



Worker killed on job site

A construction worker died while working on a job site last week.

A construction crew was digging on King Road, between Jane and Keele streets, when the rain started filling up the ditch they were working on with water.

York Regional Police (YRP) responded to a call for an industrial accident at 6:24 p.m. in the area of King Road and Peter Glass Road.

Police reported when they arrived, a worker had fallen into the ditch and was fully submerged. When he was pulled out he was pronounced deceased.

The Ministry of Labour, Training and Skills Development was notified and has taken over the investigation.

Mayor Steve Pellegrini said he was "deeply saddened" by this tragic loss and extended his condolences to the family, friends and co-workers.

"This tragic accident is a stark reminder of the dangers faced by those who work in construction and other related industries that build and maintain communities. We are grateful for the work they do and recognize the significant risks they take."

Enjoy the outdoors without a tick!

The Outdoors

You can enjoy the return of warm weather and outdoor activities by preventing tick bites that can cause Lyme disease and other infections like anaplasmosis.

Before your outdoor activity, Health Canada offers the following precautions to prevent tick bites:

Wear light coloured long-sleeved shirts and pants to spot ticks more easily. Tuck your shirt into your pants, and pull your socks over your pant legs.

Use bug spray containing DEET or Icaridin on your skin and clothing (always follow the directions on the label).

Walk on cleared paths or walkways.

When you return, take time to specifically inspect these 10 areas of your body (favorite tick hiding spots):

Head and hair; in and around the ears; under the arms; around the chest; back (use a mirror or ask for help); waist; belly button; around the groin; legs and behind the knees; between the toes.


What to look for: You may not notice a tick bite because ticks are tiny and their bites are usually painless. Feel your skin for bumps and see if there are any tiny black dots. Most people get Lyme disease after being bitten by:

A nymph, which is about the size of a poppy seed (1.15 mm), or an adult female tick, which is about the size of a sesame seed (3 mm).

Found a tick? Remove it immediately to reduce the risk of infection. To do this properly, watch the Lyme disease video: How to properly remove a tick.

King expat's journey to the moutains of Costa Rica

For one former King resident, he didn't "trade in" his former lifestyle and circle of friends, but merely expanded them.

Like a fine meal or wine, every new twist adds to the experience and sweetens the pallet.

The custom home builder decided to retire and relocate to Costa Rica, a Central American gem in its own right.

Paul (not his real name) has been keeping notes since he relocated, noting there are many expats there, mostly from Canada and the U.S. Its location means you can actually drive there from Canada or the U.S.

"I created a new life for myself in the mountains," he said. "I am extremely lucky and have taken a life-changing journey."

Paul explained that when he was a boy in the 1960s, he was awestruck by the Disney movie Swiss Family Robinson.

"I was fascinated by this family, living in the jungle, surrounded by animals. The dream of living in a jungle, surrounded by monkeys and exotic wildlife, never left my fantasies."

Paul admitted that in Canada he lived an amazing life, filled with a love from a beautiful family and a successful career.

It was a bit of a bitter-sweet depar-

ture, he admits.

"I've been fortunate enough to see the world and sometimes live temporarily in exotic places. My dream still survived. My children became successful adults and my wife stayed successful and busy with family. They loved me enough to let me go, and to fulfill my dreams. My plan was to move to Ecuador and live the rest of my life in a tropical climate. Then I took a quick trip to Costa Rica!"

He stayed at a mountain resort called The Golden Pineapple Villas and for him, it was literally life-changing. Surrounded by the jungle and panoramic ocean views and being pampered beyond expectations - left a lasting impression.

He returned, almost a dozen times and he realized this was the locale he'd been dreaming about all those years.

"I found the people of Uvita, Costa Rica, the simple loving nation that I wanted. Far away from the concrete jungle where our wants and needs are judged by how expensive our wardrobes are and the value of our homes and cars."

Paul admits he's by no means "roughing it" as he created a spacious, modern mountainside "dream home" typically featured in magazines.

The biggest changes are the people, climate and visiting the ocean every







morning.

"I love my family and friends in Canada, but, they can come visit. I haven't traded them in, I have just added new friends and family.

The long-time dog lover's home wouldn't be complete without a fourlegged companion.

