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## **Auditor General deems Greenbelt** changes benefit certain developers

The selection of lands removed from the Greenbelt by the Province was both "biased" and "dismissive," according to Ontario's Auditor General.

Bonnie Lysyk released her report on changes to the greenbelt last week, criticizing the government and its

"Provincial government actions in 2022 to open parts of the Greenbelt for development failed to consider environmental, agricultural and financial risks and impacts, proceeded with little input from experts or affected parties. and favoured certain developers/landowners," Auditor General Bonnie Lysyk said in the special report.

Lysyk also noted that the owners of the 15 land sites removed from the Greenbelt could ultimately see more than an \$8.3 billion increase to the value of their properties.

"The exercise to change the Greenbelt boundaries in fall 2022 cannot be described as a standard or defensible pro-

cess," Lysyk stated. "The truncated and highly restricted land selection exercise excluded substantive input from land-use planning experts in provincial ministries, municipalities, conservation authorities, First Nations leaders, and the public, while giving preferential treatment to certain developers with direct access to the Chief of Staff to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing."

The audit found that:

• The government's target to increase housing did not require removing land from the Greenbelt. According to the government's Housing Affordability Task Force and the Chief Planners of the three affected regions (Durham, Hamilton and York), the removal of Greenbelt land sites was not needed to meet the government's housing goals. In fact, in late October 2022, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (Housing Ministry) had already allocated housing targets to regions to build 1.5 million homes, before land sites were approved for removal from the Greenbelt.





• Political staff had substantial control over the entire Greenbelt amendment exercise. The Housing Minister's Chief of Staff provided a small team of non-political public service staff in the Housing Ministry the criteria to be used in the selection process, directed the team to alter the criteria to facilitate the selection of many sites provided by the Chief of Staff, and imposed a three-week timeline and confidentiality provisions, limiting the team's time and ability to assess the land sites and provide alternatives.

· Even though hundreds of site removal requests had been submitted to the Housing Ministry since the Greenbelt was established in 2005, only 22 land sites were considered in the 2022 selection exercise. Of those, only one was proposed by the Housing Ministry's non-political public service staff, while 21 were provided directly by the Housing Minister's Chief of Staff. Of the 15 land sites ultimately approved for removal in Dec. 2022, 14 were brought into the exercise by the Housing Minister's Chief of Staff and one was identified by the Housing Ministry's non-political public service staff.

• About 67% (4,900) of the approximately 7,400 acres ultimately removed from the Greenbelt are on two land sites for which information was given by two developers to the Chief of Staff in September 2022 at an industry function they all attended. One of these developers subsequently provided information on the removal on three additional land sites, one of which related to a third developer. Overall, 92% (6,800) of the approximately 7,400 acres ultimately removed from the Greenbelt related to five land sites involving three developers.

 Greenbelt removals were approved without full consideration of environmental and agricultural risks, and were inconsistent with the vision, goals and processes of the Greenbelt Plan to provide important natural features and agricultural land with permanent protection, as well as previous amendments to the Greenbelt boundary. The 2022 boundary changes removed almost 1,000 acres of wetlands and woodlands from the Greenbelt. As well, the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs indicated that about 83% of the area removed is classified as prime agricultural land, having the highest quality and capability for agriculture.

• Restrictions on the Housing Ministry's non-political staff team precluded an assessment of the cost to add needed infrastructure to each of the land sites proposed for removal, how the costs would be apportioned between the public and private sectors, or whether the affected municipalities would even allow those lands to be developed if the removals proceeded.

· While additions were made to the Greenbelt to offset lands removed, 2,400 of the added acres are areas typically already protected and largely undevelopable, and do not contribute agricultural land protection – a core objective of the Greenbelt Plan. Further, although 7,000 acres of the Paris Galt Moraine were added as offsets, the Housing Ministry had recommended a larger portion be added to encompass important natural features and agricultural land. Additions to the Greenbelt were necessary to offset removals because the Greenbelt Act, 2005, prohibits a reduction in the Greenbelt Area.

"While the people of Ontario deserve prompt action to solve societal problems like those generated by a need for housing, this does not mean that government and non-elected political staff should sideline or abandon protocols and processes that are important to guide objective and transparent decision-making based on sufficient and accurate information," Lysyk added.

Tim Gray, executive director of Environmental Defence, said the lands must now be returned to the Greenbelt and legislation introduced to protect it from future attacks, as well as to protect other farms and forests from speculative developers. The decision to remove the specific lands should be revisited.

"The Auditor General's report confirms that lands were removed from the Greenbelt as a favour to particular sprawl developers to enable them to make up to \$8.3 billion in windfall profits by building on land meant to be protected forever. Shockingly, this occurred despite clear and abundant evidence that lands in the Greenbelt are not required to meet Ontario's housing supply needs," Gray said.

"There are 59,000 hectares of land designated for development in the GTAH alone, without including the 3,000 hectares, removed from the Greenbelt. If some of lands were developed at even the modest densities of Toronto's Trinity-Bellwoods neighbourhood, only 15,000 hectares would be consumed by the population projected for the region by 2051.

Gray also argued there are also fixed supplies of materials and labour available for home building. Focusing them on creating low density sprawl means less can be made available to build the communities we need inside of our towns and cities.

"Ontarians know that we can build homes in cities and towns where we already have services and where public transit and walkability lead to lower costs and higher quality of life. In fact a new public opinion poll conducted by Environics for the Alliance for a Livable Ontario shows that 83 per cent of Ontario residents want homes built within cities and towns where services exist – and not on the Greenbelt. They also do not find the Ontario government credible on the issue of land supply and housing.

"The Ontario government is on the wrong side of the views of almost all Ontarians except for its developer friends. It needs to stop pushing forward senseless environmental destruction and focus on getting homes built where they are needed, and at prices people can afford.

