#### Township incorporates green development standards

King is boosting its commitment to the environment with an improved green standards policy.

Council gave its stamp of approval on the new ThinK-ING Green: Sustainable Development Standards, which will apply to all applications for Draft Plan of Subdivision and Site Plan Approval. Hopes are it will come into effect on Sept. 1.

Councillors lauded the plan and Mayor Steve Pellegrini noted King was one of the first municipalities to have its own set of green standards. This builds on the strong foundation moving forward.

Staff noted the program has been developed through extensive consultation with interested and affected par-

It establishes a set of metrics with the purpose of evaluating the sustainable performance of new development in the Township of King. The goal is to create a sustainable, resilient and healthy community for all. ThinKING

Green applies to all Site Plan Development and Draft Plan of Subdivision Applications throughout the Township, to ensure that all proposed development aligns with the vision for the community.

In terms of sustainability, the standards will help meet the needs of the present generation without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their needs.

This means that the actions we take must protect, restore, and enhance our natural and urban environments while promoting a high quality of life today, tomorrow and for generations to come.

Staff stressed that new developments must occur in a sustainable manner to work towards the development of communities that are resilient and equitable.

King Township contains portions of the Oak Ridges Moraine, Greenbelt and Holland Marsh, all of which contain diverse ecosystems. The Township includes lands that are regulated by the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA), Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority (LSRCA), and Nottawasaga Valley



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## ThinkING Green expands sustainable standards

Conservation Authority (NVCA). The program aims to ensure that the diverse ecosystems continue to flourish while recognizing new development, primarily within the Township's vil-

ThinKING Green encourages new development to protect and enhance the natural environment while utilizing efficient, innovative, and sustainable measures. They can do this through things like incorporating alternative energy sources, innovative landscaping, and green technologies.

ThinKING Green is an important tool to help implement Provincial, Regional and Municipal land use planning, sustainability and climate change goals and objectives. The Program works to promote the development of complete communities that are healthy

and sustainable, support the quality of life for residents of all ages and abilities, promote energy efficiency and lower GHG emissions, and support cultural and natural heritage conservation. The Program also offers flexibility to enable development proponents to choose the sustainability approach that best suits their project.

The Sustainable King: Green Development Standards Program was developed in 2019 and endorsed by council on September 23, 2019, shortly after Township Council declared a climate emergency on July 7, 2019.

As a result of amendments to the Planning Act through Bill 23 (the More Homes Built Faster Act, 2022), Site Plan Control was removed as a tool for the review of development proposals where no more than 10 residential units were proposed. Accordingly, the inclusion of individual single detached dwellings was not pursued further, however fect, all Site Plan Applications have met Sustainable King continues to apply to Site Plan Applications for commercial, institutional, industrial, on-farm diversified uses and multi-unit residential developments.

Based on the direction of council, staff drafted an expansion of the Program that proposed to apply to Draft Plan of Subdivision applications in addition to Site Plan Applications. This draft Program, entitled the ThinKING Green: Sustainable Development Standards ("ThinKING Green") was born.

While staff cannot mandate that applicants adhere to the requirements of ThinKING Green, such as the minimum score requirements, meeting the requirements of ThinKING Green would be strongly encouraged as a Council adopted Program. Submission of the Program Table would be required as part of a Complete Application for Site Plan and Draft Plan of Subdivision Applications even if the applicant does not meet the minimum score requirements to ensure that uptake in the Program is being effectively tracked. Staff note that since the current Program came into efthe minimum score requirements.

The Program is structured as a Guidebook that includes sections on the purpose of the Program, Implementation, Future Updates, Metrics, Program Table, and Glossary. Applications are proposed to be evaluated through a points system comprised of three levels; Bronze, Silver and Gold.

