### Council asking governments to move on bail reform

King council is urging provincial and federal governments to get moving on bail reform.

Councillor David Boyd tabled a motion at council recently, asking the federal and provincial governments to come together to ensure that all bail reform changes made as part of Bill C-48 are being effectively implemented, resourced, and are meeting the goals and outcomes intended in the legislation.

Further, council is calling on Ottawa to consider the call by Queen's Park to implementation additional measures to enhance public safety.

A copy of King's resolution will be forwarded to the Prime Minister of Canada, the Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada, the Premier of Ontario, the Attorney General of Ontario, and the Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Services for their consideration and necessary action.

It will also be sent to all municipalities in York Region and to York Regional Police, for their information and

The motion follows spikes in violent crimes across Canada and York, which include break-ins, assaults, robberies, sexual violations, thefts of motor vehicles and weapons violations.




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

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#### Internet upgrades will connect homes in King Township

Stephen Lecce, MPP for King— Vaughan, was joined by Steven Del Duca, Mayor of Vaughan and Steve Pellegrini, Mayor of King to announce that YorkNet's high-speed internet network expansion in King and north Vaughan is expected to be completed by the end of 2025.

The Ontario Government invested \$29 million into the Universal Broadband Fund to connect underserved communities in York Region to highspeed internet access.

"When I was first elected in 2018, I made a commitment to bridge the gaps in high-speed internet infrastructure across our rural communities - and I am proud to say we are one step closer to finally ending the digital divide," said Lecce. "Through our government's investment, we are delivering high-speed, reliable internet to homes, farms, and small businesses so no one in our community is left behind."

The project will bring reliable, highspeed internet to 3,800 underserved homes in rural communities and hamlets in York Region including in King City, Nobleton, Lloydtown, Schomberg, Pottageville, Kleinburg, and North Vaughan.

"Access to reliable high-speed internet is a necessity, not a luxury. Vaughan Mayor Steve Del Duca added: "In this digital era, having access to reliable high-speed internet is no longer a luxury, but a necessity. "Our government is continuing to make progress to ensure that every community across Ontario has access to reliable high-speed internet by the end of 2025," said Kinga Surma, Ontario's Minister of Infrastructure. "Thanks to incredible partnerships with organizations like YorkNet, we are expanding local broadband infrastructure to connect thousands of residents and businesses in York Region to the reliable high-speed internet services they need."

MPP Lecce previously delivered \$600,000 in 2021 to connect 262 homes and businesses in King Township to high-speed internet under the Improving Connectivity for Ontario (ICON) program as part of the Ontario Government's \$14.7 million investment into 13 high-speed internet projects. The province has invested a sum total of \$4 billion to ensure all Ontarians are connected to high-speed internet by the end of 2025.

Canada's Connectivity Strategy aims

to provide all Canadians with access to internet speeds of at least 50 megabits per second (Mbps) download / 10 Mbps upload. The Universal Broadband Fund (UBF) is a \$3.225 billion investment by the Government of Canada designed to help provide high-speed internet access to 98 per cent of Canadians by 2026 and achieve the national target of 100 per cent access by 2030.

Today, 93.5 per cent of Canadian households have access to high-speed internet or are targeted to receive access through existing program commitments, compared to just 79 per cent in 2014. On July 29, 2021, a Canada-Ontario broadband partnership was announced. This agreement will bring high-speed internet access to more than 280,000 households across Ontario, with a total investment of more than \$1.2 billion, co-funded equally by both levels of government.

The Ontario government is investing nearly \$4 billion to bring access to reliable high-speed internet to every community across the province, by the end of 2025.

The premiers of all 13 provinces and territories have written letters to the federal government calling for meaningful bail reform. The York Regional Police Service Board's 2025 Operating and Capital Budgets include a proposed net budget increase to \$441.5 million, reflecting the need for additional resources and staffing to address rising crime rates and enhance community safety and wellbeing.

The York Regional Police Service Board recognizes the importance of partnerships and prevention strategies in addressing complex organized and violent crimes, and aims to improve community safety through targeted initiatives and enhanced bail reform measures.

