# Will King be home to a new hospital?

King Township has rolled out the welcome matt to the future expansion of Southlake Regional Health Centre.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini presented a motion at the final meeting for the 2018-2022 council, supporting a new facility on the border with Newmarket.

Along with King's endorsement, councillors also approved the motion which calls for the Province to approve a new hospital on the lands and fast-track the approval process.

The motion further directs staff to work with the landowner, Province and Southlake Regional Health Centre to expedite development approvals for these lands, and directs the clerk to forward a copy of this resolution to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Minister of Health, and to the President and CEO of Southlake Regional Health Centre.

"It is important that we continue to protect the health care of those who live in or near King and help further the vision for expansion of the Southlake Regional Health Centre. King Council unanimously requests that the new Southlake Regional Health Centre is constructed, and that its approval is fast-tracked to ensure this happens," said Mayor Steve Pellegrini.

The mayor explained that he's been working with the Southlake board behind the scenes for some time, as they've outgrown their current hospital. They're looking at a similar, multi-hospital system used by Mackenzie Health.

In the search for nearby land, a perfect parcel presented itself at the northwest corner of Davis Drive (Highway 9) and Bathurst.

In a strange twist of fate, planning changes presented by the Province in Bill 23 took this parcel out of the greenbelt, making it prime for development.



By-Law Number 2022-086 is a by-Law to adopt Official Plan Amendment #102 for the Township of King Planning Area. Specifically, the amendment concerns a property located on the north side of Dew Street in the Village of King City. The subject Land is known as Registered Plan 337, Lot 37 and municipally addressed as 204 Dew Street.

The Official Plan Amendment #102 amends the Township of King Official Plan Amendment No. 54 (King City Community Plan), as amended by Official Plan Amendment No. 540 (Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan Amendment) to redesignate the subject property from 'Existing Low Density Residential Area' to 'Medium Density Residential Area'. The Amendment will facilitate a future plan of condominium application for a total of eight (8) residential units comprised of four (4) semi-detached dwellings at a gross density of 23.1 units per net hectare and a private condominium road.

The lands to which the Official Plan Amendment apply to are also subject to a Zoning By-law Amendment. Zoning By-law 2022-087 rezones the property from Residential – Single Detached 'C' (R1C) to Residential – Semi-Detached (R2-3) with site specific exceptions, including a Holding Symbol (H) with respect to servicing allocation. The purpose of the rezoning is to enable a future Plan of Condominium application for the creation of a private road and residential lots for semi-detached dwellings with access from Dew Street.

Comments were received during Public Planning Meetings on November 2, 2020 and April 6, 2021 for the Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-Law Amendment Applications. These comments have been taken into consideration during the review of the application and have been responded to both generally and specially through the Planning Divisions Recommendation Report (GMS-PL-2022-42). 

# Township notes concerns with Bill 23 to Province

A move to get more homes built across the province will add significant financial and regulatory burdens on local municipalities.

King Township staff noted their concerns with Bill 23, the More Homes Built Faster Act. While intended to address the housing crisis by adding 1.5 million homes over the next 10 years, the move will saddle municipalities with extra costs.

King councillors supported staff recommendations on the subject, at its virtual meeting Nov. 6.

The Bill contains some 50 actions, one of which includes reducing government fees and "fixing developmental approval delays." Another measure includes discounting or eliminating development charges – fees that municipalities rely on for infrastructure.

Staff are unsure whether Bill 23 will have the intended outcomes. "Approvals do not always equate to shovels in the ground, as there are several factors that impact construction timing," the report noted.

"The proposed amendments through Bill 23 will result in significant financial impacts due to the loss of revenue from development charges, reduced parkland contributions, and the potential transfer of various responsibilities currently delivered by York Region and the Conservation Authorities to local municipalities.

Township staff resources will also be impacted based on the compounding effects of Bill 109, this proposed Bill 23 and future anticipated further bills.

"Funding shortfalls will need to be managed and may impact the tax levy rate-based charges or service level adjustments to ensure sufficient funding and staff resources are available for infrastructure, parkland and service delivery.

Critics charge the Bill also removes some regulations in the Conservation Authorities Act, to speed up decisions made by these bodies.

King, staff said, relies on the expertise of the TRCA and LSRCA who comment on development applications. They provide key information into policies that are included in King's Official Plan.