To ensure an effective implementation of ThinKING Green, staff are proposing that the Program come into effect for Site Plan and Draft Plan of Subdivision Applications submitted on or after Sept. 1. This will provide an opportunity for sufficient training to be provided to Township staff on the new Program and the evaluation process, and will provide an opportunity for members of the public and the development community to familiarize themselves with ThinKING Green and the Program requirements. The proposed implementation date will also provide an opportunity for Staff to update the Township's website to include how-to guides and additional instruction information on the Program.

### Arrests made after break-in attempt in King

Two men are facing numerous charges thanks to the quick response by York Regional Police #1 District frontline officers after an attempted residential break and enter in the Township of King.

On Friday, May 24 at 1:56 a.m., police responded to a residence on Hollywood Crescent, in the area of Highway 27 and King Road, for a report of suspects attempting to break into a house. Prior to police arriving, the suspects were observed breaking into a vehicle at a nearby residence. When officers arrived, the suspects fled on foot and after a brief foot pursuit, one suspect was placed under

With the assistance of the Canine Unit and Air Support Unit, a second suspect was located and arrested nearby. A third suspect is outstanding.

It was determined that the vehicle the suspects arrived in had been stolen in Toronto in January 2024.

A 21-year-old Toronto man is charged with Loiter/Prowl at Night on Other Person's Property; Theft Under \$5,000 - from Motor Vehicle; Possession of Property Obtained by Crime Over \$5,000; Possession of Property Obtained by Crime Under \$5,000, and Breach of Probation. 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

## Why manufacturing in Canada does matter

Made in China.

It's the label you see on most products sold in stores throughout the country. The odd time, you'll see a product manufactured in some other country. But you almost never see a product that's made here in Canada any longer.

We used to make fridges and phones and TVs in Canada not too long ago. We even built the world's fastest fighter jet – I once worked in a factory that made parts for the supersonic plane.

When we were a manufacturing powerhouse, our living standards were the envy of the world. Today, as our manufacturing sector shrivels, our living standards are likewise dropping.

China, on the other hand, is a rapidly rising economic and military super-power. They used to buy their fighter jets and aircraft carriers from other countries – now they mostly make their

## The Principles of an Economic Charter of Rights

Back in the 1990s and early 2000s, it was popular for economists to say that advanced economies like Canada and the US no longer needed to manufacture products. This work, they argued, could be offshored to countries where it could be done more cheaply.

In the meantime, they said, we should focus instead on building wealth through software and the knowledge economy – products and services that didn't require physical input or materials like steel and plastic.

According to the experts, we'd all end up being highly skilled knowledge workers creating software and manipulating data, and we'd be much better off, no longer needing to dirty our hands digging minerals from the earth and

toiling on factory assembly lines.

I never believed that line of thinking – and not just because I worked in the so-called "old economy" of manufacturing. To me, a country that abandons its manufacturing is doomed to fall behind and decay.


The manufacturing industry and its supply base jointly develop a vast array of technologies and products – everything from sophisticated electronics to new composite metals and plastics. For example, when I was Chair of Magna International, our mirror systems unit and Apple jointly developed the touchscreen glass technology on the new iPhone.

The technologies incubated in the manufacturing sector have applications not only in a wide range of industries but also in the defence industry, which is vital for the safeguarding of our freedom and the protection of democracies around the world.

At the end of the day, the continued deterioration of the manufacturing sector in North America and Europe will impact a wide range of other industries, including defence, and it will rob us of one of our chief engines of technological innovation.

What can we do to halt this erosion? For one, we need to first work on restoring our technical skills base. That means training hundreds of thousands of skilled tradespeople across Canada through the creation of technical trade centres in every province focused on every industry from mining to manufacturing.

It's a major reason why technical trades training is one of the principles contained in the proposed economic charter of rights I believe Canada needs to adopt. Technical skills will give us the foundation to rebuild our



manufacturing, revitalize our economy, and restore our prosperity.

But if we don't protect and foster our manufacturing base, then years from now we shouldn't ask: How did China become so strong?