York Region Police have implemented a geo-fence to monitor activities in Nobleton and installed video surveillance to address recent troubling events. They are actively working to eliminate criminal elements and restore residents' confidence in their safety.

Locally, Mayor Pellegrini and Councillor Boyd continue to advocate for the community's concerns with York Regional Police, who have assured us that extra resources are currently active in Nobleton.

"In response to our advocacy, York Region has approved funding for 150 new police personnel, with recruitment under way," Boyd said.

## Holidays shouldn't be financially stressful

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## $\overline{Do\ these\ politicians\ really\ understand\ carbon?}$

At its early November annual general meeting in Red Deer, Alberta's governing United Conservative Party passed a resolution to "recognize the importance of CO2 to life and Alberta's prosperity" and "recognize that CO2 is a foundational nutrient for all life on Earth." The party also voted to get rid of critical net-zero emissions targets, among other measures.

Are they ignorant about climate science, physics and carbon cycles? Are they trolling? Or are they so deep in the fossil fuel industry's pockets that they'll do anything to support it? The Alberta government appears to be taking cues from the U.S. MAGA movement, so any or all of that is possible.

Regardless of their origin, these attacks on everyone and everything from transgender people to important and effective climate measures have dangerous, real-life consequences.

It's true that carbon dioxide is "a foundational nutrient for all life on Earth." We're carbon-based beings, and the carbon cycle — which circulates carbon through living things, the ocean, minerals and the atmosphere is a big part of what keeps Earth habitable. And plants do require carbon

But, as the NASA Earth Observatory states, "Any change in the cycle that shifts carbon out of one reservoir puts more carbon in the other reservoirs. Changes that put carbon gases into the atmosphere result in warmer temperatures on Earth."

Most carbon is stored in rocks, ocean, atmosphere, plants, soil and fossil fuels. Fossil fuels are solar energy that has

been super-concentrated over millions of years. In converting sunlight to energy through photosynthesis, plants, algae and bacteria absorb and store CO2. Plants and the animals that eat them release it when they die and decompose. Plants and some animals buried millions of years ago get compressed over time, creating super-concentrated stores of carbon as coal, gas and oil.

Burning fossil fuels releases the concentrated carbon into the atmosphere as CO2 — far more than under normal cyclical processes and more than can be reabsorbed through natural processes. It remains for hundreds or thousands of years. Excess atmospheric CO2 — along with other human-generated greenhouse gases such as methane, nitrous oxide and hydrofluorocarbons — allow solar radiation to enter Earth's atmosphere but prevent increasing amounts from reflecting back into space. This creates a heat-trapping blanket that's been affecting air, water and land at accelerating rates.

Most of our species' relatively short time on Earth has been during a slowly changing geological era (by human time scales), in which solar energy absorption and reflection have provided the relatively steady conditions we need to survive and thrive — overall, not too hot or cold, somewhat predictable weather patterns and natural systems capable of renewing and regenerating.

That's quickly changing. As we burn fossil fuels and pump massive volumes of greenhouse gases into the atmosphere and destroy plants and waters that store carbon, we're disrupting the

carbon cycle and causing the planet to especially Alberta and Saskatchewan, heat at an alarming rate, creating more extreme weather, shifting ocean and air currents, throwing water cycles out of whack, causing droughts, floods and wildfires and making equatorial regions increasingly inhospitable, leading to greater conflict and human migration.

And while plants need CO2 for photosynthesis, more isn't necessarily better. Increased atmospheric CO2 causes some plants to initially grow faster and bigger but studies show accelerated growth dilutes nutrients such as phosphorus, iron, zinc and protein. This affects the entire food web.

Research also shows the overall benefits to plants diminish over time and as CO2 levels rise. Global heating's impacts — droughts, floods, wildfires, storms and excess heat — also negatively affect plant growth and reproduction. As for agriculture, rising CO2 often helps weeds more than crops.

