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### Crews battle early morning barn fire

King Fire and Emergency Services tackled a structure fire on the 8th Concession Aug. 6. Crews from all three fire houses, and a total of 44 firefighters were on scene fighting this fire, according to Fire Chief Jim Wall. Damage to the nearby residential structure was minimal, however, the barn was a complete loss prior to this fire even being reported by the neighbours. The total damage is estimated at \$500,000. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

### Revamped budget reveals more spending

The reintroduction of the 2022 provincial budget, along with some changes, received mixed reaction last week.

The Province re-introduced the Plan to Build Act (Budget Measures), 2022.

"I am pleased to re-introduce the Plan to Build Act (Budget Measures), 2022 bill (today) so our government can continue delivering Ontario's Plan to Build, supporting better jobs for workers while building more highways, housing and hospitals right across the province," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "With costs rising, our plan also includes measures to help families, including new direct payments to parents to help their kids

catch up and increasing Ontario Disability Support Program payments."

"To help fill gaps in learning for students after two years of pandemic disruptions, the government is also investing \$225 million for direct payments to parents," said Stephen Lecce, MPP for King-Vaughan and Minister of Education. "This is in addition to the previously announced \$175 million tutoring support program, the largest of its kind in Ontario's history."

To help those who qualify for disability support, the government is delivering on its commitment to increase the rates for income support by five per cent beginning in September 2022, for families and persons under the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP).



### Mixed reactions to speech

Beginning in September, the government will increase both the ODSP rate and the Assistance for Children with Severe Disabilities Program maximum monthly amount by five per cent. Future ODSP rates will also be adjusted to inflation.

To help fill gaps in learning for students after two years of pandemic disruptions, the government is also investing \$225 million for direct payments to parents. This is in addition to the previously announced \$175 million tutoring support program, the largest of its kind in Ontario's history. The government will have more details later in the year on how families can access this new support.

"No government in Ontario history has invested more in public education, tutoring supports, and student mental health than our government," said Lecce. "We are going further by providing direct financial support to parents, in addition to the expanded tutoring supports for students, all focused on ensuring kids get back to class with the full school experience."

The additional investment in tutoring supports and increased ODSP rate will be funded from existing contingencies contained in the government's fiscal plan as presented in the 2022 Budget.

Building on the Province's record of transparency and accountability, the government also released the 2022-23 First Quarter Finances today, which provides updated information about the evolution of Ontario's economic and fiscal outlook since the 2022 Budget for the 2022-23 fiscal year. Due to higher-than-projected taxation revenues, the government is projecting a deficit of \$18.8 billion in 2022-23, an improvement of \$1.1 billion from the outlook presented in the 2022 Budget.

"We have a prudent and flexible plan which builds on our record of responsible fiscal management, while making the investments that will reduce commute times, support front-line health care and help create good jobs," said Minister Bethlenfalvy. "In a time of economic uncertainty, our government is supporting Ontario workers and families by putting more money back into their pockets."

The Province's 2022-23 First Quarter Finances is projecting a deficit of \$18.8 billion, an improvement of \$1.1 billion since the outlook published in the 2022 Budget, primarily due to higher projected taxation revenues.

Ontario's real gross domestic product (GDP) continued to grow in a challenging global environment, rising 1.1 per cent in the first calendar quarter of 2022 and exceeding the pre-pandemic level in the fourth quarter of 2019 by 1.3 per cent. Growth in the first quarter was widespread, with gains in household spending, business investment and exports.

The government released the 2022 Budget: Ontario's Plan to Build and first introduced the Plan to Build Act (Budget Measures), 2022 on April 28.

The Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) is disappointed that the budget today does not include

any new investments in public education. In addition, by choosing to redirect funding away from publicly funded schools, the Ford government has chosen a path toward privatization over funding that creates lower class sizes and delivers in-school support for students with special education needs.

"By dismissing educators' input and reintroducing the same education budget they presented in the spring, the Ford government has missed a clear opportunity to provide students and educators with the school-based supports and resources they need to ensure a just post-pandemic recovery," said ETFO President Karen Brown. "This school year won't be an easy one for educators. They will be relied upon to address pandemic learning gaps without the support they need to do so. Making up for lost time and providing students with more one-on-one support requires more funding at the school and board levels, not less.'

Ontario Nurses' Association (ONA) President Cathryn Hoy, RN, added the government's Throne Speech and re-released provincial budget utterly fail to take urgent action to protect access to healthcare for Ontarians, or to include meaningful solutions to restore our health-care system and its devastated health workforce.

