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Crews battle grass, structure fire

Fantastic work by all three fire houses at a grass fire/structure fire recently. Engine 381 arrived on location to find a grass fire just under an acre in size plus a barn/shed, 20' x 40' in size fully involved in fire. Crews made short work of this fire by utilizing 3 attack lines. The cause of the fire, according to Fire Chief Jim Wall, was investigated and determined to be caused by unauthorized open air burning. No injuries were reported.

King's Township-Wide Recreation Centre is in the news

King's Township-Wide Recreation Centre (TWRC) continues making headlines.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini recently sat down with reporter Lana Hall from Novae Res Urbis, a municipal and planning publication, to discuss how the TWRC recently became the first such structure in Canada to achieve the Canada Green Building Council's (CAGBC) Zero Carbon Building Design Certification.

This certification is awarded for new constructions which demonstrate climate leadership through innovative carbon reduction strategies and optimal building perfor-

Slated to open in the fall of 2024, the multi-use recreation centre is located on 25 acres at the southeast corner of the King Campus of Seneca and will be accessible from 15th Sideroad. The facility will include an aquatics centre

with a six-lane lap pool and leisure pool, two NHL-sized ice rinks, spectator seating, an artificial turf fieldhouse with running track, and a multi-use community space.

Mark Hutchinson, CAGBC vice-president of green building programs and innovation, is quoted in the NRU article as saying: "A good design team will make sure that they're maximizing the efficiency of the system that pulls the heat out of the equipment that's generating ice and provides it to other places in the building ... (In the Township-Wide facility), it's used in something like half a dozen different places, everything from the Zamboni water to the pool heating, to snow melting."

Mayor Pellegrini said the Township's recent implementation of Green Development Standards provide a framework for advancing sustainability in new developments throughout the Township to show both the development community and residents that King's local government is serious about sustainable design too.

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



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Province building new medical school at York University

The Ontario government is providing an initial investment of \$9 million through the 2024 budget, Building a Better Ontario, to begin the design and planning for York University's new medical school in Vaughan. The new medical school will be the first in Canada that is focused on training primary care doctors and is helping fulfill Ontario's commitment to ensure that everyone who wants to have a primary care provider can access one.

"Today's announcement is part of our plan to connect more Ontario families to more convenient care, including primary care," said Premier Doug Ford. "As the first medical school in Canada focused primarily on training family doctors, this new school will make an enormous impact in the lives of people in York Region and across Ontario."

This new medical school will include up to 80 undergraduate seats and up to 102 postgraduate seats starting in September 2028, with up to 240 undergraduate seats and 293 postgraduate seats on an annual basis once operating at full capacity.

By focusing primarily on training family doctors, the York University training model will devote approximately 70 per cent of the new postgraduate training seats to primary care, when the medical school becomes operational in 2028. In addition to other historic investments to increase the number of medical school seats, expand interprofessional primary care teams and efforts to break down barriers so highly skilled internationally trained doctors can care for people in Ontario, Ministry of Health modelling shows that these initiatives will help connect up to 98 per cent of people in Ontario to primary care in the next several years.

"Our government is taking historic action to grow our health care workforce by launching the largest expansion of Ontario's medical education system in over a decade," said Sylvia

Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "Our investment in York University's new medical school is another way our government is increasing the number of doctors in our health care system to make it easier for people to connect to world class care in their community for years to come."

Ontario is rolling out the largest expansion of medical education in over 10 years as it continues to build a stronger, more resilient health care system, especially in growing and underserved communities. The expansion includes all six medical schools currently across Ontario, as well as the new medical school at Toronto Metropolitan University when it becomes operational in 2025, adding 260 undergraduate seats and 449 postgraduate positions over the next five years. These seats are in addition to the new seats planned for York University's new medical school.

"Our investment in York University's new medical school will make it easier for future doctors to access the exceptional postsecondary education that Ontario is so well known for," said Jill Dunlop, Minister of Colleges and Universities. "By helping to train more primary care physicians, we will ensure Ontario families in growing communities like York, Simcoe and Muskoka continue to have access to the care they need, closer to home."

The 2024 Budget, Building a Better Ontario, continues to support the province's work through the Your Health plan to build a robust health system that puts people at the centre of care, making it easier and more convenient for them to connect to care.

