

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# Few leads in drive-by shooting in Lloydtown

Police have few leads in the Feb. 12 drive-by shooting in Lloydtown.

The victim, a 65-year-old man who was out walking his dog, remains in hospital. He has undergone several surgeries.

York Regional Police officers canvassed the community and accessed surveillance footage. But so far, it has produced few leads. Despite the fact 13 shots were fired and the victim was hit multiple times, police say there is no evidence this was a targeted shooting.

Police released a video of the vehicle fleeing the scene, describing it as a white Lexus, possibly an RS350

Sources say YRP has dumped a ton of resources into

this incident. It looks completely random at this point, but they do have a few small leads and hopefully something will unfold.

Residents remain shaken by the incident.

While there has never been an incident like this in King, car thefts remain a huge problem both here and across York and the GTA.

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



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# OOOOnly Audi repairs single mom's stolen car for free

When you walk through the front door of the OOOOnly Audi Repair Shop in downtown Schomberg, a visitor is struck by the welcoming and hospitable presence of Zoltan Hegedus, who has operated his repair shop for all makes and models of cars since 1981. Comfortable leather seats are all taken by visiting residents, including Joe McDonald, whose friendly 140-pound Mastiff lumbers amid those gathered. The reception area feels like a community hub that gathers customers, neighbours, friends, and family.

Despite this tranquil setting for business and bonding, the Hegedus family has been launched into the glare of a media spotlight in recent weeks since they came to the assistance of a Laval single mom whose car was stolen and significantly damaged by audacious criminals. The thieves – two of which were apprehended on Friday and remain in custody - used her 2011 Audi to smash entrances and store windows at Vaughan Mills Shopping Mall on February 1. When it was mentioned to Zoltan that local residents at a Schomberg Cougars' game described his family's intervention as "the kindest act they've heard of in recent memory," the charming patriarch smiled and said: "We love hearing that neighbors are happy that we were so helpful."

Zoltan's son, Danny, echoed his father's sentiments: "That's nice to hear. That's what makes us feel right about the arrangement to fix Taylor-Anna's Audi. It's great to be recognized for these actions. We're all neighbors in this community."

When asked what motivated the Hegedus family to help the luckless single mom from Montreal, Danny Hegedus noted that "We saw the story in the news and one of the things that caught our interest was that an Audi

was involved. We love working on especially older Audis - so we reached out to Taylor-Anna by social media and we were able to get her 2011 car towed back to our shop. We have a passion for repairing older cars, especially Audis, and we wanted to help her because she was having problems with her insurance coverage. People pay so much for car insurance and when she didn't have theft coverage, we wanted to help. It wasn't her fault. Her car was stolen and taken out of province to commit a crime and then she was told she had to pay out of pocket."

The selfless gesture by the Hegedus family has certainly caught the media's attention and Zoltan Hegedus acknowledged that he has "received emails from people as far away as Latvia and Florida who were happy with how we helped this single mother from Montreal."

Danny also noted that "Taylor-Anna was really in a bind and tried to drive the damaged 2011 Audi back to Montreal. We arranged for delivery of the vehicle back to Schomberg. There was lots of body damage - between \$10,000-15,000 in parts alone. The car is still here. We'll work on it when the parts all come in. Until then, we continue to serve our community customers and go about our business of fixing all makes of cars for local residents."

When informed about two of the perpetrators being held in custody after being caught by police in Ottawa and Montreal, the family declined comment and focused on the plight of Taylor-Anna Zobinger: "It's great to help someone in need."

It's evident that a helpful and hospitable spirit pervades this community hub at 306 Main Street in downtown Schomberg. Taylor-Anna Zobinger would certainly attest to that spirit as her 2011 Audi receives its complimentary repair.

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# How much screen time is too much?

Are you constantly glued to your screens? Even the kids are!

Studies have shown that nearly all children in Canada are exposed to screens by the age of 2 and only 15% of Canadian children aged 3 to 4 years meet screen time guidelines of less than 1 hour per day.

From blue light-emitting devices, such as smartphones and laptops, to our TVs at home — it can be hard to not spend too much time in front of a screen. But how much screen time is too much?

The Canadian Pediatric Society (CPS) recommends the following guidelines for children:

- Children younger than 2 years: No screen time, except for video chatting with family and friends.
- Children ages 2 to 5 years: Limit screen time to less than 1 hour per day of highquality programming, with an adult present to help children understand what they are seeing.
- Children ages 5 to 17 years: Limit recreational screen time to no more than 2 hours per day.