It's all basic science, much of it understood for hundreds of years, with knowledge growing steadily. That's why the anti-climate positions of some state, provincial and federal parties and governments in Canada and the U.S.,

are so bewildering.

The justifications are blatantly facile and anti-science and serve only to bolster the fossil fuel industry, which itself is finding it difficult to continue its lies and disinformation around evidence even its own scientists provided as far back as the 1950s!

Decisions must be based on knowledge and science — especially when it comes to our survival! We all deserve better from our political leadership.

## The best brussels sprouts and other Christmas dinner tips

At this time of year, I get asked so many questions about The Big Bird Dinner.

So...

Yes, you should brine your turkey you can reach out to me or look it up on-line if you don't know how. It certainly makes a big difference and is worth the effort.

No, you shouldn't buy those weird "baby carrots" in a bag. Get real baby carrots, cut all but ½ inch of the greens from the top, peel them and pan-roast them with thyme, cumin seeds, olive oil and a little bit of brown sugar.

Yes, it matters which potatoes you roast. Use russets, peel them, parboil them, toss them about in a colander to rough up the surface and roast them in duck fat, which you can get in a tub at most grocery stores.

No, don't buy the canned tube of cranberry jelly. Use fresh cranberries simmered with orange juice, orange zest, a bay leaf and as much sugar as you think it needs based on your own

preference.

And yes, real gravy is easy to make with the pan drippings, a little sage or poultry seasoning, some stray white wine/chicken stock and a cornstarch slurry to thicken it up. If you can't pronounce the ingredient list on the powder-in-a-box stuff, don't put it in your body. Right?

But by far the most frequently asked question is this: "How did you make those amazing brussels sprouts you used to serve at the pub?"

Well, here's how: (serves four)

- 1 lb fresh brussels sprouts, halved
- ½ yellow onion, sliced
- ½ red bell pepper, sliced 1 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tbsp real maple syrup
- 2 pieces of bacon, slivered
- ¼ tsp cajun seasoning (or paprika) ½ a lemon cut into four wedges

Toss the sprouts in the olive oil and some salt, and roast in a single layer until slightly browned and tender-crisp, 20-30 minutes. You can do this bit in advance if oven space is at a premium.

In a large skillet, cook the bacon until browned. Add the onion and bell pepper and fry in the rendered bacon fat for a few minutes until softened, scraping the bottom of the pan to get all those flavourful brown bits incorporated. Depending on the quality of the bacon you've got you might need to add a little more olive oil.

Add the brussels sprouts to the pan along with the cajun seasoning and toss to warm though.

Tip them out onto a serving dish and drizzle with maple syrup. Add a little salt and cracked black pepper and arrange the lemon slices around the dish so your guests can squeeze it on nice and fresh.

Sit back and enjoy the praise and the sounds of happy munching.

I'd be happy to answer any and all questions you might have about this high-stakes dinner. It should be a fun time of gathering and you needn't be a ball of stress over it.



"Over the years, you have been a steady hand at the helm, fostering collaboration, championing innovation, and building trust among all partners. You made it look pretty easy and [that] is the mark of a seasoned pro.'

Emmerson was lauded for his support of the Yonge Subway Extension into York Region, up to Highway 7, his dedication to improving telecommunications Region-wide, and his "strong, steadfast support" of the York Regional Police.

"What has been truly outstanding has been your commitment to serve with integrity that has truly set the tone and shown what leadership truly means. It has been a privilege for all of us to work alongside you and I am sure everyone here will agree that we have learned a lot from you - including how to stay calm during a meeting, even if it seems like the room might spontaneously combust," Scarpitti continued. "Your mentorship and steadfast commitment has inspired us to do better, to be better, and to serve with purpose – and, most importantly, with heart.

"While today might mark the end of your time in politics, it is truly far from the end of your legacy. Your work and your commitment to York Region will continue to shape the work that we do

#### More funding sees opening of active living centres

The Ontario government announced the largest single-year expansion for Seniors Active Living Centres in its history. Ontario is increasing funding by \$17 million to expand services and activities and adding up to 100 new Seniors Active Living Centre (SALC) programs over the next year.

