### Parking restrictions on Church Street in Schomberg

Staff noted the changes were proposes to improve pub-Council approved the staff recommendations, which lic safety and ensure there's enough room for vehicles to navigate the installed flexible traffic bollards.

> The Township has received written complaints about on-street parking located near installed flexible traffic bollards on Church Street.

> The proposed on-street parking restrictions will help keep adequate clearance on either side of the installed flexible bollards along the roadway. This will remove the need for vehicles to navigate into the opposing lane of traffic to avoid parked vehicles near the bollards.

> The cost and installation of new no-parking signs are funded from the Public Works budget.

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



### Dufferin teenager to compete in cattle, equestrian, poultry shows at Royal Winter Fair for first time in event's history

A 16-year-old Dufferin County resident will compete at an unprecedented level during the 102nd Royal Winter Fair in Toronto.

While it takes a high level of talent and dedication to show livestock in just one competition at the Royal, Ava Campbell of Mono will be vying for ribbons in several.

She will be a contender in two horse shows, a cattle show, and a poultry show, with her chickens and ducks.

"We're very proud of this accomplishment, and in our recent memory of the fair, this is the first time that we have seen something like this," said the Royal Winter Fair's CEO Cyrus Cooper about the number of competitions Campbell's competing in. "It's quite a feat."

The Royal Winter Fair takes place from Nov. 1 to 10 at Exhibition Place, where the best competitors across Canada compete at a national level.

"Every year, the Royal is circled on various competitors' calendars, whether you're an Olympic rider or a young, aspiring rider," Cooper noted.

Campbell's ability to train and present animals well is what's led her to qualify for so many different competitions at this year's Royal.

She is eager to show different kinds of livestock and is working hard to prepare in hopes of taking home some rib-

At past Royal Winter Fairs, she has done well in horse riding competitions, as this is her main focus.

"A couple of years ago I won a lot of classes in the smalls (horse category), and then I was overall grand champion in the ponies," Campbell recalled. "Last year I was third overall in the Jump Canada Medal Finals Equitation Class."

She has again qualified to compete in the Junior Hunters Division Horse Show as well as the Jump Canada Finals.

"She's been showing horses (at the Royal) for years and competing," said

Campbell's father Mark. "The Royal is like the playoffs, if you will, for horse riding.'

To qualify, Campbell regularly competed in horse shows at the Caledon Equestrian Park and Angelstone Tournaments in Rockwood.

"You show the horses all year and then you qualify through points. You have to be top eight in Ontario to go (to the Royal) for the horses," Campbell explained.

Throughout the winter, she's in Florida training on horseback, and taking online school so she can remain committed to her passion for riding.

Campbell is hoping her dedication to horse riding throughout the year will yield positive results at the Royal.

"It's rewarding when you continue to get better throughout the year, and then seeing the hard work pay off ... going to these big venues and doing well," she enthused.

Campbell's mother Elizabeth also has a love for horses and riding. She competed in the Royal Winter Fair when she was a teenager as well and is always excited to see her daughter do the same.

"Her mother plays a big role in the helping with the horse and the training as well," Mark noted. "The horses have always been a big part of my wife's life."

Campbell's been invited on a recruiting trip to the University of South Carolina and hopes to earn a scholarship to compete with the school's equestrian

For the Royal's cattle show, Campbell will be competing in it for her very first

She's competed in sanctioned cattle shows at fairs in the region through the summer to prepare.

Campbell will be showing a fullblood Simmental heifer, owned by cattle breeder Charles Burns of Kingsfield

Burns said Campbell first developed an interest in showing cattle about seven years ago when they met at the Royal and has been persistent in pursuing the opportunity ever since.

He added that Campbell has the right temperament for showing animals.

"There's some people that animals just trust, they don't flinch, they're not scared of them. They seem to trust the person right away, and she has whatever that skill is," Burns noted. "The animals don't run away from her."