"Right across this province, we are seeing the results of this government's failures regarding access to healthcare and what the shortage of nurses and health-care professionals means for our communities: Emergency Departments reducing hours or closing altogether, a long list of ICUs and other hospital units cutting back or closing service, and Ontarians struggling to get the care they need and deserve," Hoy said. "The Throne Speech and this government pretend the crisis is a short-term issue, and says that the actions needed to address the health-care crisis have not yet been determined. The crisis is anything but temporary, and the government must wake up to that fact and listen to the solutions we have been telling them exist.

"The Premier continues to ignore the majority of measures ONA has called for to address the health staffing crisis. ONA is once again calling on this government to come to the table and work with us for the sake of every resident of this province. Ontarians need the government to show the same level of urgency as nurses and health-care professionals did throughout the pandemic and continue to show."

Hoy said funding to build new Ontario hospitals will be wasted without also addressing the need to attract and retain the nurses and health-care professionals needed to staff new beds.

"This government's wage suppression legislation, Bill 124, has sent nurses and health-care professionals out the door," Hoy noted. "Repealing Bill 124 is the first step to giving our nurses and health-care professionals hope and showing them that they are valued. Repeal of this bill will keep more nurses where we need them most – caring for Ontarians. Instead, this government will spend taxpayer money fighting our Charter Challenge against the bill."

### CRA benefits from surplus funds

The Canada Revenue Agency is sitting on a whopping \$1.4 billion in uncashed cheques.

That's a huge amount of money that is yet to be claimed by its rightful owners. As of May 2022, there were an estimated 8.9 million uncashed cheques with the CRA and they "want to make sure this money ends up where it belongs. In taxpayers' pockets!"

That's funny, especially from an agency that is pitbull-like in its tenacity in grabbing taxpayers' money.

Each year, the (CRA) issues millions of payments in the form of refunds and benefits. These payments are issued by either direct deposit or by cheque. Over time, payments can remain uncashed for various reasons, such as the taxpayer misplacing the cheque or even a change of address which did not allow for deliv-

Their plan of attack is to sent out email notifications to potential recipients. Since the CRA launched this initiative in February 2020, approximately two million uncashed cheques valued at \$802 million were redeemed by Canadians be-

Some cheques date as far back as 1998 and government cheques never expire or So, the federal agency has been sitting pretty, on mountains of cash, for decades. While they can't spend the money, can't they set it aside and invest it in some inter-

The proposed development for the lands has come under new single ownership (Fifth Avenue Homes) and contemplates a revision of the previously submitted application for redevelopment of the lands by way of a Draft Plan of Subdivision for residential uses through the creation of a road widening block, municipal reserve block, and a future development block (0.544 hectares) that will accommodate 26 freehold common element condominium townhouse dwelling units. ### developer's dream versus affordability

Interesting to read another article by Wendell Cox, senior fellow at Frontier Center for Public Policy (FCCP) and the Heartland Institute, who also holds positions at other American conservative "think tanks."

He relies completely on his own report, and others available at https:// fcpp.org/2022/07/19/deteriorating-housing-affordability-in-canada/ as background for the article published in the King Weekly Sentinel (KWS) on Aug. 4.

A review of his consultancy website, Demographia, shows a clear focus on incomes and house prices, absent any details about related financing costs in the form of necessary infrastructure, such as roads, highways, water and sewage systems, and all the other services needed to support further expansion of the housing stock.

Cox calls "smart growth" a delusion. His website, The Public Purpose, suggests rail service is wasteful. In 2010, the journal, Republican American, quoted Cox's "jaguar argument" against mass transit projects, which he considered "more expensive than the cost of leasing each new commuter a new economy car in perpetuity. Some projects are more expensive than the cost of leasing a luxury car, such as a Jaguar XJ8 ..."

Later, Chicago News WTTW, quoted from Cox's 2012 Demographia study, "Local Democracy and Townships in the Chicagoland Area," where he wrote:

" ... smaller local governments tend to be more efficient because they are more under the control of their local electorate. Their greater accessibility to taxpayers necessarily dilutes their accessibility to special interests, which seek higher levels of spending. OffiComment

cials in smaller local governments are able to more directly oversee financial performance and public service delivery and are less reliant on professional staff that is not directly accountable to the voters."

That's not reflective of Ontario.

Still, Doug Ford, who wants to re-invent Toronto and Ottawa à la Chicago's "strong mayor" system, really needs to read this report!

However, Cox proceeds to argue against himself when it comes to Greenbelts, which he views as an unnecessary urban boundary and impediment to growth in housing stock. More houses mean more people who require more services, leading to larger governments, further restructuring and higher costs. Plus, more meddling and influence from developers (of which there is already more than enough in Ontario).