The real question we should ask is: Why did we stand idly by and watch the dismantling of the industries that made us prosperous in the first place?

## YRDSB develops resource guide addressing hate, fostering equity

The Empathetic Education: Addressing Hate and Fostering Equity strategic resource guide will focus on the following key areas: Leadership and Commitment; Reporting Mechanism; Education and Professional Development; Inclusive Curriculum; Safe and Inclusive Environment; Student Engagement; Parent and Community Engagement; Data Collection and Analysis; Diversity in Staffing; Procedure Review; Evaluation and Accountability.

"As educators, it is important for us to ensure that all our schools and workplaces are safe, inclusive and welcoming environments," said Bill Cober, Director of Education. "We remain committed to continuous improvement as a board of education and addressing all forms of hate and discrimination to ensure equity and inclusivity for all."

The strategic resource guide will be informed by the calls to action outlined in the recently received Dismantling Hate and Oppression Framework: Closing the Gaps Eliminating Inequities. The work will also take into consideration existing strategies and documents to ensure the Strategic Resource Guide is reflective of the full context of the board's richly diverse student and staff population.

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## Family favouirte — spaghetti bolognese with garlic bread

You know the drill by now: In the face of skyrocketing food costs, Chef Pops has taken on this challenge:

Feed a family of four a nutritious gourmet dinner for around \$20. The rules: No hard-to find obscure ingredients allowed; everything has to be a pantry staple or available from local grocers. No processed foods or packaged items with unpronounceable ingredients; everything has to be made from scratch... and it has to be easy to put together; no weird or fancy techniques or equipment allowed. Lastly, it has to be so delicious that it raises an eyebrow on the first bite.

Here goes:

A perennial favourite the world over, a spaghetti dinner is the perfect family meal. Now please allow me to preempt those of you who will tell me this is not "real" Bolognese sauce. You're right. The OG ragu from Bologna, Italy uses little or no tomato, milk and finely chopped chicken livers, among other things. This is a more North American version that, despite its lack of resemblance to the original, is absolutely delicious, economical and is guaranteed to please those gathered at the table. I make no apologies for straying so far from the 18th century original and if you want a recipe for that, drop me a

But for now, let's get to this recipe: Spend your \$20 on what you don't have from this list:

1 lb. lean ground beef

1 can good quality plumb tomatoes, I like San Marzano. Spend the extra dollar on a good quality brand, it's worth it.

#### Chef Pops **Budget Gourment**

1 can tomato paste

- 1 large onion, diced
- 3 cloves of garlic, minced
- ½ cup red wine, if you have it 1 tsp Italian seasoning
- 1 tbsp dry basil
- 1 shake Worcestershire sauce
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 generous glug of extra virgin olive

Salt & Pepper to taste

- 1 package good quality spaghetti, I like DeCecco or Molisana
  - 1 small baguette
  - 2 tbsp butter 1 tsp garlic powder
  - 1 tsp dried parsley

Method:

Get a large pot of salted water boiling for the pasta. Make it "salty like the

In another pot or large pan, heat the olive oil on medium-low and add the onions. Throw in a big pinch of salt (this will help draw out the moisture) and let them cook down for about 10-15 minutes until soft and yellow, but not brown. Let this take the time it needs, it's the backbone of your sauce and will bring out the sweetness of the tomatoes.

Once the onions are soft, add the garlic and cook for a further minute until

Turn the heat up to medium and add the beef, breaking up all the clumps. Cook until it starts to brown, then add the Italian seasoning, basil, Worcestershire sauce and a little salt & pepper.

When the beef is fully cooked, add

the wine and bay leaf. Let it simmer 5 minutes until you can no longer smell alcohol when you waft your hand over

Add the liquid from the can of tomatoes, then add the whole tomatoes one at a time, crushing them in your fist as you go. It's quite therapeutic.