For the competition, Campbell's focus will be on ensuring her heifer looks at its best at any given moment, standing tall and remaining calm.

When it comes to the ducks and chickens Campbell is entering in the Royal, she was recently named Junior Championship for her waterfowl at the Ontario Poultry Breeders Show.

She said she's eager to compete in this category as well.

The Royal Winter Fair features a variety of competitions that allow qualifying Canadians to demonstrate their skills and move on to international championships.

"We're very proud of the fact that the Royal offers the opportunity to compete


"She kept asking me until I said, at a high level for various individuals as well," Cooper said. "That's what's unique about the Royal every year, and that's what makes it special.'

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## Wayne Emmerson to retire as York Region chair

Long-serving York politician Wayne Emmerson will retire as regional chair

Emmerson made the announcement at last week's regional council meeting. He's leaving effective Friday, Nov. 29.

"This has been a very difficult and personal decision, but the right one and at the right time for myself and my family," he said.

"When I first started in politics almost four decades ago, I could not have imagined this incredible journey.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to serve residents both locally and Regionally, first as a ward councillor and then as Mayor in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville.

"In 2014, I had the honour of becoming the York Region Chairman and CEO and I am incredibly proud of everything we have accomplished over the past 10 years.

"Our successes are not ours alone, but the result of our collective commitment and desire to make our communities better places for all.

"I extend my gratitude to my colleagues on Regional Council – both past and present – our Regional staff, the and the many countless partners who have been a part of this very rewarding experience.

"As I move toward a new chapter in my life, I look forward to spending more time with family and focusing on personal priorities."

The clerk will bring a report to the Nov. 7 Region Committee of the Whole meeting, outlining the procedural process and proposed timelines for appointing his successor.

Chairman Emmerson is a fifth-generation resident of York. He was re-elected to a third term as Chairman and CEO for the 2022 to 2026 term.

Emmerson has more than three decades of political experience, including his role as Mayor for the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville for 17 years. Focused on getting results, his experience and leadership is well-respected across York Region and all levels of government.

As Chairman and CEO of York, he is committed to ensuring the region remains a destination of choice for residents to live, work and play.

Throughout his tenure at the helm of regional council, Chairman Emmerson has continued to support and advocate for Regional Council's top priorities, including safe and reliable transportation options, a vibrant and thriving



Chairman Emmerson is the sixth Chairman and CEO in the 53-year history of York.

#### Axe the sales tax on new homes!

In October 2015, one month before Justin Trudeau became Prime Minister, it took only 39% of the median pre-tax household income to cover home ownership costs. Now, it takes 60%.

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## Support local this fall to help Ontario farms grow

Every year our province marks Ontario Agriculture Week. It was a time to recognize and celebrate the important ongoing contribution Ontario farmers make to our society and our economy in producing food, feed, fuel and flowers.

The agri-food sector contributed \$50.7 billion to the provincial economy, provided jobs to 11 per cent of Ontario's work force and generated exports worth \$26.2 billion this past year. Those are impressive numbers, but agriculture is much more than numbers.

It's also about people - and as a fifth-generation family farmer raising beef cattle and growing crops near the southwestern Ontario community of West Lorne, about halfway between London and Chatham, I'm proud to be part of this vibrant and essential in-

Our family loves to buy from other farmers; whether it's a protein, vege-

table or tender fruit, we like to have a relationship with the people behind our food and know where that food comes

We've done direct to consumer sales of beef from our farm, and one of my favourite parts of that business is getting to meet and interact with our customers and answering their questions about what we do on the farm.

In an age where so many people are disconnected from where their food comes from, I strongly believe these relationships matter – and many of my fellow farmers do too.

I'm also a director on the board of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, and in response to growing interest from our membership in local food sales, agritourism and direct-to-consumer marketing, our organization has just completed our third survey about selling to

It's been our most popular survey yet, garnering responses from 640 re-

cent grow grains and oilseeds, our survey participants came from many different sectors, which suggests that there are many unique possibilities to tap into new opportunities with products ranging from maple syrup, wool and Christmas trees to meat, eggs, fruit and vegetables.