Reading Cox's article reminded me of KWS's front page of July 28, showing a ground-breaking ceremony for King Terraces, a new condo development, described as the "cornerstone" of King City. Mayor Pellegrini said "this project sets the bar very high for the standards of community development."

So, what are those community standards? Answer is on Page 1, third paragraph: "It will be sought after by home-owners seeking luxury condo living." So, luxury is the new community standard for King?

Then, I wondered how luxury translates into affordability? Surely, the answer must lie in the report of Ontario's Housing Affordability Task Force. After digesting some pages of introductory recommendations, including "depoliticizing the process and cutting red tape", I found the answer to affordability on Page 8:

"Affordable housing (units provided at below-market rates with government support) was not part of our mandate."

This statement was even underlined. This is what happens when Premier Ford appoints bankers, developers and house builders to prepare a report about affordability. Still, there were some useful recommendations regarding conversion of vacant commercial properties to residential uses, favourable tax considerations for purpose-built rentals (but no mention of rent control), plus reduction, or elimination of, parking requirements near transit.

The report expressed concern for the Greater Toronto Area, wedged between Lake Ontario and the Greenbelt, which should have been viewed positively in terms of food security, but alas, was not. According to the report, the answer to providing more housing (forget affordable) lies in "gentle density," which means repealing municipal policies, imposing further limits on public consultations, and reducing development charges for starters.

How does gentle density jibe with current indistinguishable sprawling developments, courtesy of official plan amendments, inspired by developers and imposed by past OMB and LPAT Boards, now being repeated at OLT hearings? And what about relief from development charges? Who will pay to build, expand and maintain all the required new infrastructure to serve population growth? They're looking at you, taxpayers; yet, the Premier and his Task Force believe public consultations are an unnecessary encumbrance.

Back to the issue of affordability.

When housing prices slide, developers withhold housing supply until prices rise because their main focus is profit-taking.

We already have the sad example of affordable housing used as a promise to drive one MZO in Vaughan where the Council approved the application from Bracor Ltd. and Crinklewood Development Inc., because 10% affordable housing was included in the original plan. Then, it vanished.

When Councillor Marilyn Iafrate investigated, she learned Minister of Housing, Steve Clark, approved the MZO minus affordable housing because "the traditional authority for MZOs does not address inclusionary zoning or affordable housing."

The Toronto skyline has sprouted

vour papers in.

many condo towers over the past decade or so.

As of April 2022, 40% were investor-owned, while according to Stats-Can (Canadian Housing Statistics Program), nearly 31% of all homes in Ontario were investor-owned. Canadian home owners are competing with domestic, international and institutional investors when it comes to purchasing this "commodity."

According to Brian Doucet, Canada Research Chair in Urban Change and Social Inclusion at the University of Waterloo, reducing demand from speculators is key to controlling affordability. He explained, "Speculators both increase demand for housing and shape the supply that gets built."

Consider this quote from former Liberal MP, Adam Vaughan, during an interview with TVO's Steve Paikin on 8 April 2021: "We're in this very strange market. We're in a safe market for foreign investment, but we're not in a great market for Canadians looking for choices around housing," later adding, "So, we've got to make a number of decisions that address the two sides of this coin. It's not a binary sort of dynamic of just supply and demand. There are also some other monetary components to it that have to be examined and understood."

Mr. Doucet noted that, between 2006 and 2016, the number of Ontario households (where the average Ontario household included 2.58 people) rose by 614, 615, but during that same period, there were 689,625 NEW occupied build-

Doucet observed "new housing supply meets or even exceeds population growth, especially in the biggest cities and hottest property markets" where some of the biggest price increases were recorded during the last quarter of 2021, at which point, "18 homes were completed for every new person."

Barely a year later, because house prices are declining in many parts of Ontario, developers and builders are postponing projects. Speculators might wait out the market, while the change presents some welcomed opportunities for people who are searching for a home for their families.

Back to Wendell Cox and his observation that smart growth is a delusion. What he might really mean is it has never been given a chance to happen yet; at least, not in Ontario, nor other parts of Canada.

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



### 'Project Monarch' seizes guns and drugs; break up ring

Investigators with the York Regional Police Organized Crime and Intelligence Services – Guns, Gangs, and Drug Enforcement Unit, and their joint-forces operation partners, have made 22 arrests and dismantled a large-scale gun and drug trafficking network that extended across Ontario and into the United States.

In October 2021, police began investigating an individual whom they believed was trafficking controlled substances. As the investigation progressed, a number of suspects based out of Brampton and London were identified as being involved in the distribution of cocaine, fentanyl, and firearms. A joint-forces operation (JFO) dubbed Project Monarch was formed to investigate and target those identified in the trafficking of controlled substances and firearms.