Though there are no hard-and-fast rules for adults, it's still important to maintain a healthy balance with daily

screen time. Not only does blue light from screens affect sleep quality, but too much time in front of a screen can also limit our ability to engage in other activities, such as exercising, socializing, and reading.

So take a break every now and then! The 20-20-20 Rule can be helpful: every 20 minutes, take a 20 second break by looking far away at 20 feet. Get out into nature or have some face-to-face conversations with family and friends vour body and vour eves will thank

# OFA calls for investments in food, farming, rural communities

It's that time of vear again when many of us turn our attention to numbers and columns. For the Ontario government, it means turning its focus to the next provincial budget. As part of that process, they hold consultations to find out what Ontarians feel is important and to get input into where and how different groups and sectors of the economy think budget funding should be allocated.

As President of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture (OFA), I had the chance to give a presentation to the finance and economic affairs committee earlier this month on behalf of the 38,000 farm businesses our organization represents across this province.

There's no denying that our sector is an economic powerhouse. We produce more than 200 different farm, food and floral products, generate nearly 750,000 jobs, and contribute more than \$47 billion annually to the provincial economy. The vast majority of this activity happens in rural areas of the province, which gives us some unique perspectives, opportunities and challenges.

In fact, this past fall, Ontario's Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, Lisa Thompson, announced

the Grow Ontario Strategy where she challenged our sector to increase the production, consumption and manufacturing of Ontario food as well as boost our annual agri-food exports.

The agri-food industry is a major asset to Ontario and it's one that can be maximized with strategic investment - in other words, we're up to the challenge, but support from the provincial government is needed in some very key areas to help us get there.

One of those key areas is physical and social infrastructure, a perennial budget topic.

In rural Ontario, the greatest needs are investments to maintain rural roads, bridges and drainage systems, expanding reliable and affordable broadband internet, upgrading and improving the rural energy grid to enable access to affordable energy, and expanding social infrastructure like local schools and health care. All of these are essential to attracting and keeping people and businesses in rural communities.

We appreciate the provincial government's commitment to 100% internet coverage in Ontario by 2025, and the ongoing investments that are being made to reach this goal. We also encourage the government to continue its expan-

ern and remote community across Ontario to ensure all residents have access to affordable and reliable energy.

One of the greatest investments made this past year by government is the Farmer Wellness Initiative, a mental health support program designed specifically for farmers and their families that is making a positive difference for those in need. This is an investment we would like to see continue, and we believe that it would benefit all to expand it to farm employees as well.

Beyond that, we recommend a continued robust strategy to tackle human resource issues in health care. This means leveraging technology and health innovations, supporting the next generation of health care professionals and continuing to address immediate workforce shortages, including through innovative scope of practice and patient care approaches.

One of the greatest problems facing agriculture right now is the critical shortage of veterinarians - particularly those who specialize in large animals – in rural and northern Ontario. The provincial government has already made some positive investments to address the issue and we encourage continued support for the Collaborative Doctor of Veterinary Medicine in Rural and Northern Community Practice

sion of natural gas lines in rural, north- Program, the Livestock Veterinary Innovation Initiative, and the Veterinary Assistance Program.

Financial incentives for veterinary students and practitioners to practice in rural and remote areas and financial support for clinics would also be of value and help make a difference.

As well, the agri-food sector currently faces unprecedented levels of risk and uncertainty, from inflation and trade and supply chain disruptions to pandemic-related challenges and extreme weather events. The Risk Management Program is a shared premium insurance program between government and industry and increasing the annual investment from \$150 million to \$250 million would help manage that risk, strengthen food security and support growth in the sector.

And finally, not every way to support the sector involves new spending by government. It's great to see the government's recognition of the economic benefits of increasing made-in-Ontario food consumption, and we see a lot of untapped potential in this area. A 10% Ontario grown food procurement policy for government and the broader public sector wouldn't increase the budget, but would add positive economic impact across the food chain.

Investments such as these will grow Ontario.

Please note the Tribunal will only accept filing fee payments by certified cheque or money order.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a by-law to the Ontario Land Tribunal ("OLT"). A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the council or, in the opinion of the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT), there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

Zoning By-law Amendment Application Z-2022-17 amends By-laws 2017-66, 2022-053 and 74-53, as amended by By-law 2005-23. By-law 2023-014 is a By-law to amend Zoning By-law 2022-053 for the Countryside Area of the Township. Specifically, the Amendment concerns lands as identified on Schedules 'A' and 'C' of By-law 2022-053.

