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

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# King centre recognized with design award

King City's library and seniors centre has been recognized for its stunning architecture.

The facility was awarded Canada's top architecture award by Her Excellency the Right Honourable Mary Simon, Governor General of Canada, at a ceremony at Rideau Hall last week.

The King City building was among 12 projects from across Canada recognized for its "exceptional, innovative and outstanding design."

Mayor Steve Pellegrini was on hand for the ceremony, swelling with pride that King has vet another feather in its cap.

The Governor General's Medals in Architecture and Landscape Architecture are presented by the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada, the Canadian Society of Landscape Architects, and the Canada Council for the Arts.

The biennial awards recognize and celebrate outstanding design in recently completed built projects of any size, type and geographical location by Canadian architects.

The competition continues a tradition initiated by the Massey Medals in 1950, providing an important source of understanding of the nature of Canadian architecture and the regional, cultural, and historic forces expressed in the built environment. Outstanding design considers exemplary approaches to sustainability, and the support and advancement of equity, diversity, and inclusion.

The library and seniors centre opened during COVID, in November 2021.

Construction of the 21,000-squarefoot (1,951-square-metre) building on King Road began in 2018. The bright, modern facility is nestled in the hillside across the road from King City Secondary School.

The Library Branch building includes meeting and study spaces, a reading lounge, book and out-of-the-box collections, public-use technology, children and teen areas and a Make-It Lab. The Seniors' Centre includes rental space, community space and program areas.

The building also has a host of environmental features, including efficient heating and cooling; energy-saving LED lighting; exterior window glazing; electric vehicle charging station, and a storm water infiltration system.

The cost of the construction was \$11.2 million. Funding sources include \$5.4 million from development charges, \$3 million from Township debenture, \$1.6 million from parkland dedication and \$200,000 from Township funds.

### Homelessness York Region receives federal and provincial funding to support homelessness

York Regional Council received an update on federal and provincial government funding to support housing and homelessness.

On Jan. 27, the Provincial Government announced \$75.5 million in Provincial Encampment Response Initiative and Last Mile funding. York Region will receive \$1.4 million between November 1, 2024, and March 21, 2025, for Encampment Response Initiative actions and \$3.98 million for the same period in Last Mile Funding. On Jan. 22, the Honourable Nathaniel Erskine-Smith, Minister of Housing, Infrastructure and Communities, announced the federal government would provide \$91.5 million in Unsheltered Homelessness Encampment Initiative funding to Ontario 10 municipalities. York Region will receive \$10.8 million over a two-year period, and as part of the federal funding agreement, the Region will match the investment. This much-needed funding will help create new emergency and transitional housing spaces, renovate existing spaces, increase drop-in programs and boost homelessness prevention activities.

The King Weekly Sentinel reached out to local provincial candidates, asking them about the top issues. Their responses appear in alphabetical order.

What are the top issues facing Ontario and how will your party address them?



#### **Stephen Lecce, PC**

"Our province is facing an unprecedented threat - President Donald Trump has made it clear that he will stop at nothing to get what he wants, even if it means turning on the United States' closest friend and ally. His repeated threats to impose devastating tariffs on all Canadian exports are real, as we've seen with his snap 25% tariffs on Canadian steel and aluminum exports that put hundreds of thousands of Ontario jobs in danger, many of which are right here in the Township of King and Vaughan.

"I went to Washington with Premier Ford to deliver a clear message to U.S. lawmakers: Canada is not for sale.

"The next four years will bring shifting goalposts, constant chaos, and an economy under attack. That's why it is more important than ever that our government secures a strong, stable, fourvear mandate from the people – one that outlasts the Trump administration. This election is about protecting Ontario and standing up for our sovereignty and economic future.

"Our plan is focused on protecting families, building Ontario's economy and infrastructure, and keeping our communities safe.

"At a time when Donald Trump's tardanger, we are fighting the job-killing Liberal carbon tax that is driving up costs for businesses and families, keeping our economy competitive. We're committed to supporting the most atrisk sectors by investing tens of billions of dollars to help companies retool and keep their workers employed. We're cutting red tape and streamlining approvals to get major projects built in needs first to have a resilient people. faster – including new and upgraded non-emitting nuclear power and critical mineral projects in the North—to ensure Ontario can generate clean, reliable, and affordable energy to power our economy. "At every turn, we are lowering the cost of doing business in this province so Ontario remains the most competitive jurisdiction for investing and creating jobs. "Under the previous Liberal government, Ontario lost over 300,000 manufacturing jobs – many of which fled to the United States. Our government will not let that happen under the Trump administration. Since 2018, we've secured \$45 billion in new investments to bring Canada's first electric vehicle and battery plants to Ontario, creating thousands of good-paying jobs and positioning our province as a global leader in auto manufacturing.

