

King receives \$1-million infrastructure grant

King-Vaughan MPP Stephen Lecce addressed infrastructure needs in King Township by presenting a \$1,054,000 grant to Mayor Steve Pellegrini in the King Municipal Centre gymnasium on Monday morning.

With posters of high energy King Olympic gold medalists Rosie MacLennan and Alex Pietrangelo serving as colorful backdrops, the Energy and Electrification Minister delivered a gold medal performance of his own. He acknowledged the expansive nature of King Township and its unique infrastructure needs: "This grant of \$1,054,000 builds on a legacy of providing revitalization grants for projects such as the revitalization of downtown Schomberg and the installation and

improvement of broadband service, and more recently, the Province's \$17-million investment last year in the new state-of-the-art recreation centre. All of these investments make a big difference for the residents of King."

Minister Lecce thanked all the political partners across the Township for working together for the greater good. In keeping with the spirit of multilevel political cooperation, Mayor Steve Pellegrini expressed his gratitude to MPP Lecce and equated the \$1-million grant "to saving King taxpayers a 3% increase in taxes to support infrastructure projects across the Township." The ebullient mayor noted that the grant would be used for "road reconstruction, road paving, upgrading culverts, and bridge maintenance."

King Township establishes new land acknowledgement

King Township is paying homage to Indigenous communities and our history.

Councillors adopted the creation of a Township-wide Land Acknowledgment recently, reflecting past, present and future Indigenous communities in King. It also reaffirms King's commitment towards Truth and Reconciliation.

Once completed, the Land Acknowledgement will physically be represented at each municipal site as a lasting reminder.

Staff noted the acknowledgement is the municipality's first stop in defining its own policy regarding Indigenous initiatives and Truth & Reconciliation, with the intent of encouraging stronger relationships with Indigenous communities and nations, including our Treaty Partners: the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and the Williams Treaty First Nation.

With council's okay, staff will craft the acknowledgement and presented it back to council in 2025.

Similar to acknowledging the land's history, and often recited prior to public and council meetings, the new Land Acknowledgement will recognize the Indigenous peoples who have called the land upon which King Township sits home.

An early draft, prior to the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation Sept. 30, reads:

"We acknowledge that the Township of King sits within the Treaty Lands and Territory of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and the Williams Treaty First Nation, as well as the traditional territory of the Huron-Wendat and Haudenosaunee peoples. We thank them for sharing this land with us. Together, we will continue to celebrate the heritage, diverse cultures and outstanding achievements of Indigenous people."

Councillor Debbie Schaefer said she was pleased with the process staff went through, as well as reaching out to Indigenous groups.

"We are making an effort to be more aware of the history" and current events, she said.

In 2023, Heritage and Cultural staff engaged in recognized training on Land Acknowledgements to learn how to use them beyond an initial statement; and, create a meaningful impact to support Indigenous peoples in the community. Through this course, staff recognized the existing acknowledgement was not sufficient for properly recognizing the important role that Indigenous peoples play in our history, present, and future; nor, did it recognize the impacts of colonization on this land. To rectify this, staff first wrote a new draft Land Acknowledgement using lessons from that course. In late 2023, staff engaged Indigenous consultant Andrew McConnell (Secondment to the Faculty of Education at York University in Toronto and former Indigenous Education Coordinator to York Region District School Board) to edit and refine the statement to the current proposed version. It has helped staff understand the importance and meaning behind its words.

was also sent directly to Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation for approval, whereby it was confirmed satisfactory without further amendments required.

A Land Acknowledgement expresses gratitude to the Indigenous people whose territory we reside on and honors those who have lived here since time immemorial.

"More importantly, it acknowledges that Indigenous communities reside within these territories today, as their roles continue to shape our present and future. This message is crucial in understanding the history that brought us here and our dynamic role within it." staff noted in their report. "Land Acknowledgments also highlight the effects of colonialism ongoing to this day, requiring mindfulness of our present participation. This practice follows Indigenous protocol, respecting the original stewards of the land."

Many municipalities in Ontario (and across Canada) have adopted Land Acknowledgements for use at council meetings, official municipal events or displayed prominently including Georgina, East Gwillimbury, Newmarket, Vaughan, Richmond Hill, Markham, York Region, and others. Several municipalities also post a Land Acknowledgement on their respective websites with additional information on Truth and Reconciliation and the Indigenous histories of their community.

In the 1400s, the Wyandot people (Huron or Wendat) traditionally inhabited areas around Lake Ontario and Georgian Bay, but by the 1600s, European diseases and Haudenosaunee expansion led to their dispersion. The Haudenosaunee, living south of Lake Ontario, destroyed Wyandot villages in the 1649-1650 period, expanding their territory. By the 1680s, the Anishinaabe pushed the Haudenosaunee back south of Lake Ontario.

The 1787 Gunshot Treaty was later disputed, while the 1805 Toronto Purchase between the Mississaugas and the British Crown was ratified. In 1923, the Williams Treaties were signed with various First Nations. Settlements in 2010 and 2018 with the Canadian government addressed compensation for historical grievances, including \$145 million for the Toronto Purchase Claim and Brant Tract Claim in 2010, and \$666 million from Canada and \$444 million from Ontario in 2018, along with recognition of treaty rights and additional reserve lands.