By-law 2023-014 amends Section 8.6 of By-law 2022-053 to standardize the language related to the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan and to remove references to site plan approval and Section 41 of the Planning Act. The amendments were initiated by the Township in response to amendments to the Planning Act by Bill 23 for where and how Site Plan Control can be utilized. The amendments are proposed to ensure that the Township continues to fulfill its regulatory responsibility to ensure that development conforms to and is consistent with the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan in accordance with the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Act.

# Plans to mitigate flooding in Kingscross, King City trails, parks

Recent flooding, warmer weather and rain, once again threatened homes on Kingscross and Manitou Drives.

It made for a wet walk on the King City trail and in Doris Patton Park.

Kingscross Ratepayers Association (KRA) recently acknowledged their gratitude that the Township of King has budgeted \$300,000 for work to mitigate the flooding on its property adjacent to some homes. Accumulation of silt in the streams, which run through Kingscross to the East Humber river, makes a significant contribution to the flooding of the watercourses, sections of the King City trail and impedes access from a neighbouring park and

KRA has collaborated with the Township of King, TRCA and Burnside Engineering over the last 2 years to establish a plan to reduce the threat of flooding close to residents wells.

Hopefully, before the end of this win-

ter heavy equipment will be employed in Phase 1 of the plan to restore the natural channels of the streams by removing tonnes of silt. Silt from other locations will be removed in Phase 2.

KRA also noted at a recent meeting of the Township of King Council that flooding is not limited to Kingscross nor is it limited to the spring melt, but rather it occurs year round, even on dry, sunny days. Flooding also impacts access to the King City Trails. Trail access from Doris Patton park and Manitou Drive can often be challenging unless one wears knee-high boots.

The ever increasing water flow across the "wetlands" can make access to the King City trail from Manitou Drive a challenge and no doubt, for the Township when using equipment to maintain the trails clear of long grass in the summer.

KRA has initiated a request for a boardwalk be erected across the wetlands between the King City trail and Manitou Drive.










# Greenhouse operation looking to add Cogen 2 generator

A King agricultural operation received a thumbs-up from King councillors recently, in their bid for expanding their onsite sustainability.

Foothill Greenhouses is a third generation family ownered and operated farm. They grow cucumber and ship roughly 8 million each year.

It's a modern an innovative facility, noted CEO Chris Voorberg, one that has invested in renewable technology. They've been burning wood waste for heat since the 1980s and they capture and recirculate 100% of their irrigation water. They also have two 10kW MicroFit solar installations and built a 3.2 MW cogeneration plant in 2016.

Ontario needs more power and cogeneration facilities help stabilize the grid. Foothill is looking at adding a Cogen

2 to their operation to meet their needs. They're hoping to a 1.4MW, 20-cylinder engine to increase their efficiency and deliver more power. This project will use existing buildings so there's no new construction.

Voorverg noted greenhouses are highly productive but need a lot of heat. The cogeneration engines allow for the production of both heat and power simultaneously. The natural gas fueled engines start up quickly and they're proven to be very useful to meet peak demands.

engine, they capture more value from the process, making it more efficient.

Local entrepreneurs, like Foothill. can help lead the way and generate electricity with the community, reducing the need for large, standalone power plants.

Things like cogeneration are minimally disruptive and the overall aim of reducing the cost of generating cleaner power is critical now and into the future.

Voorberg explained the process we are pursuing is an expansion of their existing cogeneration facility using the same technologies. Currently there is only room on their local distribution station for 1.4MW.

Technically, the electricity is a by-product for them as they're not able to use it for our their electricity needs. They are specifically using the heat generated by the system.

These systems are quiet and unobtrusive, containerized and the company doesn't expect to build any new structures.

"Some view this as a power plant, but it is our perspective that this is simply a more competitive way to generate heat that we need anyway," Voorberg said

"We are strong believers that this technology makes a healthy compromise between fossil fuels and zero-emissions, which gets us closer to emission reduction targets in a cost effective way.

#### Police recover more than 64 stolen vehicles

The York Regional Police Auto Cargo Theft Unit has recovered 64 vehicles valued at \$3.5 million, in the Republic of Malta in southern Europe, and have returned them back to Canada as part of Project Majestic.