"Now that Ontarians can see the full picture of what has occurred with the Greenbelt, immediate actions are necessary. These include:

"Full investigation of the relationship between the provincial government and development industry by the

"Lands removed from the Greenbelt must be returned immediately and the Greenbelt boundary legislatively protected.

"The Greenbelt should be expanded to protect much more of southern Ontario's farmland.

"City and town boundary expansion should only be permitted after it can be proven that there are no more opportunities for building within the existing boundaries.

"The Ontario and the federal governments must get back into the business of directly creating affordable housing."

"The finding that just two developers own 92 per cent of the property excised from the Greenbelt and stand to gain \$8.3 billion in profit from this land swap is extremely disturbing. And to have confirmation that a high-level staffer was giving preferential treatment to select developers, even letting the developers directly suggest parcels for excision. This is putting 1000 acres of wetlands and woodlands in jeopardy in southwestern Ontario, where the historical rate of wetland loss has been among the highest in Canada. It is shocking," said Dr. Rebecca Rooney, wetland ecologist and professor at University of Waterloo.

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

## No news is bad news for Canadians, CAJ says

The Canadian Association of Journalists (CAJ) calls on Meta to reverse its reckless, ill-advised decision, announced yesterday, to soon prevent Canadians from viewing or sharing news articles on its Facebook and Instagram platforms.

The Canadian Association of Journalists is the country's largest professional organization that serves to advance the interests of journalists from coast to coast. The CAJ's primary roles are public-interest advocacy work and professional development for its members.

"Democracy cannot flourish, let alone exist, without its citizens having access to accurate and quality information to help them make important decisions about how to live their lives," said Brent Jolly, president of the CAJ.

It's a chilling irony that after Facebook and Instagram have extracted so much wealth from Canadian communities, their parent company has chosen this nuclear option in response to laws allowing news publishers, big and small, to negotiate with them for fair compensation for the hard work of Canadian journalists.

Meta declaring that it would remove access to news on its platform is not without precedent. In 2021, for example, the company temporarily cut off access to news for users in Australia in response to the country's News Media Bargaining Code. Within a week, the California-based social media company reversed course and began to negotiate with news organizations.

"For more than a decade, journalism has been engaged in a complicated and unbalanced relationship with tech platforms," Jolly said. "It is our hope that cooler heads will prevail and all parties will engage in good-faith efforts to implement a regulatory framework that supports freedom of information and reflects the critical role journalism plays in keeping Canadians informed of decisions that affect their everyday lives."

How did we get here?

In June, the federal government enacted Bill C-18, the Online News Act, which would compel tech platforms to negotiate with news organizations for financial remuneration for news content shared on their platforms. A report published by the Parliamentary Budget Office last year estimated the Online News Act would bring in over \$300 million annually for Canadian news organizations.

Shortly after the bill received Royal Assent, however, Meta and Google responded swiftly and with an iron fist. Meta announced it was unfriending

news organizations, from publishers as large as CBC-Radio Canada and The Canadian Press to smaller players, such as The Tyee and CHEK News. It also unilaterally cancelled licensing deals and other pre-existing financial agreements with news organizations. Google, for its part, has said it plans to eventually end agreements with news organizations and restrict Canadians' access to Google News and Showcase pages.

"It is extremely troubling that the moment these private companies are subjected to democratic oversight, and other collective bargaining obligations, their immediate reaction is to set fire to their lofty and long-held rhetoric about building an informed public," Jolly said. "Like any autocratic government, these powerful tech giants are limiting freedom of speech and thought to get their way."

We note there is little chance of unanimous thinking with regards to the potential impacts of the Online News Act, particularly across our association's diverse membership. That said, the CAJ strongly believes Google, Meta and other social media platforms must play a role in strengthening journalism in Canada.

While critics of the legislation have frequently labelled the Online News Act as a "link tax," one factor that is seldom discussed in greater detail is the reality that tech platforms are currently using news content, produced by journalists, to train artificial intelligence models in order to compete for the trillions of dollars in potential AI revenue.

With the actions Google and Meta are taking in Canada, they are showing the world that they are willing to limit a nation's access to information rather than risk current and future revenue.

'What has become obvious is Meta and Google refuse to provide fair compensation for the news content on their platforms that is integral to their business models despite the fact that every country in the world that respects copyright has laws around payment for use of content," Jolly said.

"Radio stations pay to play songs. Broadcast news organizations buy video to use in newscasts. Newspapers pay photographers for their photos. Tech platforms should not be exempt from paying for content that feeds algorithms and helps their bottom line."

What happens next?

In the coming weeks, the federal government will be publishing important details that will be critical to establish a fair and transparent regulatory process. This exercise will have a consid-

erable impact on shaping the future of Canada's journalistic and information ecosystem.

While Meta has said it is not interested in participating in the process, this does not change the fact that Canadians have the fundamental right to a free press. Governments, similarly, have the obligation and the right to create policies that will support journalism.

Ottawa has responded to these threats from tech platforms by pulling government advertising dollars from Meta, an action that has been re-doubled by media organizations, labour groups, and other provincial governments alike.

If Canada is truly keen to lead the world in this stare-down with Google and Meta, a two-track approach is needed.

The first is a longer-term task that will address the need for Canada to undertake a comprehensive review of its copyright laws, such as the one recently undertaken by the European Union. Around the world, governments and individual lawmakers are only beginning to understand the sweeping changes coming from the exponential growth of generative artificial intelligence.

Second, and more pressing, is the need for Ottawa to ensure that the regulations associated with the Online News Act are implemented fairly, equitably and transparently.

The CAJ maintains that any financial remuneration extracted from tech platforms be directed towards expanding the number of editorial positions available in what are rapidly-contracting Canadian newsrooms. The public interest is best served through the production of more public service journal-

"Our message to the federal government is simple: Don't back down or cave into pressure tactics," said Jolly.