"This is the largest single-year investment in Seniors Active Living Centres by any government in Ontario's history," said Raymond Cho, Minister for Seniors and Accessibility. "This shows Premier Ford's and our entire government's commitment to keeping our seniors fit, active, healthy and socially connected in their communities."

The government is investing up to \$17 million extra over three years, beginning in 2024-25, increasing the number of SALCs across Ontario from 316 to 416, expanding access to services for seniors and those with disabilities in underserved communities. A call for proposals was launched in July 2024 and successful new SALC recipients will be announced starting in early 2025.

Due to the overwhelming success of the more than 300 Seniors Active Living Centres, recent changes in effect this year now enable more types of organizations to deliver Seniors Active Living Centre programs, including municipalities, non-profit corporations, registered charities, Indigenous groups, Legions, Lions Clubs and recreational

These changes are one more way the province is meeting the needs of Ontario's aging population and better supporting the people who care for seniors by improving and expanding supports for seniors no matter where they live.

On June 1, 2024, changes to the Seniors Active Living Centres Act, 2017 came into effect letting more types of organizations provide the 20 per cent contribution requirements towards SALC programs' operating costs. A call for proposals for organizations to deliver SALC programming opened July 16.

Funding for the expansion was approved in the 2024 Fall Economic Statement.

SALC programs will be able to request up to \$55,000 for maintenance and operating costs, an increase from the previous maximum of \$50,000 in 2024 and up from \$42,700 in base funding from 2023.



#### Ontario supporting women and families in the trades

The Ontario government will soon introduce legislation that, if passed, will support families and help more women enter and remain in the skilled trades by creating a new job-protected parental leave for adoptive parents and parents through surrogacy. The government would also create a new 27-week job-protected leave for workers with serious illnesses and support women in the trades by requiring all sectors to have properly fitting personal protective clothing and equipment (PPE) for women.

"Our government has a clear mission: ensure Ontario continues to be the very best place to live, work, and raise a family," said David Piccini, Minister of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development. "That means making sure Ontarians never have to choose between being a worker or a parent, and that if a worker gets sick with a critical illness they can take the time to recover without worrying about their job. We're also promoting and protecting tradeswomen as an essential part of our workforce in every sector: we see you, we value you, and we can't build Ontario's future without you."

The province's upcoming legislation will propose a new 16-week job-protected leave under the Employment Standards Act for adoptive parents and parents through surrogacy, to ensure they have adequate time to meet the demands of the adoption or surrogacy process, attach and welcome their child into their new home. This would also align with upcoming federal changes to create employment insurance (EI) benefits for adoption.

The government also intends to propose a new 27-week long-term illness leave for employees unable to work due to a serious medical condition as defined by a medical practitioner, such as cancer, multiple sclerosis or Crohn's.



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## Mayors meet with House Speaker on illegal land use

The SUM-GTHA Mayors welcomed the Honourable Ted Arnott, MPP, Wellington-Halton Hills, Chair of the Board of Internal Economy and Speaker in Halton Hills recently. Arnott, who, from his perspective as Speaker of the House, provided insights into how provincial government can work together with local council to address pressing issues at a grassroots level.

A discussion regarding illegal land use, such as contractor yards and trucking depots on agricultural zoned land followed, and Arnott's assistance was requested in bringing the issue to members of the Legislature.

Illegal land uses are affecting property values and the quality of life for citizens in the form of road safety issues, including an increase in fatalities, and degradation of environmental lands.

The existing legislative and policy tools surrounding illegal land use are cumbersome, economically inefficient and often ill-suited to address realities, and enforcement is becoming increasingly difficult and costly.

Municipal bylaw officers are facing barred entry and intimidation at illegal land use sites, the group argues. They often need to seek police intervention to keep the peace. Offenders view the costs associated with non-compliance as nom-

inal, and simply just the cost of doing business. More powerful tools, such as injunctions, are required to enforce regulations and have offenders prosecuted through the court system as AMPS does not apply to land use issues as per The Planning Act.