Most farmers interested in local food or agritourism ventures are established businesses, and many have completed special certifications, like organic, CanadaGAP food safety, or commodity-specific quality assurance programs.

Pen and paper is still the most common way for farmers to manage their direct to consumer sales (55%), followed by spreadsheets, and Point of Sale systems like Square. One fifth are using Facebook or Instagram shops and 16% are using an e-commerce platform. And although 60% of respondents said their farm doesn't have an online presence, you can find those that do on social media (32%) or by visiting their farm business websites (26%).

Annual direct-to-consumer sales continue to be lower than \$100,000 per year for the majority of farms (72%), indicating this is very much an opportunity to diversify farm business incomes, although there is a segment of respondents who reported grossing over \$200,000 per year through these

Farmers' markets are the most common way for farmers to sell their prod-

spondents. Although more than 60 per ucts directly to consumers off the farm (27%), followed by wholesale, retail and directly to restaurants. Farm tours, onfarm activities and teaching or educational workshops are the most common agritourism offerings.

> To help more farmers explore the potential of direct-to-consumer sales, the OFA and many partner organizations have launched the Cultivating Local: Seizing opportunities to grow Ontario's local agri-products sector project and hosting a series of nine free online

> Topics include everything from current market trends and how to get started in value-added agriculture to exploring agritourism, selling in rural and remote Ontario, and considering local products beyond food.

> The two-hour online workshops will be held Thursday mornings from November 2024 to February 2025; for those who aren't able to participate, all workshop recordings will also be posted on OFA's website. More information, including how to register, is available at ofa.on.ca/cultivating-local.

> When you're out shopping, look for local all year long.



The award acknowledges exceptional enforcement of impaired operation by way of arrests, charges, convictions, breath tests and drug recognition evaluation. It was named for former Road Safety Bureau Staff Sergeant Sarah Riddell, in recognition of her ongoing support in assisting MADD York Region in its mission to stop impaired driving and support victims of this violent crime. She is currently the officer in charge of Community Services.

Constable Jason Noble, of the Road Safety Bureau, has been a member of York Regional Police since 2019. He has

Three York Regional Police officers made more than 60 impaired-related arrests in the last two years while fulfilling his duties as a breath technician and a drug recognition expert (DRE). He is being recognized for his dedication to making York Region roadways safer for all road users.

Constable Matthew Rooney, of #2 District, has been a member of York Regional Police since 2019. Also a breath technician and DRE, he has conducted 33 evaluations on drivers arrested for impaired driving, including a July arrest that resulted in the seizure of a significant amount of cocaine, fentanyl and methamphetamine.

#### MPPs deliver substantial upgrades to Rutherford GO Station

Stephen Lecce, MPP for King— Vaughan and Laura Smith, MPP for Thornhill, were joined last week by Prabmeet Sarkaria, Minister of Transportation to celebrate the completion of major upgrades at Rutherford GO Station. The changes will improve the rider experience with enhanced train platforms, modern amenities and a new parking garage.

"Our government is delivering the largest public transit infrastructure expansion in North America - and with construction at the Rutherford GO Station complete in less than three years, I am proud to say we are delivering," said Lecce. "From the Vaughan Metropolitan Centre and Yonge North Subway Extensions to significant upgrades at Maple and King City GO stations that will bring all-day train service, we will continue making the necessary investments to reduce congestion and help get commuters home faster."

Rutherford GO Station features a new and improved station building with shelters, canopies, digital displays and spacious waiting areas. A new, fully accessible parking structure has 1,900 net-new vehicle spaces and 100 secured bicycle parking spots. Commuters benefit from a rail bridge over Rutherford Road, covered pedestrian walkways and an upgraded bus loop.

