# Opening of Zancor Centre delayed following break-in, vandalism

Construction on King Township's Zancor Centre, located facility opens in 2025. at 1600 15th Sideroad in King City, has proceeded over the past 24 months on time and within budget since breaking ground in April 2022. The new, multi-use recreation facility was on track to open this fall, however, that opening date is no longer viable following a recent break-in at the facility that resulted in theft, vandalism and damage to the mechanical systems within the building.

Township staff have been working with the contractor and the project team to assess damage and determine the full scope of repairs and replacements required. Based on the damage assessed to date, repairs may take until early 2025 to complete. Security protocols have since been enhanced and the break-in remains an ongoing investigation with York Regional Police.

Drop-in recreational programming that had been planned for the fall, along with registered ice hockey leagues for girls and women, will be deferred until the new

To maintain service levels and meet commitments to user groups, the King City Lions Arena will temporarily re-open for the Fall 2024 ice season to accommodate ice users which had planned on relocating to the Zancor Centre. The King Rebellion Junior A Team – originally slated to play their home games at the JTF Homes Arena in Zancor Centre for the 2024-2025 season – will temporarily relocate to the King City Lions Arena until the Zancor Centre opens.

Township staff will make efforts to accommodate all user groups to the best of their availability using all facilities across the Township, including the ice rinks at Dr. William Laceby Nobleton Community Centre and Arena and the Trisan Centre. All affected user groups will be contacted by the Township directly and advised of any schedule modifications to their permit.

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


#### King is forming an **Age-Friendly Steering Committee: apply today!**

## Homes in rural areas will start being connected later this year

soon experience a significant upgrade in internet connectivity, thanks to the efforts of YorkNet, a corporation owned by York Region, in partnership with Galaxy Fibre, an Internet Service Provider (ISP).

The initiative is part of a broader expansion project under the federal government's \$3.2-billion Universal Broadband Fund, targeting underserved homes in the region.

The project aims to improve internet access for homes that are considered underserved according to federal and provincial standards. These standards define underserved areas as those where internet speeds are below 50 Mbps for downloads and 10 Mbps for

YorkNet and Galaxy Fibre have structured the project in phases to ensure seamless connectivity to the existing network, with the first phase focusing on installing "dark" cable infrastructure in Glenville, located near Highway 9 and Dufferin Street. Dark cable refers to fibre optic cable that is unlit that becomes lit when an ISP attaches network equipment and transfers data between numerous connected points.

The groundwork has been laid, and the electronics and bandwidth connections are being installed. Residents in certain areas of Glenville will soon be able to access high-speed services when the network goes live later this year.

Galaxy Fibre plans to commence visits to eligible homes in Glenville

Residents of King Township will this month, where team members will introduce residents to their highspeed internet offerings. Interested residents can sign up for service when the network is fully operational in De-

> In addition, Galaxy Fibre representatives will also engage with residents in other areas in King, including sections of Keele Street, 8th Concession, 19th Sideroad and Lloydtown/Aurora Road. Homes in these regions will be connected once all necessary equipment is in place by 2025.

## Mosquitoes test positive for West Nile in Vaughan, Markham

The Regional Municipality of York monitors West Nile virus activity by setting mosquito traps and testing for DEET or icaridin - check label direc-West Nile Virus. To date, two mosquito traps have recently tested positive for West Nile virus. A mosquito trap at Kennedy Road and 16th Avenue in the City of Markham and a second trap at Jane Street and Highway 7 in the City of Vaughan are the first positive traps of the year.

As part of York Region's 2024 West Nile Virus Control Plan, York Region Public Health educates residents on self-protection, investigates human cases and monitors mosquitoes for West Nile virus.

York Region Public Health uses larvicides in catch basins to control mosquito breeding along Regional and municipal roads and other stagnant public water sources, including roadside ditches. Private backyard catch basins are treated upon request.

# Police ask for witnesses to fatal collision in King

Investigators with the York Regional Police Major Collision Investigation Unit are seeking witnesses following a fatal collision in the Township of King.