"Platforms will, no doubt undertake complex strategies to seek exemptions, particularly as it relates to small, startup, BIPOC-led news organizations. Foreign-owned tech companies, however, cannot be allowed to dictate winners and losers when it comes to the right to know of Canadians. The eyes of the world are looking to Canada to see how this process plays out."

## What is an Official Plan?

The Our King Official Plan is an important planning policy document that establishes a comprehensive set of policies to guide growth and development, land use change, ensure environmental conservation and promote restoration and enhancement, advance economic development activities, promote heritage conservation, and guide infrastructure. The Township's current Official Plan was approved in 2020 and has a planning horizon to

The Our King Official Plan consists of a combination of policies, maps, and schedules that identify where different land uses will occur, where municipal services and infrastructure will be needed, and how growth will be accommodated. The Township's Official Plan Review will guide growth within King to the planning horizon of 2051.

## Why Are We Reviewing the Official Plan?

The Planning Act prescribes certain provincial and regional conformity requirements for municipal Official Plans. Municipalities are required to update their Official Plans at least ten years after it comes into effect and then every five years thereafter. Municipalities are also required to amend their Official Plans within one year to conform to the Official Plan of an upper-tier municipality. The Our King Official Plan is due for a review to:

- Align with recent changes in provincial policy and legislation.
- Conform to the York Region Official Plan (2022). Ensure the vision for King continues to meet the Township's evolving needs.
- Following a presentation from staff at the Special Council Meeting, community members will be invited to share

ideas that should be explored as part of this Review. This is the first of many opportunities residents and stakeholders will have to participate.

## On the road again, tips for travelling with your dog

Here we are half-way through summer already, and many of us are going on holidays, road trips and to cottages. Here are a few tips to keep your dog safe and comfortable on the drive and when you get to your holiday destination.

Safety first: Make sure your dog is wearing a seatbelt. Harnesses are available at most pet stores and they're a great investment in the safety of both your dog and the human travelers, too.

Make sure to travel with a collapsible water bowl and make sure you take regular breaks at least every two hours. If

you're running in to a service center, try to park in the shade and leave the windows open a few inches. Cars heat up very quickly in the sun. A quick sidebar here: If your dog does become overheated, it's important to cool them down with lukewarm water as cold water can lead to shock.

If your dog is very excitable, a little children's Gravol goes a long way to keep them calm in the car, which makes the trip easier on everyone. And cute as it is, please don't let them hang out of the car window as you drive. They can be hit by debris and are more likely to get eye and ear infections.

Being prepared is key: Make sure your dog is tagged with your contact information - even the best behaved dogs can wander in unfamiliar surroundings, and many rural areas don't have the required tower infrastructure to make air-tags and other devices reli-

If you can, bring a large bottle of the water from home that they are used to drinking, it'll be easier on their stomachs. If you're staying away a long time, switch to local water is stages by mixing it with the water you brought. Also, pack the crate and a few favourite chew toys: many Air B & Bs insists that unattended dogs be crated, and it also provides a familiar and safe environment for them at your destination.

Lastly, Benadryl should be packed in case of insect bites.

Once you're there, let your dog have a supervised explore of the new surroundings on a retractable leash. Let them stretch their legs and get some exercise, and then have them calm down completely before their first meal. An unrested dog is more prone to bloating and twisted gut syndrome than a calm, rested one.

Do some exploring yourself - if you're in a rural setting look for poison ivy and poison oak and make sure your dog stays away from them. If you're near water, let your dog decide how interested they are in swimming: some dogs just don't like water and that's ok!

Make sure your dog is introduced to any local humans around the property, and ask said humans about whether there are local skunks, porcupines, coyotes or foxes. These things are best avoided in the first place to prevent unscheduled vet visits. And by the way, to-

mato juice doesn't work on skunk stink - but a mixture of Palmolive, baking soda and peroxide sure does. You heard it here first.

## MPP says strike threat 'unfair' By Mark Pavilons **Editor**

King-Vaughan MPP and Education Minister Stephen Lecce says the threatened strike action by elementary teachers is "unfair."

"Our government has been bargaining in good faith, meeting over 170 times with all education unions, and are focused on securing a deal that keeps kids in class, provides parents with stability, and treats educators fairly," he said.

"Threatening another strike and creating anxiety for parents and students just weeks before the start of the school year is unnecessary and unfair.


"After private mediation was rejected by teachers' unions to reach deals, we are available to meet every day to negotiate a deal that keeps students in class and improves the outcomes of students. I believe by staying at the table, we can and will reach a deal that keeps kids learning in classrooms where they belong."

The Elementary Teachers' Federation of Ontario (ETFO) will hold in-person meetings to conduct central strike votes and address bargaining issues. These all-member meetings will be held across the province from mid-September to mid-October.

Bargaining has stalled at ETFO's Education Worker Central Table. At its Teacher/Occasional Teacher Central Table, ETFO has repeatedly tried to get the government to talk about important issues like improved supports for students with special needs, violence in schools, compensation, fair and transparent hiring practices, workload and working conditions, and smaller class sizes. The government has refused to engage in any meaningful discussions about these education

"ETFO members have been without an agreement for almost a year. They have been patient, but their patience has run out. We need the Ford government to take bargaining seriously and to act in good faith, as required by law," notes ETFO President Karen Brown. "ETFO's goal is to reach fair and reasonable agreements without having to take job action. We need the government's full attention on bargaining so we can address pressing concerns in public education."

Holding a central strike vote is one part of the legal bargaining process established under Ontario labour laws. Details about ETFO collective bargaining and upcoming strike votes are available at etfocb.ca.

