#### **Minister boosts Building Blocks**

### Many paving projects are now complete

Work on King Township's major capital projects continues this summer, with key transportation, environmental, park and facilities projects being completed and others under way.

#### **Transportation**

Paving Program: The following road sections are now complete:

1.61 kilometres of the 10th Concession between Queen Street and Highway 9.

3.68 kilometres of Woodchoppers Lane.

17th Sideroad from Dufferin Street to Keele Street. 17th Sideroad from Keele Street to Jane Street. 18th Sideroad from Concession Road 7 to the east end. Keele Street from Strawberry Lane to King Street.

Road Reconstructions in Nobleton: Sections of the 15th Sideroad and 8th and 10th Concessions are being enhanced. Work on the 15th Sideroad from Highway 27 to 8th Concession Road is substantially complete.

Bridges and Culverts Program: Four culvert replacements on 7th Concession Road are currently out for tender and will begin construction this year. Three more culvert replacement projects will be tendered later this year with construction in 2023.

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
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### Progress being made in local park renovations

#### **Environmental**

Brownsville Court Watermain: Due to aging infrastructure, the watermain, water services and fire hydrants along Brownsville Court have been replaced. The construction is mostly complete, except for minor work. The top asphalt is scheduled to be completed this sum-

Nobleton Sanitary Sewer Works: Sanitary sewer mains are being constructed in Nobleton. Sanitary sewers are an important component of urban infrastructure, reducing the risk of leaked water-borne contaminants that can come from septic systems. Base asphalt repairs are ongoing and construction crews are finalizing concrete curb

Western, Elmwood and Castlewood watermain relining: The watermain relining along Western Avenue from Church Street to Brownsville Court, Castlewood Avenue and Elmwood Avenue in Schomberg is complete. Service connections and restoration work is ongoing and should be complete in the

#### **Parks**

Tasca Park Phase II: Tasca Park in Nobleton is scheduled to receive many new features that were based on community input. These include an offleash dog area, pump track, pickleball courts, an area for ice skating and permanent washrooms. Tasca Park is in the construction phase. Parts of the construction are already complete and ready for public use.

Osin Lions Park redevelopment: The redevelopment of Osin Lions Park in Schomberg will include the replacement of aging play structures and surfaces. The new play area will be fully accessible and incorporate inclusive options, such as a "quiet corner."

Construction is scheduled to begin mid-summer 2022. Partial park closures are to be expected during the construction period.

#### **Facilities**

Township-Wide Recreation Centre: Construction has started and progress is visible. The project continues to move forward with site works. Earth works, soil improvement and servicing are expected to be completed by the end of the third quarter of 2022.

The progression of the detailed design has been approved and is slated for completion by September 2022. The TWRC will be a state-of-the-art, high-efficiency, fully accessible recreation complex with two NHL-sized ice surfaces, a six-lane 25-metre lap pool, a leisure pool, a multi-purpose athletic fieldhouse and a multi-purpose commu-

Schomberg Community Hall: Work is nearing completion on the Schomberg Community Hall, a centrepiece in Schomberg's history for more than a century. Once done, the building will be a fully renovated, high-efficiency, fully accessible gathering place. Key renovations include a complete demolition of interior finishes, an upgraded building envelope to meet current energy efficiency standards and a fully accessible space designed to current accessibility standards.

I welcomed your article in the July 28 edition of The Weekly Sentinel about the partnership between Canadensys (Bolton) and Help A Village Effort (Minden) to fund wells in rural India. I hope it spurred some folks to look into HAVE and to

For anyone who has not heard of HAVE before, I add that this is a little charity that could and can.

As you mentioned in the article, HAVE began 40 years ago. Gerry Feltham was the founder and first Chairman of HAVE. It was because of a trip he made to India in 1981 that HAVE was begun. He has never stopped raising money from those who have, to give water to those who have it not.

He is now in his mid-90s and a cancer survivor but he continues to raise money for the underprivileged in rural India. He moved to his hometown of Glovertown in Newfoundland 24 years ago and started an annual Walk for Water there. There is also a branch of HAVE in Vancouver. With people like this behind it, no wonder HAVE has been able to fund more than 1,000 wells.

The charity is entirely volunteer-run. When trips are made to inspect the wells that have been paid for, the volunteers pay their own expenses. This is a charity where 95% of the money raised goes to the organization's charitable work.