He found Louis in San Jose, Costa Rica. His vet travels on motorcycle and visits Louis every month. She operated on him right in Paul's home. Louis is by his side all the time and shares in Paul's journeys and daily outings to the beach.

"My best addition is Louis – he's the most beautiful and loving companion. I refuse to call him a dog. He is truly my companion.

Paul even admits that Louis is smarter than he is.

Paul also noted that dogs go everywhere, including restaurants and grocery stores. Staff still bag your groceries and will take them to your car. Gas stations will pump your gas and many of them have young women working there. They also check your tires and wash your windshield!

Costa Rica is a direct flight from Canada, arriving in San Jose. This city is like many Central or South American large cities but they weren't for him.

A short small plane ride of 20 minutes gets you within 35 minutes of the place he calls home - Uvita. It's an ocean town, with many beaches and the necessities of my new simpler life. It has a new urgent care facility, beautiful beaches, grocery stores and all the needs of every day life.

Paul found a 4-acre property up in the mountains, minutes from the town. Being at a higher elevation means that it is cooler and fewer mosquitoes.

When creating his dream house, Paul admits he went a bit overboard.

The grand structure includes a gym, 2 pools 4 bedrooms with en suites and outdoor showers and a hot tub with retractable roof - "simple necessities for myself and Louis."

them every day and thank them for a job well done. They surprise me every day with an increase in quality as they are learning that I require a quality that they are not use to. They take great pride in their accomplishments. On Fridays, I buy them lunch and bring well deserved beers."

The workers are learning quickly and producing a quality that Paul requires. This is further enhancing their own skills.

Paul actually drove his own Jeep to Costa Rica from Toronto, with a special friend as co-pilot who did most of the driving.

He uses the Jeep, a pair of side-byside ATVs to navigate some of the challenging mountain roads.

Wildlife abounds there and Paul's typical mornings in paradise begin with a wake-up call from the howler monkeys. Every morning, around 5:30, they howl at an extreme volume. This morning alarm increases in intensity and then is added with the screeching of the wild turkeys. This seems to get every bird into a competition to see who can outperform who.

"This forces me to the outdoor shower where the white face monkeys are feeding on mangos. It is rare not to see agoutis feeding everywhere on my property. They are a large rodent, about the size of a small dog. The coati is an everyday sighting, a pointed snout, raccoon-like animal with a long ringed tail. The 3-toed sloths are abundant but difficult to see. Toucans are very common and the scarlet macaws are constant visitors. There are so many beautiful birds and many make my property home."

Of course, there are also insects, snakes and lizards.

But Paul finds the bugs fascinating from the huge to the bizarre.

The only ones he finds annoying are the ants that bite. He's also been bitten by a scorpion.

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Paul built a separate "casita," a little house for his staff. He has an orchard with different types of fruits including bananas, pineapples, mangos, papaya and many others.

Paul noted construction is done very differently in Costa Rica and he's extremely fortunate to have a full time building crew of 14 - extremely hard working Ticos.

Everything is done by hand. There are no specialized trades - his crew does everything. They dig the foundation by hand and bend and tie the rebar. They mix the concrete, lay the blocks, run the electrical and the plumbing. They lay the tiles and do the painting. All the structural steel was welded by them and hoisted by hand. They work from 5:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. 5 days a week.

"They are my friends and I greet

"The other insects are beautiful just so big and colorful. There are many snakes, but it is rare to see one. Most are not venomous."

Louis runs free and always returns. The many lizards are everywhere. From huge, 2-foot iguanas to the Jesus lizards that run across the pool. All harmless.

Paul's story continues to evolve and he can't quite retire.

During one of his property hunts, he found a cute house and ended up buying it. It had a commercial property that was part of the deal and this spawned another massive project.

"I had the great idea of building a restaurant. As anyone that knows me, I don't tend to do things small. I missed the wonderful restaurants back home."

Costa Rica blossomed after its independence

Costa Rica today is strongly shaped by its Spanish influences as well as Catholicism.

Costa Rica still has a large agricultural sector including coffee, banana, pineapple and sugar exports. In the last twenty years, eco-tourism and technology have taken off and become top-earning industries in the country. Costa Ricans enjoy a high standard of living, and land ownership is widespread. The country boasts a high literacy rate, a large middle class and a stable government that has functioned without an army for more than 60 years.

Indigenous people call Costa Rica home dating as far back as 5,000 B.C.