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

## **On-farm Climate Action Fund**

The Ontario On-Farm Climate Action Fund (OFCAF) has supported projects on over 130,000 acres of farmland since launching in 2022.

The OFCAF provides cost-share funding to farmers to support the implementation of best management practices (BMPs) that tackle climate change through reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and supporting increased carbon sequestration. This competitive program allocated over \$22 million in cost-share funding to successful applications during the 2022 and 2023 intake periods.

"We are pleased to share the success volved supporting projects by farmers who want to invest in soil health to improve long-term productivity, profitability and sustainability," said Steve Sickle, Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association (OSCIA) president. "The strong demand for funding is evidence that Ontario farmers are motivated to contribute to climate change mitigation to help Canada meet national greenhouse gas emission reduction targets and protect the environment."

The program was very popular with farmers across Ontario; OSCIA received over 2,700 applications to the OFCAF. Funding was available to farmers under the categories of nitrogen management, cover cropping and rotational grazing, and supports those activities when they are new to the acres they were practiced on.

Projects focused on nitrogen man-

agement, including nitrogen management planning, equipment for improved application and the use of urease and nitrification inhibitors, have been implemented on over 86,000 acres.

Projects to plant cover crops and intercrop have been implemented on over 50,000 acres, and intensive, short duration rotational grazing projects represent over 5,500 acres. The implementation of on-farm projects will continue through 2023.

"As leaders in their industry, Ontario producers are embracing the proactive actions recommended by of the program thus far, which has in- OFCAF to mitigate the effects of climate change on the environment and their operations," said Marie-Claude Bibeau, federal minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food. "The success of OFCAF's projects demonstrates that, together, producers are preparing for climate change resiliency while building a sustainable, competitive agriculture sector."

Since 2022, in-person and online KSEs have been hosted by over 30 different agricultural organizations, including OSCIA. These events will continue throughout 2023 to enable knowledge sharing beyond farmers that received direct program funding.

In Ontario, the OFCAF is delivered to farmers by OSCIA with funding provided by Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada. The fund is part of the Government of Canada's Agricultural Climate Solutions Initiative.

he will miss his daily interactions with customers, he is looking forward to "not being on a schedule. I'm ready to have a little bit more freedom. I've worked every Saturday for my whole life, but I wouldn't change a thing."



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## Local businessman has 'epic' cycling adventure

A local entrepreneur marked his 65th birthday in epic fashion.

Rory MacKinnon, owner of the Schomberg McDonald's, decided to take a bike tour of Europe with a long-time friend who also turned 65.

The tour was organized by a company called Peak Tours out of England. They specialize in supported Bike and Walking tours in the UK, France, and Spain/Portugal. They came highly recommended, MacKinnon said.

"Many of our tour group had 'causes' they were supporting by taking on the challenge. One lady who was recovering from an horrendous crash three years ago and was supporting her recovery by giving back to the local Health Team in West Sussex that contributed to her getting back on a bike and supporting her return to mental health. Very inspiring," he said.

The group travelled 1,000-plus miles (1,632 km.) of climbing over 14 days.

MacKinnon said they learned early into the tour that this is quite an iconic adventure for folks from the U.K. it is a definite must -do for biking enthusiasts. Also, the UK is very "lumpy," he observed.

"We passed through so many small towns and country homes. Scotland was particularly spectacular. One day we rode up all the way to the top of the Glen Shee highlands (very tough climb) then we had a 15-mile descent into the Balmoral estate right past the Queen's Summer home and through the Royal forests and along the river Dee ending in Ballater. It was epic!"

Physically, it was a challenge. MacKinnon noted that after having both hips replaced in the winter of 2020, "this trip became one of my goals for recovery.

"I was determined to keep my mobility. Last year I rode over 6,000 km. both virtually (during the winter) and with local club rides. This year I had over 3,000 km before I set of for the tour. Still, 14 days straight in a saddle is both tiring and punishing. Thankfully, it was not a race."

The scenery and frequent "brew stops" and lunches, were all fantastic, he said.

"We all found our own groups that met our pacing for each day. Everyone in our group finished, despite many setbacks. No one abandoned the tour out of all 22 participants. Six rode e-Bikes.

MacKinnon said unfortunately it rained 12 of the 14 days.

"That being said, anyone who spends a lot of time on a bike knows you have to like and accept rain as part of the sport. The winds were not always in our favour and I prefer rain to wind and hot any day.

"There were 2 days of strong deadwinds, torrential rain and lots of climbing and everyone suffered. After a hot shower and a warm pub meal – all was forgiven."

The camaraderie was impressive



and MacKinnon said the people they met along the way were fantastic.

"Drivers on the roads very courteous and respectful. Many stories of people helping out with flats and a farmer coming out to help with a wrench when a tire valve would not be removed. Peak Tours folks were over the top when it came to care and support."

Overall this was an epic adventure.

"I have always believed that whatever challenge you face – forward momentum is the answer. Certainly one of those challenges that you can't wait to complete – but when it is done you are left with a sense of accomplishment but also sadness that it is over. Definitely a great way to celebrate 65 and onwards!"

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## Fiscal update shows government's plan is working

the 2023-24 First Quarter Finances, the first update on the province's economic and fiscal outlook since the 2023 Budget: Building a Strong Ontario.

Overall, this update demonstrates the government's plan is working, as Ontario's economy has remained resilient through heightened economic and geopolitical uncertainties. Despite the resiliency of Ontario's economy so far in 2023, the province is not immune to any potential economic slowdown.

"The First Quarter Finances report shows that our government's targeted, responsible approach is the right plan to build and support growing communities across Ontario," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "The people of Ontario can have confidence that this government is making responsible decisions to deliver on our Plan to Build by supporting people and businesses today while laying a strong fiscal foundation for future generations."

