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Large barn was destroyed

Firefighters from all of King's stations responded to a large barn fire just outside King City Sunday, Oct. 2. The structure was a fully involved barn fire approximately 5,000 square feet in size. 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King approves long-awaited rural bylaw

Setting the direction for King's rural countryside is now cast in stone.

Council approved its long-awaited Zoning Bylaw for the Countryside Area, updating its current 48-year-old document.

Covering 80% of the King's geographic area, the bylaw not only conforms to the OP, regional and provincial policies, it recognizes the importance of our agricultural and environmental lands.

Stephen Naylor, King's director of growth management services, noted it's the culmination of two years of in-depth work by staff and consultants from WSP.

"It's a bylaw we are all proud of," he said, adding these guiding principles are a result of a comprehensive consultation process that includes six open houses, workshops and literally thousands of website visits and downloads.

New employment, commercial and institutional zones will be in place. The bylaw also broadens permission within the agricultural zone and introduces new on-farm diversified uses.

WSP consultant Robert Rappolt noted the bylaw concentrates on hamlets, rural areas and agricultural areas of King and not the three main urban villages.

Some key changes in the bylaw include "exception zones," new hamlet residential zones and expansion of non-agricultural uses.

Other changes to the document include revised permitted uses within the GNH and HC zones; the establishment of a Rural Employment Greenbelt (RMG) zone to permit uses that were legally established prior to December 16, 2004, (or in accordance with the transition policies of the Greenbelt Act).

The process, he said, garnered significant interest and participation from stakeholders.

AND TAKE NOTICE that any person or agency may appeal to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT) in respect of the by-law by filing with the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of King not later than the **26th day of October, 2022** a notice of appeal setting out the objection to the by-law and the reasons in support of the objection, together with a filing fee, in the amount as specified on the OLT website (www.olt.gov.on.ca), along with one (1) cheque for \$536.00 per appeal, payable to the Township of King, representing the Clerk's and Planning Divisions combined 2022 Administrative processing fee. Should this date fall on a holiday or weekend, you will have until 4:30 p.m. of the next business day to file your appeal. If you wish to appeal to the OLT, a copy of an appeal form is available from the OLT website at (www.olt.gov.on.ca). Please note the Tribunal will only accept filing fee payments by **certified cheque or money order**.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the OLT. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council or, in the opinion of the OLT, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

By-law Number 2022-053, being a new Zoning By-law for the Countryside (the "Rural Zoning By-law"), affects all lands within the defined area of the By-law, which includes all lands in the Township with the exception of the lands within the urban areas of King City, Nobleton and Schomberg as identified in the legend for the key map below. (Note: A larger map is available for viewing under this posted notice on the Township of King website at www.king.ca/publicnotices)

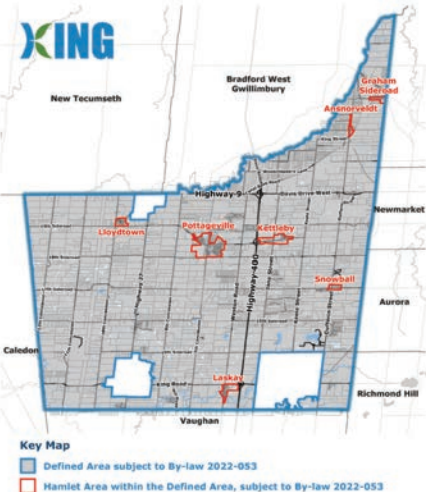
The new Rural Zoning By-law for the Countryside repeals and replaces Comprehensive Zoning By-law 74-53, as amended, for the lands within the defined area. The new By-law is the result of the Rural Area Zoning By-law Review to; revise and update zoning standards; introduce broadened permissions for agricultural uses, including agriculture-related and on-farm diversified uses to strengthen the rural economy; and to ensure the protection of environmental lands, particularly within the Greenbelt Plan and Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan (ORMCP) Areas. The new By-law conforms to and implements Township, Regional and Provincial policies, including the Township's new "Our King" Official Plan.

Public consultation was included in each phase of the process, including six (6) public open houses, two (2) zoning workshops, three (3) technical agency meetings, four (4) presentations to Council including the statutory public meeting on December 6, 2021, one (1) orientation video on the SpeakKING public consultation page, and over twenty-five (25) individual stakeholder meetings.

Comments received from the public meeting in December 2021, and all other comments received in advance of June 2022 were summarized in a comment response matrix which was published on the SpeakKING project page dated June 16, 2022. Comments received between June 2022 and September 9, 2022, were summarized in a comment response matrix that was published on the SpeakKING project page on September 19, 2022. Both comment response matrices were appended to Report GMS-PL-2022-20 which is available on the Township's website www.king.ca. The input received from stakeholders, external agencies and members of the public was valuable in providing a local context, and to ensure that the needs of the community are addressed. The input and feedback helped shape the new Rural Zoning By-law for the Countryside, particularly as it relates to agricultural areas and the hamlets.

Some question limit on ground solar generation

The Township's Official Plan includes Countryside Site Specific Policy Area 2 (CSPA-2) which recognizes that the Highway 11 Corridor Area, while forming part of the Greenbelt Plan's Protected Countryside, includes historically established commercial and other uses. C-SSPA-2 provides direction to conduct a future lands use study for this corridor to provide further guidance on land use, development and potential expansions of existing uses.

Funds to undertake the Highway 11 Corridor study have been approved in the Planning Division's Capital Budget and is scheduled to commence in 2023.

The provisions for home industries have also been revised, and tied in with those of on-farm diversified uses to aid in clarity. Where a home industry comprises part of an on-farm diversified use, or is the on-farm diversified use, the maximum gross floor area for the home industry use shall be 100 square metres. This will generally be lower than the maximum permitted gross floor area for any other form of on-farm diversified use as home industries have a greater potential of creating negative impacts to neighboring properties, are generally more industrial in nature, and smaller scale uses are more appropriate in an agricultural context.

Finally, provisions related to accessory uses have also been updated in the final draft, specifically in relation to shipping containers, and open storage.

Some members of the public and local property owners addressed site-specific concerns and some other areas contained on the new bylaw.

Angelo Santorelli, president of the King Chamber of Commerce, said some members are concerned that bylaw changes will negatively impact their current operations. Some don't conform to the new rules and staff said most will likely be non-conforming but permitted uses, although in some cases provisions will have to be made.

Jay Willmot addressed the caps used for electricity generated from ground-mounted solar, noting it could hinder local sustainability.

The new bylaw calls for a maximum generation of 10-kilowatts on prime agricultural land, but Willmot argued the thinking is out of date with current

needs and trends.

He pointed out that the advent of semitransparent bi-facial solar PV modules has added considerable new opportunity for "Agri-voltaic" mixed land use planning. These transparent solar modules create semi-shaded areas that remain available for crop cultivation underneath the racking and modules.