King Township sits in the boundarles of two separate treaties: Treaty 13 (also known as the "Toronto Purchase") which was signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN): and the Williams Treaty with the Williams Treaty First Nation. To ensure that the drafted Land Acknowledgement was acceptable, the MCFN were contacted in Summer 2024 for approval and have given their assent for the proposed statement to be used by the Township. During this process, the Township will continue to strengthen relationships with Indigenous Treaty Partners: the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and the Williams Treaty First Nations; as, well as build new relationships with Indigenous communities and nations. As per the Land Acknowledgement statement, the Township will continue to promote Indigenous initiatives, culture, and heritage in the Township and develop partnerships mutual to both parties.

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

There's no real reason for the climate and biodiversity crises to have gotten to this point, and there's no good reason for them to continue getting worse. We've known for decades what the problem is — while we had ample time to address it — and we have no shortage of solutions. Many of those solutions are already creating positive change and more are being developed every day.

The world is rapidly shifting to electric power, and renewable energy sources — mainly solar, wind and hydro, with storage — are supplying an ever-increasing amount: 30 per cent in 2023, according to the Energy Institute, up from 29 per cent the previous year. Policies such as the Inflation Reduction Act in the United States are showing results, such as lower emissions, cleaner power and increased electrification. Spinoff benefits include reduced pollu-

tion and related health care costs, good employment and economic returns.

It's not enough.

Coal, oil and gas made up 60 per cent of electricity generation in 2023, with polluting coal making up the largest share. Nuclear power generation which is expensive, potentially dangerous and takes a long time to build - remained steady at nine per cent. Global oil production reached record highs in 2023.

We also know that protecting and restoring natural areas provides a hedge against runaway climate disruption, because oceans, plants, peat bogs and wetlands sequester carbon and keep it from entering the atmosphere. At the 2022 United Nations Biodiversity Conference (COP15) in Montreal, countries agreed to a 30X30 plan – "to halt and reverse nature loss, including putting 30

degraded ecosystems under protection by 2030." Progress will be reviewed at COP16 in Colombia later this month.

Technology won't get us entirely out of the mess we've created, but it is and will continue to be a big part of the cure. Technological advances over the past few decades show there's no reason to think we can't come up with even better remedies. Most of us now casually carry mini-computers more powerful than the computing systems that put people on the moon! Renewable energy and storage technologies are rapidly improving and dropping in price.

We also need to use less energy and use it more efficiently — which shouldn't be difficult because those of us living in the industrialized world use exponentially more than necessary. In 2022, Canada had the seventh-highest energy consumption per capita and the U.S. was 10th. Qatar is number one. On average, a person in Canada con-

per cent of the planet and 30 per cent of sumes more than 20 times the energy as a person in Pakistan or the Philippines. Even among northern countries, Canada uses close to twice the energy per capita as Sweden or Germany.

> The problem is that rapidly digging up and burning fossil fuels, logging forests and paving over wetlands for development are all extremely profitable. There's a reason the automobile industry has long focused on building vehicles that require enormous amounts of fuel. Our current capitalist economic system, which measures progress through growth in gross domestic product, or GDP, encourages wasteful consumption. More growth in everything from population to industrial development creates more profit (albeit mostly concentrated in the hands of a few), which leads to more devastation.

Now we're exceeding six of nine planetary boundaries and are close to breaching a seventh. These are "processes that regulate the stability and resilience of the Earth system." As the Stockholm Resilience Centre warns, "Crossing boundaries increases the risk of generating large-scale abrupt or irreversible environmental changes. Drastic changes will not necessarily happen overnight, but together the boundaries mark a critical threshold for increasing risks to people and the ecosystems we are part of."

Climate change, introduction of novel entities (synthetic chemicals Earth can't process), change in biosphere integrity, modification of biogeochemical flows, land system change and freshwater change have all been transgressed to varying degrees, and "Ocean acidification is approaching a critical threshold." Only ozone depletion and atmospheric aerosol loading are stable or improving, thanks to international agreements.

It doesn't have to be this way. We have solutions. But we need to exercise more foresight and imagination. We can and must change the systems that have brought us to this point where our life-support systems are starting to disintegrate.

Residents asked for input into fighting invasive plants

to take a stand in the fight against invasive species with the launch of the King Invasive Species Survey.

This innovative initiative, part of the Township's Invasive Species Management Strategy (ISM), is designed to tackle some of Ontario's most destructive invaders - like Giant Hogweed, Emerald Ash Borer and Purple Loosestrife - which are threatening the health of local ecosystems. By participating in the survey, residents can help shape the Township's action plan and become active stewards of King's natural environment.

Ontario is home to several invasive species that cause significant damage to ecosystems, infrastructure and local economies. According to Ontario's Ministry of Natural Resources, some of the most destructive invasive species include:

Emerald Ash Borer: This metallic-green beetle, originally from Asia, has decimated ash tree populations across Ontario. It disrupts entire ecosystems by killing ash trees, which play a vital role in forests and urban landscapes.

Giant Hogweed: This large, dangerous plant poses a serious health risk to

King Township is asking residents humans. Its toxic sap can cause severe burns, blisters and long-term skin sensitivity when exposed to sunlight.