The report provides updated information about Ontario's economic and fiscal outlook primarily as of June 30, for the 2023-24 fiscal year.

In the first calendar quarter of 2023, Ontario's real gross domestic product (GDP) increased by 1.0 per cent, supported by growth in exports and household spending. This follows a slight decline of 0.2 per cent in the fourth quarter of 2022. As of the first quarter, Ontario's real GDP stood 4.9 per cent higher than the pre-pandemic level in the final quarter of 2019. Since the 2023 Ontario Budget, private-sector forecasters have raised their GDP projections for 2023, reflecting better-than-expected economic performance so far this year. Expectations for GDP growth however have declined for 2024, due to the impact of Bank of Canada's rapid policy interest rate increases – the fastest rise in the key policy interest rate since 1981 - and continued economic uncertainty.

As of the 2023-24 First Quarter Finances, the province's 2023-24 deficit is projected to be \$1.3 billion - unchanged from the outlook published in the 2023 Ontario Budget. Revenues in 2023-24 are projected to be \$204.4 bil-

The Ontario government released 2023, and since the 2023 Ontario Budget lion, and expenses are projected to be infrastructure, train and recruit skilled \$204.7 billion, largely unchanged from the budget projections. New investments, funded from existing contingencies, include supports for Ontario's manufacturing sector, policing and anti-crime initiatives, and municipal infrastructure.

"Ontario's population is growing, jobs are being created and we are attracting investments in communities across the province," added Minister Bethlenfalvy. "To support these growing communities, our government will continue with its plan to build critical workers and provide people with the services they need."

Overall program expenses in 2023-24 are projected to be \$190.6 billion, largely unchanged from the outlook presented in the 2023 Ontario Budget. New commitments announced since the release of the 2023 Ontario Budget are primarily funded through existing contingencies within the fiscal plan.

The government plans to provide its next economic and fiscal update as part the 2023 Ontario Economic Outlook and Fiscal Review by Nov. 15.

## Southlake garage fire had ripple effect for emergency response team

Southlake Regional Health Centre is still assessing the damage stemming from an alleged arson in their parking garage on July 20 which resulted in a 28-year-old Vaughan man charged with arson and two counts of assault on a police officer.

But, thanks to a quick response from the Southlake team, the cascading impacts resulting from the fire kept the impact on patients and operations to a minimum.

"As a 24/7, 365 critical facility, we obviously have an emergency management system that allows us to respond to various incidents that might pose a threat to our business operations and I think what was unique (about July 20) was the requirement to respond to multiple simultaneous incidents,' says John Marchman, Vice President of Capital Facilities and Business Development for Southlake Regional Health Centre. "I think ... the training we put in place and the systems we put in place were really what we relied upon to get ourselves through it."

The team was notified of the incident at 9.45 p.m.

As Central York Fire Services and York Regional Police responded to the fire in the parking garage, Southlake's emergency personnel and others were focused on addressing issues within the building related to the incident.

"We immediately implemented a Code Grey Air Exclusion, effectively a procedure to lock down outside air going into the building to prevent any entrainment from that air and those contaminants from getting into our patient spaces and causing issues that way," says Marchman.

on the sixth floor as a pressure relief valve gave way and unleashed a "substantive" amount of water that infiltrated the five floors beneath.

This flooding, in turn, hit a telecom room, taking down the phone system.

"We have a fire that is being responded to in our parking garage, and [that's] obviously unavailable and a key resource for patients and staff to access the site," says Marchman. "We have a flood, which requires response to each of six different areas to mitigate the source, to assess and contain any water that has infiltrated into those other spaces. With our phone system ... having to respond now to re-mapping our entire communications protocols ... and establish downtime procedures ... to ensure that not only can we communicate internally between those key functions and also to communicate it to the outside world.'

Gayle Seddon, Director of South-

lake's Ontario Community Health Team, likened both healthcare and the response to what Southlake's Derek Rowland described as "the perfect storm" of issues as a "team sport" where everyone needs to communicate.

The phone system, she says, was critical to operations, keeping doctors in the loop on patients, communicating test results, and ensuring families can connect with our loved ones.

"Our coms team sent out a lot of information on social to tell people our phones were down so families and staff didn't get worried," she says. "Another important thing is with our partner organizations, if you have a heart attack in your home, you need to get to Southlake's cardiac team as quickly as possible and there is a phone call to make that happen. We quickly flipped to our downtime procedures - all our partners in the EMS knew what that number was. Should anyone be unfortunate enough in the community to have a heart attack, we were perfectly ready to provide the care they need."

Helping to steady the ship was Johnny Grajcar, the hospital's Director for Support Services, who jumped in as the security lead. Assembling the team in 45 minutes, there were two key tasks at the outset: assessing the current situation and "figuring out how to mobilize the various areas" - and some of the learnings from the pandemic helped, he says.

"It was having the virtual teams to speed up the process and not have any delays," he says. "We had our calls both clinical and on the facilities side join in. From that point, we were able to establish what are the critical piec-While this was underway, they were es we needed to do right now to ensure also notified of a flood in their systems safety for our staff, but primarily for our patients."

It was a winning formula to what is hoped to be a one-off event.

The team is proud that the Southlake Emergency department remained open throughout and the hospital was never on re-direct.

"Within 45 minutes, we were assembled on site and able to leverage the structure to direct what was obviously a multi-faceted response, including the appropriate security and facilities personnel to manage the interface with Fire Services; the entire team of environmental service workers to respond to six different locations along with facilities operations personnel to make sure the water was contained, to make sure we were able to establish or solve the problem at the source, and ensure any issues with our clinical operations were clearly understood so the team could put together their response," says Marchman.



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## Pro ID camp attracts European soccer coaches

The International FC Academy and six instructors from Italy, Switzerland, and Uruguay put 300 Canadian youth soccer players through their paces at IFC's annual Summer Pro ID Camp on the turf fields of McNaughton Park in Maple. The five-day camp ran from July 31 to August 4.