"By building a new medical school in Vaughan, our government is taking action to ensure families in Vaughan and King have access to better healthcare, closer to home. This game changing investment was my top local priority to deliver, and by doing so, we will train the next generation of doctors for de-



cades to come. The York medical school in Vaughan will be situated beside the state-of-the-art Cortellucci Vaughan hospital, and the soon-to-be built longterm care home; that together will significantly improve the quality of care of our families and seniors," said King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce.

Ontario is adding 260 undergraduate medical seats and 449 postgraduate seats, starting in 2022-23, as part of the province's largest expansion of medical education in more than 10 years.

These medical expansions will bring the total number of undergraduate seats and postgraduate training seats to 1,212 and 1,637 respectively, by 2028, in addition to the new seats being created at York University.

"This new investment to support increased physician education in Ontario comes at a critical time and marks an important milestone in York's trajecleader in higher education. I want to thank Premier Ford and his government for being responsive to this pressing need, for their vision and clear commitment to York's School of Medicine - and a healthier future for Ontarians," noted Rhonda Lenton, President and Vice-Chancellor, York University.

"We (created the standards) in partnership with the development community, and they actually adhere to them, and they work with us to make their developments sustainable. Mayor Pellegrini gave MP Francesco Sorbara a tour of the new Township-Wide Recreation Centre (TWRC). The project received \$21.1 million in funding from the federal government in May 2021 through the Community, Culture and Recreation Infrastructure Stream of the Investing in Canada plan.

Innovative features designed to reduce carbon emissions include all electrical building systems to recover waste heat, daylight optimization for energy efficiency, minimal dependence on gas-fired equipment and geothermal readiness.

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Want to fix the economy? Start by fixing our tax system

For most Canadians, April is the time of year when frustration and anger over our convoluted, loophole-ridden tax system is at its highest.

For those looking for tax relief this year, there's not much hope. On the contrary, Canadians got hit with several tax hikes earlier this month, including payroll tax increases and an increase to the carbon tax levied on gas and home heating fuel.

Those hoping for simpler, easier-tofill-out forms will also be disappointed. With each passing year, the tax system gets more complicated, with new forms and new layers of tax credits for everyone from remote workers to families who add a second living unit to

their home.

Everyone knows the tax system is broken and needs to be fixed, but nothing ever gets done to make it simpler, fairer and easier.

Over the years Canada's personal income tax code has swelled in size and gotten more complex with thousands of mind-boggling passages like the follow-

our medical system: lack of doctors, doctors overwhelmed, nursing staff burned out by years of underfunding, COVID and neglect, patients waiting in long line-ups for emergency treatment and then housed in hallways as hospital rooms are full. Not a pretty picture.

With this in mind, I recently headed to MacKenzie Health for a day-surgery. pre-op visit. Surprise! I was welcomed and greeted upon entry, then directed to a registration room to electronically register and receive an identifying armband and explicit, personalized printed instructions on how to navigate to my appointment. The pre-op nurse went over my medical history and medications then asked if I had any concerns or questions. I did. An appointment for a post-op scan was scheduled (by chance) closely after my surgery, which was unsettling. The nurse agreed and immediately called my surgeon to see if this was appropriate. The surgeon was unavailable but his office promised to call back. Then I was off to see the anesthetist who would keep me living during surgery. He was professional and friendly, which I took as a good sign.

Returning home, I received a telephone call late in the afternoon. It was the nurse calling to say her shift was

As the example above shows, the current tax system is far too tangled to ever unknot. It needs to be scrapped and replaced with something far less compli-

In terms of personal income, I would create a dead-simple, black-and-white income tax formula with a clear progression in tax rates. Like the current system, those making more would pay more. The main difference, however, is there would be no loopholes or writeoffs, and the tax rates would be much lower for the majority of Canadians.

Come tax filing time, to figure out how much you owe, all you would need are two numbers - the tax rate for your income bracket and the exact amount of income you earned.

The end result of this proposed reform is that our personal income tax system would be straightforward, clear-cut and easy to understand. Most Canadians would pay less. And because of the elimination of all exemptions, loopholes and write-offs, the very rich would end up paying more.


I would further overhaul the tax system by undertaking a number of other major reforms.

The most important of these would apply to small businesses, the main drivers of economic prosperity and job creation in Canada. I propose completely eliminating corporate income tax for small businesses with fewer than 300 employees.

For large and medium-sized companies with more than 300 employees, I would replace the current corporate income tax with a corporate sales tax and eliminate all deductions, tax credits and exemptions. The new tax rate would be somewhere between two to eight percent and would be applied only on annual sales.