The JFO included investigators from York Regional Police, OPP Organized Crime Enforcement Bureau and Provincial Weapons Enforcement Unit, Peel Regional Police, the London Police Service, Homeland Security Investigations, the Canada Border Services Agency and was supported by Criminal Intelligence Service Ontario.

As the operation evolved, investi-

gators identified suspects who are accused of illicitly importing firearms from the United States into Canada. Investigators believe that some of the illegal firearms were brought through Walpole Island First Nation on the border of Ontario and Port Huron, Michigan.

Project Monarch concluded July 28. Search warrants were executed at 22 residences, two businesses and 19 vehicles located in Brampton, Toronto and London. The 10-month investigation resulted in 22 persons arrested and more than 400 charges laid. Investigators seized 27 handguns, 17 prohibited magazines, 300+ rounds of ammunition, nine kilograms of cocaine, 1.5 kilograms of fentanyl, 20,146 Xanax pills, 28 grams of heroin and 41.5 pounds of cannabis. Total street value of the seized drugs is more than \$1.3 million.

Investigators also seized \$155,242 in Canadian currency and \$9,000 in United States currency, as well as five vehicles as proceeds of crime.

### Emergency/grandparent scams on the rise in York

Investigators with the York Regional Police Financial Crimes Unit are warning the community of an increase in fraud schemes targeting elderly and vulnerable citizens.

York Regional Police have seen an increase in reports from citizens across the region who have reported being a victim of a scam known as the grandparent scam or emergency scam. Since August 4, 2022, 13 incidents have been reported and more than \$50,000 has been lost. Many of these reports have come from residents living in the Towns of Newmarket and Aurora.

These types of scams have risen dramatically in 2022, compared to 2021. Since 2019, the total reported loss for victims in this type of scam is just under \$1 million. Investigators believe there may be more victims in our region that have not yet reported to police.

Emergency scams are often called grandparent scams because fraudsters will prey on a grandparent's bond with their grandchild in an effort to defraud them. Often, criminals will place a telephone call to an elderly person while posing as their grandchild in distress, demanding money to get them out of trouble. In some cases, a second suspect will play the role of a government official, a police officer or a lawyer who then provides instructions on how the victim can deliver the money. These type of frauds may be repeated over the course of days, weeks or even months, as the criminals gain the trust of their victims.

A list of ongoing scams, including grandparent scams, and tips to avoid becoming a victim of fraud, are available at yrp.ca/fraud.

#### **Crime Prevention Tips**

- Never offer personal or financial information to the caller.
- Call the grandchild or family member in question, at a phone number you recognize as their own.
- Ask the caller personal questions that only your grandchild could answer but an imposter could not.
- Verify the story or information with family first.
- Never send money to someone you don't know.

YRP encourages citizens to share fraud prevention tips with friends and family, especially seniors or newcomers to Canada, who are frequently the targeted victims.





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### York and the ONA ratify new, three-year agreement

The Regional Municipality of York is pleased to announce the ratification of a renewal collective agreement with the Ontario Nurses' Association

"The COVID-19 pandemic has reminded us of the critical role nurses provide in our communities," said York Region Chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "On behalf of York Regional Council and more than 1.2 million residents who call York Region home, this agreement strikes the right balance between our unionized employees, the corporation and our taxpayers.'

Details of the renewal agreement include a total wage increase of 6% over the three-year term of the con-

\* 2% wage increase, retroactive to April 1, 2022.

\* 2% wage increase, effective April 1, 2023.

The agreement also includes additional increases to support employee health and well-being and improvements to enhance service delivery.

ONA membership voted to ratify the renewal collective agreement on Monday, June 13, 2022. Regional Council ratified this agreement at its Council meeting on Thursday, June 30, 2022.

"The past two-plus years have been challenging for all of us, but we are cautiously optimistic the worst is now behind us," said York Region Chief Administrative Officer Bruce Macgregor. "As we look to post-pandemic re-\* 2% wage increase, retroactive to covery, we are starting to resume the

important public health programs and services that were paused during our response to COVID-19."

The contract for ONA, which represents 393 staff, expired on March 31, 2021. The agreement follows a series of negotiations between the two parties over the past several months. This new agreement will expire on March 31, 2024.

At York Region, services provided by ONA are represented by public health nurses, registered nurses and clinical nurse specialists.

York Region's unionized employees are also represented by CUPE Local 905 (York Region Unit) and CUPE 905 Long-Term Care Unit (LTC). A fiveyear agreement with CUPE Local 905 (York Region Unit) was also announced recently. Bargaining with CUPE Local 905 LTC, representing 543 staff at the Newmarket Health Centre and Maple Health Centre long-term care homes, is expected to begin shortly.