Another reason that HAVE is dear to my heart is that my father, Rev. Fred Elson, was a volunteer and also chairperson of HAVE for several years. After his death, donations paid for a well in his memory in India.

Canadensys says it was an easy decision to work with HAVE Canada. They are right.



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### Ukraine must be victorious, for all of our sakes

It has been almost four months since Russia re-invaded Ukraine with the explicit aim of erasing Ukraine from the map as an independent country and Ukrainians as a people from our collective memory. Russian dictator – and now war criminal – Vladimir Putin failed thanks to the bravery and immense sacrifices of Ukrainians fighting for their hearth and home.

But all is not well, not yet. We – the global West – must ensure that Russia is soundly defeated, politically and militarily. Despite the ultimate price being paid in blood by the Ukrainians, this war is not only about Ukraine. It is fundamentally about the future of the European, and by extension transatlantic, political and security order.

Canada had sacrificed much blood and treasure to uphold this rules-based order since the last major land war in Europe began 83 years ago by another dictator with delusions of grandeur. Canada and Canadians have benefited immensely from this order over the years, making the country secure and its people prosperous – and the defence of this order remains a core national interest for Canada. Thus, the stakes are high for Canada as well.

The imperative of Ukrainian victory also means we must be clear-eyed about the challenges that lay ahead. I want to highlight three key challenges we need to pay close attention to in the weeks and months ahead.

First is the military challenge. Putin's blitzkrieg to Kyiv might have failed, but Russia currently occupies about one-fifth of Ukrainian territory, razing cities, killing tens of thousands of civilians, and kidnapping and transporting hundreds of thousands to Russia. In this second phase of the war, where the focus is now on Donbas, the fighting is even more fierce and deadly. Ukraine is also facing higher levels of attrition both in terms of equipment and troops, as Russia operates with shorter supply lines, better artillery and air support, and over a much-reduced front.

As such, Ukraine needs more weapons, especially heavy weapons, artillery, tanks, and air defence systems as well as more ammunition to stop and reverse the Russian offensive. Therefore, it is essential that the West not only maintain the current level of military

and economic support to Ukraine but also dramatically scale them upwards. Ukraine can prevail, but it needs the tools to do so.

Second is the political challenge. Western unity will be under strain in the coming months. There are already voices, particularly in Western Europe, that call on Ukraine to consider territorial concessions in return for a cease-fire or a negotiated settlement in which Russia gets to keep the territories it currently occupies. Those voices will only grow louder as the war continues and the impact of Russia's war of aggression, from food supplies to energy to trade, starts to be felt beyond Ukraine. Russia will surely try to exploit this potential rift.

But a ceasefire now means conquest pays. It enables Russia to regroup, recover and renew its offensive. The so-called territorial concessions are not just lines on a map. Bucha and Mariupol are the future for those who will live under Russian occupation. Russia has demonstrated time and again that it cannot be trusted to follow the most basic principle of international law, pacta sunt servanda – agreements must be kept.

This is the siren song of appeasement, and there is nothing but ruin lying in that direction. Ukrainians lived and are living through that hell every single day. Our Baltic and Polish allies understand this very well. So do the Americans and the British for now.

It is crucial that the voices of appeasement not prevail among the rest. We must ensure that western support for Ukraine is firmly embedded and locked in as part of our policy and legislation, just like Odysseus tying himself down to avoid being lured by the siren's song.

Last is the cognitive challenge. The western public was indignant and outraged when the Russian re-invasion started in late February. Russia brazenly violated the values that democratic societies hold dear. The reaction was almost visceral. But now, so-called "Ukraine fatigue" is setting in among some populations. The public's attention on the war in Ukraine is waning as soaring energy prices and increasing living costs take centre stage. That was to be expected as people try to adjust to

inflation rates not seen in 40 years in nians are paying now. But the cost of Russian victory for the West will be

But it also creates an important vulnerability; maintaining broad public support for Ukraine is essential if the western governments are going to be in for the long haul.

Russia is already exploiting the increasing anxiety about inflation, high energy prices, and food supplies. It is preparing to engineer famine and food shortages in the Middle East and Africa in the fall. The Kremlin will make sure that Europe experiences an energy crisis this winter.

Putin believes he can outlast sanctions because he thinks neither the public nor the Western governments have the necessary will to see this through. He believes Western governments will fold under the pressure of worsening economies and decreasing public attention. We need to prove him wrong.