On Saturday, Aug. 10 at 7:44 p.m., officers were called to a single motor vehicle collision on 17th Sideroad and 11th Concession. When officers arrived, they located a black Honda sedan on its roof and a lone occupant trapped in the vehicle. Despite life-saving measures by responding emergency services, the driver, a 33-year-old man from the City of Vaughan, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Police note that this stretch of road is in a remote area. Investigators are appealing to any witnesses who may have witnessed the collision. or who may have dashcam footage or video surveillance from the area around the time of the collision, to please come forward.

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

#### Ontario added more than 22,000 jobs in July

Vic Fedeli, Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade, was pleased that Ontario added more than 22,000 jobs in July.

# Climate change fuels wildfires worldwide

Last summer, during a record-breaking wildfire season, a podcast host asked Alberta Premier Danielle Smith about the connection between fires and climate change and her government's opposition to federal climate policies. "I think you're watching, as I am, the number of stories about arson," she said. "I'm very concerned that there are arsonists."

She's not alone in blaming arson, lightning or forestry policies for increasingly intense wildfires and lengthening wildfire seasons. Those are factors, but not the point. Whether fires are ignited by arson, lightning or accident, human-caused global heating is making them more likely and more furious. (Although arson and accidents do cause fires, most are sparked by lightning.)

With the impacts of climate-related wildfires mounting every year, it's up to our political leaders, especially, to take a realistic look at causes and solutions. Sadness is a normal reaction to wildfire devastation, but tears won't put out the fires that have forced people from their homes and communities, destroyed entire towns, polluted air over vast areas, caused health problems and deaths and sent wildlife fleeing if they're lucky enough to escape. Add to that rising insurance rates or even the inability to insure homes in high-risk areas.

a Beast," about the tragic 2016 wildfire that devastated Fort McMurray in the heart of Alberta's oilsands, writer John Vaillant details how vehicles and homes vaporized (in part because many were built using petroleum-based products, such as vinyl siding) and 88,000 people had to flee their homes in one afternoon.

heating is also causing more lightning strikes. On top of that, insects such as pine beetles that were once kept in check by colder winters have been thriving and killing massive numbers of trees, which dry out and further exacerbate fire risk. Consider how easy it is to start a campfire with dry kindling and wood compared to even slightly damp wood.

Burning coal, oil and gas is pushing the planet to heat at unprecedented rates, which creates the conditions for increasingly severe wildfires. We're now experiencing wildfire seasons that start earlier and end later, and fires that are more difficult to contain. Some are even smouldering throughout winter. The Canadian Climate Institute points out that during 2023, fires here consumed "16.5 million hectares — more than double the previous record and nearly seven times more than the historical average."

Of course, forest management practices play a role. Undergrowth and debris such as fallen branches, stumps and leaves that build up in a forest through lack of attention, logging or suppression of small fires can raise the risk of larger wildfires. Controlled or prescribed burning, in part based on

ested areas, is also important - something the Alberta government ignored when, shortly after being elected in 2019, it shut down 26 active fire towers across the province, ended funding for the firefighting Rappel Attack Program and later made further cuts to wildfire personnel and programs.

Increases in number, duration and intensity of wildfires also cause climate change feedback loops. Trees store carbon, which is why forests are known as "carbon sinks," providing a hedge against climate change. When trees burn, carbon is released into the atmosphere, creating even more global heating.

Because we've already released so many greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, we'll be facing escalating wildfires for years to come. We can reduce future risk by shifting from polluting fossil fuels to cleaner energy and protecting green spaces, but good forest management is also necessary.

# King expat dives into the restaurant business in Costa Rica

Finding your bit of paradise as an expat is one thing.

Opening a business is quite another. Last week we introduced you to Paul, a former King resident who has made Costa Rica his new home, writing a few

more chapters to his already interesting life.

With his dream home complete, Paul couldn't resist the opportunity to open a restaurant, but it's not something for the faint of heart. It seems the word "retirement" isn't in his vocabulary.

As an admitted "foodie," Paul was succeed in is the restaurant business.

"Many of my friends have fantasized about owning and operating a restaurant; 'fantasized' is the key word. They are smarter than I am. We all enjoy a fine meal and have our favorite restaurants and the draw to a particular establishment is usually the food, the atmosphere and the owners and staff."

Paul said part of the draw is being greeted and escorted to a favorite table and served favorite cocktails, while they ponder on the specials and menu

"We can't help on looking around and thinking of the changes that we would make to the decor or menu items. In our minds, we have a talent and draw from our gastronomic memories."