The country was shaped by influences from the Aztecs of Mexico and Mayans and Incas of Peru.

Costa Rica's history starts with the movement of tribes southwards from North America during the last Ice Age between 13,000 and 17,000 years ago.

The first evidence of human settlement in Costa Rica comes from around

10,000 BC (12,000 years ago). That's far earlier than originally thought. Indeed, the 12,000-year-old settlements found in 2016 by the Reventazon River are the oldest evidence of human life found in Central America so far.

Between then and the European arrival in the 15th century, Costa Rica was home to at least 25 indigenous groups. The country's native population was small compared to the vast Pre-Columbian civilizations found throughout Latin America. Some historians argue that the present culture of this country was primarily founded upon these more dominant indigenous cultures. You see evidence of the indigenous influences in arts and crafts available throughout Costa Rica in the form of handcrafted ceramics, ornaments, and jewelry.

The most extraordinary artifacts left by Costa Rica's ancestors are the astonishing stone spheres found near Palmar Norte and Palmar Sur in Corcovado. The most prominent indigenous tribes are the Bribris, the Borucas, the Cabecares, the Huetares, the Malekus

Uvita becoming an expat hub

Uvita de Osa is a small town in southern Costa Rica, on a section of coastline known as the Bahía Ballena.

It's home to the Cola de Ballena (Whale's Tail) beach (Playa Uvita), which is one of the beaches comprising Marino Ballena National Park. The Whale's Tail has been described as one of the world's most beautiful beaches.

Uvita has grown tremendously since the early 2000s and is the commercial centre of the Costa Ballena region. Many expatriates from North America and Europe have made Uvita their home, so many of the locals speak English as well as Spanish.

Uvita has become the tourist and adventure tour hub of the Costa Ballena region. The town offers several tours ranging from whale watching to horseback riding. The town is also known for its many restaurants and accommodations catering to tourists.

Wildlife abounds in the area and the Hacienda Baru National Wildlife Preserve (15 minutes north of Uvita) is home to more than 350 different species of birds. have been identified. This number is more than one third of all the species of birds which have been identified in the entire United States and Canada combined.

They include the Scarlet Macaw, Green and Little Blue Herons, American White Pelican, and many varieties of hummingbirds. Many other species of birds, such as fiery-billed aracaris, collared aracaris, broad-winged hawks, great kiskadees, hook-billed kites, slaty-tailed trogons, flycatchers, chachalacas, crested oropendolas, collared forest falcons, chestnut-mandibled toucans, red lored parrots, saltators, orioles, kingfishers, crimson-fronted parakeets and orange-chinned parakeets are also native to the area.

Howler and Capuchin monkeys live in the area, along with pumas, margays, ocelots and even vampire bats.

In the waters, you can spot bottlenose dolphins, pantropical Spotted Dolphins, Humpback whales and Pilot whales.

and the Chorotegas.

As with most native tribes, their numbers are dwindling as their traditions and lands are usurped by modern societies. The few remaining members of these tribes are trying to hold on to their customs and old way of life, although this is getting harder to maintain, and live in small villages in remote regions of the country. But luckily, rights for the indigenous people have been put on the agenda and tourists can support them by visiting their villages and tribes.

Columbus was the first European to set eyes on Costa Rica on his fourth and final voyage in 1502. Arriving off the coast of Limon, on the Caribbean side, he named the land Costa Rica, meaning Rich Coast, in the hope that they were going to find gold in its hills. When it became apparent that the rich coast was poorer than its neighbors, the colonists switched their focus to agricultural development.

As the landowners were quite poor and isolated from the Spanish Colonial centres of Mexico, Guatemala, and the Andes, and because there were very few indigenous labor forces to help, the first Costa Rican settlers soon turned into an autonomous and individual agrarian society. By the beginning of the 19th century, the cultivation of bananas brought in a lot of wealth and coffee soon followed.

While settlers were clearing land for coffee plantations in the late 1800s, they happened upon an archeological site that remains one of Costa Rica's most famous ones today. The Guayabo National Monument is shrouded in mystery to this day, but does reveal the existence of an ancient society of some sophistication. At its peak, around 10,000 people used to live in this ancient city. It is believed that the first settlers came to these parts around 1,000 BC and had created a bustling city by 800 AD. Why they disappeared is still unknown.