Make no mistake: this will be a long war, and we will need to shoulder some of the burden, although it will be nothing compared to the price the Ukrainians are paying now. But the cost of Russian victory for the West will be incomparably high. In other words, if we do not pay pennies today, we will pay hundreds of dollars in the future.

It is of utmost importance that othe public understands this trade-off – and that this war will last not weeks but months and perhaps years. We must be emotionally and intellectually ready for a long and brutal war. This cognitive adjustment will not be easy, but it is essential if freedom, democracy, and decency are to prevail.

Supporting Ukraine is not charity. It's self-interest. For Canada and its allies, this is not about choosing between a moral imperative and a strategic necessity. Doing the right thing is also doing the strategically smart thing when it comes to ensuring Ukrainian victory in this war.

Ukraine indeed must be victorious, for all of our sakes.



### Farming is losing to misguided urban politics

Most Canadians have never been on a farm, let alone lived on one, which makes more than 98 per cent of our population agriculturally illiterate.

For many Canadians, crop production is an unknown concept. Because of this, it's relatively easy to use fear to influence public opinion on any food-related issue involving agriculture. Activists know this well.

Our great rural-urban divide has always fuelled food politics, and that's not going to change anytime soon. But now, agri-food policies are increasingly being urbanized by an agenda that's pushing the entire Western world toward the precipice of a food security catastrophe.

The Trudeau government wants a 30 per cent reduction in emissions by 2030, which doesn't necessarily include fertilizer. But producers claim that reducing nitrous oxide emissions can't be achieved without reducing fertilizer use.

Most common fertilizers contain

nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. Nitrogen is the issue. Surpluses of nitrogen in the atmosphere can produce pollutants such as ammonia and ozone. Too much nitrogen will contaminate soils, and waterways and, of course, harm our health. Policy-makers have every right to be concerned.

But the federal government wants an absolute reduction in emissions, regardless of productivity or efficiency of fertilizer use. For many crops, Canadian farmers' ability to grow anything will be severely compromised unless they use more land.

This is all happening as food security concerns around the world are rampant. The Netherlands is witnessing massive protests from farmers as they face similar emission targets, even fertilizer bans, by 2030.

And make no mistake: Canada could be next to adopt outright fertilizer bans.

It's unclear how food prices would be impacted. But producing food on a large scale would likely become much less cost-effective. The correlation between commodity prices and food retail prices is typically not that strong, but a wide-reaching policy impacting an entire industry all at once could very well make it stronger.

Canada produces food for the world, not just for Canada. Aggressive emission targets will likely lead to more people, not fewer, experiencing famine worldwide, none of whom will be Canadian. Since we trade with the rest of the world, mainly with the United States, our crops would likely become less competitive. With lower supplies, input costs for food manufacturers and grocers would likely increase significantly, pushing food prices higher. This is one aspect of the emission reduction issue in farming.

The needs regarding food production vary widely from region to region and between crops. Supply-managed commodities like dairy, eggs and poultry will be spared, receiving more for their products no matter what. Most of these commodities are produced in Ontario and Quebec.

Grain production, on the other side, won't be so protected. Suggested emission targets will again transfer more wealth from some sectors to others by

internationally-focused farming businesses. And those farmers come from across Canada. Free-market livestock sectors like cattle and hogs are also affected by all of this.

This is all happening for one reason, beyond the focus on emission targets. The government is already imposing a 35 per cent tariff on Russian fertilizer, even if tariffs aren't actually punishing the Russian regime. This only impacts our farmers as our government wants to discourage the use of fertilizers for its own convenience.

The Canadian fertilizer emission reduction plan also points to how farming is losing to urban politics. The signals have been there for a while, with "No Mow May," bees on cereal boxes and city councils ruling on pesticides. Activists are successfully using urban-centric artifacts to influence policy issues, which could spill over to agriculture. Cities essentially want farmers to treat fields like city lawns. But the stakes are much higher for farming.

This has been happening as activism has become institutionalized in recent years. Interest groups, even academics who have become advocates, will weaponize science to support a narrative that fits with a biased view of what farmers should and shouldn't do. This is beyond dangerous. It's a reckless way of dictating policy.