He said provincial Renewable Energy Approval requirements already place a significant burden on farmers looking to build ground-mounted solar PV facilities, which already include considerable municipal and public consultation. So requiring either a minor variance or bylaw amendment will add to this burden and also tie up the Township's resources.

"It is unlikely that the minor variance will be widely available to farmers looking to install solar PV facilities as in order to justify going through the REA process it is not feasible to build ground-mounted solar PV facilities that are only minor adjusted increases from 10kW installed. Rather, farmers are already faced with the need to build considerably larger systems to justify going through the REA, which means that in all likelihood, all applications to the Township in this regard will be for a more onerous bylaw amendment."

He further stressed this runs contrary to the OP intent to support diversified on-farm uses.

Bruce Craig, on behalf of Concerned Citizens of King Township (CCKT), said they support any efforts which help address climate change and offer solutions. He also didn't see a need for a 10-kW cap, since solar is becoming more feasible and popular these days.

CCKT supports the expansion of specific on-farm diversified uses and agricultural uses, including agri-tourism, which are designed to maintain the primary agricultural use while enhancing economic and employment opportunities.

Based on the information shared by Willmot, CCKT would support a review of the 10-kW cap. In the future review of the Zoning By-law CCKT would like to see roof-mounted solar arrays and small to medium scaled wind generators considered and explored further as permitted uses in suitable zones within the agricultural and rural areas.

Roof-mounted solar arrays are already in place presently within the Countryside area of King Township.

Regarding hamlets, CCKT supports the approach taken to recognize the existing lot fabric of the different Township hamlets by including five different residential zones with related setbacks and other bylaw requirements. This respects and helps to sustain the unique character of each hamlet.

CCKT supports a future process for the identification of suitable zones for short-term accommodation. There have been thoughtful requirements given to bed and breakfast establishments and to additional residential units in the Zoning Bylaw.

"Are there future opportunities to expand provisions for additional residential units in suitable identified zones within the hamlets and rural area in order to contribute to the Township's supply of diversified housing?" Craig asked.

CCKT is pleased and encouraged to note the change to Exception 243 where "long term care home" has been removed as a permitted use from this exception zone.

"In our view this brings the Marylake property into compliance with the vision and intent of the policies of the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan."

CCKT commends King Township Planning Staff and the planning consultant in carrying out a robust process in the Rural Zoning Bylaw Review and for effectively updating this important document to align with the new King Township Official Plan, the Regional Official Plan and provincial policies. This process has included extensive

public consultation and careful consideration of current directions in rural and environmental planning.

Staff said the 10-kW cap was following provincial policy. Any proposals above 10-kW require provincial review and approval, so the bylaw is merely following suit.

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said she didn't want to make it difficult for landowners to make investments in things like solar. She said it was odd to put a cap on it.

Councillor Bill Cober also questioned the need for the cap in the bylaw, when provincial policy dictates a review anyway. He said it could be "handcuffing" the Township.

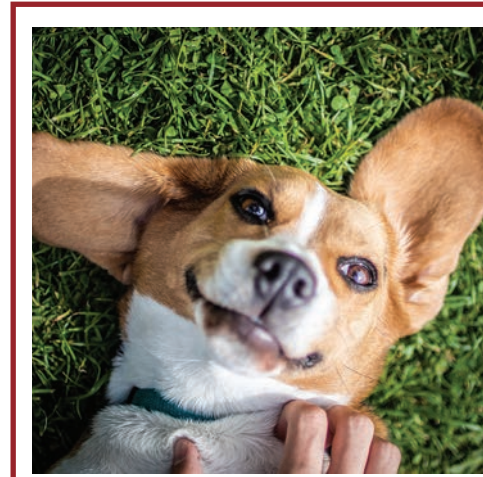
Mayor Steve Pellegrini stressed overall, the bylaw helps encourage the prosperity within King Township. This bylaw is the final ingredient to the recently passed Official Plan. He also noted there is opportunity for review after the bylaw has been implemented.

Things that should be taught to our children

"We need to teach our children empathy and care and love and communication and social responsibility in preparation for adulthood."

We're all products of the education system. Some are recent graduates, others like us Boomers, are throw-backs to simpler times.

But we're all formed, molded and changed by those years in high school and post-secondary school.

Most of us remember those times, awkward moments and yes, shenanigans, in high school. Weird sentiments in our yearbooks stand as testaments to times enjoyed, but forgotten.

I recommend dusting off those books and flipping through history if you get a chance. It's good for a laugh if nothing else.

In the 1980s, we had academics, but we also had shop class and yes, home ec. We even had the option of reversing these stereotypical classes. Kids learned some basic skills - how to change a tire or a car's oil; how to fix a hole in your jeans; how to cook a simple meal.

Alas, all of these basic skills courses have fallen by the wayside, making room for more academic, more structured forms of learning.

Helping three children through the system has taught me a lot, let me tell you. I learned right along with them.

And, I've discovered some disconcerting things.

One thing I just can't fathom is the "sameness" of it all. The course outlines, subjects and even assignments didn't change in the 10 years my kids were in high school. In fact, we can find all their essays and reports on their desktop and confirm the subjects are still the same.

There were reference articles that were decades old. Some are really bad quality photocopies, turned into PDFs.

Why would anyone cite information from the early 2000s when so much has changed and come to light?

I hope it's not apathy or laziness on the part of the teachers or school boards. Some things do not stand the test of time, trust me.

As a writer by profession, I find it odd that students - at all levels - have to follow strict essay formats, citation methods and reference checks. Sure, I understand it's a way to get them to research, take notes and document information. But come on, who uses MLA or APA formats in the real world?

I discovered that our system, at any level, teaches kids how to present a written piece. It does not teach them how to write, or how to express themselves.

Perhaps what's needed is an introductory course in Grade 9 called "Self Expression." Revealing, exchanging and presenting ideas and opinions, not formats.

I will say my children did learn something from the Grade 12 psychology classes. It allowed them the freedom to think, ponder and debate. These are useful skills throughout life.

There are some very human things missing, not only from the curriculum but from anywhere in society.

While the system is now "woke," it lacks some of the fundamentals.

We need to foster empathy in our kids. We all have it, but as Maya Angelou noted, "we may not have enough courage to display it."

"Empathy is the starting point for creating a community and taking action. It's the impetus for creating change," according to Max Carver.

He's quite right.

While we're exposed to more relevant issues, change has to first come from within.

Once more, our European counterparts are on the ball.

The Danish are the first to introduce "Empathy" as a school subject. The reason why the Danish have incorporated empathy into their standard national curriculum is that they've realized the importance of teaching children what it means to understand and share feelings.

Unlike children in the rest of the world, Danish children are also taught

how to come to terms with the many different emotional states they'll encounter later in life, as well as to develop the ability to recognize and identify feelings people usually misinterpret.

They created the CAT-Kit program, which consists of various visual, interactive, and other customizable tools that teach kids how to communicate effectively with their peers, with adults, and with other authority figures.