"We are investing \$1.5 billion to train 600,000 workers in the skilled trades so more Ontarians can access high-demand jobs and build our economy.

"We're investing nearly \$200 billion in new roads, highways, and public transit infrastructure projects to reduce gridlock, connect communities, and create construction and skilled trades jobs. Close to home, we're getting shovels in the ground for Highway 413 and the Bradford Bypass, while upgrading the King City, Rutherford, and Maple GO stations with hundreds of new parking spaces and making twoway, all-day GO train service a reality. We are committed to building a new GO station in Kleinburg-Nashville to support families across the Highway 27 corridor, including Nobleton and beyond.

"Protecting Ontario also means protecting our community from violent and repeat criminals. Strengthening bail laws, building new jails, and hiring more police officers is how we crack down on violent crime and keep offenders off our streets. We're clearing illegal encampments from public parks. We are also outright banning drug injection sites near schools and daycares to ensure your kids come home safe and sound—a critical priority I championed in government.

"I was also proud to invest in families by announcing the construction of Canada's first medical school dedicated to graduating family physicians next to Cortellucci Vaughan Hospital. Moreover, I delivered three long-term care projects to our community for over 600 seniors and established our first Youth Mental Health Hub to provide compassionate, wrap-around support for our kids.

"This election is about protecting Ontario: building a strong economy, defending our jobs, making life more affordable, and keeping our families safe. This is our moment as a province and iffs are putting so many of our jobs in country to protect our economic future while embracing our history, values, and our flag. "Canada is not for sale. Not now, not ever – and only the Ontario PCs have a plan to protect Ontario."



Governments from this time forward must not assume that interest rates on the provincial debt will remain low but plan to start paying down the debt, refraining from wasteful spending that is not for the betterment of all Ontarians in the long view.

"We need everyone in society to feel healthy, strong, and connected. It has been years since Ontarians, and Canadians, have witnessed responsible long-view leadership which is urgently required to meet the needs of the moment.

"The Greens have a budgeted plan how to fund closing the income gap, strengthen the bonds between us and help to get people back on their feet. Some of the revenue streams are mentioned below. One is to ask those with higher incomes to pay a little more.

"Despite an unnecessary, very early, snap winter election, the Green Party of Ontario released their fully costed platform on Feb. 13. Here is my brief of three topics of note.

"Housing - The Green plan is to build homes in people-centred neighbourhoods, not sprawling over farmland or destroying nature.

"The Green Party of Ontario, GPO, will address this several ways including ending the Land Transfer Tax for first-time home buyers and offering zero-interest \$25,000 for homeowners who wish o add a rental unit to their primary residence. In addition, the GPO will remove development taxes on housing less than 2,000 square feet that are built in urban areas while reimbursing the lost revenue to municipalities.

"The GPO will legalize more types of homes, update the Building Code to allow for more efficient housing to be built more efficiently, require municipalities to permit pre-approved housing designs for more affordable development and partner with non-profit and co-ops to build housing faster.

"The Green plans will fix an unfair rental system, build 2 million new homes over 10 years within urban boundaries to create thriving, walkable, affordable, people-centred neighbourhoods with schools and parks nearby, and a corner store down the street.

"Health – First, we must take care of the people who care for us.

"The GPO will address this in wavs that include improving working conditions, especially in rural areas, in order to attract, train, and retain doctors, nurses, paramedics, and personal service workers. Improvements will be implemented whether at a LTC home, or a community clinic which might be a nurse-practitioner-led clinic, perhaps a new rural hospital, or at your home. The plan includes anchoring within primary care the home care and community care system while reducing the administrative burden on primary care doctors.

"The GPO will end the privatization of our healthcare system, prioritize a preventative approach to healthcare and try to solve problems before they begin by addressing the social and environmental determinants of health. The plan includes building good healthy not-for-profit homes for seniors and phasing out for-profit care because for-profit LTC homes spend 24% less per year on care for each resident than non-profit homes.