The Township relies on partnerships whe with Conservation Authorities to support day-to-day work on various Planing Act matters. If the mandate of the Conservation Authorities is limited, as proposed in the legislation to natural hazards and flooding, the Township may need to consider alternative approaches to obtain natural heritage re-

view and expert advice for development applications as the Township still has an obligation under Provincial Plans, such as the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan, to ensure the ecological integrity of the Plan Area is maintained.

As a result of the recent changes proposed to the Conservation Authorities Act, King Township, like many other Municipalities, have entered into discussions with CA Staff to discuss ways in which the organizations can better work together, how the organization can support the other and how development applications can be processed more efficiently. These discussions are on-going and are intended to be supported through a future Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).

Staff are asking that the Province reconsider the components of the Bill 23 that limit the Conservation Authorities from commenting on planning and infrastructure projects under the various prescribed Acts. They also want discussions leading to MOUs with municipalities to be advanced and concluded.

"Conservation Authorities are key stakeholders in creating sustainable, healthy and livable communities who's contributions should not be lost in the development process moving forward."

Changes in the Bill also impact donations of parkland from developers. The Township relies on such donations, as well as cash in lieu contributions.

According to staff, the proposed amendments will result in financial impacts due to the loss of revenue from development charges and parkland rates. Any shortfall in funds caused by Bill 23 will need to be addressed through alternative mechanisms, possibly including within the tax levy. Further, the proposed reduction in parkland dedication rates (both land and cash-inlieu) will have a negative impact on the Township's ability to acquire adequate parkland under the Planning Act, as forecast in the Official Plan and Parks and Forestry Master Plan.

"Parkland is an important component of building healthy communities and contributes to a high quality of life in the Township.

"While the proposed amendments to the parkland dedication rates may be well intentioned to reduce costs for home renters or buyers, it is unknown whether the savings will be passed onto them. In addition, it may not be creating the parkland amenities that people inhabiting these neighborhoods envisioned," staff observed.

The legislation also introduces

# King hoping to host new hospital

The 500-plus-acre parcel is currently owned by the Rice Group, a vertically integrated retail, industrial, and infrastructure developer with a proven track record of executing on its project strategies. They currently manage a portfolio in excess of 1,000 acres primarily in the Greater Toronto Area.

Mayor Pellegrini said this parcel is ideal in many ways, not the least of which is its proximity to transit and the existing hospital. It also has access to servicing and everything is "lining up."

The mayor is optimistic the powers that be can get a hospital for King.

"You can't find a better location," he said. "We're willing hosts, let's get going!" Danae Theakston, communications strategist for Southlake, noted the communities served by Southlake in northern York Region and southern Simcoe County are among the fastest growing and aging in the province. With no significant acute care capital expansion in 20 years, Southlake has become one of the most overcrowded hospitals in Ontario.

In April 2022, Southlake received a \$5-million planning grant from the provincial government to support our planning for a new state-of-the-art hospital and the redevelopment of our existing Davis Drive campus. This will transform Southlake into a leading two-site hospital system.

"Southlake is grateful to have the support of the communities we serve. We sincerely appreciate the support of the council of King Township and the opportunities this brings. We are currently embarking on our site selection process to identify the preferred site and should be in a position to announce it as soon as possible."




the lowest paid workers, the "negotiations" have been a sham since June. Ford and Lecce have repeatedly said that they will keep kids in schools from now on.

Some of us naively thought that they meant they would negotiate properly with the various unions and come up with a decent liveable wage.

Lecce himself got a 10% raise in 2020, and now earns \$165,851. In order to break this lowly group of education workers, Ford and Lecce have to pass legislation and invoke the "notwithstanding" clause in order to suspend Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. One of the Rights and Freedoms is the right to negotiate a fair settlement.

What other rights and freedoms will they invoke? This misuse of the "notwithstanding" clause should scare us all.



Kettleby is a small Hamlet located on Kettleby Road between Jane Street and Keele Street in the Township of King. The downtown core along Kettleby Road is in need of rehabilitation to replace deteriorating infrastructure within the Township right of way. As part of the Township of King's capital works road improvement program, the Township is planning to reconstruct this 720 m segment of Kettleby Road. The limits of this project extend from the Kettleby Bridge on the west side of the Hamlet (just west of #500 Kettleby Road), to the eastern limit of the community, at #270 Kettleby Road.