According to IFC Media Director Alf De Blasis, it featured "youth academy instructors from Swiss, Italian, and Uruguayan pro clubs who helped conduct the identification and development camp with the prospect of selecting elite talent for professional trial opportunities in Europe or South America."

The star power of the ID camp's instructors was impressive. It included "International Guest Coaches Marco Bracco and Roberto Morosini (UC Sampdoria, Italy); Teodoro Palatella and Dario Marinoni (FC Lugano, Switzerland); Alvaro Moyano, Club Atletico Peñarol (Uruguay); and Alessio Mizzoni, Frosinone (Italy)."

Forsinone U17 Coach Alessio Mizzoni - with IFC Co-Founder and Technical Director Giuseppe Mattace Rasa serving as our affable interpreter—extolled the virtues and noted the limitations of the McNaughton Turf Fields in Maple: "The fields are nice and advanced. The only difference is the absence of a clubhouse that would provide change rooms for the players and coaches.

In Italy, the clubhouse has the change rooms but, most importantly, provides a social aspect for the team. Clubhouses are symbolic places."

Despite the lack of a traditional clubhouse at McNaughton Field, Coach Mizzoni was otherwise impressed with the camp, especially the caliber of players from Vaughan in attendance. He confirmed that many of the players on the IFC side of the camp are profession-

al prospects: "Absolutely. Yes - not only in this camp, but at another camp back in 2018. Some of the IFC players we identified five years ago are already in Italy and playing professionally."

The best part of this year's ID camp, according to Coach Mizzoni, is "the concentrated period of time we have so players can learn the cultural differences in the game. I like to see the satisfaction of the players as they respond positively to our training methods." The emphatic and friendly instructor also mentioned that the best part of teaching Canadian soccer players is that "they are exceptional athletes, they can be pushed very hard, and they respond very well to hard work in these camps."

Mizzoni added that the athletes on the field were "very disciplined" and he felt that "this would help them absolutely on and off the field as professional athletes during the 90 minutes of the game and after the game is over." When asked how much of a jump there is between Canadian soccer to Italian soccer, the diplomatic Italian coach acknowledged that "It's a big jump. We follow a grand integration scheme to train our players from Canada. The difference isn't only technical, but it's psychological, imaginative, and cultur-

When asked about Frosinone's prospects for team success this coming year in Serie A and in the U17 League, Coach Mizzoni expressed a range of goals for the two teams: "Our goal in Serie A is to keep the category. It's one of the best leagues in the world and we need to stay in the A division. For my U17 team, our team results are secondary as our job is to prepare individual players for the big team."

Based on this ID Camp and its caliber of on-field coaches, it appears that International FC Academy is doing a great job preparing individual players for its affiliated Italian pro soccer

club Frosinone. Conducting a high Final Four at this past school year's level soccer camp in the sport's GTA YRAA Tier 1 Senior Boys Soccer Chamhotbed makes a great deal of sense for both IFC and a Serie A Club like Frosinone.

Dozens of YRAA Soccer Championship banners hang in the high school gyms of the five traditional soccer powerhouses in Vaughan - next door to McNaughton Park at St. Joan of Arc CHS in Maple; at St. Elizabeth CHS in Concord; and at Fr. Bressani CHS, St. Jean de Brebeuf CHS, and Holy Cross Catholic Academy in Woodbridge. In fact, three of these schools made the

pionship – Holy Cross, St. Elizabeth, and St. Jean de Brebeuf—and the Holy Cross Hawks inscribed their name on the 2022-23 championship trophy plate.

#### **All Saints Anglican Church** By Patrick Gossage

Walking on water – a sermon by Patrick Gossage on the Gospel story in Matthew 14.

"This miracle story is one of those little drama that stars Jesus and forces us to accept the very real powers of the son of God. He has just fed 5,000 with a very small amount of loaves and fishes. Then this. At the end of today's reading, the takeaway is strong:

"And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. 33 Then those who were in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

"For some, the miracle stories of the feeding of the 5,000 and walking on water strain our credulity. God's absolute power over nature was long just assumed. And his amazing interventions on behalf of the Israelites are fundamental story lines in the Old Testament. Praying to God for a good harvest was normal in earlier times.

"But if the major miracle stories in the Gospels simply reaffirmed that Jesus was God, then that kind of power goes with it. End of story. Either we believe he was God with all the attendant powers or not.

"The Gospel miracles, bringing back people from the dead, healing the sick, walking of water etc. and the promise of life after death as well as Christ's own resurrection. were key selling points for the early churches' proselytizing. Especially by Paul who was a Roman Citizen. They were very effective.

"In 325, Constantine called the Council of Nicaea, which was a gathering of over 300 Christian leaders to determine the orthodox – beliefs of Christianity. The result was the Nicene Creed, which laid out the agreed upon beliefs of the council, including that God and Jesus were one entity. The dominance of the Roman religion though the middle ages was the result.

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



We are anticipating a surge of new listings in the fall which should result in a more balanced market

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## SKY HIGH PRICES & LOW INVENTORY: Inside Ontario's Housing Crisis

**THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO'S** population is expected housing crisis. With the rise of interest rates, we ofto grow by more than 2 million people over the next 10 years - 70% of which are likely to settle in the Greater Golden Horseshoe Region. With housing, and subsequently, housing affordability, already a critical concern for many, this begs the question... where will everyone go?

The projected population growth in the Greater Golden Horseshoe Region presents a significant challenge in terms of both housing availability and affordability. As the population increases, the demand for housing also rises, potentially exacerbating the existing housing issues in Ontario.