The station also has a newly installed second track and east train platform, helping increase capacity on the Barrie GO Line and enabling the future expansion of rail service along the corridor. The province's GO Expansion Program aims to deliver 15-minute, two-way, allday service on the Barrie Line.

"The revitalized Rutherford GO station marks another milestone in our government's plan to bring two-way, all-day GO service to critical corridors in the Greater Golden Horseshoe," said Minister Sarkaria. "As Ontario's population grows, our government will continue to invest in expanding GO service commuters rely on to get to work, school, and daily life."

MPP Lecce previously announced that station upgrades are underway at Maple and King City GO stations. Work at Maple GO includes the installation of a new west platform to support twoway train service, an improved bus loop to streamline connections with other transit agencies, new pedestrian tunnels, and a new pedestrian bridge over Major Mackenzie Drive.

A new west platform with a pedestrian bridge is also being built at the King City GO station along with an upgraded surface parking lot that will add 198 net-new parking spaces.

EllisDon Infrastructure Transit was awarded a \$239-million contract to design, build and finance the Rutherford GO Station project.

In April, the province announced the largest GO service expansion in more than a decade, adding more than 300 weekly train trips on the Milton, Lakeshore West, Lakeshore East, Kitchener and Stouffville lines.

In addition to completing upgrades at Rutherford GO Station, Ontario recently finished improvements to Old Elm, Milliken and Agincourt GO Stations.

"Following extensive renovations, I am pleased the Rutherford GO station in Vaughan is officially reopening its doors. This newly redesigned station will help fight traffic gridlock by allowing more people to take alternative modes of transportation, like GO transit, to and from Vaughan," said Vaughan Mayor Steven Del Duca. "I want to thank Premier Doug Ford, Minister Stephen Lecce, MPP Laura Smith, and everyone involved in this project for their continued support in improving critical infrastructure throughout our city to help deliver a better future and quality of life for all."



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## Extended tax cut would save households \$380 on average

Economic Outlook and Fiscal Review, the Ontario government is keeping costs down for drivers and businesses by introducing legislation that would, if passed, extend the temporary rate cuts on the gasoline and fuel taxes for the fourth time, until June 30, 2025.

These extended cuts would ensure the rates remain at 9 cents per litre through to 2025, saving Ontario households \$380 on average over the three years since the cuts were first introduced.

"Too many Ontario families are struggling as a result of the federal carbon tax and high interest rates, which is why we're always working to help taxpayers keep more of their hardearned money," said Premier Doug Ford. "Our government's gas and fuel tax cuts are just one way that we're getting this done, in addition to scrapping the license sticker fee, banning new road tolls on provincial highways, cancelling the previous government's capand-trade program and continuing to stand up for Ontario taxpayers by fighting the federal carbon tax."

"Our government is putting more money back into commuters' pockets, saving King—Vaughan households \$380 on average. This extension to the gasoline and fuel tax rate cuts will help make life more affordable for seniors, families, and workers across the province, especially while we continue to oppose the ever-increasing Liberal carbon tax. While we deliver the largest subway extension in Canadian history, and improve every GO station in our community, we will continue to reduce costs for transit riders through One Fare transit integration along with relief for commuters on our roads," added Stephen Lecce, King-Vaughan MPP.

On July 1, 2022, the government temporarily cut the gasoline tax rate by 5.7 cents per litre and the fuel (diesel) tax rate by 5.3 cents per litre. When combined with the province's previous cancellation of the cap-and-trade system, the government is saving drivers 10 cents per litre off the cost of gasoline. This relief is especially important as the federal carbon tax is set to increase again on April 1, 2025, putting further financial strain on families.

"Rising costs over the past few years have put a strain on household budgets, which is why we've taken action to offer

As part of the upcoming 2024 Ontario relief where we can, including at the pumps," said Peter Bethlenfalvy, Minister of Finance. "Our government will always look at ways to put more money back in people's pockets."

The proposed extension to the gasoline and fuel tax rate cuts builds on a host of measures to make life more affordable for people across the province, including:

Eliminating the licence plate renewal fee in March 2022, saving the average household \$600 to date.