Add the tomato paste and give everything a good stir. Turn the heat to low and let it simmer and reduce a little while you prepare the garlic bread:

Cut the baguette in half horizontally, like you were making a sandwich. Place the two haves cut side up on a cookie sheet and spread liberally with butter. Sprinkle garlic powder and parsley on the bread.

Divide the pasta between bowls, topping each serving with the remaining sauce and some grated parmesan cheese. Add a chunk of garlic bread to the side of each serving and enjoy the roaring silence while your family de-



vours the meal.

Supported by York Region financially, the GHFFA brings together a multitude of voices from agricultural experts across Ontario.

Eek said the goal is for GHFFA to be the "go-to" body for the Province, when they're looking for agricultural data or expertise. They've developed a tool with over 100,000 data points and the group monitors and comments on land use policies.

Eek said moving forward, she hopes to bring agricultural issues to local MPPs Stephen Lecce and Caroline Mul-

The GHFFA is a partnership between the regional municipalities and Federations of Agriculture in Niagara, Peel, Halton, York, and Durham, and the cities of Hamilton and Toronto, Conserva-



tion Authorities, the Greenbelt Fund, Durham College and Niagara College, the Holland Marsh Growers and members of the food industry.

In 2020, the GHFFA released their 5-year Golden Horseshoe Food and Farming Action Plan, which identifies pathways for a more integrated and coordinated approach to food and farming viability in the area to ensure that the Golden Horseshoe retains, enhances and expands its role as a leading food and farming cluster.

#### Fraser Institute rankings of Ontario secondary schools

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## Safety plan aims to reduce collisions and injuries

A bold initiative by York municipalities and York Regional Police hopes to curb collisions.

Through Vision Zero, Traveller Safety Plan, the goal is to reduce collisions by 10% over the next five years.

Used in many other jurisdictions around the world, Vision Zero does work. It has proven to reduce collisions and therefore traffic deaths, by impressive margins, some as high at 50%.

Joseph Petrungaro, Director of Roads and Traffic Operations, York Region, informed King councillors of the details of the plan.

Statistics show 94% of all collisions are a result of driver error in actions and decisions. Collisions are increasing and about

An end to severe collisions in York Region.

the region include speeding, aggressive driving, distracted driving, impaired driving and pedestrian safety.

Collisions are increasing in York, hitting 10,575 in 2023. It's estimated that one in four are severe.

He pointed to some safety projects York is carrying out in King in 2024.

They include traffic and pedestrian signal installations at Keele, south of King, and at the Township Wide Recreation Centre at the 15th Sideroad.

Intersection improvements are coming to the northbound and southbound lanes on Keele Street at King Road, pending parking prohibition. Intersection flashing beacons will be installed at Highway 27 and Diana Drive; Lloydtown-Aurora Road and 7th Concession

Roadside protection measures will be put in on Highway 27, between Mactaggart Drive and Sheardown Drive. Enhanced pavement friction is coming to Dufferin Street, south of King Road.

Council has approved automated speed enforcement and York will proceed with its implementation in 2025.

The top five road safety priorities in Units will be placed on Highway 27 near Nobleton Public School, January to March of next year. A semi-fixed automated unit will go in on King Road at King City Secondary School.

A Red Light Camera is planned for the 15th Sideroad and Dufferin Street. Four existing Red Light Camera intersections include the 18th Sideroad and Bathurst Street; St John's Sideroad; Keele Street and King Road; King Road and Bathurst Street, and King Road and Dufferin Street.

York Region is seeing a rise in distracted behaviour on Regional roads. The Region and participating organizations have a collective commitment to safety, health and well-being of all within our communities. A multi-year distracted behaviour campaign will help engage and educate residents and travellers to support a reduction in collisions on our roads.

York Regional Council recently approved the multi-year York Region Vision Zero Traveller Safety Plan to reduce severe collisions and create safer traveller experiences. The Traveller Safety Plan is driven by an international initiative called Vision Zero, developed using global road safety best practices to reduce severe collisions, which are defined as collisions resulting in serious injury or death. To support this vision, a short-term target has been set to reduce severe collisions by 10% within five years (2024 to 2028).