But he admits the reality is, they know nothing about the complexity of this industry and "are fools to think we can just jump in and be a success."

But that didn't stop him, or even slow him down.

Paul loves the ocean town of Uvita and he enjoys many great meals at the numerous restaurants in Uvita. He admits to having become a "regular" at many of them.

And yet, something was lacking.

"They were good, but didn't have the experience that I missed. I missed my Locale meals in King City and the special treatment that was always waiting. I was always searching for a real culinary experience. I'd travel to a small area, Escazú in San Jose and it was a step up but still not the experience I

Paul says he's always sought out good restaurants in his travels and he's experienced different worldly cuisines from Europe, Asia and South America. He tends to go back to his favorites of a quality steak, fresh fish and flavorful pastas.

"I want every meal to be served as if it was made to be photographed," he

When his friends would visit, they would always wonder if Costa Rica was a place they could invest and settle in.

"It's not for everyone, but it certainly is for me. I would take them on property hunts and some would pull the trigger and I would help them create their dream, tropical home. I would spend time, on my way to the beach or mountain rides, looking at properties.'

It was on one of these rides, that told many time the hardest business to he was shown an interesting house. It was a cute octagon home built up on steel structure. It looked like a Caribbean house on stilts. The interior was modern with a new kitchen and appliances. It didn't need any work and Paul thought it was a good deal.

"I bought it not thinking of why I wanted it. I certainly wasn't going to move from my mountain compound."

An empty commercial lot, on the main road was included in the deal.

"I would walk this empty lot and wonder what I should build. As anyone that knows me, I can't just do nothing and have the need to create. Here's where my companion, Louis, a standard poodle, is smarter than I am. He loves to eat but is happy with me serving him. He doesn't think that he can do a better job or wants to. I, on the other hand, think, why not build an upscale restaurant?" Nothing to it!

He pointed out the construction process is much different in places like Costa Rica, where there are no building inspectors. They do have electrical inspection and restaurant inspectors. They rely on the engineer that you hired to ensure that it is correctly built. You need to hire a certified engineer/ architect to submit a drawing to the officials of Costa Rica.

Time also moves slowly aboard and Costa Rica is no exception. The local officials will usually get around to your application, but Paul doesn't have a lot of patience for red tape.

"I decide to start immediately, without plans or permits. I brought my crew to the lot and we staked out where this restaurant will live. Workers started to dig the foundation and the rebar is ordered for the foundation."

Costa Rica is in an earthquake zone and this is the only natural disaster that visits. Earthquakes are very common but it is rare for any real issues. Nevertheless you must build accordingly. This means that the foundations look like they are being built to support a high rise. All the rebar is bent, tied and welded by hand. It is lowered into the huge foundations by hand without any equipment. It is surrounded by metres of hand-mixed concrete wheelbarrowed in. Sketches are made and distributed to the workers and somehow, steel columns are erected and walls of concrete block are laid.

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# Funding supports nearly 47,000 new homes in Peel

The Ontario government is helping coming weeks. enable the construction of more than 500.000 new homes across the province through the first round of investments from the province's Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund.

This first round will see the province invest \$970 million in 54 projects across 60 municipalities to help municipalities develop, repair, rehabilitate and expand drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure. In response to the high demand for funding, the government is also allocating an additional \$250 million for a second round of applications starting on August 14, bringing the total amount in the fund to \$1.2 billion.

"Our government's historic investments in infrastructure are helping to tackle Ontario's housing supply crisis and get more homes built across the province," said Premier Doug Ford. "The investments we are announcing today alone will help get more than half-a-million homes built, including nearly 47,000 here in Peel Region. We're going to keep working with our municipal partners to make the dream of homeownership a reality for more families across Ontario."

As part of the first round of funding, the province is providing the Regional Municipality of Peel with \$35 million to support the expansion of the G.E. Booth Water Resource Recovery Facility. This project will enable 46,784 housing units in the Region of Peel and includes the extension of water systems and installation of new features, such as an aeration tank and filtering systems. Additional projects that have been approved for funding will be announced in the

"By investing in drinking water and wastewater treatment facilities and connecting pipes to land, we are helping municipalities build more homes," said Kinga Surma, Minister of Infrastructure. "Homes can't be built without connections to drinking water and wastewater."