"Additionally, the GPO will double the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) and Ontario Works rates as a first step to implementing a Basic Income, and tie future increases to inflation. The Greens will reduce the stress for 3 million Ontarians with disability and fulfill the overdue promises in the Accessible Ontario Pledge.

"Education – The number one way to invest in our children's future is by properly funding schools, teachers and education workers.

"The GPO has many actions to accomplish this which include immediately increasing funding for schools by \$1,500 per student to make up for cuts since 2018, double the number of students that can access the Student Nutrition Programs expanding it to be province-wide by 2030, and hire more teachers and educational assistants to reduce class sizes. In addition the GPO will speed up maintenance and repairs, including for accessibility, for Ontario public schools and adopt a Standard of Good Repair, and reduce care wait times for children with autism and special needs.

"Some of the other actions that the GPO will take include bringing the Arts and physical education back to the curricula, invest in quality professional development for educators, provide funds to school boards to ensure access to mental health supports, and work

with the federal government for access the estimates of revenues over the next fast-tracking international physicians, to \$10 a day, quality child care in every community.

"To encourage students into post-secondary programs in careers experiencing shortages, the GPO will implement a dedicated tuition waiver and incentivize part-time enrolment to increase those who wish to up-skill while working

"Additionally, the GPO will immediately reverse the cuts made to OSAP by converting loans to grants for low and middle income students and eliminating interest charges on student debt and immediately return to a enrolment-based finding model for universities and colleges, increasing per student funding by 20% with annual increases matching inflation.

"If you are wondering where the money will come from to pay for the GPO platform's operational spending and capital costs, please look online at gpo.ca/platform to access both the platform document and the three page spreadsheet of the platform's full costing.

It may be of interest to some that

"Greens may not form government, but the purpose of our detailed platforms and costing is to show all what is in the realm of possible and why it is necessary. #### Gillian Vivona, Liberal

"Over the past two years, I've crisscrossed this riding knocking on doors. meeting with community groups and participating in local activities. I've listened closely to the residents of King-Vaughan. What they've told me loud and clear - and now backed up by extensive provincial voter polling, is that there are three top issues they are facing every day.

"Their top concern by far is the state of our public Health Care system. They know we have excellent medical professionals but the whole system is stretched beyond capacity. There are 57,119 people without a family doctor in King and Vaughan. Families are playing the waiting game for their care: waiting for appointments, waiting in hallways for hospital care (2,000 people a day!), waiting for surgeries and procedures, waiting for referrals to specialists, waiting for cancer care and hip replacements and waiting for their loved ones to get a space in long-term care (48,000 waiting).

With increased privatization under Doug Ford, many have shared that they felt forced to pay for care out of pocket to avoid long delays, or from fear of not

and we're ensuring care when families need it – on evenings and weekends.

"Another constant theme I am hearing is the unaffordability of homeownership and the high cost of rent. Young people are losing hope that they can ever buy a home because the price of an average Ontario home has increased by nearly 45% since 2018, and rents have increased by 45% in York Region. Meanwhile, Ford has done nothing to spur housing starts which have plunged by 15 percent in 2024 – the lowest in 70 years. That's just unacceptable.

"We, however, have a plan to make home ownership more affordable and bring back hope to those who thought it was out of reach. We will eliminate the provincial Land Transfer Tax for firsttime homebuyers, seniors downsizing, and non-profit home builders (for an average saving of \$13,500), scrap Development Charges on new middle-class housing (saving as much as \$170,000 on a new home) and introduce fair, phasedin rent control to make renting more affordable.

"The third issue that I hear from young couples to seniors is that life is unaffordable, and they are struggling to even cover basic needs such as groceries. That's not surprising considering under Ford; economic growth has slowed to a crawl at 0.3% while unemployment has increased to a whopping 7.4%. The situation is even more dire for our youth as their unemployment rate is 17%!

"A very worrisome sign is that only 16 per cent of businesses have confidence in Ontario's economy - a record low. We must ask why economic growth has stagnated under Ford. While Ford is wasting billions of taxpayers' money on gimmicks and bad deals, like a private spa at Ontario Place and putting beer in corner stores a year early, families have gotten further behind.