The one guiding principle with all of these tax reforms is simplify, simplify,

The proposed reforms, if enacted, would also make our tax system fairer. Instead of doling out breaks to the rich



and other special interests, the system would provide badly needed tax relief to the average working Canadian and small businesses.

If we want to get our economy firing on all cylinders, we need to first fix our tax system.

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Moqueca Brazilian cod stew

Chef Pops **Budget Gourmet**

You know the drill by now: In the face of skyrocketing food costs, Chef Pops has taken on this challenge:

Feed a family of four a nutritious gourmet dinner for around \$20. The rules: No hard-to find obscure ingredients allowed; everything has to be a pantry staple or available from local grocers. No processed foods or packaged items with unpronounceable ingredients; everything has to be made from scratch... and it has to be easy to put together; no weird or fancy techniques or equipment allowed. Lastly, it has to be so delicious that it raises an eyebrow on the first bite.

Here goes:

The hardest thing about making Moqueca is pronouncing it. "Mo-throat clearing sound-eka." Call in Mokeka, if you like. Or call it yummy, because it is. It's incredibly easy to make and it's absolutely delicious. Equally at home as a Fish Friday family dinner or at a fancy sit-down party, this dish feels both light and luxurious at the same time. It combines indigenous South American and Portuguese flavours to make one of my all-time favourite fish dishes. You don't have to use cod – it works great with any white fish or even shrimp. We're using cod loins here because they're easily available frozen and seem to be on sale somewhere almost every week. They're delicate, flaky, meaty and packed with flavour.

Spend your \$20 on what you don't have from this list:

 $2\,\mathrm{packages}$ frozen cod loins (there are two in a pack)

- 1 large red onion, sliced
- 3 cloves garlic, sliced thin
- 2 red peppers, slivered
- 1 can coconut milk
- 1 cup chicken stock (or veggie stock if you prefer)
 - 1 TBSP tomato paste
- 2 TBSP Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 1 TSP turmeric powder
- 1 TSP cumin powder
- 1 cup long grain rice (I like basmati but use what you like/have. Sticky rices are awesome with this, too)
- 1 handful chopped cilantro (or parsley for cilantro haters)

Salt to taste

Method:

In a large skillet (you'll need one large enough to hold all four pieces of fish side by side), heat the olive oil on medium heat. Add the onion and garonion start to soften. Salt the onions, then add the turmeric and cumin and fry til fragrant. Add the coconut milk, the tomato paste, the juice of ½ the lime and the stock, and reduce to a good simmer.



Let the sauce reduce uncovered by 25%, about 10 minutes. In the meantime, make your rice however you make rice. (If you eat it more than occasionally, I strongly recommend a rice cooker - they make things so easy and they're quite inexpensive. If you don't know how to make rice, have a look at the sidebar.)

Once your sauce has thickened add the cod pieces, the peppers and cover the pan. The fish should poach through in about 10 minutes - it's cooked when the flesh is flaky and opaque. Remove the lid, turn the heat up for two minutes to cook off any excess liquid, and serve in shallow bowls.

Pile rice on one side of the bowl and spoon 1/4 of the yellow coconutty goodness into the other half of the bowl. Top with a piece of fish, and garnish with the chopped cilantro and a lime wedge.

Fool-proof rice

Ask 10 chefs the best way to cook rice and you'll get 10 answers. Soak it. Rinse it. Start cold. Start hot. Cover with two fingers of water ... and they're all correct, they really are.

But I like to reduce hassle. So, if you don't have a rice cooker, here is the simplest, most hassle-free way to make fluffy white rice every time without a degree in alchemy. I'll wait for the hate mail.

Boil the kettle. Then, in a heavy bottomed pot with a tight-fitting lid, heat up 1 teaspoon of oil or butter. Add the rice and stir it around until it's all shiny. For each cup or rice, add 1 ½ cups of freshly boiled piping hot water. Add a teaspoon of salt, one quick stir, lid on, heat to minimum. No peeking for 20 minutes. Done.

"Sadly, at some point in our life, we will need a hospital," he says. "I look at this as an investment in the future. When you think about all the things that aren't funded by the Province, whether it be something big and fancy like a CT scanner or the basics that we don't usually think of, like just an IV pole, the little things - all that is funded by fundraising and other revenue streams. To me, it's an investment in your future - you're investing in the day you may need those services yourself and you need to be there.