"Under the leadership of Premier Ford, our government continues to make record investments to build vital infrastructure to support communities across the province. This expansion to municipal water infrastructure will allow more homes to be built in growing communities like Dufferin-Caledon and ensure a strong foundation for years to come," said Dufferin-Caledon MPP Sylvia Jones.

In this year's budget, the province announced more than \$1.8 billion in housing-enabling infrastructure funding through the \$825 million Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund and the \$1 billion Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program that complements funding announced previously through the province's Building Faster Fund. In response to the significant demand for investments in water and wastewater infrastructure to enable the construction of more homes and after consulting with municipalities, the province is transferring \$275 million from the Municipal Housing Infrastructure Program to the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund in order to meet this demand. In addition, the \$120 million from the Building Faster Fund that was reserved for small, rural and northern communities is being flowed to these communities through the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund.

"When interest rates began to soar and put significant pressure on housing starts, our government focused on making historic investments in infrastructure so that our municipal partners would have the tools in place to unleash development as soon as the Bank of Canada began cutting rates. which Premier Ford has called for repeatedly," said Paul Calandra, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing. "We have heard loud and clear that infrastructure is the number one obstacle for our partners and we will continue to do everything we can to help them build more homes faster."

Through this first round of the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Fund, the province's investment includes a total of \$456 million to support 30 projects in small, rural and northern municipalities without housing targets.

Details about the second application intake and eligibility will be available at ontario.ca/watersystemsfund on August 14, 2024. The second intake will provide an additional \$250 million.

"Peel Region welcomes the Government of Ontario's \$35 million dollar investment in G.E. Booth Water Resource Recovery Facility, as part of the Housing-Enabling Water Systems Funding announced today, G.E. Booth currently processes an average of 518 ML of wastewater per day. Earlier this year, Peel Region council approved an investment of \$130 million to increase flow capacity. The province's additional investment in G.E. Booth will help achieve our goal of increasing wastewater capacity by 40 million litres per day. This increased flow capacity will support the province's goal of helping build more homes," noted Peel Chair Nando Iannicca.

"The restaurant grew out of the ground and quickly took shape. A close friend, a Tico, suggests an upper level where he could go to enjoy the sunsets, cocktails in hand. Why not? The restaurant continued to grow and grow."

It now boasts two levels, two bars, a large air conditioned main area with wine room. The walls have niches for art; there is planters filled with beautiful plants to hide railings and a high ceiling with hanging decorative structures. Lighting is so important and a big part of the design.

Paul noted that in any home, the kitchen is the heart. In a restaurant, it is even more important.

All of the restaurant equipment was designed and manufactured, by hand in Costa Rica. All the appliances are stainless steel of commercial quality. The 8-burner stove, ovens, wash stations, grills, freezers, prep tables, walk-in fridge ...

He noted they were all designed and built for a specific location and purpose, and delivered in 6 weeks. The 2-storey restaurant has floating stairs to the upper level, necessitating a food elevator from the kitchen.

The design floated in his head and things came together like a puzzle.

He's called the restaurant Louis XIII, after my companion Louis. As many know, Louis XIII is an extremely expensive cognac and the theme of the restaurant revolves around it.

"I designed the tables with the XIII as the legs and all the furniture is handsketched and locally manufactured by welders and wood craftsmen. The main restaurant seats about 60, plus two large bars and an upper outdoor section. All of the furniture – from design to manufacture – took less than 6 weeks.

In Costa Rica, power outages are extremely common, so he installed a large generator to keep the restaurant functioning. Landscaping and signage followed and this "animal" is ready to come alive.

Paul said he's extremely pleased with the results, and almost felt like there was nothing to it.

But that was the easy part.

The unknown was running a business and selecting the food, staff, suppliers, etc.

"It is important to have consistency

with quality and supply and this reflects in the menu choices. I enjoy sampling the wine selections and deciding on the types with my expert, Jesse from the Golden Pineapple Villas. She doesn't seem to mind. There are so many decisions – cutlery, settings, glasses of every sort and size, table cloths and napkins. It doesn't end!"

All of the liquor and mixes, menu designs, websites, social media, advertising, a lot was out his wheel house.