In 1821, Costa Rica and several other Central American provinces declared their independence from Spain. By 1838, Costa Rica finally became a fully independent country.

Once independent, Costa Rica started to finally blossom. Someone discovered the Central Valley was perfect for coffee and Costa Rica began to live up to its name. This wealth turned San Jose into a European-style city with boulevards and theatres.

Costa Rica disbanded its army in 1949. Since that day, Costa Rica has been investing in education, natural heritage and developing strategies for supporting workers' rights.

Costa Rica is often at the top in Latin America for human development. It also shines as the 5th best in the world in the Environmental Performance Index. These rankings show how well the country takes care of its people and nature.

So, Paul decided to design and build a large restaurant with an upper deck and 2 bars.



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

An Aurora-based tutoring service is leveling the playing field in terms of giving students a helping hand.

Jonathan Rim, a Grade 12 student at St. Andrew's College in Aurora, launched Aequitas Tutoring last year.

The non-profit tutoring organization provides free online educational services to young students. Rim explained that willing high school students volunteer their time to tutor elementary/ middle school students for free, in ex-





vice hours.

In the past year, the organization has completed more than 500 hundred free tutoring sessions for children across Canada (5 Provinces) and distributed 500 volunteer hours. They currently have more than 100 tutors and students enrolled in our program.

Rim explained that when he was in Grade 8, he moved to a new private school where life was drastically different from his old public school.

"One of the things that stood out to me was how many more opportunities there were. However, they were obviously only for people enrolled at my school, and that's when I realized how many other people there are that do not have access to the same benefits. I decided to start this initiative to level the playing field and give everyone the chance to get educational support if they need it."

The program currently offers support in 6 classes: Math, English, Science, French, Geography, and Music.

There are several things that separate Aequitas (Latin for equality and equity) from other programs. Firstly and most notably, all of their tutors are volunteers and consequently, they are able to provide all of our services free of charge. Furthermore, all of their tutoring sessions are done online and there are so many tutors with different schedules available.

"That means students can also do these tutoring sessions from the comfort of their own homes whenever they want," Rim said.


Finally, parents can choose what the tutors work on with their children.

Rim is a firm believer that education is "one of the most important aspects of a person's life. The material they learn in school will continue to serve them throughout their lives and future careers."

Unfortunately, many elementary students may need reinforcement or extra practice with the material covered in school. Public schools generally have larger class sizes and move at a quick pace in order to cover all the material in the curriculum. "As a result, I think it is extremely important to give students who need it a 'lift,' so that they can perform better in school and gain a stronger understanding of what they learn." Lim pointed out the three most common subjects that students need help with (in descending order) are Math, French, and English. It is likely because these are the all core subjects in the Canadian curriculum and many students who seek our services are in French Immersion or are students who are new to the country. Since they're online, the services are not limited to a specific geographic. They have students and tutors from other provinces, however, currently the majority of our students are from the Greater Toronto Area.

Police warn of dangers of using replica guns

York Regional Police is warning our community about the use of gel guns after two youths were charged in connection with three incidents involving these replica firearms in the City of Vaughan.

On June 24, police were called to the area of Lady Dolores Avenue and Lady Loretta Lane for a weapons call. The complainant told officers two teens, dressed in black, had repeatedly shot at her with a gel-bead Orbeez gun. She was not injured and did not want to proceed with charges. Police located the 14-year-old youths and they were given a warning. The gun was seized.

On July 27, at approximately 5:30 p.m., police responded to two separate weapons calls in the area of Bathurst Street and Rutherford Road. In one occurrence, a victim was hit with a gel projectile in a parking lot. A short time later, officers responded to a second call nearby, where two victims were also struck by gel bullets. Both victims were hit multiple times in the face and head. Officers located the suspects in a vehicle in the area. Two youths have been charged. No one was seriously injured.

A 17-year-old from Aurora and a 16-year-old from Vaughan face charges of Assault with a Weapon x2.

York Regional Police is warning parents and teens that many replica firearms look identical to real guns. Police responding to these weapons calls are often in the position of having to make quick decisions on whether the weapon is real, a toy or a replica, which could have significant consequences.