Off-shoots of empathy are kindness and putting others ahead of oneself. Respect is another biggie.

Another "course" I'd like to see is Self-Esteem 101. Nothing is more important than building a sense of self-confidence and self-worth.

Everything begins there. High self-esteem matters because it helps you develop coping skills, handle adversity, and puts the negative into perspective.

We should also teach our youngins to be honest and truthful.

This one value ensures that your children will possess all other values.

How about an "Introduction to Hard Work?" We're all about working smart, but there's a lot to be said about putting your nose to the grindstone and rolling up your sleeves. Hard work never hurt anyone, so the saying goes.

It's hard to explain to young people the value of time itself. But we older, "wise guys" know the value of every minute of every day. I would encourage everyone to stop and smell the coffee (it's more common than roses) each and every day.

Not being in the classroom today, I have no idea if youngsters have perfected the art of sharing. If not, they must.

Our system may be geared to performance, achievement and high academic grades. And yet, we know that humility is a key quality in life. Be humble.

Here's a list of other things that could and perhaps should be on the map: physical and mental survival skills; interpersonal communication; basic finances; basic home repairs; logic and reasoning.

Sure, some of these things can only be learned through living life and the extended "school of hard knocks."

But the better prepared our children are, the better adults they will become.

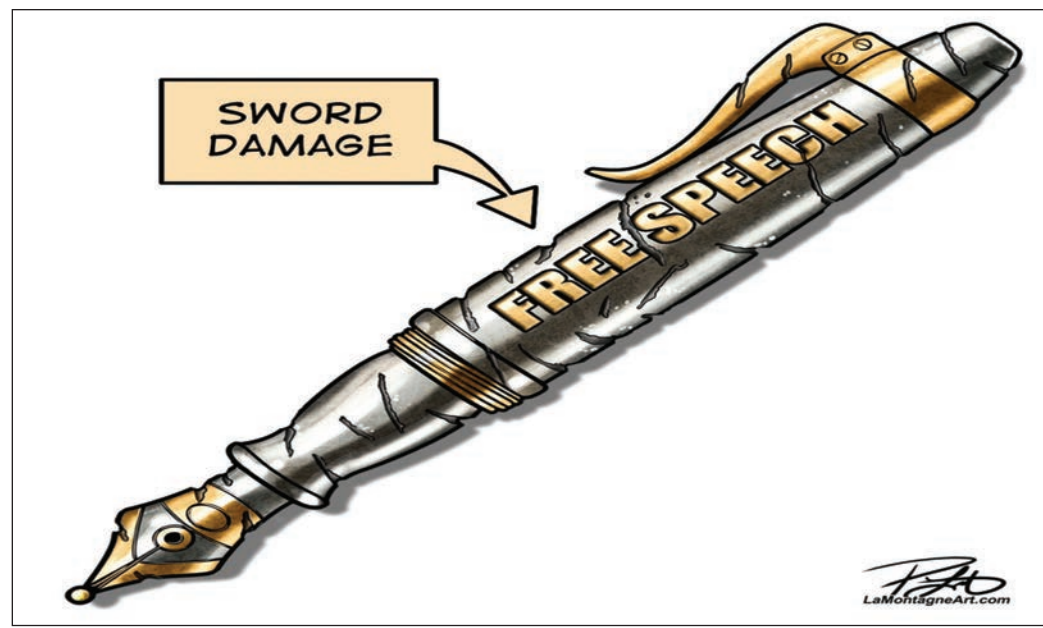
A thank you also to Plug 'n Drive for attending again this year with their various cars and experts. And thank you to the Electric Vehicle Society for their second year of enthusiastic support.

Local residents join in HOW walk against 413

Concerned Citizen of King Township (CCKT) and Climate Action King (CAK) members joined together to host a segment of the Harvest Ontario Walk (HOW) along King-Vaughan Sideroad Oct.1

The projected Highway 413 near our route is between Kirby Road and King-Vaughan Road – terminating at Highway 400. There are to be exits at Hwy. 27, Weston Road and the 400, which will be the quickest way to get more traffic into King.

We joined together to walk this segment and were accompanied by people from Port Perry, Toronto and even Australia! Those of us concerned with increased CO2 emissions, loss of local farmland, impacts on the Humber River Valley and local traffic chaos during the 10-year construction were walking to remind politicians that we oppose Highway 413. We are in favour of opening up Highway 407.

Previously cancelled highways such as the 413 and the Bradford Bypass are not a long-term solution. In the short-term they will reduce our food security and increase CO2 emissions, from the direct and indirect new construction on farmlands, wetlands, and woodlands. The destruction of carbon sequestration capability from farms and natural spaces will also result in an increase in CO2 emissions.

In addition, the HOW event highlighted the need to have a full federal impact study carried out related to 11 identified species-at-risk and full consultation with Indigenous People.

King Township has already voted against building the 413, in a King council motion and then again at the Regional level (though that motion was defeated at York Region Council).

In a motion by Councillor Debbie

Schaefer this spring, King council also voted to free up the 407 for more public access. And who among us would not like increased low cost access to the 407.

The HOW was a move initiated through Environmental Defence and GASP (Grandmothers Act to Save The Planet) and lead by Susan Berry of the Unitarian Congregation, Mississauga.

The route was loosely based on a 60-km bike ride done by the Purvis family in spring of 2021, close to the entire proposed 413 route. HOW grew to also include a large rally event at the Brampton Fairgrounds where hundreds of walkers from the seven walk segments and cyclists from two bike ride segments gathered at 12:30 p.m. to hear elected provincial officials speak including Green Party leader, Mike Schreiner.

HOW stands as a reminder of the high importance of retaining prime agricultural land because of the food insecurity we are facing in the light of climate change, future shocks to the global economy and sensitive eco-systems in Ontario's Greenbelt.

As Mary Bromley stated at the walk: "No barns, no fields, no food. It's not rocket science."

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OFA says municipal elections are crucial

When it comes to preserving Ontario farmland, Oct. 24 is a key date.

That is the day voters in municipalities across the province head to polls to elect their mayors and local councillors. And those political bodies – regional, county, city, town and township councils – hold great sway over the fate of land use in Ontario. While there are processes that can involve upper levels of government, land-use planning is first and foremost a municipal responsibility.

They are the governments tasked with developing official plans and setting urban boundaries and determining where development is best suited and how it should occur. That also makes them the first defenders of farmland.

“When an application comes forth that would dig up or pave over land that is currently growing food, fibre, fuel or flowers in order to build homes, a shopping plaza or new school, municipal councillors are the ones who get the first opportunity to say yay or nay,” says Peggy Brekveld, President of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture (OFA). “For voters who care about preserving

farmland in Ontario, this fall’s municipal elections are critically important.”