> Zebra Mussel: These small, freshwater mussels clog water pipes, damage boat engines and alter ecosystems by filtering out nutrients, disrupting the food chain in lakes and rivers.

> Asian Carp: A highly invasive fish species threatening to enter the Great Lakes, Asian carp out compete native fish for food, leading to a disruption of aquatic ecosystems.

> Purple Loosestrife: Known for its bright purple flowers, this plant rapidly invades wetlands, displacing native vegetation and reducing biodiversity, which impacts wildlife that depends on native plants for food and habitat.

> Spongy moth: This invasive insect defoliates trees, especially hardwoods like oak, maple and birch, causing extensive forest damage and weakening trees.

> Phragmites: This tall, reed-like plant takes over wetlands and roadside ditches, crowding out native species and reducing habitats for wildlife, particularly birds. King Township has been treating and monitoring Phragmites in the Dufferin Marsh in Schomberg.

The King Invasive Species Survey

invites residents to share their knowledge and experiences with invasive species in the Township. The survey's findings will directly influence the ISM, shaping future educational resources, fact sheets, workshops and hands-on removal or mitigation efforts to combat the spread of these harmful species.

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


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Remaining vigilant in our quest for pristine air

We're on an upward trend in pursuing ways to maintain our health and well being.

The air we breathe is paramount and we must remain vigilant in keeping our homes pure and clean. It's our first and best defence against airborne nasties.



Report outlines need for employment lands in King

To address King's growth over the next 25 years, staff has been asked to create intensification and employment land targets.

Council, at its recent meeting, directed staff to prepare final population, housing and employment forecasts, by village, to 2051.

Staff will also explore higher Employment Area targets and intensification targets for each village, Employment Area, Designated Greenfield Area (DGA), and Built-Up Area (BUA).

Staff will report back to council later this fall.

The Township retained Watson & Associates Economists Ltd. to prepare Growth Management and Employment Land Strategies to inform the Official Plan Review and the Township's land needs to 2051.

By 2051 the Township is expected to grow to 51,000 people, 17,400 households, and 17,700 jobs.

The Phase 1 Report concludes that Schomberg and King City are expected to build out by 2051, and that Nobleton will have a deficit of 8 hectares of residential land, and a 21 net hectare deficit of employment lands by 2051.

Staff pointed out the Employment Area forecast set out for the Township in the Phase 1 Report is not intended to be a constraint, and King has the ability to exceed this target.

In early 2024, the Township retained Watson to prepare the Growth Management (GMS) and Employment Land (ELS) Strategies. The Strategies are intended to support and inform the Township's Official Plan Review, which will guide growth in King to 2051. They provide an assessment of existing conditions and King's long-term potential for growth, as well as population, housing, and employment forecasts for each of the Township's villages and, land needs analyses.

The Official Plan review was initiated following a special council meeting in September of 2023. In accordance with Section 26 of the Planning Act, Municipalities are required to update their Official Plans no later than 10 years after coming into effect and every five years thereafter. Municipalities

are also required to bring their Official Plans into conformity with the Official Plan of their upper-tier municipality within one year of approval. The York Region Official Plan 2022 was approved, subject to modifications, by the Province in November 2022 and further modified by Provincial Bills 150 and 162 in December 2023 and February 2024, respectively. When King's Official Plan Review was initiated in 2023, the Township was required to conform to the York Region Official Plan within one vear.

However, provincial legislative changes out York Region as an upper-tier without planning responsibilities and established that relevant sections of the York Region Official Plan that apply to King now constitute an official plan of the Township. This plan remains in effect until King revokes it or amends it.

The Township's current Official Plan, Our King, was adopted in September 2019, approved by York Region in September 2020, and is now due for an update to conform to and integrate the relevant policies of the York Region Official Plan, 2022. Our King establishes a comprehensive set of policies to provide direction and set the framework for managing growth, land use and infrastructure decisions within the Township to the 2031 planning horizon. Through this Official Plan Review, the updated Our King will contemplate a planning horizon of 2051.

Since Our King was adopted, a number of changes have occurred at the provincial and regional levels that impact how the Township should plan for its future. Updates have been made to the Planning Act, the Provincial Policy Statement (PPS, 2020), A Place to Growth-The Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe (Growth Plan), the Greenbelt Plan, the Oak Ridges Moraine Conservation Plan (ORMCP), and the Region's Official Plan (YROP).

Further, as of July 1, 2024, York Region became an upper-tier municipality without planning responsibilities under the Planning Act, and as of Oct. 20, additional changes will come into effect for Ontario's planning framework, including:

The Growth Plan and PPS, 2020, will both be repealed and replaced by the Provincial Planning Statement (PPS, 2024).

amendment to the Greenbelt Plan will come into effect so that the policies of the PPS 2020 and Growth Plan will continue to apply where the Greenbelt Plan refers to them.

The new definition of "area of employment" in the Planning Act will come into effect.

These changes in Ontario's planning framework have implications for the Growth Management and Employment Land Strategies, which have been assessed and considered through the Phase 1 Report prepared by Watson.

To support the development of the Phase 1 Report, a virtual public open house was held on the Growth Management Strategy in May 2024 which had over 60 attendees. In addition, targeted consultation in the form of one-onone meetings were held with business owners and employment landowners to inform the Employment Land Strategy. A public open house was recently held on Sept. 16, to present the findings of the Phase 1 Report and seek community feedback on its conclusions. A consultation summary detailing what was heard through all the consultation sessions will be prepared and included in the next Report to Council in October 2024.