The term "Ontario Housing Crisis" is often used to describe this problem. Housing crises often manifest in various ways and frequently involve skyrocketing rents, lack of affordable housing units, homelessness and inadequate living conditions.

#### **AFFORDABILITY**

One of the concerns at the forefront for many Ontarians is the lack of affordable housing. Many individuals and families are struggling to find housing options that fit within their budgets, particularly in major urban centres like Toronto and Ottawa. The urbanization of Ontario's major cities has contributed to unprecedented population growth in recent years. This growth has put pressure on the already strained housing market.

#### **RISING INTEREST RATES**

Interest rates can have a significant impact on the housing market and can influence the dynamics of a

ten see a subsequent ripple effect on the affordability of mortgages, which then trickles down to renters as investors need to account for the increase in costs.

Rapidly increasing rent prices have made it difficult for tenants to find housing they can afford. Rent control policies have been introduced in order to mitigate rent increases, however, have limitations in addressing the overall problem.

#### SUPPLY AND DEMAND - THE SUPPLY SHORTAGE

With a shortage of available housing units, especially affordable ones, and a consistent increase in demand intensifies the existing crisis. The demand for housing outpaces the rate at which new homes are built. This supply-demand imbalance contributes to rising prices and limited options for prospective buyers and

#### **FOREIGN INVESTMENT**

Some argue that foreign investment in the real estate market, especially in cities like Toronto, has contributed to the rise in housing prices, making it harder for local residents to afford homes. In response to this, the Government introduced the "Foreign Buyer Ban", formally known as the Prohibition on the Purchase of Residential Property By Non-Canadian Act. This ban came into effect on January 1st, 2023. Simply described, the purpose of this two-year federal ban on foreign homebuyers is to temporarily reduce foreign demand for Canadian real estate in the hopes of improving the housing crisis in Canada and ensuring Canadians have more access to purchasing homes.

In addition to the Foreign Buyer Ban mentioned above, in 2022, The Government of Ontario, led by the Progressive Conservatives, introduced the "More Homes, Built Faster Act". This Act is committing to building 1.5 million new homes over the next 10 years in an attempt to alleviate the housing crisis. With an estimated 1.25 million new homes already in the development pipeline, this does not mean shovels are in the ground quite yet. This figure represents the number of homes builders have been approved to build, however, there is no set timeline by which a developer must construct these homes. With a substantial amount of red tape surrounding new home construction, from both the municipal and provincial levels, it's no surprise that we should brace ourselves for a significant delay.

In November 2022, the Ford government announced the controversial Ontario Greenbelt Development plan, whereby it would remove 7,400 acres of land from the Ontario Greenbelt and convert it into housing developments. This sparked concerns from environmental and conservation groups who argued that weakening the Greenbelt could lead to urban sprawl, loss of agricultural land and damage to natural habitats.

There is no one-size fits all approach to solving the Ontario Housing Crisis. It requires a multifaceted approach between all levels of government, along with housing developers and community organizations. Only through a unified approach can lasting improvements be made to housing affordability, availability and quality that is both accessible and sustainable for all residents.

You can make progress in upgrading your home on a budget using these government payments, and contribute to a greener future.

You may be eligible for the CAIP if you live in a province with federal pollution pricing: Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Newfoundl and and Labrador, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Those last three provinces are new to the program this summer, so residents there will be getting three payments this year. Residents of New Brunswick will follow suit and receive their first payment in October 2023. The exact amount of the quarterly payments varies by region – you'll get more if you live outside a major urban centre. You don't need to apply; you just need to file your taxes every year.

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# Do you know what your mortgage trigger rate is?

(NC) Interest rates have risen dramatically in the past year. When your mortgage has a variable interest rate with a fixed payment, you may reach a trigger rate when interest rates rise.

**YOUR TRIGGER RATE** is the interest rate at which your mortgage payment will no longer cover the principal and interest due for that period.

Once you've reached the trigger rate, your payment will only cover interest payments and no money will go towards paying down your principal amount. That means that you've stopped paying down your loan.

The best way to find out your trigger rate is to review your mortgage or loan agreement. You can also contact your bank. They'll be able to calculate the exact rate for you. They'll also be able to let you know your options if you reach it.

For example, your bank may offer to extend your amortization. This is the time period over which the mortgage loan is reduced and eventually paid off by regular payments. Extending the amortization would avoid having to increase the amount of your recurring payments. However, extending your amortization means paying for a longer period of time and paying more interest in the long run. If you do look into mortgage relief options, it's important to know what the impact will be for your entire mortgage.

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Home sales and the average selling price in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) in June 2023 remained above last year's levels.

**SEASONALLY ADJUSTED SALES** dipped on a monthover-month basis. The seasonally adjusted average selling price and the MLS\* Home Price Index (HPI) Composite benchmark were up compared to the previous month.

"The demand for ownership housing is stronger than last year, despite higher borrowing costs. With this said, home sales were hampered last month by uncertainty surrounding the Bank of Canada's outlook on inflation and interest rates. Furthermore, a persistent lack of inventory likely sidelined some willing buyers because they couldn't find a home meeting their needs. Simply put, you can't buy what is not available."

GTA REALTORS° reported 7,481 sales through TRREB's MLS° System in June 2023 – up 16.5 percent compared to June 2022. The number of listings was down by three percent over the same period.

The year-over-year increase in sales coupled with the decrease in new listings means market conditions were tighter this past June relative to the same period last year. The average selling price was up by 3.2 percent to \$1,182,120. The MLS\* HPI Composite benchmark was still down by 1.9 percent on a year-over-year basis - the lowest annual rate of decline in 2023. On a monthover-month basis, the seasonally adjusted average price and MLS\* HPI Composite benchmark were up.