Preliminary works (including hydro pole and utility relocations) are planned to commence

in 2023, with full reconstruction of the roadway scheduled in 2024. A detailed schedule of the works will be shared with the affected residents once the schedule is confirmed.

Proposed works under consideration at this time include adjustments to the asphalt platform and installation of curb and gutters to improve drainage. In addition, replacement and/or improvements to the existing sidewalks, ditches, culverts and storm sewer system are also proposed.

The project will follow Schedule A+ of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment process (Municipal Engineers Association, October 2000, as amended in 2007, 2011, 2015), which is a pre-approved process under the *Ontario Environmental Assessment Act.*

It is time for this Conservative government to start listening to citizens and municipalities who are having this bill shoved down their throats in the complete absence of public consultation, while it reflects the unique self-interests of the five-point plan prepared by Ontario Home Builders and the Building and Lands Development Association: https://www.bildgta.ca/ Assets/misc/fivepointplan.pdf

Enough of gagging the public! There is an old saying: "No taxation without representation." What do you think you are doing?

Taxes are what citizens pay to have in a civilized society, but this Conservative government seems to have turned into a secretive network, intent upon backing the plans of its favourite corporate backers.

There is already a 30-year supply of land for building in the GTA, but developers appear to want access to the entire province. Meanwhile, there is a lull in the housing market, caused by necessary interest rate hikes to control irrational prices.

### Letter to the Editor

The Association of Municipalities of Ontario explained: "Ontario had 100,000 housing starts in 2021, the highest in 30 years. However, some municipalities have seen a sharp decline in permit applications in 2022, due to factors such as higher interest rates and labour shortages."

Such labour shortages are temporary fall-out from the pandemic's hangover. Enough land has been set aside for housing. There is no need for Bill 23.

There is so much wrong with Bill 23 that I will only focus on a few areas, especially the urgent need to restore the powers of Conservation Authorities to manage watersheds on the basis of science.

Conservation Authorities (CAs) have ben protecting watersheds to prevent flooding and erosion since the 1950s, following the devastation of Hurricane Hazel. Now, climate change has increased the power of storms, as demonstrated in Barrie in 2021, followed by bridge to Ottawa in May 2022.

Even the west and east coasts of Canada have been deluged and damaged by extremely powerful storms recently. As a result, more tax dollars are needed for evacuations followed by urgent repairs to infrastructure (a situation which demands paramount attention from the federal government. Who is responsible for assessing the landscape in terms of climate change?).

Instead of planning for this predictable future, Ontario wants to prevent municipalities from entering into agreements with conservation authorities to review planning applications, thereby guaranteeing more flood damage and erosion, while allowing exemptions from natural hazard permits for those municipalities where Planning Act approvals already exist. In an act of irresponsibility, the Conservative government intends to remove conservation of land and pollution from permit decisions. It also wants CAs to sell their lands for more housing ... in flood plains, hazard zones, and protected areas.

Finally, there is the planned freeze on development charges. Who is going to pay for all the water/sewage expansions, the expansion of the electrical distribution system, and roads, schools, parks, hospitals?

Minister Steve Clark pretends development charges are hidden away in municipal "slush funds," instead of recognizing how these fees, supplemented to a large degree by our tax dollars, are used to pay down infrastructure debt that was recently identified in the 2022/23 'Costing Climate Change Impacts to Public Infrastructure: Transportation' report of Ontario's Financial Accountability Office (OFAO).

The OFAO notes: "Ontario's municipal governments own \$269 billion of the transportation infrastructure assets in scope (82%), while the provincial government owns \$61 billion (18%)." The Financial Officer estimates it will cost \$12.9-billion/year to maintain existing public transportation infrastructure until 2100.

This relates only to the cost of transportation, not sewage, water, etc., not

the next path of devastation from Ux- new infrastructure related to new buildings.

Now, heed the recent warning from the Insurance Bureau of Canada (IBC) regarding climate risks. IBC stated: "the disclosure of natural hazard and climate risk is urgently needed in the Canadian housing market because of the increasing frequency and severity of natural disasters."

IBC insists a Real Estate Climate Risk Score must be instituted across Canada by 2025, to indicate a property's susceptibility to catastrophic loss based on known risk factors. The Index would form the basis for managing and reducing household, community and municipal climate risk.