The preservation of farmland is a very critical issue in Ontario. According to figures from the Census of Agriculture released in the spring, Ontario is losing 319 acres of productive farmland every day. That’s the equivalent of 58 city blocks, nearly 800 hockey rinks or 4,785 tennis courts. In terms of food, that is enough acreage to produce more than 23.5 million apples, 1.2 million bottles of Ontario VQA wine or 75.6 million carrots.

But not only does this help feed people, it also supports at-risk animals like bee populations and preserves wildlife habitats.

While the OFA does not endorse candidates, it does encourage voters to closely examine the platforms of the candidates in their area, pay attention to what they say during election events and ask them questions if they come knocking on the door to see where they stand on issues that impact land use.

For voters who care about farmland preservation, the OFA suggests asking the following questions to assess candidates:

Where do you stand on the use of Minister’s Zoning Orders? These are a special tool that allows those intent on pushing urban development to bypass a municipality’s typical planning process, meaning reduced opportunities for essential comments and community input into development proposals.

What do you believe to be the purpose of the urban boundary? Their thoughts on your community’s Official Plan and the integrity of its urban boundaries matters. Does the candidate think these are nothing more than a flexible guideline that should be easily moved if desired, or are they hard lines on a map to keep urban sprawl at bay?

What does your platform say about public transit? Efficient transit is key to strong urban communities, and helps encourage development in the right places. Transit corridors attract resi-

dential projects, commercial enterprises and institutions, and putting these in existing urban areas is much better than digging up a farm to build them.

What incentives do you support to bring new development to our community? Incentives can be a powerful tool to encourage the right development in the right places. They are effective for rejuvenating depressed areas of an urban community, and can encourage developers to look at rehabilitating a brownfield within the urban area as opposed to targeting a greenfield farm.

What is your future vision for our community? It is a sprawling concrete urban metropolis driven solely by the attraction of an expanded tax base brought on by widespread development beyond the existing urban area? Or perhaps it is a diverse, mixed-use community with local food sources nearby supporting a busy and vibrant urban core.

OFA recognizes and understands that the vast majority of Ontarians do not come from a farming background, and we want to do our part to help bridge that gap. That’s why OFA has developed Agriculture Matters: A Guide for Municipal Councillors and Staff – an insightful resource that can help municipalities better understand local issues facing farmers, and how they can become a more agriculture-friendly community. This Guide, as well as additional resources, can be downloaded at ofa.on.ca/GrowAg.

“It is easy to take our farmland for granted, but voters should remember that farmland is a finite resource,” says Brekveld. “Once that farm is turned into a shopping centre or subdivision, that land is gone forever. We understand that cities and towns need to grow, but we believe it should be smart growth that protects and preserves the land that feeds us.

“When you cast a ballot on October 24th, we kindly ask that you cast it well-informed of where your candidates stand on preserving farmland.”

CCKT has sent a questionnaire to all 13 candidates covering a variety of relevant topics. Answers from the candidates will be posted on cckt.ca

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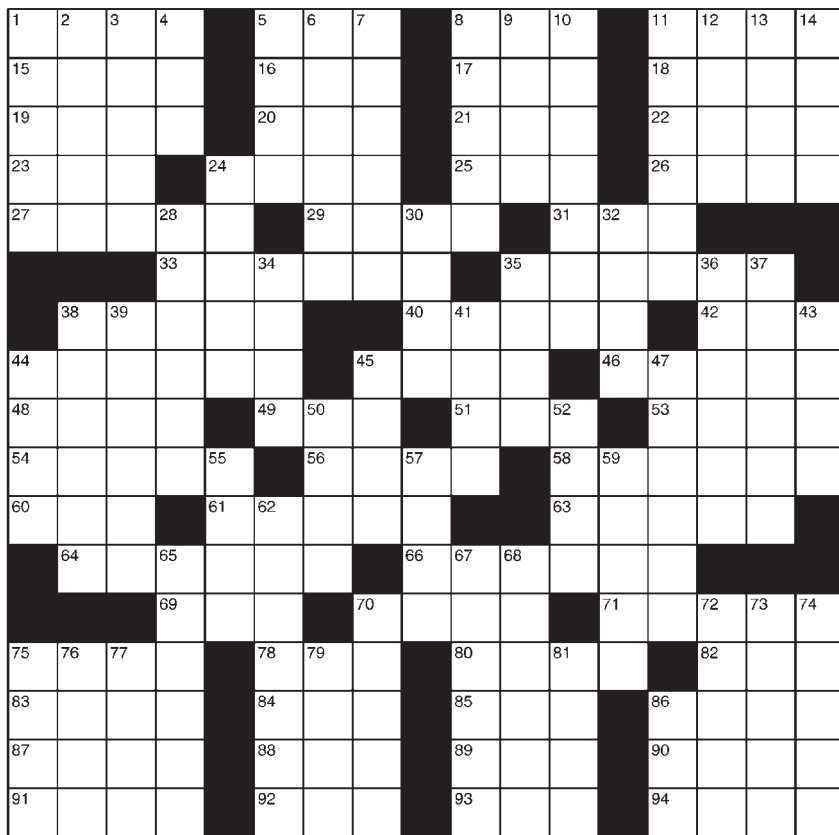