Distracted driving countermeasures in the Traveller Safety Plan include education initiatives, rumble strips, guide rail upgrades, enhanced pavement markings and enforcement.

Between 2018 and 2019, collisions involving distracted driving behaviours contributed to 20% of fatal and injury collisions across York Region.

Roughly 44% of Ontario drivers admitted to driving distracted in 2023 compared to 40% in 2022; despite the fines, there has been an increase of people texting while driving.

Some 12% of distracted drivers have been in a vehicle collision that was caused by distracted driving, while four out of 10 pedestrians in Ontario and one in four cyclists said they have been involved in a collision or close call.

More than 90% of Ontarians aged 16 to 24 are aware of Ontario's law banning texting while driving, yet 55% reported reading texts and 44% reported sending texts while driving.

York Region's Traveller Safety Plan recommends more than 100 countermeasures, including engineering and technology solutions, public engagement, education and heightened enforcement to reduce risk of collisions.

King councillors all mentioned areas in their wards that could use traffic enforcement.

Councillor Avia Eek also mentioned that safety plans should include sharing the road with farm equipment.

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





#### Junior A hockey returns to King with rebranded Rebellion

After a 37-year absence, Junior A hockey has returned to King Township. A jersey-unveiling ceremony in the Municipal Centre celebrated the relocation of the Brantford 99ers to King City.

The OJHL West Conference squad will be rebranded as the King Rebellion – a nod to the King Minor Hockey Association's rep teams and a bid to create continuity of program.

The Junior A Rebellion squad will play its games at the sparkling and sustainable Township-Wide Recreation Centre located at Dufferin and 15th Sideroad. The TWRC, a \$100-million zero carbon structure scheduled to open in September – features two NHL-sized rinks, spectator seating, a six-lane lap pool and leisure pool, and an artificial turf fieldhouse with running track and a multi-use community space.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini, bedecked in the Rebellion's home white jersey complemented by blue, gold, and red Florida Panther stripes, welcomed the Junior A team from Brantford to King as the prime tenant at the TWRC: "When we built the facility, we incorporated design elements to accommodate a Junior A team. We had lots of interest in the new arena from many teams. I'm just happy that our minor hockey pro-



gram will benefit from the Junior A team and I know the Junior A Rebellion coaches and players are committed to help on the ice with King's minor hockey teams. It's going to be great hockey that gives our younger players something to aspire to."

The nomadic 99ers started playing great hockey this past season and rose from being OJHL Western Conference cellar dwellers in 2022-23 to a competitive .500 playoff squad in 2023-24. Their bench boss Mark Joslin was named the OJHL Coach of the Year this Spring for improving the hockey club with lightning speed. He commented on the team's rapid transformation: "The biggest thing was to bring about change of culture. We made everybody accountable from management to coaches to players. We only had three players returning from the previous team and rebuilt the roster with guys that would buy in to the many changes we were going to make."

Coach Joslin's re-invented team competed well during the first round of this year's playoffs before being eliminated by the Canadian Junior Hockey League Champion Collingwood Blues. The Blues won the Centennial Cup in Oakville last Sunday by edging the Melfort Mustangs 1-0. Coach Joslin's performance expectations for the 2024-25 remain high after their strong effort this Spring versus Collingwood: "We had such a good playoff series against the national champs and two of the games could have gone either way. I expect us to be a Top 10 OJHL team this upcoming season. I'm hoping that we can feed off last year's finish and build on our .500 record. I wasn't even sure that last year's club was going to make the playoffs, but the guys improved so much in one season."

He pointed to the vast improvement of many players, including 6'5" defenceman Simon Wang who's committed to NCAA D1 Boston College: "We're happy to have successful student-athletes great skater and we expect big things from him on our team this year and in Division 1 with Boston U in two years. We have four or five players that will be committing to NCAA schools this year. The OJHL is a really good route

to U.S. college scholarships."