Virtue signalling – supporting ideals over fact – is practised by those who likely see their quality of life being affected. They're also dead wrong. This goes for all issues, but food and energy

compromising the livelihood of many policies are the ones that will be felt most acutely.

The federal government wants to make agriculture greener and more sustainable. There's nothing wrong with that; the sector can always do better. Many are speaking about regenerative agriculture and the circular economy. Those concepts have merit and can help our agri-food sector become more efficient.

But what is not appreciated is how farming has evolved in just the last five years, adopting more sustainable practices. Crop rotation schedules, biodiversity considerations and the no-till approach have all made agriculture more sustainable, helping farmers reduce emissions.

Farming is a business, and cutting costs is part of doing business. Farmers don't want to overspread expensive fertilizers since this would make their business less profitable. Most farmers hire soil scientists to ensure they can rely on reusing natural resources to make a living.

Farmers are the most responsible environmental stewards in the world. Incentivizing farmers using productivity-based metrics linked to fertilizer would be more appropriate - and less foolish.

The government can look at other sectors to hit targets but messing around with our food system can be quite perilous.



### Canada, Ontario aim to grow, sustain agri-food workforce

The governments of Canada and Ontario are investing \$4 million to continue building a strong and competitive agri-food workforce.

The second round of the Ontario Agri-Careers Support Initiative, which closes on Sept. 8, provides funding for innovative pilot projects that are tailor-made to address employee needs at a local level.

"By working together through the Canadian Agricultural Partnership, we're ensuring Ontario has a skilled workforce to support its crucial food processing sector," said Marie-Claude Bibeau, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada. "This investment in Agri-Careers helps Ontario's food processors meet growing labour challenges, while remaining competitive here and around the world."

Eligible food processing businesses with 50 or more employees can apply for up to \$80,000 in funding, or up to \$200,000 for collaborations between two or more businesses, to cover up to 70 per cent of eligible project costs. Selected projects will aim to help the sector attract, support and retain the

workers it needs to continue producing the safe and high-quality food made in Ontario, strengthen the local supply chain and promote greater food security.

"Our government recognizes that we need to continue making strategic investments that position Ontario's agrifood sector for success both now and in the future," said Lisa Thompson, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs. "The innovative projects we are supporting through this program will make it easier for people to take advantage of meaningful and increasingly high-tech career opportunities available in food processing."

"We need all hands-on deck to tackle the historic labour shortage in Ontario, so that shelves are stocked, and families have food on their table," said Monte McNaughton, Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development. "That's why our government is supporting the Ontario Agri-Careers Support Initiative, which will prepare job seekers for exciting careers in agrifood and spread opportunity to every corner of our province."

The Ontario Agri-Careers Support Initiative builds on the first intake that was announced in February and follows an additional \$1.5-million labour intake under the Canadian Agricultural Partnership (CAP) that was announced last October. These initiatives, combined with the \$22 million Agri-Tech Innovation cost-share program launched in April 2021, further enhance the province's agri-food labour support to build a competitive and skilled agri-food workforce.

"As the province's largest manufacturing sector by employment, programs

The Canadian Agricultural Human Resource Council (CAHRC) estimates an agri-food workforce shortfall of 123,000 by 2029 in Canada. Ontario is expected to represent the largest share of the shortfall.

The agri-food sector represents 10.2 per cent of Ontario's labour force. In 2021, one in 10 jobs was related to the agri-food sector.



#### No fences in the Marsh

There are no trees, buffer strips, or fences between fields as the land is too valuable to grow fence posts. This lack of separation reaches past the fields as there is a long history of the farmers working together to solve problems. Whether it's managing pests, because with no barriers between fields infestations can travel far and fast, or promoting the many crops grown, in this area, no fences make good neighbours.

### Agriculture and Agri-food Strategy on track with over 90% of actions under way

- Continuing digital engagement with stakeholders and the public to deliver virtual events and activities, specifically through the COVID-19 pandemic.



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

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### Ontario training more workers for in-demand careers in auto manufacturing

The Ontario government is working sustainable platform for communities for workers by investing \$5 million to underrepresented groups to prepare them for well-paying jobs in the province's thriving automotive manufactur-

The project will provide participants with the necessary skills for rewarding careers in machine operation, assembly, quality control, and logistics. The program will also help address a critical shortage of workers in a vital industry as Ontario positions itself as a North American leader in auto manufacturing.