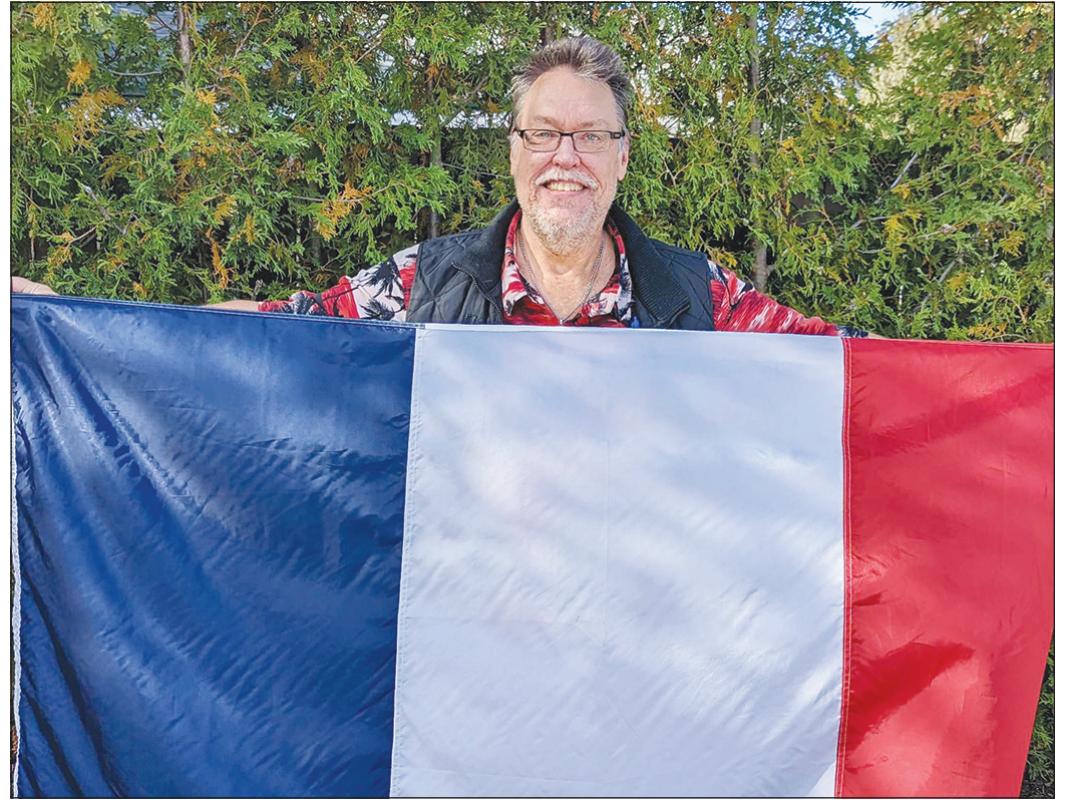

Police lay 53 charges in Project Erase

The York Regional Police Road Safety Bureau, in partnership with the Air Support Unit, our law enforcement partners from across the Greater Toronto Area and the Ministry of Transportation, are delivering the message that street racing and stunt driving will not be tolerated on the streets of York Region and the GTA.

Recently, officers laid 53 Criminal Code and Highway Traffic Act charges and four drivers had their vehicles impounded for stunt driving and street racing-related incidents.

Twenty vehicles were inspected and four were taken out of service for safety violations. Two, three-day licence suspensions were issued, one alcohol related and the other drug related. One person was also arrested for Dangerous Driving and drug related offences.

Another person was charged for driving while their licence was suspended and received a seven-day vehicle impound.

Street racers put themselves and unsuspecting road users at risk of death or serious injury when they choose to disobey traffic laws and drive without due care and control and with a disregard for public safety.

Road safety, speeding and aggressive driving remains a high priority for York Regional Police. Anyone caught driving more than 50 kilometres per hour over the posted speed limit can expect to be charged, have their vehicle towed and their licence suspended.

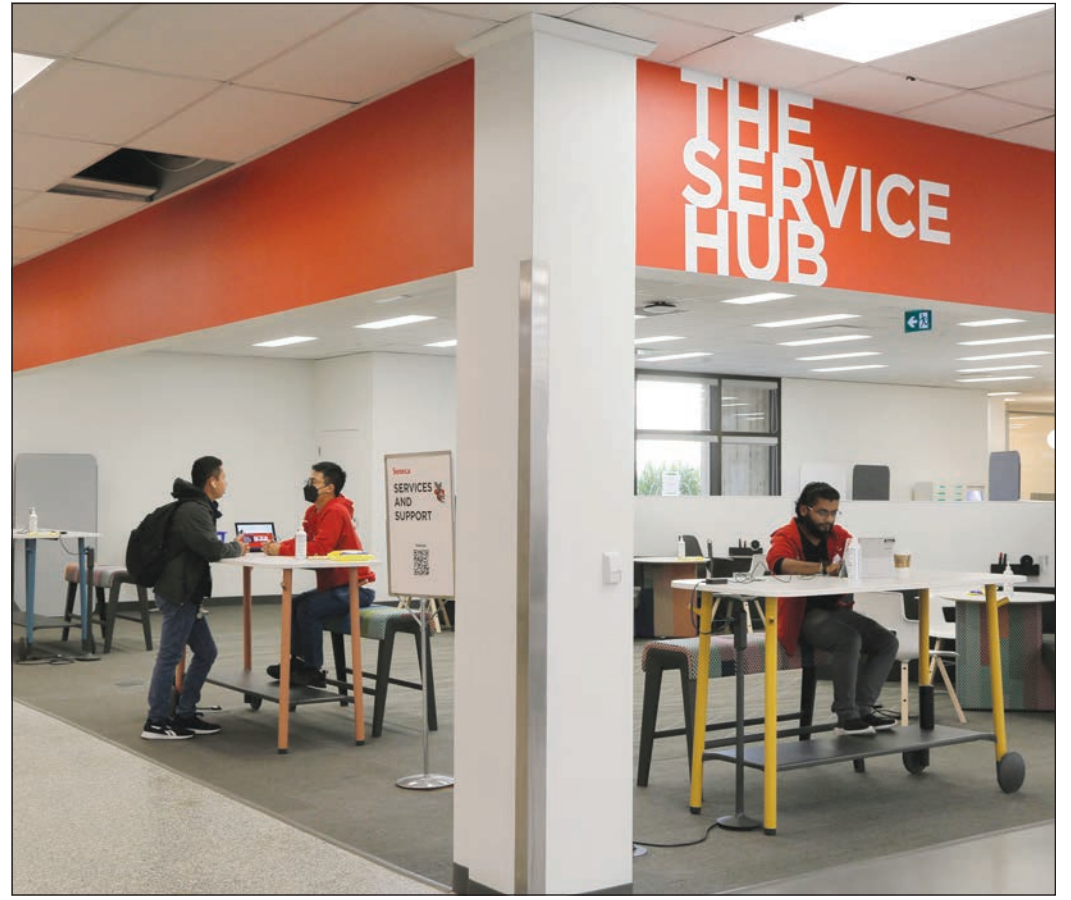

YRP lays firearm and drug charges

York Regional Police has seized one loaded firearm and a large quantity of drugs after a traffic stop in the City of Vaughan.

On Sept. 10, at roughly 9:20 p.m., an officer on patrol observed a vehicle travelling in the area of Buttermill Avenue and Millway Avenue. Police learned the registered owner of the vehicle did not have a valid driver’s licence. The driver was investigated and police located marihuana in the vehicle.

The driver was searched, along with the vehicle. Police located a loaded handgun in a bag accessible to the driver, along with a large quantity of marihuana, suspected opioid drugs and cash.

The investigation led officers to execute three search warrants. Officers located more than 30 marihuana plants and drug-packaging items. Matthew Pinkney, 35, of Toronto has been charged with numerous criminal code offences, along with offences under the Cannabis Act Ontario and Highway Traffic Act.

The investigation is ongoing.

“This is an excellent example of proactive policing that resulted guns and drugs being taken off our streets,” said Chief Jim MacSween. “I commend the officers’ actions and their perseverance in affecting these arrests.”

York Regional Police remains committed to combating the distribution of opioids in our community. Tree canopy is in good shape across York Region

The tree canopy in York and King are quite healthy.

That came as good news to King officials, who want to know exact details on the Township's forest cover, so they can closely monitor the community's environmental health.

James Lane, manager of Natural Heritage and Forestry for York Region, updated councillors on woodland cover. Data is collected and updated every five years, he said.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini wanted the nuts and bolts – the specifics – about how King's tree and woodland cover are progressing. He wants past and present data, so local officials can watch and monitor the local progression. He also wants to know more details about King's carbon footprint.