Banning new road tolls on new and existing highways in Ontario. This ban would also apply to the Don Valley Parkway and the Gardiner Expressway once uploaded to the province. The government removed tolls on Highways 412 and 418 in April 2022.

Permanently freezing driver's li- 30, 2024. cence and photo card fees, saving drivers an estimated \$66 million over the next five years.

Launching One Fare, which will save daily riders on participating systems an average of \$1,600 each year.

Ending the Drive Clean Program, saving taxpayers over \$40 million every

Requiring the government to first obtain the consent of Ontario voters through a referendum before implementing a new provincial carbon pricing program.

More information about the government's plan to keep costs down for families and businesses will be included in the 2024 Ontario Economic Outlook and Fiscal Review, to be released on October

The price consumers pay at the pump is made up of the cost of crude oil, wholesale margins, retail margins, federal excise tax, the federal carbon tax, Ontario gasoline/fuel tax and HST.

While the government has taken action on tax rates for unleaded gasoline and fuel (diesel), there will be no change to tax rates for leaded gasoline, propane, or aviation fuel.

Ontario continues to call on the federal government to eliminate the federal carbon tax, which increased to 17.61 cents per litre on gasoline and 21.39 cents per litre on diesel on April 1, 2024 and is scheduled to increase again on April 1, 2025 to 20.91 cents per litre on gasoline and 25.40 cents per litre on diesel.

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### New funding will support surgeries, upkeep at Southlake

A further investment of \$6.3 million by the Provincial Government will help Southlake Regional Health Centre provide more surgical care for local residents and support critical upgrades to ensure the hospital's longevity.

The funding was announced at Southlake recently Newmarket-Aurora MPP Dawn Gallagher Murphy.

newly-announced funding breaks down to \$4 million in support of surgical care this year and \$2.3 million for repairs and infrastructure upgrades.

"This is to extend the life of the hospital and our community infrastructure," she said. "In June, our government announced an investment of an additional \$965 million as part of the 2024 Ontario Budget, which includes a four per cent increase for an unprecedented second year in a row to increase access to high quality care and ensure our public hospitals are able to meet patients' needs. Today, I am pleased to announce a 5.7 annualization increase to

Southlake for their surgical operations. This is a total investment for 2024-25 of \$22,706,000."

This equated to \$4 million more for 2024, she noted, to "support the stabilization and management of the surgical system, maximizing capacity to increase the number of surgeries performed." As such, the funding will help reduce wait times.

"This year's \$228 million to support critical upgrades and repairs at 129 hospitals and 58 community healthcare facilities marks a 25 per cent increase in health infrastructure renewal fund since 2018," said MPP Gallagher Murphy. "This investment allows more hospitals to complete upgrades and repairs in a timely manner. I am committed to ensure we serve this community and to ensure that people can have access to a more connected and convenient emergency care close to home."

While Southlake warmly welcomed the money towards surgical care, they underscored the importance of funding for services not often seen by patients.

"There's a lot more going on behind

the scenes, including important building systems," said Nathan Robinson, Director of Capital of Development for Southlake. "Southlake has been here 100 years, so not surprisingly some of our infrastructure has changed over those years. Many of those renovations are not flashy and they're not even visible to the public, but they do make a significant difference to the experience of the staff and the patients, and if they didn't happen they would notice that difference.

"The \$2.3 million will allow more of that type of renovations, including renovations to select components of our critical electrical and HVAC systems. These are things that patients don't really see, but they're going to make a really material difference and, frankly, they're going to keep the lights on."

Puneet Sandhu, Southlake's Director of Surgical and Maternal Child Programs, said for the last 100 years the hospital has been "creating the best experiences for both our patients and our teams," and this year's anniversary marks 100 years of "innovating and

standing side by side with our communities to foster a healthier future and 100 years of leading-edge care close to home."