Craig Stewart, V.P., IBC Climate Change and Federal Issues, stated: "We simply can't wait until 2050 to be climate compatible in the housing sector. Immediate action must be taken to protect homeowners and communities, or catastrophic loss to homes and communities will continue to increase in severity and cost, year after year."

This Conservative government has gutted environmental policies and green energy plans to ensure building is cheaper for their developer friends. What an absolute abomination and disgrace! What an abdication of your public responsibility!

We cannot pretend the federal and provincial governments exist in separate spheres in Ontario. Both levels must wake up to the realities of climate change, ensuring it is the absolute top priority for this nation now, instead of trying to breathe new life into a 1950s model for the economy of the 21st century.

Ottawa's plan for net zero by 2050 now appears too little too late. Yet, I fear the federal approach overlooks new damage that will likely be inflicted through provincial planning changes now imposed by Doug Ford's government.

The glaring democratic deficit in Ontario shows there is a total disconnect between the public and those who supposedly serve the public. That needs to be fixed. Now.

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

"This law should never have been adopted. Bill 28 imposed a four-year concessionary contract that would have pushed more of us into poverty while stripping us of our Charter rights, human rights, and any legal avenue to fight back.

"Students and parents need funding guarantees to ensure services are being provided in schools.

"School boards need the government to make a meaningful investment, too. School boards can't hire or retain education workers. There is a crisis in our schools because no one wants to work for poverty level wages, be laid off for months every year, and be continuously disrespected and undervalued by the government.

"With high inflation forcing more education workers to use food banks or choose between their rent or their car payment, we need a significant wage increase just to get by.

This designates residential lands for detached, semis and row houses.

One major change is altering the roles of upper-tier municipalities, in our case, curbing input from York Region. Under the changes, York would no longer be the approval authority for King's official plan and OPAs.

King staff noted that coordinated land use planning across the region will be vital in the coming years, when high growth is anticipated. Municipalities like King find value in having York as a commenting partner.

The Act also deals with servicing requirements of local governments, including sewer and water systems.

Resident Mary Muter, chair of the Kingscross Ratepayers Association, said the proposed changes will result in significantly increased responsibilities for King Township.

She wanted to know the financial implications of the legislation.

KRA members, she pointed out, are already paying high taxes and any increase due to Bill 23 implementations would be "very concerning."

King's status of the "green hole in the donut" is in jeopardy if wetlands and streams are buried and developed under Bill 23.

"This makes absolutely no sense facing climate change since wetlands and their associated ravines provide critical climate resiliency," she said.

Regarding growth in York Region and King Township Muter wants to know whether the premier will support building a new sewage treatment plant to service the new development proposed south of Lake Simcoe.

According to ECCC's Great Lakes climate change predictions, water levels on Georgian Bay are predicted to decline by 2030 to three feet or a meter below the record lows. Lake Simcoe is a puddle compared to Georgian Bay. Perhaps it is time that Lake Simcoe interests begin to understand what an increased intrabasin transfer combined with climate change will do to Lake Simcoe water levels.

The proposed loss of democracy by not allowing citizens or ratepayer organizations to appeal municipal decisions "is unacceptable." During the LPAT appeal process for the developments abutting our neighbourhood we were able to get agreements in conditions that address our concerns.

"If we are living in a democracy this must be continued to be allowed.

"Bill 23's passage must be delayed until new municipal councils across Ontario have been sworn in and the new councils have had time to properly assess the impacts and comment in detail."

Susan Walmer, CEO of the Oak Ridges Moraine Land Trust, noted the trust now protects over 67 properties (5073 acres/2053ha) across the Moraine and Greenbelt. Their newest donated protected property is located at the north edge of the Pottageville Swamp in King Township and consists of wetlands adjacent to the LSRCA lands.

The proposed changes in Bill 23 will have a huge impact on municipal governments like King Township.

"It will cause municipalities to go back to the drawing board with respect to the calculation of development charges, as well as parkland bylaws. The reduction in development charges to the development industry will push municipal taxes at the local level even higher," she said in her submission to council.

"Building our climate change resiliency and the future health of our communities, both for people and nature needs the expertise of the Conservation Authorities as the final word on wetland protection and other ecological values. Without this local oversight, there will be sprawl into rural areas in King township.