The restaurant is within minutes from Paul's house and also minutes from the centre of Uvita.

He doesn't plan to have live music as it takes away from conversation with your companion or guests. Soft, more classical music will be played in the main dining area with a more upbeat on the upper deck.

"Everything is a moving target at this time," he says.

Fresh bread will be baked and homemade pasta will be made daily in the kitchen.

"Quality and presentation will be extremely important. It will be critical to have the staff well dressed and well trained. They will all be fluent in both English and Spanish."

Paul says there are many high-end resorts on this mountain road, so Louis XIII will fit in nicely.

The majority of his clients will be tourists and expats with a sophisticated palette.

"I have spoken to many residents that are looking forward to becoming my customers. One has already insisted that I take \$300 as he wants to be my first paying patron. I took it!"

Paul plans to complete the restaurant before searching for staff. Since he demands quality, he will treat them with respect and offer generous wages.


There are still chefs to hire and train, along with bartenders, a hostess, wait staff and more.

The champagne corks haven't popped yet, but when they do, it will be marvellous.

# Future of Food & Farming' brings business, students and farm together

When we think of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) we often think of students learning the skills they need for the high-tech jobs of tomorrow – and we're not necessarily wrong.

But a new partnership between an Aurora business and a King Township farm is shining a light on how STEM can not only advance traditional farming methods and jobs but feed communities in innovative ways.

The Future of Food & Farming: Innovations in Horticultural and Indoor Agriculture is the brainchild of Aurora's STEM Minds and King's Boreal Farms.

Supported this past spring by a grant of nearly \$300,000 from the Provincial Government, the innovative collaboration is now in full swing at Boreal, located on the northeast corner of King and Weston Roads.

The aim of the program is to provide immersive learning experiences in the field, highlight how STEM technology can be used to innovate agriculture on large and small scales (both indoors or outdoors), and highlight in-demand jobs in agri-tech.

The partnership between STEM Minds and Boreal Farms was borne out of an innovation summit where STEM Minds owner Anu Bidani and Boreal's Brandon Hebor struck up a conversation and had what Bidani describes as an "ah-ha!" moment.

"Teaching STEM with purpose is more impactful than just teaching it in general, so this became a platform to teach with purpose," says Bidani.

With the grant from Ontario's Skills Development Fund, the partnership has been working to raise awareness amongst young people that there is a "huge talent pipeline issue" in the agritech sector and, in doing so, they have underlined the art of just what can be possible in a variety of spaces.

On a rainy Friday afternoon last week, Bidani and Hebor welcomed us to the farm, planted just behind a repurposed school building. The former school yard in which generations of children played is now a fertile oasis that boasts more than 300 tomato plants in four different varieties, cucumber, kale, watermelon, cantaloupe, Korean melon, squash, a variety of peppers, greens and herbs, along with zucchini and garlic.

It's a fitting setting where past meets present and future as Bidani and Hebor aim to bring this type of agricultural knowledge into schools across York Region and South Simcoe where they believe on-site greenhouses and gardens can highlight the intersection of environment and technology.

Just north of the field is a farm building where STEM Minds students showcase several innovations they have spearheaded as part of the program, including a robot they describe as a farm "Roomba," virtual rendition of nearby fields created by drones which can monitor both the health of plants and the soils in which they are planted, and deceptively simple-looking seed-growing kits devised by the students that require no tools or glue to build, but still come equipped with LED lights to help seedlings get off the proverbial ground.

Here, the students demonstrate how the drone work can provide real-time data on the state of the crops while the robot can be programmed for deployment in the fields overnight to pull weeds and a number of other tasks, boosting efficiency and reducing labour.

"On this journey, we have realized how little people actually understand small-scale farming opportunities," says Bidani.

Adds Hebor: "Agricultural education helps them also become informed consumers – buying food, understanding the value of local food is not necessarily the dollar value of the produce; it's how it was grown, who is growing it, and is that money staying in the local economy? Working with kids and having the hook of technology in this day and age, we can also use that hook of technology to understand the land, what regenerative farming is, what local food is, and then when they get to come to the farm and taste the food, it makes a huge difference.