Based on the June 2024 forecast, the Region is forecast to accommodate a total of 2.064 million residents and 989,200 jobs by 2051. The Region also prepared growth allocations for each of the lower-tier municipalities, including King, starting from 2021 with a forecast to 2051. The Report from Watson breaks the forecast down into 5-year increments from 2021 to 2051. The following summarizes the Region's forecast for the Township:

The Township's population is forecast to increase to 51,000 in 2051. The number of residential dwellings in the Township is projected to increase by 8,400 units by 2051 to approximately 17,400 households. King's employment is forecast to increase to 17,700 jobs in 2051.

In addition to the municipal growth allocations, the Region also identified intensification targets, greenfield densities, Employment Area densities and other growth management considerations which have been explored through Watson's Phase 1 Report.

Based on forecasts, the Township will

A consequential administrative require approximately 8,390 new households by 2051, or 280 new households annually. The report finds that over the long-term, housing demand is anticipated to gradually shift away from single/semi-detached units towards townhouses and low- and medium-rise apartment dwellings, largely driven by housing affordability and increased demand associated with the Township's growing seniors population. The Report finds that over the 2021 to 2051 forecast period, new housing development is forecast to comprise 34% low-density, 22% medium density (townhouses) and 44% high density (apartment) units. However, even with this shift the total housing base is expected to remain predominantly low-density dwellings.

> The report also allocates the Township-wide forecast population and housing by Village and, to the rural areas. The allocation of new households is forecast as follows -68% to be accommodated in King City; 28% to be accommodated in Nobleton, and 4% to be accommodated in Schomberg.

In terms of overall population growth, King City is forecast to be the largest Village in 2051.

Community Area Lands are comprised of the Township's three villages. or Nobleton, the Community Area Lands are more specifically the lands within the Nobleton Urban Area rather than the village boundary.

The majority of growth (52%) is anticipated to be accommodated through intensification, primarily within the BUAs of the villages, however, this will be subject to enhancements in water and wastewater servicing capacities. Community Area Lands also include population related employment, (i.e., office, retail and commercial uses). An assessment of the Township's commercial needs is under way and will be presented as part of the Phase 2 Report from Watson.

The deficit in Nobleton has been a larger proportion of higher-density ares of Employment Lands within Noidentified after including the additional 20 hectares of lands currently designated for employment in Nobleton (Pre-Brick Official Plan/Zoning Bylaw Amendment Applications) which are proposed to be converted to Community Area.

While a deficit is forecast for Nobleton, the King City and Schomberg designated greenfield areas are anticipated to be fully built out over the forecast period, assuming sufficient servicing capacity is available to support the growth.

In addition to the land deficit, the Phase 1 Report concludes with the following observations for the Growth Management Strategy:

More than half the Township's housing growth over the forecast period is to be accommodated through intensification within the built-up area. Achieving this intensification target will require development than what has occurred previously.

If the intensification target is not realized, greater emphasis will be placed on the greenfield areas to accommodate growth, which may require additional greenfield lands and/or higher densities on greenfield lands.

With the changes to the planning framework proposed through the 2024 PPS, urban expansions are allowed for up to a 30-year horizon from the date of the approval of the Official Plan. As additional land needs will likely arise between 2051 and 2056, there is an opportunity to consider these needs through this Official Plan Review.

Exceeding the employment forecasts for the Township would ultimately increase the land needs by 2051.

By 2051 it is forecast that the Township will need an additional 21 net hectbleton.

King City and Schomberg's Employment Areas are forecast to fully build out within the 2051 planning horizon.

The report also noted that an urban boundary expansion for Nobleton (into the Nobleton Village Reserve) represents the best opportunity to establish a new Employment Area.

Council has directed staff to prepare final population, housing and employment forecasts; final intensification and density targets; identify potential locations for urban boundary expansions; and explore the option of a higher employment area target, based on all council and public comments received.

A report to council is slated for Oct. 28 to present the density and intensification targets for each village, Employment Area, Designated Greenfield Area (DGA), and Built-Up Area (BUA).


This past weekend, King Township was buzzing with excitement for Power King, an electric vehicle event held at the township municipal centre.

School zone safety rules

Now that summer has come to an end, school zones that were vacant just weeks ago are now some of the busiest areas in town. Ensure you and your children stay safe this season by following our safety tips for driving in school zones:

Know when to stop for a school bus

While each municipality may have its own bylaws for driving around school buses, here are some general rules to keep in mind:

- If you're driving in either direction on a road without a meridian strip - a paved, planted or landscaped strip that separates traffic going in the opposite direction - you must stop for a stopped school bus if both its upper red lights are flashing
- On a road **with** a median strip, only vehicles coming from behind the bus must stop
- If you're behind the school bus, stop at least 20 metres away
- If you're approaching the school bus from the

and assist children crossing the street. When a guard displays a stop sign, you **must** stop before reaching the crossing and remain stopped until everyone, including the guard, is safely off the road. Drivers that don't follow these rules can receive a hefty fine and three demerit points.