Citizens should be aware that when police respond to any call involving a firearm, it is treated as legitimate until an investigation can determine otherwise

In light of this, York Regional Police reminds the public of the following:



Police-involved shootings have occurred where the firearm is later determined to have been a replica and the officer has been found to be justified in their actions.

There is often no way to tell if the weapon is real prior to investigation.

Replica firearms, air guns, gel guns or toy guns used in the commission of another offence are considered legitimate weapons and those responsible will face significant criminal charges.

If you damage property or injure a person or animal by discharging an air gun, you could be subject to criminal charges in addition to civil liability.

Residents must seriously consider the risks and responsibilities involved in owning any item that fires projectiles.

For the safety of our communities, we strongly discourage the purchase and use of these items in our region.

If you do have access to these types of guns, parents are strongly encouraged to monitor their children's use of them.

Amidst this commemoration of a full century of leading-edge care, Southlake is busy taking "snapshots" of what the next century might look like.

Throughout the first half of 2024, Southlake has held several community engagement sessions in the areas they serve, including one such event at the Aurora Armoury last month.

"We want to develop what will hopefully shape the next 100 years of care in our communities, obviously recognizing that no plan can actually plan for a whole 100 years, but this is the start of developing that plan for the future," says Angelica Cruz, Manager of Communications and Public Affairs for Southlake Regional Health Centre.

One of the certainties in the plan is the creation of more space to meet the needs of a growing community, and this will require a new campus.

"Southlake is bursting at the seams," says Cruz. "We know that we serve one of the largest-growing and aging populations in all of the country and we want to be able to bring that to the communities and hear directly from them about what they are hoping to see from their local hospital as we continue to grow. Access to care varies [between geographic areas] and we want to just make sure everyone is heard and everyone has the chance to really weigh in on what the future of Southlake looks like.

"I think one of the things we have heard a lot recently is, at the heart of it, Southlake's strength is its people. We have really good people who are incredibly dedicated to providing leading-edge care, being compassionate, and providing the right services to patients when they need them and being right there by their side in making sure they have the care they need close to home."

During the feedback sessions, one of the questions Southlake has asked the community is what they would like their families, friends and neighbours to be saying about the hospital 10 years from now. Feedback from the Aurora session indicated residents would like to see wait times reduced, a decrease in ambulance offload times "so that

patients have better access to care and emergency medical services can get back on the road faster," and a "diversity in care" to meet the diversity of the community as a whole.

Needs and challenges seen through an Aurora lens include a difficulty in accessing primary care and urgent care clinics, as "limited alternatives have resulted in overcrowding" in the Emergency Department. More urgent care, home care and satellite resources are needed, feedback continued, as is a streamlined process from diagnosis to treatment.

Participating residents called on Southlake to expand partnerships with fitness and wellness programs, offer education in the school environment on "general health and nutrition", preventative education with community health fairs and other forms of outreach, support programs for seniors, including social opportunities, and to develop an education portal to serve the community in different situations, including knowing when to go to the **Emergency Department.**

Other calls include "culturally appropriate" services for patients, increased education on navigating the Ontario Health System, the development of a "system thinking approach focused on the aging population by expanding home care and health education to get ahead of the higher acuity curve," and a focus on "improving staff satisfaction to better the patient experience."

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



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King City's Adriana Leon and the Canadian Women's National Soccer Team crashes out of Olympics quarterfinals

After a hard-fought 120-minute scoreless draw with Germany descended into a heart-breaking loss on penalty kicks (4-2), Team Canada's defence of its Gold Medal ended in the Olympic quarterfinals in France on Saturday.

The play of two-time Olympian Adriana Leon – a resident of King City - had been instrumental in the national squad fashioning a 3-0 record in Group Play. The battle-tested team - led by veterans like the 31-yearold Leon - overcame the noise of the Drone Scandal, the suspension of its Head Coach, and a six-point penalty being levied against their impressive perfect record to head into the showdown versus Germany with a degree of positive momentum.

Leon, the Aston Villa professional and Country Day School graduate, was snake-bitten during key moments versus Germany. In the 71st minute, Leon broke in alone on the German goalkeeper Ann-Katrin Berger. Berger saved Leon's breakaway shot, deflecting it out of harm's way with her leg to keep the game scoreless. During penalty kicks, Leon missed her second opportunity versus Berger - a stark contrast to Leon's triumphant penalty

Brazil during the Olympic quarterfinals in Tokyo in 2021.