'The Ontario Liberals have a clear, strong plan to re-energize our economy and give all families a boost to get ahead. We will cut the small business tax rate by half, saving up to \$18,000, allowing for increased investments in advanced machinery, new hires, and business expansion. We will also lower the personal income tax rate for middle class Ontario families by reducing the tax rate on taxable income between \$51,446 - \$75,000 by 22 per cent. A third measure is to eliminate the 8% HST on heating and hydro bills for everyone. These three key initiatives will put more money back into people's wallets. "Over and over, people are telling me the same stories of their frustrations with healthcare, housing and affordability. They are expressing fear and worry about their futures. I am listen-

These projects resulted in 33 hectares of land being restored within the watershed, with 75% of them increasing biodiversity, and 73% addressing climate change stressors.

Ms. Sharp concluded her presentation by looking forward to the year ahead, mentioning that there are over 45 projects in progress for 2025.

Chief Administrative Officer Rob Baldwin further reiterated the importance of advancing innovative research to better understand and address environmental challenges, including climate change and biodiversity loss. He also introduced a year-in-review video compilation, highlighting noteworthy achievements.

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# Southlake pioneers 4D technology for complex cardiac cases

Southlake Health is leading the way in cardiac care by pioneering the use of 4D intracardiac echocardiogram (ICE) catheters, a new tool that provides real-time images of the heart for some of the most complex cardiac cases in the province.

Not yet approved for regular use in Canada, hospitals must receive "Special Access" authorization from Health Canada to use the Nuvision 4D ICE catheter for specific patients. Southlake is the second hospital in Ontario and one of the first four hospitals in Canada to use this technology, building on its international reputation for ground-breaking procedures and innovative solutions.

Typically, physicians who require a 3D image of the heart use transesophageal echocardiograms (TEE), a procedure during which a thin tube is guided down the esophagus to take pictures of the heart. The Nuvision 4D ICE catheter is next generation technology. A small catheter with an ultrasound sensor is inserted from the leg into the heart to generate real-time images of the valves and other structures. This advanced technology provides higher quality, real-time images, allowing physicians to instantly see the heart in 3D so that patients who cannot use TEE can still undergo life-changing cardiac procedures that help them avoid recurrent heart failure and other complications.

# York expanding its rapid transit

York Region needs more rapid transit.

Jane Street, from Highway 7 to Major Mackenzie Drive in Vaughan, is one of the Region's busiest transit routes and York Region Council is investing in the preliminary planning and engineering for bus rapid transit (BRT) along this key corridor.

Jane Street BRT will support housing growth as it materializes along this corridor with 45,000+ active development applications and an expected increase of 30,000+ more people and 64,000+ more jobs by 2051.

The Environmental Assessment (EA) and 30% Preliminary Design for this critical project is under way and York Region's Rapid Transit Corporation is looking to raise awareness and get public feedback to help shape the future of this important rapid transit corridor. for cardiac care, they're trusting us with their hearts, a responsibility that our team takes incredibly seriously," said Warren Cantor, MD, Southlake Health. "Special access to cutting-edge technology like the 4D ICE catheter enables us to offer treatment options to patients who otherwise have little to no options, improving their quality of life. We are honoured to play a key role in bringing this technology to Southlake and Canada."

Last fall, the Regional Cardiac Program at Southlake received a referral from a cardiologist in Windsor. Their patient, Nancy Skinner, was seeking treatment for tricuspid valve regurgitation (TVR), a form of heart valve disease in which the valve between the two right chambers of the heart does not fully close. Moderate to severe TVR is a serious condition that requires treatment, including surgical valve repair or replacement, to ensure enough oxygen rich blood flows through the heart.

However, Nancy was not a candidate for surgery and complications with her heart valve prevented clear imaging of the valve with TEE. This imaging is necessary to ensure a safe and successful procedure, and patients who cannot have TEE or have inadequate imaging with the tool are ineligible for procedures like a transcatheter tricuspid valve repair, leaving them with limited care options. Nancy and her cardiologist needed more options to address her heart disease. Undeterred, Dr. Cantor, an international expert in acute coronary syndromes, and the cardiac team at Southlake turned to global solutions in the Nuvision 4D ICE catheter.