Know the school zone speed limit

School zones often have lower speed limits to help protect children. Most Canadian provinces and territories set school zone speed limits at 30-40 kilometres per hour in urban areas and 50 kilometres per hour in rural ones – so, if vou're unable to locate a posted speed limit, use this as your guide.

Pay attention in school parking lots

Be extra mindful when entering a school parking lot. Only travel in designated directions and be aware that if you stop, it should be for dropoffs only. If you need to get out and walk your children inside, park your vehicle in a designated spot

front, stop at a safe distance for children to get off and cross the road in front of you

Be prepared to stop at any time

Passing a stopped school bus could result in a fine of \$400 to \$2,000 and up to six demerit points for a first offence. Repeated offences can be more severe, with jail time up to six months.

Obey the school crossing guards

You may encounter crossing guards in school zones. They're legally permitted to stop traffic

Speed limit reductions at in King will improve traveller safety

York Regional Council approved reducing speed limits at six locations on various Regional roads to minimize severe collisions and enhance public safety in the Region.

There are three in King:

Highway 27 from 230 metres south of Oliver Emerson Avenue to 100 metres south of King-Vaughan Road (in King) from 70 km/hr to 60 km/hr.

We ston Road from 210 metres north of King Road to 80 metres south of 16th Sideroad, from 80 km/hr to 70 km/hr.

Dufferin Street from Lloydtown-Aurora Road/18th Sideroad to 325 metres north

of Wellington Street West, from 80 km/hr to 70 km/hr.

Dufferin Street from 145 metres south of Wellington Street West to 15th Sideroad, from 80 km/hr to 70 km/hr.

"Lower speed limits help protect all travellers and promote a safer road environment for cyclists and pedestrians," said York Region Chairman and CEO Wayne Emmerson. "As more people are walking, cycling, taking transit or driving in and across our growing communities, it is important to review and adjust speed limits appropriately."

The York Region Vision Zero Traveller Safety Plan identifies speeding as a contributing factor in aggressive driving behaviours leading to collisions. This plan was approved by Regional Council in March 2024 to reduce severe collisions and create safer travel in the Region.

"Protecting vulnerable road users is crucial as these travellers are more likely to sustain injury or death if involved in a collision," said Aurora Mayor Tom Mrakas, chair of the Region's Public Works Transportation Services. "Consistent speed limits encourage compliance and improve safety for everyone travelling on Regional roads with minimal impact to travel time."

Speed limit revisions are recommended and approved based on principles, including industry standards and criteria in the Region's Establishing Speed Limits on Regional Roads Policy, which guides decisions for a consistent approach. The Highway Traffic Act gives Regional Council authority to revise speed limits under 100 km/hr.





White Fang grandmaster shares four decades of experience with students

Taekwon-Do Grandmaster Angela Scarsellone peers out at her students as they file into their temporary home on the second floor of the King City Lions Arena on a Tuesday night.

She greets the white-uniformed kids warmly by name, adjusts their belts and uniforms prior to class, and projects this super mom aura who loves what she does: "I've been instructing Taekwon-Do for over forty years. I've always been very athletic, I loved playing rep soccer, basketball, volleyball and competing in gymnastics and cross country, but as soon as I put on this white uniform, there was no turning back and it truly became a way of life. I want to be more than an instructor to them. I want to have profound connections to my students."

Scarsellone's connection to her young charges is evident as the auditorium fills with Taekwon-Do enthusiasts ranging in age from 6 to 18. The youthful Grandmaster acknowledges the teacher-student bonds that she has enjoyed over the course of an instructional career which started at the Driftwood Community Centre in Toronto: "I worked for the City of Toronto and White Fang made a difference in so many lives in an under-served neighbourhood. We had a successful program that helped disadvantaged youth, but Mayor Rob Ford's government cut all the recreation programs. As a result, we moved the program to Vaughan and Concord. So many connections have been made in the Region over the years. I have students that call me on Mother's Day. I've been invited to their weddings. In fact, I just taught the child of one of my former students so I'm experiencing The Circle of Life."

White Fang's fearless leader was recognized in 2023 in a 9th Dan ceremony as the highest-ranked female Grandmaster worldwide in the ICTF Organization. In 1991, she won nine medals at the National Championships in Regina, Saskatchewan and represented Canada at the 1992 World Championships in Pyongyang, North Korea. Scarsellone was Captain of Team Canada when the national squad finished 3rd in a 72-team field in St. Petersburg, Russia. With this impressive resume, she brings a unique level of expertise and international competitive experience to her classroom in King City: "As the highest-ranked female Grandmaster in Canada, I was proud to represent Canada in three

world championships. I was trained by the founder of Taekwon-Do. I remember working through my certification while I was five months pregnant and achieved 5th degree under the instruction of very influential leaders in the global Taekwon-Do community."

Scarsellone offers this wealth and depth of experience to her Taekwon-Do students on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays in Vaughan and in King City on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturday. White Fang Taekwon-Do was one of many King Township recreation programs forced to find other accommodations due to the delayed opening of the Zancor Centre: "It's been a hectic schedule this fall, but we're looking forward to the opening of the new recreation centre. At any site, it's well worth it when my students apply the five tenets of Taekwon-Do – courtesy, integrity, perseverance, self-control, and indomitable spirit - to their everyday lives."