Approximately 80% of York Region's total staff complement is represented by one of these three unions.





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### King Creek holds a special place in local history

King Township is home to many villages and historic settlements. That's part of its charm.

Many of the smaller, lesser known hamlets have faded away, but their history runs deep.

One such area is known as King Creek, which was once located off of Mill Road, south of King Road, east of Nobleton. It's flanked by the historic trade route, Toronto Carrying Place, and the current site of the Humber Trails Conservation Area.

Current area landowners, Vito and Marianne Pacifico, embrace the rich background and are disappointed the name and identify has vanished.

"We feel the rich history and heritage of this area should be maintained as King Creek," they said.

King Creek was a real community and much more than the local name of the east branch of the Humber River.

The 120 acres of the west part of Con-

Realty Co. Ltd. in April 1935. Through here flowed the meandering East Humber River. In July 1937, part of this property was surveyed into town lots in seven distinct geographic blocks labelled A to G and registered as Plan 280 with the Township of King.

In 1929, the Bertram Realty Co. Ltd. had already developed 73 town lots in Albion Township, Peel County into the community of Humber Grove.

The King Township development, called Humber Trails, included four roads; Humber Trail, Forest Trail, Bridle Trail and Elmpine Trail. From June 1938 until about May 1954, the Bertram Realty Co. Ltd. sold over 50 town lots. Over the course of these 16 years, many of the buyers quickly erected residenc-

October 1954's Hurricane Hazel caused severe flooding of the Humber River. In mid-1955, this led the Township of King to purchase the remaining Bertram Realty Co. Ltd. property and under its December 1955 By-Law 1037 "to expropriate lands to prevent damage by

sold by Edwin J. Kaake to the Bertram floods," it began the multi-year process acres in King (Lot 4, Concession 7) and to acquire most of those private properties that made up the community of Humber Trails. Only the properties on Elmpine Trail remained.

> In April 1957, the township sold these expropriated properties to the then Metro Toronto and Region Conservation Authority for a nominal fee. All the buildings on these properties were subsequently demolished and the area was developed into the Humber Trails Conservation Area, today a nature reserve, the Humber Trails Forest and Wildlife Area.

> Thus, the community of Humber Trails, adjacent to the one-time community of King Creek on Mill Road, ceased to be after a scant existence of 17 years.

> The federal government had a post office there from 1866 until 1913 when the mail delivery went to a rural system.

> The current entrance to the TRCA Humber Trail Conservation Area leads into a network of former roads and driveways of the former homes and farms that made up part of the community of King Creek.

> Walking the area today one has little sense of what once was.

The name appears on the 1861 map for York County and the map of King Township from the Historical Atlas, 1878.

Christopher Stokes appears to be the driving force in the beginnings of this hamlet. He arrived from England in 1800 and lived in Machell's Corners (Aurora). In 1834 he purchased 200

later built a grist mill on the property.

He is buried in the All Saints cemetery in King City.

Around that time there had been a general store, known as McMillan's Store, at the corner of Lot 6, north of King Sideroad. The store later relocated closer to the mill.

This busy little centre, first known as Stoke's Hollow, became King Creek and held a special place in King's history.

King Creek expanded and by 1854 a hotel, shoe shop and flour mill met residents' needs. King Creek post office opened in 1866 inside the store and Alex McMillan was the first postmaster.


Three sawmills near King Creek got power from the Humber River. The mills became obsolete when electric power was introduced at the turn of the century.

The last known gathering at King Creek was May 21, 1913. A diary entry from Andrew McClure reads:

"A gala picnic was held at the King Creek old pond. About seventy people attended. A good time. Races, baseball, quoits, fishing, tug-of-war. Ice cream, cigars and bananas."

### **Expansion of Incentives for Zero-Emission Vehicles Program**

Clean air, good jobs, and lower bills -Canadians have been clear about what they want.

The Government of Canada is continuing to deliver on those priorities. On Earth Day, the Minister of Transport, the Honourable Omar Alghabra, announced additional details of key measures that will help Canadians make the switch to a zero-emission vehicle that cuts pollution and lowers everyday expenses.

The Incentives for Zero-Emission Vehicles Program has already helped Canadians purchase or lease over 141,000 new zero-emission vehicles since 2019. The program will be expanded to include the purchase of additional vehicle models popular with Canadians, such as minivans, light-duty pickup trucks, and SUVs.

To be eligible:

A car must have a base model Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price that is less than \$55,000. Higher priced versions of these vehicles, up to a maximum Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price of \$65,000, are also eligible.