"That legacy is one we're very proud to continue," she said.

Added Newmarket Mayor John Taylor: "Southlake is our community's most important asset, full stop. That is something we all have to work at all the time to ensure it can continue to deliver the way it needs to deliver. It touches the lives of virtually every resident in our communities, either directly or indirectly, whether it is one of their loved ones, their neighbour or themselves ....

"We ask the nurses, the doctors, all of the staff here to provide leading-edge care and that's a big task; in order to do that we have to make sure they have facilities that are leading-edge as well and we need to make sure we get that funded whether that is through things like the incredibly successful gala recently or through our support from the Provincial government and Dawn Gallagher Murphy."



#### Junior A Rebellion losing streak hits five in 4-1 loss to Collingwood Blues

T.S. Eliot once wrote that "April is the cruelest month, breeding Lilacs out of the dead land, mixing Memory and Desire, stirring dull roots with Spring rain," but the King Rebellion would beg to differ with the famous poet's assertion.

Instead, October has been the "cruelest month" for the OJHL club. King's Junior A team has dropped seven of its last eight games and five in a row after Sunday afternoon's tough 4-1 loss to the Collingwood Blues at the Nobleton Community

The team has, indeed "mixed memory and desire" in its recent narrow losses and the club's executive has tried to "stir its dull roots" with a pair of big trades to lift themselves out of a month-long slump.

Sunday's game was a rematch of King's stirring 5-3 defeat of the Blues 5-3 in Collingwood to hand the 2024 CJHL champs their first loss on home ice in two seasons. It was the Rebellion's second game of the season and set up a successful September for the relocated Brantford 99ers franchise.

That was then; this is now.

Rebellion Captain Aaron Andrade, who scored King's only goal versus the Blues on Sunday, showed graciousness in defeat and prescribed a pathway out of the slump in which his team is mired: "We have to trust each other and our coaching staff. We have to treat each game like a playoff game and we have to do all the small things right to get out of the slump."

Andrade contrasted his team's effort on Sunday with their strong performance in Collingwood in early-September: "We knew they wanted revenge for their loss to us and they skated hard from the start of the game. We didn't match their energy today."

The Blues were an energized squad on Sunday and converted on their second power play opportunity when Collingwood Captain Marcus Lougheed banged in a rebound past King goaltender Carter Bickle at 8:46 - exactly 10 seconds into their man-advantage.

King tied the game on a 4-on-3 power play with less than four minutes to go in the first period. Taking advantage of the extra spacing on the ice, Andrade received a perfect pass from Simon Wang and rifled a wrist shot under the bar past Blues goaltender Noah Tegelaar. The Captain of the Rebellion described his seventh of the season: "Simon set up the space for me. They overcommitted to him, I was able to get open, and I found the gap over his shoulder."

Andrade's power play goal turned out to be the Rebellion's principal highlight of the game and the Blues looked very much like the squad that captured the CJHL championship six months ago as they scored three unanswered goals in the second period.

Collingwood forward Zander Veccia deflected a centering pass between Bickle's pads 71 seconds into the second period to hush the Nobleton Community Centre crowd.

Blues' rangy defenceman Dillon Stiles fired a wrist shot from just inside the blue line that flew over a screened Bickle into the back of the net to put the visitors up 3-1 at 3:52 of the middle frame.

Collingwood closed the scoring when Daniel Markevych one-timed a puck on Bickle's doorstep to convert a slick 2-on-1 rush with Damen Boose and give the Blues a commanding three-goal lead with eighteen seconds left in the second period.

Bickle put forth a heroic effort in his 47-save performance on Sunday, but much of the game resembled the acrobatic Rebellion goaltender fending off a Collingwood shooting gallery. Bickle was especially sharp in the third period when he made 18 saves to keep his beleaguered squad in the contest.

King's cruel month concludes in Leamington versus the Flyers on Halloween at the Nature Fresh Farms Recreation Centre. Puck drop on Fright Night will be 7:05.