Working in partnership with the Canada Border Service Agency (CBSA), the Malta Port Authority and Customs and Equité Association, investigators identified the location of the stolen vehicles, which were inside shipping containers, ready to be sold illegally.


Project Majestic began in early 2021, with members of the Auto Cargo Theft Unit working in collaboration with Toronto Police Auto Theft Suppression Project, the Peel Regional Police Commercial Auto Crime Unit and Peel Regional Police Criminal Investigations Bureaus. Investigators identified a criminal syndicate responsible for stealing high-end vehicles, including Lexus, Toyota and Honda sport utility vehicles, from residential driveways across the Greater Toronto Area (GTA).

The suspects entered the vehicles and reprogrammed ignition computers, allowing them to be driven away utilizing a new key. The vehicles were driven directly to the Port of Montreal or loaded into shipping containers in Toronto and transported to Montreal by rail. The containers were then loaded onto ships and vehicles delivered to buyers in Africa and the United Arab Emirates.

On March 16, 2021, following a two-month investigation, investigators executed eight search warrants across the GTA and in Brossard, Quebec. Between March 2021 and December 2022, more than 70 stolen vehicles were seized, with a value of more than \$4.5 million, in addition to the recently recovered vehicles in Malta, bringing the total number of recovered vehicles to more than 130, valued at \$8 million. Eighteen people have been charged with more than 170 offences, including Conspiracy, Trafficking of Property Obtained by Crime and Theft of a Motor

York Regional Police remains committed to education and enforcement efforts regarding impaired driving and is reminding anyone who drinks and drives that failing or refusing to provide a breath sample when demanded to do so by police is not an effective strategy to avoid a charge and is, in fact, illegal.

In a recent incident on Jan. 24, an officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle in the Township of King. The officer spoke with the driver, noticed the smell of alcohol on the person's breath and formed grounds to suspect the driver had recently been drinking.

The driver was asked to step out of the vehicle and given a demand to provide a sample of his breath into an approved screening device. The officer demonstrated how the screening device was used and that it was functioning correctly.

The driver was given a total of nine attempts to provide a suitable sample of his breath and was warned he would be arrested and charged if he failed to do so. After several explanations, demonstrations and opportunities provided by the officer, it became clear that the driver was intentionally not providing a sample of his breath. He was then arrested and charged with Failure to Comply with Demand. His vehicle was impounded for 7 days and licence suspended for 90 days.

# Addiction Services opens treatment beds in partnership with community groups

GTA residents looking to overcome addiction have an expanded path to recovery thanks to the Aurora-based Addiction Services Central Ontario and community partners.

Addiction Services Central Ontario (ASCO), in partnership with the Krasman Centre and Caritas School of Life, have launched a new pilot program – a newly-opened withdrawal management centre in York Region.

Located in Vaughan, the centre offers six beds and will work with various community leaders to expand service for community members living with substance use concerns, including drop-in programs, peer support, counselling, case management, harm reduction, psychoeducation, and more.

The Centre is funded by Ontario's Addiction Recovery Fund and organizers say its opening "marks an important step in expanding the continuum of equitable, accessible, publicly-funded services" in the communities they

"We're one of the largest providers of addiction services in Ontario and we have been providing a suite of services [such as] counselling, treatment, addictions, medicine, case management, peer support, information, referral, education awareness, and we also provide court support and a very specific program for women who are pregnant and who are at risk of using substances, who might be parenting and are at risk of using substances," says Penny Marrett, Executive Director of Addiction Services Central Ontario. "As part of this, we're saying there's a continuum of services and some people may decide they wish to withdraw or reduce their consumption of substances. They may be able to stay at home, but for others they need that additional support, to have that opportunity to have a stay in withdrawal management centre, also known as 'detox', gives them that [chance]."

The closest detox centres for anyone who lives in York Region or South Simcoe are in Barrie or Toronto, and being able to offer this kind of care closer to home has long been a goal for ASCO and has long been an ask to funders.

That funding came following the Provincial Government's 2021 announcement of the Addictions Recovery Fund,

enabled ASCO to partner with both the Krasman and Caritas to make these six beds a reality.

They can't do it alone, adds Marrett, and The Krasman Centre's peer support organization and Caritas' clinical supports have all come to the table to make this happen.

It's what she describes as a "24/5" service in that it operates Monday through Friday, giving those who avail themselves of the program a chance to figure out their next steps.