"This is our hospital. We as the community need to support it to make sure the hospital has all the resources we as individuals may need for ourselves and our families in the future. Any way you can support is valuable, whether it is volunteering, running yourself, or sponsoring someone else who is running. At the end of it, all of it goes to support our hospital and it needs our support. For people who are participating, the registration dollars really cover the costs for our event. That's where the fundraising piece is so important: that's the money that actually comes to the hospital. King uses open data to improve services and foster innovation

In keeping with its commitment to transparent governance, King Township has released three open data sets, providing residents and stakeholders with unprecedented access to key information regarding municipal operations. The newly available data sets include an interactive view into development applications, building permits and fire inspections, and can be viewed online at king.ca.

Open data refers to digital information made available with the necessary technical and legal attributes to enable its free use, reuse and redistribution by anyone, anywhere at any time. In the case of King Township, these data sets are not only accessible through user-friendly maps and dashboards but also allow for the download of CSV data, enabling further analysis and application development by the public.

The details of King's new open data sets are as follows:

Development applications: This data is presented in three formats – on a map, in a table and a CSV file. Information includes the application type, file name and number, application date, property address, application description and status details.

Building permits: This data is presented in two formats - as an infographic and a CSV file. Information includes the total number of building permit inspections, number of passes and fail-

ures, applications received and permits issued.

Fire inspections: This data is presented in three formats - on a map, in a table and a CSV file. Information includes the number of home inspections, the number of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms installed and the number of working and non-working smoke alarms.

The release of these open data sets is just one more way the Township is committed to transparency, reflected in the recent publishing of its service profile inventory.

Municipalities are increasingly recognizing the value of open data and are using it in a variety of ways to improve services, increase transparency and foster innovation. One key area where open data is making a difference is in urban planning and development. By providing access to data on zoning, land use and development applications, municipalities are empowering citizens and developers to make more informed decisions about building projects and community development.

Digital data can be leveraged by computer applications to generate insights, conduct analyses and develop innovative web and mobile applications. Through this initiative, King Township is fostering a culture of data-driven decision-making and collaboration, ultimately enhancing the quality of life for all residents.

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

Seminar on 'Passive Houses' really hits home at CAK AGM

Climate Action King's Annual General Meeting took place at the King Heritage and Cultural Centre last week. It featured Chris Ballard's keynote address entitled "What is Required of Buildings in the Face of Climate Change: Moving Beyond Net-Zero."

Ballard's advocacy, expertise, and call to action – derived from his dedicated public service as Ontario's Minister of the Environment and Climate Change, Minister of Housing, and, more recently, as the current CEO of Passive House Canada in BC – were in keeping with his history of supporting environmental and land use causes across the country, including 25 years of work in the Far North to support the land and its peoples.

The event was attended by over 50 members and residents in the brightly-lit, comfortable Main Schoolhouse and Gallery Building. An array of Green Vehicles parked outside the Cultural Centre prior to the event foreshadowed the audience in attendance who enthusiastically embraced the activist agenda presented inside.

CAK Member-at-Large Ann Raney warmly welcomed attendees, made an Indigenous Wisdom acknowledgement rather than simply a land acknowledgement, and cited the environmental insights of Chief Seattle in his famous address to the American government: "If we do not own the freshness of the air and the sparkle of the water, how can you buy them? Every part of the Earth is sacred to my people. Every shining pine needle, every sandy shore, every mist in the dark woods, every meadow, every humming insect. All are holy in the memory and experience of my people."

Raney's invocation of Chief Seattle reflected the activist organization's dedication to healthy communities and ecosystems through transformative climate action. Raney transitioned from the soaring words of Seattle to her introduction of the dynamic Climate Action King Chair Catherine Flear. After the AGM items were attended to by Chair Clear and her executive colleagues, the organization's leadership group for the upcoming year was confirmed by membership including Chair Catherine Flear; Treasurer and Membership Coordinator Neva Loren-

zen; Secretary Mary Asselstine; and Members at Large: Bruce Craig, Keith Beckley, Kate Goodale, Ann Raney, and Debbie Schaefer.

It was noted that the organization's 4th annual 'Go Electric' Event – held in 2023 at the Schomberg Fairgrounds to rave reviews – will return this fall. In addition to this big event, Sabrina Guvenc, Climate Change Coordinator and Lead of the King Environmental Action Team, encouraged all attendees to participate actively in the King Community Clean Up on Saturday, April 20.

Guvenc also encouraged residents to visit the King.ca website for more information about how to keep our parks, streets, and neighborhoods clean and green. She reminded attendees that "April is an exciting month, especially with its Earth Day and Earth Week celebrations and actions."