In his presentation, Lane noted York's goals are to increase canopy cover to 40% and woodland cover to 25% by 2051. They hope to up King's canopy cover range to 41% and its woodland cover to 28% in the same time frame.

York, King, the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority and Toronto and Region Conservation Authority partnered to complete the first

forest study in 2016. It provided an inventory and helps officials manage trees and forests. It also tracks and monitors the effectiveness of management programs.

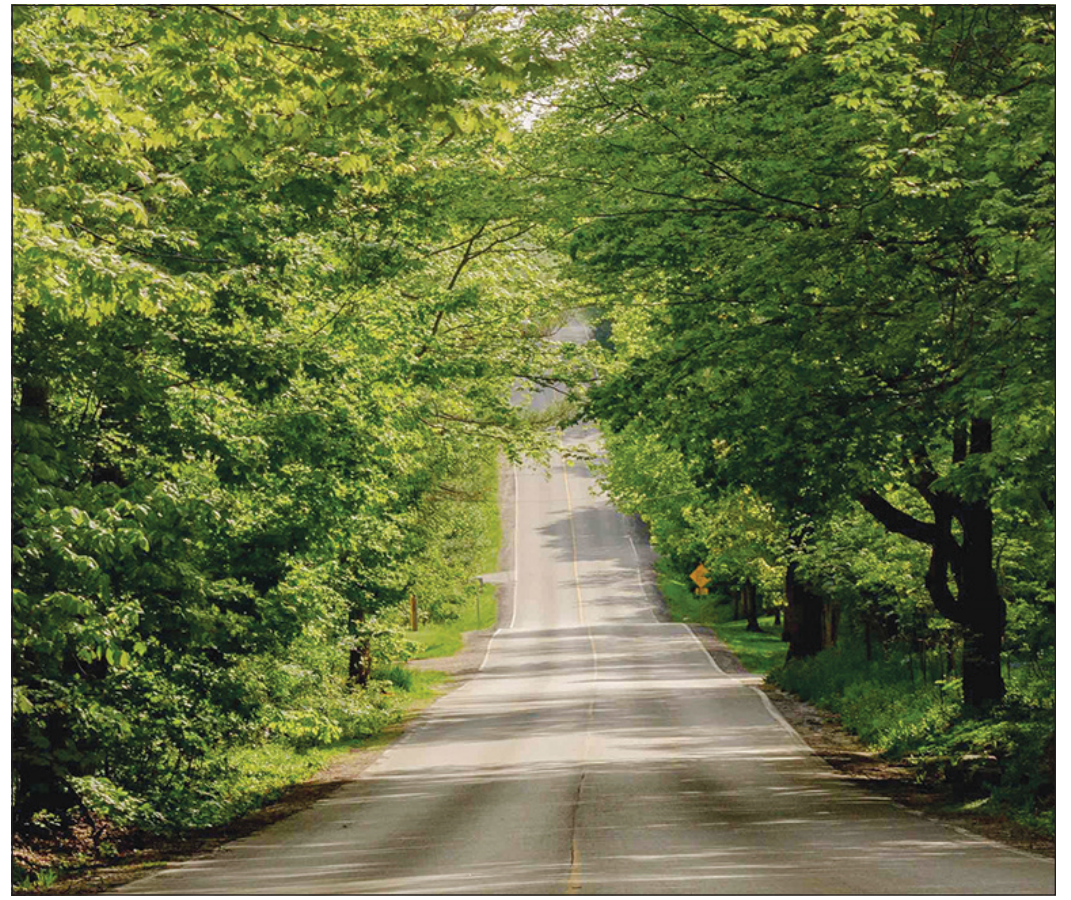
Lane noted a second King forest study is under way and hopes are it will be released in 2023.

King's tree canopy currently sits at 34.4%, slightly above the regional average. It's hoped to get it up to the 36% to 41% range.

York created a Greening Strategy which delivers on ground actions to support a sustainable natural environment. Since 2001, more than 1.7 trees have been planted and 1,518 hectares of land secured for conservation.

In King, a whopping 39,066 trees and shrubs were planted in 2021. The bulk – 22,814 – were planted on private properties. York delivered another 8,453 and 7,106 trees were planted by TRCA at Cold Creek Conservation Area. Another 693 trees and shrubs were planted through community events at Kettle Lake and Hill Farm Park.

The York Region Forest Management Plan, released in 2016, is the regional road map to increasing forest cover. The goal is to continue promoting and refining planting programs and protecting forest through conservation.



Trees of Giving approaches

Kicking off the holiday season, Trees of Giving is an annual, feel-good community event presented by the board and staff of the King Heritage & Cultural Centre.

Community groups and local businesses are invited to participate by entering a tree decorated around the theme of "Childhood." Trees can be real, artificial or constructed and can be decorated with lights and homemade or store-bought decorations. Trees of Giving will be on display Nov. 19 through Dec. 17.

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Gothic home wins 2022 Heritage Advisory Committee Award

Property owners Susan McNerney and Jim Allen were at the King Township Municipal Centre Sept. 26 to receive a beautiful, framed drawing of their property produced by local artist, Phyllis Vernon. A reproduction of that drawing will be hung at the King Township Municipal Centre.

Resident's case receives stay of proceedings

Charges against a King City Secondary teacher have formally been stayed.

Robert Aurich of King was initially charged Nov. 18, 2020 after images containing child pornography had been uploaded to a social media platform. The upload was traced back to the York Region District School Board. He was arrested at King City Secondary School.

York Regional Police noted a "stay of proceedings" was issued June 21, 2022.

When proceedings are stayed by the Crown, the prosecution has ended and the accused is no longer in jeopardy – legally, it is as if the accused has never been charged. Any orders related to pre-trial detention or release are vacated.

The Crown may objectively choose to stay the proceedings if there is no reasonable prospect of conviction based on the evidence, or if the prosecution does not serve the public interest.

A stay of proceedings can also be granted by a trial Judge under sec-

tion 24(1) of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. This is a very drastic remedy and will only occur in the clearest of cases upon a finding that an accused's Charter rights have been breached in such a way that the only remedy is to stay the proceedings. A Judicial stay of proceedings only occurs in exceptional circumstances, where some egregious misconduct has occurred, and no alternative remedy would appropriately cure the prejudice to the accused. This determination is final and prevents a Court from ever adjudicating the matter – there is no determining guilt or innocence beyond this stay.

Aurich told the Sentinel it has been a long, troublesome time for him, one that has "exerted an extreme toll on my life."

Aurich contends the charges never actually "reflected what happened."

Aurich said it was a case of "Involuntary Intoxication." Under the law, this involves someone who unknowingly ingested an intoxicating substance by accident or was surreptitiously administered an intoxicating substance.