"The changes to exclude the Conservation Authorities oversight on planning applications will not fix the housing crisis and will not create new units faster. It will push sprawl into areas of the Greenbelt creating more asphalt and road salt. Proposed offsets to recreate or restore lands elsewhere have not worked in the USA where there are few examples of success in the past 30 years.

built heritage.

Bill 23 implies a prohibition to "list" properties indefinitely. A property is listed when council agrees that it has cultural heritage value but deep research and evaluation has not been conducted. Properties are listed as they contribute to the unique character of our communities; accordingly, many of our listed properties are included in the King Township History & Heritage brochure featuring a map and photos.

As most listed properties are not in any danger, listing is an adequate tool for local councils to identify and celebrate these structures. When there is risk of demolition of a listed property Council has 60 days to discuss options with the property owner and to conduct the deep research to verify if its cultural value merits designation.

Schaefer said Bill 23 forces either designation or the dropping of 150 properties from the register within two years leaving them with no heritage status.

"If we want to avoid a laissez-faire at-

celeration of the disappearance of our titude about our built heritage it will be necessary to designate the 150 currently listed properties on the municipal register within two years of Bill 23 being passed. But this is neither desirable nor possible."

> Bill 23 also attacks our desire to celebrate our history and heritage by changing the standard for designation from at least one of three Ontario's heritage criteria to two, she stressed.

"Like many of the changes prescribed in Bill 23 it's not evident how the changes to OHA will result in more houses being built more quickly. And one must question why the Province is forcing unnecessary designations on municipalities and heritage property owners."

Staff noted they haven't quantified the shortfall in DCs just yet but they will explore options to make up the shortcomings.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini wondered what will become of the upper tier (York Region) planning powers, adding he's not sure if everyone realizes the magnitude of these proposed changes.

MAIN **STREET** Christmas

York Regional Council passed a motion requesting the province halt Bill 23, the More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022, to allow for more fulsome analysis and meaningful consultation and collaboration with Ontario's municipalities and other stakeholders.

The motion, brought forward by Markham Mayor Frank Scarpitti and seconded by Richmond Hill Mayor David West, requests the government halt Bill 23 and convene the consultation with the Housing Supply Action Plan Implementation Team (HSAPIT) to ensure municipalities can work in partnership with the province to address the housing affordability crisis in our communities.

"Regional Council and The Regional Municipality of York remain aligned with the provincial goal of building more homes and increasing the speed of approvals, but we do have concerns with the proposed legislation," said York Region Chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "As proposed, Bill 23 will have considerable and complex economic, social and environmental impacts and will significantly impact how municipal governments recover the costs associated with growth."


Introduced into the Ontario Legislature on Oct. 25, Bill 23 proposes to amend nine acts with varying levels of impact on municipalities. Most significant of these amendments are proposed changes to the Development Charges Act and The Planning Act, which would limit the ways in which a municipality can finance growth related infrastructure and may, in reality, contradict the goal of building more affordable housing. Further to the sweeping changes outlined in Bill 23, the government has provided a short window for consultation, requiring municipalities and other stakeholders to submit comments on the legislation by Nov. 24.

The first was a fairly simply swap of oval gems - my mom's sapphire re-mounted in my dad's citrine ring. What I wanted was a combination of both of them. and I got just that.

Now, it's a very fitting tribute to them, and me, my past, my heritage. I actually purchased the Ceylon sapphire myself as a gift to my mom decades ago. It now lives on in a piece that I'm proud to wear

Another piece involved taking a small. 12th-century coin and mounting it in a bracelet that my dad purchased in the Bahamas many years ago.

Recently, I've developed a fondness for religious artifacts - ancient crosses and coins bearing christograms.

This coin, Bohemond III, (1163 - 1201) has a cross on one side, and a helmeted knight/crusader on the other. Minted in Antioch, the coin has mystical qualities, at least for me.

Crusaders, even members of the Knights Templar, apparently hoarded riches in Antioch.

During the June 1098 Siege of Antioch, a monk named Peter Bartholomew reported that he had a vision in which St. Andrew told him that the Holy Lance was buried in the Church of St. Peter in Antioch. After much digging in the cathedral, Bartholomew allegedly discovered a lance. Despite

doubts, the discovery of the Holy Lance of Antioch inspired the starving Crusaders to break the siege and secure the city.

The Holy Lance, of course, is the very spear that cut into Jesus's side while he was on the cross.