Those ideals are embodied in eightyear-old White Fang student Alessia Agostino. The polite and dynamic Blue Belt, who attends Holy Name Catholic Elementary School, explained what she likes best about Taekwon-Do after studying for a year and a half with Grandmaster Scarsellone: "I like learning all the patterns. Some of them I can memorize and I enjoy learning all of them."

As Agostino goes through her footwork patterns and demonstrates her discipline and agility, she notes that "it's helped me be a better soccer player and figure skater and now I'm working toward my Blue Belt-Red Stripe."

Scarsellone and Agostino's connection is crystal-clear as the veteran instructor compliments Agostino's agility and her disciplined performance of patterned steps on the venerable auditorium's floor. The Grandmaster relishes these teaching moments and White Fang's public appearances: "I still have a passion for teaching. I always want to be engaged and working with them. It's so important to show empathy towards students at any level as an important part of connecting with them. It's also satisfying to host co-op students to give them opportunities at both our locations in Vaughan and King City. It's been fun to make group appearances in the community, most recently at Humber River Hospital and the Woodbridge Fair."

The King Rebellion's three-game winning streak came to an abrupt halt this weekend with nearly-identical 4-2 losses to the Muskies in Lindsay on Friday night and the Leamington Flyers on Sunday afternoon in Nobleton.

The Muskies scored three unanswered goals on Friday and the Flyers scored four unanswered goals on Sunday to subdue King's Junior A squad.

Artem Narbekov's shorthanded goal at 9:33 of the second period staked the Rebellion to a 1-0 lead in Lindsay, but two minutes later, Simon Wang of the Muskies tied the game with this seventh of the season. King reclaimed their one-goal lead when Spencer Vandenberg beat Lindsay goaltender Joseph D'Angelo at 15:35 of the middle frame.

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
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Scoop from Schomberg



THE PERFECT PIZZA



is a Family Affair

Tucked away in the plaza at Highways 9 & 27 in Schomberg is The Schomberg Village Pizzeria. Its unassuming exterior belies the delights that lie within.

The Karas family owns and operates the pizzeria, using their secret recipes and years of knowhow to offer diners a truly gastronomic experience. "We make our own sauce every day, and our own dough. We import our tomatoes from Italy and Greece, and we use the finest '00' (double zero) flour available, the best natural 100% milk mozzarella we can source... Some guys might think that's overkill but to us quality is everything," says Elias, who runs the family businesses. "My mother Anna would kill me if she thought we were cutting corners!"

Anna makes all the food for the hot table, including veal and chicken parmigiana, pastas, soups and salads. Brother Yianni takes care of the pizzas and wings, making fresh sauce and dough daily. It's a labour of love for the Karas family, who perfected their craft for 20 years before moving to Schomberg and opening their doors five years ago.

"Our motto is 'We're more than pizza," says Elias. "And we mean that in a dual meaning sort of way. When we opened just at the beginning of COVID, we were trying to find ways to be able to survive the pandemic. Shortly thereafter the lockdowns began, and we wanted to offer the community more options instead of just the classic pizza & wing options that you would get at other pizza places. So we integrated various protein and pasta dishes in the menu. When dine in was prohibited, we took out the tables and turned it into a retail area with a small grocery section which brought it to the concept it is today. In the second sense of "being more than pizza," it means that we're about family and community. Our family is pretty tight knit, and so is our - what has become - extended family of customers and neighbours. We love the community we live in, and we love the sense of closeness that making food for our neighbours brings us. The people of Schomberg work hard and we work hard too, to bring them the best quality food at a reasonable price."

The Karas are big on tradition. Their recipes and attention to details are steeped in it, and they continue to fire their pizzas on stone. "A lot of places use conveyor belts, and that certainly makes things easier, but we're a bit old school. In our first pizza place as kids, we learned on a wood fired pizza oven and we would love to do that again, but our current location will not allow that. We don't think anything tastes quite as good as a pizza cooked on a stone, so that's what we do. It takes time to do things right, but we think our customers deserve the best, and that's why they keep coming back."

The Karas are now offering King residents more delights: They've just opened Euro Market Café in the plaza on Dr Kay Drive in Schomberg. "We love to live and work in the town of Schomberg, and we wanted to create a one stop shop where we could offer an assortment of items from all over Europe. We took our experience in restaurants and food service and combined it with our experience in food imports and this is how the idea came to be!" says Elias.



From the rural sights in King Township, to the urban core in Vaughan, to the small fishing towns on the coast of Quebec and many other communities across Ontario, I spent the summer speaking to people from all over, sharing our common sense Conservative plan to axe the tax, build the homes, fix the budget, and stop the crime.

Feeling older these days?

It seems to always be a happy, successful first step as many of our seniors and caregivers remain together not for days or weeks, but for months and some for years."

Services provided by Living Assistance Services caregivers are extensive but nonmedical: personal care (including assistance with bathing, dressing, and hygiene) medication supervision, light housekeeping, convalescence and respite and end-of-life care. Other services include, escorting to appointments and shopping, meal planning and preparation, as well as Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, dementia, and cancer care. Companionship and care naturally are essential ingredients of every caregiver visit.

"When it comes to a schedule, we care for seniors every hour you can imagine," Brian said. "Our caregivers stay for over-nights, have a variety of day shifts and also, they can live in a senior's home-24/7.