Nobleton & King City Garden club holds final flower show

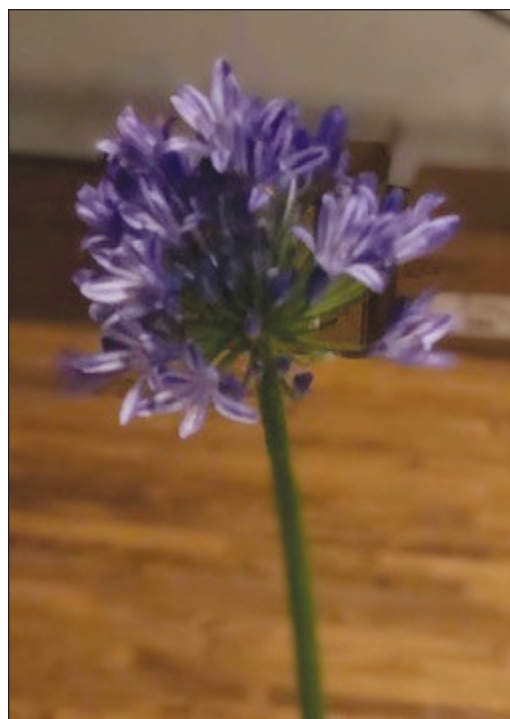
The Nobleton & King City Garden Club held their September meeting recently. The last Flower Show of the year brought great results and vibrant colours to Laskay Hall.

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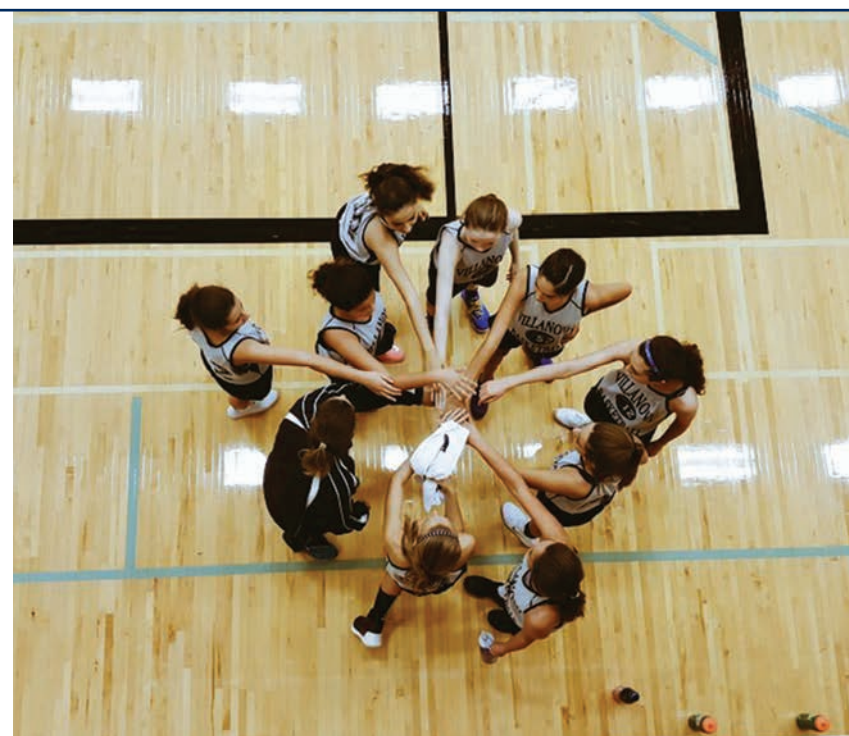

Is the merger of these two youth soccer clubs a sign of things to come?

At the end of the day, it is all about the youth.

Just months after the Toronto Blizzard began a historic partnership with FC Bayern Munich, one of the city's most prominent development academies did it again.

Just a few weeks ago, Toronto Blizzard began an exclusive partnership with FC Emery to promote the long-term development of young soccer players.

FC Emery, who currently houses a few players from Aurora, was established in 1991, originally as a men's futsal program. But over time, the club grew and became an academy, poised for competitive soccer. HFX Wanderers player Mohammad Omar, earned his trade in this system.

The Toronto Blizzard on the other hand, formally competed in the North American Soccer League from 1979-1984. This elite academy, is also where players in the past have earned full rides and their structure is one of the best around.

In speaking with the head of FC Emery, Angel Granja, he said when he spoke to the head of the Toronto Blizzard, Joe Parolini, he approached with him with a plan and had numerous players in need of his infrastructure.

“It's more affordable for the kids and it works out for us as well. They have the coaching staff, they have the players. He has the accessibility for the USA that we needed. He has everything that we're looking for, for the next phase of our development,” Granja said.

In his experience, Granja has seen players enroll into the Ontario Player Development League (OPDL) and opt out due to high costs. A key factor for many players, who financially cannot pay to play in the league.

“It's about working together for the sport. Even though we're seeing the national team developed in Canada, promoting the game has never been our gold standard ... Even if the kid can't play, do we have a development program? We generated a beginner's program for U13 and up,” Granja said.

“We're not looking for superstars. We're looking to make kids' opportunities better. That's all it is. If they continue the sport, we're growing the sport. If they get a degree, or if they continue professionally, that's even better.”

With this merger, yes, more players will have flexibility with less monetary strain on families. But in its totality, can we potentially see this to happen between clubs in the foreseeable future?

When asked, Granja said no. Each club, might not be keen on merging with another. Lots of clubs can be competitive that way and want to have a better system than the other. The cold truth unfortunately, but in reality, it can most certainly be the nature of a competitor.

If this is something that can happen in other communities, this isn't particularly a bad thing. If a player doesn't fit right at one club, they should be recommended to try out for another. The care into player development has most certainly grown. The players are looking for outlets and they are seeking clubs in primed positions for their services.

Canada Soccer has become a lot better in recent years. It is why we currently see the success of our national team. To finally return to the World Cup since their first and only appearance in 1986, speaks volumes on all of the work this country has been doing to get this nation there.

And there will be another in 2026. First time in the country's history to have back-to-back appearances. Now isn't that something.

To say every club should merge might be overstepping a fine line in some instances. But if we're all in it for the development of the players and to further promote the game is there truly a harm?

With the Toronto Blizzard merging with a second club – and this time a local one – can this happen with others? There are many questions. We'll have to wait to find out.

St. Alban's By John Arnott

The now closed little, towered red brick Anglican church on Hwy. 27 close by the cemetery in Nobleton was consecrated as St. Alban's in 1889 after St Alban the first known Christian martyr in England which in Rome's day was called Britannia and was the most

northerly provincia in the Roman Empire.

Not much information about this man has survived the turbulent years following of the fall Roman Empire. Most of what we know about him is found in the writings of historian Gildas (saint) and St. (the Venerable) Bede who lived some 300 years after Alban's martyrdom. Both these scholars wrote that Alban was an officer with the rank of centurion stationed in Verulamium a military town (today called St. Alban's) about an hour's drive north of London. They recorded that Alban died during a persecution of Christians in 305 AD when Diocletian was emperor but some modern researchers now say he was martyred during the reign of Decius in 254 AD while others claim it was in 209 AD when Septimius Severus ruled.