Of course, it's never been found, or the story proven. Regardless, this tiny trinket of a coin speaks volumes of that era, those beliefs, and faith that kept them strong.

Elena and I chatted, made a few sketches, and we were off to the races.

### Ontario cuts gas, fuel taxes for additional year

As part of its plan to help keep costs down for Ontario families and businesses, the government's 2022 Fall Economic Statement will propose legislation that would, if passed, extend the current gas and fuel tax rate cuts to Dec. 31, 2023.

"At a time when inflation has reached the highest levels in over four decades, we know families are feeling the pressure from rising prices on everything from gas to groceries," said Premier Doug Ford. "To continue providing real relief, our government is proposing to extend the gas tax cut for another year to put more money back in peoples' pockets where it belongs."

The proposed extension of the gas and fuel tax rate cuts for an additional year would save Ontario households \$195 on average between July 1, 2022, and Dec. 31, 2023. This extension follows legislation passed this spring that cut the gas tax by 5.7 cents per litre and the fuel tax by 5.3 cents per litre for six months, from July 1, 2022 to Dec. 31, 2022.

The proposed extension to the gas and fuel tax rate cuts builds on the government's other measures to help keep costs down for families and businesses.

The price paid at the pump is made up of the cost of crude oil, wholesale margins, retail margins, federal excise tax, the federal carbon tax, Ontario gasoline/fuel tax and HST.





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# Gowan's longevity, fan support transcends time

Canada's own effervescent "strange animal" is running on pure adrenalin, and a passion for what he does.

Scarborough's native son and international sensation Larry Gowan is an anomaly. It seems the older he gets, the more energy he has. In fact, few can keep up with his bombastic style and a signature sound that never wavers one iota.

He's way better than a fine wine.

Active for 47 years, the rock star just turned 66 and shows no signs of slowing down. In fact, he's doing an Ontario tour, hitting The Rose Brampton in December (therosebrampton.ca). If it's sold out, try to catch him at other venues in southern Ontario.

He's not only proudly Canadian, he's iconic. He owned the charts in 1985 with "A Criminal Mind," and "(You're a) Strange Animal," songs that still get adults singing along when they appear on the radio.

He's the consummate performer, giving you a glance or a nod if you're within sight. His smile is proof that he's having the time of his life. He simply loves it, he's fueled by it.

He sings to his audience, not at them, because he lives through every song, every time he performs it. He says he's always "in the moment" and wants to convey a message, and not just belt out lyrics. A good singer, he notes, makes you believe every word, every note.

After roughly 100 concerts this year touring with legendary Styx, Gowan loves coming home to the smaller, more intimate venues like Rose. He loves the almost club-like atmosphere. He'll be performing with his son, brother and long-time friends and former bandmates.

This show is definitely a must-see, just to get your Gowan "fix."

Local fans can't get enough, something that was evident when he did a series of solo shows at Fallsview in 2010. Fans were coming from all over Ontario and northern New York state, so now Gowan's first studio album with the local tours are on the calendar. He's band. Gowan sings "Fields of the

performing across southern Ontario. He and Styx sell out where ever they

go and the fan base, it seems, is ever increasing. How is this even possible?

Gowan notes it all comes down to music and rock, he says, is the greatest influence of the last half of the 20th century.

During the pandemic, he kept in shape both physically and mentally by reaching out via social media. The tech tools became his friend and he revisited some of his old favourites from a vast catalogue. He got some renewed energy from fans saying just how important music is in their lives.

His "marriage" with Styx seemed like destiny. In 1997, during Styx's tour, Gowan performed as a supporting act for them at Montreal's Molson Centre and Quebec City's Colisée. He noted they clicked right off the bat and all of them have grown together in the past 23 vears.

For those who've seen him perform, his energy is unrivalled. He notes on stage he feels "timeless," but admits he does feel it the next day.

While he doesn't get much down time, he did say his whole life is "time off." Despite a heavy workload he can't complain and enjoys every moment.

He's deeply involved in helping Styx evolve even further and played an integral role in the album released last year. He does have a solo project on the backburner, that's "almost ready to go."

Gowan's 1985 album Strange Animal was his commercial breakthrough in Canada. The album had hit singles like "A Criminal Mind, (You're a) Strange Animal, Guerilla Soldier" and "Cosmetics." That year he won a CASBY Award for most promising male artist

His 1987 Great Dirty World gave him another hit single with "Moonlight Desires." Lost Brotherhood in 1990 gave us "All the Lovers in the World."