"We invite the province to join in creating a joint provincial/municipal working group aimed at tackling illegal land use issues," the mayors aid.

"We are appreciative that the Province continues to listen to the leaders of small urban municipalities and show support by making legislative changes to help our communities thrive. The SUM-GTHA looks forward to our continued collaboration on the issue of illegal land use and reach a solution."



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#### GTA 'Masters' in collection showcased at Aurora Cultural Centre

Treasures from "Seven Masters" in the collection of the Georgina Centre for Arts and Culture are experiencing a homecoming of sorts at the Aurora Cultural Centre.

The Aurora Cultural Centre formally opened its latest exhibition entitled "Seven Masters," a curated show featuring works collected by the Georgina Centre for Arts & Culture (GCAC) since its inception in 2004.

The bulk of the works in question were donated to the GCAC by York Region artist and collector Bruce Smith and features works created by artists who might be familiar to Aurora Cultural Centre patrons: Albert Chiarandini, whose work was exhibited at the Church Street School in the Cultural Centre's second show in 2011, and Helen Lucas, who hosed her final solo show at the Aurora Cultural Centre in 2018. Their work hangs alongside those created by Kay Murray Weber, Travis Shilling, York Wilson, Tom Zsolt, and Bruce Smith himself.

"Over a year ago, Charlotte Hale from the GCHC and I began discussing the possibility of an exhibition featuring works from the permanent collection right here in the Aurora Cultural Centre. For some reason it felt right to place this show early in our programming schedule. It felt like sort of a homecoming," says Samantha Jones, Gallery Manager for the Aurora Cultural Centre.

"Little did I know this decision had already been made before. When the Aurora Cultural Centre first opened in 2010, its second exhibition was entitled York Region Vistas. This exhibition featured paintings by Albert Chiaradini, paintings that just happened to be from the Georgina Centre for Arts and Culture. "We had no idea that this had been the case until after we announced are just able to tick in a little deeper to it to our team, and our Communica- that artist and learn about them. It's original Cultural Centre staff members pointed out."

Once this connection was made, they found even more as they looked into each artist's ties to the area - and found that the wife of one of the artists, York

"That's why we titled these rooms Homeroom Galleries... because this used to be a public school. In addition to that, we were also delighted to welcome back the works of Helen Lucas. Helen actually opened up her last solo exhibition with us in 2018 that was titled Why Do I Paint Flowers? This was right before our temporary relocation for the construction of the Aurora Town Square projects. Sometimes exhibitions choose us and we just roll with the current it takes us in. We're housing these works for the next two months and excited for our community to experience the work."

GCAC Artistic Director Charlotte Hale says the donation from Smith amounted to hundreds of pieces, including nearly 200 painted by Chiaradini alone.

"Bruce Smith donated his own work and over the years other donations have been added either curated in or added in along the way by other significant donors," Hale says, adding that deaccessioning some items from the collection recently has allowed them to purchase more to broaden their collection. "Following our new mandate of diversifying the collection, we have made some really great purchases. It becomes more dynamic. The collection has become more dynamic and will stay that way, which is a good thing.




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## A Main Street Christmas



#### Szabo and Sakitkovski tally two goals each in Schomberg's 6-1 win over Caledon

Luke Szabo and Jacob Sakitkovski spurred the Schomberg offence with two goals each in the Cougars' decisive 6-1 win over the Caledon Golden Hawks on Thursday night at the Trisan Centre.

The Cougars got off to a quick start in the opening frame by scoring four goals in twelve minutes and outshooting the struggling Golden Hawks 15-4. Szabo opened the scoring at 6:08 with helpers from Matthew Lychek and Henry Kotyk. Two minutes later, Szabo notched his second goal on a power play deflection assisted by Jordyn Palazzo and Anthony Nascimento.