Alban, a non Christian, was executed because he gave shelter to a Christian priest fleeing the Roman authorities and while this man was staying in Alban's home he talked to him about his Christian beliefs and Alban was so impressed that he asked the priest to baptize him into this new religion. Soon, however, it was discovered where this wanted Christian refugee was staying and soldiers came to arrest him. But warned of this Alban and the priest exchanged clothes and Alban was arrested while the priest escaped.

When the authorities discovered the ruse they were furious and even more so at finding out that one of their own was now a Christian. They tried to force him to recant but even under torture Alban adamantly refused so he was publicly beheaded on the grounds of the open air arena on the outskirts of the town. The townspeople were forced to come and witness what happens to those who defy the might Rome.

Some years later a small shrine was built on the place where the now saint died. Today a magnificent cathedral incorporating this ancient memorial stands on the site. I learned from Rev. Sheilagh Ashworth of blessed memory that more pre- and post-Reformation Anglican churches are named for St. Alban than any other saint!

The Anglican community in Nobleton notes that mother of Rev. Arthur Allerton long time priest at St. Alban's Nobleton came from St. Alban's in England. And the Bishop of St. Alban's in England sent an email to the Nobleton congregation expressing his support and prayers for them as they faced the closure of their beloved church.



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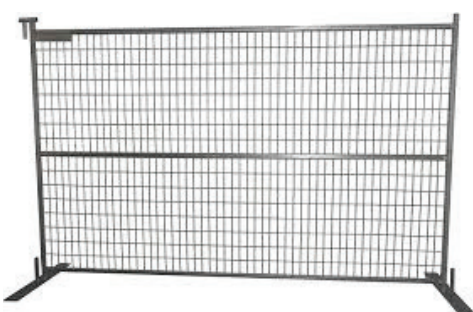
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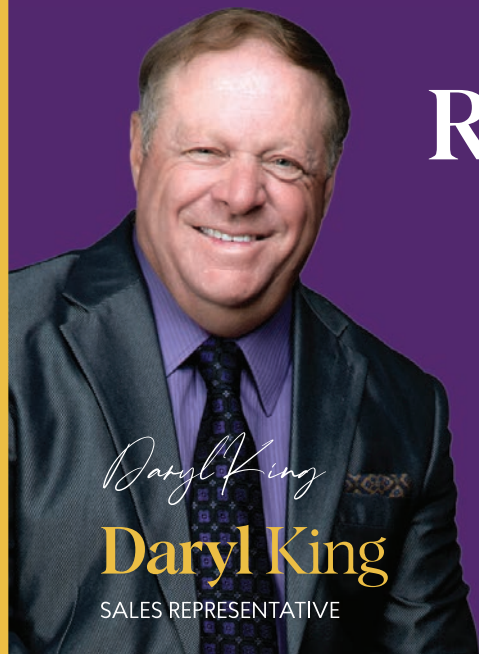


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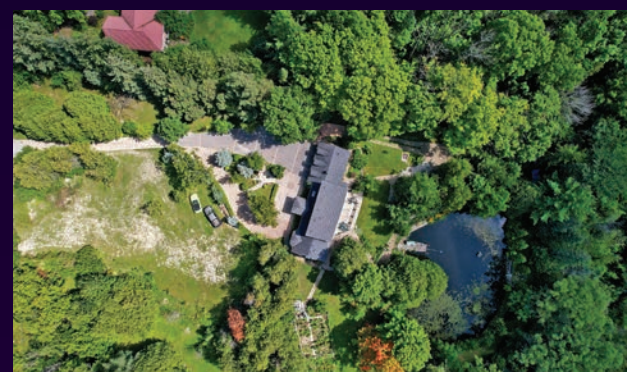

It Only Takes A Speck - Rev. Erin

Martin's sermon last Sunday spoke from Luke 17 -faith as a mustard seed:

"In recent gospels, Jesus has been asking big things – giving away our possessions, forgiving those who've wronged us, and taking up our cross to follow Jesus. In the face of such challenges, the disciples wanted a bit of a boost. I feel like we're in the same boat.

"The last few years have been filled with challenges, COVID-19, natural disasters, the death of the queen, war in Ukraine and the growth of bigotry, hatred and violence. It feels like we're working so hard and don't always see the results we want. We need a boost too –more faith to get through the day – to do what know God is asking us to do. When the disciples asked Jesus for more faith, you would think that he'd grant their request.

"Instead, he seemed to scold them saying, 'If you had even a speck of faith....,' he began, suggesting that they didn't even have faith the size of a mustard seed. Jesus's answer was just what they needed to realize that God was all around them and their faith was sufficient to accomplish great things. Theologian David Lose wrote, 'Here's the thing: servants aren't invited to the table with the landowner; they eat when their work is done. Nor do they deserve great thanks simply for doing their job; they just do it. That's more what faith is like – simply the willingness to do what needs to be done. Faith isn't always heroic. It is simply and humbly doing what needs to be done, just because it needs doing.'

"Jesus pointed them to the service of servants performing their duties. 'Faith isn't found in the mighty acts of heaven but in the ordinary and everyday acts of doing what needs to be done, responding to the needs around us, and caring for the people who come our way.' Do we recognize that Jesus would call so many of the things that we do each week, faithful? Things like, showing up for work and doing a good job; listening when someone needs to talk, getting kids off to school and remembering to pack their lunch, volunteering to make a meal for Crosslinks, bringing items for our food drive, writing a thank you note to someone who was kind, praying for a friend or neighbour, doing work at the senior's center, spending a couple of hours in a parish executive meeting, volunteering to host coffee hour, checking in with someone who's on your heart ... The list goes on and on."

"According to the Township of King's 10 Year Paving Strategy and Pavement Management Plan report that was released in November 2020, 70% of the roads rated as being in "very poor" condition in King Township are in Ward 3. Another 70% of the Township's roads listed as being in "Poor" condition are

also in Ward 3," she said about the research that she posted on her website, www.JenniferAnstey.ca.

"While it won't be a surprise to many," she added. "There is even a note in the report's summary that 'The gravel road network was in the worst condition.' In my view, this indicates that our ward needs a stronger voice on council to better advocate for more resources being directed to our area."

Defending the countryside is another issue that Jennifer plans to champion.

"I'm a passionate supporter of protecting the rural lifestyle that characterizes King Township. Our ward in particular, embodies King's farming and agricultural heritage that we are all so fond of," she said of her long-term vision for King Township. "With thoughtful planning we can preserve the countryside while building complete communities within the urban boundaries that feature a variety of living accommodations and working opportunities."

In addition to understanding the issues, Jennifer also promises to be responsive to residents' needs.