In 1998, Gowan was the recipient of the National Achievement Award at the annual SOCAN Awards in Toronto.



Brave" and "More Love for the Money," with that distinctive, signature Gowan sound.

As he glances around the audience during shows for Styx (and his own), fans are getting younger, which is a really great sign that rock has incredible longevity.

Songs like "Strange Animal" seem to transcend time and it's been used in several films, the most recent was Jordan Peele's "Nope." Rumour has it that it may be featured in the coming season of the Netflix hit "Stranger Things."

There's nothing strange about the phenomenon that is Gowan.

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
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# Schomberg resident honoured at Portraits of Giving

Investigators with the York Regional Police Major Collision Investigation Unit are seeking witnesses following the Nov. 11 fatal collision.

"On your way up, always turn around and offer a hand up to the next person," Susan said.







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

#### St. Alban's **By John Arnott**

The Rev. Father Sibbald, parish priest from 1887-1893 on whose watch St. Alban's, Nobleton oldest church was built, also wrote that during his incumbency the Anglican community in Nobleton steadily grew larger and the number of communicants (those taking Holy Communion regularly) tripled. He noted too that "the contributions of the people were most liberal." He also commented as well that the "spirit of kindness has prevailed among all and I cannot speak too highly of the generous, honourable, loyal and upright character of the people of this place."

Rev. Sibbald left the parish in May

fering an Advent study for 4 Fridays 1893 to take temporary charge of St. Luke's Church in Saint John, New Brunswick returning to Ontario in 1895. He apparently then left the ministry for another field of endeavour.

> From mid-1893 until 1906 six priests came and went in the parish and although mainly young experiencing winters in mid York County may have a played a part in their short stays.

> Handsome young Rev. J. E. Gibson took command of Lloydtown Parish first as a lay reader and then after he was ordained in 1906 he was appointed parish priest by Archbishop Sweatman of Toronto of the 3-point parish which included St. Mary Magdalene's, the mother church in Schomberg, St. Alban's, Nobleton and newly built Christ Church, Kettleby. Still a very rural parish served only by narrow unpaved roads some not much more deep rutted muddy lanes barely passable in summer let alone in rainy or snowy weather Father Gibson "took a page from the book" of the first parish priest, Canon Henry Osler and forsook carriage, cart and sleigh in favour of a horse (in his case a retired racehorse) to get him to the church on time.

Father Gibson, after 4 years of faithful and energetic service, left the parish and would later serve as a chaplain in the Canadian Army during World War 1.

The Rev. J.H. Colclough, who followed as rector from 1911 to 1918, guided his parishioners through the heart wrenching years of the First World War when many young men and women of his congregations served their country overseas.

Father Colclough was the first parish priest to have one of Henry Ford's inventions – a car.

My thanks again to our sainted David Knowland for his research and notes.



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



The choir will be singing in full voice and we hope you'll join them!

Witness in the Ruins – a sermon last Sunday on Remberance Day by Rv. Erin Martin:

"This week, we reflect on Remembrance Day and the sacrifices of so many people. I've heard refugees fleeing Ukraine and other war-torn countries say that the fear of living so close

to danger and violence had them conrelative safety, it felt like the end of the world as they knew it.

"People have been anticipating the end since practically the beginning. Asking questions like, 'when is it coming? How will we know? How will it happen. Are all the sufferings of this world a sign?' Every human being shares the same fear - that what we know and what we love; might be torn down one day, gone forever. In those moments we ask 'Where's God in all this?' It's tempting to believe that God has abandoned us in our greatest time of need.

"When the disciples voiced their concerns about the destruction of the temple and what they believed would be the end of the world, Jesus reminded them that whatever they faced, they mustn't be afraid and always believe that God is with them in their suffering. These promises are epitomized in Jesus – because when it looked as though death had won; Jesus was raised from the dead and God's creative work began anew.

"We've got to look at what God's doing in the world and join in – any way we can. There is a lot going on in the world. God is shaking the foundations of what we know and helping us lay the foundations of what is possible. Through it all, remember God is with us.

"When evil and brokenness threaten to tear us down, let's bear witness even in the ruins that what is happening is not death, but birth and that the God who loves us will bring us through to the other side to joy and life."

## Move puts farmland at risk, Greens say