Larger zero-emission vehicles (e.g., sports utility vehicles, minivans and pick-up trucks) must have a base model Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price under \$60,000. Higher priced versions of these vehicles, up to a maximum of \$70,000, are also eligible.

To accelerate the manufacturing and adoption of cleaner cars, the Government of Canada will also put in place a sales mandate so at least 20 per cent of new passenger vehicles sold in Canada **Special Series:**

and at least 60 per cent by 2030, on the road to 100 per cent by 2035.

In addition, the Government of Canada will launch a strategy to reduce pollution from medium- and heavy-duty vehicles with the aim of having these vehicles make up 35% of total sales of zero-emission vehicles by 2030. This will include developing medium- and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicles regulations to require 100% medium- and heavy-duty sales to be zero-emission vehicles by 2040 for certain types of medium- and heavy-duty vehicles.

"Helping Canadians make the switch to a zero-emission vehicle is win-winwin: it keeps our air clean, helps people save money on fuel, all while positioning Canada as a leader on building and powering these cars. Today's announcement is about making sure Canadians have the options they need - whether you want to make your next family car, or your ride to work, a zero-emission vehicle," said Omar Alghabra, Minister of Transport.

"Our government understands that as Canadians transition to zero-emission vehicles, it will play an instrumental role in ensuring a cleaner and greener future. That's why we are working to build a sustainable automotive ecosystem with clean energy, green steel, green aluminum and green batteries. And with today's announcement, we will be zero-emission vehicles by 2026, are making sure that Canadians can

be a part of this transition by ensuring more affordable vehicles," added François-Philippe Champagne, Minister of Innovation, Science and Industry.

"The popular Incentives for Zero-Emission Vehicles Program is key to helping Canadians make the switch to cleaner cars. Switching to an electric vehicle is one of the most impactful things Canadians can do to help fight climate change. Our government will continue supporting the full supply chain of electric vehicles in Canada so that we can reduce our dependence on fossil fuels," noted Steven Guilbeault, Minister of Environment and Climate Change.

Budget 2022 proposes to invest \$1.7 billion to continue the Incentives for Zero-Emission Vehicles Program until March 2025, including a broadening of the eligibility under the program. Today's announcement provides details on eligibility for those investments.

Budget 2022 also proposes to:

Provide \$547.5 million over four

years, starting in 2022-23, to launch a new purchase incentive program for medium- and heavy-duty zero-emission

Provide close to \$34 million over five years, starting in 2022-23, to work with provinces and territories to develop and harmonize regulations and to conduct safety testing for long-haul zero-emission trucks.

Build a national network of electric vehicle charging stations by supporting charging infrastructure in communities of all sizes through \$500 million in changing infrastructure investments by the Canada Infrastructure Bank as well as \$400 million for the Zero Emission Vehicles Infrastructure Program, toward the government's goal of adding 50,000 charging stations across the country.

In 2021, new zero-emission passenger vehicle sales reached 5.6 per cent market share according to IHS Markit, up from 3.8 per cent in 2020 and 3.1 per cent in 2019.



### **VW reveals ID Aero**

Volkswagen has revealed its all-new ID. Aero concept all electric sedan.

The presentation was held online in China, where the production version will be launched in the second half of 2023, separately by two joint ventures FAW-Volkswagen and SAIC Volkswagen. The car will also be introduced in Europe and in North America, becoming Volkswagen's global EV flagship model.

The ID. Aero concept is very aerodynamically efficient. It's roughly 16 feet long, with a wide body and coupe-style rear three-quarter design for a dynamic look.

It's estimated to travel up to 385 miles (620 km), based on the European WLTP test cycle.

The model also boasts illuminated touch surfaces instead of conventional door handles, 22-inch bi-color wheels and front and rear LED light bars.

Budget 2022 establishes the Canada Growth Fund to attract substantial private sector investment to help meet important national economic policy goals:

- To reduce emissions and contribute to achieving Canada's climate goals.
- To diversify our economy and bolster our exports by investing in the growth of low-carbon industries and new technologies across new and traditional sectors of
- To support the restructuring of critical supply chains in areas important to Canada's future prosperity, including our natural resources sector.

On-road transportation accounts for 20 per cent of Canada's greenhouse gas emissions. Budget 2022 presents a number of measures to reduce emissions from transportation by making zero-emission vehicles more affordable for Canadians and Canadian businesses.



IUCN, keeper of the global endangered species list, added some species of monarch butterfly to their Red

The butterfly is common across Ontario and Canada. Also, it can often be seen right here in King Township.