The veteran forward, who was named First Star of the Game by PJHL staff, described what turned out to be the game-winning goal: "We won the draw on the power play and I went to the front of the net - I don't normally stay there on the power play – the shot came in from the point and I didn't try to tip it, but it hit my stick out front and went in."

Szabo, the Cougars' leading scorer with 22 points, earned his third point in less than six minutes when he and AP linemate Sebastien Ferris set up Lychek at 11:39 to increase Schomberg's lead to 3-0.

Less than one minute later, rookie forward Roenik Mahal notched his team-leading 12th goal of the season to get the Golden Hawks on the board at 12:13. Schomberg Captain Jordyn Palazzo restored the Cougars' threegoal lead by scoring his team-leading 12th of the season with 1:21 left in the opening frame.

Sakitkovski increased the Cougars' lead to 5-1 at 12:01 of the middle frame. The rookie forward discussed the factors that led to his sixth of the season: "I crashed the net and Lessard got it to me. I turned and shot it. My girlfriend was in the stands so I didn't want to miss."

The impact of his girlfriend's presence must have been profound on Sakitkovski because he closed the scoring with 8:36 left in the final frame. While the teams were playing 4-on-4, Sakitkovski converted Ferris's pass by backhanding the puck past Caledon goaltender Mason Milone.

Sakitkovski, who was named Second Star of the Game by PJHL staff, discussed the importance of the team's decisive win over the Golden Hawks: "It was really important that we got off to a quick start tonight against them. We haven't had good starts against Caledon this season. Tonight's 4-1 lead after the first period made a statement from the start. These are points we have to have."

The veteran Assistant Captain agreed with Sakitkovski's insights about the importance of a quick start against Caledon, but he also applauded the efforts of Cougars' netminder Nicolas Morvan and his defense corps for their fine play on Thursday night: "Our goalie made some big saves in the third period when we had to kill 5-on-3 penalties. Our D did a very good job carrying the puck out of our zone and putting pressure on Caledon all game, especially Henry Kotyk who was selected to the PJHL's all-star team."

Kotyk, the smooth-skating defenceman who earned two assists versus Caledon, was named Third Star of the Game by PJHL staff.

The amount of pressure pass rushers exerted on Caledon was indicated by the shots on goal total which favored the home side 53-19.

With the emphatic win, the thirdplace Cougars improved their record to 13-9-2-0 and trail the second-place Georgina Ice (15-5-1-0) by only 4 points in the East Orr Division. The seventh-place Golden Hawks slipped to 1-21-2-0 with the loss.

A new format of curling called Sturling is grabbing a substantial amount of interest for curlers that maybe approaching a different age bracket or heaven forbid, a change in physical ability.

(S) Stick or Slide, (T) Two person, and urling. All put together reads Sturling.

Tuesday afternoons the sheets of King include 2 curlers per team that play with either a stick or the traditional slide delivery. Teams are created beforehand which allows members to play with different people each week. One player holds the broom and calls the end while the mates throw 6 rocks each at one end of the sheet.

At the conclusion of the end, players switch their position and the 6 rocks are thrown back by the other teammate to the other end. The strategy is mostly draws to the button and or Tap ups (tapping a stone further up the scoring area). No stone anywhere in the playing area can be removed before 3 rocks have been thrown, even if its in the house where in regular format its a removable or hittable stone.

Sweeping is allowed only from the Hogline in towards the rings for the whole game. Scoring remains the same, but what makes this in a category of its own is the pace of play and the fact that curlers will have thrown 54 rocks in a matter of an hour and a half.

A great way of curling for those who don't (usually) or cannot sweep and for those that really want to practice their draw weight.

Larry Sheardown, convener and avid "Sturler" played in an National event last season, says "it's the best of both worlds for curlers to keep playing in an non-traditional format."

Curling clubs in Western Canada are facing a Sturling frenzy with some having more members in their Sturling leagues than in their regular leagues. As we get older and less flexible, Curling once again has found a way to keep us in it to be physically active, socially active and most of all keep having fun.





"God tends to choose regular people to do the important things. God tends to find people far away from the seats of wealth, power and influence.




