlight or obscured by clouds – she finds the wondrous in the routine world around her. This exhibition summarizes an extraordinary career, opening with a display of her ceramic fruit piles, with subsequent sections devoted to her early work in performance, ceramic still life, and selections from her Theatre in Black and White and Colour, works which extend her notions of theatrical presentation into the realm of oil on

The show continues with a gathering of Falk's flower border paintings and a number of works from her Pieces of Water series, a sumptuous immersion in her lush painterly style and lavish use of colour. Another section will gather her sculptural investigations of shoes and clothing in her art, often rendered in serial form.

Finally, the exhibition concludes with a presentation of Falk's Night

Sky paintings from the 1970s and 1980s, accompanied by her ghostly Reclining Figure (after Henry Moore): Stella, a major sculptural work from 1999 that evokes the absent figure. This concluding gallery evokes the mysteries we face at the end of our days as we search the heavens, and the wonder at life that has always underpinned Falk's art making.

The exhibition is accompanied by a major publication, including essays by McMichael Chief Curator Sarah Milroy, Vancouver curator and writer Daina Augaitis, artists Liz Magor and Landon Mackenzie, writer Nancy Tousley, and art historians John Geoghegan and Jocelyn Anderson.

This will be the first solo museum exhibition of works by the exceptional Inuit artist Elisapee Ishulutaq (1925–2018), focusing on her epic works on paper in pencil and oil stick. Her works immerse us in the experience of daily life in her home community of Pangnirtung, located on a spectacular mountainous fjord on Baffin Island, Nunuvut, capturing the community's way of life in vibrant colour.

Ishulutaq's drawings are bold in their minimalism, her high-contrast forms evoking the dramatic mountain-scapes that surround her community. Large panoramic drawings provide holistic views of life in the hamlet of Pangnirtung, while smaller works evoke the dazzling world of birds in flight, boats at sea, or the inky back expanses of the night sky in the depths of winter. Intriguing, too, are her hybrid scenes in which Arctic realities are

counterbalanced by imagery from an imaginary south – and the unexpected appearances of elephants or leafy trees.

Ishulutaq's works draw us deeply into her way of seeing, transmitting an indelible view of life in the Arctic seen through her unique lens. This exhibition extends the longstanding commitment of the McMichael Canadian Art Collection to the art of Canada's North, bringing to light an artist whose accomplishments have yet to be fully celebrated.

The exhibition will be accompanied by a publication that will include an introductory essay by McMichael Chief Curator Sarah Milroy, a lead essay by Inuit writer and artist Tarralik Duffy, an essay by art historian John Geoghegan, and a contribution from Darlene Wight, Curator of Inuit Art at the Winnipeg Art Gallery, who knew Elisapee Ishulutaq during her lifetime.

Through July 3, the McMichael welcomes Toronto-based artist Jen Aitken to the Tom Thomson shack as part of the RBC Emerging Artist Residency at the McMichael. During the residency, Aitken will use the Thomson Shack as a studio space in which to create a site-specific installation that responds to the site's architecture. Visitors will be able to meet Aitken and engage with the work in progress on June 26 and July 3 when she will lead drop-in drawing workshops with visitors in the Shack. The McMichael will also host a virtual Artist Talk on July 5 where Aitken will be in conversation with Chief Curator Sarah Milroy.

### Dangerous driving is on the rise

Ontario drivers say they aren't feeling as safe as they used to on highways, and they're seeing more dangerous driving behaviours on the roads.


A new study by DIG Insights on behalf of CAA South Central Ontario (CAA SCO) indicates that 98 per cent of Ontario drivers witnessed unsafe driving behaviours in the past year – up three per cent last year. This increase in unsafe driving behaviours could also explain why six per cent fewer drivers are feeling safe on our roads, specifically on highways with speed limits of 100 km/h.

"Ontario police services continue to report significant amounts of speeding, stunt and aggressive driving," said Michael Stewart, community relations consultant, Government and Community Relations, CAA SCO.

About half of respondents point to speeding as a big problem in Ontario which is no surprise considering the most common behaviour seen was speeding, followed by aggressive driving, unsafely changing lanes and distracted driving.

In total, 58 per cent admitted to engaging in dangerous driving behaviours. Forty-three per cent of Ontario drivers admitted to speeding, 17 per cent say they've driven distracted, eight per cent say they've made unsafe lane changes and six per cent have driven aggressively.



Partnered with Chacco Kid, Lamaze enjoyed numerous victories around the globe and represented Canada at the 2018 World Equestrian Games in Tryon, NC. For Lamaze, his most meaningful win with Chacco Kid came in the \$500,000 RBC Grand Prix of Canada, presented by Rolex, during the 2019 Spruce Meadows 'National' tournament in Calgary. It was Lamaze's first competition since publicly revealing that he had been battling a brain tu-

"My favourite memory with Chacco was winning the RBC Grand Prix when I wasn't well," recalled Lamaze. "The win was 70 percent horse and 30 percent rider. He knew he had to take care of me and seemed to rise to the oc-

### **Pacers draft two Canadians**

Not only did the Indiana Pacers marvel at the talent of all four Canadians available at this year's NBA Draft, the organization's front office stuck to their guts and brought a few of them on board.