"A resilient economy, tight labour market and record population growth kept home sales well above last year's lows. Looking forward, the Bank of Canada's interest rate decision this month and its guidance on inflation and borrowing costs for the remainder of 2023 will help us understand how much sales and price will recover beyond current levels," said TRREB Chief Market Analyst Jason Mercer.

"GTA municipalities continue to lag in bringing new housing online at a pace sufficient to make up for the current deficit and keep up with record population growth. Leaders at all levels of government, including the new mayor-elect of Toronto, have committed to rectifying the housing supply crisis. We need to see these commitments coming to fruition immediately, or we will continue to fall further behind each month," stressed TRREB CEO John DiMichele. "In addition to

the impact of the listing shortage, housing affordability is also hampered on an ongoing basis by taxation and fees associated with home sales and construction as well as the general level of taxation impacting households today. Going forward, we need to look at all of the factors influencing the household balance sheet and people's ability to house themselves."

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
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# 4 steps to take before starting your renovation

renovations take a lot of planning. Whether you're updating a deck or gutting the whole home, you need a careful plan. Here are four key steps to take before you get to digging, demolishing or do-it-yourself-ing.

#### **MAKE A BUDGET**

This tip might be obvious, but it's crucial. Look carefully at your overall budget, how your savings stack up and what the ideal version of your project could cost. Set your expectations and your spending limit, and then plan how you'll stay within them. Remember to include a contingency amount that keeps within the total cost that you can afford, or prefer, to spend. This provides breathing room for the inevitable surprise expenses that can occur with any renovation.

#### 2 APPLY FOR PERMITS

If you are building or redoing a structure on your property, you may need a permit from your municipality, and the process can take a while. Fines for not obtaining one can reach \$50,000 for a first offense, so it's not worth going without. While the municipal-

ity has a set timeframe to review your application, that doesn't include the time you need to prepare it (such as getting technical drawings done) or time to revise or appeal it. It's best to start the process early.

#### 3 FIND THE RIGHT CONTRACTOR

Hiring a contractor is often a smart choice, even for many savvy DIYers. Just be sure to interview a few and call their references to find a good fit for your needs and expectations. Compare quotes to ensure you're getting a reasonable rate. Contractors are in high demand across the country, and they often book up months in advance. Delaying your search could leave you disappointed in your options and stuck with a mediocre project.

#### **4** REQUEST A UTILITY LOCATE

Building a fence or a tree house, garden bed or new foundation? If your renovation involves any digging on your property, you're legally obligated to "request a locate" of where infrastructure is buried on your land. Even minor damage to water, gas, sewer and hydro lines can be costly, disruptive and cause serious safety risks. At least it's a simple process. You contact the organization Ontario One Call at least five business days before you want to dig. They notify the infrastructure companies, who then send representatives to mark the locations on your property or issue a clearance allowing you to dig. It's completely free of cost.

Rabies is considered fatal once clinical symptoms appear, and these requirements aim to prevent it and other diseases from entering and spreading in Canada.

Ideal indoor humidity levels are generally considered to be between 30 and 45 per cent. This can be a challenge to achieve during summer months, as warmer air retains more moisture.

The good news is that you can manage humidity levels effectively in a variety of ways. Homeowner maintenance is the key. There's an extra level of importance if you own a newly built home, as your warranty will not cover moisture-related issues, like damage to hardwood floors or mould, that result from improper maintenance.

- Invest in a hygrometer, which will allow you to monitor humidity levels inside your home. Hygrometers are inexpensive and can be found at most hardware stores.
- Be mindful of the number or type of plants in your home as they can mean higher humidity levels inside.
- Use your home's ventilation system. Turn on exhaust fans when cooking, showering or doing laundry. It's also a good idea to leave them running for a short time after you're done to ensure enough moisture is removed from the air.
- Keep areas throughout your home as tidy as possible. Storage spaces and general clutter can interfere with air circulation, trap humidity and lead to mould growth.
- Use a dehumidifier. They are available as standalone units or can be integrated into your home's heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system. A dehumidifier will help to remove excess moisture from the air.
- Plan your landscaping in a way that does not alter the grading around your foundation. Flowerbeds close to your foundation can cause rainwater to pool close to the structure instead of being diverted away from it.

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## How to coordinate colours in your home decor

What's staying and what's going? The simplest place to start is to look at what's already in the room. #### IT'S ALL ABOUT BALANCE

The simplest way to create a balanced colour palette is to follow the 60/30/10 rule: 60 per cent of the room should be a dominant colour, 30 per cent should be the secondary colour and the last 10 per cent can be an accent colour. These colours are referred to as the mass colours, and the easiest way to harmonize them is by selecting a consistent undertone; either warm or cool.

Warm undertones are typically orange, yellow or red, while cool undertones have green, blue or purple. Grech says, "It's safer to stay consistent with undertones, but when painting exclusively with a colour like white, mixing and matching warm and cool undertones can add subtle distinction within a space."

Now that you've established what to re-vamp, Grech reminds us that paint is not only for walls.

"Give furniture a second life with a fresh coat of paint and opt for a colour that complements the tones found on your walls and flooring." For this she uses Benjamin Moore Advance paint, an easy-toapply paint that makes old furniture look new again. "Pair dark walls with furniture in cool tones and lighter hues such as fresh Smoky Green CC-700. Or, if you're using a white wall, mix in a cozy, warm pop of colour, like Stuart Gold HC-10."

Offices painted in blues or greens tend to be less distracting and even improve concentration, where warm reds, yellows and oranges bring higher energy to the space. It truly depends on what mindset each person is trying to get into when they work."

For calmer spaces like the bedroom or office area she recommends a soothing light purple such as New Age 1444, or a calming, crisp light blue like Polar Sky CC-790.

When dealing with a small living space, it's essential to think beyond the floor area and make use of vertical space. #### **USE YOUR WALLS TO SHOW PERSONALITY**