"Over the last century, Southlake Health has built a proud legacy of leading edge care, close to home to save patients from travelling into Toronto," said Derek McNally, Executive Vice President, Clinical Services and Chief Operating Officer, Southlake Health. "Our world-class team at the Regional Cardiac Centre continues to lead ground-breaking research and techniques, ensuring patients from York Region to Muskoka, and beyond have access to the best care possible."

With the 4D ICE catheter's real-time imaging, Dr. Cantor was able to repair the patient's heart valve using a minimally invasive procedure. This helped relieve the patient's symptoms and im-



prove her breathing. Today, she is doing much better.

"I feel like myself again," said Nancy. "Dr. Cantor and the cardiac team at Southlake Health gave me another chance at life and went above and beyond to do so. I am so thankful for their resourcefulness in getting this new technology."

Southlake's Regional Cardiac Program is home to one of two Structural Heart Programs in Ontario and one of four in Canada. The program uses minimally invasive procedures to treat conditions that affect the heart's structure, including the valves, walls, muscles, and blood vessels. Today, Southlake is one of the highest volume centres in Canada for transcatheter mitral valve repair, providing care to patients from York Region, Simcoe County, and beyond. The team at Southlake works with patients to provide the best care possible, which in some cases includes cutting-edge transcatheter procedures that are not available many in other cardiac centres.

"Southlake's deep commitment to patients pushes our team to continuously raise the bar for leading edge cardiac care, even when that care is complex," said Elizabeth Lalingo, Director of the Department of Cardiac Health, Southlake Health. "Every patient who walks through our doors can be confident that they're receiving comprehensive care that is cutting-edge on the world stage."

As a Level 7 Regional Cardiac Pro-

gram, Southlake's contributions to advancing cardiac care extends far beyond operating and procedure rooms. The highly skilled team of medical staff and staff provide almost every type of cardiac care, with the exception of heart transplants, to patients who no longer need to travel far distances to Toronto.

As leaders in their fields, the team actively participate in ground-breaking research and are often the first to perform leading edge procedures in Ontario, Canada and even the world. Southlake continues to collaborate with international experts to enhance cardiac care and improve patient outcomes globally.

### York Region receives funding to support housing, homelessness

York Regional Council received an update on federal and provincial government funding to support housing and homelessness.

On Jan. 27, the Provincial Government announced \$75.5 million in Provincial Encampment Response Initiative and Last Mile funding. York Region will receive \$1.4 million between November 1, 2024, and March 21, 2025, for Encampment Response Initiative actions and \$3.98 million for the same period in Last Mile Funding.

On Jan. 22, the Honourable Nathaniel Erskine-Smith, Minister of Housing, Infrastructure and Communities, announced the federal government would provide \$91.5 million in Unsheltered Homelessness Encampment Initiative funding to Ontario 10 municipalities. York Region will receive \$10.8 million over a two-year period, and as part of the federal funding agreement, the Region will match the investment.

This much-needed funding will help create new emergency and transitional housing spaces, renovate existing spaces, increase drop-in programs and boost homelessness prevention activities.

# Highly anticipated History of King book launches in April, coincides with King's 175 Annniversary


The King Township Historical Society is proud to announce that local author Ann Love, in tandem with dedicated researcher Sharon Bentley, have submitted the final manuscript of their highly-anticipated 476-page book, The History of King Township: A Community Shaped by the Land, for publication in late March.

Their book launch is set for Thursday, April 24, from 4:30-6:30pm at the King Township Municipal Centre; serendipitously coinciding with the celebration of King Township's 175th anniversary year.

Six years in the making, and significantly delayed due to closures during the pandemic, this labour of love traces the formation of King Township's unique natural landscape and narrates the adventures of those who have made King their home.

The writing team looked for connections between the people and the land over time with the underlying question – why has so much of the township's countryside survived into the 21st century given its proximity to Toronto?

The authors unearthed fresh stories as well as new insights to enliven familiar tales. The book considers hundreds of generations of First Peoples who managed the land in strategic and subtle ways. What mechanisms of colonialism were applied in King Township and how did they affect King's First Peoples and landscape? Who were the early settlers and their descendants and how did their values, imaginations and stories impact the township? Finally, the book considers the 20th century influx of city folks, many of whom shared with long-time residents a determination to keep King Township a green, living community. Beautifully crafted with high-quality paper, a hardcover, and surveyor Stegmann's 1800 map of King beneath the dust jacket, The History of King Township: A Community Shaped by the Land will be available for pre-order online starting in early March for \$30. It will then officially debut at a public book launch at the King Township Municipal Centre on Thursday, April 24 from 4:30-6:30 p.m. at the same price and later



retail for \$50 at the King Heritage & Cultural Centre (King Museum) and various local shops and cafes.