"I have had hundreds of students for whom it is their first time ever picking produce from a farm. They have gone to farms, but it's usually pumpkin farms or hay fields, so picking tomatoes, cu-



cumbers, or peppers right off the vine is an experience that leaves a memory. In everything we teach them, there is this underlying theme of supporting our needs of today while thinking about resilience for tomorrow."

Recent statistics have shown Canada needs approximately 30,000 more permanent agricultural workers in the next 15 years and a goal of the program is to teach and train the up-and-coming generation how to become involved and find success in the sector while also challenging notions of farming.

Farming isn't something limited to the types of fields we see dotting the edges of country roads. Instead, indoor farming under the right conditions, they stress, can take place in warehouses, storage containers, and, of course, outdoor locations like school yards and parks

"A school is a place where families congregate and those families could subscribe to a student food basket and build an economic model for something like that even better," says Hebor.

"What if some of those school portables were converted to indoor farms and greenhouses?" muses Bidani, pointing to the student hard at work on their innovations. "Just imagine the live lab we have happening here right inside schools. To us, that is the big value of this proposition. Unlike [a commercial farm field], when people walk in here it is not overwhelming. When you walk onto a big 200-acre farm, you think, 'I can't do this,' but this I can do. When you start putting technology with it, the impact is huge and the fear factor just kind of goes away."

An added bonus, she says, is teachers who have come to see the program happen see applications in just about every subject.

"Everything we're teaching here is in the curriculum; it's just not taught through the lens of agriculture (at school), whether it is biology, lighting systems, plant physiology, even irrigation and plumbing," says Hebor. "It is taught in a very different lens, perhaps, because teachers don't know enough about agriculture to be able to deliver that to students. If we're able to be a hub and create knowledge-sharing for students, similar to Anu when she started up with STEM Minds, and have a hub where teachers would come in, then that knowledge could be spread out"

Schools, notes Bidani, study data analysis but it is often just in "theoretical models." If such places of learning had indoor farms, greenhouses, or other forms of agriculture, it will offer students live data to study right from their school yard.

"That's the beauty of what we can do when we start to think about it," she

In the meantime, for the balance of summer, participants in The Future of Food & Farming: Innovations in Horticultural and Indoor Agriculture program will continue to tweak and further their innovations for the future and the idea is that once these designs are finished and perfected they will serve as an Open Source-type of file that can be shared with any student, classroom or teacher going forward.

"It starts building community," says Bidani. "We're sharing, learning, and collaborating and that's the intent of this - showing the intent of what you can do with simple design-building. I think this collaboration between farming knowledge and technical knowledge is where the power is. The more we marry the two, the more innovation we will see in smallscale farming and have kids in school innovating before they even graduate and having an impact in many different ways."

To see for yourself, Boreal and STEM Minds will host a Community Night at the farm at 13175 Weston Road in King, the theme of which is Growing Mushrooms, which will feature a hands-on project on how to inoculate mushroom logs for home cultivation. #### OPP charges over long weekend disappointing

These behaviours account for a significant number of preventable deaths every year. Officers also conducted enforcement and education around Ontario's Move Over Law.

The OPP laid a total of 8,050 charges associated with various traffic, marine and off-road vehicle laws between Friday afternoon and Monday night (Aug. 2-5).


Among the traffic charges:

ed driving, 69; No seatbelt, 554, and Move Over law, 99.



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



# New police helicopters will help prevent carjackings in GTA

To fight against car thieves and organized crime, the Ontario government is investing \$134 million to purchase five new police helicopters for use in the Greater Toronto Area and Ottawa. Equipped with the latest technology, the helicopters will help keep highways and roadways safe from violent carjackings, auto theft, street racing and impaired driving.

"Our government is making the necessary investments to ensure that police services have the tools and resources they need to crack down on auto theft and car thieves," said Premier Doug Ford. "From implementing new technologies and innovative policing strategies to tackling guns and gangs and getting more boots on the ground, we'll do whatever it takes to put the criminals behind bars and keep our communities safe."

As part of a new Joint Air Support Unit, the Ontario Provincial Police will acquire two new H135 helicopters to provide support to Ottawa and Toronto Police Services. In addition, three helicopters will be procured, owned and operated by Durham, Halton and Peel Regional Police Services to support current patrols and improve response times

"Criminal networks have become more sophisticated, but so have we," said Solicitor General Michael Kerzner. "In Ontario, a car is stolen every 14 minutes – this is completely unacceptable. These helicopters will be a critical tool in helping police stay one step ahead of the criminals who are stealing cars and committing crimes on our streets."