Established in 1964, the International Union for Conservation of Nature's Red List of Threatened Species has evolved to become the world's most comprehensive information source on the global extinction risk status of animal, fungus and plant species.

The IUCN Red List is a critical indicator of the health of the world's biodiversity. Far more than a list of species and their status, it is a powerful tool to inform and catalyzes action for biodiversity conservation and policy change, critical to protecting the natural resources we need to survive. It provides information about range, population size, habitat and ecology, use and/or trade, threats, and conservation actions that will help inform necessary conservation decisions.

The IUCN Red List is used by government agencies, wildlife departments, conservation-related non-governmental organizations (NGOs), natural resource planners, educational organizations, students, and the business community. The Red List process has become a massive enterprise involving the IUCN Global Species Program staff, partner organizations and experts in the IUCN Species Survival Commission and partner networks who compile the species information to make The IUCN Red List the indispensable product it is

As well as assessing newly recognized species, the IUCN Red List also re-assesses the status of some existing species, sometimes with positive stories to tell.

as the downlisting (i.e. improvement) of a number of species on the IUCN Red List categories scale, due to conservation efforts. The bad news, however, is that biodiversity is declining.

Currently, there are more than birds.

For example, there's good news such 147,500 species on The IUCN Red List, with more than 41,000 species threatened with extinction, including 41% of amphibians, 38% of sharks and rays, 34% of conifers, 33% of reef building corals, 27% of mammals and 13% of

### Grocery gift cards on the way to the York Food Bank

The Food Bank of York Region's (FBYR) network of community partners, and covid home delivery program recipients will be receiving grocery gift cards over the next coming weeks to help offset and alleviate the cost of food. The gift cards will be distributed in addition to their regular food delivery and support that is normally received from the FBYR.

The \$75,000 grant funding comes from the 2022 Emergency Food Security Fund, which was created by the Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food (AAFC) and distributed by Food Banks Canada (FBC). The FBYR applied for funding support to this grant in hopes to help more families, seniors, children, and individuals access more healthy, nutritious foods.

"Relief and gratitude will probably be what our clients will be experiencing once the grocery cards are delivered. The cost of food has risen significantly, were living in a housing crisis, and inflation is at an all time high. A lot of our recipients are struggling to make ends meet," explains Alex Bilotta, CEO and founder of the Food Bank of York Region. "Our hope is that the addition of these grocery gift cards can help fill the gaps in the food they're receiving, allowing our clients to ensure they have everything they need for themselves and their families to survive, until their next visit or delivery."

In 2021 the FBYR delivered over \$7.24 million worth of food, or 2.79 million meals through their network of community partners across York Region. Of the 22,793 unique individuals they served, 30% were children and 10% were seniors. The FBYR's home delivery program made over 40,000 deliveries and distributed 1.3 million meals alone. A couple of weeks ago we might have given up at that point, but these guys battled and fought and it was great to back into the game initially and to grab a winner late, it's something this group needed," said York United head coach, Martin Nash after the victory.

After Nash's take on the victory, Wilson came to the stand to share his thoughts on the win.

"Two months ago, that would have been a game that we tied or lost. So, we just have to take the good with the bad. So, today, you don't want to concede two goals but we still scored more than the other team so we got to give credit to the boys for that," Wilson said, in the post-match press conference.

"I think being in the middle and being an older player on the team, when I find myself doing other things that I shouldn't be doing im upset an I'm the hardest person on myself. Coming into the second half, we knew we were up one-nil and we knew we had to take it to them. We knew we didn't have a lot of energy. Myself included, I took my foot off the gas a bit. Caledon's Paintbrush takes its place in the top 10 of best golf courses in Canada, according to SCOREGolf.

SCOREGolf released its exclusive rankings of Canada's Top 100 golf facilities. The No. 1 course in Canada is Cabot Cliffs in Inverness, Nova Scotia, which has been rated the top course since it opened in 2015.

The Devil's Paintbrush joins other Ontario courses – Hamilton Golf and Country Club, and Toronto Golf Club – in the top 10.

The Paintbrush boasts 18 holes, par 71, 6,780 yards, with a rating of 71.8. The Devil's Paintbrush is where Michael Hurdzan and Dana Fry paid homage to the links of Scotland with a course largely void of trees and marked by pot bunkers, blind shots, double-greens, tall fescue and charming accents like stone walls and ruins. The Paintbrush is "pure adventure from start to finish."

Since it opened in 1992, Devil's Paintbrush has quietly won respect and admiration for its refreshing character as a links-style course that wouldn't appear out of place alongside The Old Course at Ballybunion in Ireland. Links-style golf requires exciting terrain and Devil's Paintbrush has it all - "outrageous topography, lovely sweeps of land and magnificent scenic vistas."