The program, which made its debut in 2017, welcomed 27 enthusiastic "newbies", most of whom are still members of the club today. The program now runs Sunday afternoons for 8 weeks, focusing on the basic skills of the sport, player safety, the format of the game, and the use of equipment.

Karl Davis, who was very instrumental in the start of the program as one of the coaches said, "We like to cap off at 32 participants to keep the student/coach ratio at 8:1." Davis is very proud of the program's accomplishments with an astonishing 85-95% of the "graduates" progressing into league play with the club. Some of them have even advanced into a coaching role.

Adults who have never curled step onto the ice on day one and step off the ice on the last day of the Learn-to-Curl program, game ready. Equipment is provided for everyone who wants to try it out before

purchasing their own, and for those who don't want to learn the traditional delivery, they can use a curling stick, which grips the rock handle allowing the curler to walk rather than slide during delivery.

Davis also noted that the club is encouraging younger people (25-40) to try curling through the Learn-to-Curl program.

Curling Is for everyone!

Curling is NOT a retiree sport! Anyone from the age of six to 86 can play the game. It is a sport that can be strictly recreational and for those that enjoy the competitive drive. King Curling Club offers social and competitive leagues six days a week, operating during the day and in the evening. It is a place to meet new people, make new friends, socialize on and off the ice and play in a supportive environment. Being a physical sport, curling is a great way to get some exercise, improve mental health and stay active during the winter.

He also played in the U18, U21 and U25 leagues outside of the school curling programs. He gives credit for his success to the King Curling

Club's coaches Julie Oakley and Kathleen Gorsline. His advice to kids who may want to try curling is "to just do it! You don't know if you like it until you try it".

Stephen Lecce: "Deeply committed to King–Vaughan'

King's MPP Stephen Lecce is approaching each new challenge with tenacity, and his constituents in mind.

King—Vaughan's long-serving MPP was promoted to a new ministry after one of the longest tenures in the Ministry of Education since Bill Davis, and he has also racked up a litany of local and regional achievements.

"After nearly five years of serving as Ontario's Minister of Education and being one the longest-serving Ministers in this portfolio, I am proud to have introduced measures such as restricting cell phones and banning vaping in schools. The job wasn't easy, but I look back with immense pride, knowing we've steered the curriculum in the right direction by getting back to the basics of reading, writing, and math and revamped skilled trades education to prepare our students for jobs in high-demand, good-paying careers," he said. It was also about standing up for what's right – for common sense and the voices of parents ° ensuring their voices triumph.

He was honored to have been promoted to Ontario's new Minister of Energy and Electrification. The Minister was tasked with a strong mandate from the Premier to deliver clean, reliable and affordable energy with a strong emphasis on keeping costs down for families in both King—Vaughan and across the province by capitalizing on Ontario's nuclear advantage.

"Ontario needs more energy as our economy and population grow. From expanding our grid here at home to displacing the reliance on dirty energy from authoritarian regimes abroad – we are using every tool at our disposal to secure Ontario's place as a global clean energy leader."

Lecce noted that the government is about "delivering results" and "staying focused on the community I was raised in and continue to call home."

"We've got a great team at Queen's Park focused on making critical investments in infrastructure projects like building more roads and highways, overseeing the largest public transit expansion across North America, and slashing timelines for new school builds in half," he said. "We also welcomed over 44 billion dollars' worth of historic manufacturing investments by companies like Stellantis, Volkswagen, and Honda – all of whom have chosen Ontario as their place to do business – creating thousands of new jobs in this province. But most importantly, our government is committed to making

life more affordable for families in Ontario. We've extended the 10-cent/litre gas tax cut and continue to stand up against the punitive Liberal carbon tax – while keeping energy rates low, predictable, and affordable so no family or senior lives through a time of energy poverty and rolling blackouts ever again."

One of his greatest achievements as MPP was announcing Canada's first and only medical school focused on training family doctors, right beside the Cortellucci Vaughan Hospital. By funding and building the York University School of Medicine in Vaughan, beside the new long-term care home that was announced in 2022, "our government is ensuring that families and seniors in King-Vaughan have access to more integrated, better health care, closer to home. This is the first medical school in Canada with a distinguished mandate to focus on training family doctors." MPP Lecce said he has been working on this for the past two years and was humbled to deliver this with the Premier by his side because "every family needs a family doctor, and I am determined to find a solution for our community and that benefits the entire province."

He was also proud to deliver \$22.6 million to build the Tanya Khan Public School in New Kleinburg, which was completed in three years, from start to finish. This state-of-the-art school created 638 net-new student spaces and 39 licensed childcare spaces. This will be a modern, STEM-focused school environment that will ensure our kids get back to the basics in the classroom. This is in addition to the expansion of Pope Francis Catholic Elementary School and ventilation improvements at every publicly funded school in the community.

"Here in King, we announced the start of construction of the new long-term care home at Marylake last October that will house 160 beds for seniors right here in our community. I was proud to deliver \$60 million for this project to enable our seniors to age comfortably in their community." When MPP Lecce was elected, King had the lowest ratio of residents to long-term care in the province; however, with this investment, we will massively expand spaces for seniors in a beautiful natural setting.