Joslin, whose award-winning coaching and administrative experience is invaluable to the relocated franchise, was taken by Monday's jersey-unveiling ceremony: "The Mayor's genuine excitement about us coming into town was the best part of today's meeting. He's a big hockey fan and was surrounded by people that are big hockey fans, too. I didn't expect so many people to be in Rebellion jerseys. I was impressed and proud."

A resident of Richmond Hill, Coach Joslin noted many reasons why he's looking forward to coaching in King City: "In addition to cutting my commute from 2 hours to 12 minutes, it's the excitement about creating a Junior A team here in the town for the first time. We'll be getting involved with the King Minor Hockey Association so our players can help out with house league and rep practices. I'm really happy that we are rebranding as the Rebellion to keep in sync with the King rep like Simon Wang on our roster. He's a program. I know there's lots of excitement in the organization about being the main tenants in a brand new building, too, and having a centre ice score clock and a custom dressing room for the club."

Sharing an arena and facilities is

one of the reasons the 99ers relocated to King Township. The arrival in Brantford of the OHL's Hamilton Bulldogs was a significant factor. Initially, the Bulldogs were going to stay in Brantford for 2-3 years while the First Ontario Centre in Hamilton underwent renovations and repairs. The OHL and OJHL squads shared the Brantford Civic Centre initially, but when the Bulldogs' ownership group chose to put down roots in 'The Telephone City,' the 99ers needed a new home to call their

When the Rebellion take to the ice at their new home at the KWRC, it will end a four-decade absence of Junior A Hockey in King. The Nobleton Junior A Devils represented the Township from 1984 to 1987 before relocating and rebranding, respectively, in Etobicoke as the Capitals. The franchise eventually moved to Brampton where it was decommissioned by the OJHL in 2012.

owed the relocation of the franchise a week before the OJHL formally approved the 99ers' move to King. It was evident at the Victoria Day Parade in Nobleton.

"The Rebellion Starts Now." Indeed.

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#### Ontario introducing stiff penalties to combat auto theft

The Ontario government is cracking down on auto theft by introducing legislation that, if passed, would suspend driver's licences for people convicted of the crime. With auto thefts and carjackings on the rise across the province, the legislation would help deter potential thieves and make it more challenging for criminals to re-offend.

"Car theft is a cowardly and often violent crime that can traumatize victims and communities who experience it," said Prabmeet Sarkaria, Minister of Transportation. "Under the leadership of Premier Ford, our government is sending a clear message to those who commit these crimes and using every tool in our toolbox to keep them off our streets."

Under the proposed legislation, thieves convicted of motor vehicle theft under the Criminal Code would face a 10-year licence suspension for a first offence, a 15-year licence suspension for a second offence and a lifetime licence suspension for a third offence. Licence suspensions would apply to convictions where the court found that aggravating factors were involved in the commisuse of a weapon, use of force, threat, or pursuit of financial gain.

"Under the leadership of Premier Ford, our government is taking bold action to stop what is a serious and often violent crime," said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner. "Criminals who want to steal a car in Ontario need to know there will be severe consequences for doing so."

In addition to stiff penalties for auto theft, the province is also proposing to strengthen penalties for stunt driving. The proposed legislation would ensure that anyone convicted of stunt driving receives a minimum mandatory licence suspension – one year for a first conviction, three years for a second conviction and a lifetime suspension, reducible to 10 years under certain criteria, for a third conviction.

"I want to thank the provincial government for its efforts to tackle auto theft head-on. Too many Vaughan residents have had their vehicles stolen. and we have a duty to protect them and their property. Introducing escalating licence suspensions for criminals who

The federal mandatory minimum prison sentence for a third auto theft offence is six months.

The Ontario government is investing \$18 million over three years to help police services combat and prevent auto

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


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#### Nobleton & Schomberg United Churches