Chair Flear introduced her former neighbor Chris Ballard as the keynote speaker and recognized his excellent record of public service as Ontario's Minister of the Environment, Ontario's Minister of Housing, and a Municipal Councillor in Aurora, as well his influential current role as CEO of Passive House Canada.

Ballard was received warmly and offered those assembled a blend of disturbing trends and reassuring policies. The former Newmarket-Aurora MPP reassured the 50 members in the audience that "There's a real focus on how we will reduce our Greenhouse Emissions in Canada." After he was defeated in the 2018 provincial election, Ballard transitioned seamlessly from his role as Minister of the Environment and Housing to becoming CEO of Passive House Canada whose environmentally-responsible homes are "healthier, more comfortable, affordable, durable, and contribute to a sustainable future."

He noted that Passive House is "recognized by the United Nations Global Centre for Excellence for High Performance Buildings" and Ballard averred that "This is not rocket science, but it is a building standard."

Ballard's engaging and dynamic keynote address offered insights into what is required of buildings going forward in the Canadian construction industry and delivered a daunting set of statistics about the impact of Climate Change in Canada: "15,700 premature deaths per year due to dangerous par-



ticles or PM25 caused by wildfires and fossil fuel combustion; 165 million hectares lost to wildfires; 2 extreme heat events in a heat dome on the West Coast that caused over 700 deaths; a \$2.5 billion annual hit to the Canadian economy by 2025 in lost GDP; an average 42 percent increase in home insurance in the past decade as a direct result of climate change-related damage to properties; and droughts in 2021 raised global food prices by 28 per cent."

Ballard offered some unsettling tales about human suffering caused by Climate Change and reminded attendees that Climate Migration will be the biggest challenge for humanity as millions of nomadic people will be searching for better habitat.

Amid the doom and gloom were glimmers of hope offered by Ballard due to new government policies and he cited the federal government's recent legislative responses, including "Mitigation and Adaptation programs. Every \$1 spent on adaptation saves \$13-\$15 on direct and indirect economy-wide benefits. Limiting further warming while adapting to warming pays off in even bigger returns."

In addition to outlining the economic benefits of responsible environmentally-sensitive action for Canadians, Ballard also noted that "Canada is a signatory to the Paris Agreement that aims to limit global heating and since Canada is an exporting country, it needs to be seen as adhering to the Paris Agreement."

Ballard promoted building environmentally-friendly structures across Canada as a strategy to limit global warming and cited "China as the largest passive building adherer" and pointed out that the world's second-largest economy is "desperate to reduce their energy consumption."

Ballard provided examples of Chi-

na's newest sustainable buildings as examples of the superpower's willingness to "be a leader in environmental stewardship out of economic necessity."

The former Minister segued from Asia back to North America and offered good news about rising Canadian awareness about Climate Change: "Over 400 Canadian municipalities including the Township of King have declared climate emergencies. Many are implementing building by-laws to reduce carbon fuel consumption." He focused on King Township's strong stance regarding climate change and the green direction taken by local government: "King declared a climate emergency in 2019 and implemented a 45% GHG emission reduction target by 2030."

Ballard also lauded King Township's "Green Development" including "some really cool rearrangements of buildings." He presented a series of slides that showed a variety of energy-efficient buildings across Canada including Humber College's NX Building, Ken Soble Tower in Hamilton, a Subaru Dealership in Red Deer, the Clayton Community Centre, as well as the 60-story condominium CURV (the world's tallest passive house) located in downtown Vancouver and to be completed in 2029.

After presenting these inspirational structures, the former Minister outlined "the five principles of passive house design: super-insulated; airtight construction; thermal bridge-free; high-quality windows; and ventilation systems that provide heat recovery of 94%."

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CDS snowboarder Sarin Gosal captures medals

Sarin Gosal's success on the slopes this winter was about much more than procuring medals and podium placements. Gosal, a Grade 12 student-athlete at The Country Day School in King City, was carrying on a family tradition by capturing her fifth consecutive CIS-AA Gold at Craigleith and an OFSAA Bronze at Devil's Glen in February.

The champion snowboarder completed a perfect five-year run of CIS-AA Gold Medals that continued a familiar and familial winning streak initiated by her older sister, Daya, and her brother, Jeevan, in 2015. Remarkably, for nine consecutive seasons, a member of the illustrious Gosal family has owned the podium at the CISAA snowboarding championships. This sequence of victories and dynastic dominance are a source of delight for CDS Head Coach Jen Weening who provided historical context for the Gosal-ian Gold Rush: "After nine seasons of having a member of the Gosal family anchoring the team, the streak came to an end with Sarin's final CISAA gold medal as a U20 athlete and a bronze medal at OFSAA."