The investment in new helicopters was announced in the 2024 Ontario Budget and builds on the province's \$51 million investment to support the OPP's Provincial Auto Theft and Towing Team and Ontario's Major Auto Theft Prosecution Response Team.

"We are investing directly in the wellbeing of Ontario families, who deserve to feel safe in their homes and communities," said Minister of Finance Peter Bethlenfalvy. "With these five new helicopters patrolling our roadways and neighbourhoods, we're sending a clear message to criminals that we do not tolerate threats to public safety."

"Air support is an extremely effective law enforcement and public safety tool that significantly enhances the capacity of the police to detect crime, disrupt criminal activity, safely apprehend offenders and assist vulnerable missing persons. The establishment of the Joint Air Support Unit and the expansion of OPP Aviation Services will contribute greatly to the safety of our communi-

ties and the security of our province," said Thomas Carrique, OPP Commissioner.

The 2024 Budget: Building a Better Ontario supports the government's ongoing efforts to enhance public safety in Ontario by ensuring police services have the resources to respond to major incidents and urgent situations.

As a result of Project Vector, a joint effort between the OPP and the Canada Border Services Agency, 598 vehicles worth approximately \$34.5 million were recovered from the Port of Montreal between December 2023 and March 2024.

Co-led by Toronto Police Service and the OPP, the GTA multi-agency Provincial Carjacking Joint Task Force made 124 arrests, laid 749 charges, recovered 177 vehicles and seized eight firearms between September 2023 and March 2024. The Ontario government is investing \$112 million to help police track and monitor repeat and violent offenders who are released on bail. This includes \$24 million to help police services establish dedicated bail compliance and/or warrant apprehension teams and support new technology for a province-wide bail compliance monitoring system

"This is a monumental investment that will provide much needed support to our officers and help them in the work they do every day to enhance community safety. The addition of these helicopters is a great example of what can be accomplished when police services and the provincial government work together to help improve police response and the safety of the citizens of Ontario," added Nishan Duraiappah, Peel Regional Police Chief.

This type of theft occurs all across York Region.





# **Blood donors are needed**

Appointment bookings at Canadian Blood Services' blood and plasma donor centres across the country are not keeping pace with the rise in demand for blood products.

Demand for blood products was stable for nearly a decade, and at times even declined slightly. Now, hospital demand is quickly rising. While there is a dedicated group of people who have been donating blood and plasma regularly, there are simply not enough people donating to meet the growing demand. New donors are needed to help keep the national blood supply well stocked.

Currently, only about 80 per cent of the available appointments are booked each week, leaving the national supply at risk of falling short as the summer rolls on and the supply dwindles. Patients are counting on people making the time to donate, to ensure a steady supply of blood and blood products.

"Today, more patients need blood products than we have seen over the past decade," says Dr. Kathryn Webert, medical director for Canadian Blood Services. "This is because there has been an increase in surgeries and treatments that require blood transfusions. The population is both growing and aging, and the number of patients with diseases that are treated with blood products is going up."

Blood products play a critical role in everyday medical care. Many people with various health conditions require regular transfusion therapy. For example, a person living with thalassemia could need blood every two to five weeks, and a person living with leukemia may need blood from up to 8 donors every week.

In addition, new studies showing the benefit of blood and products made from plasma, as well as advances in medical care that allow for treating some conditions more aggressively are putting increased pressure on existing inventories. It is crucial that more people donate this summer to keep pace with the growing demand.

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

## Expanded vaccine program to include children and pregnant women

The Ontario government is expanding the Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) program to connect more infants, high-risk children and pregnant women to RSV vaccines that can help protect themselves and their loved ones during the fall respiratory illness sea-

"Our government is taking steps to ensure Ontarians of all ages have the tools they need to be prepared and keep themselves and their loved ones safe and healthy," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. "By expanding the number of children eligible under the RSV prevention program, our government is making it easier for families to access the care and protection they need ahead of respiratory illness season."