Sharon Bentley, B.A., LT, KTHS Board Member and retired Deputy Chief Librarian of the King Township Public Library, unearthed, compiled, and indexed the research for this book.

Serving considerable time on both the King Township Historical Society Board and the King Township Museum Board, she was also responsible for establishing the King Township Archives (along with Virginia Atkins).

Elsa-Ann still serves on the Museum Board and volunteers twice a week at the King Heritage & Cultural Centre, conducting archival research and supervising other volunteers. She also belongs to a book club, sewing club and the University of Toronto Women's Club and credits keeping busy to her longevity! The KTHS dates back to 1972 when a group of dedicated residents, with interests in preserving the history of their township, gathered to form the King Township Historical Society. In 1981-1982, the KTHS was incorporated by the Ontario Historical Society under a Provincial Letters Patent. Their goals and objectives are to encourage research into the history, to secure and preserve an accurate account of the progress and development, and to promote public interest in the history of King Township. A volunteer mission in Mexico recently marked its 10th anniversary, and a King resident has helped in its resounding success.

"Operation Apple" acknowledges its tenth anniversary by having firefighters unite with police officers to hand out apples to local Chapala children.

A retired police officer from King has decided to share his knowledge and expertise with Mexican law enforcement personnel. Doug Ransom has done some ride-alongs with the Chapala Police in Mexico and helped launch the program.

He helped teach Chapala officers principles reflective of policing in Toronto, and it became apparent that the local police needed strategies to improve its rapport with the public. "Out of that need, I came up with a strategy whereby local expat organizations would fund the acquisition of boxes of apples and uniform police officers would hand them out to kids on 'Three Kings Day' or what is referred

to elsewhere as the Epiphany, which is the last day of the Christmas season in Mexico," Ransom explained.

Once again this year on Jan. 6, Three Kings Day is a major gift-giving day given it mirrors the three Wise Men arriving in Bethlehem with gifts for the new born, Jesus.

Operation Apple again took place in Chapala on this very special day. This year marks the 10th anniversary that this annual public relations event has taken place. Unlike other years, this year, members of the Chapala Fire Department joined police officers from Chapala Police to hand out the apples.

The smiles on children's faces and the gratitude shown by their parents and older siblings, were an indication that this is a program that is appreciated by all who participate, Ransom noted. As these community heroes distributed apples to local children to celebrate Three Kings Day, it was apparent that these efforts are appreciated by the community. The main street near the Malecon was the perfect location as families gathered in the Mexican sun to enjoy the closing days of the 2024/2025 Christmas Season.

# 12UA Rebellion captures King Challenge Playoff Cup


The 12UA King Rebellion Head Coach Joey Altomare is preparing his hockey team for the final weekend of their regular season and is confident his surging team will perform well in the upcoming OMHA playoffs.

The veteran rep coach has been pleasantly surprised by his team's performance in 2024-25 in what he considered to be a rebuilding year: "This is a newly-built 'A' team. It was supposed to be a development year and we would have been satisfied with a .500 record with all the new players on the team, but we've surpassed our goals and we're in third place in our league."

Coach Altomare praised the myriad components of the team that have contributed to a successful season thus far: "I couldn't ask for a better coaching staff. We've got a great set of parents and an outstanding group of players. They're great kids on and off the ice."

After winning the King Challenge Playoff Cup Championship Jan. 19 with a decisive 4-1 win over the Clarence-Rockland Crush, Coach Altomare believes his third-place squad is heading towards the final weekend of the regular season and into the playoffs with a full head of steam.

The personable rep coach stressed the significance of winning a local tournament - set mostly in King Township - as a key source of momentum for his young club: "Home town tournament wins are very important. It hits home and it's sentimental for everybody involved. I mean, who doesn't want to win their own tournament?"



The King Challenge Playoff Cup featured preliminary match-ups at the newly-opened Zancor Centre in King City – home of the OJHL King Rebellion - and Westwood Arena in Etobicoke, home of the OJHL Toronto Patriots. In addition to the host club, the tournament included teams from Mississauga, Willowdale, and Clarence-Rockland.