Ontario leads the country in the number of best courses, with nearly 50 per cent of the Top 100 located in the province. British Columbia and Alberta lead the remaining provinces in top courses.

The current panel of more than 100 volunteer course raters judge the courses on several categories, including beauty, design, par-3 holes, par-4 holes, par-5 holes, conditioning and fun factor.

#### St. Alban's By John Arnott Harvest Part 1

It's Awst (August) and already time to harvest the winter wheat sown the

previous Samonios (autumn – mid-October to mid-November) thought young Brenn, the young Celtic farmer, as he hurried down the dirt track towards home. Now was the time to offer prayers to Lugh, the son of the sun god, to grant good weather long enough for the first harvest of the year to be brought in and safely stored in barns. Once this was done farm families could relax for a couple of days to celebrate Lughnasadh an early thanksgiving,

Originating in central Europe the Celts spread into much of western Europe including Britain and Ireland displacing the people, mainly hunter gatherers living there. These ancient Celts saw Lughnasadh, as the time the sun god poured much of his being in to Lugh, his son, sending him then to Earth where he in turn poured himself into the grain and died when it was har-


Some of the grain was used as bread and eaten allowing life to go on and the seed of some was planted to grow again producing more corn (in the old country corn is a synonym for all grain including wheat). Thus to the Celtic mind Lugh was the self sacrificing harvest god who dies for his people so they can live then is resurrected to continue the circle of life, death and resurrection.

A good harvest of winter wheat was vital as the stores of grain from the previous year would be almost gone. As ever there was always the chance of a poor crop or a good crop ruined by heavy ,hail or gales which would spell hardship even starvation for farming communities and their new neighbours in burgeoning urban centres. No wonder in those early times when a successful harvest was safely in barns rejoicing and giving thanks was widespread in the Celtic world.

The St. Alban's Anglican community in Nobleton notes flour milled from gluten rich winter wheat is called hard and mostly used for making yeast breads while flour milled from spring sown wheat which is harvested in late summer or early fall is known as soft is best for cakes and pastries.

In Celtic Britain and Ireland first winter wheat flour milled was often baked into the shapes of owls, the sun, wheat sheaves or the corn offered to the gods. Once blessed by a Druid priest these shapes called "quarter bread" were broken in four parts and placed in each corner of barns to protect the corn (grain) stored in them.

Aileen Van Ginkel, a lay anointer from our parish, gave a sermon last Sunday from Luke 12:49-56 where Christ warns of divisions between those who follow him and those who don't and tells us to read the signs of what is happening in the present time.

She said, "The second part of the reading got my attention: In my Bible, the heading for the passage in my Bible is, Interpreting the Time - we could also call it Discerning the Time, which relates to the work I've been doing with Christian organizations developing communal discernment practices. The word 'discernment' is a process of examining a particular reality and sorting out truth from untruth or healthy vs. unhealthy ways of doing things. We are engaged in discernment every time we make a decision, every time we choose one thing over another. Communal discernment is simply undertaking discernment with other people who

share your desire for greater understanding and wisdom prior to making a group decision or setting directions for the future.

"If I were to ask, 'What are each of you hearing from God as you've contemplated future actions?,' some might say, 'I don't get clear messages for my life from God. No such voice in my head ...' I try to put hearing God's voice into being mindful of something meaningful in our lives, which can set direction for us. Sometimes we gain such awareness or we come to a clear realization of an important truth on our own; it just comes to us out of the blue. Such moments of clarity reflect God's intention for us. When we experience such moments, might we not be hearing God's voice? I love being reminded by Jesus in John's Gospel, chapter 10, that 'my sheep know my voice' - I think we all know that voice better than we might

"If you're like me, you'll want to test your awareness with others, ask them if they've thought or experienced something similar or simply get their views. That's really what communal discernment practices are all about: exploring with others what it is we are beginning to understand together about a situation we're all engaged in.

"In the second part of our gospel reading today, Jesus says, 'When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, "It is going to rain;" and so it happens. And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, 'There will be scorching heat;' and it happens. You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?'

"Clearly there are signs we need to pay attention to that will help us discern our way through times that are complex, directionless and produce anxiety. We live in such times now. Who knows how to navigate these complex times? And who doesn't get anxious every time they expose themselves to the news? Coming together to share our individual sense of God's presence in our lives can help us gain clarity and assurance that God will be with us always. When we are confused and muddled, let's reach out to one another, seek to listen to the voice of Jesus together, and remind one another of his words of comfort at the very end of Matthew's gospel: 'Remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

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



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


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