"What happens is during those five days they're there is clinicians are all working to help them determine what their next steps will be," she says. "We're not discharging them into oblivion...some people will have decided they want to go to longer-term live-in treatment but they need to be in a detox centre before they can go and be stabilized. Individuals may decide they have supports at home and it's safe for them to go back, or individuals may decide they want to do addictions counselling. They will be at home with a referral to an addictions counsellor like our own

"We have other community agencies we have relationships where we can actually do a warm referral to them so they can then come and pick them up and provide the supports for that next phase in their life. For us, the real important piece is during the five days they have a chance to decide their next step in their recovery and where do they want to go. There's no judgement about where it is, we don't tell anybody where they should be going. What do you want to achieve? What's your goal? How do we support you in reaching that goal?"

The 24/5 structure is the model simply due to current resources, notes Marrett, but they will work to connect people with the supports they need.

"We're really trying to build a program that will be able to offer a number of different things, but right now we don't have the funding to do all of what we want to do, but we're talking and we're hoping to have more funding to be able to do more comprehensive withdrawal management centre. Some people may require more immediate addictions 24/7. We know who has space... because we don't want you to call 10 different places. We keep in touch to know

a fund that is in place for three years. It who has space and then you can decide real importance. This has been a serif that is where you want to take your referral or not."

ASCO and its partners have this funding in place until March 31, 2024 and, during this window, will monitor the number of people served and the services used in order to keep building.

"We suspect six beds aren't going to be enough in the end for our region, but it is a start and that's the important thing for us. We believe that between the number of individuals served and the outputs and the outcomes more generally speaking will demonstrate the vice that even individuals who are clients of ours have been asking for years and years. Some people can afford a private detox but the majority of people can't. For us, part of the continuum is we need to have a publicly-funded withdrawal management centre for individuals who are looking for that service, so we're really pleased to be able to offer it – very excited."



In the 6th end and his last rock Wright removed his opponent's centre stone with an accurate shot that curled


just enough to bring the game within a 1 point advantage for Team Taylor.

It was a night of 3s for the Schomberg Cougars in their 9-5 win over the Midland Flyers on Thursday night at the Trisan Centre. Cougars' Captain Cam Kokelj scored 3 goals including his 30th of the PJHL season.

The Cougars' deadly power play struck for three goals in less than three minutes in the third period, Midland fired three power goals of their own in a wild final frame, and — with the win the Cougars (23-6-2-1) strengthened their hold on third place in the competitive North Carruthers Division.

Cougars Head Coach Stan Kondrotas assessed his team's victory as a "good and bad win. We have a good team, they have a young team, and I expect more from a veteran squad that we have. However, a win is a win at this time of the season and we took advantage of Midland's penalty troubles. I thought we responded really well, especially on the power play when Kokelj scored his third goal of the game in the third period."

With his three-goal outburst versus the Flyers, Kokelj pulled into a tie with Jake Weston of the North Middlesex Stars in the 60-team Provincial Junior Hockey League scoring race. The productive Cougars forward has two games in hand on Weston and currently sits atop the PJHL with 30 goals, 41 assists, 71 points, and a points per game average of 2.29.

Despite the Cougars' impressive statistical evening, they did not get off to a good start versus the Flyers. Midland's Lucas Texmo struck for a pair of goals to stake the visiting Flyers to a 2-0 lead before the mid-way point of the first period, including a power play marker at 8:47 that paced the visitors. However, with Texmo serving a cross-checking penalty at 17:22, the Cougars went to work on the power play. Captain Cam Kokelj scored less than a minute into the Cougars' man-advantage on assists from Luke Miehm and Andrew Hrinco to cut the Flyers' lead to 2-1 at the end of the opening period.

Cougar defenceman Jacob Duggan, assisted by Anthony Roberts and Jordyn Palazzo, pulled the home team even eight minutes into the middle frame. Jacob Futas's timely short-handed goal on Roberts's second assist of the game put Schomberg ahead 3-2 with five minutes to go before second intermission.

The third period featured an offensive lightning strike by the Cougars as they tallied three straight power play goals in just over three minutes to take a commanding 6-2 lead over the Flyers. Austin McKibbon's fifth goal of the PJHL season — in an assist from Zach Gallow — kicked off the fireworks at 3:17. Kokelj tallied the second Cougar power play goal of the period a mere 25 seconds later with help from Carlo Lionti The Cougars' captain completed his hat trick with his 30th of the PJHL season at 5:12 on assists from his prodigious power play partners: Miehm and Lionti. Coach Kondrotas felt the flurry of power play goals "deflated Midland" and Schomberg's Matthew Lychek fired his 11th of the season to put the Cougars up 7-2 with just under six minutes left in the game.