In the championship game on Sunday afternoon in Nobleton, the Rebellion avenged an opening round 2-1 loss to the Crush to capture the championship. Sebastian Bella powered the King offence with three goals including the tournament-winning goal at 2:37 of the second period.

After a scoreless first period, King lit the lamp three times in the middle

frame with a pair of goals from Bella and one from James Sacilotto. The Rebellion carried a 3-1 lead into the third period and Bella completed his hat trick at 10:38 to crush any comeback attempt by Clarence-Rockland.

Bella led his team in tournament goals scored with five. Marcel Altomare, Francesco Ieraci, and Stefano Cancellara fired four goals each over the five-game tournament to provide the Rebellion with a well-balanced offensive attack that cranked out 26 goals. King accrued a 4-1 record and starting goaltender Jake Racco allowed only 4 goals and earned two shutouts in five games.

Coach Altomare offered this assessment of his team's performance: "Everyone put in an exact effort. Everybody did their job and played their role. It was a complete team effort. Everyone worked hard and, most importantly, everyone had fun. Winning is always a bit more fun. It was an incredible weekend of hockey and the boys gave it everything they had. To see the team come together and pull off this victory a pair of goals by Adam Halderson

two minutes apart to give King a 5-0 lead. Ieraci's second goal of the game at 9:46 provided his club with a six-goal margin. Stefano Cancellara scored less than two minutes later and Altomare completed his natural hat trick at 6:10 to give King an insurmountable 8-0 lead after two periods. Sebastian Bella closed the scoring at 1:42 of the third period and Jake Racco earned his first of two shutouts in the tournament.

Game 2 for King was the polar opposite to the Game 1 blowout. After trailing the Willowdale Hawks 1-0 after two periods of play on Friday night, the Rebellion's high octane offence shook off its nocturnal slumber. A three-goal rally with less than three minutes to play in the final period salvaged a gutsy 3-1 victory. Ieraci tied the game with 2:45 left on the clock and Cancellara fired the game-winner at 1:59. Saccucci provided an insurance marker with three ticks left on the clock to punctuate the comeback win by the "The Cardiac Kids from King."

On Saturday morning in Game 3, and Samuel Leblanc gave the Clarence-Rockland Crush a 2-0 lead after the first period. Cancellara's third of the tourney at 2:18 of the middle frame pulled the Rebellion to within one of the Crush, but King dropped its only game at the Challenge Playoff Cup in what turned out to be a sneak preview of the championship final. In the semi-final playoff on Saturday evening, King bounced back from its narrow loss to Clarence-Rockland by shutting out the Spitfires 9-0. Game 4 was eerily similar to Game 1. With the timely road win, King (21-23-1-5) pulled six points ahead of the Georgetown Raiders (18-25-2-4) in the two-horse race for the final OJHL West playoff spot. Ninth-place Georgetown has faltered down the stretch. The Raiders' 2-1 loss in Pickering on Tuesday, 7-4 loss in Collingwood on Friday, and 5-3 loss to Buffalo at home on Saturday enhanced the Rebellion's playoff chances. Although Georgetown has one game in hand on King, the Raiders face a slate of playoff-bound opponents down the stretch - Buffalo, Toronto Patriots, Stouffville, Milton, and Niagara Falls (twice) – as well as pesky tenthplace Oakville. To complicate matters, the struggling squad has won only once in January and February. The Raiders' record in 2025 is 1-12, including two recent losses to last-place Caledon. By comparison, King has cobbled together a 7-5 record in 2025 and closes its regular season schedule with two games versus 11th-place Mississauga, two games against third-place Milton, and one each versus eighth-place Pickering and the fourth-place Patriots. Rebellion Head Coach Mark Joslin has been pleased with his team's recent performance and noted the significance of Thursday night's victory in The Queen City: "It was our biggest win of the year -a fun bus ride home for the boys. We were lucky there were no weather issues in Buffalo.' Seven minutes into the first period, the Junior Sabres opened the scoring when Brody Seitz beat King goaltender Tre Altiman, but Rebellion forward Sam Black fired his 12th of the season at 8:55 to pull his team into a 1-1 tie. 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
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

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