Coach Weening explained that "In 2015, when the CDS snowboard team was just starting out, Daya, then in Grade 8, and Jeevan, in Grade 7, both joined. From that point on, for their entire Middle and Senior school careers, this dynamic sibling duo competed every season. Then in 2019, as soon as she was eligible in Grade 7, Sarin joined the team as well. For that singular season, all three members of the Gosal family shredded the slopes together. At OF-

SAA that year, Daya was a part of the CDS Girls team which took home the OFSAA championship banner, while Jeevan won his first of two consecutive individual OFSAA gold medals."

The veteran Snowboarding coach delineated the sustained excellence exhibited by the Terrific Trio: "At CDS, the concept of a 'snowboarding family' runs even deeper, with a strong history of multiple family members being very successful on the team. Nowhere is this more evident than in the Gosal family, whose three members - Daya (Class of 2019), Jeevan (Class of 2020), and Sarin (Class of 2024) have captured more CISAA and OFSAA snowboard hardware than any other athlete in CDS team history. Clearly, they have snowboarding in their DNA."

Sarin acknowledged her coach's kind words in our interview and noted that the most satisfying part of being the final chapter in her family's Dynastic Snowboarding Storybook involved a wee bit of sibling rivalry: "Personally, the most satisfying aspect is the competitive spirit between my brother and me. I'll always remember that moment of him urging me on to victory this year. He's not the most affectionate brother, but he did say really nice things to me at OFSAA and really pushed me."

The Grade 12 Honor Roll student reflected on and relished this year's triumphant moment at Craigleith: "The CISAA gold medal was really close and competitive. A lot of emotions went through my mind during the race. When I knew I won the gold medal, I was ecstatic. I knew it was a good race and I went straight to my mom and hugged her. This was my final year so



it was special."

Although memories of winning her fifth CISAA gold medal will be indelible, Gosal's most memorable moment of her career as a CDS snowboarder occurred at Boardercross this year. "I finished my first run and felt good, but people started to beat my second time. I was worried about not placing in my final high school race. Ms. Weening called out all the winning athletes and she announced that I placed second. Finishing second in Ontario was special and being with the 'CISAA Fam' made this moment even more memora-

Gosal hopes to create more memo-

rable moments at her post-secondary destination: Edinburgh, Scotland. The five-time CISAA champ will be attending the University of Edinburgh and pursuing a four-year degree in Law and Business. When not studying at the prestigious UK university, Gosal will be an active member of the school's winter sports team.

Although Coach Weening aptly described Gosal's imminent departure from CDS as "the end of an era," a bright new world of possibilities awaits her champion snowboarder - across the ocean where the sky truly will be the limit for this congenial and successful student-athlete.

Horticulture By John Arnott

What with the mild winter temperatures ,the lack of snow cover (not a good thing) and the seemingly shorter winter the groundhog 'predicted' I was concerned about the effect this would have on gardens but here in Tecumseth Pines (Tottenham) they seem to have handled it just fine. I had aconites (small spring bulbs with bright yellow buttercup like blooms), crocuses and snowdrops poking up through the late February frozen ground. And then we had a heavy short stay snowfall.

Once the snow disappeared there were the green points of these tiny bulbs still hail and hardy. Next my small bulb irises began to break ground and soon were showing their sky blue flowers. Of course a couple of weeks ago we had another short stay snowfall that covered them completely and I didn't help this situation by shoveling some of my driveway snow on to what was already there! However, once the sun had melted this second batch of white stuff there they were again and no worse for wear even after a third pummeling of short-stay snow.

Towards the end of January when the lengthening daylight hours begin to be noticeable nature gets this message through snow and frozen ground and life still dormant in roots and bulbs once again begins to stir. Then in normal times sap begins to rise and something of the now stronger sun's rays penetrates the often still frozen top layer of soil allowing the new growth to begin to produce chlorophyll found in most plants and which allows them to use these rays to tun solar energy into food for the burdgeoning growth as they push up to the soil to reach its surface.

When showing above ground new growth can handle reasonably well a

downturn of temperatures and a fall of snow (which actually insulates them from cold). Now this being said flower petals can be damaged even totally