However, a spirited Midland club deployed their own power play. Three consecutive man-advantage markers by Selbie, Graff-Sakasov, and Weatherall in less than seven minutes narrowed the Flyers' deficit to 7-5. The Cougars counterpunched when Anthony Nascimento and Anthony Roberts scored two minutes apart to deliver the margin of victory in the final three minutes of the contest.

Coach Kondrotas credited Nascimento and Roberts for their "timely goals" to finish off the Flyers: "Nasci's was a nice goal. It was step in the right direction for him. We need him scoring to be successful in the playoffs."

The Cougars' next home game is Thursday, Feb. 23 versus Orillia at 7:30 at the Trisan Centre.

To the earliest people fire must have seemed like something from the gods they imagined, with the power to destroy as well as a weapon for hunting and an agent for warmth, light, cooking and making pottery and tools. Thus ash created by fire must be sacred, too. And when it was sprinkled on the dead it acted like a prayer to guide them to life beyond the grave.

"Thou art dust and to dust to thou thou shalt return" is a stark phrase often heard around year as Christians consider upcoming Lent, a time of penitence, reflection and forgiveness. This somber message reminds us that all must die prepared or not. And that if God created the first human from dust then to dust all humanity must all return to await resurrection day. In many writings about repentance and death ash is used with dust or in place it.

This past Wednesday, which marked 46 days before Easter 2023, is commonly known as Ash Wednesday and it begins the solemn church season called Lent.

This custom continues today. Because this is not considered a Sacrament of the church like Holy Communion, lay members of the congregation are permitted to take small sealed packets of blessed ashes home.

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

Listen Be Raised Up and Do Not Fear; sermon by Rev. Erin Martin on the transfiguration of Christ in Matthew 17:

"Before we begin Lent, we hear the story of the transfiguration, that moment on the mountaintop when Jesus was revealed in all his divine glory in front of Peter, James and John. They Contact Pastor Niyazi and/or Irada recognized his divinity in a way they hadn't before. Days leading up to this mountaintop moment had been emotionally charged.

> "Six days before Peter had confessed that he believed Jesus was the Messiah. Then Jesus explained that he'd have to suffer, die and be raised again and Peter refused to believe that, Jesus scolded

him for his lack of understanding. Peter was scared by what Jesus said was going to happen, and uncertain about the future. This was a turning point.

"No, Jesus was going to move toward the terrifying future he'd predicted. They couldn't understand that this future could ultimately be a life-giving. They were half confused and half afraid. We feel the same way. The world we live in is filled with frightening events from earthquakes to an endless war in Ukraine, the cost of living rising. With so much going on, like Peter, we're anxious. But then remember three things that were said on that mountaintop. They can helps re-orient

"The first was the voice of God saying, 'Listen to him.' In a time when the voices of leaders, companies and consumers, peacemakers and hatemongers are bombarding us, we're reminded that the voice we should listen to is the voice of Jesus calling us to love and life. When everything is chaotic, I remember God is speaking words of wisdom and truth.

"To understand God is to look to Jesus and listen to him. The second thing to pay attention to is Jesus's command to 'Get up.' It really means 'be raised up.' Or be resurrected. God's commands also usually carry with them the power to fulfill the command – we can hear in these words a call to action that GIVES us the energy and will to act, to be doing the works of mercy and compassion to which God calls us.

"Third, was the promise: 'Do not be afraid.' These are words perhaps never more needed than now. The threat of economic collapse or ruin, the potential for illness or injury, unexpected loss, the list goes on. To all these fears, the Gospel reply is the same: Because God is God of the past, present, and future, we do not need to fear. When we trust God we need not fear. God did not create us for death but for resurrection, and God doesn't want us to be afraid but to move forward with courage and confidence. Listen. Be raised

"The story continues with the promise that God raised him from the dead so that all of us could have hope that there is more to this life than we can see, that love and life are stronger than hate and death. As we come down the mountain with Jesus, As we go forward to be God's beloved children in this world I pray we'll remember to listen, be raised up and not to fear."

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
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
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
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
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