With the sixth overall selection, the Pacers selected Montreal, Que. native Bennedict Mathurin and then with the No. 31 overall pick, the Pacers went on to select Aurora native Andrew Nembhard.

For the fourth time in NBA Draft history, four or more Canadians were selected in a single year. With the seventh overall selection the Portland Trail Blazers took London, Ont. native Shaedon Sharpe and with the No. 32 pick, the Orlando Magic snagged Mississauga native Caleb Houstan.

Mathurin, a 6-foot-7 guard out of Arizona is coming off an incredible season. Mathurin averaged 17.7 points, 5.6 rebounds and 2.5 assists per game. He was named Pac-12 player of the year and even made the All-Pac-12 first-team at the end of the season. The highly touted wing, will surely be quite an impact player.

And the same goes for Nembhard. The 6-foot-5-point guard was named a Bob Cousy Point Guard Award finalist and helped lead the Gonzaga Bulldogs to the No. 1 ranked team in all of the NCAA last season.

When he transferred from the Florida Gators to the Gonzaga Bulldogs, it was seemingly the perfect fit for Nembhard. In 32 games this past season, Nembhard averaged 11.8 points, 3.4 rebounds and 5.8 assists.

With these draft picks, the Pacers will now house four Canadian players

Both Mathurin and Nembhard will ioin Toronto native Oshae Brissett and Dominican Republic-born guard who was raised in Montreal, Chris Duarte.

So, what comes next for the Indiana Pacers?

According to reports ahead of the 2022 NBA Draft, the Pacers were testing the trade market involving star centre Myles Turner and guard Malcolm Brogdon.

After trading versatile forward Domantas Sabonis in a six-player deal with the Sacramento Kings at the trade deadline last year, it was clear to everyone the Pacers are interested in rebuilding.

The Pacers in the deal received key pieces including point-guard Tyrese Haliburton and shooting guard Buddy

Turner, who missed the second half of the regular season due to a stress fracture in his left foot, is heading into the final year of his four-year, \$80-million contract.

Brogdon, who suffered with a right-Achilles injury for most of this season, was expected to be on the move last week, as per ESPN senior NBA insider, Adrian Wojnarowski.

By selecting Nembhard, it looks more like a sure-fire decision Brogdon will be out on his way with Haliburton expected to run Rick Carlisle's offence and it might be safe to presume, Andrew Nembhard will come off the bench to run the second unit.

But then again, anything can happen. If Brogdon ends up staying, it could be a lethal backcourt, should he be able to stay healthy. Nembhard would further enhance his game and he will be able to learn from two very gifted floor-generals.

"We watched the Ironman Championships, then we got married afterwards." Gazing upon the will of the athletes and the energy of the crowds, McGrath began envisioning what she wanted in her future. From that point onward in 1999, she had set out one goal. That was, to compete in this Ironman World Championships in Hawaii one day.

She started off small, easing her way into the swing of things. Then in 2002, she competed in her first Ironman in Wisconsin and then again in Florida in

Following the birth of her daughter, she took some time off to ramp up her training again and in 2006, she signed up for the competition right here in

But an incident during training forced McGrath and her family to take one step back. "I crashed my bike, sustained a concussion, punctured my lung, broke some ribs and was unable to complete my Ironman in 2006. Despite my pleading, the doctor wouldn't let me go. I had to defer the race to 2007, where I in Ironman Florida."

Of course, with her family concerned about her health, McGrath involved herself in smaller triathlon events. The goal had remained the same, but she refrained from fully giving it her all to protect herself from any further incidents. McGrath is gearing for the Ironman World Championships in Kona, Hawaii



Ambassadors of God – Rev. Erin Martin's sermon last Sunday on Christ's instructions to his disciples in Luke 10:

"In Luke Jesus talks to the disciples about what they'd encounter when they went out into the world to share the good news. Jesus was preparing a congregation sized group of about 70 – All Saints at is best – to go out and be his ambassadors.

"He told them, 'I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves.' God's work is never easy. Those first ambassadors didn't have the same resources that we have – there was no church, there weren't any books, there were no training schools, no seminaries. In fact, they were told to carry no purse, no bag, no sandals – just go, with only God's message to use in their ministry.

"Jesus was wanted his ambassadors to depend on faith and the Spirit. I've learned that when it comes to "doing" ministry, I build relationships with people and work with them to deepen their own relationship with God.

"Jesus instructed the disciples to find people who were open to God's message of love, and then stay with them - eat with them, become a part of their family – listen to the stories of their lives. Ministry is always about relationships. It is about our relationship with God and with each other. We can't accomplish nearly as much without those relationships in place. My whole goal in coming here is simply to love you...I believe the rest will fall into place ... but my first order of business is to know and love you.

"We're all called to love each other in such a way that people will say – 'you know, they talk about this loving God of theirs, and they live like they love each other – so maybe there's something true about what they're saying. Maybe I should try to get to know this God and see for myself what that's all about.'

"Jesus is looking for ambassadors to represent him today, in our world.. He's looking for people who are ready to love others, even in hard times, to build relationships and welcome all people into the family of God; people who make those relationships signs of God's loving work in the world.

"Jesus sent out a congregation sized group of people to spread the news. We can be the next group to be sent out."



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