"Our government is securing game-changing investments in the province's auto sector that will ensure the electric vehicles and batteries of the future are made here in Ontario by Ontario workers," said Premier Doug Ford. "As we do, we're investing in training the next generation of Ontario's automotive workers and connecting hundreds of them with good-paying jobs at local businesses in immediate need of their world class talent and expertise."

Led by the Automotive Parts Manufacturers Association (APMA), training includes three-month paid job placements through APMA's network of more than 300 small and medium-sized businesses. After completing the program, each participant will receive a job offer from a local employer.

"Our auto workers are heroes, and we need more of them to deliver our ambitious plan to build Ontario," said Monte McNaughton, Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development. "This investment will help local manufacturers find the skilled workers they need to grow our economy and connect job seekers with meaningful careers where they can proudly earn bigger paycheques for themselves and their families."

Training is tailored to the needs of each participant and employers can receive up to \$4,600 in wage subsidies for each trainee.

#### **Ontario government** poised to outspend predecessor, increase debt

Despite any word to the contrary, the current Ontario government plans to outspend its predecessor, finds a new study published today by the Fraser Institute, an independent, non-partisan Canadian public policy think-tank.

"When in opposition, the PCs frequently criticized the Liberal government's spending, but now the Ford government plans to actually spend more than the Wynne government ever did," said Ben Eisen, senior fellow at the Fraser Institute and co-author of Ford Government Plans to Outspend Wynne Government.

During its first term in office, the Ford government spent more (on a per-person, inflation-adjusted basis) than the Wynne government.

This fiscal year (2022/23), the Ford government plans to increase per-person program spending by 2.9 per cent to \$11,783, which is \$282 more than the Wynne government spent during its last year in office. (All numbers are based on the latest Ford budget, adjusted for inflation, and exclude COVID-related spending.)

As a result, the Ford government forecasts larger budget deficits than the deficit inherited from the Wynne government, with the province's per-person net debt increasing from \$27,889 in 2021/22 to \$28,930 in 2024/25 - essentially mirroring the Wynne government's pace of debt accumulation.

"For the Ford government to fulfill its promises to restore Ontario's finances, it must make a sharp course correction during its second term in office,"

### Bolton native stresses ongoing need in Ukraine at talk

A Bolton native will explain the pressing need to support the Ukraine in a talk at Forster's Book Garden Aug. 11.

Kevin Leach will discuss Project Volya at the 7 p.m. talk, a collaboration of a group of Canadians to secure and deliver lifesaving medical equipment in Ukraine.

Leach noted allied governments are doing a good job of providing heavy equipment, but small organizations like his are valuable for addressing the needs of individual soldiers on a smaller scale.

As for the end of the conflict, Leach said he believes Ukrainians won't accept anything but total victory (restoration of all territory according to in-

ternationally recognized borders).

"Prior to the full scale invasion, I think many would have been happy to part with the territory Russia held, but after the horrific crimes Russia has committed, Ukrainians want Russia to be punished and a full restoration of territory," he said.

The ordeal has stirred many emotions and Leach noted he feels angry that the Russians pushed things this far. He also feels guilty that he's not doing enough, and also optimistic about "our" victory and what it will mean for Ukraine in the long run.

"I think all of us here are feeling these things in different degrees."

He describes Western aid as "incredible."

One example is military support and the HIMARS artillery. These are capable of pinpoint precision and outrange anything comparable the Russians have.

"Using those our guys have blown up dozens of ammo and supply depots and made it virtually impossible for the Russians to keep up their push into Ukraine. Ukrainian forces were managing a strong defence before, but heavy weapons especially are a game changer.

"Russia has the advantage in numbers, but using superior Western weapons will give Ukraine the edge overall. I think having these better weapons will save a lot of Ukrainian lives in the long run."

The monetary aid and political support have also been a tremendous boon, the first keeps life as normal as possible for Ukrainians outside of the fighting areas, and the second is wonderful for keeping Ukrainian morale high.

"Sadly, the initial invasion in 2014 and the speed with which it exited the

headlines left a lot of Ukrainians feeling like they didn't matter to the rest of the world," he pointed out.

This war has given Leach a clear purpose and he plans to stay in Ukraine, along with his wife.


In his talk, Leach will give people a quick rundown of the situation as it is on the ground, without sensation or propaganda, impress on them the fact that the war is still far from over.

"We need to keep up our support until victory."