Highly visible in the riding, Lecce said he couldn't help but take note of the incredible generosity of constituents across King—Vaughan. MPP Lecce knocked on doors over the summer, meeting families and connecting with residents. "Everywhere I went, I connected with old friends and made many new ones, but there was one thing they had in common: everyone looked out for one another. From Maple, to Kleinburg to King, the highlight of my summer was connecting with community members from all backgrounds and walks of life who share the same values unique to our country – freedom, democracy, and the belief that hard work should pay off in Canada."

"Some of my most memorable moments this summer were the opening of the state-of-the-art King Animal Hospital and hosting my annual Community Appreciation BBQ at Beretta Farms, in King City."

Looking ahead, Lecce said construction for the YorkNet high-speed internet project is on track to be completed by the end of 2025, connecting more families than ever before to high-speed internet in King and Vaughan. Lecce said this is critical to "ending the digital divide," a priority he has championed in King— Vaughan for the benefit of students, small businesses, and families.

"I am also looking forward to officially opening the long-awaited Zancor Centre, which will be a game changer for our communities. Families in King have made it very clear that we need a modern recreation centre for sports and recreation. I listened – and delivered over \$17 million in provincial dollars – to get this done." This investment represents the single largest infrastructure investment Ontario has ever made in King Township.

Provincially, the single largest responsibility looking into the next two decades is expanding the energy grid and keeping costs down for Ontario families. Ontario is forecasting at least 60% more energy by 2050, emphasizing the critical importance of energy generation and storage. Lecce has said that we must think, plan, and build for the future in order to keep the system reliable and affordable for "the best generation, your kids and grandkids."

"With the economy and population growing, EVs coming online, and industry electrifying, our energy demands will increase by anywhere from 60-80%, which requires our government to invest in the largest energy expansion and conservation initiatives in the history of our province. That includes leaning into non-emitting sources like nuclear, hydroelectric and renewables. This is important as Ontario has one of the cleanest electricity grids on earth, with roughly 90% from non-emitting sources."

Lecce also is keeping a focus on the local GO stations, with a \$239 million investment underway to expand two-way GO services, noise barriers, enlarged platform space, and the building of more parking spaces and EV charging stations to make public transit more accessible. The Rutherford GO station is now complete, with Maple and King City under construction. "We need to get gridlock down in the GTA, and our investments in the largest subway expansion along with new highways and GO expansions will help commuters now and well into the future."

"We're helping commuters get around faster by working our way towards two-way, all-day GO Train service on the Barrie Line, and building the Finch West LRT, Eglinton Crosstown LRT, Hazel McCallion Line, Ontario Line, and the Yonge-North subway expansion into Vaughan that will further connect York Region to Toronto's transit system. It's going to take a lot of work, but we will get it done."

It seems the MPP's plate is constantly full of serious provincial responsibilities, but there is always room for his constituents and their needs. Lecce said he attended more events this summer than ever before, which can only mean that as the years go on, his sense of service, responsibility, and admiration for King and Vaughan families only grows stronger.







Last spring, the school decided to secure the naming rights to Ice Pad 2 of the new Zancor Centre, the cutting-edge multi-use recreation centre. The arena will soon be known as "The Country Day School Arena".

This, says Brent Johnston, Executive Director of Advancement, is their way of giving back to the community. It's been "magical" to connect with the municipality in this new facility - a mere 800 metres from the school on Dufferin Street. The \$86-million facility sits on 25 acres at the southeast corner of the King Campus of Seneca and will be accessible from 15th Sideroad. The Zancor Centre will include an aquatics centre with a six-lane lap pool and leisure pool, two NHL-sized ice rinks, spectator seating, an artificial turf fieldhouse with running track, and a multi-use community space. Outdoor amenities include a large courtyard with direct access to social and community rooms, with future plans for the site including connections to the Oak Ridges Moraine trail system and outdoor sports fields.

CDS itself is moving full steam ahead at improving its own array of athletic facilities and having access to the nearby arena will only enhance the student experience. The pools will also serve to help students learn important water safety skills and receive certification for outdoor education related trips.

While CDS has produced some high-level athletes over the years, the school embodies the mantra of "education with balance," catering to students' needs. Academics is bolstered by arts, technology, outdoor education and sports. The all-encompassing nature of the CDS experience is what makes it a world-class independent school.

In recent years, the school has revamped both its Junior and Senior Schools and added a marché style dining hall.

The school has produced NHL players such as two-time Stanley Cup champion Barclay Goodrow, but Johnston is quick to point out that professional sports success is not the focus at CDS. Johnston said the campus ensures its own facilities are top-notch, and there are plans to replace the aging Dome with a new fieldhouse. The Zancor Centre provides a "wonderful opportunity" for CDS, which will come in particularly handy when construction takes place.

There's incredible enthusiasm for the school and enrolment now stands at 820 students. Their pride and balance resonates not just in the hallways, but throughout the King community as well.

CDS is a place where the students are really "lifted up," whether it's competing at international public speaking events or performing a musical on stage.

The level of CDS family and community support is second to none, and keeps growing. The school recently celebrated its 50th anniversary and is looking to the future for more milestones.

"The sky's the limit," said Kim Sillcox, Director of Communications & Marketing.

The sounds of skates hitting the ice will soon resonate throughout the community. And CDS stars of today, and tomorrow, will be among those leaping off the benches and into the thick of things.