High performance sports can be like that. Sometimes you're the hammer and sometimes you're the nail.

As Bruce Arthur noted in The Toronto Star, "From the 57th minute - when Canada brought in Adriana Leon, Evelyn Viens, and Cloe Lacasse - they shoved the Germans, created chance after chance, dominated for long stretches. They could have scored three. Leon, above all, will see a least three different plays in her dreams, maybe for years."

Despite the disappointment versus Germany, Leon has her gold medal. She has also cobbled together a successful ten-year professional career on both sides of the Atlantic. Playing in the world's top leagues and in two Olympics speak to Leon's glowing achievements on the soccer pitch both at home and abroad.

A long-time star performer for the Aurora Barbarians, Daniels scored the game-winning try in the national team's inspirational 19-14 upset win over the host country in front of 70,000 hometown fans at the Stade de France. Daniels, a flyback who also kicks converts, scored 9 points against Team France. The momentum of eliminating France carried over to Canada's 21-12 upset of the favored Australians in the semifinals.

The 21 year-old is a three-year veteran of the national rugby program and kicked converts in Canada's 17-14 Game 1 win over Fiji and 26-17 Game 3 victory over China. The valiant Team Canada side lost their second Group Play game 33-7 to New Zealand, but nearly upset the Kiwis in the gold medal game--thus showing the young squad's improvement from Game 1 to Game 6 of the Olympic tournament.

Aurora's Andrew Nembhard scored 18 points in 21 minutes of playing time in Canada's 88-85 win over Spain to give the National Men's Basketball Team a perfect 3-0 record after Group Play. Nembhard's box score line (8 for 10 shooting, including 2 for 3 from 3-PT range with 1 rebound and 2 assists) against #2-ranked Spain was impressive, but his crucial basket on a runner in the lane with 2:09 left put Canada up by three to help quell a Team Spain rally late in the game.

The 24-year-old guard, who signed a the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics.



a silver medal in a narrow 19-12 loss Indiana Pacers in July, scored 2 points and 1 assist in Team Canada's 86-79 Game 1 victory over Greece and tallied 5 points and collected 4 rebounds in the national team's 93-83 Game 2 win over Australia.

Nembhard has provided much-needed backcourt support for Shea Gilgeous-Alexander, RJ Barrett, Lu Dort, and Jamaal Murray. Nembhard and Murray are significant additions to the gritty Canadian squad that captured the bronze medal at the FIBA championships in 2023. In all, Team Canada's 12-man squad features 10 current NBA players. The #3 seed in the Olympic tournament will need all that professional talent as they play host France on Tuesday in the quarterfinals.

Vaughan's Christopher Morales-Williams advanced in the men's 400M event after finishing second in his first round heat on Day 9 of the Olympics. The 19-year-old's time of 44.96 seconds ranks him 15th heading into the semifinals. Unfortunately, Morales-Williams's 400M time in Paris was almost a full second slower than his electrifying, record-setting dash this Spring for the University of Georgia.

The Georgia Bulldog and NCAA champion set the Canadian record at the Southeastern Conference Track and Field Championships at 44.05 0.03 seconds faster than the winning 400M time at the Tokyo Olympics.

Morales-Williams is clearly "a rising star in Canadian athletics," according to Tony Sharp, his Jamaican-born sprint coach and bronze medalist for Team Canada in the 4x100M relay at

Perseid meteor show lights up the night sky


The best meteor shower of summer belongs to the Perseids. The entire shower lasts through September 1 with the peak period being the night of Aug. 12 into the morning of the 13. But the night before and after should still result in a spectacular cosmic show. The first quarter moon will set on the 12th around 11:30 p.m. local time and midnight on the 13th.

With the lunar glow gone, conditions will be ideal to see the estimated 90 meteors per hour including a few bright fireballs. Away from the glow of city lights will reveal the band of our Milky Way Galaxy.

The planet Saturn will rise after 9 p.m. with the pair of Mars and brighter Jupiter after 1 a.m. Any astronomy cell phone app will show their position. Both are closest (conjunction) on the morning of the 14th with a separation less than the width of the full moon. Enjoy these sand-sized particles of Comet Swift-Tuttle as they safely vaporize in the atmosphere at about 72 kilometres per second.



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