Starting this fall, families with infants and high-risk children up to 24 months old, will now have access to the new RSV immunization, Beyfortus®, through the publicly funded RSV prevention program. Pregnant women will also have the option to receive a single dose of Abrysvo®, an RSV vaccine that can provide protection for their infant from birth to six months of age. More health care system as a whole," said Dr. moves closer to respiratory illness seadetails on the expanded RSV program, including where families will be able to access vaccines will be provided in the coming weeks.

# Give your kitchen cabinets a facelift in 6 easy steps

Oil-free paints called alkyds are great for durability as well. When choosing your colours, you can't go wrong picking from a designer-endorsed palette like Behr's colours of the year, which is only available at The Home Depot.

#### PRIME THE CABINETS

If you're going lighter than the current colour or your cabinets are new, you will need to prime them. Apply your primer by painting the edges with a brush first, then rolling the middle for the fastest coverage. Allow them to dry completely.

#### **PAINT DOORS AND DRAWERS**

Once your frames are painted, you can let them dry and move on to the doors. Put boards on the ground and then lay your cabinet doors flat on top of them. This keeps them off the ground while painting. Start painting from the middle of the door and work your way out towards the edges. Let them dry completely. If you want a more vibrant colour, consider adding a second coat. Don't be worried if there are brush marks, they'll even out as the paint dries.

#### **REASSEMBLE**

Once your paint is dry, reassemble your cabinets by putting the hardware back on the doors if you removed it and then reattaching the doors to the cabinets. Once everything is assembled, you can stand back and take in your brand-new kitchen look.

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# 6 HOME RENO PROJECTS

# to tackle before it gets too cold

(NC) When the days are starting to get shorter and the nights get colder, it's time to start thinking about keeping your home warm and comfortable throughout the fall and winter months. Before the weather starts cooling off dramatically, review and tackle this checklist:

#### PERFORM A ROOF INSPECTION AND REPAIR LOOSE SHINGLES

Have a professional check your roof to ensure your shingles are intact. Also, make sure your gutters and downspouts are free and clear of leaves and branches. Apply roof repair glue to any loose shingles to help avoid leaks or damage. If your roof needs a fix, many local hardware stores like The Home Depot Canada have installation services to help. Make sure to schedule the work before the weather gets too cold.

#### TURN OFF EXTERIOR FAUCETS

Turn off all exterior faucets and drain water from outdoor hoses, pipes, valves and sprinkler heads to prevent bursts. You should also consider installing frost-proof faucets.

#### INSTALL HEATING CABLES

Roof heating cables will help you avoid long-term damage caused by freezing and ice dam build-up. Before installing the cables make sure your eavestroughs

and roof have been thoroughly cleaned. Affix roof cable clips in a zigzag pattern. Finally, attach and secure your heating cable to the clips and connect the power supply.

#### **SEAL GAPS AND CRACKS**

"Sealing the gaps and cracks around your windows and doors when the weather is still warm is essential to keep your home comfortable while using less energy this winter," says Jack Rende, senior building materials merchant at The Home Depot Canada. "Any gaps wider than the width of a nickel between your siding and window or door frames should have caulking applied to them. Use your finger or a wet caulk-smoothing tool to smooth your seal within 2 to 5 minutes of application."

#### **CLEAN GUTTERS AND ADD GUTTER GUARDS**

Clean gutters allow water to easily flow from your rooftop and away from your home, preventing damage to your foundation and ice buildup on your roof. Installing gutter guards is a great way to avoid the buildup of leaves and other debris in your gutters.

#### WEATHERSTRIP YOUR WINDOWS AND DOORS

Weatherstripping your windows and doors is another great way to keep the cold out. To find out where weatherstripping is needed, wet your hand and run it along your door seam or window casing. The moisture on your hand will help you detect any incoming drafts. Door sweeps and adhesive-backed insulation foam are also very effective draft deterrents.

- Change it Up For a truly distinctive look, don't be afraid to mix colours and materials, such as combining dark aluminum railing with white composite posts.

#### LIGHT IT UP

To extend the amount of time you're able to spend enjoying your outdoor space, integrate deck lighting into your railing. Look for energy-efficient, easy-to-install LED lighting options that are specifically designed for use on railing post caps and post rails. There are even solar-powered caps that harness energy from the sun to deliver enhanced ambiance without any electrical wiring.