Anything you have done, all comes into play in your application. Then you're short-listed. So, amongst myself in athletic therapy, there are a few other athletic therapists, physiotherapists, massage therapists and doctors. It's a small team, that gets picked by the Canadian Olympic Committee."

For the past three Summer Olympics, Prieur, has had the pleasure of being a part of the health care team in Team Canada.

Having been a part of the London Olympics in 2012 and the Commonwealth Games in Scotland in 2014, when asked what her reaction was to being selected, Prieur, was excited to be a part of it once again.

"I was pretty excited. Especially finding out about who the other colleagues who are going. I call them my Games family. I've done games with them, I never see them outside of that. To be able to see some of my colleagues and definitely see the athletes that have grown up in just a year from Tokyo; I was in Tokyo with them last year, there is exciting change we get to see in one year of training," Prieur explained.

Prieur has been working with the basketball team and the diving team during her time in England. The Commonwealth Games, which is hosting 72 nations, wrapped up August 8.

In dealing in both of these sports, Prieur, came into this without any experience in diving. She notices a lot of stress injuries from using the same muscles repetitively. It was a bit of a learning curve for her, but one that was not too difficult to get a handle on.

Commonwealth athletes were responsible for 80 per cent of Canada's medals in the 2020 Olympic Games.

#### Horticulture By John Arnott

Gardening articles will often contain the word "herbaceous." This term from the Latin herba meaning grass-like or green crop usually refers to plants with soft, non-woody stems that die right down to ground level leaving little or nothing to show where they once grew. With most garden perennials this diedown happens in the late fall and most often includes foliage. The underground root, however, stays alive but dormant so to speak until spring when it will begin to start to produce new growth. This said the stems of some perennials such as sedums, goldenrod, wild asters and burdock have enough "woodiness" in their stems to allow them, although they are dead, to stick up all winter.

The stems and foliage of spring bulbs (tulips. daffodils muscari-grape hyacinths and hyacinths) die down leaving little trace by mid-summer so their place should be well marked to prevent accidently digging into them. Virginia bluebells/ mertensia (which every spring graces many old gardens in the Schomberg area) falls into this category as well.

Foliage on perennials, especially bulbs, should not be cut down until it begins to die as while still green it is feeding the plant's roots to ensure the next year's growth.

Hot soil in hanging baskets and ground containers dries out quickly and shrinks away from the inner walls of these plant holders so that when they are casually watered most this vital water runs down the inner walls onto the ground not getting a chance to penetrate the soil around the root. To prevent this press the top inch/2.5 cm or so up against the container's inside walls before watering then water slowly to allow the soil particles to swell and press against the inside of the container all the way down thus most of the water soaks the root ball. If the container is small say 6 to 10 inches/16 to 24 cm across dunk the whole thing into a pail of water[not too cold] and hold so the rim is under water for 30 seconds or until the air bubbles almost stop. These actions should revive the wilting plants.

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### **BUT HE DOES!**

#### All Saints Anglican Church By Patrick Gossage

Jesus sends off his disciples: Luke 33-34: "Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

The chapter continues with warnings to be ready for Christ's coming again.

Sermon by Patrick Gossage on Luke 12:

"This is challenging Gospel - On the one hand it promises us the kingdom then warns us to be prepared for his coming again It suggests Jesus has left but will return and we better be ready.

"In my view, this part really has to do with being ready for the unexpected. Sometimes we are all overcome by the

unexpected. But have we really been watching what is going on and being alert to what is expected of us? Are we prepared for what our faith calls on us to do? As Christians, do we think about our future or that of our community, country and or world enough and do we get ready? I don't think so.

"How seldom we sit with our friends and talk about the difficult polarized, war torn future we know today overhangs everything we are and will be? Instead, as we get older, we tend more to live in the past in our memories. We think little about how we might even influence the future for the better – as the disciples are being called to do.

"The climate crisis falls under the heading of being ready. We continue to degrade God's creation and are paying an awful price for our lack of care in horrific climate events. 'This is a Christian issue. So what is the voice of the Lord saying today?

"Paul in Colossians writes: "By Jesus Christ all things were created In heaven and on earth, visible and invisible ... all things were created through him and for him ... And he is the head of the body, the church."

"So if the head of the Church cares

located in good neighbourhoods are selling at a strong price regardless of when the home is listed.


